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FIRST-AND-10...

- The University of Maryland, winners of two of its final three regular-season games, will take on Oregon State University in the sixth annual Emerald Bowl at 8:30 p.m. ET on Friday, Dec. 28 in San Francisco, Calif. It will mark the first-ever meeting between the teams and the 22nd bowl appearance for the Terps who became eligible for postseason play with their most complete performance of the year, a dominating 37-0 shutout of NC State on Saturday, Nov. 24. The game will be telecast nationally on ESPN and broadcast on the Terrapin Sports Radio Network.
- The Terps offense, which was decimated by injuries in the regular season (only three players started all 12 games), came together over the last month of the year, averaging 424.3 yards during the final three games, including a season-high 472 in the upset of No. 8 Boston College (Nov. 10). Maryland ranks fifth in the ACC in total offense (350.6 ypg), including third in rushing (147.3 ypg). Seniors Lance Ball and Keon Lattimore combine to average nearly 140 rushing yards per game. Lattimore is fifth in the ACC and 71st nationally in rushing (71.7 ypg), and has tallied a league-best 13 rushing TDs. Ball is the fourth all-time leading rusher in school history (2,482 yards). The Terps will face the second-ranked rushing defense in the country (74.92 ypg) in Oregon State. Despite playing behind a banged-up offensive line, sophomore Chris Turner has been solid for the Terps since taking over as the starting QB in the sixth game of the year. Turner, who stepped under center for junior Jordan Steffy (injured vs. Rutgers), ranks third in the ACC is passing efficiency (136.7 rating). WR Darrius Heyward-Bey, a 2006 freshman All-American, leads the Terps in receptions (48) and receiving yards (687). He posted 21 catches over the last four games of the regular season. Senior guard Andrew Crummey, one of the top linemen in the nation, missed most of the season half of the season, while junior guard Jaimie Thomas missed the final five games of the year.
- The Terps rank 42nd nationally in total defense (355.9 ypg) and 28th in scoring defense (21.58 ppg). The Maryland defense also stepped up down the stretch, holding NC State (Nov. 24) to just 250 total yards, including 10 on the ground, and in the win over the Eagles, sacked Heisman candidate Matt Ryan a season-high four times and held BC to 45 rushing yards. The Terps surrendered an average of 69.7 rushing yards over the last three games. OSU averages 166.58 rushing yards per game (No. 43 in the country), including 103.70 by Yvenson Bernard. The Terps possess two of the top tacklers in the country in junior linebackers Erin Henderson and Dave Philistin, who rank eighth (11.1) and tied for 31st (10.1), respectively, in the nation in tackles per game. Henderson was a preseason All-American and a Butkus Award semifinalist, and earned All-ACC honors for the second straight season. Senior tackle Dre Moore, a first-team all-conference choice, has a team-high six sacks. Moore has also averaged 6.5 tackles in his last six contests. Junior cornerback Kevin Barnes has led the secondary with four of the team's 12 interceptions.
- The Terps special teams distinguished itself well this season despite three new starters. True freshman Travis Baltz and junior place-kicker Obi Egekeze are both in their first seasons seeing game action. Baltz, a freshman All-ACC choice, ranks seventh in the ACC in punting average (41.3), including second (43.1) in league contests. Egekeze has hit 17 of 22 field goals, including a league-best 93 percent (13 of 14) in ACC games. Redshirt freshman Da'Rel Scott, a backup running back, has been the No. 1 kickoff return man, though he was slowed by injuries earlier in the year. He's averaging 22.1 yards per return and 19.1 yards each time he touches the ball. Junior Danny Oquendo was the lone returning specialist. SS Christian Varner and CB Anthony Wiseman took over punt returner duties due to a season-ending knee injury to Oquendo. The Terps rank first in the country in kickoff return yardage defense (16.1 ypr) and 42nd in punt return yardage defense (7.4 ypr).

ALL ABOUT OREGON STATE

SCOUTING THE BEAVERS

- Oregon State finished the year red hot, winning six of its last seven games after a 2-3 start. A 24-3 setback to then
 No. 13 USC was the Beavers only loss in that span. The Beavers are 14-3 combined in the months of October,
 November, and December over the last two seasons.
- In the regular-season finale, the Beavers defeated No. 18 Oregon, 38-31, in double overtime in the annual Civil
 War game. Matt Sieverson, subbing for an injured Yvenson Bernard, ran for 142 yards and a touchdown in the
 win
- Bernard has run for 1,037 yards and 12 touchdowns this season in only 10 games. The senior has amassed 3,685 yards and 37 rushing touchdowns for his career, second all-time in school history. As a receiver he has 790 yards and three touchdowns in four years. He is averaging 103.7 yards per game on the ground this season, 28th best in the country.
- Head coach Mike Riley (46-38, .548) is in his second tour of duty at the school. He served as the head man from 1997-98 before leaving to take over the same job with the NFL's San Diego Chargers. He returned to Corvallis in 2003, and has posted winning records in four of his five seasons.
- Oregon State is 3-0 in bowl games under Riley. The Beavers downed Missouri, 39-38, in the 2006 Sun Bowl, beat Notre Dame in the 2004 Insight Bowl, 38-21, and defeated New Mexico, 55-14, in the 2003 Las Vegas Bowl.
- With the win over the Ducks, Oregon State head coach Mike Riley has now won five of his last nine games against ranked opponents.
- Three Oregon State players Victor Butler, Slade Norris, and Dorian Smith rank in the top 10 of the Pac-10 conference in sacks. As a team the Beavers are third in the NCAA in quarterback takedowns as they average 3.5 per game.
- The Beaver defense is 12th in the NCAA in total defense, and specializes in stopping the run. Oregon State has
 the second best rushing defense in the nation, allowing only 74.92 yards per game on the ground. The Beavers
 allow 23.33 points per game.
- OSU ranks 77th nationally in total offense (370.67 ypg), including 43rd in rushing (166.58).
- Senior Alexis Serna serves as both the team's primary kicker and punter. The former walk-on has hit 18 of his 26 field goals but only averages 35.59 yards per punt.
- The Beavers have outscored their opponents 127-16 in the first quarter of games this season. Extending back to the team's last 21 games, the Beavers have outscored their opponents 207-40 in the opening quarter.
- OSU forces a lot of turnovers, but is has also committed a few. The Beavers have forced 32 turnovers, tied for seventh best in the country, but have lost the ball 31 times (tied for 108th nationally). Their turnover margin of 0.08 is 47th nationally.

QUICK HITT

- Maryland has faced three top-10 teams this season and has gone 2-1 in those contests. This is the first time in school history the Terps have defeated two top-10 teams in the same season. It's also just the second year in school history the Terps have faced three top-10 teams in the same season (also 1982). They lost to No. 4 West Virginia, 31-14, on Sept. 13, downed No. 10 Rutgers, 34-24, on Sept. 29, and defeated No. 8 Boston College (Nov. 10).
- The Terps are one of only four teams in the country (also Kentucky, LSU and Illinois) to defeat two top-10 teams this season.
- According to the NCAA, the Terps' 2007 schedule is tied for 27th-most difficult in the nation, based on records of their opposition (65-51/.560).
- Maryland is one of just four teams in the nation to have two running backs with at least 750 rushing yards. **Keon** Lattimore has a team-high 789, while Lance Ball has 763. Oklahoma (DeMarco Murray, 764; Allen Patrick, 927), Michigan State (Javon Ringer, 1,346; Jehuu Caulcrick, 813) and Arkansas (Darren McFadden, 1,725; Felix Jones, 1,117) join the Terps on that list.
- Ball ranks fourth on both the Terps career rushing list (2,482) and career rushing TD chart (26). Lattimore is 14th on the career rushing list (1,728) and tied for ninth on the rushing scores chart (19).
- Ball and Lattimore became the second duo in school history to each post 10 or more rushing touchdowns in the same season. Lattimore has 13 rushing scores (first in the ACC), while Ball has 12 (second in the league). Bruce Perry and Marc Riley each had 10 during the 2001 campaign.
- Sophomore Chris Turner started the final seven regular-season games at quarterback and was fairly hot down the stretch. He averaged 261.7.0 passing yards over the last three games, completing 67.5 percent of his passes (56 of
- Sophomore Darrius Heyward-Bey needs seven receptions to become the 11th receiver in school history with 100 catches. Heyward-Bey is currently 12th on the Maryland career receptions list and 11th on the career receiving yards chart (1,381).
- Juniors Erin Henderson and Dave Philistin form one of the top linebacker duos in the nation. Henderson (11.1) and Philistin (10.1) rank first and third, respectively, in the ACC in tackles. They also rank eighth and tied for 31st, respecitvely, in the country in stops. Henderson (122) and Philistin (121) are the first Maryland duo since 1998 to each post 120 or more tackles in a season. Eric Barton (159) and Kendall Ogle (143) also hit that mark.
- Maryland is 197-161-4 (.550) all-time in ACC contests, including a 33-23 (.589) mark under Ralph Friedgen. Friedgen's 56 career wins are the third most by any ACC coach through his first seven seasons (see chart on pg. 15).

MARYLAND BOWL FACTS...

- Maryland is bowl eligible for the fifth time in seven years under coach Ralph Friedgen. The Terps have won each of their last three bowl games. Friedgen's three bowl wins are the most of any Maryland coach. He is 3-1 in bowl games. Prior to Friedgen's arrival, Maryland made only one postseason appearance in the previous 15 years.
- The Terps have an all-time record of 9-10-2 in bowl games, including a school-record stretch of three straight wins.
- Maryland's three straight bowl wins is the second-longest active streak among ACC teams. Boston College has won seven in-a-row, though only the last two have come during its time in the league. NC State has also won its last three bowl appearances.
- The Terps are facing just their second Pac-10 opponent in a bowl game. Maryland fell to Washington, 21-20, in the 1982 Aloha Bowl. In fact, Maryland has only played a Pac-10 team three times in school history (also UCLA in 1954-55).
- In last season's Champ Sports Bowl, Sam Hollenbach passed for 223 yards and two TDs, and Lance Ball rushed for 98 yards to lead the Terrapins to a 24-7 win over Purdue. The Terrapins kept the Boilermakers' offense, the NCAA's 10th best at 425 yards per game, in check, allowing just 285 total yards. Keon Lattimore added 86 rushing yards on 20 carries for the Terps, who held the ball for 39:48. Maryland posted 429 total yards and 20 first downs. The Champs Sports Bowl drew a record crowd of 40,168 with over 10,000 Terp fans in attendance.
- · Maryland has out-scored its last three bowl opponents 95-17.

GOING WEST...

 The Terps haven't traveled west for a bowl game, or any game for that matter, very often in their history. Only five of their bowl games have been played west of the Mississippi and the team has only played one game in the state of California in 115 years of football. Maryland lost to No. 4 UCLA, 12-7, in Los Angeles in 1954.

FOUR TERPS EARN ALL-ACC HONORS..

Four Terps earned All-ACC honors from the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association (ACSMA) and the Associated Press. On the defensive side of the ball, linebacker Erin Henderson and tackle Dre Moore were first-team selections. On offense, guard Andrew Crummey was a second-team choice for the second-straight year, while senior running back **Keon Lattimore** drew an honorable mention nod. Henderson was the leading vote-getter at linebacker after posting 122 tackles, including a team-best 11 tackles for loss, despite missing the Georgia Tech game (Oct. 6) due to an injury. Henderson was a second-team All-ACC selection a year ago. He has carried on a rich tradition at linebacker. The Terps have had a first-team All-ACC linebacker in five of the last seven seasons. Henderson's brother, E.J., was a first-teamer in 2001 and 2002, and D'Qwell Jackson was a first-team choice in 2004 and 2005. In his final season as a Terp, Moore developed into a force in the middle of the Maryland defense. He led the Terps with six sacks, the most by a Maryland player since 2004 (Shawne Merriman, 8.5). Moore is only the second Maryland defensive tackle to earn first-team All-ACC honors in the last eight seasons (also Randy Starks, 2003). Crummey, a member of this year's watch list for the Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy, earned the honor despite missing five games. After fracturing his fibula against Georgia Tech, Crummey was shelved for six weeks, before heroically returning for the season finale and helping the Terps rack up 466 yards in a 37-0 win over North Carolina State. Lattimore recorded career highs in rushing yards (789) and rushing touchdowns (13). No player in the conference had more rushing scores than Lattimore, who also topped the 100-yard mark four times this season.

