SPRING OUTLOOK

Maryland came within a whisker of its first appearance in the Atlantic Coast Conference Championship game last season and that should give the Terrapins fuel for 2007.

However, any talk of championships must begin during the off-season and the grueling early morning workouts and long sessions in the weight room. The players and coaches started preparations for 2007 shortly after their dominating 24-7 victory over Purdue in the Champs Sports Bowl in December.

That victory gave the Terps a school-record three straight bowl wins and enabled them to finish the season 9-4, marking the 13th time in 114 years of football the Terps won at least nine games. Remarkably, four of those occurrences have come during Ralph Friedgen's six years as head coach.

"We had a good season," head coach **Ralph Friedgen** said of last year. "We had a chance to make it a real special season, but came up just a little short. Hopefully, that will help motivate the guys this spring.

"Last spring we talked about winning the ACC title and I don't think our players really believed it. But we ended up having an opportunity to do that. That's where we need to look to keep setting our goals high."

The Terps will look to their 41 returning letterwinners, including 13 offensive and defensive starters, to guide the squad, with the goal, once again, of winning a league title.

Seven starters are back on offense, including running back **Lance Ball**, wide receiver **Darrius Heyward-Bey**, tight end **Joey Haynos** and three linemen, to help facilitate that goal. In fact, backs who accounted for 94 percent of the rushing yards have returned, as well as pass-catchers who accounted for 97 percent of the receiving yards.

The problem is the Terps have to replace the triggerman, as two-year starting quarterback Sam Hollenbach departed, as did All-ACC left tackle Stephon Heyer. Heyer was the leader on the offensive line which opened holes for the Ball and running mate **Keon Lattimore** and allowed Hollenbach to toss for over 2,300 yards en route to All-ACC honors.

Junior **Jordan Steffy** enters the spring as the starter after two seasons as a backup. He has seen limited action in his career, but has been in Friedgen's offensive system for three years. This will mark the fifth time in the last seven years the Terps will break in a new starting quarterback.

"Jordan looks fine physically and has done a good job in off-season workouts," Friedgen said. "He will give us some more mobility in the pocket, something we hope to be able to utilize this season."

An offensive line that surrendered the second-fewest sacks in the ACC last season will have to be re-tooled.

Senior guard **Andrew Crummey**, an All-ACC performer, junior center **Edwin Williams** and tackle **Jared Gaither** are the returning starters, though Gaither will sit out the spring.

"We need to stay healthy up front or we're going to have some problems," Friedgen said.

The defense, meanwhile, returns six starters, though that unit lost three of its top four tacklers. However, there were a number of part-time players from a year ago who should step into starting roles this season.

"We have more depth on defense than we've had in the past and a lot more than we have on offense," Friedgen said.

Junior **Erin Henderson**, the team's leading tackler and an All-ACC performer last season, headlines not only the linebacking corps, but the whole defense.

Conrad Bolston has departed from the defensive line, but pass rusher **Jeremy Navarre** and run-stopper **Dre Moore** return. **Carlos Feliciano**, who started seven games last season, will step into Bolston's tackle spot where the Terps hope to have an improved rushing defense.

"We want to improve our tackling and the ability to shed blockers," second-year defensive coordinator **Chris Cosh** said about one of his goals for this spring.

With the departure of Wesley Jefferson and David Holloway, the linebacking corps will have to be a focus. Younger, more inexperienced players will likely man those spots, while **Trey Covington** is back as the starter at LEO, a hybrid defensive end/linebacker position.

There will be two personnel and position changes in the secondary where All-American cornerback Josh Wilson and strong safety Marcus Wimbush have departed. Senior **Isaiah Gardner** returns at cornerback and **Christian Varner** will move from free safety to strong safety.

Chief among the concerns of the coaching staff is the lack of a punter or place-kicker. All-ACC performers Adam Podlesh and Dan Ennis have completed their eligibility and will have to be replaced. No one on the roster has punted or place-kicked during a collegiate game.

OFFENSE

Quarterback

The Terps have some big shoes to fill at quarterback where two-year starter Sam Hollenbach ended a solid career last season. Hollenbach was the unquestioned leader of the offense, directing the Terps to nine victories, including a flawless performance in the Champs Sports Bowl victory. He became one of just four quarterbacks in school history to toss for over 5,000 career yards.

But Friedgen, who is also in his second year as offensive coordinator, has plenty of capable replacements where six quarterbacks will vie for time under center this spring.

Jordan Steffy, the backup last season, enters the spring as the starter. He is the only signal-caller on the roster to take snaps under center at Maryland. Steffy has played sparingly in his career, but has the necessary skills to be productive in Friedgen's system.

"Jordan has matured tremendously since he came here as far as watching tape and going through the playbook," Friedgen said. "I see a whole different person right now." Steffy played in just one game last season, but saw action in six contests in 2004 as a true freshman. That experience gives him a leg up heading into the spring.

"It was disappointing that he wasn't able to play more last year because every game was so close," Friedgen said. "But I did see he really improved in practice and he did some good things, whether he can transfer that to the field is what we have to find out this spring. Just from an experience standpoint of running our offense, he's ahead of the other quarterbacks."

Sophomores **Josh Portis** and **Chris Turner**, as well as redshirt freshman **Jeremy Ricker**, will be battling for time behind Steffy.

Portis sat out last season after transferring from the University of Florida, but was a highly sought-after recruit two years ago. He possesses a strong arm with the ability to move around the pocket. He played sparingly at UF as a true freshman in 2005.

"Josh has tremendous tools but what people just don't understand is that it takes a while to learn how to play quarterback, especially in our system, or any system," Friedgen said.

Portis didn't see many reps last season, as he spent most of the fall as a scout-team quarterback.

Turner, a dropback passer, enters the spring No. 2 on the depth chart buoyed by the fact that he has spent two years in the system. He was one of the top quarterbacks in the country coming out of high school in 2004.

Ricker is another highly-recruited signal-caller. The Hummelstown, Pa., native was the ninth-ranked quarterback in the country by Scouts, Inc. as a high school senior.

Also in the mix for time under center are junior **Bobby Sheahin** and freshman **Jamarr Robinson**.

Sheahin transferred from West Virginia two years ago and Robinson is a true freshman who signed with the Terps last spring, but enrolled in school this semester. Sheahin is a pocket-passer, while Robinson is a threat with his arm and legs.

Running Back

This is among the deepest and most talented positions on the roster, as the Terps possess one of the most dynamic backfield combinations in the country.

