SEVENTH-SEEDED TERPS HOST UMBC IN FIRST ROUND OF NCAA TOURNAMENT

- The No. 7 seeded Maryland men's lacrosse team hosts unseeded UMBC in the NCAA Tournament First Round this Sunday at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium. Face-off is set for 7:30 p.m., as the Terps (10-5 overall) battle the Retrievers (10-5) for the first time in post-season play. Live audio feeds of the game will be available via WMUCSports.com, Maryland's student radio station. Live stats of the game will be available on umterps.com.
- The Terps are making their 30th NCAA Tournament appearance, the second most of any school in NCAA history. Maryland returns to the event after back-to-back trips to the NCAA Semifinals in 2005 and 2006. UMBC is making just its fourth appearance in the NCAA men's lacrosse tournament after earning an at-large bid out of the America East Conference.
- The winner of the Maryland/UMBC game will take on the winner of the No. 3 seed Virginia (12-3)/Delaware (11-5) game on Sunday, May 20 at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium in Annapolis, Md.. The Cavaliers and Blue Hens play in Charlottesville, Va., on Sunday, May 13 at 5 p.m. at Klöckner Stadium. The other quarterfinal in Annapolis will pit the winner of the No. 1 Duke (14-2)/Providence (7-9) game against the winner of the No. 8 North Carolina (9-5)/Navy (11-3) game.

MARYLAND'S 30TH TIME AT NCAA'S

- Maryland is making its 30th overall NCAA Tournament appearance in 2007. The Terps have played in the second-most tournaments since the event began in 1971. Only Hopkins has played in more with 35. UMBC is making its fourth NCAA appearance.
- In the first round of the tournament, the Terrapins have a 9-2 (.818) record overall. Maryland has also received six byes into the second round.
- The Terps have captured two NCAA championships, 1973 and 1975, and have now reached the NCAA Semifinals 19 times, including three of the last four years.

MARYLAND'S RECORD IN NCAA'S

- The Terps have won the third-most Division I NCAA Tournament games, compiling a 39-27 overall record in 66 games. Only Johns Hopkins (57-27) and Syracuse (50-18) have won more Division I games.
- Maryland is fourth by percentage (.591) among all teams ever to play in the tournament (Syracuse (50-18, .746), Princeton (29-10, .744), and Johns Hopkins (57-27, .679) are ahead).
- The Terps have captured two titles. Only six other schools have ever won the NCAA Championship: Syracuse (9), Johns Hopkins (8), Princeton (6), North Carolina (4), Cornell (3), Virginia (3).

MARYLAND AS THE NO. 7 SEED

- This marks the third time that Maryland has been named the No. 7 seed in the NCAA tournament. Maryland is 2-2 all-time as the No. 7 seed.
- The Terps were previously a No. 7 seed in 1982 and 1991. In 1982, Maryland lost a first round game to Johns Hopkins by a 14-9 margin. In 1991, Maryland advanced to the Final Four, but lost to Towson, 15-11, in the semifinals.

COTTLE IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

- This is **Dave Cottle's** fifth NCAA Tournament appearance as the head coach of Maryland. He is coaching his 19th team to the NCAA Tournament, with the first 14 coming during his stint at Loyola. All 14 of his appearances with the Greyhounds came consecutively starting with the 1988 season and going through the 2001 campaign.
- Overall, Cottle is 15-18 in NCAA Tournament games, which ranks him third among all coaches in the 2007 tournament in wins. Only Princeton's Bill Tierney (29-10) and Virginia's Dom Starsia (25-15) have more tournament wins to their credit among this year's crop.
- With his 19th tournament appearance, Cottle is tied for first place on the all-time list for most NCAA Tournament Division I appearances as a head coach with Syracuse's Roy Simmons Jr., Virginia's Dom Starsia and Towson's Tony Seaman. With his streak of 14-consecutive tournaments while at Loyola, Cottle is behind only to Simmons Jr. (19) and Bill Tierney (15), for the longest-consecutive steak.
- Cottle has led his teams to the NCAA Quarterfinals on 16 occasions and to the NCAA semifinals five times, making an appearance in the 1990 championship game where Loyola fell to Syracuse, 21-9. He also reached the NCAA semifinals as the No. 1 seed with Loyola, but lost to Maryland, 19-8, at Byrd Stadium on May 23, 1998. At Maryland he has now lead the Terps to three semifinal berths, falling to eventual champion Virginia, 14-4, at M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore on May 24, 2003, a 18-9 loss to No. 2 seed Duke, 18-9, on May 28, 2005, and an 8-5 loss to UMass in 2006.

COACHING MATCH-UP

- Now in his 25th season as a head coach, **Dave Cottle** comes into the game with a 248-97 career record for a 71.9 win percentage, sixth-highest among active coaches. His win total is fifth among active coaches. He is 67-27 (71.3) in his six seasons at Maryland.
- Don Zimmerman is in his 21st season season as a head coach and holds a lifetime record of 173-103 (.627). He has been the head coach at UMBC for 14 years and is 100-89 (.529) with the Retrievers.
- Cottle has recorded an 18-2 career record against UMBC, 12-2 while he served as the head coach at Loyola. Prior to his 6-0 run at Maryland vs. UMBC, he last faced UMBC as he led his Loyola team to a 19-8 victory in 1996. Cottle has won every game against UMBC since 1988, including the last seven against current UMBC coach Don Zimmerman.

GORSKI FACES OLD TEAM

- Maryland volunteer assistant coach **Steve Gorski**, who works primarily with the goalies, lettered at UMBC from 1993-96 playing goalie and defense. He made 35 appearances with the Retrievers, starting 14 games in goal and stands 10th all-time in career saves with 224.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Jeremy Sieverts scored his first hat trick as a Terrapin to lead the 10th-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to an 11-7 win over No. 19 UMBC Saturday afternoon at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium.

Sieverts, a sophomore who transferred in from Butler when the Bulldogs dropped their men's lacrosse program in January, scored the game's first two goals to give the Terps a 2-0 lead. The first goal was unassisted as Sieverts beat Retriever goalie Jeremy Blevins on the short side with a spinning shot from the right side of the crease. His second score came at the 5:35 mark when he took a pass from freshman Adam Sear 12 yards out directly in front of the UMBC goal. Sieverts then drilled the shot into the top left corner of the net.

Midfielder Alex Hopmann got the Retrievers on the board with two minutes left in the first with a 13-yard blast off an assist from Terry Kimener. Kimener then tied the game early in the second quarter with his first of three goals on the day. Hopmann fired a shot wide of the Terps' goal, but Drew Westervelt was in the right place at the right time and picked up the groundball and quickly flipped a pass to a wide open Kimener, who was all alone on the right side of the crease for an easy score.

But that would be the last time the Retrievers were in the game as Maryland would rip off a 4-0 run over the next 10:57 to take control of the contest.

Sophomore Danny Gallagher got the run started with an unassisted goal, his sixth of the season, at the 11:55 mark of the second quarter. Sieverts tacked on his third of the game, off another assist from Sear, less than a minute later on a 10-yard shot.

Maryland's defense turned into offense to build the lead to three, 5-2, at the 9:19 mark. Junior Zach Hinton, who played both short-stick and long pole defensive midfield positions in the game, caused a Retriever turnover to begin the play. Freshman goalie Brian Phipps picked up the groundball and flipped a perfect outlet pass to All-America defender Ray Megill, who raced down the center of the field and bounced a shot past Blevins for his first career score. But the play almost didn't get to that point. As Megill approached midfield, senior All-America candidate Ryan Clarke realized Megill would have been offside and hustled back beyond the midfielder stripe, keeping Megill onside and letting the play continue for the goal.

The run concluded with Maryland's first extra-man opportunity of the day. UMBC's Dan Caramack was called for pushing at 6:24 and it only took the Terps 12 seconds to capitalize. Junior All-America candidate Max Ritz scored his first of two goals on the afternoon off an assist from sophomore midfielder Dan Groot to push the Maryland lead to 6-2.

UMBC cut the lead to three on Hopmann's second goal of the game, but Maryland responded with senior midfielder Chris Feifs taking a pass from Ritz and cashing in on another extra-man opportunity for a 7-3 Terp lead at the half.

After the break, Maryland went on another 4-0 run in the third quarter to put the game out of reach.

Feifs tied his career high with his second goal of the game off at the 11:09 mark. He drilled an open shot from the left alley off a perfect skip pass from the right side of the field from Groot.

UMBC looked to have a sure-fire goal at the 7:25 mark of the third quarter when a Maryland turnover gave Kimener a one-on-one with Brian Phipps. Kimener put a double-move on Phipps, faking a quick, low shot before shooting high. But Phipps stayed with the play the whole way and made a spectacular save, preserving the 8-3 lead.

Maryland picked up its first penalty of the game during the ensuing fight for the groundball, giving the Retrievers a man-up advantage. But the advantage proved to be the Terps' when Phipps made another tough save and starting the Maryland transition attack with another perfect outlet to Megill.

Megill pushed the ball into the UMBC zone and this time the Retrievers collapsed to the ball to cut off his path to the goal. But he was able to slip a pass past the oncoming defenders to a wide open Ritz in front of the UMBC goal, where he beat Blevins for a man-down goal and a 9-3 lead.

Michael Phipps finished the scoring for the Terps with a pair of goals as the quarter wound down. He scored an unassisted goal of the season at the 2:26 mark when he beat his defender around the back side of the Retriever goal and beat Blevins low on the short-side.

Phipps scored again to the lower left off the first-career assist of freshman Casey Creaney with just two seconds remaining in the quarter to give Maryland a commanding 11-3 lead.

The Retrievers refused to pack it in and scored four unanswered goals in the final quarter to make the final score 11-7.