THREE TERPS EARN FRESHMAN ALL-ACC HONORS...

Three Maryland freshmen were selected to the 2007 Sporting News Freshman All-ACC Football Team. Wide receiver LaQuan Williams, linebacker Adrian Moten and punter Travis Baltz represent the Terps on this year's team. The magazine chose 11 starters on each side of the ball, along with three specialists. Only one school – North Carolina with six – placed more players on the team. Georgia Tech and Duke each had three selections as well. Moten, a redshirt freshman, has proven to be a versatile player seeing time as a reserve at all three linebacker spots and at defensive end in pass-rushing situations. He ranks ninth on the team with 45 tackles, including 5 1/2 tackles for loss and 3 1/2 sacks. Williams switched over from defensive back prior to the start of spring workouts and made the most of his opportunity by earning a share of the starting job (seven starts). He had 15 catches for 217 yards before a knee injury shelved him for the final two regular-season games. He's expected to return for the bowl game. The redshirt freshman had perhaps his best game in the 34-24 upset of No. 10 Rutgers (Sept. 29) when he recorded two catches for a career-high 66 yards, including a spectacular 27-yard diving grab which set up Keon Lattimore's fourth-quarter touchdown. Baltz had some big shoes to fill after he took over for All-ACC performer Adam Podlesh, but the true freshman responded well. Baltz ranks seventh in the ACC and 45th in the nation with an average of 41.3 yards per punt, and elevated his game during conference play with a 43.1-yard average, second-best in the league.

TERPS BATTLE THROUGH INJURIES...

The Terps were hit by the injury bug in some key areas this season, mostly noticeably on offense where just three players started all 12 regular-season games. QB Jordan Steffy sat out vs. Georgia Tech and Virginia after suffering a concussion vs. Rutgers (Sept. 29). He was cleared to play prior to the Clemson game and played two series vs. FSU and the final two of the NC State game (Nov. 24). RG Andrew Crummey, a preseason All-American, missed five games with a fractured left fibula (vs. Georgia Tech, Oct. 6), but returned for the regular-season finale. Starting left guard Jaimie Thomas was lost for the season when he fractured his right fibula vs. Virginia (Oct. 20), though there is a slight chance he could return for the bowl game. TE Dan Gronkowski left the Clemson game (Oct. 27) with a knee injury and missed two contests before returning vs. Florida State (Nov. 17). FB Cory Jackson played most of the Virginia game with a broken hand and missed the Clemson contest. He returned vs. UNC (Nov. 3) and played with a wrap on his hand over the final four weeks. Starting LT Scott Burley played over the final five weeks of the regular season, but sparingly due to an ankle injury. His backup, true freshman Bruce Campbell, was also on and off the field with an ankle injury. Redshirt freshman Paul Pinegar, a walk-on, replaced both of them at times. WR Danny Oquendo injured a knee in practice prior to the BC game (Nov. 10) and was lost for the season. Fellow wideout LaQuan Williams hurt his knee and missed the final two regular-season games. On defense, reserve DT Travis Ivey missed three weeks with a knee injury, but returned vs. BC. LB Rick Costa, who was starting for an injured Erin Henderson, incurred a sprained neck vs. the Yellow Jackets and is out indefintely. Some key reserves are also on the shelf. Pass-rushing DE Mack Frost injured his right knee vs. the Cavaliers and is out for the season. Junior **Drew Robinson**, a backup safety and special teams player, is out for the season with a knee injury, one he suffered vs. the Tar Heels. The Terps also lost Alex Wujciak, who was expected to vie for one of the starting linebacker roles, during the preseason. In all, 16 members of the two-deep have missed at least one game this season due to injury. That number does not include Burley even though he was in on just three plays vs. Clemson (Oct. 27).



CLOSE CALL

The Terps' 24-16 loss to Florida State (Nov. 17) was their fourth conference setback of the season by one score or less. Maryland opened the ACC campaign with a 31-24 overtime loss to Wake Forest and also had an 18-17 defeat at the hands of Virginia (Oct. 20), as well as a 16-13 loss to North Carolina (Nov. 3). Maryland lost four of its five ACC games by a total of 17 points. In addition, five of the team's six losses came at the hands of bowl teams.

HOLDING ONTO THE BALL...

The Terps are currently fourth in the ACC and tied for 24th in the NCAA in turnover margin (+0.58). Maryland has forced 22 turnovers on the season and lost the ball just 15 times. The Terrapins forced seven turnovers in the final four regularseason games. They forced three turnovers vs. UNC (Nov. 3), but did not convert them into points. However, Maryland intercepted Matt Ryan of Boston College twice and scored touchdowns on both ensuing drives. In the FSU game (Nov. 17), the Terps forced four fumbles, but were able to corral just one of them. In the regular-season finale vs. NC State (Nov. 24), the Terps forced one turnover and turned it into three points. On the season, Maryland has out-scored the opposition 68-43 off turnovers.

NO NEED TO DO LAUNDRY...

Ralph Friedgen-coached teams rarely beat themselves and that trend has continued this season. Maryland is the second-least penalized team in the ACC (5.5 pg). That mark also ranks tied for 25th in the nation. In terms of yards (44.33 pg), Maryland is also second in the ACC and 16th in the nation.

YOUNG TERPS STEP UP...

· A number of youngsters have found themselves in more prominent at the end of the regular season. Maryland used one more of its true freshmen vs. Clemson (Oct. 27). Fullback Haroon Brown saw action in place of an injured Cory Jackson. In addition, Bruce Campbell got the starting nod at left tackle in place of Scott Burley, who was also out injured. Campbell had played as a reserve vs. Villanova in the season opener. Brown was the fourth true freshman to play this season (also Travis Baltz and Dominique Herald). Junior Olugbemi Otulaja, a walk-on defensive lineman, and sophomore LB Chris Clinton also saw their first career action vs. Clemson. In addition, sophomore DL Deege Galt saw his first career action vs. UNC (Nov. 3). In the win over BC (Nov. 10), redshirt freshman Emani Lee-Odai saw his first career action at wideout and responded with three catches for 71 yards. In addition, redshirt freshman Da'Rel Scott averaged 133.3 all-purpose yards over the last three regular-season games, including a career-high 149 vs. FSU (Nov. 17).

TURNING THE PAGE...

One week after having a tough outing in a 16-13 loss to North Carolina (Nov. 3), sophomore guarterback Chris Turner rebounded with a career effort vs. Boston College (Nov. 10). In just his fifth career start, Turner completed 21 of 27 passes (78 percent) for a career-high 337 yards and a career-best three TDs with no interceptions. He also had a career-best passing efficiency rating of 219.29, which is the fifth highest single-game rating in the ACC this season. He got the offense in gear right from the start, leading the Terps to a touchdown on the opening drive of the game and scores in seven of their first eight possessions. Turner was at his best in the clutch. He was a perfect 10-for-10 for 83 yards on third down, helping the Terps gain eight first downs. Turner also challenged the BC defense deep, completing passes four passes of more than 40 yards, a single-game high this season. Against BC, Emani Lee-Odai (41 yards), Darrius Heyward-Bey (43), Isaiah Williams (45), and Da'Rel Scott (57) had 40-plus yard receptions. Turner's performance earned him ACC Offensive Back of the Week honors. He was also sharp in the 37-0 shutout of NC State (Nov. 24). Turner completed 19 of 24 passes (79.2 percent) for 206 yards, leading the Terps to four straight first-half scoring drives and a commanding 24-0 halftime lead. He also rushed for 40 yards, including a career-long 41yarder which set up the first touchdown of the day. As he has been for most of the season, Turner was solid in the clutch, completing 10 of 12 third-down passes for 103 yards. For the second time in three games Turner completed nearly 80 percent of his passes.

OFFENSIVE NOTES...

- Maryland ranks fifth in the ACC in total offense (350.58 ypg), including third in rushing offense (147.33 ypg). The rushing attack is also 65th nationally.
- The Terps are third in the league in red zone offense, scoring on 44 of their 49 trips (89.8 percent). They are also third in the ACC in third down conversions (41.1 percent).
- Maryland has been guick out of the gate most of the season, outscoring its opponents 80-40 in the opening guarter.
- One of the foremost offensive minds in the collegiate or pro game, head coach Ralph Friedgen is in his second season as offensive coordinator.
- The Maryland offense rolled in the regular season finale against NC State (Nov. 24), netting 466 total yards in the 37-0 win. Maryland controlled the ball for 37:55.

- The Terps averaged 424.3 total yards over the final three regular-season games
- Maryland has done a solid job of holding the ball and keeping it away from its foes. The Terps rank 16th in the NCAA in
 time of possession, holding the ball for an average of 31:31 minutes per game. Through the first five games of the year,
 the Terps led the nation in TOP, averaging 34:48 minutes per game.
- Maryland is winning the time of possession battle partly because it is holding onto the ball. The Terps have only lost 15 turnovers this season, tied for 11th best in the country.
- The Terps ran for a season-high 249 yards vs. NC State, with Keon Lattimore, Lance Ball, Chris Turner and freshman
 Da'Rel Scott all chipping in. Lattimore ran 34 yards and two scores, while Ball had 78 yards and a pair of touchdowns
 of his own. Turner recored a career-long rush of 41 yards, while Scott had a career-day with 89 yards on just eight
 carries.
- For the second time in three games, Turner completed nearly 80 percent of his passes vs. the Wolfpack. He connected
 on 19 of his 24 attempts (79.2 percent), and his completion percentage ranks seventh on the school's all-time singlegame list. Turner completed 77.8 percent of his passes in the upset of No. 8 Boston College, a number which is now
 tied for ninth on the single-season list.
- Maryland rolled up a season-high 472 yards of total offense against No. 8 Boston College (Nov. 10). Maryland's previous single-game high was 458, which they recorded in the upset of No. 10 Rutgers.
- The Eagles entered their matchup with the Terps with the nation's top run defense. Maryland ran up 135 yards on the
 ground, the highest total given up by BC all season.
- Turner has completed 136 of 212 passes for 1,753 yards. He owns an efficiency rating of 136.68, third best in the ACC, and 32nd nationally. The efficiency rating is also ninth on the Maryland single-season list.
- Over the last four games, Turner has looked to veterans Darrius Heyward-Bey and Joey Haynos, with 35 of his 76 completions hauled in by that duo.
- Playing in his final game at Byrd Stadium, senior tight end Jason Goode had a career-night vs. BC, catching six passes
 for 56 yards and two touchdowns. He has 11 catches over the last four games after three in the first eight.
- Ball, also in his final game at Byrd, had a big night vs. BC as well. The senior earned his first start of the season in relief
 of an injured Lattimore and responded with his first 100-yard game of the season, totaling 109 yards against the nation's
 top-ranked rushing defense. It was the only 100-yard rushing game BC has allowed this season.
- Ball ranks seventh in the ACC and 93rd nationally with 63.58 rushing yards per game.
- Lattimore and Ball have become quite familiar with the end zone this season. The seniors have scored a combined 25 touchdowns on the year (Lattimore 13; Ball 12). Lattimore's 13 rushing scores rank tied for sixth on the school's single-season list, while his 19 career rushing TDs are tied for ninth all-time. Ball's 12 rushing TDs are tied for eighth on the Maryland single-season chart, while his 26 career rushing scores are tied for fourth in school history. LaMont Jordan (1999) owns the Maryland single-season record (16) and Rick Badanjek (1982-85) has the career mark (44).
- No other pair of Maryland backs has ever rushed for as many scores in a single season as Ball and Lattimore (25) have this year. Chris Downs (13) and Josh Allen (8) had the previous high when they totaled 21 in 2002. Bruce Perry and Marc Riley had 10 each for the Terps in 2001.
- Lattimore and Ball average a combined 13.09 points per game. Lattimore (7.09 ppg) and Ball (6.00 ppg) are sixth and tied for 11th, respectively, in the ACC in scoring.
- The dynamic Ball-Lattimore tailback duo combined for 1,558 yards last season, and have carried that success through the 2007 season. Through 12 games, the pair have combined for 1,552 yards rushing and 25 touchdowns on 378 carries. Lattimore and Ball were one of just five running-back combos in the nation last season to collect over 700 rushing yards apiece.
- Lattimore has six career 100-yard rushing games (119 vs. Wake Forest and 114 vs. Virginia in 2006; 106 vs. Villanova, 111 vs. FIU, 112 vs. WFU, and 124 vs. RU in 2007). That puts him in a tie for fifth on Maryland's career list (see page 8).
- With 109 yards on the ground against BC, Ball tied Lattimore with six 100-yard games in his career. The pair are tied
 with Bruce Perry (1999-03), Mark Mason (1990-93), and Willie Joyner (1980-83). Louis Carter (1972-74) ranks fourth
 on the list with seven games over the century mark.
- After getting shut out by Clemson, Heyward-Bey has rebounded nicely with 21 catches for 268 yards in his past four games. He had caught a pass in 19 consecutive games before the Clemson game. In 25 career games, Heyward-Bey has led the team in receiving yards in 12 times (Georgia Tech -111, Florida State 57, Miami 175, Purdue 81 in 2006), including eight of the Terrapins' games this season (Villanova 81, FIU 48, WVU 56, RU 61, GT 109, UVA 54, UNC 64, and BC 75). Heyward-Bey currently ranks ninth in the ACC in receiving yards per game (57.25).
- LaQuan Williams switched from defensive back to wide receiever last spring but adjusted quickly and earned a spot on the 2007 Sporting News ACC All-Freshman Team. The redshirt freshman made the most of his opportunity. He had 15 catches for 217 yards before a knee injury shelved him for the final two regular-season games.

