# PREVIEW / NOTES

## Edsall Era Begins...

- A new era in Maryland football officially gets underway on Monday, Sept. 5 when the Terps play host to the Miami Hurricanes at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium in a nationally-televised game (ESPN). The Terps are under the direction of first-year head coach **Randy Edsall**, who transformed the University of Connecticut from a Division I-AA program (now FCS) to Division I-A (now FBS). Edsall was named Maryland's 34th head coach on Jan. 2 after he directed the Huskies to two Big East Conference titles and five bowl games, including their first-ever BCS appearance (2011 Fiesta Bowl). Between hiring a staff, recruiting, coaching and meeting supporters Edsall has been on the go. "The past six months have been very exciting," Edsall said. "There have been a lot of things going on to keep you busy. This is all part of the process that you have to go through to put a program in place. It's been great meeting a lot of the different people and supporters outside the campus, but also the people on campus who we work with on a daily basis. I can't wait to get the season started. I'm always looking forward, never looking back."

## First-and-Goal...

- Maryland returns 41 letterwinners, including 12 offensive and defensive starters, from last season's 9-4 squad that won the Military Bowl.
- Quarterback **Danny O'Brien**, the 2010 ACC Freshman of the Year, and three offensive linemen headline the five starters back on offense. O'Brien posted the sixth-highest passing yardage total (2,438) for a freshman in ACC history last season. **Davin Meggett** and **D.J. Adams** also form a formidable backfield tandem. Meggett posted a team-high 720 rushing yards in 2010, while Adams posted a freshman school-record 11 rushing TDs. The Terps will have to replace their top two receivers in first team All-ACC pick Torrey Smith and the reliable Adrian Cannon.
- Kenny Tate**, **Joe Vellano** and **Demetrius Hartsfield** highlight the seven starters back on defense. Tate (100), a 2010 first team All-ACC pick, and Hartsfield (88) are the top two tacklers back for the Terrapins. Vellano was also an all-league pick a year ago, earning second-team honors after posting a team-best 5.0 sacks. The Terps also welcome back their top two cornerbacks in seniors **Cameron Chism**, a two-year starter, and **Trenton Hughes**. Chism had 70 tackles and eight pass breakups last season, while Hughes had a team-high nine PBUs.
- Tony Logan**, a 2010 first team All-ACC choice and record-setting punt returner is back this season, but the Terps will have to replace Travis Baltz, who handled punting and place-kicking chores in 2010, and Smith, the ACC's all-time leader in kickoff return yards.

## Quick Hitters...

- The preseason two-deep features just 10 seniors (five on offense and five on defense).
- Sophomore **Danny O'Brien** is the consensus preseason first team All-ACC choice at quarterback. Despite the Terps' long history of outstanding quarterbacks, the last Maryland signal-caller to gain first-team All-ACC honors was Mark Manges in 1976. Sam Hollenbach was the last Terp QB to earn all-league honors, picking up an honorable mention nod in 2006.
- O'Brien's passing efficiency rating of 134.5 in 2010 is tops among returning ACC signal-callers.
- Tony Logan's** career punt-return average of 13.6 yards ranks second in the FBS among returning players.
- Despite starting just six career games, **Davin Meggett** ranks 20th in school history in rushing yards (1,515).
- Senior CB **Cameron Chism**, a preseason All-ACC selection, has started 23 consecutive games which leads the team.
- Junior OT **R.J. Dill** has started 18 straight times which leads the offense.

## Home Cooking...

- The Terps do not have to leave Maryland to play a game until the second weekend of October and play eight of their 12 regular-season contests in the state. Maryland is playing its opening four games at home for the first time in the modern era (first seven at home in 1911). In addition to the seven games in Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium, the Terps face Notre Dame at FedExField in Landover, Md., on Nov. 12 (a Fighting Irish home game). The Terps went 5-1 at home last season and 6-1 in the state of Maryland (victory over Navy in Baltimore).

## Reading the Defense...

- The Terps are fortunate to have one of the top young quarterbacks in the nation in sophomore **Danny O'Brien** who will be a key to the team's success in 2011. The 2010 ACC Freshman of the Year, as well as a candidate for the 2011 Davey O'Brien, Manning and Maxwell Awards, showed poise and accuracy in the pocket a year ago and was vital to the Terps' nine-win campaign. O'Brien started the last 10 games of the season and posted a 7-3 record. Despite not starting the first three games, his 22 TD passes were third in the ACC, third in the country among freshmen and second in school history. On the season, O'Brien had an efficiency rating of 134.5, a mark that was fourth-best in the ACC and fifth among freshmen FBS QBs. The freshman All-American did a good job spreading the ball around, hitting nine receivers in one start and eight different receivers in six starts. **C.J. Brown**, who played in just one game last season due to a shoulder injury, is set to be O'Brien's backup, though the sophomore is more than capable of directing the offense. "We're in good shape with Danny and C.J., though we do have a little bit of a depth problem," Edsall said. "But with freshman **Troy Jones** being our third string, it's just something that we're going have to deal with. Guys will have to prepare themselves to be ready to play."

## Looking to Replace Playmakers...

- The Terps, who ended 2010 ranked 29th in the FBS in scoring offense (32.2 points per game), will need to replace two of their home-run threats in WR Torrey Smith and RB Da'Rel Scott. Smith, a two-time All-ACC player and second-round choice of the Baltimore Ravens, posted a school record 12 touchdown receptions last season and scored three times on kickoff returns in his career. Scott was one of the top breakaway threats in the ACC during his four-year career. He was one of only four players in school history to post more than 2,000 rushing yards and 500 receiving. Scott, an all-league choice in 2008, had four touchdowns of more than 55 yards last season.
- Senior **Quintin McCree** and junior **Kevin Dorsey** are the top returning receivers in terms of catches. McCree had 16 receptions in 2010 and Dorsey posted 15. McCree is penciled in No. 1 at Z receiver, while Dorsey is atop the list at X receiver. Surprisingly, TE **Matt Furstenburg** recorded a team-best 17.2 yards per reception a year ago. The junior had 206 receiving yards and is one of seven returning players who caught a TD pass last season.
- A number of other receivers will be vying for time including seniors **Ronnie Tyler** and **Tony Logan**, and junior **Kerry Boykins**. Tyler and Boykins spent time at slot receiver last season (with LaQuan Williams) and combined for 23 receptions. That duo ended the spring atop the depth chart at W (slot receiver). Logan has spent most of his career as a punt returner, but has the shiftiness to be effective at receiver. Others expected to get a look in the preseason are freshmen **Adrian Coxson**, **Devin Burns**, **Tyrek Cheeseboro** and **Marcus Leak**. **Nigel King**, a freshman who enrolled in January, will redshirt in the fall. Burns is an athletic, converted quarterback and Coxson impressed on the scout team last season after transferring from Florida. "We've got really good competition," Edsall said of the wide-receiving corps. "We've got experienced guys coming back, so it's going to be interesting to see how that all plays out."
- Despite not starting a game last season, senior **Davin Meggett** led the team in rushing. He posted a career-high 720 rushing yards and showed a quicker burst than he had his first two years. Meggett had eight offensive plays (six rushes/two receptions) of 20 or more yards, which was second on the team behind Smith's 15. Sophomore **D.J. Adams** was the short-yardage specialist last season. He only averaged 3.6 yards per carry, but posted 11 rushing TDs which was tied for second in the ACC last season. "I feel very good with Davin and D.J. at tailback," Edsall said. Redshirt freshman **Jeremiah Wilson**, who moved from defensive back to tailback in the spring, will give the Terps depth. The Terps are lacking experience at fullback. Redshirt freshman **Rahsaan Moore** is No. 1 on the depth chart. **Jeff Hernandez** and true freshman **Tyler Cierski** will also figure into the mix.

## Experience on the O-Line...

- After suffering through injuries on the offensive line the last two seasons, the Terps appear to have a more stable unit this year. Maryland has three starters back from last season - **Andrew Gonnella**, **Bennett Fulper** and **R.J. Dill** - and three other players who have started games - **Justin Gilbert**, **Pete White** and **Pete DeSouza**. Gonnella, the lone senior, and Dill are the most experienced of the linemen, having each played in 25 career games with 21

starts a piece. Fulper has started 11 times, including the final seven last season at center. Gilbert was the starter at left tackle for the first three games in 2010 before suffering a left knee injury and missing the remainder of the year. He entered the spring back atop the depth chart, but injured the same knee in the first week of practice during a non-contact drill. He had surgery and is expected to be out of action until the early part of the season. DeSouza, who was injured in a scooter accident last season, did not practice in the spring while continuing his rehabilitation. **Max Garcia** is a highly-regarded tackle prospect. He played in two of the final three games last season as a true freshman. Garcia moved to the top of the depth chart at left tackle with the injury to Gilbert. White played in eight games at guard last season and had one start on the right side. **Josh Cary** was a pleasant surprise in the spring. The sophomore stepped into the No. 1 role at right guard due to injuries and held onto the spot. Edsall is hoping to create a solid two-deep during preseason camp. "We do have some issues from a depth standpoint that we do have to address," Edsall said. "But I do like the way that Max Garcia, Andrew Gonnella, Bennett Fulper, Josh Cary, and R.J. Dill came along during the spring and how they worked to get better." Other linemen hoping to figure into the rotation with the second unit include **De'Onte Arnett**, **Sal Conaboy** and **Nick Klemm**.

