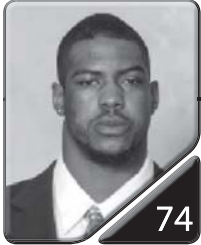

BRUCE CAMPBELL

Hargrave Military Academy)

An imposing physical specimen who has outstanding athleticism ... took over as the No. 1 left tackle midway through the 2008 season ... played in 27 career games, including 17 starts, all at left tackle ... one of the strongest players on the team during his career ... posted a bench press of 490 lbs. in spring 2009 testing, the second-highest total in school history ... surrendered his final year of eligibility to enter the 2010 NFL Draft.

As a Junior (2009): Started nine games at left tackle, but battled nagging injuries all season ... an All-ACC nominee ... suffered a turf toe injury in the season opener against California (9/5), causing him to miss the James Madison (9/12) and the MTSU games (9/19) ... returned to action against Rutgers (9/26), starting at left tackle ... injured his left knee vs. Clemson (10/3), causing him to miss the Wake Forest game (10/10) ... still graded out as the No. 2 offensive lineman vs. the Tigers ... returned from his knee injury to start against Virginia (10/17), helping the Terps post 126 rushing yards (most in four games) and allow just one sack ... graded out as the team's second-best offensive lineman vs. the Cavaliers ... part of the offensive line that helped Maryland gain a season-high 196 rushing yards and give up just one sack against Florida State (11/21) ... graded out as the top offensive lineman vs. Boston College (11/28).

As a Sophomore (2008): Played in all 13 games ... saw action as a reserve at LT in the first six contests before starting at that spot the last seven ... member of a line that enabled Da'Rel Scott (1,133) to become the seventh Terp back, and first since 2002 (Chris Downs), to gain over 1,000 rushing yards ... the line also aided Chris Turner to throw for 2,516 yards, the seventh-highest single-season total in school history ... posted the second-fastest 40-yard dash time (4.79) in school history (among offensive linemen) in spring testing ... a part of the unit that surrendered just seven sacks during the seven-game span from Sept. 20 to Nov. 15, five of which resulted in Maryland victories ... part of the unit that surrendered just one sack and helped Scott rush for a career-high 197 yards vs. Delaware (8/30) ... member of the offensive unit that scored 35 points vs. No. 23 Cal (9/13) ... part of the unit that accounted for 51 points and 486 total yards against EMU (9/20) ... graded out as the team's top offensive lineman (along with Scott Burley) and earned ACC Lineman of the Week honors for his performance against Wake Forest (10/18)

... part of the unit that helped ball carriers rack up 203 rushing yards (including 163 by Scott) vs. NC State (10/25) ... part of the unit that helped Scott and fellow RB Davin Meggett combine for 215 rushing yards and allowed just one sack in an upset of No. 17 UNC (11/15) ... helped spearhead a solid offensive attack in the win over Nevada in the Roady's Humanitarian Bowl (12/30) ... offense posted 456 total yards, including 258 rushing yards, vs. a Wolf Pack defense which entered the game ranked third nationally against the run (74.5 ypg).

As a Freshman (2007): Appeared in five games at left tackle, including one start ... started against Clemson when injuries hit the offensive line ... also played vs. Villanova, UNC, BC and FSU ... one of three true freshmen (also Haroon Brown and Dominique Herald) to play during the season.

At Hargrave Military Academy (2006): Originally signed with the Terps in 2006, but attended the Chatham, Va., school ... coached by Marty Talbert.

At Hyde Leadership School: A four-year letterwinner and three-year starter ... a *PrepStar* All-American ... four-year starter at defensive end ... started as a junior and senior at offensive tackle ... never missed a game during his career ... recorded 70 tackles, including six sacks, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery his senior season in 2005 ... had 50 tackles, including 4.5 sacks, while blocking two PATs and one punt as a junior ... team rushed for 7,400 yards his last two years ... first team all-state and New Haven-area most valuable player by the *New Haven Register* ... Class "S" all-state pick as a junior and senior ... the No. 1-ranked player in the state of Connecticut and the 17th-ranked offensive tackle nationally by *Rivals.com* as a senior ... the 19th-ranked OT in the nation by *SuperPrep* ... team went 24-0, winning two Class "S" state championships in his final two seasons ... lettered three years in basketball and in track (shot put) ... also recruited by Virginia, Nebraska and Michigan State ... coached by John Aquavita.

Personal: Born May 25, 1988 ... parents are Bruce and Rita Campbell ... father was an area high school legend in basketball who ultimately starred at Providence College in the '70s and was selected by the New Jersey Nets in the eighth round of the 1978 NBA Draft ... father is in the Providence Athletics Hall of Fame and played professional hoops overseas ... enrolled in letters and sciences.

A speedy and versatile cornerback who was expected to have an all-league senior season, but had his year cut short with a broken leg ... moved from wide receiver to the secondary prior to the 2007 season ... a solid special-teams player during his career ... played in 38 career games, including six starts ... has a vertical jump of 41.0, the third-best mark in school history among defensive backs ... invited to the 2010 NFL Combine.