Seniors **Lance Ball** and **Keon Lattimore** have only scratched the surface of their potential. This duo combined for over 1,500 yards on the ground last season and will be looking for more in 2007 when each should vie for All-ACC honors.

Ball racked up a team-high 815 rushing yards in 2006, but Lattimore was not far behind with 743. Ball ranked seventh in the ACC in rushing (62.7 yards per game) last year and

posted eight touchdowns on the ground. He started 11 of the 13 games, but had just 14 more carries than his counterpart.

Both can also catch the ball out of the backfield, though Lattimore was used more in that role, totaling 20 receptions to rank fifth on the team.

"We know what Lance and Keon can do," Friedgen said. "We'll give them enough reps this spring to keep them sharp, but we need to find out about the other guys."

Redshirt freshmen **Da'Rel Scott** and **Morgan Green** are sitting behind Ball and Lattimore at tailback.

This younger, talented duo comes into the season with a solid prep pedigree. Green was ranked among the top 20 tailbacks in the

nation coming out of high school by Rivals.com, while Scott was listed among top 25 athletes in the country by the same organization.

"We need to find out about both of these guys in the spring," Friedgen.

Another redshirt freshman, **David Akatu** will add depth behind Green and Scott.

Sophomore fullback **Cory Jackson** took full advantage of his opportunity last season and enters the spring as the lead blocker for Ball and Lattimore. Jackson saw extensive action in the second half of last season, subbing for an injured Tim Cesa, who will not return to the team this season.

Jackson proved to be a capable blocker as the Terps had two of their highest rushing totals (194 vs. Wake Forest and 206 vs. Purdue) in the final two games of the season. He also showed good hands, catching four passes as the outlet receiver.

Depth is a concern at this position as Jackson was the only fullback on the roster at the end of last season. Sophomore **Steve Pfister** moved from linebacker over the winter and enters the spring No. 2 on the depth chart.

"Steve gives great effort," Friedgen said. "He's been behind a number of guys at linebacker. He's someone we think can help us at fullback."

Wide Receiver

After a somewhat inconsistent 2006 season, the receiving corps, led by returning starters **Darius Heyward-Bey** and **Isaiah Williams**, has a chance to be one of the top units on the team as both returning starters are back with more experience and game-breaking ability.

Heyward-Bey, one of the most explosive players on the team, is coming off a freshman All-America season, while Williams showed flashes last year, ending the year with 29 catches for 379 yards, including a 65-yard effort in the regular-season finale vs. Wake Forest.

Heyward-Bey had one of the top seasons in ACC history as his 694 receiving yards were third all-time on the freshman single-season list.

Junior **Danny Oquendo** also returns to man the slot receiver position as all but one wideout who caught a pass last season is back (Drew Weatherly had one reception). He was the second-leading receiver on the team in 2006 with 396 yards and the primary punt returner.

There were certainly a number of highlights from the receiving corps in 2006, including Heyward-Bey's record-setting performance vs. Miami (two touchdowns, including a school-record 96-yard TD catch). He also hauled in three more scores and finished fifth in the conference in receiving (53.4 yards per game).

"We're pretty solid at the top, but need to find a fourth receiver," Friedgen said.

There are a number of candidates, including **Nolan Carroll**, **Emani Lee-Odai**, **Stephen Smalls**, **Adrian Cannon** and **Kevin Gresham**.

Lee-Odai is penciled in at the X position this spring, backing up Carroll, who enters as the starter with Williams sitting out the spring to rehab after off-season shoulder surgery. Lee-Odai is a tall and rangy local product who has put on about 20 pounds since arriving on campus from Anacostia High School in Washington, D.C.

A pair of veterans will back up Heyward-Bey this spring as Gresham and **Matt Goldberg**, both juniors, will have an opportunity for playing time. Neither has seen game action.

Smalls is the backup at the slot receiver. He enrolled early last year, but used 2006 as a redshirt season. Cannon is another big target. He sat out last season and enters the spring as a backup at the X position.

The spring will be a period of trial and error for many of the wideouts as the coaching staff looks to work a talented unit into the proper positions.

"We're going to move some guys around (in the spring) to see if we can get our best receivers on the field (in the fall)," Friedgen said.

Offensive Line/Tight End

The good news is the Terps return five offensive linemen who have started games in their careers, including four regulars from last season. The bad news is no one has seen any significant action behind those five players.

Center **Edwin Williams**, right guard **Andrew Crummey** and tackle **Jared Gaither** are the returning starters on the line. That duo will be joined by **Jaimie Thomas** and **Dane Randolph**, each of whom started multiple times last season. Gaither, however, will sit out the spring.

Crummey was an All-ACC choice last season at right guard, while Williams started every game at center on an offensive line which had two running backs each gain over 700 rushing yards and allowed just 19 sacks, the second-lowest total in the ACC.

Thomas started the final three games of the season at left guard as a replacement for Donnie Woods, who will not return to the team this season. After starting the first 10 games of 2006 at left guard, Woods decided to forego his final season of eligibility to pursue a career in the Army. Thomas enters the spring as the starter at left guard.

The Terps will also have to replace left tackle **Stephon Heyer**, an honorable mention All-ACC choice in 2006.

Randolph split time with Gaither at right tackle toward the end of last season so he comes into the spring with plenty of experience. Randolph will open the spring as the starter at right tackle.

"We feel good about the first team," Friedgen said. "Our offensive line at one point was a real strength and now we've lost some guys. We've got some young guys who are not even scholarship guys who are figuring in at second team."

Senior **Scott Burley** and **Jack Griffin**, who have five letters between them but saw limited action in 2006, will move into more prominent roles this season. Burley opens the spring No. 1 at left tackle, while Griffin is the backup at right tackle.

Redshirt freshman **Evan Eastburn** is listed as the backup to Thomas at left guard, while junior **Lee Oliver** is No. 2 at right guard. Neither has seen game action.

Sophomore **Phil Costa** probably has the most experience among the reserves. He played in just two games last season, but spent the spring of 2005 as the starting center with Williams out of action.

Other reserves who may figure into more prominent roles include redshirt freshmen **Paul Pinegar**, **Danny Edwards** and **Matthew Harraka**, as well as junior **Kyle Sappington**.

The Terps employ a two tight end set quite often and return starter **Joey Haynos**, as well as a host of backups. Junior **Dan Gronkowski** can't quite be considered a backup as he started nine games in 2006. Haynos, though, received the bulk of the reps and was the Terps' second-leading receiver with 37 catches for 369 yards. He went on to earn honorable mention All-ACC honors.