## D-Line Rotation...

- The Terps need to replace just one starter (Drew Gloster) along the defensive line. They have six players back, including three starters, who saw extensive action in 2010. That group, as well as some newcomers, should see time in 2011. All-ACC pick **Joe Vellano** should man the interior, along with **A.J. Francis**, **Maurice Hampton**, **Andre Monroe** and **Justin Anderson**, who played the anchor (strongside DE) in 2010. Vellano posted a team-high five sacks last year and is a consensus preseason All-ACC pick, while Francis chipped in a career-high 44 tackles. Monroe was a pleasant surprise in the spring. The under-sized redshirt freshman is in line for playing time after ending the spring No. 1 at tackle alongside Vellano. **Isaiah Ross** and **Bradley Johnson** each saw time at defensive end in 2010. Ross chipped in 4.5 tackles for loss and 2.5 sacks, which ranked tied for fourth on the team. Johnson is a converted outside linebacker who gave the team speed off the edge. New to the position is sophomore **David Mackall**, a gifted defender, who moved from Mike LB to defensive end in the spring. Mackall had three sacks last year in passing situations which ranked third on the team. He also chipped in an interception in the Military Bowl. "We've got some guys who have played very well," Edsall said of the defensive line. "But there's some young guys who came on during spring practice that I was impressed with. I do think that we have some depth there, but we've just got to get more out of them in terms of a pass rush." One of the players Edsall was referring to was redshirt freshman **Clarence Murphy**, who emerged from the spring atop the depth chart at one of the defensive end spots. Redshirt freshman **Ian Evans** and sophomore **Marcus Whitfield** also figure into the mix at DE. Whitfield adds speed, but he is coming off a knee injury suffered early in 2010. **Darius Kilgo** will also battle for time, along with **Alvin Thomas** and true freshmen **Quinton Jefferson** and **Keith Bowers**.

**DL Drew Gloster 3V 6-2, 255**

- Played in 35 career games, including 12 starts, all in 2010 ... found a home at DE after moving there in the spring of 2010.

**LB Alex Wujciak 3V 6-3, 245**

- A three-time All-ACC selection (second team in 2008; first team in 2009 and 2010) ... started every game (38) of his career at middle linebacker ... 10th in school history with 381 career tackles.

**LB Adrian Moten 4V 6-2, 230**

- Started all 25 games his final two seasons ... 15.5 career sacks ranks 12th in school history ... also 14th on the book in career tackles for loss (24.0) and eighth in yardage (145).

**SS Antwine Perez 3V 6-1, 210**

- Played in all 38 games during his three seasons after transferring from USC ... tied for sixth in the ACC and tied for 64th nationally in passes defended (0.85 pg) in 2010.

### Adjustments at Linebacker...

- One of the strongest units on the defense the last two seasons was linebacker. But with three-year starter and three time all-league performer Alex Wujciak gone, along with two-year starter and playmaker Adrian Moten, the Terps needed time to adjust and they may have found the right combination. Junior **Demetrius Hartsfield** has the most experience at the position having started two years at Will. Hartsfield, who has 152 career tackles (second on the team), moves inside to the Mike position with **Darin Drakeford**, the top LB reserve last season, switching from Sam to Will. Redshirt freshman **Lorne Goree** was a reserve at Will last season and spent most of the spring at that spot. However, Goree, who has bulked up to 230 pounds, slides inside to back up Hartsfield. Senior **Kenny Tate**, a 2010 first team All-ACC pick, has moved from safety to the Star position (hybrid strong safety and outside linebacker position) in order to get the best 11 defenders on the field. "When you take a look at his abilities, he's better suited to being a linebacker," Edsall said before spring practice. Tate was all over the field last season. He had 8.5 tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks, and had a league-high four forced fumbles. Edsall seems to like the move even more now. In fact, he's impressed with the first-team linebackers. "I think at linebacker - in terms of the three starters - there might not be a better group in the country than those three," Edsall said. "We do have some depth problems behind those three guys, but that's something we have to do as a coaching staff, create more depth. We need to get those younger guys where they can contribute if there are injuries." Two of the younger guys are redshirt freshmen **Mario Rowson** and **Desmond Kearse** who each moved to Star, along with Tate. Kearse saw limited action early last season before his true freshman year was cut short with an injury. **Lamonte Gaddis** and **Shaquan Virgil** are options behind Drakeford at Will, while **Ray Lynn** is a backup at Mike LB. There will also be three true freshmen - **Cole Farrand**, **Garrett Lederman** and **Alex Twine** - joining the linebacking corps in the preseason.

### Secondary Roles...

- With **Kenny Tate's** move to linebacker, Maryland has two returning starters in the secondary in senior cornerbacks **Cameron Chism** and **Trenton Hughes**. Chism, a two-year starter, has 144 career tackles (third on the team) and four interceptions, while Hughes had a team-high nine PBUs in 2010. That duo combined to start all 13 games last season. **Dexter McDougale** served as the No. 3 cornerback last season and after the spring is listed No. 1 at one of the cornerback spots. Redshirt freshman **Jeremiah Johnson** is backing up McDougale, while Hughes is behind Chism. Sophomore **Avery Graham** has seen most of his time on special teams, but should figure into the cornerback rotation in the fall. He rehabbed from shoulder surgery in the spring, but is expected to be healthy in the fall. There should be a battle at cornerback

in the preseason. "Dexter, Jeremiah and Avery are fighting it out at one corner spot, while Cameron and Trenton are fighting at the other spot," Edsall said. The Terps were able to move Tate to linebacker because they have a solid frontline duo at safety in junior **Eric Franklin** and sophomore **Matt Robinson**. While neither has been a full-time starter, both played extensively last season. Franklin played in 11 games, posting 23 tackles and three interceptions (tied for second on the team). Robinson, a big physical defender, played in all 13 games, posting 29 tackles and forcing a pair of fumbles (tied for second on the team). **Austin Walker**, a three-year letterwinner, is a veteran reserve safety. He has played sparingly in the secondary, but has been a standout on special teams. Redshirt freshman **Titus Till**, a highly-regarded prospect, is also one of the reserves at safety. **Anthony Green** and **Clarence Claiborne** will provide depth. Newcomers who could eventually figure into the rotation in the defensive backfield include **Undray Clark**, **A.J. Hendy**, **Makinton Dorleant** and **Lukas Foreman**.

### Special Teams Makeover...

- Maryland will have to replace a number of its special-teams performers from last season as punt returner **Tony Logan** and long snapper **Tim Downs** are the lone holdovers. Travis Baltz was the punter the last four seasons and also handled the place-kicking last year. Baltz ended his career ranked fifth in school history in punting average (41.2) and third in punting yards (9,224). He also set the Maryland single-season school record for consecutive PATs (47 in 2010) and connected on 14 of 18 field goals last season. The Terps also have to replace the production of Torrey Smith, the team's kick returner the last three seasons. Smith had 2,983 career kickoff return yards (ACC record) and three touchdowns (school record). Maryland has options as replacements for both Baltz and Smith. **Nick Ferrara** was the team's starting place-kicker in 2009 and went on to earn freshman All-America honors. Ferrara got hurt during preseason camp last year and was unable to wrestle the job back from Baltz. Ferrara did serve as the kickoff specialist in 2010. Ferrara and redshirt freshman **Michael Tart** were the lone kickers on the spring roster and split duties between the two jobs. Freshman **Nate Renfro** will join them in August. He is penciled in behind Tart at punter heading into camp. Logan gives the Terps a breakaway threat in the return game. He earned first team All-ACC honors after ranking third in the FBS in punt-return average (18.1) last season. **Dexter McDougale**, **Trenton Hughes**, **Avery Graham** and **Logan** are among those who returned kickoffs last season in Smith's absence. Despite the loss of Baltz and Smith, Edsall is comfortable with the depth on special teams. "Overall, I think we do have the specialists that can do it and we just need to get them to perform on a consistent basis," Edsall said. "I'm excited about the return game and one of the strongest areas we have with our specialists is long snapper with Tim Downs and **Greg Parcher**."

- Four-year starter at punter (2008 All-ACC) ... also served as No. 1 place-kicker in 2010 ... ended his career ranked fifth in school history in punting average (41.2).

KR Torrey Smith 3V 6-1, 200

- Ranks first in both school and ACC history in career kickoff return yards (2,983) ... had three career kickoff returns for TDs ... second-round pick of the Baltimore Ravens in the 2011 NFL Draft.

## Coaching Staff At-A-Glance..

- With **Randy Edsall** taking over the reins of the Maryland football program in January most of the staff has turned over. **Tom Brattan** (11th year as offensive line coach) and **Lee Hull** (fourth year as wide receivers coach) are the lone holdovers. Here are brief sketches of the seven new assistant coaches:
- Todd Bradford** (defensive coordinator/secondary) has served as a coordinator on both sides of the ball, including the last three seasons as the DC and secondary coach at Southern Mississippi. The Golden Eagles' rushing defense ranked No. 13 (113.0 yards per game) in the FBS in 2010. They were also No. 14 in third-down conversions (34 percent) and No. 30 in turnovers gained. Bradford has also coached at Oklahoma State, BYU and Louisiana. Bradford was hired by Edsall in January as the inside linebackers coach, but was elevated to defensive coordinator (as well as handling the secondary) when Don Brown left for UConn.
- Gary Crowton** (offensive coordinator/QBs) spent the last four seasons as offensive coordinator at LSU. Despite having three different starting quarterbacks in his tenure, the Tigers set a number of offensive records. The Tigers averaged over 30 points a game in his first two seasons, including a school-record 38.6 points a contest in 2007 when LSU won the national title. He has also been a head coach at BYU (2001-04) and Louisiana Tech (1996-98) and an offensive coordinator with the Chicago Bears (1999-00) and Oregon Ducks (2005-06). Crowton has coached seven quarterbacks who have gone on to be selected in the NFL Draft.