Maryland's defense was solid once again, led by its close defense of All-American Steve Whittenberg, Megill and All-America candidate Joe Cinosky. That trio held UMBC's trio of attackmen, Westervelt, Andy Gallagher and Cayle Ratcliffe, to just two goals in the game. They had been averaging more than six goals per game in the Retrievers' first five games this season.

The Terps' freshmen defenders also had an impressive afternoon. Brian Phipps finished the game with 13 saves, his fourth-straight game with at least 13 stops, and four groundballs. Bryn Holmes played his usual physical game and ended up with three cause turnovers and a pair of groundballs. Brian Farrell did not get into the scoring column, but did draw plenty of attention when he drifted into the offensive zone, but did pick up three groundballs.

Game Notes:

- With today's 11-7 win Maryland is 24-4 all-time vs. UMBC and 11-3 all-time in College Park.
- With two goals and an assist Max Ritz now has 13 multi-goal and 19 multi-point games in his career.
- The three-point game is also Ritz's eighth-straight game with multiple points and his seventh-straight with at least three points.
- Michael Phipps pushed his point-scoring streak to eight games with his two-goal effort.
- Phipps' two goals gives him eight multi-goal and 17 multi-point games in his career.
- Jeremy Sieverts' hat trick was his first as a Terrapin and third overall for his career.
- Adam Sear extended his point-scoring streak to four games with a pair of assists.
- Maryland's "D" also shutout the Retrievers in the third quarter, giving the Terps their seventh shutout quarter of the season.

SERIES HISTORY VS. UMBC

- Maryland holds a 24-4 lifetime advantage in 28 meetings with state rival UMBC. Maryland has won the last eight games, 11-7 earlier this year, 9-4 last season at UMBC, 16-10 in 2005 at Byrd Stadium, 9-4 in 2004 at UMBC, 15-8 in College Park in 2003, 19-9 in 2002; 14-4 in the 2001 home finale at Ludwig Field and 15-7 in Catonsville on May 6, 2000. Those wins ended a two-year run of Terp losses to the Retrievers in 1998 and 1999.
- UMBC upset the then-No. 1 Terps in the regular-season finale in 1998, 12-8 at UMBC. They repeated the upset in the 1999 finale, winning 7-6 in College Park. Prior to that pair of losses, Maryland had won six meetings in a row from 1992-1997.
- Over the last eight wins, Maryland has outscored UMBC 108-53, for an average score of 13.5-6.6.
- Earlier this season, Maryland topped the Retrievers, 11-7, at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium. Sophomore midfielder **Jeremy Sieverts** scored his first hat trick as a Terp, while junior attackman **Max Ritz** chipped in with two goals and an assist. Senior defender **Ray Megill** scored the first points of his career with a goal and an assist.
- Last season the Terps entered the game as the No. 1 team in the nation and the Retrievers were looking for the upset. Maryland only led by one heading into the fourth quarter, but the Terrapin defense shutout UMBC for the final 15 minutes, allowing the offense to score four unanswered goals to take home a 9-4 win. The senior trio of Bill McGlone (2-2=4), Xander Ritz (3-0=3) and Joe Walters (3-0=3) were the main weapons for the Terrapins but it was junior attackman **Michael Phipps** that scored the game-winning goal.
- In 2005 Joe Walters tied then-career highs with six goals and seven points to lead No. 4 Maryland to a 16-10 win over the Retrievers at Byrd Stadium. First team All-American Bill McGlone also had a career day for the Terps, setting his career high with five goals in the victory. Brendan Healy scored twice and added a pair of assists, while long pole **Ryan Clarke** set his career high with six groundballs. The Terrapins dominated possession, thanks in large part to winning 20 of 29 face-offs. David Tamberrino won 14 of 18, tying his personal best for wins in a game.
- In 2004 Joe Walters lead the Terps to a hard-fought 9-4 win with a natural hat trick in the second quarter. The Maryland defense was sensational, holding UMBC scoreless for 29:12 bridging the second through the fourth quarters. Terp goalie Tim McGinnis made 13 saves, including eight in the fourth quarter to preserve the victory.
- In the 2003 game in College Park, Mike Mollot and Joe Walters each had three goals while former Retriever Justin Smith had two goals and two assists in his first game vs. his former team.
- This will be just the fourth time the two teams will play in the month of March. The 2003 game on April 25 was the first time since 1977, that Maryland-UMBC game was not be played in May. The UMBC game had been the last contest on Maryland's regular-season schedule for the 13 years, dating 1990 through 2002, with Maryland winning 10 of 13 regular-season finales.

- Separated by less than 30 miles, it's no coincidence that there are 16 former high school teammates that will be reunited on the field today.
- Not just high school teammates, the Gallagher family will have rooting interest on both sides of the field as big brother Andy, a UMBC senior attackman, will meet up with **Danny**, a sophomore attackman at Maryland for the second time in college.
- Calvert Hall, Mt. St. Joseph's and St. Mary's high schools will be represented by a combined 13 former student-athletes. Maryland's **Jeff Reynolds** (out for the season with a torn ACL) will have fellow Calvert Hall alums Jeremy Blevins and Michael Bryan. **Jason Carter** and **Will Dalton** will be reunited with fellow 2004 St. Mary's grad, UMBC junior Conor Devlin. James Hyland and Travis Bowman are also St. Mary's grads. Mt. St. Joseph's will have Maryland's **Kevin Slafkosky** and UMBC's Tim Anderson, Sam Eitel, Brandon Mathias and Jordan Pierce representing the Gaels.
- Severn will have Terrapin brothers **Michael** and **Brian Phipps** competing against sophomore defender John Eckert.
- Liberty High will have Maryland junior **Zach Hinton** and Retriever freshman Matt Latham on the field.
- Maryland's **Nick Kellinger** and UMBC's Matt Curtin are both Centennial High alums.
- Today's game will not just reunite high school teammate, but it will be a mini-reunion of CCBC-Essex lacrosse. Maryland's **Jon Beard**, the 2005 NJCAA Offensive Player of the Year, will be reunited with former Knights Travis Begay, Dan Cormack, and Josh Porcell.

DAVE COTTLE

HEAD COACH • SIXTH SEASON AT MARYLAND • SALISBURY '78

Dave Cottle, the third winningest active coach in lacrosse, begins his sixth season at the helm of the Maryland lacrosse program. He was named the eighth coach in the storied history of Maryland lacrosse on Sept. 26, 2001, after a sensational 19-year stint as the head coach at Loyola College in Baltimore.

Cottle, 51, took the reins from the ACC's all-time winningest coach, Dick Edell, who retired on Sept. 3, 2001 after 18 years with the Terps.

He enters the 2007 season as the third winningest active coach in the sport of lacrosse, winning 72.1 percent of his games for a 238-92 record. During his five seasons in College Park a total of 19 Terrapins have earned 35 All-America selections.

Last season saw the Terps return to the NCAA Final Four for the second straight season. Cottle's squad finished the year with a 12-5 record and earned Maryland the No. 2 seed in the NCAA tournament for just the second time in school history. Seven Terrapin players earned All-America honors with attackman Joe Walters and midfielder Bill McGlone being first team selections. Walters was also named the ACC Player of the Year for the second time in his career and was the winner of the Turnbull Award, which is given annually to the nation's top attackman.

In 2005 he directed Maryland to its ninth trip to the NCAA Semifinals and its second straight ACC tournament championship. The Terps ended the season with an overall record of 11-6, but finished the season winning six of their last seven games. Six Maryland players were named postseason All-Americans, including McGlone, who was a first team selection. Cottle's program also earned another honor in June of 2005 when Walters was named to the 2006 U.S. National Team, the only college player to be selected to the 23-man roster.

Cottle guided the 2004 Terps to a 13-3 record and their first ACC championship since 1998. Maryland finished the season ranked No. 3 in the USILA poll and made it to the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament. Eight Terrapin players earned All-America honors, including three first team honorees, and Lee Zink was named National Defenseman of the Year, marking the second straight season a Terp earned that honor.

In 2003 he led Maryland back to the NCAA Semifinals for the fourth time in nine years, but the first since 1998. The Terps had a stellar season finishing ranked No. 3 in the nation after being ranked in the top seven all season. Maryland piled numerous accolades as they had eight USILA All-Americans including first-team honoree and National Defenseman of the Year Michael Howley.

The Terps posted a 12-4 record in 2003 and gave Cottle his third trip to the national semifinals. He led the Greyhounds to two national semifinal appearances including an appearance in the 1990 championship game.

The backbone of Cottle's success has been his emphasis on a strong work ethic, intelligent recruiting, attention to detail, and a creative approach to the game. He also is a true believer in the concept of "student-athlete." In each of the last four years, his team's graduation rate has been 89 percent or higher. Six of Cottle's Terrapin players earned USILA Scholar All-America honors, including 2005 graduate Ian Healy, who became just the third Maryland student-athlete to be inducted into Phi Beta Kappa, the nation's oldest and most prestigious academic society.

He led his Loyola teams to top-10 finishes in each his 14 seasons. The Greyhounds finished with a winning record the final 18 years of his tenure, dating to 1984. Loyola also played in 14 consecutive NCAA Tournaments, entering the 1998 and 1999 tournaments as the No. 1 seed.

A Baltimore native, Cottle took over a struggling Greyhound program in 1983. Since posting a first-year record of 5-9, his only losing season, Cottle's Loyola teams reeled off 18 consecutive winning seasons. The 1998 team's 13-2 campaign, which ended with a berth in the NCAA semifinals, saw Loyola reach a No. 1 national ranking, and the school's first No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

In 1988 the Greyhounds began their current run of 14 consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances. Loyola advanced to the national championship game in 1990, and it has made 10 NCAA quarterfinal appearances. In fact, Loyola has advanced to at least the national quarterfinals in seven of the past eight seasons.