OFFENSIVE NOTES CONT. ..

- Junior wide receiver Isaiah Williams has averaged 22.6 yards per reception in Maryland's last three games (eight catches for 181 yards). Williams had a 38-yard catch in the second quarter against NC State, which set up the Terps' second touchdown.
- Entering the season, no quarterback on the Maryland roster had ever started a game. Maryland now finds itself with two capable signal callers - Turner and Jordan Steffy.
- Prior to his injury, Steffy was efficient and accurate while directing the Terrapin offense. He is 70 of 104 (67.3 percent) for 686 yards on the year. His completion percentage ranks second in the ACC.
- In his five games as a starter, Steffy owned a pass efficiency rating of 123.22. He saw his first action in six weeks vs. Florida State (Nov. 17) when he came in for two drives in the first half. He again saw action in the season finale against NC State.
- Turner has been solid in relief of Steffy, who left the Rutgers game just before halftime with an injury and missed the next two games versus Georgia Tech and Virginia.
- In his first career start, Turner threw for 255 yards against Georgia Tech on 10 of 17 passing. At the time, it was the most yards through the air by a Terrapin guarterback since Sam Hollenbach threw for 374 yards against North Carolina on Nov. 12, 2005.
- The 255 yards passing by Turner were the most by a Maryland quarterback in a starting debut since Scott Zolak threw for 303 in a 20-13 win over Virginia Tech in 1990. Only one other quarterback since 1991 (Scott Milanovich, 253 vs. Virginia in 1993) surpassed 200 yards in their first career start.
- In the previous game, Turner led Maryland to an upset of then No. 10 Rutgers. Turner threw for 149 yards on 14 of 20 passing, and led four second half scoring drives. He was named ACC Co-Offensive Back of the Week for his performance against the Scarlet Knights.
- The 78-yard touchdown pass Turner threw to Goode against Georgia Tech was the first career score for each player. It was also the longest career play for each. Goode's previous career-long was a 57-yard reception against Clemson last year.
- In his first game as a collegiate starter, Steffy completed 19 of 24 passes (79 percent) for 174 yards and one interception. The junior's debut was the most efficient effort by a Maryland quarterback starting his first career game since Brian Cummings completed 83 percent of his passes in a 1995 win over Tulane to open the year.
- Havnos, Goode and **Dan Gronkowski** form one of the top tight end trios in the nation. Each has started at the position. Over the past two seasons, Gronkowski has opened 17 contests, while Haynos started 12. Goode has started the last three games - the first three starts of his career - with Haynos in two tight end sets. Haynos was a member of the Mackey Award watch list this season.
- After a slow start Haynos came on strong for the Terps down the stretch. Of his 27 receptions, 19 have come in the last five games. He had five catches for a season-high 71 yards against NC State.
 - Injuries have decimated the offensive line. With the injury to RG Andrew Crummey (fractured fibula), the Terps had just one returning starter from last season (C Edwin Williams) playing on the offensive line, though the group has quite a bit of experience. LG Jaimie Thomas, who was lost for the regular season in the Virginia game (Oct. 20), played in all 13 games last season, starting three, while **Dane Randolph** played in 11 games, mostly at right tackle. Randolph started four games there, including the Champs Sports Bowl. Williams and Randolph are the only lineman to start all 12 games in 2007. Starting left tackle **Scott Burley** missed all but three plays in the Clemson game (Oct. 27) with an ankle injury and true freshman Bruce Campbell got the start in his place, before he too had to leave with an ankle injury. Both were hampered over the last month of the year. Burley has played in each of the last three seasons, including eight games as a sophomore in 2005, but this is his first chance to start. Junior Jack Griffin, meanwhile, who was penciled in as the No. 2 right tackle, redshirted last season, but did see action as a freshman and sophomore, though that came on the defensive line. Griffin stepped into Crummey's starting right guard role (Crummey returned vs. NC State). Sophomore Phil Costa served as the reserve center and guard. Costa started at right guard for Crummey vs. Virginia, but slid over to left guard to take over Thomas' spot beginning with the Clemson game (Oct. 27). Friedgen considered the Terps to have seven starters along the o-line due to the skill and versatility of this group. Injuries to Crummey and Thomas reduced that number to five for much of the season.
- Crummey has started 35 games, which is tied for the team lead with Christian Varner, while Williams' 25 consecutive starts lead the offense. Williams is the only offensive returnee to start all 13 games in 2006.

DEFENSIVE NOTES...

The Terps rank 42nd in the nation and 10th in the ACC in total defense (355.92 yards per game). All nine ACC teams which rank ahead of the Terps are among the top 38 in the nation in total defense. The Terps have surrendered an average of 69.7 rushing yards over the last three regular-season games.

- Maryland's 37-0 shutout of NC State (Nov. 24) marked the first time the Terps had blanked an opponent since they topped The Citadel, 61-0, on Sept. 3, 2003. It was Maryland's first shutout of an ACC foe since it defeated Wake Forest, 52-0, on Oct. 19, 1996. The last time Maryland blanked an opponent on the road was on Oct. 17, 1999, when it downed Temple, 6-0. The Terps' last shutout of an ACC foe on the road was a 14-0 win over Wake Forest on Oct. 17, 1987. The loss ended the Wolfpack's streak of 150 consecutive games without a shutout, dating back to Sept. 25, 1995, when Baylor beat NC State, 14-0, at Carter-Finley Stadium. It was the ACC's longest active streak and the fourth-longest streak in ACC history.
- In a dominating effort, the Terps surrendered just 10 rushing yards (on 16 carries) to NC State, which was the lowest
 output by an opponent since Clemson rushed for 10 yards (on 29 carries) on Oct. 4, 2003. It was the third time this
 season the Maryland defense surrendered fewer than 50 yards on the ground (11 vs. Villanova; 45 vs. Boston College).
 Maryland also held Florida International and Rutgers (82 rushing yards each) below the century mark.
- The Wolfpack tallied just 250 yards of total offense, which was lowest output for a Maryland ACC foe since NC State had 186 in the 2005 regular-season finale.
- The defense also allowed the Wolfpack to convert just one of 13 third-down attempts. Over the final two regular-season games, the Maryland defense surrendered a first down on only 3 of 25 (12 percent) third down opportunities.
- · Between defense and special teams, the Terps have forced 18 fumbles. Last season, Maryland had just 11.
- Despite playing through numerous injuries, linebacker Erin Henderson currently ranks eighth in the nation and first
 in the ACC with 11.09 stops per game. In the four games following the Georgia Tech contest which he missed with an
 injured knee, the junior went on a tear, posting 57 stops. He has led the team in tackles in nine games this season.
- With Henderson ailing, middle linebacker Dave Philistin stepped up to lead the Terps. He posted 10 tackles in each of Maryland's last two games. He has eight consecutive games with double-digit tackles, the longest active streak on the team.
- Against NC State, Philistin recorded his first career interception in the first quarter and returned it 43 yards to set up Obi
 Egekeze's 30-yard field goal and Maryland's first points of the game.
- After sitting out practice before all week with a sore back prior to the BC game (Nov. 10), Henderson totaled 13 tackles
 against the Eagles, his 15th career game with double-digit tackles. Henderson was a Butkus Award semifinalist and a
 first-team All-ACC selection. He was the leading vote-getter at linebacker.
- Defensive tackle Dre Moore netted his sixth sack of the year against Florida State (Nov. 17). His six sacks mark the
 most a Terrapin has recorded in a season since Shawne Merriman had 8.5 in 2004. Moore also had seven tackles
 against the Noles to lead all defensive linemen.
- With a relentless pass rush, the Maryland defense harrassed BC's Matt Ryan all night and tied a season-high with four sacks in the process. Maryland's previously had four against Villanova in the opener. Maryland also intercepted Ryan twice. Moore snagged his first career interception in the first quarter and he returned it 12 yards. J.J. Justice picked off a deep pass in the second half. Maryland posted 12 interceptions this year, after totaling eight last season.
- Maryland has 15 sacks over the last six games after notching eight over the first six contests. The Terps had three
 sacks in both the Virginia and North Carolina games and matched a season-high with four vs. Boston College (Nov. 10).
 Against Florida State the Terps tacked on three more, and caused quarterback Drew Weatherford to fumble on two of
 those sacks.
- Maryland's pass defense has been solid, allowing only 219.25 yards per game, 47th best in the nation.
- Cornerbacks Kevin Barnes and Isaiah Gardner have combined for 24 passes defended this season, including six
 interceptions. Each recorded two pass break-ups against NC State. Barnes (.33) is tied for seventh in the ACC and 55th
 nationally in interceptions per game. He has four picks on the season, the most by a Terp since Domonique Foxworth
 had five in 2002.
- Barnes has proved to be a solid tackler as well, and is tied for fourth on the team with 63 tackles. His 45 solo stops are
 third most among Terps. In a three-game stretch (Georgia Tech, Virginia and Clemson) he recorded 27 tackles, including
 20 solo. He led the Terps with a career-high eight solo tackles in the win over Georgia Tech. He had a career-best 10
 total tackles in that game, including one for a loss, and also broke up two passes.
- Linebacker Adrian Moten, a redshirt freshman who has impressed the Maryland coaches with his ability to play all
 three linebacker positions, was named to the 2007 Sporting News ACC All-Freshman Team for his stellar play down the
 stretch. He ranks ninth on the team with 45 tackles, the most of any reserve. A disruptive force on the edge, he has 3.5
 sacks, all of which came in the final four regular-season games, and 5.5 tackles for loss overall. He has also forced two
 fumbles and has one interception.
- Six Terrapin defenders have started more than 15 career games for Maryland and three (Jeremy Navarre, Trey
 Covington and Christian Varner) have started more than 30. Covington has started 33 of the last 34 games at LEO, a
 hybrid linebacker/defensive end position, while Varner has started 35 of the last 36 at safety, including a team-high 34
 straight. In addition, Navarre has started 34 of the last 36 contests.
- Defensive linemen **Mack Frost** and Navarre each had key fourth quarter sacks of Rutgers QB Mike Teel in the upset win. They were the first two sacks allowed by Rutgers on the year.