- Keith Dudzinski** (inside linebackers) served as the defensive coordinator at UMass-Amherst the last seven years, including five under former Maryland assistant Don Brown, who was the Minutemen's head coach from 2004-08. During Dudzinski's time as defensive coordinator at UMass, the Minutemen maintained one of the top units in the nation. They finished among the top 20 in total defense three times (third in 2005; 20th in 2006; 13th in 2007). UMass was also first nationally in scoring defense in 2005 and fifth in 2006.
- John Dunn** (tight ends/recruiting coordinator) spent the last three seasons as a graduate offensive assistant under Crowton with the LSU Tigers who went 11-2 in 2010. Dunn played quarterback and tight end for North Carolina from 2001-03 before spending four seasons on the Tar Heels staff.
- Greg Gattuso** (defensive line) spent the last six seasons at Pittsburgh. The Panthers were one of the top sack producers in the nation the last two years. Brandon Lindsey (10.0) and Jabaal Sherard (9.0) both ranked in the top-20 nationally in sacks during the 2010 regular season and Pittsburgh led the nation in that category in 2009 (3.6 per game). Gattuso, the former head coach at Duquesne (1992-04), initially joined the Pitt staff as tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator. In his first season, he helped the Panthers sign a recruiting class rated 10th in the nation by Scout.com. Gattuso was twice named the national Mid-Major I-AA Coach of the Year at Duquesne and was a seven-time MAAC Coach of the Year.
- Lyndon Johnson** (special teams/outside linebackers) was on Edsall's staff at Connecticut, serving in a variety of roles. The UConn graduate coached tight ends and special teams his first three seasons (1999-01) before handling the outside linebackers his final nine years. He also coached special teams from 2005 through 2010. The Huskies were ninth in the FBS in kickoff returns in 2009 (25.8 yards per return) and Robert McClain ranked 18th nationally in punt returns (12.6 ypr). Johnson had the top kick returner in the nation this past season in Nick Williams who averaged 35.3 yards per attempt and had two touchdowns.
- Andre Powell** (running backs) spent the last four seasons at Clemson where he coached running backs and coordinated the special teams his final three years. He tutored All-ACC running backs James Davis and C.J. Spiller, two of the top three rushers in Clemson history. Spiller finished his career No. 2 in NCAA FBS history in all-purpose running. The Tigers went to a bowl game every year Powell was at Clemson and finished in the top 25 of the final AP poll in 2007 and 2009. Maryland is Powell's fourth stop in the ACC, having also coached at Virginia (1996-00) and North Carolina (2001-06).

Maryland signed 20 student-athletes to national letters-of-intent for the 2011 football season in February.

Head coach **Randy Edsall** said the Terps filled a number of needs on both sides of the ball. There are five offensive linemen and five defensive backs in the class.

"We were able to add speed and athleticism in the skill positions," Edsall said. "We also added depth in the offensive line. There are guys on defense who can run and have the ability to make plays."

Four of the recruits hail from the Maryland/Washington, D.C., area, including WR **Tyrek Cheeseboro**, OL **Nathaniel Clarke** and DB **A.J. Hendy**, all ranked nationally among the top prospects are their positions.

Cheeseboro and Clarke, who both attended Fork Union Military in the fall, as well as WR **Nigel King** did not sign letters. That trio enrolled in classes in January and took part in spring practice.

Four more student-athletes are from talent-rich Florida, including DL **Keith Bowers** and DBs **Undray Clark**, **Makinton Dorleant** and **Lukas Foreman**.

King is one of four North Carolina products, joining OL **Ryan Doyle**, WR **Marcus Leak** and RB **Justus Pickett**. King was the 11th-ranked prospect in the state according to Scout.com. Leak is the 24th-ranked player in the state according to Rivals.com.

King and Leak helped the Terps reel in the 20th-best wide-receiver class in the nation according to Rivals.com.

"It was important that we add quality depth at receiver with three seniors on the roster," Edsall said.

The Terps also added a pair of players from both Pennsylvania and Delaware.

DE **Quinton Jefferson**, a Pittsburgh native, should add even more speed and play-making ability to the defensive line after posting 16 sacks in 2010, while OL **Andrew Zeller** (Red Lion, Pa.) was a second team all-state choice in the fall.

OL **Evan Mulrooney** and RB **Brandon Ross** are two of the top four players in the state of Delaware.

"We helped ourselves at the running-back position," Edsall said.

FB **Tyler Cierski** is the second-ranked fullback in the nation according to Scouts, Inc., while Ross was a 2010 second team all-state choice.

With the loss of four-year starter Travis Baltz, the Terps went out and signed a punter. **Nathan Renfro** was an All-Tennessee selection last season after handling both of the kicking chores.

The Terps also added a pair of linebackers in **Cole Farland** and **Alex Twine**, and an all-state offensive lineman in **Stephen Grommer**, who hails from Spartanburg, S.C.

# Randy Edsall

**Head Coach**

**Syracuse '80 • First Year at Maryland**

With a reputation as a top-notch builder, leader and recruiter, Randy Edsall is in his first season as Maryland's head football coach.

Edsall, who is originally from nearby Glen Rock, Pa., spent the previous 12 seasons as head coach at the University of Connecticut where he took the program from FCS (formerly Division I-AA) status to five bowl games, including a BCS contest.

Edsall, who was hired in January as the 34th head coach in Maryland history, guided the Huskies to a pair of Big East Conference titles (2007, 2010) and postseason appearances in each of his final four years, including the 2011 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.

The 2010 Big East Coach of the Year, who also had a successful run as an NFL assistant, led UConn to eight or more wins in each of the last four seasons as the Huskies successfully made the ascent to the FBS (formerly Division I-A). In fact, Connecticut was 33-19 over the last four seasons, including a pair of bowl wins.

UConn is also the first program to go from FBS newcomer to BCS bowl participant in only seven years.

During his time in Storrs, the program blossomed from a major college football newcomer upon his arrival to a team that made five bowl appearances in the past seven years. He left as the school's all-time leader in career wins (74) and most games coached (144). Edsall was also an impressive 65-46 (.586) in the school's first nine FBS seasons (since 2002).

The 2010 Huskies were typical of a hard working, blue-collar Edsall team. After starting out 3-4, including 0-2 in the league, UConn finished the year with five consecutive Big East wins to earn the conference championship and a spot in the BCS.

UConn's trip to the 2011 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl marked its fifth bowl trip since 2004. The Huskies defeated South Carolina in the 2009 Papajohns.com Bowl by a 20-7 score. Edsall guided Connecticut to a 38-20 win over Buffalo in the 2009 International Bowl, led the team to a victory in the 2004 Motor City Bowl and an appearance in the 2007 Meineke Car Care Bowl.

Edsall's Huskies won their final three regular season games in 2009 - including a historic double-overtime win over Notre Dame. UConn posted a 7-5 regular season record facing the 25th-toughest schedule in the country. In 2007, the Bryant and Munger Coach of the Year Award finalist helped guide UConn to a share of its first-ever Big East Championship in a season where the Huskies were picked to finish seventh in the league.

Edsall is a two-time recipient (2007, 2010) of the Bowl Championship Division Head Coach of the Year in New England by the Gridiron Club of Greater Boston.

Edsall has been a prominent voice in the college football community as he was a member of the American Football Coaches Association Board of Trustees and the NCAA Football Rules Committee.

UConn joined the Big East Conference in 2004, finishing just one win shy of tying for the league championship. The Huskies led the conference in total defense each of their first two years and again in 2008. During its debut season in 2004, UConn also led the Big East in total offense. UConn finished in the national top 20 for total offense (2003, 2004) and total defense (2002, 2005, 2008) in multiple seasons. The Huskies finished an impressive sixth in the country in total defense in 2008.

Under Edsall's guidance, the Huskies defeated members of the Atlantic Coast Conference, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Conference USA and Southeastern Conference during their Football Bowl Subdivision tenure.

In addition to the great success on the field, UConn has performed admirably in the classroom under Edsall. In five of the past seven years, including 2007, '08 and '09, UConn was recognized by the American Football Coaches Association for its high graduation rate.

UConn was the top team in the NCAA's Graduation Success Rate (GSR) in both October 2008 and '09 among league schools. The Huskies were third in the Big East in the 2010 GSR release and within four points of second.

In 2008, UConn had the highest GSR for African-American student-athletes among all state universities that participated in a bowl game following the 2008 season.

In 2009, the NCAA's Academic Progress Rate (APR) for the UConn football team was an impressive 951, which was third in the Big East Conference and just five points behind the second-place team. That mark also placed Connecticut ahead of the Bowl Subdivision average of 941 and among the top 30 percent of schools in the country.

In 2007, UConn was one of just six schools to play in a bowl game and also boast a GSR over 80-percent for both its Caucasian and African-American student-athletes. In 2003, UConn was the only public Division I-A school to graduate at least 90 percent of its football players and in 2005, UConn was one of only eight schools to both graduate 70 percent and win a bowl game.

Even in its first season at the Division I-A level, UConn was able to make its mark on the national scene.

Edsall guided the 2002 team to a 6-6 record in its first year with a full complement of 85 scholarships. UConn ended the 2002 season impressively, registering four straight wins to reach the .500 mark, including season-ending road wins at Navy and at bowl-bound Iowa State.

UConn's .500 season was its best record since the squad won 10 games in 1998. The Huskies' six wins were

more than the Huskies posted in 2000 (three) and 2001 (two) combined. In 2002, the Huskies were the most improved Division I-A team in the country, according to pre-season and postseason ratings by College Football News.

The excitement for Edsall and his team continued to swell in 2003 as the Huskies moved into their new home, Rentschler Field, and enjoyed the nation's largest attendance increase (+ 21,252 fans per game).

Finishing with a 9-3 record, many national media outlets, including Bristol-based ESPN, proclaimed that UConn should have received a bowl berth, a feat highly-uncommon for an independent team.

With their membership in the Big East for the 2004 season, another strong campaign by the Huskies resulted in a bowl berth. UConn went 8-4 against a challenging slate that fall as the program gained its highest-ever level of exposure. The Huskies capped their historic season with a resounding 39-10 win over Mid-American Conference Champion Toledo in the Motor City Bowl.

The 2007 season witnessed a new level of excitement in Storrs as the Huskies earned their first ever national rankings, peaking at No. 13 in the BCS standings on Nov. 5. UConn became just the second Big East team to ever go 7-0 at home and defeat three teams there which were ranked in the Top 10 at some point during the season. The Big East Champion Huskies finished that season at 9-4 with a berth in the Meineke Car Care Bowl, earning Edsall New England Division I Coach of the Year accolades.

Edsall was named the 27th head football coach at the University of Connecticut on December 21, 1998. He brought 19 years of coaching experience to the Husky program, including 15 seasons on the collegiate level and three in the NFL.

Edsall joined the Huskies after completing the 1998 season as the defensive coordinator at Georgia Tech, where he helped the 14th-ranked Yellow Jackets complete a 9-2 campaign.

Prior to joining the staff at Georgia Tech, Edsall spent three seasons as the secondary coach for the Jacksonville Jaguars. In his three seasons on Tom Coughlin's staff, Edsall was a part of one of the most successful expansion

franchises in the history of the NFL. The Jaguars reached the playoffs twice, including a berth in the 1996 AFC Championship Game.

Edsall began his coaching career in 1980 at his alma mater, Syracuse University. A former quarterback for the Orangemen, Edsall started as a graduate assistant from 1980-82. In 1983, Orange head coach Dick MacPherson named Edsall to oversee the running backs.

