SPRING OUTLOOK

Ralph Friedgen has done a lot for Maryland football in his time as head coach. He's taken the Terps to five bowl games in his seven years, including a school-record three straight postseason contests, won nearly 70 percent of his games and been on the sidelines to see 20 of the top 25 crowds in the history of Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium

But one thing the Maryland graduate hasn't been able to do, and that's become satisfied with last year's performance. The 2007 campaign began with promise as the Terps returned a number of key contributors from a 9-4 team which dominated its bowl game.

The Terps won their first two games last season, and despite a home loss to No. 4 West Virginia and a heart-breaking conference-opening loss to Wake Forest, were in position to compete for an ACC title after wins over No. 10 Rutgers and Georgia Tech.

However, injuries began to mount midway through the season and the Terps could not fully recover. In all, 17 members of the two-deep missed at least one game, including three along the offensive line.

But despite all the injuries, which led to four league losses by a touchdown or less, Maryland still went on post a win over No. 8 Boston College and shut out NC State in the season finale to earn a berth in the Emerald Bowl, the second straight postseason appearance for the Terps.

This season, Friedgen is hoping some adjustments will benefit the team when it opens the 2008 campaign on Aug. 30 vs. Delaware.

He surrendered his dual role of head coach and offensive coordinator, which he served the last two seasons.

He also hired three new coaches, including tight ends coach/special teams coordinator **Danny Pearman**, wide receivers coach **Lee Hull** and offensive coordinator/assistant head coach **James Franklin**, who was on staff during Friedgen's first four seasons in College Park. Franklin will also oversee the quarterbacks.

Though the Terps will now employ more of a west-coast based offense, much of what Franklin has learned offensively comes from Friedgen's influence. Franklin was also the offensive coordinator at Kansas State the last two years after spending one season with the Green Bay Packers.

"It's more terminology than anything else," Friedgen said of the adjustment with the offense. "James has a very good understanding of the west-coast offense and I think he's very excited and enthusiastic about the possibilities with the talent we have."

While the offensive philosophy will alter, there shouldn't wholesale changes to a unit which returns 23 letterwinners, including nine starters.

The Terps will have four of their five starting offensive linemen back, as well as starting QB **Chris Turner** and all of the receiving corps, headlined by All-America choice **Darrius Heyward-Bey**.

"One of the reasons I was interested in James was the knowledge he had about what we did in the past," Friedgen said. "That's an important ingredient. We want to have a flexible offense so we can take advantage of the strengths of our players. I didn't want to try to put a square peg in a round hole. From what I've seen so far in our meetings this spring. I'm convinced we have that flexibility."

Regardless of the type of offense the Terps run, they'll need to do a better job of closing games.

"We have to finish better this season," Friedgen said. "That's a big area of concern. If we finish at Wake Forest, we win that game, the same with Virginia, North Carolina and Oregon State.

"This is one of the things we emphasized to our kids in winter workouts," Friedgen said. "When it got a little tough in the fourth or fifth station of conditioning drills, I told them to raise those four fingers because we're in the fourth quarter. Our kids responded real well this off-season, I saw a lot of enthusiasm. They didn't like how we finished last season either."

The defense will go through some changes as well, but those are more personnel based as third-year coordinator **Chris Cosh** will have to replace six starters, including first-team All-ACC performers Dre Moore and Erin Henderson, and three members of the secondary.

DE **Jeremy Navarre** and LEO **Trey Covington** are two of the most experienced players on the team, having each started more than 30 career games. Navarre is expected to move inside along the line.

Despite the loss of Henderson, one of the most productive linebackers in the nation the last two seasons, the linebacker unit should be the deepest group on the defense with a number of players who have seen significant action, including **Dave Philistin** and **Moise Fokou**. Philistin was fourth in the ACC in tackles last season, and Fokou was third on the team in stops.

During the spring, health will be the biggest concern for the defense as four members of the prospective two-deep will be out to continue rehabbing from off-season surgery. **Mack Frost**, who is expected to start at defensive end, as well as Philistin, Fokou and fellow linebacker **Rick Costa** will all miss spring ball.

Friedgen has some experience on defense as 20 letterwinners return from last season's squad. There weren't quite as many injures on defense as there were on offense last year, but there were a number of players, including **Adrian Moten**, a 2007 Freshman All-America choice, who saw extended time in a reserve role due to guys being banged up.

The Terps finished 24th in the country in scoring defense and 40th in total defense last season, but there are areas to improve upon.

"We need to do a better job against the run," Friedgen said. "We got hurt a lot on the zone option last season. We want to try and become more flexible on the defensive side of the ball and keep finding ways to play to the strength of our players."

While most of the regulars are back on special teams, they'll have a new coach in Pearman, whose pedigree includes an eight-year stint on Frank Beamer's Virginia Tech staff. Beamer is well known nationally for his special teams success.

"Special teams-wise we have a new coach," Friedgen said. "It's kind of like starting all over there because Ray (Rychleski) was there for so long."

Senior **Obi Egekeze** and sophomore punter **Travis Baltz** formed a good tandem last season as first-year starters and should only improve this fall.

All the staff changes have let Friedgen to become more involved off the field.

"This has allowed me to get more involved with the players and to make sure I'm spending as much time as possible motivating them," Friedgen said. "I didn't have as much time for that the last two years.

"My major undertaking is to try and coordinate all this," Friedgen said. "I can see some of the things we are doing on offense, defense and special teams. We need to make it all cohesive. I'm pretty excited right now and looking forward to the spring to see how we put it all together on the field."

OFFENSE QUARTERBACK

Entering last spring, the Terps had limited experience at quarterback, as no one on the roster had started a collegiate game.

The situation has changed considerably with both Chris Turner and Jordan Steffy serving as the starter last season.

Turner enters the spring as the No. 1 quarterback after posting nearly 2,000 passing yards and the third-best passing efficiency rating in the ACC in 2007.

The junior replaced an injured Steffy in the Rutgers game, led the team to a victory over the 10th-ranked team in the country and went on to start the final eight games of the season.

Quarterback is no different than any other position as players continually battle to keep starting jobs. Turner is likely to have a fight on his hands to remain the starter.

"Chris ended last year as the starter and has a leg up on the competition," Franklin said.

Steffy, No. 2 on the depth chart entering the spring, started the first five games last season and was sixth in the league in passing efficiency when he went down with a concussion against the Scarlet Knights.

"Jordan's as healthy as he's been," Friedgen said of the fifth-year player. "All the quarterbacks have been working hard in the off-season. Josh (Portis) has been doing a good job as well and Chris has a confidence about him."

Each of the quarterbacks brings a different element to the field.

"Jordan is mobile, while Chris is more of a pocket passer, but he'll scramble and make 10 yards." Friedgen said.

Junior **Josh Portis** is expected to find himself in the quarterback mix after missing the last two seasons. He transferred from Florida in 2005 and sat out 2006 due to NCAA transfer rules. Portis was ruled ineligible prior to the last year's opener and missed the whole season, though he did practice with the team.

"Josh is hungry right now after being off for two years," said Franklin. "He's got freakish physical skills but needs to continue his development as a quarterback."