The 1990 team, a potent mix of seasoned veterans and talented underclassmen, marched all the way to the NCAA championship game after making the school's first NCAA semifinal appearance. In the semifinals the Greyhounds staged an incredible comeback to beat Yale, 14-13, in overtime and advanced to the title contest against two-time defending champion Syracuse. The Orangemen ended Loyola's quest for the national title, but the Greyhounds' 1990 season always will be remembered.

In 1994 Cottle guided the Greyhounds to one of their best seasons ever. Loyola finished 11-2, recording wins against four teams that participated in the NCAA Tournament. The Greyhounds earned the nation's No. 1 ranking for only the second time in the program's history during that memorable campaign. Loyola concluded the regular season with a 17-15 victory over Johns Hopkins, the program's first victory ever against the Blue Jays. Ranked third in the final USILA poll, the Greyhounds earned a first-round bye into the NCAA Tournament before dropping a 14-13 overtime decision to Brown in the NCAA quarterfinals.

Cottle also guided his 1988 and 1989 teams to the postseason. The 1988 squad finished with a 12-2 record, earning Loyola's first NCAA Division I tournament berth. Loyola defeated Air Force for its first NCAA postseason victory before losing to Penn in an exciting quarterfinal. The Greyhounds concluded the campaign ranked fifth in the nation, and Cottle earned USILA Coach-of-the-Year honors, becoming the first coach in Loyola athletic history to receive a national award. Cottle was selected to coach the South team in the 1988 North-South All-Star Game.

The 1989 Greyhounds became the only Loyola lacrosse team to complete an undefeated regular season. The Greyhounds beat four nationally ranked teams en route to a perfect 10-0 mark. Loyola was ranked third in the final poll, behind eventual national champion Syracuse and Johns Hopkins. A quarterfinal loss to North Carolina ended Loyola's season, but the Greyhounds captured the attention of the lacrosse world with their best record ever.

Cottle came to Loyola in 1982 after leading Severn School to a 26-9 record and consecutive Maryland Scholastic Association championships. Prior to his success at Severn, Cottle served for two years as a graduate assistant coach, assistant varsity lacrosse coach and physical education instructor at his alma mater, Salisbury State University.

One of the finest players in Salisbury State history, Cottle was enshrined into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1989. During his career he re-wrote the NCAA record book, while earning All-America honors three times. He still holds many places in the Salisbury State record book, and was just the second player in collegiate lacrosse history to score over 100 points in a single season. The nation's leading scorer in 1975, he served as captain of the South team in the North-South All-Star Game.

Cottle received his bachelor of science degree in physical education in 1978 from Salisbury.

He was an assistant coach for Team USA 1994, which won the world championship in Manchester, England. Cottle has addressed many lacrosse gatherings across the country, including the USILA Coaches' Convention, and he serves as a member of the All-America Selection Committee. In February of 1998 he was inducted into the Baltimore Chapter of the Lacrosse Foundation's Hall of Fame.

A graduate of Baltimore's Northern High School, Cottle lives with his wife, Lynn, daughters, Taylor and Tory, and son, Sean, in Edgewater, Md.

SHOOTING TELLS THE STORY

- The difference between winning and losing for Maryland this season is simple - when the Terps shoot well they win. Coach Dave Cottle is on record saying that good teams will shoot at least 30%. As it turns out 30% is the magic number for the Terps this season.
- In Maryland's 10 victories this season the Terrapins are shooting above 30% (31.6%, 113 goals/352 shots). In their five losses the Terps' shooting percentage is cut to 23.9% (38 goals/159 shots).
- Another standout statistic from Terp wins and losses is man-up conversion percentage. Maryland has converted 15 of 29 opportunities (.517) in its 10 wins, but has only cashed in on 10 of 22 chances (.455) in five defeats.

HOME COOKING

- A lot is made in sports about the home-field advantage, and for the Maryland men's lacrosse team that advantage has held true since Coach Cottle arrived in College Park. Since 2002, the Terps are 34-12 (.739) when playing on the Maryland campus. At Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium Maryland is 23-9 (.719) under Cottle, while the Terps have gone 8-3 (.727) at the Field Hockey & Lacrosse Complex and 3-0 at Ludwig Field.

HOME VS. AWAY

- A lot is made in sports about the home-field advantage, but for the Maryland men's lacrosse team it has been better away from home than it has been in College Park. The Terps have played 10 games at home (7-3) and five on the road (3-2) and the numbers show an edge for the Terps when they are on familiar ground.
- Maryland is averaging 11.5 goals per game in its home games, which is two goals better than the 9.5 goals the Terps average on the road.
- Just like the offense, the Maryland defense has been more comfortable at home this season. As a team, the Terps are allowing opponents 6.9 goals per game at home, but that inflates by more than two goals to 9.3 gpg on the road.
- All-America candidate **Michael Phipps**, the team's leading scorer overall, is also the Terps' top scorer at home with 21 goals and 15 assists for 36 points. All-America candidate **Max Ritz** leads the squad in scoring on the road with 11 goals and six assists for 17 points. Phipps is second in road scoring, totaling 12 points on six goals and six assists.

STREAKING TERPS

- Fourteen games into the 2007 season and so far and two Terps have nothced at least one point in every game.
- Michael Phipps** has scored at least one point in each of the 14 games so far and has a 16-game point scoring streak dating back to the NCAA Quarterfinals against Princeton last season.
- Max Ritz** is currently on a 15-game multi-point streak dating back to last year's NCAA Semis vs. UMass. So far this season he has had at least two points in each of the Terps' 14 games. His streak of three-plus point games came to an end with a two-point effort in limited time vs. Mount St. Mary's Overall he has a 16-game point scoring streak going.
- Even though its not every game this season, sophomore **Dan Groot** has been impressive, scoring at least a point in 11 of 14 games this year. He's also tallied at least one point in eight of Maryland's last nine games and has nine games with multiple points.

OFFENSIVE DEFENDERS

- Through 15 games Terrapin defensive players have been surprisingly offensive. So far in 2007, Maryland defenders have scored 17 goals and added 12 assists to account for 29 points. The Terps have totaled 260 points as a team, which means that more than 11 percent of Maryland's offense has come from a defensive player.
- Freshman long pole **Brian Farrell** leads the defense with five goals and three assists and is actually 10th on the squad in points. After going through a nine-game scoring drought, Farrell found the scoring touch again in the ACC semifinals against Virginia.
- Senior All-American **Ray Megill** scored his first career goal and added his first career assist in the win over UMBC. Since then he has scored twice and added an assist in the last four games.
- Other defensive players to score this season are **Bryn Holmes** (2-3=4), **Chris Rhine** (2-0=2), **Spencer McAllister** (1-0=1), **Zach Hinton** (1-0=1), **Joe Cinosky** (0-1=1) and **Ryan Clarke** (0-1=1).
- Injured short stick defensive middies **Jimmy Borell** and **Jeff Reynolds** have three goals and two assists between them.

DEFENSE EXCEEDING EXPECTATIONS

- On paper this year's Maryland defense shapes up as one of the nation's best. The unit features two preseason first team All-Americans in seniors **Ray Megill** and **Steve Whittenberg** and an honorable mention selection in junior **Joe Cinosky**. Add to that trio senior long pole **Ryan Clarke** and senior short-stick middle **Jimmy Borell**, both two-year starters, and there is no question that the tools are there for defensive coordinator **Dave Slafkosky**.

- During the last three seasons, Maryland held its opponents scoreless for long stretches of game time. The 2004 Terps kept opponents scoreless for stretches of 20 or more minutes eight times. In 2005 Maryland did it on seven occasions, and was just seconds away from keeping the high-powered Duke (1st meeting) and Navy offenses off the board for more than 20 minutes. Last season the Terrapin defense did it 10 times in its 17 games. So far the 2007 Terp "D" has 11 20+ minute scoring droughts to its credit. In addition to that stat, Maryland has held 14 of its 15 opponents below their season scoring averages.
- Versus Bellarmine in the season opener, the Knights took a 2-1 lead with 6:46 to go in the first quarter. Maryland's defense, lead by freshman goalie **Brian Phipps**, who totaled nine saves in his college debut in the 11-6 victory, didn't allow Bellarmine another goal until 11:47 in the third quarter, a total time of 24:59. Maryland's man-down unit was stellar on the afternoon, allowing only one goal (at 11:46 of the fourth quarter with Maryland holding a 9-5 lead) in six opportunities. The defense even got into the scoring column against the Knights as freshman long pole **Brian Farrell** scored twice in his college debut.
- The Catamounts of Vermont scored on three of their first four shots and were tied with the Terps at 3-3 after the first period. But the Maryland defense gave up just one goal in the next 36:09 and allowed the offense to go on an 8-1 run. The Terrapins held Vermont without a goal for 26 minutes, spanning the second, third and fourth quarters. **Brian Phipps** made 14 saves in the win. The defensive effort was even more impressive considering that All-American **Ray Megill**, **Zach Hinton** and **Jimmy Borell** did not play in the game.
- After a first half that saw Georgetown score six goals, the Maryland defense settled down and shutout the Hoyas in the third quarter, allowing the Terps to score five unanswered goals to tie the game at 6-6. During that 5-0 Terrapin scoring run, the Maryland defense held Georgetown scoreless for 25:14. Senior All-American **Steve Whittenberg** was magnificent, causing five Hoya turnovers and picking up three groundballs. Long pole All-America candidate **Ryan Clarke** had five groundballs to his credit and caused a pair of turnovers. Freshman short-stick **Bryn Holmes**, who saw his most significant playing time so far due to the loss of **Jeff Reynolds** for the season with a torn ACL, caused three turnovers and had one groundball.
- The Terps gave up 14 goals to the high-powered Duke offense, but responded with a tough, physical effort against Towson. Maryland's defense pitched a shutout for the first 29:57 of the game and allowed its offense to build a 4-0 lead. The starting defense of All-Americans **Steve Whittenberg**, **Ray Megill** and **Joe Cinosky**, along with long pole **Ryan Clarke**, held the Tiger starting attack and first midfield to just one goal, while compiling seven groundballs and three caused turnovers. But it wasn't just the upperclassmen that led the charge for the Terp "D." Freshmen **Brian Phipps**, **Bryn Holmes** and **Brian Farrell** all played key roles in Maryland's 8-7 win. Phipps was solid in the goal for the Terps, turning away a career-best 16 Towson shots. Holmes has a career-day of his own, setting personal bests with eight groundballs and five caused turnovers (both surpassing his season totals in each category prior to the Towson game) and setting the tone with numerous big hits. Not to be outdone was Farrell, as the long pole continued to be a force on the offensive end as well as the defensive side of the field. Farrell caused a turnover and picked up a pair of groundballs, but it was his goal with 3:44 left in the fourth quarter when the Terps were a man-down that proved to be the game-winner. You

won't know it by looking at the boxscore, but **Jimmy Borell** was a huge factor in the victory as well. The senior gave up his body, throwing himself in front of a last-second Tiger shot to block the ball and lock-up the Terrapin win.