Edsall coached running backs for three seasons (1983-84 and 1986) and oversaw the tight ends in 1985 before making the switch to the defensive side of the ball. He coached the Syracuse defensive backs from 1987-1990 and during that period the Orangemen were ranked among the Division I-A leaders in pass defense.

Edsall was a three-year letterwinner in football, basketball and baseball at Susquehannock High School (Pa.). He was an all-state selection in all three sports in his senior season and was inducted into the York Area Sports Hall of Fame.

He went on to Syracuse, where he was a member of the football team and earned one varsity letter as a quarterback for the Orangemen. He was a member of the Syracuse squad that captured the 1979 Independence Bowl title under head coach Frank Maloney.

Edsall earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from Syracuse in 1980 and added a master's degree from the Big East school in health and physical education in 1982.

Edsall was honored with the Leadership Award at the Martin Luther King, Jr., Holiday National Liberty Bell Ringing Celebration in Hartford, Conn., in January, 2010. He was honored this last fall by the UConn Alumni Association as an honorary alumnus of the school.

Edsall was an active member of the community and has supported a number of charitable events over the years.

He and his wife, Eileen, a former basketball and volleyball letterwinner at Syracuse, have a daughter, Alexi (21), and a son, Corey (18).

# Todd Bradford

**Defensive Coordinator/Secondary**  
**Southern Utah '86 • First Year at Maryland**

After having success at a number of stops, Todd Bradford, who has coached in Conference USA, the Big 12 and Big Ten, gives the Terps another well-rounded, experienced assistant.

He is in his first season as the Terps defensive coordinator and secondary coach, the fourth time in his career he has held those dual roles.

Bradford has coached in bowl games in each of the last five seasons and been a coordinator on both sides of the ball, spending the last three seasons as the defensive coordinator/secondary coach at Southern Mississippi.

The Golden Eagles rushing defense ranked No. 13 (113.0 yards per game) in the FBS in 2010. They were also No. 14 in third-down conversions (34 percent), No. 30 in turnovers gained (26) and tied for 26th in tackles for loss (6.7 pg).

In his second season with Southern Miss, Bradford led an opportunistic defense which helped the team rank No. 19 nationally in turnover margin. The Golden Eagles ended 2009 tied for 18th in the FBS in sacks (2.7 per game), tied for 25th in turnovers gained (27) and No. 26 in tackles for loss (6.8 pg).

In his first season, Bradford oversaw a defense that got stingy over the last half of the year and helped lead the team to a season-ending five-game winning streak, including a victory in the 2008 New Orleans Bowl.

The Golden Eagles ranked No. 10 nationally in turnover margin in 2008 by forcing 29 total turnovers including 13 over the final five contests.

The defense gave up just 12.4 points per game over that span as well, while allowing just 254.2 yards (60.6 yards rushing, 193.6 passing). The defense also recorded its first game since 2006 without giving up a touchdown to C-USA rival East Carolina in a 21-3 victory.

Bradford came to Southern Miss after spending three seasons (2005-07) as Oklahoma State's linebackers coach.

During his time in Stillwater, Okla., he coached two freshman All-Americans in Patrick Levine (2006 first team by Rivals.com) and Chris Collins (2006 second team – Rivals.com), and helped the team reach a pair of bowl games.

Prior to his stint at OSU, Bradford worked on the other side of the football as the offensive coordinator at Brigham Young for two seasons under current Maryland assistant Gary Crowton.

While at BYU, he coached a pair of award-winning wide receivers in Todd Watkins, an honorable mention All-American, and Austin Collie, the Mountain West Conference Freshman of the Year and freshman All-American.

Bradford served as secondary and kickoff coverage coach at Middle Tennessee in 2002, and was the defensive backs coach at Wisconsin from 2000-01.

While with the Badgers, Bradford tutored Jamar Fletcher, who led the Big Ten in interceptions and won the 2000 Jim Thorpe Award. Fletcher then was taken in the first round of the 2001 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins.

From 1997-99, Bradford worked on the staff at Louisiana Tech, serving as the defensive coordinator under Crowton the final two years. Bradford was also on the defensive staff at Eastern Michigan from 1995-96 where that unit broke 43 school records.

He was the defensive coordinator at Lehigh in 1994 and helped guide the Engineers to the Patriot League championship game, while boasting the league's second-best defense.

Bradford began his coaching career in 1987 at his alma mater, Southern Utah, before moving on to New Hampshire as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator from 1988-93.

Bradford and his wife, Sondra, have a son, Kody, and three daughters, Ashlee, Hailee and Whitney.

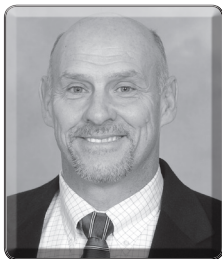

# Gary Crowton

## Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks

### BYU '83 • First Year at Maryland

A long-time successful offensive coordinator and head coach with a reputation for developing NFL-caliber quarterbacks, Gary Crowton is in his first season on the Maryland staff.

Crowton, the former head coach of BYU and Louisiana Tech, spent the last four seasons as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at LSU. He has the same responsibilities with the Terps.

Despite having three different starting quarterbacks in his tenure, the Tigers set a number of offensive records.

The Tigers averaged over 30 points a game in his first two seasons, including a school-record 38.6 points a contest in 2007. The LSU offense set 10 school records in 2007 en route to claiming the national title.

The offensive school records set under Crowton in 2007 included points in a season (541), points per game (38.6), touchdowns scored (64), rushing TDs (35), passes attempted (442), passes completed (256), total yards (6,152), total plays (1,054) and first downs (316). LSU also scored at least 40 points a school-record seven times in 2007 as the Tigers posted a 12-2 overall mark.

The 2007 offense produced one of the top rushing and passing seasons in school history as Jacob Hester ran for 1,103 yards and 12 scores, while Matt Flynn threw for 2,407 yards and 21 touchdowns. It marked only the sixth time in school history that LSU's offense has featured a 1,000-yard rusher and a 2,000-yard passer in the same season.

Four offensive players were drafted following the 2007 season - Hester (third round to San Diego), wide receiver Early Doucet (fourth round to Arizona), Flynn (seventh round to Green Bay) and tight end Keith Zinger (seventh round to Atlanta).

LSU has scored over 400 points four times in school history and two of those occurrences (541 in 2007 and 402 in 2008) came on Crowton's watch.

The Tigers scored at least 30 points in 31 games and compiled a 40-12 overall mark during Crowton's tenure.

The LSU offense helped cap off an 11-win 2010 campaign by scoring over 40 points in three of the final four games.

Two years earlier, the Tigers had three quarterbacks on the roster who combined to play in one college game. By the end of the season, LSU's offense was among the best in the SEC, averaging 30.9 points per game and 368 yards per contest.

Crowton joined the Tigers after a two-year stint as the offensive coordinator at Oregon, transforming the Ducks into one of the top offenses in the nation. In 2006, Oregon ranked No. 9 nationally in total offense (422.8 yards per game), which included 241 through the air and 182 on the ground. Oregon led the Pac-10 in both rushing and total offense.

In his first year with Oregon, Crowton orchestrated an offense that tallied the second-highest totals in school history in passing yards (304.5 per game) and points (34.5 per game). The Ducks ranked No. 8 in the nation in passing, No. 12 in scoring and No. 18 in total offense on their way to posting a 10-2 overall mark and reaching the Holiday Bowl.

Crowton joined the Oregon staff after a four-year stint as Brigham Young head coach, guiding his alma mater to a 26-23 record, including a 12-2 mark in 2001 which was capped off with an appearance in the Liberty Bowl. The Cougars scored 40 or more points 10 times that year, including 70 in a win over Tulane and 44 in a victory over California.

BYU led the nation in total offense (542.9 per game) and scoring (46.8 per game) in 2001 as the Cougars captured the Mountain West Conference title and Crowton was named the league's Coach of the Year.

Prior to taking the head-coaching job at BYU, Crowton served as the Chicago Bears offensive coordinator for two years (1999-00). In his first season, the offense ranked No. 3 in the NFL in passing yards (258.5 per game). That year, the Bears established a franchise record with 4,136 passing yards behind a trio of quarterbacks.

Crowton's first head-coaching stint came at Louisiana Tech, serving as the top man from 1996-98 and leading the Bulldogs to an overall mark of 21-13, which included a 9-2 record in 1997.

In three years at Louisiana Tech, Crowton's teams scored at least 35 points 16 times. He also posted some of the biggest wins in school history - beating Mississippi State, 38-23, in 1995; and then upending California, 41-34, and Alabama, 26-20, the following season.

Crowton's 1998 Louisiana Tech team proved to be one of the most potent offenses in the nation that year as the Bulldogs ranked No. 1 in the nation in passing yards (432.1 per game) behind All-America quarterback Tim Rattay. Tech finished the year ranked No. 2 in the nation in total offense (542 yards per game).

The 1998 Bulldog offense also featured a future first-round draft pick in wide receiver Troy Edwards.

Rattay, one of seven Crowton-coached quarterbacks to be drafted, and Edwards teamed up for what was one of the most explosive offensive displays against a nationally-ranked team to open the 1998 season. In that game against fourth-ranked Nebraska, Rattay threw for 590 yards, while Edwards caught 21 passes for an NCAA record 405 yards.

One year earlier, Louisiana Tech ranked No. 3 in the nation in passing (360.5 per game) and total offense (496.0 pg).

Crowton began his 29-year coaching career as a student assistant in 1982 under LaVell Edwards at BYU, where he earned his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1983. He proceeded to serve as secondary coach at Snow (Utah) Junior College in 1983 before becoming offensive coordinator at the school for the next three seasons.

He then served as passing game coordinator at Western Illinois in 1987, followed by offensive coordinator at New Hampshire (1988-90), quarterbacks coach at Boston College (1991-93) where he was on the same staff with Randy Edsall, co-offensive coordinator at Georgia Tech (1994), and offensive coordinator at Louisiana Tech (1995). Crowton was elevated to head coach at Louisiana Tech the following year.