Senior **Jason Goode** also saw time last season and will be joined by redshirt freshman **Drew Gloster** and sophomore **Tommy Galt** as backups.

DEFENSE

Defensive Line

Maryland lost one of its three starters along the defensive line, but does return a part-time starter.

Junior **Jeremy Navarre** started 12 games at defensive end and tied for the team lead with 3 1/2 sacks. He'll be joined by tackle **Dre Moore** who started 10 games at defensive tackle.

Moore collected 47 tackles, including a team-high tying 3 1/2 sacks, and did a good job clogging up the middle.

"We should have some good competition at defensive line this spring," Cosh said. "We only lost one starter. Jeremy had a solid year, as did Dre and we need those guys to keep getting better. We do have a number of other guys who can help us."

Junior **Carlos Feliciano** will step into the defensive tackle role which was occupied by Conrad Bolston last season. Feliciano actually started seven games along the line and saw significant action all season.

Backups at the nose tackle and defensive tackle include sophomore Travis Ivey and senior **Omarr Savage**, who played in four games as a reserve last year. Junior transfer **Olegbemi Otulaja** and **Dean Muhtadi** will add depth in the middle.

Junior **Mack Frost** and sophomore **Jared Harrell** are the backups at defensive end with Frost having the most experience with 19 career games under his belt.

Linebacker

The linebacking corps likely has the most question marks among the defensive units. That's not to say there isn't talent, just a lack of playing experience.

Junior **Erin Henderson** returns to headline this unit. Henderson is coming off a season in which he recovered from a serious knee injury quite nicely. He posted a team-high 8.8 tackles per game, which ranked second in the ACC and 31st nationally.

Henderson, who missed all of 2005, claimed second-team All-ACC honors in 2006 and should be among the most feared defensive players in the league this fall.

But the other two linebacking spots are open.

"Middle linebacker is the biggest question mark as we head into the spring," Cosh said.

• All-ACC and honorable mention All-America in 2006; two-time Academic All-ACC selection; also set the single-season school record for kick return yards in 2006.

SS Marcus Wimbush Sr.-3L 5-10, 202
• Recorded 68 tackles last season; voted the team's most improved defensive Pplayer in 2006



PROSPECTUS

Junior **Chase Bullock** and redshirt freshman **Alex Wujciak** will look to replace Wesley Jefferson who graduated in January and gave up his final season of eligibility to pursue a career in law enforcement.

Bullock, who enters the spring No. 1 on the depth chart at Mike, played sparingly last season, seeing action in six games as Jefferson took most of the reps inside en route to posting 110 tackles.

Junior **Moise Fokou** enters the spring No. 2 on the depth chart at Will, behind Henderson. Fokou played in all 13 games as a reserve linebacker last season.

"Fokou has the ability to play all three of the linebacker positions," Cosh said.

Redshirt freshman **Chris Clinton** will also get a look at the Will linebacker, while veteran **Dave Philistin** is listed No. 1 on the depth chart at Sam. He'll be backed up by a pair of redshirt freshmen in Adrian Moten and Stephen Hargett.

Trey Covington is back to man the LEO, a hybrid defensive end/outside linebacker position. Covington made 11 starts a year ago, tallying 41 tackles.

Redshirt freshman **Brian Whitmore** and sophomore **Jeff Clement** are the backups at LEO. Senior **Jermaine Lemons**, who will miss the spring due to his knee injury last season, should provide depth at LEO in the fall.

Secondary

One of the Terps top defenders over the last two seasons is no longer in the secondary. Cornerback Josh Wilson was not only a productive football player, but a leader in the locker room and off the field after earning honorable mention All-America honors and the James Tatum Award as the top football-playing student-athlete in the ACC in 2006.

However, his counterpart – senior **Isaiah Gardner** – returns and should assume more of a leadership role in the secondary this season. Gardner started all 13 games at cornerback last season, finishing fifth on the team in tackles with 63. He is expected to assume his starting role again, though he will miss spring practice after off-season shoulder surgery.

The injury, however, could be a blessing as it will give the defensive staff a chance to evaluate what looks to be a deep and athletic group of defensive backs.

Juniors **Kevin Barnes** and **Richard Taylor** each enter the spring No. 1 on the depth chart at cornerback. Both Barnes and Taylor played in all 13 games last season, seeing time on special teams and in the secondary.

While Barnes and Taylor are atop the depth chart at cornerback, the jobs are far from secure as **Anthony Wiseman**, **Brandon Jackson-Mills**, **Colin Nelson** and **Pha'Terrell Washington** are among a host of players in the mix for time at cornerback.

"There's a lot of guys that have a chance to help us at cornerback," Friedgen said.

The Terps also need a replacement for steady strong safety Marcus Wimbush, who led the secondary in tackles last season with 68.

Senior **Christian Varner** will move from his free safety spot to take Wimbush's place, while junior **J.J. Justice** assumes Varner's role.

Justice played in all 13 games last season and started one game at strong safety. Sophomore **Terrell Skinner** is the backup free safety after seeing action in eight games last season.

Junior **Jeff Allen** should give the safety unit even more depth. He played in every game last season and looks poised to vie for extensive time this season.

"Jeff had a very good winter and we're looking for good things from him this year," Friedgen said.

Sophomore **Jamari McCollough** is still recovering from a knee injury, but should be at full speed in the fall. He will in the mix for time at one of the safety spots as well.

The lone coaching staff adjustment for the Terps in the off-season affected the secondary as **Kevin Lempa** was hired to oversee this group. Tim Banks left to become the defensive coordinator at Central Michigan.

Special Teams

Special teams is one of the biggest question marks for the Terps this spring, and likely heading into the fall.

Adam Podlesh was an All-ACC punter and two-time semifinalist for the Ray Guy Award. His consistency may have been his best attribute, as he became the first player in school history to earn all-league honors four times, including second-team last season.

While Podlesh is likely taking his game to the NFL, Dan Ennis was quietly one of the top place-kickers in the conference the last two seasons. He connected on 20 of 25 field goals last year, including the game winner in a pulsating 13-12 road victory over No. 19 Clemson. Ennis tied for ninth nationally in field goals per game (1.54).

Junior **Chris Roberts** and true freshman **Travis Baltz**, who entered school early this semester, will battle it out for the punting job.

"Travis is a good looking kid with long legs which should give him some leverage punting," Friedgen said. "We're anxious to see how he does, even though we had him in camp and watched him on tape."