DEFENSIVE NOTES CONT. ...

- Navarre's came on a fourth down as Rutgers, then trailing by three, was attempting to tie or take the lead. Navarre's hit forced a fumble, and Maryland took over on downs, setting up Lance Ball's second touchdown of the day on the very next play. For Frost it was his first of the season. Frost was emerging as one of the team's top pass rushers before he was lost for the season with a knee injury vs. Virginia (Oct. 20).
- Maryland held Rutgers to 82 yards on 23 carries on Sept. 29, one of five times this season the Terps did not allow 100 yards rushing. Rutgers entered the game averaging 228.3 yards per game on the ground.
- In the season opener versus Villanova, Philistin got the starting nod at middle linebacker, marking the third consecutive season the Terps have opened the year with a different Mike. Wesley Jefferson, who manned the middle for the Terps a year ago after replacing D'Qwell Jackson in 2006, graduated early to pursue a career as a state trooper. Jefferson was second on the team in tackles in 2006. Chase Bullock entered the fall No. 1 on the depth chart and remained there until an injury forced him out of the lineup.
- Philistin has more than filled the void left by Jefferson. He has stepped up his play with eight consecutive games with double-digit tackles, including 10 against NC State (Nov. 24). He is currently third in the ACC and tied for 31st in the nation in tackles per game (10.1). Against Georgia Tech he led the team in tackles with a career-high 21. It marked the second straight game that he had set a new career record, after he totaled 11 against Rutgers. Philistin's 21 stops were the most for a Terrapin since Eric Barton tallied 22 in 1998 against North Carolina. Philistin also stopped Tech's Tashard Choice short of the end zone on a two-point conversion attempt that would have tied the game at 28. He was named ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week for his performance against the Jackets.
- The Terps suffered a major loss in the preseason when LB Alex Wujciak injured a knee during a practice. He had ACL surgery at the end of August and should return next season. The redshirt freshman was expected to play LEO and possibly at Mike.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES...

- In punter Adam Podlesh and kicker Dan Ennis, the Terps never had to worry about their special teams last season. Podlesh was a four-time All-ACC punter and two-time semifinalist for the Ray Guy Award, while Ennis connected on 20 of 25 field goals last season and tied for ninth nationally in field goals per game (1.54).
- The Terrapins tapped place-kicker Obi Egekeze and punter Travis Baltz at the start of the season to replace their sensational specialists from 2006, and the returns have been solid. Egekeze has been near perfect this season, the one exception coming in the win over Rutgers game (Sept. 29) when he went 2-for-5. Through 12 games Egekeze is a perfect 34-for-34 on PATs, and 17 of 22 on field goal attempts. Two of those misses have come from beyond 50 yards (52 vs. FIU; 51 vs. Rutgers). He ranks sixth in the ACC in kick scoring (7.1).
- Egekeze has hit 13 of 14 field goals (92.9 percent) during league games, the top mark in the ACC. He pushed a 46yarder wide left in the fourth quarter of the Florida State game (Nov. 17), for his only miss in ACC play. The junior did hit a career-long 46-yarder in the first quarter against the Seminoles, and also hit from 29 and 37 yards in the game.
- Baltz, a true freshman, has been solid thus far in his brief Maryland career, ranking seventh in the ACC with a punting average of 41.2. After averaging 43.0 yards on two punts against Villanova, Baltz averaged 37.9 yards on nine punts against FIU, but pinned the Golden Panthers' inside their 20-yard line on five of his nine kicks. The five punts inside the 20 were the most by a Maryland punter since Brooks Barnard had six in Ralph Friedgen's first game as head coach, a 23-7 win over North Carolina in 2001. Baltz's nine punts were the most by a Maryland punter since Adam Podlesh booted the ball 11 times in a 13-3 loss to NC State in 2004.
- Baltz has had his best outings vs. ACC competition. He ranks seventh in the conference in punting (41.3 ypp), including 43.1 in league games, second best in the ACC. Against Wake Forest, Baltz punted six times for 268 yards, a 44.7 average. He recorded one punt for a then career long of 54 yards, and put two balls inside the 20-yard line. In the win over Georgia Tech, Baltz averaged a career-high 49.6 yards per punt (five attempts), including a career long of 65 yards. It was the 10th best single-game average in Maryland history. In the loss to Virginia, Baltz averaged 44.7 yards on six punts and put two balls inside the 10.
- Kickoff specialist Chris Roberts has also helped pick up the special teams unit. He's averaged nearly 60 yards per kickoff, with opponents' average starting point of drives at the 27-yard line. He had his first touchback vs. Rutgers (Sept. 29). The Scarlet Knights averaged less than 18 yards per kickoff return. Roberts' strong play combined with strong tackling has the Terps ranked first in the nation in kickoff return yardage defense (16.08 ypr).
- Maryland has a strong history of special teams play in the Friedgen era. Podlesh, as well as Barnard and former kicker Nick Novak, moved on to the NFL. Although Egekeze served as a kickoff specialist last season, neither he nor Baltz had attempted a kick in a game prior to the 2007 opener.
- When Baltz entered the Villanova game (Sept. 1) in the second quarter, he became the first true freshman to start an opening-day game for the Terps since defensive end Jeremy Navarre in 2005, and only the second of the Ralph Friedgen era.

- The Terps had big shoes to fill at kick returner as Josh Wilson has taken his game to the NFL. Wilson ranked third in the ACC (11th nationally) last season in kick returns (27.3 ypr) en route to setting a single-season school record for return yards (847). Backup running back Da'Rel Scott got a shot at returning kicks against Wake Forest (Sept. 22) and responded with 101 yards on four returns, including a long return of 39 yards. He has 530 yards on 24 returns for the year, including a career-high 132 vs. Florida State (Nov. 17). Reserve safety Terrell Skinner, who moved from wide receiver in the spring, opened the season as the primary kick returner, and averaged 18.5 yards on six returns.
- Scott's 530 kickoff return yards are the most ever by a Terp freshman (10th overall on the single-season list). Scott is
 averaging 22.1 yards per return which would rank seventh in the ACC if he had played in 75 percent of the games. He
 has also averaged 19.1 yards each time he has touched the ball on a rush, reception or kickoff return.
- Maryland was fortunate to have the sure-handed Danny Oquendo back to handle punt return duties, but he is likely
 done for the season with a knee injury. Last season, Oquendo ranked eighth in the ACC and 53rd nationally in return
 average (8.4). Through nine games this season, Oquendo has averaged 8.2 yards on 15 returns. Christian Varner has
 served as Oquendo's backup, returning five punts for 40 yards and Anthony Wiseman has chipped in with four returns
 for 24 yards.
- Moise Fokou (16) and Adrian Moten (14) have been the top tacklers on special teams this season.

DID YOU KNOW?...

• The Terps are one of only two teams in the nation to have two players with 12 or more rushing touchdowns, and one of only five to have two players with more than 10. Keon Lattimore's 13 touchdowns ranks first in the ACC, while Lance Ball checks in second with 12. Steve Slaton (17) and Pat White (14) of West Virginia are the only other duo to reach 12 rushing TDs each. Darren McFadden (15) and Felix Jones (11) of Arkansas, Matt Groethe (10) and Mike Ford (12) of South Florida and Dan LeFevour (17) and Justin Hoskins (10) of Central Michigan are the other duos with 10 or more rushing TDs. Lattimore's 13 scores are tied for sixth on the Terps' single-season rushing TD list, while his 19 career rushing TDs are tied for ninth all-time. Ball's 12 rushing TDs are tied for eighth on the Maryland single-season chart, while his 26 career rushing scores are tied for fourth in school history. (see pg. 9).

AIRING IT OUT...

• In his first career start, Chris Turner threw for 255 yards vs. Georgia Tech (Oct. 6). At the time, it was the the most yards through the air by a Terrapin quarterback since Sam Hollenbach posted 374 against North Carolina on Nov. 12, 2005. Turner earned his first career start vs. Georgia Tech (Oct. 6), one week after leading Maryland to an upset of then No. 10 Rutgers. Turner threw for 149 yards on 14 of 20 attempts, and was named ACC Co-Offensive Back of the Week for his performance against the Scarlet Knights. The 78-yard touchdown pass from Turner to reserve tight end Jason Goode was the first career score for each player. The Terps' longest pass play of the season coming into the game was 39 yards. Turner and the Terps had three pass plays over 40 yards vs. the Yellow Jackets. They posted a season high four 40-plus yard passes in the win over BC (Nov. 10). Speedy sophomore wideout Darrius Heyward-Bey had his first 100-yard receiving game of the season (109) vs. Georgia Tech.

FOUR TRUE FRESHMEN SEE ACTION...

 Four true freshmen - P Travis Baltz, OL Bruce Campbell, DB Dominique Herald and FB Haroon Brown - have seen action this season. Baltz has started every game this season and was named to the 2007 Sporting News ACC All-Freshman Team, while Herald has been a regular on special teams. Campbell is a backup at left tackle and played in the season opener vs. Villanova (Sept. 1). He also earned his first career start at left tackle vs. Clemson, subbing for Scott Burley. Campbell has played in five games. Brown also saw action vs. the Tigers in place of injured FB Cory Jackson and has played as a reserve since.

TURNER IN THE CLUTCH...

• Chris Turner was efficient with his 14-for-20, 149-yard performance in helping the Terps to a 34-24 upset win over No. 10 Rutgers (Sept. 29). He did not throw a TD pass, but also did not turn the ball over. Most importantly he was key on third down where Maryland was 9-for-21 (43 percent) for the game, including 6 of 12 in the second half. Turner went 7-for-8 for 57 yards on third down. Four of those completions led to first downs. Turner had seen action in just a few series in the season opener vs. Villanova (Sept. 1) and had one play vs. Wake Forest (Sept. 22). In games vs. ranked opponents (Rutgers and BC), Turner has completed 35 of 47 passes (74 percent) for 486 yards with three touchdowns and no interceptions. Those numbers were accumulated in just six quarters of action.

DID YOU KNOW?...

Maryland is one of just three teams in the nation with two players averaging 10 or more tackles per game. Junior Erin
Henderson is eighth in the nation with 11.1 tackles per game, while Dave Philistin is tied for 31st with 10.1 stops per
contest. Tulsa's Chris Chamberlain (11.4 tackles per game, sixth) and Nelson Coleman (10.5, 19th), and Penn State's
Dan Conner (11.3, seventh) and Sean Lee (10.3, 23rd) are the other duos.

BYRD TO GET A FACELIFT...