Among the standouts he has tutored include BYU running back Luke Staley, who was the recipient of the 2001 Doak Walker Award and nation's scoring leader; Troy Edwards, Louisiana Tech's 1998 Biletnikoff Award honoree; Tim Rattay, who finished 10th in balloting for the Heisman Trophy in 1999; and Boston College quarterback Glenn Foley, who finished fifth in the 1993 Heisman Trophy voting.

The former all-league quarterback at Orem High School earned All-America acclaim at Snow Junior College before completing his football career as a quarterback, wide receiver and defensive back at Colorado State in 1978. He then ran track for one year at Idaho State before earning his degree at BYU.

Crowton and his wife Maren have four daughters - Tara, Jenessa, Mikauli and Toriana - and three sons - Dane, Quinn, and Macloud.

# Tom Brattan

## Offensive Line

Delaware '72 • 11th Year at Maryland

After coaching in the Big Ten and Pac-10, Tom Brattan has found a home with Maryland in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

The veteran coach is in his 11th season as the Terps' offensive line coach. He boasts more than 35 years of coaching experience, including 29 at the collegiate level.

The Maryland offensive line has been one of the team's strengths since 2001, producing seven first team All-Atlantic Coast Conference performers and a handful of other players honored by both the league and national media, including Paul Pinegar in 2010 (honorable mention All-ACC).

Brattan has also prepared a number of players for the next level as eight of his former Terp pupils were on NFL rosters last season, including Bruce Campbell, a fourth-round choice of Oakland in the 2010 NFL Draft.

In 2008, Edwin Williams was a first team All-ACC selection, while Jaimie Thomas and Scott Burley were honorable mention choices. Williams and Thomas have been in the NFL the last two seasons.

In 2007, Andrew Crummey, another current professional, was tabbed a second team All-American, while Burley earned all-conference honors.

Over the last five seasons, Brattan's offensive line opened holes for three of the top backs in school history.

In 2008, Da'Rel Scott rushed for 1,133 yards, the seventh-highest single-season total in school history. Scott ended his career in 2010 ranked seventh on the Maryland career rushing list.

One year before that, Lance Ball completed his career ranked fourth in school history in rushing yards and Keon Lattimore ended his tenure No. 14 on the rushing list.

In 2006, Crummey and Stephon Heyer were recognized as part of the All-ACC team. Heyer also earned a spot on ESPN.com's All-Bowl team for his performance in the Champs Sports Bowl vs. All-American and 2007 first-round NFL Draft choice Anthony Spencer of Purdue.

The 2006 unit allowed Ball and Lattimore to each rush for over 700 yards and yielded just 19 sacks, the second-lowest total in the ACC.

In 2005, he mentored Jared Gaither to third team freshman All-America honors. Brattan also oversaw a young line to a season that helped Ball earn second team All-ACC recognition at tailback, all despite losing its top player (Heyer) prior to the season. The season was reminiscent of the 2003 campaign when an injury-plagued unit still produced the nation's 24th-best rushing offense, allowed just 20 sacks and had a first team All-ACC performer in C.J. Brooks.

In previous seasons, the Maryland line had similar success. In 2002, Brattan had four of five linemen earn All-ACC recognition while the team had the league's second-rated rushing attack (198.8 ypg) and scoring offense (32.2 ypg) while allowing 21 sacks in 14 games.

In his first year (2001), the Terps averaged 35.5 points per game, allowed just 18 sacks and paved the way for a 1,242-yard season from Doak Walker finalist Bruce Perry. In doing so, Melvin Fowler earned All-ACC recognition en route to being drafted by the Cleveland Browns in the third round and Todd Wike earning a first team all-league nod.

Prior to coming to Maryland, Brattan spent two years (1999-00) at Stanford, where he served as the Cardinal's line coach in charge of centers and guards. Stanford went 8-4 in 1999 en route to a Rose Bowl bid. The 1999 Stanford offense scored at least 31 points in all but three games and hit the 50-point plateau three times. That year, Brattan's offensive line allowed just 15 sacks despite 385 passing attempts (one sack for every 27 attempts).

Brattan took his first full-time job at the collegiate level at William & Mary in 1983 as an offensive backfield coach. After just one season, he was promoted to offensive coordinator and served the remainder of his tenure (1984-91) in that capacity. He also worked with the offensive line at William & Mary. In that time, the Tribe advanced to the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs on three occasions. From 1986 to 1990, William & Mary earned national rankings in three seasons (No. 9 in 1986; No. 13 in 1989; No. 7 in 1990). The success was largely a product of Brattan's offensive design as his unit ranked in the top 20 in offense in 1985 and 1986, while it had the top-rated attack in Division I-AA for the 1990 season and the sixth-best in '91.

Brattan took his success at the I-AA level to his next job, Northwestern, where he resided from 1992-98 as offensive line coach. In Brattan's first three years at the school, the Wildcats continued to struggle, pushing their streak of seasons without a winning mark to 23.

Then in 1995, the Wildcats were in the national spotlight as they came seemingly out of nowhere to win the Big Ten championship for the first time in 47 years and advance to the Rose Bowl where they ultimately fell to USC. They finished the year ranked No. 7 in the nation with a 10-2 mark. Brattan's line allowed just eight sacks all year while helping propel Darnell Autry to a new school rushing record. Northwestern finished fifth nationally in rushing.

The Wildcats posted a combined 15-1 league record in 1995 and 1996, taking the Big Ten crown both years after having won just five league games in the previous three years. In 1996, they earned a bid to play Tennessee in the Citrus Bowl.

Brattan got his start in coaching as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Delaware, in 1972. After one year in Newark, he took his first full-time coaching post at Highland Springs (Va.) High School as an offensive line coach. After three years (1973-75) at Highland Springs, he moved back to his home state of Delaware and took his first head coaching job at McKean High School in 1977. He spent one year at McKean - the same high school that helped produce Maryland legend Randy White - before moving

back to Virginia and taking over as the head coach at Lloyd C. Bird High School. After serving at Bird in 1978, he returned to Highland Springs -- this time as a head coach -- for his final four years (1979-82) at the prep level.

A native of Newark, Del., Brattan is a 1972 graduate of his hometown school where he earned his bachelor's degree in history and later earned his master's degree in education in 1977. He was a member of the Blue Hen football team, lettering in 1971. He and his wife, Anne, have three children -- Kristen, Kate and Megan.

# Keith Dudzinski

## Inside Linebackers

New Haven '91 • First Year at Maryland

A long-time defensive coordinator, Keith Dudzinski is in his first season as a Maryland assistant coach. Dudzinski, who came to College Park in February, oversees the inside linebackers.

He served as the defensive coordinator at UMass-Amherst the last seven years, his second stop at the school and second career stint as a coordinator, and the Minutemen maintained one of the top units in the nation during that span.

UMass finished among the top 20 in total defense three times (third in 2005; 20th in 2006; 13th in 2007) and the Minutemen were also first nationally in scoring defense in 2005 and fifth in 2006.

Dudzinski has coached a number of standout performers.

UMass linebacker Tyler Holmes was a finalist for the 2010 Buck Buchanan Award, honoring the top defensive player in the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS).

In 2009, Holmes had a tremendous season as he was named All-Colonial Athletic Association after racking up 100 tackles. In 2008, guided by Dudzinski UMass had one of the top linebacker corps in the nation led by first team all-conference selection Josh Jennings who racked up 90 tackles.

The 2007 season was no different as the Minutemen led the CAA in total defense (309.6 yards per game), scoring defense (19.2 points per game), sacks, tackles for loss and passing efficiency defense. The UMass defense had five first-team All-CAA selections that year including linebackers Jason Hatchell and Charles Walker, who both worked directly with Dudzinski.

Hatchell was an All-American and Buchanan Award candidate in 2007 after piling up 115 tackles. He finished his career with 360 stops, sixth in UMass history. Walker had a team-high 116 tackles in 2007 and finished ninth in career stops (340).

UMass' defense was impressive throughout the 2006 season as the Minutemen advanced to the National Championship game. The Minutemen led the nation in scoring defense until that championship game, finishing fifth, giving up 13.3 points per game. The Minutemen finished in the top 20 nationally in nine defensive statistics.

Dudzinski worked directly with three all-league linebackers in Hatchell, Walker and Brad Anderson. All three players racked up more than 100 tackles on the season. Hatchell, also an All-American that season, emerged as one of the nation's top tacklers after finishing second in the conference with 134 stops.

The Minuteman had a league-best 20 all-conference honorees in 2006, including eight on defense.

During his second season in Amherst, Mass., Dudzinski oversaw a defense which led the nation in fewest points allowed (13.3 ppg). The Minutemen also led the Atlantic 10

in five defensive categories and ranked in the nation's top five in four. UMass topped the conference in total yardage defense, passing defense, pass efficiency defense, net punting and scoring defense.

Working with the linebackers, he coached two A-10 second-team honorees in two-time team captain Serge Tikum and Hatchell, who had a team-high 107 tackles. The defense also included two-time consensus first-team All-American Shannon James and all-league selections defensive end Keron Williams and safety James Ihedigbo.

In 2004, Dudzinski headed up a defense which featured consensus first-team All-American Shannon James, who led the nation in interceptions.

Dudzinski spent two seasons (2002-03) as linebackers coach at Northeastern, including defensive coordinator his final year.

He directed the career of first team All-American and two-time first team All-Atlantic 10 selection Liam Ezekiel, who made 140 total tackles in 2003.

During the 2002 season, the Huskies allowed opponents only 299.3 total yards and 16.0 points per game. During the 2002 campaign, Dudzinski helped lead Northeastern to a record of 10-3, a share of the Atlantic 10 Conference title and the school's first-ever trip to the NCAA Division I-AA (now FCS) Playoffs.

During his first stint as an assistant coach at UMass under Mark Whipple, Dudzinski served in a variety of roles on the defensive side of the ball. He coached the secondary in 2001, the linebackers in 1999 and 2000, and the defensive line in 1998. He also oversaw the special teams his final three seasons.

Dudzinski guided the career of Kole Ayi, who was a two-time first team All-American (1999-00) and two-time Buck Buchanan Award finalist.

Dudzinski first joined the UMass staff after spending four years at Brown under Whipple as the defensive line coach for the Bears. Dudzinski helped the Brown defense hold opponents to just 194 total points during the 1997 season (19.4 points per game) -- the fewest number of points allowed by the school in 10 years. While at Brown, he helped develop two-time first-team All-Ivy defensive tackle Brendan Finneran (1996 and 1997).