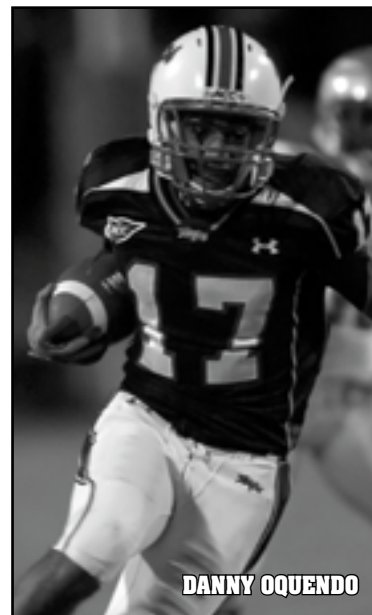
After serving as one of the kickoff specialists the last two seasons, junior **Obi Egekeze** is likely to handle the place-kicking chores. He has never attempted a kick in a game. "It's important for Obi to come through this spring," Friedgen said. "He's been around, been in games and he has all the tools. Hopefully he can give us the consistency Dan gave us."

Junior **Danny Oquendo** is back as the No. 1 punt returner. He ranked eighth in the ACC in returns last season, averaging 8.4 yards per attempt.

With the departure of Josh Wilson, who ranked 11th in the nation with 27.3 yard average, the Terps are in search of a No. 1 kickoff return specialist.

Redshirt freshman **Da'Rel Scott** enters the spring No. 1 on the depth chart, but a number of individuals will get a shot, including **Emen Ifon**, **Terrell Skinner** and **Anthony Wiseman**.

No one in that group has returned kickoffs, though Oquendo and **Nolan Carroll** each have limited experience in that capacity.

HEAD COACH RALPH FRIEDGEN

Ralph Friedgen is in his seventh year as head coach at the University of Maryland with a reputation as one of the top minds in college football. Friedgen has lifted the Terrapins to unprecedented heights in his tenure, taking the team to four bowl games, including a pair of New Year's Day appearances, and a school record three-straight bowl victories. Prior to Friedgen's arrival, Maryland had just one bowl game appearance in the previous 15 seasons.

He is the 33rd head coach in school history and ranks second in Maryland annals in career winning percentage (.676), trailing only legendary coach Jim Tatum, who is the only other mentor to lead the Terps to three 10-win seasons and multiple New Year's Day bowl appearances.

Last year Friedgen took on added responsibility, assuming the duties of the team's offensive coordinator, marking the first time he has called the plays in his head coaching tenure at Maryland. The team went on to post a 9-4 record, marking the fourth eight-win campaign in the last six seasons. The Terps culminated the season with a convincing 24-7 victory over Purdue in the Champs Sports Bowl.

A long-time successful assistant coach at Georgia Tech, where he was credited with overseeing one of the nation's most potent offensive attacks, Friedgen continues to build a new level of pride and glory to his alma mater's football program, guiding the Terps to a 50-24 record, including an Atlantic Coast Conference title and a pair of second-place finishes. Through his first five seasons, he was the second-winningest head coach in ACC history.

Not only did his 41 wins after five seasons match the mark of Terps legend Jerry Claiborne, they also fell just shy of the all-time ACC mark of 44, set by Clemson's Danny Ford in the early 1980s. In addition, in his first three seasons at the helm of the Terrapin program, Friedgen became the first coach in conference lore to lead a team to three-straight seasons of 10 wins or more, while his 36 wins in his first four years ranked him in the top 10 in NCAA history, surpassing the fourth-year marks of coaches such as Frank Leahy and Joe Paterno.

The consensus national Coach of the Year in 2001 after leading Maryland to its first ACC championship since 1985, Friedgen and company have returned Maryland to prominence on the national scene. The Terrapins have won more games (50) in the six seasons under Friedgen than they had in the 10 years prior to his arrival (37).

Long overlooked as a head-coaching candidate, the 1970 Maryland graduate was tapped as the Terps' head football coach following the 2000 season, and he wasted no time in returning the program to the glory days it achieved when Friedgen was an assistant to Bobby Ross in the 1980s.

Six years ago, in his first season as the Terps' grid boss, Maryland won its first seven games and eventually halted Florida State's reign as perennial ACC champion, earning the league's automatic berth in the Bowl Championship Series' FedEx Orange Bowl. By winning the ACC title that season, Friedgen became the first mentor in league history to win the championship in his first year as a head coach.

In 2002, despite a 1-2 start and without 19 seniors from the previous year, the Terps made their way back to a major bowl game, winning 10 of their last 11 games and finishing in a tie for second in the ACC. The 2003 campaign provided a bit of déjà vu for Friedgen and the Terrapins as they again started 1-2, and again ran off 10 wins in their final 11 games to earn a second New Year's bowl bid in three years.

By winning 11 games in 2002, Friedgen became just the second coach in school history to hit that mark, tying matching Claiborne's 11-win campaign in 1976.

The 2006 team started 3-2 before reeling off a five-game winning streak, which placed them in the midst of the ACC Atlantic Division race. The Terps lost to eventual champion Wake Forest on the final game of the regular season, but Maryland was a force in the league race throughout the year, enabling it to earn the fourth slot among ACC postseason bids and a trip to Orlando for the Champs Sports Bowl.

Friedgen's Terps have gone to bowl games in four of his six seasons, participating in the BCS Orange Bowl his first year before posting lopsided victories over Tennessee (30-3) in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl and over West Virginia (41-7) in the Toyota Gator Bowl.

His offensive success notwithstanding, Friedgen's teams at Maryland have been superb on defense, ranking among the nation's leaders annually while producing the ACC's Defensive Player of the Year in three of the last five seasons (E.J. Henderson in 2001 and 2002; D'Qwell Jackson in 2005).

Named the winner of the Frank Broyles Award as the top assistant coach in the country in 1999 while at Tech, Friedgen brought 32 years of assistant coaching experience (including 21 as an offensive coordinator either in college or the NFL) with him in his return to College Park.

The 59-year-old Friedgen (pronounced FREE-jun) owns the rare distinction of coordinating the offense for both a collegiate national champion (Georgia Tech in 1990) and a Super Bowl team (San Diego in 1994).

Friedgen spent 20 seasons with the aforementioned Ross in coaching stops at The Citadel, Maryland, Georgia Tech and the NFL's San Diego Chargers. He returned to Tech in 1997, where he served another successful stint as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under good friend George O'Leary, now the head coach at the University of Central Florida.

A 1970 graduate of Maryland, where he earned a degree in physical education, Friedgen launched his coaching career as a graduate assistant before heading off to a series of jobs that included The Citadel (1973-79), William & Mary (1980) and Murray State (1981).