- The defense was at it again vs. Lafayette. The Leopards scored three goals in the first quarter and took a 3-1 lead into the start of the second, but the Maryland defense would not allow another goal for the next 21:01. The Terps went on a 9-0 run to take control of the game 10-3 before Lafayette scored its final goal at the 9:24 mark of the third quarter. Maryland shutout the Leopards in the second and fourth quarters and allowed just that one goal for the final 45:22 of the game. The Terps got tremendous defensive effort from everyone on the roster. Maryland picked up a season-best 51 groundballs and caused 24 turnovers, one shy of a season high. **Steve Whittenberg** and fellow All-American **Ray Megill** totaled five groundballs and five caused turnovers. Junior defender **Ryne Adolph** had his finest day as a Terp, picking up a career-high three groundballs and causing a turnover while playing three different defensive positions. Maryland's trio of long poles, senior All-America candidate **Ryan Clarke**, senior **Sean Sullivan** and freshman **Brian Farrell**, combined for seven groundballs and four caused turnovers. Other defensive standouts included freshman short-stick **Bryn Holmes**, who had three groundballs and a caused turnover, and sophomore defender **Mike Griswold**, who caused a career-high two turnovers.
- The UMBC game was another defensive showcase and not just on defense. Sure the Terps shutout the Retrievers in the third quarter and allowed only one goal during a 29-minute span that allowed the offense to go on a 9-1 run and all but wrap up the victory. But the real story for the Terp "D" vs. UMBC was All-American **Ray Megill**. The senior had played in 49 games for the Terrapins, but never scored a goal or picked up an assist. That all changed vs. the Retrievers as Megill pushed the ball in transition twice, scoring a goal the first time down the field and assisting on a **Man Ritz** goal on the second.
- Mount St. Mary's proved to be no problem for the Terrapin defense as the Terps held the Mount scoreless for 37:29 spanning the second, third and fourth quarters. Fourteen different Terps combined to force 19 of the Mount's 26 turnovers. Senior goalkeeper **Harry Alford** made his season debut after missing the first seven games recovering from off-season shoulder surgery. The defense got into the scoring act again as defensive midfielders **Chris Rhine** and **Zach Hinton** scored goals in the 18-3 victory.
- The defense came to play again against North Carolina. With the Terps holding a 2-0 lead, the Tar Heels tried to get back into the game following Nick Tintle's first quarter goal. But the Maryland defense held Carolina scoreless for the next 24 minutes to allow the offense to build an 8-1 lead. Freshman goalie **Brian Phipps** was spectacular in cage for the Terps, making 15 saves and starting several scoring opportunities with precision outlet passes. All-America **Steve Whittenberg** picked up four groundballs, while fellow All-American **Ray Megill** caused two turnovers.
- The goal scorers get the glory in thrilling wins, but the Terrapin defense was dominating in the 8-7 double-OT win at No. 7 Navy on April 6. The defense held the Mids scoreless for 20:23 to allow the offense to build some momentum and claw back from a 6-4 deficit. But the offensive spark came from a defensive player when senior All-American **Ray Megill** won his first career face-off attempt and raced down the field to score his second career goal. Megill would finish with a career-best seven groundballs, while combining with **Steve Whittenberg**, **Joe Cinosky** and **Ryan Clarke** to force 12 Navy turnovers.
- Despite losing in overtime, the defense was stellar in the 103rd meeting with Johns Hopkins. The Terps limited the Blue Jays' top five scorers to just two goals and combined to force 15 turnovers with All-American **Steve Whittenberg** and All-America candidate **Ryan Clarke** each causing three.
- The loss to No. 3 Virginia in the ACC semis wasn't without some tremendous defensive efforts. All-ACC honoree **Ray Megill** missed much of the game due to injury, but senior **Sean Sullivan**, junior **Jacob Baxter** and sophomore **Mike Griswold** were solid in his stead. The trio combined for four groundballs and three caused turnovers. Also of note was the first start of the season for two-time All-America goalie **Harry Alford**, who is fully recovered from off-season shoulder surgery.

MISSING TIME

- All athletic teams have injuries, but this season the Terps have had more than their fair share. From torn ligaments to broken bones to food poisoning and everything in between, Maryland men's lacrosse student-athletes have missed games this season as what seems like a record pace.
- Not counting the Terps' four preseason scrimmages and valuable practice time, no fewer than 17 Terps have missed a total of 103 games due to injury or illness: **Ryne Adolph** (2 games), **Harry Alford** (7), **Paul Andrews** (1), **Jimmy Borell** (5), **Jason Carter** (15), **Chris Feifs** (1), **Dean Hart** (2), **Travis Holmes** (7), **Patrick Hutchinson** (15), **Ray Megill** (1), **Rob Morrison** (8), **Jeff Reynolds** (13), **Chris Rhine** (2), **Kevin Slafkosky** (7), **Scott Tompkins** (4), **Matt Trautman** (12), **Nick Ward** (1).

STEPPING IN, STEPPING UP

- Usually a player's first season is spent getting used to new surroundings, understanding new systems, getting comfortable with new teammates and a lot more. Freshmen usually don't expect to see a lot of playing time, let alone playing time in big games against top-ranked opponents. Usually. But that's not the case for the Terps this season as several freshmen has become integral pieces of the Maryland puzzle. Injuries to key returners may have forced these players into the spotlight ahead of schedule, but they have responded better than could have ever been expected.
- **Brian Phipps**, the first true freshman in recent memory to start the season in goal, has been better than advertised. The No. 1 goalie prospect in the nation, according to *Inside Lacrosse*, was pressed into service ahead of schedule due to injuries to two-time All-American **Harry Alford** and back-up **Jason Carter**. All Phipps did as the starting goalie was lead Maryland to a 9-4 record in 13 games and stop nearly 60% of the shots he faced. For his efforts the Annapolis, Md., native was named the 2007 ACC Rookie of the Year, becoming just the sixth Terp in history to earn that honor.
- **Brian Farrell** was expected to see some playing time this season but not this much this soon. The long pole from Boy's Latin came to College Park with a reputation as a playmaker and he's lived up to that billing. Through 14 games Farrell is 10th on the team with seven points on five goals and two assists. Against Towson he picked up the first game-winning goal of his college career with a man-down goal in transition at the 3:44 mark of the fourth quarter.
- **Bryn Holmes** was penciled in as a face-off wing-man and facing-off some himself, but with **Jimmy Borell** missing the first two games due to a preseason injury and **Jeff Reynolds** suffering a torn ACL against Vermont he has had to be much more than that. Holmes has risen to the occasion and is now one of Maryland's top two short-stick defensive midfielders. He's tied for third on the team with 19 caused turnovers, many of which have been caused by the bone-jarring hits that have become Holmes' signature on the field, and is tops with 42 groundballs. He also picked up his first career goal at Virginia on March 31 and added his first collegiate assist on April 6 in the Terps' 8-7 win at Navy in double-OT.
- **Adam Sear** arrived at Maryland just before the spring semester and the Australian import has gone from just getting used to his surroundings to making an impact on the field. The 2006 Australian Lacrosse League All-Star started the season on the third midfield line, but when **Travis Holmes** was forced to the sidelines with an illness Sear was ready to take advantage of the opportunity. He showed a glimpse of what he can do with a goal in limited action against Duke, but Sear's true abilities came through against Towson with a goal and an assist. He tallied his first two-assist game in Maryland's 11-7 win over No. 19 UMBC and is now tied for sixth on the team with 11 points on six goals and five assists. He's proven to be a versatile players as well, earning his first career start on attack in Maryland's 14-10 win at Penn.

PHIPPS NAMED 2007 ACC ROOKIE OF THE YEAR

- **Brian Phipps** was named the Atlantic Coast Conference Men's Lacrosse Rookie of the Year as selected by a vote of the league's four coaches. Phipps' selection marks the sixth time that a Maryland player has been named the ACC's top freshman. Phipps, a native of Annapolis, Md., entered the 2007 season as the third-string goalie on the Terrapin roster, but was pressed into service when Maryland's other two goalies went down with injuries.
- The nation's top goalie prospect, according to *Inside Lacrosse*, began his career with nine saves in the Terps' season opener and got even better from there. He turned in his finest performance of the season on March 10 at Towson. Phipps made a career-best 16 saves and helped the defense hold the Tigers scoreless for a stretch of 29:57 in the 8-7 Maryland win.
- Phipps has also come up big in some of the Terps' biggest games of the season. He made 15 saves in a 14-8 win over then-No. 11 North Carolina. Phipps stopped 13 shots in his return to Annapolis on April 6, helping Maryland pull out an 8-7 win in double-overtime at then-No. 7 Navy.