Prior to coming to Brown, Dudzinski was a defensive assistant at New Haven under Whipple for three years (1991-93), working with the outside linebackers. He has also worked as an assistant coach at Kolbe Cathedral High School in Bridgeport, Conn., and St. Joseph's High School in Trumbull, Conn.

Dudzinski is a 1991 graduate of the University of New Haven, where he was an All-New England linebacker and team captain as a senior. He and his wife, Kathy, have one son, Jack, and two daughters, Mary Kathryn and Elizabeth.

# John Dunn

**Tight Ends/Recruiting Coordinator**  
**North Carolina '05 • First Year at Maryland**

A protégé of offensive coordinator Gary Crowton, John Dunn is in his first season with Maryland after stops at LSU and North Carolina.

Dunn, who spent the last three seasons as a graduate offensive assistant with the Tigers, is serving as the tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator.

The Hendersonville, N.C., native will coach an experienced group of tight ends this season with juniors Matt Furstenburg, Devonte Campbell and Ryan Schlothauer and sophomore Dave Stinebaugh all set to return after making key contributions in 2010.

At LSU, Dunn helped coach the tight ends, offensive line and quarterbacks and ran meetings with those position groups. Dunn also had primary responsibility for the assimilation of the playbook and all computer drawings, as well as all practice scripts and game plans.

In 2010, the Tigers went 11-2 and defeated Texas A&M in the Cotton Bowl, their fifth victory over a ranked opponent that season. In his three years at LSU, the Tigers had a 28-11 record and went 2-1 in bowl games.

Dunn also assisted with all on-campus recruiting for the Tigers, as they pulled in the No. 11 class in 2008, the No. 1 class in 2009 and the No. 8 class in 2010, according to ESPN.com's rankings.

Dunn walked on at North Carolina in 2001 and played there until 2003 before his career was cut short by a neck injury. He served as a student assistant while finishing his undergraduate studies. In his second season on the Tar Heel staff Dunn became a quality control assistant and then worked as a graduate coaching assistant on the offensive side of the ball his final two years (2006-07) in Chapel Hill.

At Carolina, Dunn helped tutor wide receiver Hakeem Nicks who finished the '07 season ranked in the top 35 nationally in receptions (6.2) and receiving yards per game (79.83) while earning All-ACC first team honors. Nicks was taken 29th overall by the New York Giants in the 2009 NFL Draft.

Dunn, who is married to the former Lindsay Moffitt, played quarterback and tight end for the Tar Heels, lettering in 2003.

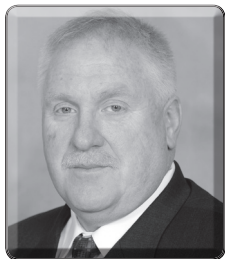

# Greg Gattuso

**Defensive Line**

**Penn State '83 • First Year at Maryland**

The former head coach of Duquesne (1992-04), Greg Gattuso is in his first year as the defensive line coach at Maryland after spending the last six seasons at the University of Pittsburgh.

Gattuso has a long history of success, winning a national title in 1982 as a defensive lineman at Penn State, leading Duquesne to a 97-32 record during his head-coaching tenure and building Pittsburgh's defensive line into one of the best in the nation as an assistant head coach. He has also developed a name as a top recruiter, having hauled in a top-10 class while serving as recruiting coordinator at Pittsburgh.

During his time at Pittsburgh, Gattuso turned the Panthers' defensive line into one of the team's major strengths. The last two seasons, the line was one of the top sack producers in the nation.

Brandon Lindsey (10.0) and Jabaal Sherard (9.0) both ranked in the top 20 nationally in sacks during the 2010 regular season and Pittsburgh led the nation in that category in 2009 (3.6 per game).

Sheard was the 2010 Big East Defensive Player of the Year, the second straight season Gattuso coached the award winner. Pitt defensive linemen Greg Romeus and Mick Williams shared the award in 2009.

Three starters on Pitt's defensive front were honored on the 2009 All-Big East Team, as tackle Gus Mustakas earned second-team honors.

Gattuso initially joined the Pitt staff as tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator in 2005. In his first season, he helped the Panthers sign a recruiting class rated 10th in the nation by Scout.com, 16th by ESPN.com and 21st by Rivals.com. He began coaching the defensive line in 2006 and was promoted to assistant head coach in 2008.

Prior to his time at Pitt, Gattuso had a successful 12-year stint as head coach at Duquesne University, where he built the Dukes into one of the elite I-AA football programs in the nation. The winningest coach in school history, the Dukes went 97-32 (.752) under his direction, won eight Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) titles, made five bowl appearances and captured the 2003 consensus Mid-Major Division I-AA national championship.

The Western Pennsylvania native was twice named the national Mid-Major I-AA Coach of the Year and was a seven-time MAAC Coach of the Year. The Dukes dominated the conference during his tenure, going 66-7 (.904) in league play, including a 33-game winning streak.

Gattuso was an assistant coach at Duquesne in 1992 before taking over the head coaching post the following year.

From 1989-91, he served as head coach at his high school alma mater, Seton-LaSalle. Taking over a team that went 6-34 during the four seasons prior to his arrival, Gattuso led the Rebels to a 28-10-1 mark (.731), including three WPIAL playoff berths, a WPIAL championship and Parkway Conference title.

During his playing career, Gattuso was named the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette's* Class AA Player of the Year his senior season at Seton-LaSalle and was a two-time All-East defensive lineman at Penn State. He was a member of the Lions' 1982 national title team and graduated in 1983 with a bachelor's degree in administration and criminal justice.

Gattuso and his wife Colleen have two daughters, Jacqueline and Kaitlin.

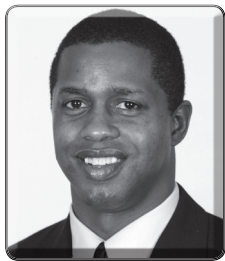

# Lee Hull

## Wide Receivers

**Holy Cross '88 • Fourth Year at Maryland**

With a background that includes a professional playing career and a diverse coaching resume, Lee Hull is in his fourth season as wide receivers coach at Maryland.

Hull, who spent the previous five seasons as an assistant coach at Oregon State University, tutored some of the top receivers in Maryland history the last three years.

In his first season in College Park, Hull helped prepare first-round NFL Draft pick Darrius Heyward-Bey for the next level and oversaw a unit which featured senior standouts Isaiah Williams and Danny Oquendo.

Under Hull's guidance, Torrey Smith was a two-time All-Atlantic Coast Conference performer. Smith posted 67 receptions for 1,055 receiving yards and a school-record 12 touchdown catches in 2010. Smith was selected by the Baltimore Ravens in the second round of the 2011 NFL Draft, making it two Terrapin receivers taken in the first two rounds over the last three seasons.

He has also groomed a number of youngsters including Kevin Dorsey, Tony Logan, Ronnie Tyler and Quintin McCree, all of whom should play important roles this season.

Hull also has experience coaching other positions.

He tutored running backs his first two seasons in Corvallis and wide receivers the last three. He coached three OSU All-Americans, including a pair of wideouts, and was a part of four bowl wins.

The 45-year-old had three receivers catch 30 or more passes in 2007, including Darrell Catchings, who was a freshman All-American along with fellow wideout James Rodgers.

In 2006, he coached Sammie Stroughter to All-America status in one of Oregon State's best seasons. The Beavers posted a 10-4 record, second-best in school history, including a win over Missouri in the Sun Bowl. That season, Stroughter led the Pac-10 Conference and ranked 10th in the country in receiving yards per game (92.4).

Stroughter was on the watch list for the 2007 Biletnikoff Award, which honors the top receiver in the nation. He went on to be selected in the 2009 NFL Draft by Tampa Bay.

In Hull's first season in charge of OSU wide receivers, Mike Hass ended his stellar career as a first-team All-America selection and the winner of the 2005 Biletnikoff Award. Hass posted the third-highest receiving yards total (3,924) in league history. He is currently a member of the Seattle Seahawks.

Hull also coached current St. Louis Rams' running back Steven Jackson during the 2003 season. Jackson was a first-team All-Pac-10 and third-team All-America choice as a junior, his final season at OSU. He was a first-round draft choice in the 2004 NFL Draft.

Prior to his five seasons at Oregon State, Hull spent five years (1998-2002) at his alma mater, the College of the Holy Cross. He coached linebackers for one season before becoming wide receivers coach, as well as overseeing the kickoff coverage and kickoff return units. He also went on to become the passing game coordinator.

Hull was a standout wide receiver at Holy Cross from 1984-87, playing under former Maryland coach Mark Duffner his final two seasons. The Crusaders posted a 21-1 record his last two years and were ranked No. 1 in Division I-AA in 1987. Holy Cross also won the Colonial League title and the Lambert Cup that season. He was a preseason All-America choice as a junior.

He went on to play professionally with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the CFL. Hull spent 1990-92 with Winnipeg where he was coached by Mike Riley in his first season. Riley was the head coach at Oregon State during Hull's five-year tenure. The Blue Bombers won the 1990 Grey Cup. He also played for Toronto in 1992.

Hull was also a free-agent signee of the New England Patriots in 1998.

Prior to joining Holy Cross, he coached at the prep level in Massachusetts for five years. He was offensive coordinator at South High School in Worcester, Mass., for three years (1992-94) and the passing game coordinator at Auburn High School in 1995. He returned to South High in 1996 as head coach.

During his coaching career, Hull has participated in a number of internships. In 1999 he interned in the CFL. In 2000 and 2001 he took part in the NFL's Minority Internship Program. In addition, he attended the 2007 Minority Coaches Forum in Chandler, Ariz.

Hull earned his bachelor's degree in economics from Holy Cross in 1988 and a master's in secondary education from Worcester State in 1995.

He had a stellar high school career as both a football player and track performer.

A native of Vineland, N.J., Hull lettered twice as a wide receiver for Vineland High School. He was selected All-Cape League, first-team All-South Jersey, first-team All-New Jersey Group-4, honorable mention all-state and the Vineland Student-Athlete of the Year. He was a long jumper and ran the 400 meters.

Hull and his wife, Stacey, have two sons, Alexander and Jordan, and one daughter, Laila.