"I'm pleased with all three guys," Franklin said. "Chris is working very hard. He's getting bigger and stronger and moving well. He played well last year and we hope he continues to improve."

Jamarr Robinson is the only other quarterback on the roster. The redshirt freshman is No. 4 on the depth chart. He served as either the No. 2 or 3 quarterback last season.

"I've been pleasantly surprised with him," Franklin said. "He's done well in the off-season."

RUNNING BACK

When you lose two running backs who ended their careers among the all-time leading rushers in school history, chances are they'll be some questions at tailback the following season.

There's not necessarily a lack of talent, just experience and depth. Sophomores **Da'Rel Scott** and **Morgan Green**, who battled for the No. 3 tailback spot last season, are No. 1 and 2, respectively, on the depth chart this spring.

Returning players account for just 15 percent of last season's rushing yards total. Scott and Green combined to carry the ball just 17 times. Scott did show some explosiveness in a limited role last season. He averaged 18.5 yards each time he touched the ball.

Lance Ball, who finished his career No. 4 on the Maryland career rushing list, and Keon Lattimore, who was 14th on that list, carried the bulk of the load the last three years.

The Terps will have a different look this season.

"Da'Rel is a talented back," Franklin said. "He's got the ability to take it the distance. We just need to keep Da'Rel and Morgan healthy. I think we have more speed back there, but a lot less experience."

Sophomores **Dan Bonato** and **Pha'Terrell Washington** will vie for time behind Scott and Green. Bonato, who is No. 3 on the depth chart, has not played in a game, but showed an ability to make people miss during last season's scrimmages.

Washington is converted defensive back, who showed promise last season.

The Terps are in good shape at fullback where junior Cory Jackson has started since the end of his true freshman season. Jackson, one of the toughest players on the team, doesn't carry the ball nor catch it much, but is one of the best blockers in the conference and helped open holes for Ball and Lattimore the last two years.

Sophomore FB **Haroon Brown** filled in nicely last season as a true freshman. Jackson missed a game with a broken hand and Brown came in and distinguished himself well.

Redshirt freshman **Taylor Watson** will also push for time at fullback, along with senior **Steve Pfister**.

WIDE RECEIVER

Maryland has a chance to have one of the most potent wide receiving corps in the nation.

Junior All-America **Darrius Heyward-Bey** has been the leader of this group for the last two seasons. He's already pushing his way onto most of the top 10 lists in the Maryland record book, despite only two seasons in uniform.

Heyward-Bey, who has blazing speed, has almost 100 catches over the last two seasons.

He'll be joined by a slew of talented players, led by seniors **Isaiah Williams** and **Danny Oquendo**, as well as a new position coach, Lee Hull, who joined the staff in March

"We have a real fast group with five guys running under a 4.5 (in the 40-yard dash)," Friedgen said. "We need to get them to translate that to the field consistently."

Williams has tremendous physical skills, while Oquendo is the steady third-down receiver. Williams has posted nearly 800 receiving yards the last two seasons and shown the ability to stretch the field.

Oquendo has been the team's slot receiver the last two seasons, and he was missed last season after he went down with a knee injury prior to the Boston College game.

LaQuan Williams had a breakout redshirt freshman season before being shelved with a knee injury late in the year. He highlighted his skills in the upset win over No. 10 Rutgers last season, making a remarkable diving catch on third-and-12 to set up a fourth-quarter touchdown. He ended up fourth on the team in receiving yards last season.

The Terps would appear to have solid top four at wideout, with some unproven players behind that group.

"We have a really deep and talented group," Franklin said. "They all have different strengths and we want to try and put people in the right spot."

Redshirt freshman **Torrey Smith** and sophomore **Stephen Smalls** open the spring behind Isaiah Williams and LaQuan Williams at the X receiver spot, while sophomore **Emani-Lee Odai** and redshirt freshman **Quinton McCree** serve as Heyward-Bey's backup at Z receiver.

Lee-Odai, one of the fastest players on the team, saw increased action during the second half of last season.

Smith and McCree sat out last season as redshirts, but were impressive during practice with McCree making the travel squad. Smalls also did not see game action.

Adrian Cannon, who enters the spring No. 2 on the depth chart at slot receiver, also saw time as a reserve last season, playing in seven games.

Other players who will vie for time at wideout include junior **Kevin Gresham**, and freshmen **Kevin Dorsey**, **Tony Logan** and **Ronnie Tyler**.

Gresham and Dorsey are listed as reserves at Z receiver, while Logan and Tyler are backups at slot receiver.

Gresham has shown good pass-catching ability the last two years, while Logan and Tyler were both impressive on last year's scout team. Logan and Tyler are a little undersized but have excellent physical tools.

Dorsey is a highly-touted local recruit who enrolled in classes in January. He may miss some time this spring with a foot injury.

OFFENSIVE LINE/ TIGHT END

One year after this unit was decimated with injuries and forced to play some unproved players, the offensive line has a chance to be the strength of the team.

The Terps did lose an All-American in Andrew Crummey, who is off to the NFL, but four players with 66 career starts are back, as are four others who saw significant action last season.

"We've got quite a few guys who have played and done something," Franklin said. "Guys we've won with. If we could just develop some more depth, not just for this year but for the future, that would help"

There are five seniors – LT **Scott Burley**, LG **Jaimie Thomas**, C **Edwin Williams**, RG **Jack Griffin** and RT **Dane Randolph** - among the top six linemen so getting some of the younger guys ready will be critical.

Williams has the most experience among this group with 26 career starts, tops among offensive players.

However, Randolph has started 17 games at right tackle and stepped in to play some snaps at left tackle last season when Burley was saddled with nagging ankle injuries.

Burley distinguished himself well in his first season as a starter. He managed to start 12 games in 2007 despite being hampered by sprains to both ankles at various points in the season. He ended up earning all-conference honors for his play.

Thomas started just seven games at left guard, missing the second half of the season with a fractured right fibula. He was able to return and play in the Emerald Bowl.

The starting spots on the offensive line are pretty well sewn up entering the spring. The only question is whether Griffin or junior **Phil Costa** gets the nod at right quard.

Both played extensively last season and are versatile. Costa started one game at right guard for an injured Crummey and started the last six games for Thomas at left guard.

Griffin split time at right tackle with Randolph in the early portion of 2007 before taking over at right guard for Crummey after his injury.

In addition to the veterans, sophomores **Bruce Campbell** and **Paul Pinegar** played quite a bit last season. Despite being a true freshman, Campbell started one game for Burley at left tackle. Pinegar also saw time at left tackle and left guard last season.

The Terps have a number of linemen who redshirted last season including Stephen St. John, Joe Faiella, Lamar Young, Tyler Bowen and Bearthur Johnson.

All have skills, but those need to be developed.

"Bruce Campbell's development will be important this spring as will Lamar Young's and Bearthur Johnson's," Franklin said. "If we could come away with 10 guys we think we can work with in the fall after spring practice, I think we'll be in good shape."

Other veterans who are expected the push for time include Lee Oliver, Danny Edwards, Evan Eastburn, and Kyle Sappington.