Maryland is in the design phase of a \$50.8 million expansion of Tyser Tower. The new facility will include suites, new areas for working media and new booths for radio and television. Construction is scheduled to begin in phases after the 2007 season with the goal of opening prior to the 2009 season. Phase One includes the expansion of Tyser Tower which includes the addition of 64 suites, mezzanine seating for 500, new work area for television, radio and print media, new work area for coaches and gameday staff, a new merchandise outlet, enhanced seating for disabled customers and a new state-ofthe-art video scoreboard. Phase Two will inlclude installation of railings in the north and south lower bowl, chairback seating in the 200 level on the north side and additional restrooms and consessions on the south side. The playing field will be lowered to improve site lines in the first 10 rows and converting those 3,000 seats into some of the best in the

- \$1 million to establish the Gossett Family Head Men's Basketball Coach Endowment;
- \$1 million to establish the Gossett Family Maryland Athletics Director Endowment;

STRETCHIN

Sophomore Chris Turner helped spark the offense to the win over Rutgers (Sept. 29), but the Maryland wide receiving corps aided the inexperienced signal-caller by making a number of big plays down the field. Over the first three games of the season, the Terps had only eight plays of 20 or more yards (2.7 per game), but over the last nine contests they have posted 36 (4.0 per game), including 25 in the pass game. In the win over Boston College (Nov. 10), there were five plays over 20 yards, including four pass plays. In the Rutgers game, the top four wideouts (Darrius Heyward-Bey, Danny Oquendo, Isaiah Williams and LaQuan Williams) accounted for 13 receptions for 199 yards (15.3 yards per catch). None of the receptions may have been bigger, however, than LaQuan Williams' 27-yard catch on third-and-12 midway in the fourth quarter which enabled the Terps to extend their slim 20-17 lead. Williams laid out to corral Turner's pass at the 2-yard line, and Keon Lattimore scored one play later for a 27-17 lead, one Maryland did not relinquish. The Terps had four plays of 30 yards or more vs. Georgia Tech (Oct. 6), including a 78-yard TD connection between Jason Goode and Chris Turner. On the season, Heyward-Bey has a team-best 12 plays of 20 or more yards.

TERPS UPEND A TOP 10 TEAM...

Maryland's win over No. 10 Rutgers (Sept. 29) was its first over a top 10 team since 2004 (20-17 vs. No. 5 Florida State, Oct. 30). The Terps also downed a ranked team on the road for the second time in three opportunities. They lost to No. 20 Boston College, 38-16 on Nov. 18, 2006, but defeated No. 19 Clemson, 13-12, Nov. 4 of last year. It also marked the first time Maryland defeated a top 10 team on the road since Nov. 17, 1990 when they upended No. 8 Virginia, 35-30, in Charlottesville. That win came in the regular season finale and clinched a berth in the Independence Bowl for the Terps. In addition, Maryland defeated a top 10 non-conference team on the road for the first time since 1984. Frank Reich engineered a 31-point comeback in the Terps' 42-40 win at No. 6 Miami on Nov. 10, 1984. Until the Rutgers win, the Terps had lost seven in-a-row to top 10 non-conference foes on the road.

...AND THEN ANOTHER...

Maryland's 42-35 win over No. 8 Boston College on Nov. 10 gave it two victories over top 10 teams this season. In fact, the Terps have faced three top 10 teams this season and has gone 2-1 in those contests. This is the first time in school history the Terps have defeated two top 10 teams in the same season. It's also just the second year in school history the Terps have faced three top 10 teams in the same season (also 1982). They lost to No. 4 West Virginia, 31-14, on Sept. 13, downed No. 10 Rutgers, 34-24, on Sept. 29, and defeated No. 8 Boston College Saturday. Maryland has faced two top 10 teams in a season 14 times.

MAKING PLAYS ON OFFENSE...

- Entering the Wake Forest game, Maryland had eight plays from scrimmage of 20 yards or more on the season. Against WFU (Sept. 22) and Rutgers (Sept. 29), they had four apiece, and then exploded with five more in the win over Georgia Tech. In the first half of that game, the Terps recorded three of their longest pass plays of the year. Chris Turner, starting his first career game, hit Darrius Heyward-Bey for gains of 47 and 44 yards, and connected with tight end Jason Goode for a 78-yard touchdown pass. A 30-yard run by Lance Ball and a 20-yard completion from Turner to Joey **Haynos** rounded out the Terps big plays for the day.
- Heyward-Bey had touchdown receptions of 65 and 96 yards last season, but his 54-yard run against Wake Forest was the longest rushing attempt of his career and the longest rush of the season for Maryland. Against Georgia Tech, Heyward-Bey recorded his two longest plays of the season so far, with receptions of 47 and 44 yards. He also had a 37-yard TD on a reverse vs. Boston College (Nov. 10).

TERPS OWN NATION'S LONGEST STREAK...

- In special teams coach Ray Rychleski's seven years, Maryland has had three punters (Brooks Barnard, Adam Podlesh, and Travis Baltz), two long snappers (Jon Condo and Andrew Schmitt) and zero blocked punts. In fact since the Wake Forest game in 1999 (Oct. 9), only three players (Barnard, Podlesh, Baltz) have started at punter.
- The Terrapins' streak without a blocked punt goes back 97 games, the longest streak in college football.
- The Terps have not had a punt blocked since Nov. 13, 1999 (Florida State). That amount of time became the longest in NCAA football when Georgia had a punt blocked by Ole Miss last season, snapping a streak which began earlier in the 1999 season.

TERPS TOUGH ROAD LAST SEASON...

- The Terrapins road back to a bowl game last season was a challenging one, as their schedule was one of the toughest in the nation. The Terrapins played five teams ranked in the AP Top 20 at the time of the game (West Virginia, Georgia Tech, Clemson, Boston College, Wake Forest).
- Eight bowl teams were among the 12 teams on Maryland's schedule last season. The Terps closed their 2006 schedule with five straight bowl teams.

...AND IT HASN'T BEEN ANY EASIER...

- In 2007, the Terps again faced eight teams that were selected to bowl games (West Virginia, Wake Forest, Rutgers, Georgia Tech, Virginia, Clemson, Boston College, Florida State). So far this season they have also faced three ranked opponents (all top 10 teams) and gone 2-1 in those games.
- The Terps' three-game stretch from Sept.13 through Sept. 29 may have been one of the hardest in the country. In
 consecutive weeks, the Terps played host to West Virginia in College Park (ranked No. 4 in both polls), traveled to
 defending ACC champion Wake Forest, and headed to New Jersey to face Rutgers (ranked No. 10 in both polls). They
 went 1-2 in that stretch.
- Prior to the start of the season, SI.com had the Terps' schedule ranked 24th-most difficult in the country. According to
 the NCAA, the Terps' 2007 schedule is tied for 27th-most difficult in the nation, based on records of past opposition
 (65-51/.560). Maryland's schedule is ranked 27th-most difficult according to final regular-season Sagarin Ratings.

TERPS AMONG A SELECT GROUP...

 The Terps are one of just six teams in the nation (University of Central Florida, East Carolina, Middle Tennessee State, Troy and Louisiana Tech) to play two top 10 teams in non-conference action this season. More importantly, the Terps are the only team among this group to come away with a victory.

East Carolina: at No. 9 Virginia Tech; at No. 5 West Virginia.

Middle Tennessee St.: at No. 8 Louisville; at No. 2 LSU.

 The Terps are also one of just four teams (Kentucky, LSU, Illinois) in the nation to defeat two top 10 teams this season:

THE HENDERSON LINEBACKER LEGACY...

- Junior Erin Henderson continued his own legacy this season. Henderson is the younger brother of E.J., who was a
 consensus All-American at linebacker for the Terps in 2001 and 2002. Erin and his brother posted comparable numbers
 as sophomores. Erin totaled 114 total tackles in 2006, while E.J. posted 109 in 2000. Now Erin, a preseason All-America
 pick by Playboy, is having an explosive junior season similar to his brother's. E.J. burst onto the national scene with 150
 tackles and 28 tackles for loss in 2001, as Maryland captured the ACC title. Henderson leads the team in tackles (122)
 despite missing the Georgia Tech contest (Oct. 6).
- In 2006, Erin Henderson averaged 12.4 stops over the last five regular-season games, and recorded six double-digit tackle games on the season, including a then career-high 17-tackle effort versus Clemson. He has 15 career doubledigit tackle outings after posting 13 stops vs. BC (Nov. 10).

STEFFY OPENS SEASON AS STARTER...

- Starting quarterback Jordan Steffy has had to fight his way through more than just competition to climb the depth chart. A highly touted prospect out of Leola, Pa., Steffy played in six games as a freshman in 2004 and showed potential before injuries derailed his career. He suffered a concussion against Virginia Tech, and a torn meniscus the next month. In April 2005 he survived a near-fatal car accident, and in July of that year he had surgery on his biceps as a result of overthrowing. After a redshirt season and a year as the back-up quarterback, Steffy finally claimed the starting job to open the season, though he has had to miss the Georgia Tech and Virginia games after suffering a concussion vs. Rutgers (Sept. 29). He was cleared to play just two days before the Clemson game (Oct. 27), and has seen action in each of the Terps last two games (FSU, Nov. 17 and NC State Nov. 24).
- Friedgen on Steffy "He knows the offense very well and he's a very instinctive player. He's also a leader on the team. One of the things I like about him is that he's patient. He'll take the check down."
- Steffy demonstrated poise and excellent decision making in the Terps off-season scrimmages. In the three scrimmages
 of spring practice, he threw for 376 yards, with three touchdowns and no interceptions on 30 of 47 passing. He finished
 with 19 completions on 26 attempts for 165 yards and an interception in the team's final summer scrimmage.
- Steffy has completed 67.3 percent of his passes, the second best mark in the ACC.

SELECT COMPANY...

- Ralph Friedgen's 56 wins are the third-most by any ACC coach in his seventh season on the job.
 Danny Ford of Clemson posted 51 from 1979-84 and Dick Crum of North Carolina (1978-82) also tallied 50.
- Though he was the top second-, third- and fourthyear coach in ACC history by wins, Friedgen's five-year win total (41) fell short of the mark of 44 victories set by Clemson's Danny Ford from 1979-83. That mark tied him for second on the list with former Terrapin great **Jerry Claiborne** (1972-76). Claiborne holds the league's sevenyear mark with 58 victories. Friedgen currently has 56.

IN THE BOOKS.

There are currently two players in the two-deep - LEO Jermaine Lemons and TE Dan Gronkowski - who have graduated. Lemons is pursuing another degree and Gronkowski is in grad school. There are also 12 players on the roster, including seniors Lance Ball, Andrew Crummey, Isaiah Gardner, Joey Haynos, Brendan McDermond, Dre Moore, Chris Roberts and Christian Varner, as well as juniors Obi Egekeze, Matt Goldberg, Erin Henderson, and Richard Taylor, who are expected to graduate by December. In addition, all 15 seniors on the roster are on track to graduate by August, 2008.

HENDERSON A SEMIFINALIST FOR BUTKUS AWARD...

 Erin Henderson was selected as one of 10 semifinalists for the Butkus Award, given to the nation's best collegiate linebacker, as announced by the Downtown Athletic Club of Orlando (DACO) on Thursday, Oct. 18. Henderson, the Terps' active career leader in tackles with 236, led Maryland in stops in each of the nine games he has played this season (sat out the Georgia Tech game with a knee injury). The junior is currently eighth in the NCAA in tackles per game (11.1). The Butkus Award is bestowed upon the top linebacker in college football. Joining Henderson on the semifinal list were Dan Connor (Penn State), Shawn Crable (Michigan), Jordon Dizon (Colorado), Ali Highsmith (LSU), James Laurinaitis (Ohio State), J Leman (Illinois), Ben Moffitt (South Florida), Keith Rivers (USC) and Wesley Woodyard (Kentucky). Henderson was not named a finalist. Connor, Dizon and Laurinaitis were named finalists on Nov. 8. A 2007 Playboy All-American, Henderson was one of 65 student-athletes selected to the original watch list. In the preseason, he was also selected to the watch lists for the Nagurski Trophy and the Bednarik Award, which both honor the top defensive player in the nation. Henderson's brother, E.J., who currently plays for the Minnesota Vikings and was an All-America linebacker at Maryland, won the 2002 Butkus Award after he totaled 175 tackles that year.

LB UNIT: HOME OF THE HARDWARE...