# Lyndon Johnson

**Special Teams/Outside Linebackers**  
**Connecticut '92 • First Year at Maryland**

After spending 12 seasons in a variety of roles on head coach Randy Edsall's staff at Connecticut, Lyndon Johnson enters his first season at Maryland coaching special teams and outside linebackers.

The UConn graduate coached tight ends and special teams his first three seasons (1999-01) with the Huskies before handling the outside linebackers his final nine years. He also coached special teams from 2005 through 2010.

Johnson had the top kick returner in the nation this past season in Nick Williams who averaged 35.3 yards per attempt and had two touchdowns. As a team the Huskies ranked third nationally in kickoff returns, bolstering a run to the Big East Championship and a berth in the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.

The Huskies were ninth in the FBS in kickoff returns in 2009 (25.8 yards per return) while setting a school record with three returns for touchdown, and Robert McClain ranked 18th nationally in punt returns (12.6 ypr).

UConn's special teams also aided its run to the 2007 Big East Championship. The team returned two punts for touchdowns and also returned two kickoffs for touchdowns. The season saw Tony Ciaravino score an even 100 points, a record for a UConn kicker, and punter Desi Cullen record a 40.7 yard average, fifth-best in UConn history.

Cullen concluded his career in 2009 and had the career record for punting average with 41.1 yards per punt and set the single-season record at 42.8.

During the 2007 and '08 seasons, Johnson coached linebacker Scott Lutrus to postseason honors. Lutrus was a first-team Freshman All-America selection after the 2007 campaign and an All-Big East pick in 2008.

Johnson began his coaching career at Brien McMahon High School in Norwalk, Conn., where he spent four seasons (1993-96) including the final two as defensive coordinator.

He made his collegiate coaching debut at Sacred Heart in Bridgeport, Conn., where he served as defensive coordinator in 1997, before moving on to Fordham to coach the defensive line in 1998.

Johnson, a four-year letterwinner for UConn from 1989-1992, started all 33 games on the offensive line over his final three seasons. He served as team captain in 1991 and was named the team's Most Valuable Offensive Player that year. He was a second team All-Yankee Conference pick in 1989 and a second team All-ECAC selection in 1990.

A native of Norwalk, Conn., Johnson received his degree in sociology from UConn in 1992. He and his wife Cynthia have two sons, Taren and Trace.

# Andre Powell

## Running Backs

Indiana '89 • First Year at Maryland

After spending the last four seasons at Clemson where he coached running backs and coordinated the special teams his final three years, Andre Powell is in his first season with Maryland.

Powell, who coaches the Terrapin running backs, has 20 years of experience coaching college football and is making his fourth stop in the Atlantic Coast Conference. In addition to his four seasons with the Tigers, Powell coached at Virginia (1996-00) and North Carolina (2001-06).

At Clemson, he coached unanimous first-team All-American running back and return specialist C.J. Spiller, helping him become the No. 9 overall selection of the Buffalo Bills in the 2010 NFL Draft. Spiller was the ACC Player of the Year in 2009 and finished his career No. 2 in NCAA FBS history in all-purpose running.

Spiller ranked in the top 15 in the FBS in kickoff returns in each of his final three years (2007-09) and became the first running back in ACC history with 1,000 rushing yards and 500 receiving yards in the same season (2009). He also set the FBS record for career kickoff returns for touchdowns (seven) and tied the record for total kick returns for a score (eight).

Powell also tutored All-ACC running back James Davis in 2007 and 2008, who along with Spiller, is among the top three rushers in Clemson history.

Along with the success of his running backs, Powell oversaw a kickoff-return unit that finished in the top 25 nationally his first three seasons and in the top 40 in 2010. In 2009, the Tigers ranked seventh in the country in punt returns, including a pair of touchdowns.

In addition, Clemson was 113th in the nation in kickoff return yardage defense the year before Powell arrived in Death Valley. The first year he took over the unit (2008) the Tigers were No. 47 nationally and the following season they reached No. 24 in the country.

That success translated to consistent winning as the Tigers went to a bowl game every year Powell was at Clemson and finished in the top 25 of the final AP poll in 2007 and 2009.

While at North Carolina, Powell coached a future NFL standout in running back Willie Parker, as well as Ronnie McGill, who finished his career 10th in school history with 2,393 rushing yards.

Powell also coached kickoff returns for the Tar Heels, steering that unit to No. 7 national ranking in 2005 and second in the ACC in 2006.

Prior to his time at North Carolina, Powell spent five seasons with the Cavaliers where he coached the running backs in 1996, the wide receivers from 1997-99 and the running backs again in 2000. At Virginia, he tutored future NFL players Tiki Barber, Germaine Crowell, Thomas Jones, Charles Kirby, Pat Washington and Terrence Wilkins.

Powell also had two different stints as an assistant coach at Army (1991, 95), along with graduate assistant positions at Indiana (1989) and South Carolina (1990). He coached running backs for the first time at Virginia Military (1992) and spent two seasons (1993-94) coaching the same unit at Rhode Island.

A native of Lockhart, S.C., Powell played two seasons at Lees-McRae (1984-85) prior to earning two letters at Indiana where he was a member of two bowl teams (1986 All-American; 1988 Peach Bowl). He earned Indiana's Most Improved Player award during his senior season and was the lead blocker for 1,000-yard rusher Anthony Thompson that season.

Powell earned a bachelor's of science degree in health, physical education & recreation from Indiana in 1989. He and his wife Joann have a son, Andre II, and two daughters, Alayna and Mikala.

BALTIMORE - Navy dominated the time of possession, outgained Maryland by nearly 200 yards and made 15 more first downs.

None of this lessened the enjoyment the Terrapins derived from their 17-14 victory.

Kenny Tate stopped Ricky Dobbs at the goal line with 34 seconds left, and Maryland stunned their in-state rivals to break a seven-game losing streak that began last October.

The Midshipmen (0-1) held the ball for nearly 19 minutes longer than Maryland (1-0), amassed 485 yards and collected 26 first downs. But in a game influenced by untimely turnovers and huge penalties, the outcome was decided by a gritty goal-line stand.

Trailing 17-14 with a fourth down at the 1, Navy decided to go for the win. Dobbs took the snap, went to his left and was met by Tate, who would not relent to the momentum Dobbs brought to the line.

Maryland raced to a 14-0 lead in the first quarter and then held on behind a defense that repeatedly excelled after Navy got inside the 20.

The Midshipmen had a 7 1/2-minute edge in time of possession in the first half, yet trailed 14-7 after coming up empty on drives of 52, 63 and 66 yards.

In the second half, Dobbs lost a fumble at the Maryland 1 and was stuffed by Tate on the game's pivotal play. Dobbs ran for 63 yards and a touchdown, but the senior quarterback fumbled three times -- losing two of them at the Maryland 1.

Navy didn't punt until early in the fourth quarter, and the short kick was returned 57 yards by Tony Logan to the Navy 16.

Maryland promptly fumbled the ball away on a missed exchange.

The Midshipmen pulled even at 14 with 1:52 left in the third quarter when Dobbs scored from the 1 on a drive that began with wide receiver Greg Jones running 53 yards on a reverse.

A crowd of 69,348 showed up for the second meeting between the teams since 1965.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - With Maryland coming off an emotional win and playing with only four days rest, coach Ralph Friedgen was worried about how the Terrapins would fare against in-state foe Morgan State. He got the answer rather quickly.

Maryland scored on its first three possessions Saturday night, and the Terrapins enjoyed their highest-scoring performance in 35 years with a 62-3 rout.

Despite the quick turnaround following Monday's win over Navy, the Terrapins reached the 62-point mark for the first time since a 62-24 blowout against Virginia on Nov. 22, 1975. It was also Maryland's largest victory margin since a 61-0 win over the Citadel on Sept. 13, 2003.

Maryland has already matched its victory total from last season and owns its first winning streak since 2008.

Morgan State (1-1) gained only six yards in the first half and finished with 85 - the fewest allowed by Maryland since Friedgen arrived in 2001.

Morgan State's lone score came on a 39-yard field goal by Kemar Scarlett in the third quarter.

Maryland backup quarterback Danny O'Brien entered for starter Jamarr Robinson in the second quarter with the score 24-0. On his third play, O'Brien unleashed his first career throw: a 27-yard touchdown pass to wide-open tight end Matt Furstenburg.

A 37-yard punt return by Tony Logan led to a 24-yard TD pass from O'Brien to Torrey Smith, and O'Brien closed out Maryland's prolific first half by connecting with running back Da'Rel Scott on a 22-yard score.

Robinson also had his first game with multiple touchdown passes, connecting with Smith on a 5-yarder and Adrian Cannon for 19 yards to end Maryland's first two possessions.

Late in the first quarter, a 6-yard punt by the Bears set up a 47-yard field goal by Travis Baltz for a 17-0 lead.

With the Bears backed up on their own 11, Maryland's Demetrius Hartsfield intercepted a Dickerson pass at the 14 and coasted into the end zone for a 24-0 lead.

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. - Jamarr Robinson had third-quarter touchdown passes of 60 and 80 yards to Torrey Smith, but a fast start lifted No. 21 West Virginia past Maryland, 31-17, on Saturday.

Geno Smith threw a career-high four touchdown passes for the Mountaineers, while Noel Devine rushed for a season-high 131 yards.

Smith, a sophomore making his third career start, had two scoring tosses apiece to sophomore Tavon Austin and redshirt freshman Stedman Bailey as West Virginia (3-0) jumped ahead 28-0 early in the third quarter.

Except for Geno Smith's 5-yard scoring toss to Bailey to start the third quarter, West Virginia struggled on offense after halftime as it tried to eat up clock time. Smith finished 19 of 29 for 268 yards.

Torrey Smith caught three passes for 149 yards. His TD catches cut Maryland's deficit to 28-14. Terps added a 35-yard field goal from Travis Baltz in the fourth quarter.

West Virginia then put the game out of reach behind fullback Ryan Clarke, who carried eight straight times on the ensuing 16-play drive that ate up nearly nine minutes of clock and ended with Tyler Bitancourt's 23-yard field goal with three minutes left for the final margin.

Maryland was trying for a 3-0 start for the first time since coach Ralph Friedgen's first season in 2001.