Tight end should be in good hands with **Dan Gronkowski** back. He has started 17 career games, including eight last season. Gronkowski has been used mostly as a blocker, but he has good hands and can run well after the catch.

Junior **Tommy Galt** will be asked to fill a more substantial role this year. He was used as the third tight end in running formations last season.

Sophomore **Drew Gloster** served as a backup at H-back last season and will assume the No. 1 spot in the spring.

"For Tommy and Drew it's their time," Franklin said. "They need to find a role."

Others expected to vie for time at those positions include Lansford Watson, Devonte Campbell and Matt Furstenberg. Watson redshirted last season, while Campbell and Furstenberg are true freshmen who entered school in January.

DEFENSEDEFENSIVE LINE

The Terps have some holes to fill along the defensive line with Dre Moore and Carlos Feliciano, a duo which started 46 career games having graduated and in the process of pursuing pro careers.

"We're a little untested up front," Cosh said. "This is a group where someone will have to emerge, especially inside."

Senior defensive end **Jeremy Navarre** is the most experienced returnee, having started a team-high 35 career games. He is the Terps' active career leader in tackles for loss (18.0) and sacks (9.0).

Navarre will slide inside to tackle this spring, a post he manned quite a bit last season. Quite often **Mack Frost** entered the game at defensive end with Navarre bumping inside to tackle, especially on pass-rushing downs.

Junior **Travis Ivey**, a good-sized run-stuffer, is atop the depth chart at nose tackle. He's a veteran guy who played mostly in goal-line situations last season, though spelled Feliciano and Moore at times.

Frost is expected to step into Navarre's role at end, but he will miss the spring while recovering from off-season knee surgery.

Junior **Jared Harrell** and sophomore **Brian Whitmore** are No. 1 and No. 2, respectively, on the depth chart at end entering the spring. Neither has seen much time, but both are strong, athletic players who could contribute come the fall.

There's also a group of veterans who hope to make an impact at one of the tackle spots.

Seniors **Dean Muhtadi** and **Olugbemi Otulaja**, along with junior **Deege Galt**, look to provide some depth on the interior of the line. Muhtadi and Otulaja saw limited time last season, but were effective when they were on the field.

Some of the youngsters will get a chance to see time. **Dion Armstrong** and **Ian Davidson** both redshirted in 2007, their first season in College Park and were highly recruited coming out of high school.

Carl Russell is a true freshman who signed in 2007, but did not matriculate until this semester. He's penciled in as a backup at defensive end.

Senior **Trey Covington** is manning the LEO position, a hybrid defensive end/linebacker spot, for the fourth-consecutive year. Covington provides a veteran presence and a pass rusher off the edge. He played very well in last year's Emerald Bowl, posting nine tackles, including a career-high two sacks.

Covington will be backed up by redshirt freshman **Derek Drummond** and junior **Jeff Clement**, who has been mostly a special teams contributor in his career, but played some at LEO last season.

"Drummond is a big, long guy," Cosh said. "We're hoping he can help us at this spot."

LINEBACKER

Despite losing one of the most productive linebackers in school history, this position may turn out to be the defense's deepest.

Erin Henderson led the team in tackles the last two seasons from his Will linebacker spot. He was a two-time All-ACC choice and earned All-America honors in 2007, following in the footsteps of his brother, E.J.

But seniors **Dave Philistin** and **Moise Fokou** were two of the top linebackers in the ACC last season when they started all 13 games. In addition, **Adrian Moten** was one of the top freshman defenders in the league a year ago.

Philistin ranked fourth in the ACC in tackles (9.5 pg) as the Mike linebacker and Fokou was 20th (6.4 pg) from his Sam LB position. Moten, who played all three linebacker positions, tied for the team lead in sacks (5.5) and tallied 50 tackles despite not starting a game.

However, off-season surgery to Philistin, Fokou, and **Rick Costa** will keep them out of spring practice. With that trio shelved, some others will get a longer look.

Moten opens the spring No. 1 on the depth chart at Sam linebacker. He'll be backed up by **Dominique Herald** and **Femi Akinwande**, both of whom were moved from safety to linebacker this spring.





"Dominique is a little undersized, but we're trying to get some more speed on the field," Cosh said.

Sophomore **Alex Wujciak** enters the spring No. 1 on the depth chart at Mike linebacker. Last summer Wujciak looked like a player who was going to be an integral part of the defense. But a knee injury near the end of preseason camp derailed his year before it even got started.

"Alex is a guy who can affect tempo and effort," Cosh said. "He likes to play the game and that's infectious."

Redshirt freshman **Ben Pooler**, who nearly played last season, opens the spring as Wujciak's backup. Senior Alex Schulz will provide some depth in the middle.

LB Moise Fokou Sr.-2V 6-2, 225

 Former walk-on who had breakout season in 2007 with 84 tackles; special-teams standout who led Terps with 17 stops in coverage.

CB Kevin Barnes Sr.-3V 6-1, 188

 An All-ACC candidate who enters spring as No. 1 corner; led Terps with four interceptions as a junior, 2nd on team with nine pass breakups.

T Dre Moore Sr.-4V 6-4, 311

 First team All-ACC as a senior; 2nd on team with 8.5 tackles for loss and led Terps with six sacks; 10.5 career sacks; ranked among top NFL Draft prospects at DT.

DT Carlos Feliciano Sr.-4V 6-5, 315

 Played in 41 career games, including 20 starts; finished with 42 tackles as a senior.

LB Erin Henderson Jr.-2V 6-3, 236

 One of the top linebackers in the nation who was a Butkus Award semifinalist as a junior; led the ACC and ranked ninth in the nation in tackles per game (11.08); a third team All-American and first team All-ACC selection by Rivals.com.

CB Isaiah Gardner Sr.-3V 5-11, 197

 Started his final 27 games at cornerback; tallied over 130 tackles as a junior and senior.

SS Christian Varner Sr.-4V 5-11, 205

 Played in all 48 games over his final four years; his 35 consecutive starts were the most on the team; had 165 career tackles.

FS J.J. Justice Sr.-4V 6-2, 222

 Played in every game since the start of his freshman year (2004); fourth on the team in tackles (76) last year, including the most among defensive backs. After an injury-plagued season, senior **Chase Bullock** opens the spring No. 1 on the depth chart at Will linebacker. Bullock was near the top of the depth chart at Mike LB entering last season, but hurt both his ankles early in the year and played sparingly the rest of the way.

Sophomore Chris Clinton and freshman Demetrious Hartsfield are the backups to Bullock at Will. Clinton has seen limited time, but he has the size and athleticism to provide a spark. Hartsfield, meanwhile, is a speedy true freshman who entered school this semester.

"We think our linebackers will give us some toughness on defense," Cosh said. "We also need to find some leaders on defense and hopefully there are a few guys from this group we can look to."

SECONDARY

The Terps have a few holes in the secondary this season where second-year coach **Kevin Lempa** will have to replace three starters.

Senior cornerback **Kevin Barnes**, who had a team-high four interceptions and ranked tied for fifth in the ACC in passes defended, is lone returning starter in the secondary.

Juniors **Anthony Wiseman** and **Nolan Carroll** will battle it out for the starting spot opposite Barnes.