MEGILL AMONG TEWAARATON TROPHY NOMINEES

- Senior defender **Ray Megill** was among 17 players on the 2007 Tewaaron Trophy nominee list announced by the Tewaaron Award Foundation on April 18. The 17 nominees will be trimmed to five finalists for the award, which will be presented on May 30.
- Megill, a preseason first team All-American, is one of the top defenders in the nation. The 6-foot-1, 200-pound, Clark, N.J., native is among the team leaders in groundballs and caused turnovers and has become a force in transition for the Terps, scoring two goals and adding an assist.
- A two-time All-American, Megill had the signature game of his career in Maryland's 8-7 win at Navy in double-overtime on April 6. Against the Midshipmen, Megill picked up a career-best seven groundballs, caused three turnovers, won his first-ever face-off attempt and scored a goal. He was also the lead defender on Navy attackman Nick Mirabito, who had his 40-game scoring streak snapped against the Terps.
- Two other Maryland defenders, senior **Steve Whittenberg** and junior **Joe Cinosky**, were on the preseason "Watch List" but were not among the 17 to make the semifinalist list.
- The Tewaaron Trophy is awarded each year to the top male and female varsity lacrosse player, as chosen by the selection committee. The seventh annual award will be given at a banquet on Wednesday, May 30.

- Many school's refer to their sports programs as families, but under Coach Cottle the Maryland men's lacrosse program has really become a family affair. Since arriving in College Park in 2002, Cottle has had seven sets of brothers don the red and black together for at least one season.

82ND SEASON OF LACROSSE

- The Terps boast an all-time record of 683-224-4 (.752), dating back to the first varsity team in 1924 (a team was not fielded in 1944 and 1945 due to World War II). Maryland has finished every one of its previous 81 seasons with a .500 or better record, including last season when the Terps went 12-5. The program reached the 650-win milestone with a 16-12 win over Army in the first round of the 2004 NCAA tournament at Byrd Stadium.
- Since 2000, Maryland is 90-34 for a .726 win percentage. In the decade of the 1990s, Maryland recorded its most wins in any decade with a 95-47 record. The .669 winning percentage matched Maryland's win percentage of the 1980s when the Terps went 83-41 and also compiled a .669 win percentage.

GAME 1

BELLARMINE 6 NO. 6 MARYLAND 11 FEBRUARY 17, 2007 FIELD HOCKEY & LACROSSE COMPLEX

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - For Maryland freshman Brian Farrell, his college debut is going to be a tough act to follow. The long pole defensive midfielder scored two goals in his first collegiate game to help the sixth-ranked Terrapin men's lacrosse team (1-0) to an 11-6 victory over Bellarmine (0-1) Saturday afternoon at the Field Hockey & Lacrosse Complex.

In total, nine different Terps scored on the afternoon with six players tallying double-digit points. In addition to Farrell's two scores, junior midfielder Drew Evans made his first college start a memorable one by setting his career high with a pair of goals against the Knights. The second of the Ithaca, N.Y., native's scores came on a nifty behind-the-back shot in the second quarter.

The first quarter proved to be a closely-fought contest. Maryland jumped out to a quick lead on Evans' first goal of the game off the first of a career-best three assists from junior attackman Max Ritz. But Bellarmine showed Maryland that it was a formidable opponent, scoring two goals in the next three minutes to take a 2-1 lead.

The Knights' only lead of the game would be a short-lived one as Maryland rattled off the next four goals to take a 5-2 lead into the second half. Sophomore midfielder Jeremy Sieverts, who transferred to Maryland from Butler when the Bulldogs dropped their men's lacrosse program prior to the 2007 season, got the ball rolling with with his first goal as a Terp off of another Ritz assist.

Farrell gave Maryland the lead for good at the 6:53 mark of the second quarter with a transition goal to make the score 3-2. The play was started by a fantastic save by freshman goalie Brian Phipps on a shot by Bellarmine's Dylan MacDougal.

Senior attackman Michael Phipps scored his first goal of the season at the 5:25 mark on a diving shot from the left side of the Bellarmine crease. He also figured into Maryland's next goal, picking up the assist on Evans' behind-the-back score.

Maryland opened the third quarter with a man-up goal from senior midfielder Travis Holmes off an assist from sophomore middle Dan Groot to give Maryland a 6-2 advantage. Bellarmine answered back with its first goal in more than 24 minutes on an Adam Gardner goal.

The lead was back to four in a matter of seconds though as Maryland's face-off man Will Dalton cleanly picked up the ensuing face-off, bulled his way through the right alley and scored his first goal of the year. Dalton was a dominant force at the face-off stripe for the Terps all afternoon, winning 12-of-18 attempts.

Maryland increased its lead to 9-4 heading into the fourth quarter on man-up goals by Groot and senior midfielder Thomas Alford.

The Knights looked to build some momentum early in the fourth on back-to-back goals less than a minute apart by Bryan Brown and John Kirk. But Maryland's defense, which turned in a solid effort on the afternoon, shut Bellarmine out the final 11:46 of the game.

Sophomore attackman Danny Gallagher became the ninth Terp to score a goal with his first tally of the season off an assist from junior defensive midfielder Jeff Reynolds at the 9:23 mark. Reynolds picked up his second assist of the game five minutes later on Farrell's second goal to close the scoring at 11-6.

Defensively for the Terps, it was another tremendous display of both individual and team defense. Senior All-American Ray Megill tied his career best with five ground balls, while junior All-America candidate Joe Cinosky tied his career high with three caused turnovers. Senior long pole Ryan Clarke showed why he's an All-America candidate as he tied his career high with four caused turnovers in addition to picking up three groundballs.

Overall, Maryland's defense held the Knights without a goal for 24:59 and shut them out in the second quarter. Last season the Terps held opponents scoreless in 19 quarters and help the opposition without a goal for more than 20 minutes 11 times.

Brian Phipps was solid in his college debut, making nine stops and orchestrating Maryland clear attempts with precision. On the afternoon the Terps were 13-of-16 (81.3%) on clear attempts.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - A career-day by senior attackman Michael Phipps highlighted the fifth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team's 16-7 victory over Vermont Tuesday afternoon at the Field Hockey & Lacrosse Complex.

Phipps set career highs with eight points on four goals, including the game-winner, and four assists. The Annapolis, Md., native scored a goal in each quarter and became the first player since Scott Hochstadt in 1998 to post a four-goal, four-assist game. But, Phipps wasn't the only standout performer on the afternoon for the Terps as nine other Maryland players scored goals as well.

Each of the other five Terrapin offensive starters had at least one goal. Junior attackman Max Ritz scored a goal and added two assists, all in Maryland's eight-goal fourth quarter. Sophomore Danny Gallagher, the Terps' third attackman, scored his lone goal in the fourth quarter as well.

The starting midfielder unit was also stellar, combining for 10 points on five goals and five assists. Sophomore midfielder Dan Groot set career bests with five points on his first-career hat trick and two assists. Junior middle Drew Evans also set his career high with four points on a goal and a personal-best three assists. Senior midfielder Chris Feifs made his season debut after missing the 2007 opener due to illness and scored his first career man-up goal.

The second midfield line also got into the scoring act with four goals and assist. Senior Thomas Alford tied his career high with two goals, while sophomore Jeremy Sieverts turned in his first multi-point game as a Terp with a goal and an assist. Rounding out the trio is senior Travis Holmes, who scored a goal on his lone shot of the afternoon.

The catalyst for the Terps proved to be Will Dalton's dominance at the face-off stripe and some outstanding play by Maryland's trio of long poles - seniors Ryan Clarke and Sean Sullivan, and freshman Brian Farrell. Dalton won 18-of-22 face-offs and picked up a career best eight groundballs. The junior from Queenstown, Md., started the game by winning the first eight face-offs.

Clarke, Sullivan and Farrell also turned in big performances for Maryland. Clarke, an All-America candidate, picked up three groundballs and caused a turnover. Sullivan set his career high with five groundballs and also caused a turnover. Farrell set personal bests with four groundballs and two caused turnovers and figured into the scoring for the second-straight game by picking up his first career assist on Phipps' man-down goal in the third quarter.

Maryland's final goal of the contest was also a career-first. Sophomore Nick Ward, who made the transition from the midfield to attack in the off-season, scored his first-collegiate goal with 41 seconds remaining in the game.

Defensively, the Terps were led by goalie Brian Phipps. The freshman, in just his second college game, made 14 saves, picked up five groundballs and caused a pair of Catamount turnovers. Junior All-America candidate Joe Cinosky caused two Vermont turnovers, while freshman defensive midfielder Bryn Holmes picked up a pair of groundballs.

Overall, Maryland's defense held the Catamounts without a goal for 26:00 and shut them out in the third quarter. That marks the second time in two games that the Terrapin defense has held an opponent scoreless for more than 20 minutes and shut them out in a quarter. Last season the Terps held opponents scoreless in 19 quarters and help the opposition without a goal for more than 20 minutes 11 times.

The Catamounts were led by seniors Pete Hein and Dan Zwirko. Hein netted a hat trick, while Zwirko added a pair of goals.

Maryland (2-0) returns to action this Saturday, February 24, when it hosts fourth-ranked Georgetown. Time and location for the game have not been finalized. Log on to umterps.com for event details.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The fifth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team erased a five-goal halftime deficit, but came up short in its 8-6 loss to fourth-ranked Georgetown in front of a sellout crowd at the Field Hockey & Lacrosse Complex Saturday afternoon.

The Hoyas jumped out to an early 2-0 lead in the first quarter before junior attackman Max Ritz got the Terps on the board with an unassisted goal at the 6:12 mark. Georgetown would build its lead to 6-1 going into halftime by scoring four unanswered goals, capped off by Andrew Brancaccio's third goal of the game at 4:16 of the second quarter.