Austin had a big day against the Terrapins with seven catches for 106 yards to add to his team-leading totals. Early in the game, he caught a 15-yard pass, threw a key block that sprang Devine on a 50-yard run, then caught a 6-yard scoring pass from Smith on a crossing route.

After West Virginia got the ball back near midfield, Geno Smith avoided the blitz and hit Sanders on a 32-yard pass play to set up Smith's 5-yard TD toss to a wide-open Austin for a 14-0 lead.

Bailey took over from there, stretching high to snare a 26-yard scoring pass in the back of the end zone early in the second.

Maryland entered the game averaging 241 yards rushing but was held to minus-10. Bruce Irvin had three of West Virginia's eight sacks.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Maryland was in desperate need of a big play when Tony Logan wrapped his arms around a punt at his own 16-yard line.

Eight-four yards later, the Terrapins had their first lead against Duke.

Logan's electrifying punt return in the third quarter provided Maryland with the push it needed, and the Terrapins opened the ACC portion of their schedule with a 21-16 victory.

Maryland (4-1, 1-0) trailed 9-0 midway in the second quarter and 9-7 at halftime before coming back. Logan's touchdown made it 14-9, and the Terps held on.

Logan sidestepped a potential tackler immediately after catching the punt. He then headed upfield, juke to his left and then cut right at his own 25 before sprinting down the sideline to the end zone. It was Logan's second punt return for a score in two weeks.

Duke (1-4, 0-2) lost for the fourth-straight time. Sophomore Sean Renfree completed 28 of 56 passes for 351 yards and a touchdown, but he was intercepted twice.

Donovan Varner had eight catches for 128 yards, and Conner Vernon gained 99 yards on six receptions.

A 2-yard touchdown pass from Renfree to Brandon King made it 21-16 with 7:20 to go, and after a Maryland punt the Blue Devils moved from their own 19 to the Maryland 39 with two minutes left. Facing a fourth-and-15, Renfree threw a pass to Austin Kelly that was tipped away.

Duke has been tormented this season by too many turnovers and the Terrapins got their first touchdown late in the first half following an interception, and in the second half Logan and Scott scored on long plays.

But the Duke defense - which was allowing 44.5 points per game - made it tough on O'Brien, who was playing in place of injured starter Jamarr Robinson for a second straight week. O'Brien went 9 for 26 for 170 yards, including his TD pass to Scott.

Davin Meggett capped off an eight-play, 80-yard drive with a 3-yard TD plunge which cut Duke's lead to 9-7 with under two minutes left in the first half.

Will Snyderwine kicked three first-half field goals when the Maryland defense stiffened in the red zone three times.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Danny O'Brien threw a career-high four touchdown passes, Kenny Tate and Ryan Donohue each scored on interception returns and Maryland rolled past Wake Forest 62-14 to become bowl eligible.

The Terrapins (6-2, 3-1 ACC) scored on their first four possessions and blocked two punts in taking a 27-7 halftime lead. During a 28-point third quarter, Tate and Donohue sandwiched their scores around a touchdown pass by O'Brien to assure Wake Forest (2-6, 1-4) its sixth straight defeat.

It was Maryland's most lopsided ACC win since a 59-7 rout of North Carolina in 2002, and the 62 points tied the school record for a conference game, set in 1975 in a 62-24 win over Virginia.

O'Brien, a redshirt freshman, went 13 for 20 for 168 yards before being lifted in the third quarter. He has seven touchdown passes in his last two games and 12 overall.

Davin Meggett ran for 94 yards and a touchdown for the Terrapins, whose sixth win made them bowl eligible for the seventh time in 10 years under Friedgen.

Wake Forest freshman quarterback Tanner Price completed 16 of 31 passes for 156 yards and a touchdown. Backup Skylar Jones played briefly in the third quarter, but one of his three passes was picked off by Donohue, who took it 25 yards into the end zone.

Wake's running game was held down by Maryland, finishing with minus-3 yards on 21 attempts. Josh Harris, coming off a 241-yard rushing performance against Virginia Tech, was limited to 24 yards on nine carries.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. -- D.J. Adams ran for three touchdowns and Danny O'Brien ran for one and threw for two, leading Maryland to a 42-23 victory against Virginia.

The Terrapins (7-3, 4-2 ACC) remained in control of their chance to play in their first ACC championship game. Maryland will gain the Atlantic Division's berth if they win their final regular season games, both at home, against Florida State and North Carolina State.

Virginia (4-6, 1-5) saw its three-game winning streak in the series end on Senior Day, and lost to its northern border rival for only the fifth time in the last 19 meetings.

Adams scored his third touchdown on a 2-yard run just 35 seconds into the fourth quarter, capping a drive kept alive by a pass that went through the hands of Virginia linebacker Darnell Carter and into the arms of LaQuan Williams for a 26-yard gain on third-and-14.

Two interceptions of Virginia's Marc Verica followed on the Cavaliers' ensuing possessions, and O'Brien hit Torrey Smith with a 12-yard TD pass with 2:35 remaining.

The Terps freshman finished 17 for 28 for 289 yards, and Smith caught seven for 157 yards. Verica was mistake-free before the final quarter, and was 25 for 43 for 265 yards.

The Terps led 21-20 at halftime, and all three scoring drives included a long pass.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. -- Christian Ponder threw for 170 yards and a touchdown, and Florida State beat Maryland 30-16 to remain in the hunt to play in the ACC title game.

The Terrapins (7-4, 4-3) were eliminated from contention. Maryland, which became the last ACC team to lose at home this season, needed to beat the Seminoles and Wolfpack to win the division crown for the first time.

Down 23-16, Maryland drove to the Florida State 19 in the final minute before Nick Moody intercepted a fourth-down pass by redshirt freshman Danny O'Brien and took it 90 yards for the clinching score with 36 seconds left.

The Seminoles took advantage of four Maryland turnovers, including two interceptions and a fumble in the fourth quarter after FSU took a 20-16 lead. The Terrapins came in with an ACC-low eight turnovers in 10 games.

Neither team led by more than seven points until the closing seconds and the lead changed hands three times.

Chris Thompson ran for 95 yards, including a 70-yard touchdown, Ponder completed 16 of 26 passes and Bert Reed had six catches for 93 yards and a touchdown for the Seminoles.

Da'Rel Scott gained 84 yards rushing for the Terrapins and Davin Meggett ran for 72 yards. O'Brien went 25 for 45 for 269 yards and a touchdown.

Maryland took a 16-13 lead in the third quarter on a 32-yard field goal by Travis Baltz after Thompson lost a fumble at the FSU 47.

Florida State answered with a 44-yard touchdown pass from Ponder to Reed, who caught a short throw over the middle and weaved his way into the end zone.

Greg Reid then intercepted a pass by O'Brien at the Maryland 43. The Seminoles punted, but the kick hit Maryland's Cameron Chism and was recovered by FSU. That led by a field goal by Dustin Hopkins for a 23-16 lead with 4:37 left.

The Terrapins wore black helmets for the first time this season, along with black jerseys and pants with camouflage trim to support the Wounded Warrior Project. Maryland fans were also dressed in black.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Danny O'Brien threw for a career-high 417 yards and four touchdowns, all to Torrey Smith, and Maryland denied No. 21 North Carolina State a spot in the Atlantic Coast Conference title game by defeating the Wolfpack, 38-31.

Needing a victory to win the league's Atlantic Division, the Wolfpack (8-4, 5-3) scored touchdowns on their first two possessions to take a 14-0 lead. But the Terrapins (8-4, 5-3) rallied behind O'Brien, who made up for a running game that finished with negative yardage.

North Carolina State ended up in a second-place tie with Maryland behind Florida State, which will face Virginia Tech in the championship game on Dec. 5.

O'Brien, a redshirt freshman, completed 33 of 47 passes in the first 400-yard game by a Terp quarterback since Scott Milanovich in 1993.

Smith had a career-high 14 catches for 224 yards and became the first Maryland player with four touchdown receptions in a single game.

Smith scored on passes of 11, 10, 12 and 71 yards. The last touchdown came with 6:26 left immediately after Maryland's Drew Gloster sacked Russell Wilson on a fourth-down play from the Maryland 8 with the Terrapins ahead 31-17.

Wilson scored on a 1-yard run with 2:39 remaining. The Wolfpack recovered the onside kick and Wilson threw a TD pass with 1:16 left, but Maryland pounced on the ensuing onside kick.

Travis Baltz had the wind behind him when he kicked a career-long 52-yard field goal to put the Terrapins up 17-14 at halftime.

Maryland made it 24-14 in the third quarter when O'Brien capped an 80-yard drive with a pass to Smith, who wriggled free in the left side of the end zone. O'Brien completed four passes on the drive, including three to Smith for 44 yards.

WASHINGTON - The Maryland Terrapins forced four turnovers and Da'Rel Scott ran for 200 yards with a 51-20 victory over East Carolina in the Military Bowl.

Scott had second-half touchdown runs of 61 and 91 yards on back-to-back offensive plays and posted the school's first 200-yard rushing game since 2003. D.J. Adams had four short touchdown runs for the Terrapins, who finished 9-4.

Dominique Davis completed 33 of 54 passes for 255 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions for East Carolina (6-7), which scored a season-low in points and committed 15 penalties.

The first half included 12 penalties, four turnovers, a blocked extra point and a missed 25-yard field goal. The Terrapins scored on a 45-yard touchdown pass from ACC rookie of the year Danny O'Brien to Kevin Dorsey, a 1-yard run by Adams and a 23-yard field goal by Travis Baltz.

East Carolina didn't score until Mike Barbour's 37-yard field goal with 6:08 left in the half - the longest the Pirates had gone into a game without scoring this season.

The Terrapins began scoring at will in the second half. They added to a 16-3 halftime lead when David Mackall returned a tipped interception 35 yards to East Carolina's 1, setting up Adams' second touchdown.

Dwayne Harris' 36-yard punt return led to East Carolina's first touchdown, a 20-yard pass to Lance Lewis that made the score 23-10, but the Terrapins responded with a 69-yard drive capped by another touchdown from Adams.

Scott ran up the middle untouched for a 61-yard score on the first play of a drive late in the third quarter, and did virtually the same from 91 yards on the first play of the next drive early in the fourth.