Wiseman was the third corner for most of last season, though Carroll saw extended time later in the year at cornerback. Both have good speed and athleticism.

Senior **Richard Taylor** is No. 2 on the depth chart behind Barnes. Taylor was in the mix for a starting spot last season before injuring his knee in the spring and never getting on the field in the fall.

Others who will vie for time at corner include **Brandon Jackson-Mills**, **Michael Carter** and **Trenton Hughes**.

Cosh singled out Carter as someone who was impressive in winter workouts.

There will be two new starting safeties with J.J. Justice and Christian Varner completing their eligibility.

Senior **Jeff Allen** in penciled in this spring as the No. 1 strong safety and junior **Terrell Skinner** is No. 1 at free safety.

Allen and Skinner saw time in the defensive backfield last season, but have seen most of their action on special teams.

Allen is sure tackler, while Skinner is a big, athletic former

"Skinner got better and better last season," Cosh said. "We're looking for a big spring from him."

Sophomore **Antwine Perez** sat out last season after transferring from USC, but the Terps hope he can find his way into the mix. He enters the spring No. 2 on the depth chart at free safety.

"Perez showed he was physical on the scout team last season and demonstrated a willingness to hit," Cosh said.

Junior **Jamari McCollough**, a special teams player last season, enters the spring as Allen's backup.

Seniors **Drew Robinson** and **Jared Baum** will provide depth at each of the safety spots.

SPECIAL TEAMS

One season after overhauling the special teams unit, the Terps enter this spring with almost a full complement of starters. However, they will have a new field general as **Danny Pearman** is the new special teams coordinator, taking over for **Ray Rychleski**, who had guided the unit the last seven years.

Pearman will certainly place his stamp on a special teams unit which has been among the best in the ACC since Friedgen's arrival in 2001, but the cupboard is not bare.

Senior **Obi Egekeze** and sophomore **Travis Baltz** form one of the top kicking tandems in the ACC, while senior **Danny Oquendo** is in his third season as the punt returner and **Da'Rel Scott** is back as the kick returner.

"We feel good about where we are on special teams, but we could still have some competition at some spots," Friedgen said. "We'll have to see how it all plays out."

Egekeze had a solid junior season, his first as the starting place-kicker. He made nearly 75 percent of his kicks and was almost perfect in ACC play, nailing 13 of his 14 attempts, the best mark in the league.

Baltz, a freshman All-America choice, distinguished himself well last season, averaging 40.9 yards per punt which was seventh in the ACC. He also performed better in league play, averaging 43.1 yards per punt, the second-best mark in the ACC.

Oquendo has been a solid and steady contributor as the punt returner. He'll most likely slide back into that spot in the fall, though **Anthony Wiseman** saw time there last season after Oquendo missed the last four games with a knee injury.

Scott, a 2007 freshman All-ACC pick, showed play-making ability returning kicks last season. He nearly broke a couple for scores and had a 60-yarder vs. Florida State. His 566 return yards were the most ever for a Maryland freshman. He is No. 1 on the depth chart at tailback, so whether Scott remains the kick returner remains to be seen.

The Terps will have to replace holder Matt Goldberg and short-snapper (FGs/PATs) Brendan McDermond, both of whom graduated.

Senior **Andrew Schmitt** returns as the team's long-snapper (punts). Schmitt has snapped the last three seasons and Baltz is just the team's third punter in the last nine years. The Terps have put together quite an impressive run in terms of blocks, or lack thereof.

Maryland has not had a punt blocked in the last 98 games (third game of the 1999 season), the longest streak in the nation.

HEAD COACH RALPH FRIEDGEN

Ralph Friedgen is in his eighth year as head coach at the University of Maryland with a reputation as one of the top offensive minds in college football.

Friedgen has lifted the Terrapins to unprecedented heights in his tenure, taking the team to five bowl games, including a pair of New Year's Day appearances, and a school record three straight bowl victories. Prior to Friedgen's arrival, Maryland had just one bowl game appearance in the previous 15 seasons.

He is the 33rd head coach in school history and ranks fourth in Maryland annals in career winning percentage (.676). His 56 wins are also the third most of any Atlantic Coast Conference head coach through seven years.

After spending the last two years as head coach and offensive coordinator, Friedgen relinquished that difficult dual role after the 2007 season.

In his first season as offensive coordinator since becoming head coach, he directed the team to a 9-4 record, marking the fourth nine-win campaign in the previous six seasons and 13th in school history. The Terps culminated the 2006 season with a convincing 24-7 victory over Purdue in the Champs Sports Bowl.

Friedgen led the team to another bowl appearance last season despite having to persevere through numerous injuries as only three offensive players started all 13 games. In all there were 17 members of the two-deep which missed at least one game.

In spite of the injuries, Friedgen had the Terps at their best against the toughest competition as Maryland defeated a pair of top 10 teams in 2007. In 115 years of football, the Terps had never defeated two top-10 teams in the same season.

The wins over No. 10 Rutgers and No. 8 Boston College put the Terps among elite company nationally as well. Maryland was one of only four teams in the country (also LSU, Kentucky and Illinois) to defeat two top-10 teams during the 2007 campaign.

A long-time successful assistant coach at Georgia Tech, where he was credited with overseeing one of the nation's most potent offensive attacks, Friedgen continues to build a new level of pride and glory to his alma mater's football program, guiding the Terps to a 56-31 record, including an ACC title and a pair of second-place finishes in his first seven years.

Not only were his 50 wins after six seasons more than those of Terps legend Jerry Claiborne, they also fall just shy of the all-time ACC mark of 51, set by Clemson's Danny Ford in the early 1980s. In addition, in his first three seasons at the helm of the Terrapin program, Friedgen became the first coach in conference lore to lead a team to three-straight

seasons of 10 wins or more, while his 36 wins in his first four years ranked him in the top 10 in NCAA history, surpassing the fourth-year marks of coaches such as Frank Leahy and Joe Paterno.

The consensus national coach of the year in 2001 after leading Maryland to its first ACC championship since 1985, Friedgen and company have returned Maryland to prominence on the national scene. The Terrapins have won more games (56) in the seven seasons under Friedgen than they had in the 14 years prior to his arrival (55).

Long overlooked as a head-coaching candidate, the 1970 Maryland graduate was tapped as the Terps' head football coach following the 2000 season, and he wasted no time in returning the program to the glory days it achieved when Friedgen was an assistant to Bobby Ross in the 1980s.

Seven years ago, in his first season as the Terps' grid boss, Maryland won its first seven games and eventually halted Florida State's reign as perennial ACC champion, earning the league's automatic berth in the Bowl Championship Series' FedEx Orange Bowl. By winning the ACC title that season, Friedgen became the first mentor in league history to win the championship in his first year as a head coach.

In 2002, despite a 1-2 start and without 19 seniors from the previous year, the Terps made their way back to a major bowl game, winning 10 of their last 11 games and finishing in a tie for second in the ACC. The 2003 campaign provided a bit of déjà vu for Friedgen and the Terrapins as they again started 1-2, and again ran off 10 wins in their final 11 games to earn a second New Year's bowl bid in three years.