Three of the last seven years, the Atlantic Coast Conference Defensive Player of the Year has been a Maryland linebacker. Last season the Terps had to replace the 2005 honoree after losing the eventual NFL second-round pick D'Qwell Jackson. Focus this season is on junior Erin Henderson, who had a number of preseason accolades after a standout 2006 campaign. Henderson, who mans the Will linebacker slot, finished second in the ACC in tackles last season. Henderson, younger brother of former All-American E.J., was a second-team All-ACC choice in 2006. Erin was on the 2007 Playboy Preseason All-America team and was on the watch lists for the Nagurski Trophy (top defender in the nation), Bednarik Award (top defensive player in the nation) and Butkus Award (top linebacker in the country). He has earned a spot as one of the 10 semifinalists for the Butkus Award. E.J. was the league's defensive player of the year in 2001 and 2002 and Jackson (2005) earned their hardware while also garnering national award attention.

'TERRAPINS RISING' GOES BEHIND THE SCENES WITH MARYLAND FOOTBALL...

'Terrapins Rising,' a reality television show chronicling spring practice, gave fans a behind-the-scenes look at the inner workings of a major college football program, the first show of its kind. The 10-episode series, which was being presented by Under Armour, began on Monday, June 25 and aired weekly each Monday on Comcast SportsNet Mid-Atlantic. Footage for the show was shot throughout the five weeks of spring practice, which concluded on April 28 with the annual Red-White Game. 'Terrapins Rising' was the result of a partnership between Maryland Athletics, Under Armour and Atkinson Productions. A film crew, led by former University of Maryland and Washington Redskins placekicker Jess Atkinson, followed the team. The crew also sat in on team and positional meetings, as well as a number of off-the-field activities. "This isn't something that's been done at the college level," head coach Ralph Friedgen said of the reality show. "It's really ground-breaking. We think the show will give fans better insight into how much goes on day-to-day with the players and coaches." Atkinson, owner of Atkinson Productions, has worked with the university the past six years, producing Fridge TV and video segments for the school's athletics Web site, umterps.com. 'Fridge TV,' the Terps' weekly football television show, is broadcast during the regular season on Comcast SportsNet.



RALPH FRIEDGEN IS IN HIS SEVENTH YEAR AS HEAD COACH AT THE UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND WITH A REPUTATION AS ONE OF THE TOP OFFENSIVE MINDS IN COLLEGE FOOTBALL.

FRIEDGEN HAS LIFTED THE TERRAPINS TO UNPRECEDENTED HEIGHTS IN HIS TENURE, TAKING THE TEAM TO FIVE BOWL GAMES, INCLUDING A PAIR OF NEW YEAR'S DAY APPEARANCES, AND A SCHOOL RECORD THREE STRAIGHT BOWL VICTORIES. PRIOR TO FRIEDGEN'S ARRIVAL, MARYLAND HAD JUST ONE BOWL GAME APPEARANCE IN THE PREVIOUS 15 SEASONS.

He is the 33rd head coach in school history and ranks fourth in Maryland annals in career winning percentage (.676). His 56 wins are also the third most of any seventh-year head coach in Atlantic Coast Conference history.

Last year Friedgen took on added responsibility, assuming the duties of the team's offensive coordinator, marking the first time he has called the plays in his head coaching tenure at Maryland. The team went on to post a 9-4 record, marking the fourth nine-win campaign in the last six seasons and 13th in school history. The Terps culminated the season with a convincing 24-7 victory over Purdue in the Champs Sports Bowl.

Friedgen has directed the team to another bowl appearance this season despite having to persevere through numerous injuries as only three offensive players started all 12 regular-season games. In all there were 16 members of the two-deep which missed at least one game this season

In spite of the injuries, he had the Terps at their best against the toughest competition as Maryland defeated a pair of top 10 teams this season. In 115 years of football, the Terps had never defeated two top-10 teams in the same season.

The wins over No. 10 Rutgers and No. 8 Boston College put the Terps among elite company nationally as well. Maryland was one of only four teams in the country (also LSU, Kentucky and Illinois) to defeat two top-10 teams during the 2007 campaign.

A long-time successful assistant coach at Georgia Tech, where he was credited with overseeing one of the nation's most potent offensive attacks, Friedgen continues to build a new level of pride and glory to his alma mater's football program, guiding the Terps to a 56-30 record, including an ACC title and a pair of second-place finishes in his first seven years.

Not only were his 50 wins after six seasons more than those of Terps legend Jerry Claiborne, they also fall just shy of the all-time ACC mark of 51, set by Clemson's Danny Ford in the early 1980s. In addition, in his first three seasons at the helm of the Terrapin program, Friedgen became the first coach in conference lore to lead a team to three-straight seasons of 10 wins or more, while his 36 wins in his first four years ranked him in the top 10 in NCAA history, surpassing the fourth-year marks of coaches such as Frank Leahy and Joe Paterno.

The consensus national coach of the year in 2001 after leading Maryland to its first ACC championship since 1985, Friedgen and company have returned Maryland to prominence on the national scene. The Terrapins have won more games (56) in the seven seasons under Friedgen than they had in the 14 years prior to his arrival (55).

Long overlooked as a head-coaching candidate, the 1970 Maryland graduate was tapped as the Terps' head football coach following the 2000 season, and he wasted no time in returning the program to the glory days it achieved when Friedgen was an assistant to Bobby Ross in the 1980s

Six years ago, in his first season as the Terps' grid boss, Maryland won its first seven games and eventually halted Florida State's reign as perennial ACC champion, earning the league's automatic berth in the Bowl Championship Series' FedEx Orange Bowl. By winning the ACC title that season, Friedgen became the first mentor in league history to win the championship in his first year as a head coach.

In 2002, despite a 1-2 start and without 19 seniors from the previous year, the Terps made their way back to a major bowl game, winning 10 of their last 11 games and finishing in a tie for second in the ACC. The 2003 campaign provided a bit of déjà vu for Friedgen and the Terrapins as they again started 1-2, and again ran off 10 wins in their final 11 games to earn a second New Year's bowl bid in three years.

By winning 11 games in 2002, Friedgen became just the second coach in school history to hit that mark, tying matching Claiborne's 11-win campaign in 1976.

The 2006 team started 3-2 before reeling off a five-game winning streak, which placed them in the midst of the ACC Atlantic Division race. The Terps lost to eventual champion Wake Forest on the final game of the regular season, but Maryland was a force in the league race throughout the year, enabling it to earn the fourth slot among ACC postseason bids and a trip to Orlando for the Champs Sports Bowl.

Friedgen's Terps have gone to bowl games in five of his seven seasons, participating in the BCS Orange Bowl his first year before posting lopsided victories over Tennessee (30-3) in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl and over West Virginia (41-7) in the Toyota Gator Bowl. In all, Maryland has outscored its last three bowl opponents, 95-17.


His offensive success notwithstanding, Friedgen's teams at Maryland have been superb on defense, ranking among the nation's leaders annually while producing the ACC's Defensive Player of the Year in three of the last seven seasons (E.J. Henderson in 2001 and 2002; D'Qwell Jackson in 2005).

Named the winner of the Frank Broyles Award as the top assistant coach in the country in 1999 while at Tech, Friedgen brought 32 years of assistant coaching experience (including 21 as an offensive coordinator either in college or the NFL) with him in his return to College Park.

The 60-year-old Friedgen (pronounced FREE-jun) owns the rare distinction of coordinating the offense for both a collegiate national champion (Georgia Tech in 1990) and a Super Bowl team (San Diego in 1994).

Friedgen spent 20 seasons with the aforementioned Ross in coaching stops at The Citadel, Maryland, Georgia Tech and the NFL's San Diego Chargers. He returned to Tech in 1997, where he served another successful stint as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under good friend George O'Leary, now the head coach at the University of Central Florida.

A 1970 graduate of Maryland, where he earned a degree in physical education, Friedgen launched his coaching career as a graduate assistant before heading off to a series of jobs that included The Citadel (1973-79), William & Mary (1980) and Murray State (1981).

In 1982, he returned to Maryland as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach under Ross, with Friedgen's tenure lasting until 1986. During that stretch, the Terps captured three consecutive ACC championships (1983-85) and played in four bowl games. All told, the Terrapins were 39-15-1 from 1982-86 and won two bowl games (the Sun Bowl in 1984 and the Cherry Bowl in 1985). It is the type of success Friedgen has reinstilled in his current group of Terrapins.

The Ross-Friedgen connection began in 1973, when Ross hired the former Maryland offensive guard as defensive line coach at The Citadel. Friedgen spent seven seasons at The Citadel, the last three as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. He then worked one season (1980) as offensive coordinator at William & Mary and one season (1981) as assistant head coach at Murray State before Ross tapped him to be his offensive coordinator at Maryland in 1982.

During his five-year stay at Maryland under Ross, Friedgen was instrumental in the development of future

pro quarterbacks Boomer Esiason, Frank Reich and Stan Gelbaugh, all of whom spent at least 10 seasons in the National Football League. Esiason played professionally from 1984-97, Reich from 1985-98 and Gelbaugh from 1986-95.

Friedgen followed Ross to Georgia Tech in 1987, becoming the Yellow Jackets' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for the next five seasons, including the 1990 campaign when Tech, unranked in the preseason, captured the national championship with an 11-0-1 record. The national title came just two years after the Jackets had posted back-to-back seasons of three wins or less.

When Ross was named head coach of the San Diego Chargers in 1992, he tapped Friedgen to serve as running game coordinator for two seasons (1992-93) before elevating him to offensive coordinator in 1994, when the Chargers advanced to the Super Bowl for the first time in franchise history. During his time with the Chargers, Friedgen helped a club that had not made the playoffs in a decade reach postseason play three times in five

Known for developing balanced offensive attacks with multiple looks, Tech was one of only two teams in the country in 1999 to average at least 200 yards rushing and 200 yards passing. Tech also accomplished the feat under Friedgen's guidance in 1990, '91 and '98. The 1999 team, with Joe Hamilton at quarterback, set 59 school records, rewriting many marks established by the 1990 national championship team, which was led by another Friedgen pupil, Shawn Jones (1989-92). Friedgen was a finalist for the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach in 1998 when the Ramblin' Wreck set a then-school record with 50 touchdowns.

The first Maryland alum since Bob Ward (1967-68) to serve as the Terps' head football coach, Friedgen originally came to Maryland as a quarterback in the mid-'60s and spent most of his career as an offensive lineman, lettering in 1966 and '68 and capturing Academic All-ACC honors. He was a two-time winner of the George C. Cook Memorial Award (1968-69) for having the highest academic average on the football team.

Friedgen's coaching roots run deep. His father, also named Ralph (though not a "Sr."), was a high school coach for more than 30 years and masterminded, among other teams, the 1964 Westchester County (N.Y.) High School team that went undefeated and averaged 44 points per game running what was then an unusual multiple offense. It was an offense run by a 190-pound quarterback later recruited by Maryland who shared his name. Maybe as a sign of things to come, the younger Ralph called all of his team's offensive plays from his junior year on.

Friedgen and his wife, the former Gloria Spina, have three daughters: Kelley, Kristina and Katie. Gloria is the Coordinator of Alumni Affairs and Outreach for the College of Health and Human Performance at Maryland while both serve on that college's Board of Visitors. Kelley is in her third year as an associate at Arnold and Porter in D.C., specializing in pharmaceutical and medical device law; Kristina is in her fourth year in the theater program at Maryland; and Katie is her second year of college at Maryland, majoring in art.

Friedgen was honored for his dedication to his family in June of 2007 when he named father of the year by the Washington D.C. Father's Day Council.

VILLANOVA MARYLAND 14 31

SEPT. 1, 2007 CHEVY CHASE BANK FIELD AT BYRD STADIUM

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) – Keon Lattimore ran for 106 yards and three touchdowns, Jordan Steffy played exceptionally well in his first start as Maryland's quarterback, and the Terrapins were down Villanova in a 31-14 victory.