But Brancaccio's third and final goal of the game may have been the turning point for Maryland. Terps' sophomore attackman Danny Gallagher was penalized for an illegal equipment violation and was assessed a 3:00 unreleasable penalty. Maryland's defense rose to the occasion, allowing just one goal in those three minutes to swing the momentum back to the Terps heading into the second half.

That was the beginning of a Georgetown scoreless drought that lasted for 25:14, which allowed the Terrapin offense the space it needed to make a 5-0 run to tie the game at 6-6 with 13:14 left in the game.

Once again it was Ritz that sparked the Maryland offense. The Wayne, Pa., native scored back-to-back goals just two minutes apart for his third career hat trick. Ritz figured in on the next Maryland score, assisting on senior Michael Phipps' man-up goal to bring the Terps to within two goals at 6-4.

Maryland closed out its third-quarter scoring barrage with a bang at the 4:06 mark with freshman long pole Brian Farrell's third goal of the season. Fellow freshman Bryn Holmes started the play by causing a turnover that was picked up by Farrell. The 6-foot-4, 240-pound Farrell then raced the length of the field and beat Hoya goalie Miles Kass with a bouncing shot.

The Terps closed the scoring gap completely with their second man-up goal of the game at the 13:04 mark. Senior midfielder Chris Feifs scored his second goal of the year off of another assist from Ritz.

The Hoyas finally put an end to their scoreless stretch at the 9:02 mark of the fourth to take a 7-6 lead. Dan D'Agnes scored the eventual game-winner, his second goal of the game, off of Andrew Baird's second assist on the afternoon.

With Georgetown clinging to a 7-6 lead, the Terps appeared to tie the game again with 6:44 left in the fourth quarter. Junior midfielder Drew Evans dodged around a Hoya defender and beat Kass over his left shoulder, but officials ruled him to have stepped in the crease, nullifying the goal.

Brendan Cannon picked up his lone goal of the game with 25 seconds remaining on an empty-net shot to cap the scoring at 8-6 and give the Hoyas their first-ever win over Maryland in seven tries.

Defensively, the Terps were led by All-American Steve Whittenberg, who caused five Georgetown turnovers and picked up three groundballs. Senior All-America candidate Ryan Clarke had another impressive game for the Terps, causing two turnovers and picking up five groundballs. Bryn Holmes, who started in the defensive midfield for the Terps in place of the injured Jeff Reynolds, caused three turnovers and picked up a groundball. Maryland's other starting defensive midfielder, Jimmy Borell, playing in his first game of the season after sitting out the Terps' first two contests due to a hand injury, picked up four groundballs. Freshman goalie Brian Phipps made nine saves on the afternoon for Maryland.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The sixth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team lost 14-7 to No. 2 Duke Friday night in front of 5,283 fans at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium.

Junior attackman Max Ritz scored two goals and added an assist to lead the Terps, but it was Blue Devil attackman Matt Danowski that stole the show with six goals and an assist.

Danowski assisted Gibbs Fogarty's first of two goals just more than a minute into the game for a 1-0 Duke lead. Maryland answered right back off the ensuing face-off as junior Will Dalton scored his second goal of the season to knot the score at one apiece.

But that was as close as the Terps would come to the Blue Devils on this night as Duke scored three unanswered goals to take a 4-1 lead.

Ritz's first goal of the game cut the lead to a pair of goals heading into the second quarter, but the Blue Devils scored four of the next five goals for a five-goal halftime advantage.

TOWSON, Md. - The tenth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team stifled a comeback effort by the No. 13 Towson Tigers to pull out an 8-7 win Saturday afternoon in front of 3,445 fans at Unidas Stadium.

The Terps got off to a fast start in the first quarter with a pair of goals from junior All-America candidate Max Ritz. He scored his first goal on an assist from freshman midfielder Adam Sear, but the play began with a terrific effort by freshman long pole Brian Farrell. Farrell out-hustled his defender to the midfield line allowing Sear a clean run into the attack zone. That bit of breathing room allowed Sear the space to find Ritz on the right side of the crease, where he buried a shot over the left shoulder of Towson goalkeeper Matt Antol.

Ritz gave Maryland a 2-0 lead with 4:03 left in the quarter with a goal from just about the same spot on the field. Sophomore midfielder Jeremy Sieverts fought through three Tiger defenders to pick up a groundball and work his way to the front of the Towson goal. He lost the ball on a good check by a Tiger defender, but Ritz was there to scoop up the loose ball and lace a shot into the right side of the Towson goal.

The second quarter got off to a slow start, but the Terps drew first blood once again, this time on Sear's second goal of the season. The play started with freshman defensive midfielder Bryn Holmes' fifth caused turnover of the game. He pushed the ball into the attack zone. Sear took the ball at the top of the zone, dodged around a defender and bounced a shot into the top left corner of the goal.

Ritz scored his third of the game less than two minutes later on a give-and-go with junior midfielder Drew Evans to push Maryland out to a 4-0 lead.

Towson managed to get on the board with just three seconds left in the second quarter when Adam Hagelin rolled around the back right side of the crease and found a cutting Nick Williams, who scored his second goal of the season.

The Tigers refused to quit and showed at the third quarter face-off that there were not going away. Matt Eckerl, who won 14-of-18 draws on the afternoon, won his seventh face-off and raced down the right wing of Maryland's defensive zone. He skipped a shot from about nine yards out that bounced into the lower left corner of the Terrapin goal to cut the Maryland lead to 4-2.

Senior attackman Michael Phipps answered back for Maryland less than three minutes later with his first goal of the game. He scored his seventh of the season on a transition goal when sophomore Nick Ward found him with a perfect pass as Phipps was cut to the front of the Tiger goal.

Towson got off to another quick start in the fourth quarter as Eric Boyle scored on a skip-shot into the lower left corner to pull the Tigers to within two goals at the 14:38 mark.

Senior midfielder Thomas Alford gave Maryland a three-goal cushion with an unassisted goal at the 10:24 mark of the fourth. Alford dodged around a Tiger defender into the left alley and bounced a shot from 12 yards out for his fifth goal of the season.

Evans scored his fourth of the season less than three minutes later on an assisted by Ritz. The Ithaca, N.Y. native drilled a shot into the left side of the goal from 15 yards out directly in front of the Tiger net. Towson answered right back less than a minute later on Boyle's second goal of the game off an assist by Bobby Griebel to once again cut the Maryland lead to three.

The Terps' lead was cut to two, 7-5, at the 4:42 mark of the fourth when Hagelin scored his first of the game off an assist from Jonathan Engelke.

It looked like Towson was poised to trim the lead to one when Holmes was called for a slashing penalty at 4:28, but Maryland turned the tables and pushed the lead to three on a man-down goal by Farrell. The native of Towson, Md., took a pass from senior All-American Steve Whittenberg near midfield and raced the length of the field, bouncing a shot past Antol from seven yards out.

Towson made a late push as Justin Schneider scored an unassisted goal at the 1:37 mark to trim the deficit to two at 8-6.

An offside penalty with ten seconds to go gave Towson an extra-man opportunity and the Tigers took advantage as Schneider cashed in with his second-straight goal to pull Towson to within a goal of the Terps at 8-7.

The Tigers had one last shot to tie the game when Eckerl won the ensuing face-off and fired a desperation shot from the left wing, but senior defensive midfielder Jimmy Borell made sure the shot never got to the Maryland net by jumping in front of it and blocking it with his body.

Freshman goalie Brian Phipps turned in his finest performance of the season, stopping a career-best 16 shots and picking up four groundballs. Holmes also had a career-day for the Terps on defense, posting career highs with five caused turnovers and eight groundballs.

Maryland's starting close defense of Whittenberg, Ray Megill and Joe Cinosky, along with long pole Ryan Clarke, turned in a fine performance, totaling seven groundballs and three caused turnovers while holding Towson's starting attack and first midfielder to just one goal.

Phipps kicked off the run with his first two goals of the game. Those were followed by a pair of transition goals by senior defensive midfielder Jimmy Borell, who scored set a career-best with his two-goal game.

Sophomore attackman Danny Gallagher, who picked up his first assist of the season on Phipps' first goal, scored three of the next four Maryland goals for his first career hat trick.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Jeremy Sieverts scored his first hat trick as a Terrapin to lead the 10th-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to an 11-7 win over No. 19 UMBC Saturday afternoon at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium.

Sieverts, a sophomore who transferred in from Butler when the Bulldogs dropped their men's lacrosse program in January, scored the game's first two goals to give the Terps a 2-0 lead. The first goal was unassisted as Sieverts beat Retriever goalie Jeremy Blevins on the short side with a spinning shot from the right side of the crease. His second score came at the 5:35 mark when he took a pass from freshman Adam Sear 12 yards out directly in front of the UMBC goal. Sieverts then drilled the shot into the top left corner of the net.

Midfielder Alex Hopmann got the Retrievers on the board with two minutes left in the first with a 13-yard blast off an assist from Terry Kimener. Kimener then tied the game early in the second quarter with his first of three goals on the day. Maryland came out quickly in the third quarter with Phipps finishing off a seven-point game with a pair of goals and an assist in the first five minutes of the period. Great ball movement set up Phipps' second goal of the game. Groot sent a sharp pass to junior All-America candidate Max Ritz behind the cage, who quickly found an open Phipps of the right side with a picture-perfect pass that allowed Phipps to easily beat Mount back-up goalie Chris Channing with a low shot.

Phipps was on the giving end of the next goal, sending a nifty pass from behind the cage to sophomore Danny Gallagher, who lost his defender with a well-timed cut to the front of the crease.

Ritz and Phipps hooked up one more time on the Terps' next score and once again sharp passing led to an easy goal. This time it was Sear starting the play, sending a quick pass to Ritz behind Mount St. Mary's goal. Ritz then laced a pin-point pass to Phipps who was darting down the right alley. Phipps buried the shot for his third goal of the game to make the score 12-2 for the Terps.