By winning 11 games in 2002, Friedgen became just the second coach in school history to hit that mark, tying matching Claiborne's 11-win campaign in 1976.

The 2006 team started 3-2 before reeling off a five-game winning streak, which placed them in the midst of the ACC Atlantic Division race. The Terps lost to eventual champion Wake Forest on the final game of the regular season, but Maryland was a force in the league race throughout the year, enabling it to earn the fourth slot among ACC postseason bids and a trip to Orlando for the Champs Sports Bowl.

Friedgen's Terps have gone to bowl games in five of his seven seasons, participating in the BCS Orange Bowl his first year before posting lopsided victories over Tennessee (30-3) in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl and over West Virginia (41-7) in the Toyota Gator Bowl. In all, Maryland has out-scored its last four bowl opponents, 109-38.

His offensive success notwithstanding, Friedgen's teams at Maryland have been solid on defense, ranking among the nation's leaders annually while producing the ACC's Defensive Player of the Year in three of the last seven seasons (E.J. Henderson in 2001 and 2002; D'Qwell Jackson in 2005).

Named the winner of the Frank Broyles Award as the top assistant coach in the country in 1999 while at Tech, Friedgen brought 32 years of assistant coaching experience (including 21 as an offensive coordinator either in college or the NFL) with him in his return to College Park.

The 60-year-old Friedgen (pronounced FREE-jun) owns the rare distinction of coordinating the offense for both a

collegiate national champion (Georgia Tech in 1990) and a Super Bowl team (San Diego in 1994).

Friedgen spent 20 seasons with the aforementioned Ross in coaching stops at The Citadel, Maryland, Georgia Tech and the NFL's San Diego Chargers. He returned to Tech in 1997, where he served another successful stint as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under good friend George O'Leary, now the head coach at the University of Central Florida.

A 1970 graduate of Maryland, where he earned a degree in physical education, Friedgen launched his coaching career as a graduate assistant before heading off to a series of jobs that included The Citadel (1973-79), William & Mary (1980) and Murray State (1981).

In 1982, he returned to Maryland as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach under Ross, with Friedgen's tenure lasting until 1986. During that stretch, the Terps captured three consecutive ACC championships (1983-85) and played in four bowl games. All told, the Terrapins were 39-15-1 from 1982-86 and won two bowl games (the Sun Bowl in 1984 and the Cherry Bowl in 1985). It is the type of success Friedgen has reinstilled in his current group of Terrapins.


The Ross-Friedgen connection began in 1973, when Ross hired the former Maryland offensive guard as defensive line coach at The Citadel. Friedgen spent seven seasons at The Citadel, the last three as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. He then worked one season (1980) as offensive coordinator at William & Mary and one season (1981) as assistant head coach at Murray State before Ross tapped him to be his offensive coordinator at Maryland in 1982.

During his five-year stay at Maryland under Ross, Friedgen was instrumental in the development of future pro quarter-backs Boomer Esiason, Frank Reich and Stan Gelbaugh, all of whom spent at least 10 seasons in the National Football League. Esiason played professionally from 1984-97, Reich from 1985-98 and Gelbaugh from 1986-95.

Friedgen followed Ross to Georgia Tech in 1987, becoming the Yellow Jackets' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for the next five seasons, including the 1990 campaign when Tech, unranked in the preseason, captured the national championship with an 11-0-1 record. The national title came just two years after the Jackets had posted back-to-back seasons of three wins or less.

When Ross was named head coach of the San Diego Chargers in 1992, he tapped Friedgen to serve as running game coordinator for two seasons (1992-93) before elevating him to offensive coordinator in 1994, when the Chargers advanced to the Super Bowl for the first time in franchise history. During his time with the Chargers, Friedgen helped a club that had not made the playoffs in a decade reach postseason play three times in five seasons.

Known for developing balanced offensive attacks with multiple looks, Tech was one of only two teams in the country in 1999 to average at least 200 yards rushing and 200 yards passing. Tech also accomplished the feat under Friedgen's guidance in 1990, '91 and '98. The 1999 team, with Joe Hamilton at quarterback, set 59 school records, rewriting



many marks established by the 1990 national championship team, which was led by another Friedgen pupil, Shawn Jones (1989-92). Friedgen was a finalist for the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach in 1998 when the Ramblin' Wreck set a then-school record with 50 touchdowns.

The first Maryland alum since Bob Ward (1967-68) to serve as the Terps' head football coach, Friedgen originally came to Maryland as a guarterback in the mid-'60s and spent most of his career as an offensive lineman, lettering in 1966 and '68 and capturing Academic All-ACC honors. He was a two-time winner of the George C. Cook Memorial Award (1968-69) for having the highest academic average on the football team.

Friedgen's coaching roots run deep. His father, also named Ralph (though not a "Sr."), was a high school coach for more than 30 years and masterminded, among other teams, the 1964 Westchester County (N.Y.) High School team that went undefeated and averaged 44 points per game running what was then an unusual multiple offense. It was an offense run by a 190-pound quarterback later recruited by Maryland who shared his name. Maybe as a sign of things to come, the younger Ralph called all of his team's offensive plays from his junior year on.

Friedgen and his wife, the former Gloria Spina, have three daughters: Kelley, Kristina and Katie. Gloria is the Coordinator of Alumni Affairs and Outreach for the College of Health and Human Performance at Maryland while both serve on that college's Board of Visitors. Kelley is in her third year as an associate at Arnold and Porter in D.C., specializing in pharmaceutical and medical device law; Kristina is in her fourth year in the theater program at Maryland; and Katie is her second year of college at Maryland, majoring in art.

Friedgen was honored for his dedication to his family in June of 2007 when he named father of the year by the Washington D.C. Father's Day Council.

2008 RECRUITING CLASS

The University of Maryland football program signed 18 student-athletes to National Letters of Intent for the 2008 season, Coach **Ralph Friedgen** announced Feb. 6, the first day of the national signing period.

The class is highlighted by five All-Americans, 16 studentathletes ranked among the top 100 nationally at their position and 13 who received all-state honors during their career.

In addition, seven of the signees were labeled four-star recruits by Rivals.com.

The Terps kept quite a bit of local talent at home, as nine members of the class hail from the state of Maryland or Washington, D.C.

"This is a great class in terms of size, speed and athleticism," Friedgen said. "It's also, by far, the best class academically we're had to date."

WR Kerry Boykins (Chesapeake, Va.), WR Kevin Dorsey (Forestville, Md.) and Gary Douglas (Durham, N.C.) were each PrepStar All-Americans, while TE Devonte Campbell (Forestville, Md.) and WR Kenny TAte (Forestville, Md.) were SuperPrep All-Americans. All five were also named all-state.

Other all-state honorees included DL Cody Blue (Columbia, Md.), DB Cameron Chism (Forestville, Md.), LB Eteyan Edet (Fort Washington, Md.), TE MAtt Fur-

stenberg (Flemington, N.J.), LB Demetrius Hartsfield (Raleigh, N.C), DL Masengo Kabongo (Stratford, Conn.), DL Zach Kerr (Gaithersburg, Md.) and OL Justin Lewis (Johnsonville, S.C.).