Lattimore also caught six passes for 33 yards. The senior averaged 5 yards on his 21 carries and moved over 1,000 rushing yards for his career.

Steffy did a fine job running the offense, going 19-for-24 for 174 yards and running for 47 yards and a touchdown

Up 10-7, the Terrapins opened the third quarter with an 11-play, 66-yard touchdown drive. Five plays after Steffy ran for 2 yards on a fourth-and-1 from the Villanova 42, Lattimore scored on a 14-yard run.

On Maryland's next possession, Steffy left with a leg cramp in the middle of a 57-yard touchdown drive that Lattimore concluded with an 18-yard run for a 24-7 lead.

Then, after a Maryland interception, Steffy moved the Terrapins 87 yards and scored on a 10-yard TD run with 12:46 left.

That ended a night Steffy had been waiting for since he arrived at Maryland as a freshman in 2004. Before facing the Wildcats, the redshirt junior had thrown only 37 passes and had gone two years since his last completion.

Steffy's play against Villanova belied his inexperience. First, he moved the Terrapins 46 yards for a field goal. Then he directed a 90-yard march in which he passed for 28 yards and ran for 22. The drive ended with Lattimore dragging two tacklers into the end zone on a 12-yard run.

The Wildcats then moved 84 yards on eight plays, closing to 10-7 on Antwon Young's first career touchdown pass, a 26-yarder to Matthew Sherry.

Young went 17-for-28 for 176 yards in his first college start. The Wildcats finished with 11 yards rushing on 22 carries.

Villanova got a touchdown with 54 seconds left when Salim Koroma picked off a Turner pass and took it 42 yards to the end zone.

MARYLAND 26 FLORIDA INTERNATIONAL 10

SEPT. 8, 2007 THE ORANGE BOWL

MIAMI (AP) -- Keon Lattimore ran for 111 yards and two early touchdowns, and Maryland held off pesky Florida International 26-10.

Jordan Steffy completed 18 of 25 passes for 135 yards and Lance Ball had a 1-yard scoring run with 53 seconds left to seal the win for Maryland, now 2-0 for the fourth time in Ralph Friedgen's seven seasons.

Moses Hinton caught a 49-yard TD pass from Wayne Younger for Florida International (0-2), losers of 14 straight games — the second-longest current drought in major college football behind Duke.

FIU put a major scare into Maryland last season, losing 14-10 when the Terrapins intercepted a pass near the goal line on the game's final play. This one wasn't easy for the Terps, either -- who scored 10 fourthquarter points off a pair of FIU turnovers.

Lattimore is the brother of Baltimore Ravens linebacker Ray Lewis, who starred at Miami before entering the NFL. Lattimore has fond memories of seeing Lewis play at the Orange Bowl, the Hurricanes' home field that FIU is using this season while its own stadium is remodeled. Now, he's got memories of his own.

Lattimore had a 42-yard run on Maryland's first play, and he scored from 1 yard out to make it 9-0. The scoring started with a safety on a botched FIU punt 26 seconds into the game.

FIU went three-and-out on its next possession and Lattimore came through again, this time with a 14-yard TD to make it 16-0 with 8:13 left in the quarter.

A big play helped FIU get back into the game.

Off play-action, Younger found Hinton down the left sideline for the first score in Mario Cristobal's era as FIU coach.

FIU got within 16-10 early in the fourth on Chris Abed's 42-yard field goal. But Lionell Singleton fumbled a punt return away deep in FIU territory with 12:27 left, setting up Obi Egekeze's 36-yard field goal that restored Maryland's nine-point lead.

For Maryland (3-2), it was redemption. The win ended Rutgers' 10-game home winning streak and snapped a two-game Terps losing streak that included a 31-24 overtime loss to Wake Forest last week.

Turner completed 14 of 20 passes for 149 yards in relief of Jordan Steffy, who left late in the first half with

Maryland rallied despite losing a 14-3 advantage late in the first half and heading into halftime with Rutgers leading 17-14.

Turner led the rally that culminated in field goals of 26 and 37 yards from Obi Egekeze, a 2-yard TD run by Lattimore and a late 14-yard dash by Lance Ball, who rushed for 90 yards and two touchdowns.

Teel threw two touchdown passes and Ray Rice scored on a 1-yard run with 4:41 to go to cut the Maryland lead to 27-24. But the Terps defense held stout against a Scarlet Knights offense that was averaging 46 points. Rice was held to 97 yards rushing on 21 carries, including 38 yards on his last 15 attempts.

The victory over a top 10 team was the first for Maryland since upsetting Florida State in 2004. The Terps outgained the Scarlet Knights 458-392 while forcing three turnovers.

Turner, who took over after Steffy was hurt on the Terps' final series of the first half, got Maryland going early in the second half. A 28-yard pass to Isaiah Williams and a penalty for roughing the passer led to Egekeze's 26-yard field goal that tied the game at 17 midway through the third quarter.

Ball broke off a 32-yard run and Turner hit Darrius Heyward-Bey for 18 to set up a go-ahead 37-yard field goal with 3:43 left in the third quarter.

Maryland's defense held Rutgers to one first down on its next two series, and Turner led Maryland on a 58-yard touchdown drive. Lattimore capped it with a 2-yard run one play after LaQuan Williams stretched out to making a diving third-down catch of a 27-yard pass.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. -- Sophomore Chris Turner threw for 337 yards and three touchdowns to lift the injury-plagued Maryland Terrapins (5-5, 2-4) to a thrilling 42-35 victory over No. 8 Boston College (8-2, 4-2). Senior tight end Jason Goode, playing in his final home game, caught two TD passes as the Terps rolled

up a season-high 466 total yards.

It was the most points Boston College had allowed in an Atlantic Coast Conference game since joining the league in 2005. In addition, the nation's top-ranked rushing defense (58 yards per game) surrendered a season-high 135 yards, even though Maryland was without its leading ground-gainer.

Matt Ryan, who threw three interceptions against Florida State, went 33-for-56 for 421 yards and three touchdowns, but was intercepted twice.

The Terps received a solid performance from Turner, who went 21-for-27. Knowing it would be difficult to pound the ball inside, Maryland relied heavily on the passing game, often throwing deep and spreading the Boston College defense with guick tosses to the outside.

That enabled Lance Ball to rush 32 times for 109 yards and a score. Goode had six catches, matching his total in Maryland's first nine games.

The Terrapins let a 42-21 lead dwindle to seven points when Ryan threw a 13-yard touchdown pass to Ryan Purvis with 52 seconds left, but the subsequent onside kick failed to go the required 10 yards, giving Maryland possession and the victory

At game's end, the fans rushed the field to celebrate the Terps' second win this season over a top-10 team. Maryland beat then-No. 10 Rutgers on Sept. 29. It marked the first time in school history Maryland has defeated two top-10 teams in the same season.

Da'Rel Scott, who had a career-high 89 yards on the ground, then rushed 33 yards up the middle to open a possession that ended with Ball's second TD, a 2-yard burst around right end that gave the Terps a 24-0 lead with 4 minutes left before halftime. By then, some fans were headed for the exits.

Obi Egekeze kicked three field goals for Maryland.

It was a rare rout in a series that had been dominated by close games, with the previous seven meetings decided by an average of fewer than 6 points.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. - In front of the first capacity crowd in Gator Bowl history, 16,666, Maryland's Lu Gambino was a one-

man wrecking crew, rushing for 165 yards and scoring three touchdowns. Gambino's three scores propelled Maryland to a 20-7 lead, but Georgia reeled off 13 points in the fourth quarter to tie the game. The Bulldogs threatened to win the game in the closing seconds, but time ran out with Georgia on Maryland's four-yard line. Despite the tie, there was no question as to the game's most valuable player. Gambino won the Burkhalter Award, signifying the game's outstanding performer. Gambino was inducted into the Gator Bowl Hall of Fame in 1992.







DEEP ROOTS, BROAD IMPACT

Charles Benedict Calvert founded the Maryland Agricultural College in 1856 with the goal of creating a school that would offer outstanding practical knowledge to him and his neighbors and be "an institution superior to any other."

One hundred and fifty years later, the University of Maryland has blossomed from its roots as the state's first agricultural college and one of America's original land grant institutions into a model of the modern research university. It is the state's greatest asset for its economic development and its future, and has made its mark in the nation and the world.

Calvert would be astounded by the depth and breadth of research activities, innovative educational programs, and the single-minded pursuit of excellence that are part of the University of Maryland today. Maryland is ranked 18th among the nation's top public research universities by *U.S. News & World Report*, with **31 academic programs in the Top 10 and 92 in the Top 25.** It is also ranked No. 37th in the world, according to the Institute of Higher Education at at Shanghai's Jiao Tong University.

Maryland is the state's premier center of research and graduate education and the public institution of choice for undergraduate students of exceptional ability and promise. The faculty includes three Nobel laureates, six Pulitzer Prize winners, a three-time Emmy Award winner, 40 members of national academies and scores of Fulbright scholars. The university focuses great attention on the highest academic standards, affordability

for all qualified students, and a President's Promise program that guarantees opportunity for extraordinary extracurricular and professional experiences for each student.

It has earned a national reputation for its enriched educational experiences for undergraduates, including such widely imitated living/learning programs as College Park Scholars; Gemstone, a unique program that brings teams of students together from across disciplines to tackle specific technical problems; and the Hinman CEO Entrepreneurship Program, sponsored jointly by the A. James Clark School of Engineering and the Robert H. Smith School of Business, and widely recognized as the most successful student entrepreneurship program in the nation.

These programs are guided by outstanding faculty whose accomplishments in research abound. Whether the issue is Mideast peace, cutting-edge research in nanoscience, homeland security or bioscience advances, Maryland faculty are selected for national leadership and are making news. Many recent major faculty initiatives receiving significant external support strengthen our homeland security endeavors—centers for research on agrosecurity and emergency management; intermodal freight transportation

security; behavioral and social analyses of terrorism and responses to terrorism; astrophysics and advanced world climate and weather prediction; and a national Center for Advanced Study of Language.

In addition to its academic prowess, Maryland is also home to the Terrapins, whose athletic achievements are a perennial source of pride for nearly 250,000 alumni and residents of the state. In 2005-2006, the Terrapins brought home national championships in four sports — men's soccer, field hockey, competitive cheer and women's basketball — more than any university in the nation.

In 2004, Maryland's School of Music hosted the National Symphony Orchestra in its first university residency, and its 2006 opera production was declared by the *Washington Post* music critic "... as good as any Bohème you are likely to see this side of the Metropolitan Opera or Covent Garden."

Whether aiming for the skies or pioneering journalism programs in China, the University of Maryland is surging ahead. Building on the work of outstanding faculty and students, and with the loyal support of alumni and friends, Maryland is moving aggressively and confidently to a decade that will shine brighter than any other in its history.





RESIDENT MOTE JR.



In September 1998, C. D. (Dan) Mote, Jr. began his tenure as President of the University of Maryland and Glenn L. Martin Institute Professor of Engineering. He was recruited to lead the University of Maryland to national eminence under a mandate by the state. Since assuming the presidency, he has encouraged an environment of excellence across the University and given new impetus to the momentum generated by a talented faculty and student body. Under his leadership, academic programs have flourished. In 2005, the University was ranked 18th among public research universities, up from 30th in 1998. President Mote has emphasized broad access to the university's model, enriched undergraduate curriculum programs and launched the Baltimore Incentive Awards Program to recruit and provide full support to high school students of outstanding potential who have overcome extraordinary adversity during their lives.

He has spurred the university to lead the state in the development of its high-tech economy, especially in the information and communication, bioscience and biotechnology, and nano-technology sectors. President Mote has greatly expanded the university's partnerships with corporate and federal laboratories and successfully negotiated to bring to the College Park area the first Science Research Park sponsored by the People's Republic of China. Under his leadership, the University has established a research park, The University of Maryland Enterprise Campus, M-Square, located on a 115-acre site adjacent to the University of Maryland/College Park Metro with 3 million square feet of development potential. Among its first tenants are the Center for Advanced Study of Language, a joint venture of the University and Department of Defense, and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's new World Weather and Climate Prediction Center.