Four of Maryland's final six goals were career firsts. Freshman Fran Gormley kept up the scoring barrage with his first career goal at the 5:38 mark of the third quarter. The 5-foot-7 attackman used a spin dodge on the left side of the crease to separate from his defender enough to get off a tough shot into the top right corner of the Mount goal.

Junior face-off man Will Dalton scored an unassisted goal off the fourth-quarter face-off to bring the Terrapin lead to 14-2.

After that a pair of defenders got some time on the offensive end and broke into the scoring column for the Terps. Sophomore Chris Rhine, who has played long pole and short-stick defensive midfielder this season, scored his first of two goals off an assist from sophomore attackman Scott Tompkins.

In between Rhine's two goals, junior defender Zach Hinton, who is a close defender that has also played long pole and short-stick this year, scored his first collegiate goal off an assist from Beard.

After the Mount got back into the scoring with an extra-man goal by Dave Orban, the Terps closed out the scoring with Tompkins feeding Creaney for his first career goal.

Freshman goalie Brian Phipps was only called on to make two saves in the contest in just more than 35 minutes of action.

Phipps was replaced in the third quarter by senior All-American Harry Alford, who made his first appearance of the season. Alford missed the first seven games of the season after undergoing off-season shoulder surgery. He looked sharp in 14 minutes of action, stopping two shots and not allowing a goal.

Junior Nick Kellinger played the final 10:20 of the game, making one stop and allowing just one extra-man goal.

Maryland was also solid at the X with five Terps combining to win 18-of-24 face-offs. Dalton led the charge winning 10-of-14. Thomas Alford, who also picked up an assist on Rhine's second goal, and Creaney each won 3-of-4. Freshman Bryn Holmes and graduate student Paul Andrews each won their only draw.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Led by sophomore Dan Groot's second career hat trick, the first two midfielders for the ninth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team combined to score nine goals in the Terps' 14-8 victory over No. 11 North Carolina Saturday afternoon at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium.

The victory boosted Maryland to a 7-2 overall record and 1-1 in the ACC. Carolina fell to 6-3 on the year and 0-2 in conference play.

The Terps came out firing in the first quarter with sophomore midfielder Jeremy Sieverts drawing first blood at the 11:51 mark with a running shot sweeping through the right alley.

Senior attackman Michael Phipps built the lead to 2-0 just 40 seconds later. Freshman defensive midfielder Bryn Holmes caused one of his two turnovers on the day to start the play, dislodging the ball from the Tar Heels' Nick Tintle. Sophomore attackman Danny Gallagher ended up with the groundball and found Phipps along the right side of the crease where he dodged around a defender and scored his 17th goal of the season.

Carolina got on the board and cut the Terrapin lead to 2-1 with a man-up goal from Tintle at the 9:41 mark. But that was the closest the Tar Heels would get to the lead as Maryland scored the game's next six goals to take a commanding 8-1 lead.

Groot started the scoring spree off with a running shot from the left alley to the top corner on Carolina goalie Grant Zimmerman's short side.

The Terps' transition game was in full effect on their next goal. Freshman goalie Brian Phipps cleanly picked a skip shot by Ryan Walterhoefer and threw a perfect outlet pass to his brother Michael over the midfield stripe. Michael Phipps then raced into the attack zone and dodged around a pair of Tar Heel defenders to score his second goal of the game.

Junior All-America candidate Max Ritz set-up the next Maryland goal with a strong skip pass from behind the net to senior midfielder Chris Feifs, who buried a bounce shot from 10 yards out in the left alley.

The first quarter came to a close with a bang for the Terps when Adam Sear continued his scoring streak with his only goal of the game with just five seconds remaining. The freshman midfielder beat Zimmerman with a hard underhanded shot from the right alley from eight yards away.

The momentum from the first quarter didn't carry over for the Terps and both teams struggled to gain the advantage. Maryland finally broke through with an unassisted goal by senior midfielder Thomas Alford, beat his defender in the right alley and connected with a bounce shot at the 2:48 mark to give Maryland a 7-1 lead.

Hustle earned Maryland an 8-1 lead a minute and a half later. Senior co-captain Jimmy Borell helped clear the ball into the Terrapin offensive zone following Brian Phipps' eighth save of the game, and beat a Carolina offensive midfielder back to the midfield stripe during a substitution by a wide enough margin to allow junior midfielder Drew Evans a free run into the play. Feifs recognized the advantage and fed the ball to Evans on the right wing where he laced a shot past Zimmerman for his seventh goal of the season.

Carolina broke a 24-minute scoreless streak with a pair of goals in the final 13 seconds of the second quarter. Ben Hunt scored an unassisted goal with 13 seconds left. Tintle picked up the groundball on the ensuing face-off and sent a quick pass to Ben Hunt, who scored with just three ticks left on the clock.

The Tar Heels continued to put pressure on the Terps midway through the third quarter by cashing in with a transition goal by Rob Driscoll at the 8:38 mark. Zimmerman started the play by making a tremendous one-on-one save on Michael Phipps.

Groot stopped Carolina's three-goal run with his second goal of the game on the exact same play that his first goal came on.

The Tar Heels caught a lucky break and cut the Maryland lead to 9-5 to close the third quarter. The Terrapin defense looked to have forced Michael Burns to turn the ball over, but the ball skipped into the right alley where Hunt picked it up and got off a quick shot for his second score of the game.

Momentum seemed to be with the Tar Heels entering the fourth quarter, but Maryland took it back with a four-goal scoring binge over 5:20 to take a 13-5 lead. Alford got the ball rolling with his second of the game on a huge, top corner shot from 17 yards out.

It was like déjà vu all over again on Maryland's next score as Groot buried another runner from the left alley at the 10:50 mark.

Sophomore attackman Danny Gallagher picked up the next Terrapin score 49 seconds later. Senior Jon Beard picked up the assist on the play, feeding the ball to Gallagher in front of the crease, where he flipped a low shot past Zimmerman from eight yards out.

Ritz capped the scoring streak for the Terps with another score from the left alley at the 6:51 mark. The score came during a five-on-five situation with both teams down a man due to penalties.

Carolina cut the lead to 13-8 with goals from Gavin Petracca, Ryan Walterhoefer and Driscoll, but it was too little, too late. Borell would tack on another unassisted goal from the left alley to finish the scoring at 14-8.

Freshman goalie Brian Phipps had another stellar game for the Terps, stopping 15 Tar Heel shots. Maryland's trio of close defenders, Steve Whittenberg, Ray Megill and Joe Cinosky, held the high-powered Carolina starting attack to just a pair of goals and one assist. Coming into today's game the Tar Heels' starting attackmen had been averaging five goals and three assists per game.

ANNAPOLIS, Md. - Sophomore midfielder Dan Groot scored the game-winning goal at the 3:18 mark of the second overtime to give the 10th-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team an 8-7 win over No. 7 Navy in front of a crowd of 14,625 at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium Friday night.

The game was sent into overtime by a miraculous goal by midfielder Drew Evans. The junior from Ithaca, N.Y., scored his only goal of the game with seven seconds remaining in regulation, lacing a low-to-high shot from 16 yards out over the right shoulder of Navy goalie Colin Finnegan.

All-America defender Ray Megill turned in a career-defining performance and provided the spark that turned the tide for the Terps.

The Midshipmen had just ripped off three-straight goals to take a 6-4 lead midway through the fourth quarter. Navy had won 10-of-13 face-offs at that point and had momentum building. Enter Megill, who trotted out to the X to take his first-ever college face-off against Mikelis Visgauss, who only lost one draw in seven

attempts. That lone loss became Megill's first win. The senior from Clark, N.J., picked up the groundball, raced down the middle of the field and buried a shot from eight yards out to pull the Terps to within a goal.

Navy's Tommy Wallin scored less than three minutes later on a wild falling-down shot to push the lead back to two, but that's just when the game got interesting for Maryland.

Megill won the ensuing face-off to give the Terps possession and they cashed in less than a minute later. Senior All-America candidate Michael Phipps, who also scored a goal, fired a skip pass to sophomore midfielder Jeremy Sieverts, who was cutting in front of the Navy goal. Sieverts one-timed a shot past Finnegan for his second goal of the game to cut the Midshipman lead to 7-6.

That's the way the game would stay until the final minute of regulation. Maryland looked to have tied the game when Evans had a clean look at the goal on the doorstep, but Finnegan was there to make the save and preserve the one-goal lead. The Mids tried to run out the clock, but the Terps would get one more crack at it thanks to senior All-America candidate Ryan Clarke, who caused his third turnover of the game with 56 seconds left. Two-time All-American Steve Whittenberg came up with the big groundball and cleared the ball into the Maryland offensive zone.

That set the stage for Evans' heroics. With time running out, Evans drove high and used multiple roll dodges to separate from his defender. That gave him just enough space to get off the game-tying shot.

The first overtime was a physical struggle with Maryland goalie Brian Phipps making two of his 13 saves and Finnegan coming up with another key save.

Navy never got possession in the second overtime thanks to freshman defensive midfielder Bryn Holmes, who beat Navy's face-off specialist William Wallace. Senior short stick Jimmy Borell grabbed the loose ball and raced into the attack zone. Junior All-America candidate Max Ritz, who scored a goal and added an assist in the game, looked to end the game, but Finnegan was there to make the save. Sieverts came up with the groundball off of the save to keep possession for the Terps.

That set the stage for Groot, who dodged past his defender through the left alley and was able to beat Finnegan over the left shoulder to give Maryland its first victory over the Mids since 2003.

Maryland's defense was tremendous in the victory, especially the man-down unit that held Navy without a goal in five extra-man opportunities, including one when the Terps were two men down.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The seventh-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team rallied from a two-goal deficit in the fourth quarter to send the game into overtime, but All-American Paul Rabil gave No. 10 Johns Hopkins the stunning 8-7 victory Saturday night at a rain-soaked Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium.