Of the 16 signees ranking in the top 100 at their positions by various outlets, seven were ranked among the top 25.

Campbell was 12th among tight ends by Scouts, Inc. coming out of high school, and No. 9 nationally among prep players. He attended Hargrave Military Academy last fall.

Each of the three Terps' wide-receiver signees were ranked among the top 25 in the nation at their position by various outlets.

Tate was No. 16 nationally among receivers by Scout. com and was the top-rated recruit in the state of Maryland by that outlet. In fact, according to Scout.com, the Terps landed two of the top three recruits in the state of Maryland. They also signed four of the top 11 recruits in the state, according to Rivals.com.

Boykins was another highly regarded wideout. He was ranked No. 20 nationally among wide receivers by Scouts, Inc., and the eighth-best prospect in the state of Virginia by Rivals.com.

Dorsey was the third-best product in the state of Maryland and ranked No. 25 nationally among wideouts

by Scout.com.

Kabongo, one of four defensive-line recruits, was ranked 15th nationally among defensive tackles by Scouts, Inc. He was also the second-ranked player in the state of Connecticut by Rivals.com.

The signees hail from eight states, including Maryland/ Washington D.C. (9), Virginia (2), North Carolina (2), Connecticut (1), Georgia (1), New Jersey (1), Pennsylvania (1) and South Carolina (1).

Nationally, the Terps ranked high among their peers at three positions. Rivals.com has Maryland's tight end crop ranked No. 4 in the country. The Terps also produced the ninth-best wide receiver class and sixth-best defensive tackle group.

The rest of the class includes QB **Tyler Bass** (Atlanta, Ga.), OL **R.J. Dill** (Camp Hill, Pa.), DL **A.J. Francis** (Severn, Md.), OL **Justin Gilbert** (Richmond, Va.) and RB **Davin Meggett** (Clinton, Md.).

Four members of the recruiting class - Campbell, Dorsey, Furstenberg, and Hartsfield - have completed their high school curriculum and have enrolled in classes for the spring semester. They will be eligible for spring ball and have four years of eligibility remaining beginning in the fall.

A pair of defensive linemen - Carl Russell (Washington, D.C.) and Joe Vellano (Rexford, N.Y.) - are also recent additions to the roster, though not included among the 18 signees.

Russell and Vellano signed with the Terps last season and enrolled in classes last month. They will also be eligible for spring practice and have four years of eligibility beginning in the fall.

Russell is another local product. He was a standout two-way lineman at H.D. Woodson High School. He earned honorable mention All-Met honors as an offensive lineman in 2006 and was a Pigskin Club All-Metropolitan choice as a senior defensive lineman. Vellano was a second-team all-state defensive tackle in 2006.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) -- Keon Lattimore ran for 106 yards and three touchdowns, Jordan Steffy played exceptionally well in his first start as Maryland's quarterback, and the Terrapins wore down Villanova in a 31-14 victory.

Lattimore also caught six passes for 33 yards. The senior averaged 5 yards on his 21 carries and moved over 1,000 yards rushing for his

Steffy did a fine job running the offense, going 19-for-24 for 174 yards and running for 47 yards and a touchdown.

Up 10-7, the Terrapins opened the third quarter with an 11-play, 66-yard touchdown drive. Five plays after Steffy ran for 2 yards on a fourth-and-1 from the Villanova 42. Lattimore scored on a 14-vard run.

On Maryland's next possession, Steffy left with a leg cramp in the middle of a 57-yard touchdown drive that Lattimore concluded with an 18-yard run for a 24-7 lead.

Then, after a Maryland interception, Steffy moved the Terrapins 87 yards and scored on a 10-yard TD run with 12:46 left.

That ended a night Steffy had been waiting for since he arrived at Maryland as a freshman in 2004. Before facing the Wildcats, the redshirt junior had thrown only 37 passes and had gone two years since

Steffy's play against Villanova belied his inexperience. First, he moved the Terrapins 46 yards for a field goal. Then he directed a 90yard march in which he passed for 28 yards and ran for 22. The drive ended with Lattimore dragging two tacklers into the end zone on a 12-

The Wildcats then moved 84 yards on eight plays, closing to 10-7 on Antwon Young's first career touchdown pass, a 26-yarder to Matthew Sherry

Young went 17-for-28 for 176 yards in his first college start. The Wildcats finished with 11 yards rushing on 22 carries.

Villanova got a touchdown with 54 seconds left when Salim Koroma picked off a Turner pass and took it 42 yards to the end zone.

MIAMI (AP) -- Keon Lattimore ran for 111 yards and two early touchdowns, and Maryland held off pesky Florida International 26-10.

Jordan Steffy completed 18 of 25 passes for 135 yards and Lance Ball had a 1-yard scoring run with 53 seconds left to seal the win for Maryland, now 2-0 for the fourth time in Ralph Friedgen's seven seasons

Moses Hinton caught a 49-yard TD pass from Wayne Younger for Florida International (0-2), losers of 14 straight games -- the secondlongest current drought in major college football behind Duke.

FIU put a major scare into Maryland last season, losing 14-10 when the Terrapins intercepted a pass near the goal line on the game's final play. This one wasn't easy for the Terps, either -- who scored 10 fourthquarter points off a pair of FIU turnovers.

Lattimore is the brother of Baltimore Ravens linebacker Ray Lewis, who starred at Miami before entering the NFL. Lattimore has fond memories of seeing Lewis play at the Orange Bowl, the Hurricanes' home field that FIU is using this season while its own stadium is remodeled. Now, he's got memories of his own.

Lattimore had a 42-yard run on Maryland's first play, and he scored from 1 yard out to make it 9-0. The scoring started with a safety on a botched FIU punt 26 seconds into the game.

FIU went three-and-out on its next possession and Lattimore came through again, this time with a 14-yard TD to make it 16-0 with 8:13 left in the quarter.

A big play helped FIU get back into the game.

Off play-action, Younger found Hinton down the left sideline for the first score in Mario Cristobal's era as FIU coach.

FIU got within 16-10 early in the fourth on Chris Abed's 42-yard field goal. But Lionell Singleton fumbled a punt return away deep in FIU territory with 12:27 left, setting up Obi Egekeze's 36-yard field goal that restored Maryland's nine-point lead.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Keon Lattimore rushed for 80 yards and led Maryland receivers with four catches, leading the Terrapins' offense in a 31-14 defeat to No. 4 West Virginia before 53,107 at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium.

The crowd was the fifth-largest in the history of the stadium.

Lattimore scored on a 4-yard run midway through the first quarter, marking his third straight game with a rushing touchdown.

Also for Maryland, quarterback Jordan Steffy tossed his first career touchdown pass, hitting Danny Oguendo with a 22-yarder late in the fourth period.

Steve Slaton ran for 137 yards and three touchdowns and Noel Devine amassed 125 yards on his first three carries for the Mountaineers. The freshman finished with 136 on five carries, including a 76-yard run to set up one of Slaton's touchdowns.

Maryland fumbled the snap on the first play from scrimmage, giving WVU a short field at the 20-yard line. Two plays later, White scampered in from 22 yards for the touchdown.