As a Senior (2009): Started in two games before suffering a broken leg ... had one PBU and three tackles in the season opener against California (9/5) ... recorded a career-high tying seven tackles against James Madison (9/12) before breaking his right tibia ... missed the rest of the season ... one of four team captains and member of the Terps' leadership council.

As a Junior (2008): Played in 10 games, including four starts at cornerback ... posted a career-high 37 tackles on the season ... recorded the eighth-highest strength index (tops among DBs) on the team in spring testing ... also posted the third-best vertical jump (41.0) in school history (among DBs) ... played in the first three games then missed three due to a leg injury before returning to the starting lineup for the game against Wake Forest (10/18) ... ranked second on the team with eight PBUs ... had five tackles and a career-best two PBUs vs. MTSU (9/6) ... equaled that PBU figure and also tallied six tackles vs. Cal (9/13) ... missed the Eastern Michigan (9/20), Clemson (9/27) and Virginia (10/4) games with an ankle injury ... returned to the lineup and notched two tackles and one PBU vs. Wake Forest (10/18) ... earned his first career start vs. NC State (10/25) ... contributed a career-best seven tackles, including his first career TFL, at Virginia Tech (11/6) ... also had a career-high four solo stops vs. the Hokies ... matched career highs in tackles (seven), solo stops (four) and pass breakups (two) vs. Nevada in the Roady's Humanitarian Bowl (12/30) ... earned Iron Terp status for the first time in his career in spring testing.

As a Sophomore (2007): Played in all 13 games as a reserve cornerback and special-teams performer ... played on coverage teams and also returned kicks ... had seven special teams tackles on the season ... moved from wide receiver to CB prior to the season ... returned two kicks for 41 yards, including a career-long 23-yarder, vs. West Virginia (9/13) ... played on special teams and returned one kickoff for 17 yards vs. Rutgers (9/29) ... recorded two tackles and returned a kick for 11 yards vs. Georgia Tech (10/6) ... saw significant action at corner (15 plays in nickel packages) vs. UNC (11/3) and had a season-best three solo tackles ... had a season-high four tackles in a reserve role vs. BC (11/10) ... returned one kick for 15 yards vs. the Eagles ... made two tackles vs. NC State (11/24) before leaving the game with a hamstring injury ... did not play in the Emerald Bowl due to the injury.

As a Redshirt Freshman (2006): Played in all 13 games as a reserve wideout and on special teams ... saw action in all but one game with the special-teams unit ... did not record a catch on the season, but had five kickoff returns for 60 yards ... saw first career action in the season opener vs. William & Mary (9/2) ... played vs. West Virginia (9/14) and returned two kickoffs for 12 yards ... returned two kickoffs for 31 yards vs. BC (11/18) and saw extensive action at wideout due to injuries ... returned one kickoff for 17 yards vs. Wake Forest (11/25).

As a Freshman (2005): Redshirt season ... named offensive scout team player of the week for his work in practice leading up to the Florida State game (10/29).

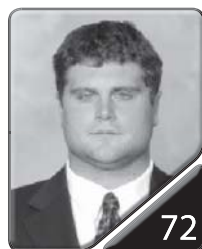

An intelligent, versatile player who was the leader of the offensive line as a senior ... a hard-nosed player with good feet ... a two-year starter ... played mostly guard until his senior season when he started at center ... one of the Terps' top reserve linemen in 2006 and 2007 ... emerged as the starting right guard as a junior ... played in 40 career games, including 30 starts (13 at RG/five at LG/12 at center) ... started the final 24 games of his career ... a two-time Academic All-ACC performer ... one of the strongest players on the team during his career ... owns the all-time record among Terps' offensive linemen in the clean (435 in 2008) and is second all-time in the vertical jump (35.5 inches in 2007) among offensive linemen ... also has the third-best strength index (748 in 2008) in school history (among offensive linemen).

As a Senior (2009): Started all 12 games at center and played nearly every snap at the position ... an All-ACC nominee ... the only senior on the offensive line ... graded out as the top offensive lineman in eight of 12 games ... part of an offensive unit that scored 38 points and gained 359 yards of total offense in the overtime win against James Madison (9/12) ... helped the offense gain a season-high 446 yards of total offense, including 158 yards rushing vs. MTSU (9/19) ... part of the line that helped Chris Turner pass for 307 yards and three TDs against Wake Forest (10/10) ... earned the top o-lineman grade vs. the Demon Deacons ... graded out as the top lineman, along with R.J. 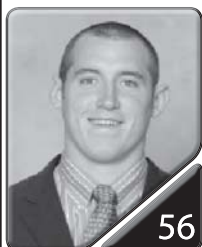

As a Redshirt Freshman (2006): Did not see any game action after suffering a knee injury in the summer.

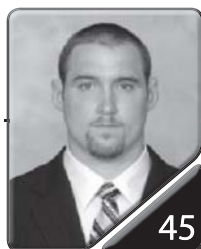