During President Mote's second year in office, the University began the largest building boom in its history, with more than \$100 million in new projects breaking ground that year. New facilities address every aspect of university life, from the arts to recreation to classrooms and laboratories, and, in creative partnership with the private sector, new residential facilities. Highlights of the construction activity include the stunning Clarice Smith Performing Arts Center; the Comcast Center, a state of the art sports complex; a high tech research greenhouse; and new classrooms for chemistry, computer science, business and engineering. President Mote also led the development of a new Facilities Master Plan for development in the next 20 years, which is noted for its emphasis on environmental

Dr. Mote is a leader in the national dialogue on higher education and his analyses of shifting funding models have been featured in local and national media. He has testified on major educational issues before Congress, representing the University and higher education associations on the problem of visa barriers for international students and scholars and on deemed export control issues. He has been asked to serve on a high level National Academies Committee appointed at the request of the Senate Energy Subcommittee of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee to identify challenges to United States leadership in key areas of science and technology and to be a member of the Leadership Council of the National Innovation Initiative, an activity of the Council on Competitiveness. He has served as vice chair of the Department of Defense Basic Research Committee, and is a member of the Council of the National Academy of Engineering. In 2004-2005, he served as President of the Atlantic Coast Conference. In its last ranking in 2002, "Washington Business Forward" magazine counted him among the top 20 most influential leaders in the region.

Prior to assuming the Presidency at Maryland, Dr. Mote served on the University of California, Berkeley faculty for 31 years. From 1991 to 1998, he was Vice Chancellor at Berkeley, held an endowed chair in Mechanical Systems and was President of the UC Berkeley Foundation. He led a comprehensive capital campaign for Berkeley that raised \$1.4 B. He earlier served as chair of Berkeley's Department of Mechanical Engineering and led the department to its number one ranking in the National Research Council review of graduate program effectiveness.

Dr. Mote's research lies in dynamic systems and biomechanics. Internationally recognized for his research on the dynamics of gyroscopic systems and the biomechanics of snow skiing, he has produced more than 300 publications. holds patents in the U.S., Norway, Finland and Sweden, and has mentored 56 Ph.D. students. He received the B.S., M.S. and Ph.D. in mechanical engineering from the University of California, Berkeley. President Mote has received numerous awards and honors, including the Humboldt Prize awarded by the Federal Republic of Germany. He is a recipient of the Berkeley Citation, an award from the University of California-Berkeley similar to the honorary doctorate, and was named Distinguished Engineering Alumnus. He has received two honorary doctorates. He is a member of the U.S. National Academy of Engineering and serves on its Council, and is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He was

elected to Honorary Membership in the ASME International. its most distinguished recognition, and is a Fellow of the International Academy of Wood Science, the Acoustical Society of America, and the American Association for the Advancement of Science. In Spring 2005, he was named recipient of the 2005 J. P. Den Hartog award by the ASME International Technical Committee on Vibration and Sound to honor his lifelong contribution to the teaching and/or practice of vibration engineering. In Fall 2005, he received the 2005 Founders Award from the National Academy of Engineering in recognition of his comprehensive body of work on the dynamics of moving flexible structures and for leadership in academia.

He and his wife of over 40 years, Patricia Mote, have two married children, Melissa and Adam, and four grandchildren. Patsy Mote has continued her strong support of the arts and is spokesperson for the Clarice Smith Performing Arts Center and a member of Prince George's County Arts Commission.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS • 14TH YEAR AT MARYLAND



Deborah A. Yow is in the 14th year of her outstanding tenure as director of athletics at the University of Maryland, a tenure that has seen unprecedented success and achievement in Maryland athletics. In Yow's 13-plus years at Maryland, the Terrapins have won a remarkable 15 national championships and graduated student-athletes at an enviable rate as Maryland

athletics has soared to sustained new heights among the nation's elite intercollegiate athletic programs.

The comprehensive success of Terrapin athletics under Debbie Yow's leadership is a clear and compelling testimony of her values of excellence, teamwork and accountability.

Likewise, her prior election to the presidency of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics is an indication of the wide respect with which she is regarded among its 6,100 members representing 1,600 colleges and universities in the U.S. and Canada.

She has been honored by Street and Smith's Sports Business Journal as one of the 20 most influential people in intercollegiate athletics and she has received the Carl Maddox Sport Management Award presented by the United States Sports Academy for excellence in athletics administration.

Dr. Yow was selected to serve on the U.S. Department of Education's Commission on Opportunities in Athletics to review the status of Federal Title IX regulations. She recently served as the chair of the Atlantic Coast Conference Committee on Television. The committee is charged with overseeing the league's TV contracts and dealing with issues related to television, including multi-year ACC football and basketball contracts with ABC, ESPN, ESPN2 and syndication entities. In January 2008, she will become a member of the Board of Directors of the National Football Foundation.

Additionally, she has represented intercollegiate athletics with presentations in a number of prominent settings such as the Harvard University School of Law conference on "Shaping the Future of Collegiate Athletics" and the Street and Smith's Sports Business Journal "National Forum on the Direction of Intercollegiate Athletics" in New York. She was also recently inducted into the State of Maryland Women's Hall of Fame and the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame, joining fellow Terp Buck Williams as honorees.

Yow, who has served on the NCAA Management Council and the NCAA Division I Budget Committee, is a strong and steady voice on behalf of intercollegiate athletics in America.

Since taking over as AD at Maryland in 1994, she and her staff have:

- Transformed Terrapin athletics into a responsive, goal-oriented organization with 27 sports and more than 700 studentathletes.
- Balanced all 13 of the department's annual budgets (none of the budgets were balanced in the 10 years prior to her arrival).
 The budget has now reached \$56 million annually and the multi-million dollar accumulated operating debt which her administration inherited has been eradicated.
- Greatly enhanced the academic support services provided for student-athletes, with an enviable exhausted eligibility graduation rate of approximately 85 percent for student athletes at Maryland.
- Led the Terrapins to a national all-sports ranking in the upper 7 percent of all NCAA Division I institutions.
- Significantly expanded marketing and fund-raising efforts on behalf of Terrapin athletics. As a result, private gifts to athletics have increased over 350 percent and corporate sponsorship revenues have increased by over 300 percent during her tenure at Maryland.

- Continued to dramatically improve venues and facilities for the department's 27 teams. The Comcast Center for men's and women's basketball and other sports that use the facility is a prime example of the remarkable upgrade of athletic facilities.
- Implemented a strategic management model.
- Developed a comprehensive Internet strategy with management, marketing and fund-raising applications.
- Significantly improved customer care in every area of Maryland athletics.

The most recent achievements of Maryland athletics are exceptional:

- Maryland captured a remarkable six national championships during the past two seasons.
- In 2006, the Terrapins achieved the highest student-athlete graduation rate in the history of Maryland athletics.
- Fundraising for Maryland athletics set a historic mark of \$31 million in 2006-07.
- Maryland was selected by U.S. News & World Report as one
 of the Top 20 athletic programs in the nation (for overall quality
 and competitive excellence).
- In 2005-06, Maryland Athletics won the inaugural PRISM Award as the most well-managed Division I collegiate athletics program in the nation
- Maryland was ranked as the sixth-finest athletic program in the nation by the Laboratory for the Study of Intercollegiate Athletics, based on comprehensive criteria such as graduation rates, financial efficiency, equity effectiveness and competitive excellence
- In men's basketball, the Terps won the Atlantic Coast Conference title over Duke in the championship game in 2004 and won the NCAA National Championship in 2002. Under Coach Gary Williams, the men's basketball team appeared in 11 consecutive NCAA Tournaments and in 12 of the last 14 tournaments.
- Women's basketball won the 2006 NCAA National Championship under head coach Brenda Frese, completing an amazing turnaround that saw the program go from a 10-18 record to a National Championship in four seasons.
- In football, the Terps won the 2001 Atlantic Coast Conference championship and played in the 2002 Orange Bowl, followed that with an 11-win season and a 30-3 victory over the University of Tennessee in the Peach Bowl, again followed by a 10-win season and a 41-7 win over West Virginia in the Gator Bowl on New Year's Day 2004. In the 2006-07 season, Maryland returned to the bowl scene, where the Terps beat Purdue, 24-7, in the Champs Sports Bowl. Graduation rates in football are exemplary and the program was recently recognized by the American Football Coaches Association for its academic excellence under Coach Ralph Friedgen.
- Additionally, Maryland is one of only nine universities to win the National Championship in football and men's basketball and is one of only three universities in the nation to win National Championships in men's basketball, women's basketball and football. Stanford and UCLA are the only other NCAA Division I institutions to achieve that mark.
- Set an ACC single-game record for women's basketball attendance by drawing 17,950 to a regular-season game at Comcast Center and led the ACC in season attendance.
- Hired Dave Cottle, the fifth-winningest active men's lacrosse coach in the U.S., who guided his team to the NCAA Final Four in three of the past five seasons.
- Field hockey earned National Championships in 2005-06 and in 2006-07, and has become a perennial participant in the Final Four in that sport.

- In women's lacrosse, hired Kathy Nelson Reese, who was named the 2007 ACC Coach of the Year in her first season as coach of the Terps.
- Men's soccer has appeared in four Final Fours in the past five years and won the NCAA National Championship.
- Football facilities have been significantly enhanced with team house, stadium and practice field upgrades. The Academic Center was the first improvement, as it took priority over all other initiatives
- The Terrapins have moved into the \$130 million Comcast Center, housing athletic department offices and seating for 18,000 fans for basketball and other events – part of a remarkable \$250 million upgrade and expansion of athletics facilities during Dr. Yow's leadership of Maryland Athletics.
- In 2006-07, 24 Maryland teams competed in postseason play.
- The productivity, morale, and the competitive and academic achievement of Terrapin athletics are exceptional and continue to gain momentum.

Regarding the many achievements of Terrapin athletics over the past 13 years, Yow says, "We are pleased, but we are not satisfied... our vision is to be one of the Top 5 programs in the nation consistently... we see no reason to settle for less."

Yow is known for her goal-oriented and proactive management style. She consistently inspires and challenges those around her to "raise our sights and sharpen our tools... to work hard and work smart... to recognize that our only limitations are those that we place upon ourselves."

As a manager and a leader, she clearly models these principles. She is the only known current AD in NCAA Division I who has hired both the National Coach of the Year in football (while at Maryland) and the National Coach of the Year in men's basketball (while at Saint Louis University). In 2002, she also brought to the University of Maryland Brenda Frese, who at that time was the National Coach of the Year in women's basketball. Four years later, Frese led the Terrapins to the NCAA National Championship at the Women's Final Four in Boston.

Dr. Yow is known as "a coach's AD," while also being highly organized and a strategic and proactive leader and administrator. Quite simply, Debbie Yow personifies the relational and management dynamics that are necessary to be an excellent administrator and leader.

A successful former basketball coach at the University of Kentucky and University of Florida, she moved into athletics administration at the University of Florida and the University of North Carolina, Greensboro, followed by a successful tenure as AD at Saint Louis University.

She has authored numerous articles and books on athletics management and human behavior, and is a respected leader in intercollegiate athletics in the United States.

Summing up the entire Maryland athletics program, our athletics director recently stated, "We have the finest student-athletes, coaches, support staff and administrative team in America. It is because of their courage, hard work and cooperative spirit that we now have a strong, viable athletic program. I am immensely proud of each of them. I am equally proud of our Terrapin fans who buy tickets, our Terrapin Club members who faithfully support the Maryland athletic program with their donations for scholarships, and the M Club members who serve and give liberally.