The Terrapins responded immediately, though, going 75 yards in 11 plays to set up Lattimore's 4-yard run that tied the game at 7-7 with 9:53 left in the first quarter.

West Virginia scored 24 unanswered points over the next two periods, turning a 14-7 halftime lead into a 31-7 advantage. The Mountaineers took control by going 63 yards in nine plays with the second-half kickoff, setting up a 1-yard score by Slaton.

Maryland finished the scoring with 5:50 left when Steffy found Oquendo. The Terrapins recovered the onside kick, but were unable to move downfield

Erin Henderson led the Maryland defense with 11 tackles, his second straight game with double figures on the defensive chart.

PISCATAWAY, N.J. (AP) - Backup quarterback Chris Turner led Maryland to 20 second-half points, Keon Lattimore rushed for 124 yards and a touchdown and the Terps ruined No. 10 Rutgers' second stay in the top 10 with a 34-24 victory

For Maryland (3-2), it was redemption. The win ended Rutgers' 10-game home winning streak and snapped a two-game Terps losing streak that included a 31-24 overtime loss to Wake Forest last week

Turner completed 14 of 20 passes for 149 yards in relief of Jordan Steffy, who left late in the first half with a concussion.

Maryland rallied despite losing a 14-3 advantage late in the first half and heading into halftime with Rutgers leading 17-14.

Turner led the rally that culminated in field goals of 26 and 37 yards from Obi Egekeze, a 2-yard TD run by Lattimore and a late 14-yard dash by Lance Ball, who rushed for 90 yards and two touchdowns.

Teel threw two touchdown passes and Ray Rice scored on a 1-yard run with 4:41 to go to cut the Maryland lead to 27-24. But the Terps defense held stout against a Scarlet Knights offense that was averaging 46 points. Rice was held to 97 yards rushing on 21 carries, including 38 yards on his last 15

The victory over a top 10 team was the first for Maryland since upsetting Florida State in 2004. The Terps outgained the Scarlet Knights 458-392 while forcing three turnovers.

Turner, who took over after Steffy was hurt on the Terps' final series of the first half, got Maryland going early in the second half. A 28-yard pass to Isaiah Williams and a penalty for roughing the passer led to Egekeze's 26-yard field goal that tied the game at 17 midway through the third quarter.

Ball broke off a 32-yard run and Turner hit Darrius Heyward-Bey for 18 to set up a go-ahead 37-yard field goal with 3:43 left in the third quarter.

Maryland's defense held Rutgers to one first down on its next two series, and Turner led Maryland on a 58-yard touchdown drive. Lattimore capped it with a 2-yard run one play after LaQuan Williams stretched out to making a diving third-down catch of a 27-yard pass.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. -- Sophomore Chris Turner threw for 337 yards and three touchdowns to lift the injury-plagued Maryland Terrapins (5-5, 2-4) to a thrilling 42-35 victory over No. 8 Boston College (8-2, 4-2) Saturday evening.

Senior tight end Jason Goode, playing in his final home game, caught two TD passes as the Terps rolled up a season-high 466 total yards

It was the most points Boston College has allowed in an Atlantic Coast Conference game since joining the league in 2005. In addition, the nation's top-ranked rushing defense (58 yards per game) surrendered a season-high 135 yards, even though Maryland was without its leading ground-gainer.

Matt Ryan, who threw three interceptions against Florida State, went 33-for-56 for 421 yards and three touchdowns, but was intercepted twice.

The Terps received a solid performance from Turner, who went 21-for-27. Knowing it would be difficult to pound the ball inside, Maryland relied heavily on the passing game, often throwing deep and spreading the Boston College defense with quick tosses to the outside.

That enabled Lance Ball to rush 32 times for 109 yards and a score. Goode had six catches, matching his total in Maryland's first nine games.

The Terrapins let a 42-21 lead dwindle to seven points when Ryan threw a 13-yard touchdown pass to Ryan Purvis with 52 seconds left, but the subsequent onside kick failed to go the required 10 yards, giving Maryland possession and the victory.

At game's end, the fans rushed the field to celebrate the Terps' second win this season over a top-10 team. Maryland beat then-No. 10 Rutgers on Sept. 29. It marked the first time in school history Maryland has defeated two top-10 teams in the same season.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. -- Preston Parker ran for 133 yards and a touchdown in his first start at tailback as Florida State (7-4, 4-4 ACC) clinched a winning season with a 24-16 victory over Maryland that gave coach Bobby Bowden his 300th career win at the school.

Parker, who had been the Seminoles' leading receiver, ran for 51 yards on his first four carries, including an 18-yard touchdown that gave the Seminoles a 14-3 lead late in the first quarter.

Drew Weatherford bounced back from a concussion to throw for 204 yards and a touchdown. He also ran for another.

Florida State took a 21-3 lead 44 seconds into the second quarter when Weatherford and De'Cody Fagg hooked up on a 10-yard touchdown nass

The Seminoles led 21-6 at the half with Maryland's points coming on a pair of field goals by Obi Egekeze, who added a third in the fourth quarter to complete the scoring.

Maryland rallied in the second half, pulling to within 21-13 midway through the third quarter when Darrius Heyward-Bey scored on a 14-yard pass from Chris Turner.

Turner completed 16 of 32 passes for 242 yards, but threw a costly interception and was sacked four times.

The Maryland defense gave the offense some opportunities. After FSU scored on its first three drives of the game, the Seminoles were forced to punt on their next eight possessions.

Obi Egekeze's field goal with 2:58 to play in the game moved the Terps to within a score, but they could not get the ball back.

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Lance Ball and Keon Lattimore rushed for two touchdowns apiece as Maryland routed North Carolina State 37-0 on Saturday.

The Terrapins (6-6, 3-5 Atlantic Coast Conference) posted their first shutout since 2004 and became bowl eligible for the fifth time in the last seven years. They scored on four straight possessions in the first half.

Chris Turner was 19-of-24 for 206 yards and had a 41-yard keeper that set up a touchdown for Maryland. The Terrapins ran for a season-high 249 yards while holding the Wolfpack to just 10 yards rushing.

The Wolfpack were shut out for the first time since a 14-0 loss to Baylor on Sept. 23, 1995, a span of 150 straight games that was longest active streak in the ACC.

The Terrapins outscored NC State 21-0 in the second quarter and using big plays to set up their three touchdowns.

Turner's keeper through the left side set up a 1-yard touchdown run by Lattimore. On the next drive, Turner's 38-yard pass to Isaiah Williams came three plays before Ball ran for a 15-yard touchdown to make it 17-0.

Da'Rel Scott then rushed 33 yards up the middle to open a possession that ended with Ball's second TD, a 2-yard burst around right end that gave the Terps a 24-0 lead with 4 minutes left before halftime. By then, some fans were headed for the exits.

Obi Egekeze kicked three field goals for Maryland.

It was a rare rout in a series that had been dominated by close games, with the previous seven meetings decided by an average of fewer than 6 points.

SAN FRANCISCO -- Chris Turner threw for 205 yards and a pair of touchdowns, including a 63-yarder to Darrius Heyward-Bey, but Oregon State used 275 yards on the ground to earn a 21-14 victory over Maryland in the 2007 Emerald Bowl played at AT&T Park.