The first period proved even with both teams picking up a single goal. Maryland opened up a 2-1 lead a minute and a half into the second period on Adam Sear's sixth goal of the season.

But the lead was short-lived as the Blue Jays would go on a three-goal run, the first two coming on unassisted goals by Austin Walker, to take a 4-2 advantage into halftime.

The Terps refused to go quietly however and responded with their own three-goal run in the third to take a 5-4 lead. Senior co-captain Chris Feifs started and ended the run with two of his career-high three goals on the evening. Senior All-America candidate Michael Phipps' lone goal of the game was sandwiched between Feifs' pair. All three goals came on low skip shots from the right wing.

That lead disappeared quickly as Hopkins' Kevin Huntley capitalized on a Maryland penalty 20 seconds later to knot the score at 5-5. That was the beginning of another three-goal run by the Blue Jays that was capped by another Huntley man-up goal at the 13:22 mark of the fourth quarter.

Jeremy Sieverts started the Terrapin comeback with a brilliant individual effort with just over nine minutes remaining. The sophomore midfielder dodged around his defender to the left alley and drilled a quick shot over Blue Jay goalie Jesse Schwartzman's right shoulder to pull Maryland to within a goal.

The Terps tied the game less than three minutes later when Feifs converted on a man-up opportunity from the right wing off of a strong skip pass from Phipps.

The two teams waged a tough physical game over the final seven minutes of regulation, but neither was able to get another score. Maryland looked for one last shot as the clock was winding down, but Hopkins was able to force a turnover with 12 seconds remaining. Stephen Pysler got off a hard shot as the clock ticked down to zero, but freshman goalie Brian Phipps made one of his eight saves on the game to preserve the tie and send the game into overtime.

That's where Rabil, who was 0-of-5 shooting in regulation, sent Hopkins home with the 8-7 win 43 seconds into the extra session.

Defensively Maryland got tremendous play from senior All-Americans Steve Whittenberg and Ray Megill. Whittenberg, who held Hopkins' leading scorer Steven Boyle to no goals and just one assist, caused three Blue Jay turnovers. Megill caused a pair of turnovers and picked up three groundballs. Senior All-America candidate Ryan Clarke turned in a solid effort with four groundballs and three caused turnovers.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. - Max Ritz tied his career high with six points on a season-best four goals and two assists to lead the No. 8 University of Maryland men's lacrosse team (9-4) to a 14-10 win over Penn (6-6) Saturday afternoon at Franklin Field.

Ritz, a native of Wayne, Pa., just outside of Philadelphia, scored a hat trick in the first half to keep Maryland in the game as the Quakers, who were playing to keep any hopes of an NCAA tournament bid alive, held two-goal leads twice in the half.

But with just over a minute remaining and Penn holding a 6-5 lead, Ritz's third goal of the game tied the contest in spectacular fashion. The junior All-America candidate took a feed from junior midfielder Drew Evans in front of the crease and as momentum and a Quaker defender were taking Ritz to the right side, he flipped the ball over his left shoulder for a behind-the-back goal.

The Quakers were determined to put up a fight and took their fifth lead of the game just 26 seconds into the third quarter on Craig Andrzejewski's second goal of the game. But that would be Penn's last lead as the Terps would rip off four straight to finish the period and take a 10-7 lead into the fourth. Senior All-America candidate Michael Phipps figured in on two of the goals, scoring a goal and adding an assist. He also picked up an assist on Thomas Alford's goal, which gave Maryland its first lead at 8-7. Evans started the run with a low-to-high shot from the right wing.

Penn's Garvey Heiderman put an end to the run with his first of two goals on the day. But that just set off another four-goal scoring spree for the Terps that put the game out of reach.

Sophomore midfielder Dan Groot scored his second goal of the game, capitalizing on a man-up opportunity, off an assist from Ritz. Maryland picked up its next two scores from the left alley from senior midfielder Jon Beard and freshman attackman Fran Gormley. Beard scored his second of the season of a nifty low-to-high shot off of a roll dodge, while Gormley got one past Quaker goalie Chris Casey, who finished with 13 saves, with a tough bounce shot with a pair of defenders bearing down on him.

Ritz capped off the scoring for the Terps, which gave them a 14-8 lead, thanks to some quick hands. Phipps laced a shot that beat Casey, but it clipped the left post and bounced right to Ritz, who scooped up the groundball and flipped it into the net in one smooth motion.

Penn finished the game with two late goals by J.J. Lian, who tallied three scores on the day, and Heiderman.

Senior Harry Alford picked up the win in net for the Terrapins after taking over for starting goalie Brian Phipps at the beginning of the third quarter. Alford made six saves to pick up win No. 23 for his career.

Maryland's defense was tenacious all afternoon, forcing 18 of Penn's 26 turnovers. Senior All-American Steve Whittenberg enjoyed another tremendous game with four caused turnovers and three groundballs. All-America candidates Ryan Clarke and Joe Cinosky each had four groundballs and combined for five caused turnovers.

Tewaaraton Trophy nominee Ray Megill also had a solid day for the Terps, causing a turnover and picking up a groundball, but the senior All-American also sparked the offense. He scored his third goal of the season at the start of the second quarter to tie the game at 3-3.

The Quakers won 16-of-28 face-offs, but freshman defensive midfielder Bryn Holmes turned the tide in the second half, winning 7-of-11 draws and picking up a game-high seven groundballs.

DURHAM, N.C. - The sixth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team battled back from a four-goal deficit in the fourth quarter, but fell to No. 3 Virginia, 11-10, in the ACC Semifinals at Duke's Koskinen Stadium Friday evening.

After Virginia took a 1-0 lead less than a minute, the Terps went on a 4-0 run over the next 11 minutes to take a 4-1 lead. Senior attackman Michael Phipps started the run off an assist from freshman Bryn Holmes. Sophomores Dan Groot and Jeremy Sieverts, who started his first game at attack, scored the next two for Maryland. Sieverts then set up the fourth goal, which came on a man-up opportunity, with a good skip pass to Durham, N.C., native Chris Feifs, who buried a shot from the left wing into the top right corner of the goal.

Cavalier attackman Ben Rubeor pulled the Wahoos to within a goal at 4-3 before the close of the first quarter with a pair of goals in the final two minutes.

The Terps built the lead to 5-3 less than two minutes into the second quarter on Groot's second goal of the game with a top-shelf shot from the left wing off an assist from Phipps. But that lead vanished as Virginia reeled off three unanswered goals from Steve Giannone, Danny Glading, and Rubeor, who added assists on the other two goals.

The defense stepped-up to stop the bleeding as junior All-America candidate Joe Cinosky caused a turnover on the defensive end and raced down the field before feeding freshman long pole Brian Farrell, who scored his first goal since the Towson game on March 10 to tie the score at 6-6 with 5:54 to play in the second quarter.

Virginia took a one-goal lead into the locker room when Jack Riley scored off an assist by Garrett Billings. The Cavaliers built that lead to 9-6 in the third quarter by scoring the only two goals of the period. Billings scored Virginia's eighth goal when he picked up his own rebound on the right wing and fired another shot that Maryland goalie Harry Alford got a piece of, but the ball just trickled across the goal line for the score. Giannone scored with 2:30 remaining in the quarter for the three-goal advantage.

Ryan Kelly finished a 4-0 Virginia run with an unassisted goal to give the Cavaliers a 10-6 lead. Phipps gave the Terps some life when he snapped a 21-minute Maryland scoreless streak with his second score of the game at 9:38 in the fourth.

The Terps cut the lead to two less than two minutes later when Groot connected on his third score of the game, capitalizing on an extra-man opportunity off an assist by Max Ritz. The Wahoos got the lead back up to three at the 5:13 mark when Brian Carroll scored off a feed from Glading.

Maryland remained resilient as it bounced back with an 18-yard cannon into the upper right off an assist from Groot to trim the lead to 11-9. Groot then scored his second man-up goal, and career-best fourth overall, of the game to cut the lead to one.

The Terps had a chance to tie the game on extra-man with 1:11 left when Adam Fassnacht was called for a holding, but Virginia goalie Kip Turner came up with a big save on a Groot shot from 10 yards out in the right alley to preserve the tie.

Harry Alford started his first game of the season in goal for the Terps and finished with nine saves.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Seniors Chris Feifs and Michael Phipps combined for seven of Maryland's 12 goals to lead the sixth-ranked Terrapins to a 12-4 victory over Yale on Senior Day at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium on Saturday afternoon.

Maryland (10-5) was never threatened in the game, jumping out to a 4-0 lead in the first quarter. Feifs got the Terps started with his first of a career-high four goals on the day less than a minute into the game. Senior All-America defender Ray Megill picked up his third assist of the season on the goal.

Phipps then stole the show with all three of his scores coming in a span of 1:07. The first came in transition from the right wing off an assist from senior long pole Ryan Clarke, who last picked up an assist on May 6, 2006. Phipps then tried the left wing and skipped a low shot in off an assist from junior attackman Max Ritz. His third score came 10 seconds later off an assist from Bryn Holmes, who won the face-off clean and laced a pass to Phipps on the right side of the crease where he ripped off a low-to-high shot for the goal.

Junior midfielder Drew Evans got the run started with a jumping skip-shot before Sieverts rattled off two scores in 10 seconds. Feifs netted his third of the game next off an assist from Evans before Sieverts finished his hat trick with an unassisted goal at the 9:24 mark.

Sophomore midfielder Dan Groot got into the scoring column for the ninth time in the last 10 games with a rocket from 15 yards out in front of the Bulldog goal. The run was capped off with Feifs' fourth goal of the day off a skip pass from Sieverts for a 12-1 Maryland lead.

Yale got three goals in the fourth quarter from Chris Kempner, Brendan Gibson and Michael Karwoski to close out the scoring.