In 1982, he returned to Maryland as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach under Ross, with Friedgen's tenure lasting until 1986. During that stretch, the Terps captured three consecutive ACC championships (1983-85) and played in four bowl games. All told, the Terrapins were 39-15-1 from 1982-86 and won two bowl games (the Sun Bowl in 1984 and the Cherry Bowl in 1985). It is the type of success Friedgen has reinstalled in his current group of Terrapins.

The Ross-Friedgen connection began in 1973, when Ross hired the former Maryland offensive guard as defensive line coach at The Citadel. Friedgen spent seven seasons at The Citadel, the last three as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. He then worked one season (1980) as offensive coordinator at William & Mary and one season (1981) as assistant head coach at Murray State before Ross tapped him to be his offensive coordinator at Maryland in 1982.

During his five-year stay at Maryland under Ross, Friedgen was instrumental in the development of future pro quarterbacks Boomer Esiason, Frank Reich and Stan Gelbaugh, all of whom spent at least 10 seasons in the National Football League. Esiason played professionally from 1984-97, Reich from 1985-98 and Gelbaugh from 1986-95.

Friedgen followed Ross to Georgia Tech in 1987, becoming the Yellow Jackets' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for the next five seasons, including the 1990 campaign when Tech, unranked in the preseason, captured the national championship with an 11-0-1 record. The national title came just two years after the Jackets had posted back-to-back seasons of three wins or less.

When Ross was named head coach of the San Diego Chargers in 1992, he tapped Friedgen to serve as running game coordinator for two seasons (1992-93) before elevating him to offensive coordinator in 1994, when the Chargers advanced to the Super Bowl for the first time in franchise history. During his time with the Chargers, Friedgen helped a club that had not made the playoffs in a decade reach postseason play three times in five seasons.

Known for developing balanced offensive attacks with multiple looks, Tech was one of only two teams in the country in 1999 to average at least 200 yards rushing and 200 yards passing. Tech also accomplished the feat under Friedgen's guidance in 1990, '91 and '98. The 1999 team, with Joe Hamilton at quarterback, set 59 school records, rewriting many marks established by the 1990 national championship team, which was led by another Friedgen pupil, Shawn Jones (1989-92). Friedgen was a finalist for the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach in 1998 when the Ramblin' Wreck set a then-school record with 50 touchdowns.

The first Maryland alum since Bob Ward (1967-68) to serve as the Terps' head football coach, Friedgen originally came to Maryland as a quarterback in the mid-'60s and spent most of his career as an offensive lineman, lettering in 1966 and '68 and capturing Academic All-ACC honors. He was a two-time winner of the George C. Cook Memorial Award (1968-69) for having the highest academic average on the football team.

Friedgen's coaching roots run deep. His father, also named Ralph (though not a "Sr."), was a high school coach for more than 30 years and masterminded, among other teams, the 1964 Westchester County (N.Y.) High School team that went undefeated and averaged 44





points per game running what was then an unusual multiple offense. It was an offense run by a 190-pound quarterback later recruited by Maryland who shared his name. Maybe as a sign of things to come, the younger Ralph called all of his team's offensive plays from his junior year on.

Friedgen and his wife, the former Gloria Spina, have three daughters: Kelley, Kristina and Katie. Gloria is the Coordinator of Alumni Affairs and Outreach for the College of Health and Human Performance at Maryland while both serve on that college's Board of Visitors. Kelley is in her second year as an associate at Arnold and Porter in D.C., specializing in pharmaceutical and medical device law; Kristina is in her third year in the theater program at Maryland; and Katie is her first year of college at Maryland, majoring in art.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Lance Ball ran for 86 yards and two touchdowns, Keon Lattimore had a career-high 86 yards rushing and a score, as Maryland beat William & Mary, 27-14, in the season opener for both teams.

The Terrapins had little difficulty against the Division I-AA Tribe, scoring touchdowns on two of their first three possessions in building a 24-7 halftime lead. Fifth-year senior Sam Hollenbach went 9-for-15 for 153 yards.

Ball, who led the Terrapins with 903 yards rushing last season, had 15 carries. Lattimore, a junior, ran 13 times.

William & Mary, of the Atlantic 10 Conference, got offensive production from quarterback Jake Phillips, who completed 16 of 31 passes for 127 yards, including a 9-yard touchdown to Elliott Mack in the second quarter. Maryland drove 80 yards to start the second quarter with Hollenbach throwing a 6-yard TD pass to tight end Joey Haynos. It was the first TD allowed by the Mountaineers in eight quarters.

After the teams traded field goals, Reynaud picked up his own fumble at the 4-yard line in the final minute of the half, took off up the middle and scored West Virginia's first kickoff return for a touchdown in 31 games.

The Terrapins (4-2, 1-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) trailed 20-0 before staging their comeback.

Fans who weren't streaming to the exits saw Sewell drive the Cavaliers to the Maryland 21 before his 6-yard run and three incompletions gave the ball back.

Maryland 26, NC State 20

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Maryland converted two consecutive turnovers into 14 third-quarter points, and the Terrapins held on to defeat North Carolina State.

Maryland (5-2, 2-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) led 6-0 before a fumble recovery and an interception produced two quick touchdowns and a 20-point cushion.

NC State (3-4, 2-2) used a long drive and a 65-yard punt return by Darrell Blackman to close to 23-13 with 8:18 left, but the comeback bid was blunted when Daniel Evans threw his second interception of the game.

After Dan Ennis kicked his fourth field goal for Maryland, the Wolfpack used a 1-yard touchdown run by Toney Baker to get within six points with 58 seconds left. But the Terrapins recovered the onside kick to secure the victory.

Maryland's Sam Hollenbach went 7-for-9 for 115 yards and a touchdown, and Lance Ball ran for 77 yards and a score.

The Wolfpack have been hurt by turnovers all season, and the same problem hindered their bid to beat Maryland for a third straight time. On the first play from scrimmage in the second half, NC State's Andre Brown fumbled when hit by Marcus Wimbush, who recovered at the Wolfpack 31.

After Hollenbach threw a 21-yard completion to Darius Heyward-Bey, Josh Allen scored on a 5-yard pass to make it 13-0.

On the first play after the kickoff, Evans was intercepted by Erin Henderson at the NC State 24. Hollenbach promptly ran for 20 yards, setting up a 2-yard touchdown run by Ball with 10:07 left in the third quarter.

NC State got on the board with a 14-play, 80-yard drive that ended in a 2-yard touchdown run by Brown. But the conversion was blocked, and the Terrapins padded their lead on the ensuing possession, getting a 40-yard field goal for a 23-6 lead.