Yvenson Bernard rushed for 177 yards and a touchdown in his final college game, leading the ground attack in a rain-soaked game.

James Rodgers rushed for 115 yards, caught an early TD pass and recovered Bernard's fumble for the second half's only score as the Beavers (9-4) won their fourth consecutive bowl game

Turner hit Isaiah Williams and Darrius Heyward-Bey with firstquarter TD passes, but the Terrapins (6-7) stalled in the second half.

Oregon State finished with seven victories in its last eight games by surviving the unique challenges of the Emerald Bowl, where both teams stand on the same sideline at the San Francisco Giants' waterfront

The game was just Maryland's second in California in the program's 115-year history, and the Terps' first meeting with a Pac-10 team since the 1982 Aloha Bowl. They didn't seem bothered by the cross country trip, and Oregon State's defense deserved the credit for Maryland's struggles in the Beavers' first game against the ACC since 1942.

Maryland opened the game with an impressive 11-play, 80-yard scoring drive capped by Williams' 9-yard TD catch. Turner went 6-of-7 on the drive, with Williams dropping his only incompletion.

Moevao was hurt on the Beavers' third play by blitzing linebacker Moise Fokou. Canfield took over and finished a TD drive, hitting Rodgers with a scoring pass before Moevao returned for the rest of the

But Turner hit Heyward-Bey in stride for a 63-yard TD pass down the sideline later in the first quarter, the second-longest scoring play in Maryland bowl history. Turner also threw two interceptions in the second quarter, and Bernard tied it at 14 with a 2-yard TD run 16 seconds before halftime.

2007 SEASON NOTES

Ouick Hits

- Despite a number of setbacks during the 2007 season, the University of Maryland football team reached its fifth bowl game in seven years and upended a pair of top 10 teams. The Terps won two of their final three regular-season games, including a dominating 37-0 win over NC State in the season finale, to reach postseason play. Maryland had its school record streak of three-straight bowl wins snapped in a 21-14 defeat at the hands of Oregon State in the Emerald Bowl in San Francisco.
- The Terps ranked 40th nationally in total defense (358.0 ypg) and 24th in scoring defense (21.5 ppg) in 2007. The Maryland defense also stepped up down the stretch. holding NC State (Nov. 24) to just 250 total yards, including 10 on the ground, and in the win over No. 8 Boston College (Nov. 10), sacked Heisman candidate Matt Ryan a seasonhigh four times and held the Eagles to 45 rushing yards. The Terps surrendered an average of 69.7 rushing yards over the last three regular-season games. The Terps had two of the top tacklers in the country in junior linebackers Erin Henderson and Dave Philistin, who ranked ninth (11.1) and 39th (9.5), respectively, in the nation in stops per game. Henderson was an All-American and a Butkus Award semifinalist, as well as earning All-ACC honors for the second straight season. Senior tackle Dre Moore, a first-team all-conference choice, had a team-high six sacks. Junior cornerback Kevin Barnes led the secondary with four of the team's 13 interceptions. He ranked tied for seventh in the ACC in interceptions per game (0.31 pg). The Terps pass defense ended the year ranked fifth in the ACC and 33rd in the nation (210.7 ypg). Barnes and senior CB Isaiah Gardner each ranked tied for seventh in the league in passes defended (0.92 pg).
- The Terps offense, which was decimated by injuries (only three players started all 13 games), came together over the last month of the year, averaging 424.3 yards during the final three regular-season games, including a season-high 472 in the upset of BC. Maryland ranked fifth in the ACC in total offense (340.9 ypg), including fifth in rushing (137.5 ypg). Seniors Lance Ball and Keon Lattimore combine to average nearly 130 rushing yards per game. Lattimore was seventh in the ACC and 86th nationally in rushing (67.1 ypg), and tallied a league-best 13 rushing TDs. Ball ended the year tied for ninth in the league in rushing (59.1 ypg). He ended his career as Maryland's fourth all-time leading rusher (2,487 yards). Despite playing behind a banged-up offensive line, sophomore Chris Turner was solid for the Terps after taking over as the starting QB in the sixth game of the year. Turner, who stepped under center for junior Jordan Steffy (injured vs. Rutgers), ranked third in the ACC is passing efficiency (135.5 rating). WR Darrius Heyward-Bey, a 2007 honorable mention All-America choice, led the Terps in receptions (48) and receiving yards (687). He posted 21 catches over the last four games of the regular season. Senior guard Andrew Crummey, one of the top linemen in the nation, missed most of the season half of the season, while junior guard Jaimie Thomas missed the final five games of the year.
- The Terps special teams distinguished itself well this despite three new starters. True freshman Travis Baltz

and junior place-kicker Obi Egekeze are both in their first seasons seeing game action. Baltz, a freshman All-ACC choice, ranked seventh in the ACC in punting average (40.9), including second (43.1) in league contests. Egekeze has hit 17 of 23 field goals, including a league-best 93 percent (13 of 14) in ACC games.

Four Terps Earn All-ACC Honors...

Four Terps earned All-ACC honors from the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association (ACSMA) and the Associated Press. On the defensive side of the ball, linebacker Erin Henderson and tackle Dre Moore were first-team selections. On offense, guard Andrew Crummey was a second-team choice for the second-straight year, while senior running back **Keon Lattimore** drew an honorable mention nod. Henderson was the leading vote-getter at linebacker after posting 122 tackles, including a team-best 11 tackles for loss. The Terps have had a first-team All-ACC linebacker in five of the last seven seasons. Moore developed into a force in the middle of the Maryland defense. He led the Terps with six sacks, the most by a Maryland player since 2004 (Shawne Merriman, 8.5). Moore is only the second Maryland defensive tackle to earn first-team All-ACC honors in the last eight seasons (also Randy Starks, 2003). Crummey, a member of this year's watch list for the Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy, earned the honor despite missing five games. Lattimore recorded career highs in rushing yards (789) and rushing touchdowns (13). No player in the conference had more rushing scores than Lattimore, who also topped the 100-yard mark four times.

Three Terps Earn Freshman **All-ACC Honors...**

Three Maryland freshmen were selected to the 2007 Sporting News Freshman All-ACC Football Team. Wide receiver LaQuan Williams, linebacker Adrian Moten and punter Travis Baltz represented the Terps on the team. The magazine chose 11 starters on each side of the ball, along with three specialists. Only one school - North Carolina with six - placed more players on the team. Georgia Tech and Duke each had three selections as well. Moten, a redshirt freshman, proved to be a versatile player seeing time as a reserve at all three linebacker spots and at defensive end in pass-rushing situations. He tied for team-high honors with 5.5 sacks. Williams switched over from defensive back prior to the start of spring workouts and made the most of his opportunity by earning a share of the starting job (seven starts). He had 15 catches for 217 yards before a knee injury shelved him for the final two regular-season games. Baltz had some big shoes to fill after he took over for four-time All-ACC performer Adam Podlesh, but the true freshman responded well. Baltz ranked seventh in the ACC and 58th in the nation with an average of 40.9 yards per punt, and elevated his game during conference play with a 43.1-yard average, second-best in the league.