Maryland backup running back Keon Lattimore had three catches for 72 yards and added 33 yards rushing in a first half dominated by the Terrapins.

Held to one first down on its opening two possessions, Maryland moved 67 yards in 10 plays before Ennis kicked a 32-yard field goal for a 3-0 lead. The key play was a 32-yard pass from Hollenbach to Lattimore.

The Terrapins started their next drive in identical fashion. This time, Lattimore took a short pass 34 yards to the Wolfpack 24. Five plays later, Ennis kicked a 27-yard field goal.

NC State got only 25 yards passing in the first half and advanced into Maryland territory only once in five possessions.

Maryland 27, Florida State 24

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Sam Hollenbach threw three touchdown passes, and Maryland held off Florida State to keep the Seminoles in the Atlantic Coast Conference cellar.

Maryland led 27-14 in the third quarter, but was not assured the win until Jeremy Navarre blocked a 46-yard field goal try by Gary Cismesia with 42 seconds left. It was the second time in three seasons that the Terrapins (6-2, 3-1) beat the Seminoles (4-4, 2-4). After the game, thousands of fans rushed the field to celebrate the win, which made the Terrapins bowl eligible.

Florida State sophomore quarterback Drew Weatherford was a late scratch with tendinitis in his right foot, ending a run of 20 successive starts. He was replaced by sophomore Xavier Lee.

The Seminoles closed to 27-24 with 8:49 left when Cismesia kicked a 24-yard field goal after Lee completed a 55-yard pass to Chris Davis. Florida State then forced a punt and took over at its own 15 with 5:30 to go.

The Seminoles got to the Maryland 16, but a sack by David Holloway and an incomplete pass preceded the ill-fated field goal try by Cismesia. A brisk wind with gusts of up to 40 mph affected with the kicking game.

On the opening drive of the third quarter, FSU Coach Bobby Bowden decided against punting into the wind on a fourth-and-1 at midfield.

Fullback Joe Surratt was stuffed by Navarre, and a personal foul against the Seminoles gave Maryland a first down on the FSU 33. On third down, Hollenbach threw a 30-yard touchdown pass to Darius Heyward-Bey.

It turned out to be the Terrapins' final score. Lee then directed an 80-yard drive, capping the march with a 17-yard touchdown pass to Davis.

Hollenbach finished 9-for-16 for 113 yards. He threw two touchdown passes in the first half to stake the Terrapins to a 20-14 lead.

Maryland took advantage of a turnover to go up 7-0 in the first quarter. After FSU receiver Greg Carr lost a fumble, Hollenbach capped a 48-yard drive with a 3-yard touchdown pass to Dan Gronkowski.

After Antone Smith scored on a 9-yard run for FSU, Dan Ennis put Maryland back in front with a field goal. The Terrapins then forced a punt, and Danny Oquendo returned the kick 35 yards, setting up a 5-yard touchdown catch by Heyward-Bey for a 17-7 lead.

A 28-yard punt gave Maryland the ball at the Florida State 49, and the Terrapins converted the fine field position into another field goal.

The Seminoles then closed to 20-14 when Carr made a leaping catch in the end zone with 53 seconds left in the half.

CLEMSON, S.C. (AP) - Dan Ennis kicked a 31-yard field goal as time ran out, lifting Maryland to its fourth straight victory, a win over No. 19 Clemson that moved the Terrapins into a tie for first place in the Atlantic Division race.

The Terps (7-2, 4-1 ACC) used the same blueprint as Virginia Tech to keep Clemson's powerful running game in check. But it looked like it wouldn't matter after Jad Dean kicked his fourth field goal with 2:25 left to put the Tigers (7-3, 4-3) ahead 12-10.

But Sam Hollenbach drove Maryland 54 yards to Clemson's 12 - converting a fourth-and-inches with his sneak - to set up Ennis' game winner.

The Terps jumped and hugged Ennis in celebration. They had a lot to be happy about - the victory keeps them in the mix to represent the league's Atlantic Division in the championship game.

Maryland came into the weekend tied in the division with No. 16 Boston College and No. 22 Wake Forest. It remained on top with Wake Forest after the Demon Deacons' win over the Eagles later Saturday night.

Maryland's chances seemed slim after the Tigers got a key call overturned by the replay booth to help them take the lead.

Clemson trailed 10-9 midway through the final period when quarterback Will Proctor had the ball ripped from his hands at the end of a run near Clemson's 10. Tailback C.J. Spiller chased the ball back to the goal line and slid into the end zone as he collected it. When Maryland linebacker David Holloway fell on Spiller, officials gave Maryland a safety.

But after a lengthy review, Spiller was ruled down on Clemson's 1.

Two plays later, Proctor completed a 71-yard pass down the middle to tight end Thomas Hunter to Maryland's 28.

Clemson appeared to put the game away when James Davis rushed for a touchdown. That play, however, was nullified by an illegal procedure call and the Tigers settled for Dean's final kick.

For the second straight week, Clemson's powerful tailback tandem of Davis and Spiller was held in check. The two combined for 332 yards on the ground to beat Georgia Tech, a victory that lifted the Tigers into the top 10. In this one, Davis had 90 yards - he had a 42-yard run early in the game - and Spiller 41.

Hollenbach led the Terps, completing 23 of 34 passes for 247 yards. He hit on 11 straight throws during one stretch, including Maryland's only touchdown play - a 7-yard scoring pass to Danny Oquendo.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Sam Hollenbach connected with Darius Heyward-Bey twice, including a school-record 96-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter, as the Maryland Terrapins outlasted the Miami Hurricanes.

The Terps (8-2, 5-1 ACC) maintained a share of first place in the ACC Atlantic Division following the win. Miami fell to 5-5, 2-4 in the conference.

With the win, Maryland became the first team in 21 seasons to defeat both the Hurricanes and the Florida State Seminoles in the same year, a feat last accomplished by the Florida Gators in 1985.

Despite only recording six first downs, the Terps staked an early 14-0 lead and the defense prevailed, with a key interception by Trey Covington on the Hurricanes' final drive. Although Miami forced a late punt, Isaiah Gardner swooped in to cause Bruce Johnson's fumble, which was recovered by J.J. Justice to seal the victory, Maryland's fifth in a row.

Hollenbach, who threw for over 200 yards for the second straight game, finished with 202 yards on 11-of-16 passing. Heyward-Bey eclipsed the century mark in receiving yards for the second time in his career, with five catches for 175 yards.

The duo connected on the Terps' then-longest play of the season, a 65-yard strike for the opening touchdown with 11:45 remaining in the first quarter. It was the first time Maryland had scored a touchdown on its opening possession since Middle Tennessee on September 9.

However, they eclipsed both the season and all-time marks with the 96-yarder down the right sideline in the second quarter. The play broke the previous record of 92 yards (Stan Levine to Ed Bolton vs. South Carolina), a mark that stood for 57 seasons. In addition, it was the longest play ever given up by the Miami defense in that school's history.

Meanwhile, the Maryland defensive effort was led by linebackers Wesley Jefferson and Erin Henderson, who notched 14 and 13 tackles, respectively. Cornerback Josh Wilson had five pass breakups in the game, including one midway through the fourth quarter which stopped a potential scoring drive for Miami.

Both teams played with great emotion following a pre-game moment of silence and tribute to Hurricanes senior defensive tackle Bryan Pata, who was shot and killed earlier this week.

BOSTON (AP) - Boston College led 14-0 in the first four minutes on Jolonn Dunbar's returns of 14 and 38 yards before Matt Ryan threw two scoring passes in a win over 21st-ranked Maryland on Saturday.

Any hopes for a comeback were dashed by two more Terrapin turnovers - a 42-yard interception return for a touchdown by DeJuan Tribble and an interception in the end zone by Jamie Silva after Maryland reached the 4-yard line early in the fourth quarter.

The loss ended Maryland's five-game winning streak.

On the second play from scrimmage, Danny Oquendo took a pitchout to the left from quarterback Sam Hollenbach and was blasted by Larry Anam. On the fifth play of the next series, Hollenbach tried a pitch to the other side with similar results. Lance Ball fumbled and Dunbar was there again, grabbing the ball and racing untouched into the end zone.

Ryan finally got in the game with 6:36 left in the first quarter and threw a 21-yard completion to Tony Gonzalez on his first play. That series ended with a missed 42-yard field goal attempt by Steve Aponavicius. Maryland scored midway through the second quarter on the first of Dan Ennis' three field goals, a 29-yarder.

Then Ryan led BC to touchdowns on a 34-yard pass to Gonzalez and a 17-yarder to Brandon Robinson for a 28-3 lead. On those two series, Ryan completed 9 of 12 passes for 140 yards.

Ennis' 37-yard field goal on the last play of the half and his 46-yarder cut the lead to 28-9. After Tribble's interception, Maryland scored its only touchdown on Josh Allen's 9-yard option pass to Oquendo.

The Terrapins had a chance to get within two scores early in the fourth quarter, but Hollenbach's pass was intercepted in the end zone by Jamie Silva.

No. 20 Wake Forest 38, Maryland 24

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Kenneth Moore ran for 165 yards and a touchdown, Kevin Harris scored twice, and freshman quarterback Riley Skinner went 10-for-13 for 125 yards and a touchdown for No. 20 Wake Forest, which became the first ACC team in history to go 6-0 on the road with a victory over Maryland.

Wake Forest handed Maryland (8-4, 5-3) its first home loss of the season. It was Wake Forest's first win in eight tries against Maryland since 1998. The Demon Deacons were 13-40-1 against the Terrapins all-time.

Wake Forest went up 28-14 with an 80-yard touchdown drive to start the second half. Moore had runs of 15 and 23 yards and Skinner went 3-for-3 for 35 yards before Harris scored from the 3.

Maryland's Keon Lattimore then accounted for all the yardage in a 49-yard drive that produced a 26-yard field goal by Dan Ennis, but the Deacons answered with a field goal to restore the 14-point cushion.

Maryland closed to 31-24 when Sam Hollenbach threw a 5-yard touchdown pass to Isaiah Williams with 12:54 left. But Wake Forest responded with a 10-play, 76-yard drive that ended with a 1-yard touchdown run by Rich Belton on a fourth-down play.

Lattimore rushed for 119 yards and a touchdown, only the third player to reach the 100-yard mark against the Demon Deacons this season. Hollenbach was 14-for-26 for 125 yards, but threw three interceptions.

Wake Forest yielded 215 yards in the first half, but benefited from turnovers in taking a 21-14 lead.

The final game of a crazy ACC regular season matched two of the league's most surprising teams in a duel for the Atlantic Division title.

Both teams scored TDs on their opening drives. Lattimore ran in from the 12 before Harris concluded a 13-play possession with a 2-yard run.

Next came an exchange of turnovers. After Riley Swanson took an interception 30 yards to the Maryland 16, an apparent touchdown run by Moore was erased by a holding call. On the next play, Skinner threw his first interception on the road. A 19-yard touchdown run by Moore made it 14-7 early in the second quarter.

The Terrapins' next two drives ended in interceptions by Alphonso Smith. After the latter turnover, Skinner threw a 49-yard TD pass to Willie Idlette for a 21-7 lead. Maryland then got a 1-yard touchdown run by Lance Ball.

Despite the loss, the Terps still posted their fourth eight-win regular-season over the last six years.

Maryland 24, Purdue 7

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) - Maryland methodically and meticulously put away Purdue - and looked nothing like the team that ended the regular season with two losses.

Sam Hollenbach passed for 223 yards and two touchdowns, Lance Ball rushed for 98 yards, and the Terrapins won the Champs Sports Bowl 24-7.

Maryland missed a chance to play for the Atlantic Coast Conference title by losing to Boston College and Wake Forest.

The Terrapins (9-4) were able to keep Purdue's offense, the NCAA's 10th best at 425 yards per game, in check by blanketing its speedy wideouts, batting down several passes - and keeping the ball away from the Boilermakers.

Keon Lattimore added 86 yards rushing on 20 carries for the Terps, who held the ball for 39:48. It hardly mattered that Dan Ennis' 22-yard field goal with 6:22 left in the third quarter was the only scoring in the second half.

Maryland milked the clock with 429 total yards and 20 first downs and Purdue did little when it had a shot.

Boilermaker quarterback Curtis Painter completed 23 of 36 passes for 264 yards, one touchdown and one interception. Maryland's offense was virtually mistake free, but Purdue (8-6) had several costly miscues.

The biggest was Dorian Bryant's fumble after a 31-yard reception that would've been Purdue's biggest play of the game on its opening drive of the second half. Purdue never got its ground game on track after falling behind early and finished with 21 yards rushing.

Darius Heyward-Bey showcased his 4.38 speed on a 46-yard second-quarter TD pass. Hollenbach appeared to overthrow him on the sideline route, but the wideout got underneath, making it 21-0.

Purdue missed its first chance to score by ending a 55-yard first quarter drive with a missed field goal. Ball ran five times for 49 yards on the next series to set up a TD. Out of the shotgun with five wideouts, Hollenbach dumped it to Joey Haynos for a 4-yard score to give Maryland a 7-0 lead.

Starting from their own 40, the Terps made it 14-0 after Hollenbach orchestrated another flawless drive. He hit Heyward-Bey over the middle for a 19-yard gain, and Danny Oquendo for 11 yards to the Purdue 4. Cory Jackson ran in from a yard out for the touchdown.

The Boilermakers got their only touchdown just before halftime. Painter led them 71 yards in 1:25, hitting Greg Orton for a 12-yard touchdown.

Maryland played its first bowl game since 2004, while Purdue returned after missing last year for the first time in Tiller's 10 seasons. It was the teams' first meeting.

2006 SEASON NOTES

QUICK HITS

- Maryland finished the season 9-4, marking the 13th time in 114 years of football the Terrapins have won at least nine games in a season. Four of those seasons have come during **Ralph Friedgen's** time as head coach. Friedgen also moved to 3-1 as a head coach in bowl games, all with the Terps.

- The Terps compiled an impressive streak in the middle of the season, starting with the come-from-behind victory at Virginia on October 14. In that game and the four following, Maryland was 5-0, with a combined victory margin of 13 points in the five games.

- After two-straight losses to close the regular season, Maryland bounced back with its 24-7 victory in the Champs Sports Bowl in Orlando, Fla, its third straight bowl win. The Terps finished the season second in the ACC Atlantic Division, narrowly missing a chance to play for the ACC Championship in Jacksonville.

- Senior **Sam Hollenbach** finished his career with his best season, as he passed for 2,371 yards and 15 touchdowns in 2006. The dual rushing attack of junior tailbacks **Keon Lattimore** and **Lance Ball** proved very effective for the Terps in 2006, as the pair rushed for over 1,500 yards and 11 touchdowns. In the receiving corps, freshman **Darius Heyward-Bey** emerged as the Terps' No. 1 threat, as the freshman All-American caught 45 passes for 694 yards and five touchdowns, all team highs. In the November 11 game against Miami, Heyward-Bey caught a 96-yard bomb, setting a new school record for longest touchdown pass.

- Prior to the Wake Forest game, Maryland honored 13 seniors who played their final season in a Terrapin uniform: **Josh Allen**, **Conrad Bolston**, **T.D. Callahan**, **Dan Ennis**, **Stephon Heyer**, **Sam Hollenbach**, **David Holloway**, **J.P. Humber**, **Adam Podlesh**, **Greg Powell**, **Drew Weatherly**, **Josh Wilson**, **Marcus Wimbush**. This group of seniors finished their career with Maryland with a four-year record of 29-19 and a five-year mark of 40-22.

MORE ON THE CHAMPS SPORTS BOWL

- Maryland now has a three-game winning streak in bowl games for the first time in school history. The previous two wins came over Tennessee 30-3 on 12/31/02 in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl and over West Virginia 41-7 on 1/1/04 in the Toyota Gator Bowl.

- Maryland scored first for the 12th time in 21 bowl games and now has a 6-4-2 record in bowl games in which it scores first. In the 2006 season, the Terps were 7-1 when denting the scoreboard first.

- In the last three bowl games, Maryland has outscored its opponents in the first half by a combined 62-10 (21-7 vs. Purdue at halftime in 2006 Champs Sports Bowl, 24-0 at halftime vs. West Virginia in 2004 Gator, 17-3 at halftime vs. Tennessee in 2002 Peach). Maryland has now outscored its last three bowl opponents by a combined 95-17.

OF DRAMA

- Maryland won five straight games (Oct. 24-Nov. 11) by a combined total of 13 points. Each game featured some fourth-quarter drama and kept Terrapin fans on the edge of their seats:

- After losing their ACC opener, 27-23, at Georgia Tech, Maryland trailed 20-0 at Virginia (10/14) when the teams broke for halftime. The Terrapins got a 56-yard TD by **Keon Lattimore** and a 45-yard interception return by **Erin Henderson** in a run of 28 unanswered points over a stretch of 6:11. Virginia pulled within 28-26 with a touchdown with 2:37 to play, but **Josh Wilson** tipped away the Cavaliers' two-point conversion attempt.

- Maryland used two turnovers by NC State to earn a 20-0 lead early on 10/21, then held on for a 28-26 Homecoming win over the Wolfpack. NC State pulled within two points with a touchdown with 58 seconds left, but the Terrapins covered an onside kick attempt to pull out the win.

- Sam Hollenbach** threw three TD passes en route to a 27-14 lead in the third quarter on 10/28 against Florida State. The Seminoles closed to within 27-24 with 8:49 left on a 24-yard field goal by Gary Cismesia. Lining up for a potential game-tying field goal from 46 yards out, DE **Jeremy Navarre** broke through the middle to block the kick and give Maryland the win.

SAM I AM

- For just the second time in the previous six years, Maryland started a season with a returning starter at the quarterback position. And though the success **Sam Hollenbach** had in the 2005 campaign is not that of Scott McBrien (the last QB to return as starter) in 2003, his experience and knowledge of Friedgen's offense was indicative of the success the Terrapins had in his senior season.

- In 2006, Hollenbach, the Champs Sports Bowl MVP, cut down on the mistakes that plagued him in 2005. He finished 203-for-328 (61.9 percent) for 2,371 yards with 15 touchdowns and 11 interceptions. His career completion percentage is third-best in school history, 61.4 percent (417-for-679).

- He finished his career at Maryland with 5,139 yards, ranking him fourth all time in passing yards behind Boomer Esiason, Scott Milanovich and Scott McBrien, the other three Terrapins to reach the 5,000 passing yards mark.

NINE TERPS NAMED ALL-ACC

- Nine Terrapins were named to the 2006 All-ACC team by the Atlantic Coast Conference Sports Media Association and the AP. Senior P **Adam Podlesh**, sophomore LB **Erin Henderson**, junior OL **Andrew Crummey**, freshman WR **Darius Heyward-Bey** were voted to the second team, while senior QB **Sam Hollenbach**, junior TE **Joey Haynos**, senior OL **Stephon Heyer**, senior CB **Josh Wilson** and senior PK **Dan Ennis** earned honorable mention. Podlesh was the lone repeat honoree for the Terps, collecting his fourth consecutive second-team selection. He became the first Terrapin in school history to secure All-ACC honors four times.
