POSTSEASON NOTES

TERPS MAKE FINAL FOUR FOR THIRD TIME IN FOUR SEASONS, FINISH WITH 12 WINS

- Maryland returned to the NCAA Semifinals for the third time in four years, and finished the 2006 season with a 12-5 record and a No. 4 ranking in the USILA and *Inside Lacrosse* polls.
- Despite dropping an 8-5 decision to UMass in the NCAA semifinals, the 2006 Terps showed tremendous heart, determination and perseverance throughout the season. Maryland defeated seven nationally ranked teams, including then-No. 1 Duke, and held the No. 1 ranking for two weeks in March.
- The 2006 Terrapins will also be remembered for its dominating 11-4 victory at sixth-ranked Johns Hopkins on April 15. That win was the first for a Maryland team at Homewood Field since 1996.
- 1996 was also the last time before this season that the Terps earned the No. 2 seed in the NCAA Tournament. Maryland earned that honor by finishing the regular season with a 10-4 records against the nation's toughest schedule.

DAVE COTTLE

HEAD COACH • FIFTH SEASON AT MARYLAND • SALISBURY '78

Dave Cottle, the third winningest active coach in lacrosse, begins his fifth season at the helm of the Maryland lacrosse program in 2005. He was named the eighth coach in the storied history of Maryland lacrosse on Sept. 26, 2001, after a sensational 19-year stint as the head coach at Loyola College in Baltimore.

Cottle, 50, took the reins from the ACC's all-time winningest coach, Dick Edell, who retired on Sept. 3, 2001 after 18 years with the Terps.

He enters the 2006 season as the third winningest active coach in the sport of lacrosse, winning 72.2 percent of his games for a 226-87 record. He picked up his 225th career victory in the Terps' 14-10 win over Penn State in the first round of the 2005 NCAA Tournament on May 14, 2005.

Last season, he directed Maryland to its ninth trip to the NCAA Semifinals and its second straight ACC tournament championship. The Terps ended the season with an overall record of 11-6, but finished the season winning six of their last seven games. Six Maryland players were named postseason All-Americans, including midfielder Bill McGlone, who was a first team selection. Cottle's program also earned another honor in June of 2005 when attackman Joe Walters was named to the 2006 U.S. National Team, the only college player to be selected to the 23-man roster.

Cottle guided the 2004 Terps to a 13-3 record and their first ACC championship since 1998. Maryland finished the season ranked No. 3 in the USILA poll and made it to the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament. Eight Terrapin players earned All-America honors, including three first team honorees, and Lee Zink was named National Defenseman of the Year, marking the second straight season a Terp earned that honor.

In 2003 he led Maryland back to the NCAA Semifinals for the fourth time in nine years, but the first since 1998. The Terps had a stellar season finishing ranked No. 3 in the nation after being ranked in the top seven all season. Maryland piled numerous accolades as they had eight USILA All-Americans including first-team honoree and National Defenseman of the Year Michael Howley.

The Terps posted a 12-4 record in 2003 and gave Cottle his third trip to the national semifinals. He led the Greyhounds to two national semifinal appearances including an appearance in the 1990 championship game.

The backbone of Cottle's success has been his emphasis on a strong work ethic, intelligent recruiting, attention to detail, and a creative approach to the game. He also is a true believer in the concept of "student-athlete." In each of the last four years, his team's graduation rate has been 89 percent or higher. Six of Cottle's Terrapin players earned USILA Scholar All-America honors, including 2005 graduate Ian Healy, who became just the third Maryland student-athlete to be inducted into Phi Beta Kappa, the nation's oldest and most prestigious academic society.

He led his Loyola teams to top-10 finishes in each his 14 seasons. The Greyhounds finished with a winning record the final 18 years of his tenure, dating to 1984. Loyola also played in 14 consecutive NCAA Tournaments, entering the 1998 and 1999 tournaments as the No. 1 seed.

A Baltimore native, Cottle took over a struggling Greyhound program in 1983. Since posting a first-year record of 5-9, his only losing season, Cottle's Loyola teams reeled off 18 consecutive winning seasons. The 1998 team's 13-2 campaign, which ended with a berth in the NCAA semifinals, saw Loyola reach a No. 1 national ranking, and the school's first No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

In 1988 the Greyhounds began their current run of 14 consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances. Loyola advanced to the national championship game in 1990, and it has made 10 NCAA quarterfinal appearances. In fact, Loyola has advanced to at least the national quarterfinals in seven of the past eight seasons.

The 1990 team, a potent mix of seasoned veterans and talented underclassmen, marched all the way to the NCAA championship game after making the school's first NCAA semifinal appearance. In the semifinals the Greyhounds staged an incredible comeback to beat Yale, 14-13, in overtime and advanced to the title contest against two-time defending champion Syracuse. The Orangemen ended Loyola's quest for the national title, but the Greyhounds' 1990 season always will be remembered.

In 1994 Cottle guided the Greyhounds to one of their best seasons ever. Loyola finished 11-2, recording wins against four teams that participated in the NCAA Tournament. The Greyhounds earned the nation's No. 1 ranking for only the second time in the program's history during that memorable campaign. Loyola concluded the regular season with a 17-15 victory over Johns Hopkins, the program's first victory ever against the Blue Jays. Ranked third in the final USILA poll, the Greyhounds earned a first-round bye into the NCAA Tournament before dropping a 14-13 overtime decision to Brown in the NCAA quarterfinals.

Cottle also guided his 1988 and 1989 teams to the postseason. The 1988 squad finished with a 12-2 record, earning Loyola's first NCAA Division I tournament berth. Loyola defeated Air Force for its first NCAA postseason victory before losing to Penn in an exciting quarterfinal. The Greyhounds concluded the campaign ranked fifth in the nation, and Cottle earned USILA Coach-of-the-Year honors, becoming the first coach in Loyola athletic history to receive a national award. Cottle was selected to coach the South team in the 1988 North-South All-Star Game.

The 1989 Greyhounds became the only Loyola lacrosse team to complete an undefeated regular season. The Greyhounds beat four nationally ranked teams en route to a perfect 10-0 mark. Loyola was ranked third in the final poll, behind eventual national champion Syracuse and Johns Hopkins. A quarterfinal loss to North Carolina ended Loyola's season, but the Greyhounds captured the attention of the lacrosse world with their best record ever.

Cottle came to Loyola in 1982 after leading Severn School to a 26-9 record and consecutive Maryland Scholastic Association championships. Prior to his success at Severn, Cottle served for two years as a graduate assistant coach, assistant varsity lacrosse coach and physical education instructor at his alma mater, Salisbury State University.

One of the finest players in Salisbury State history, Cottle was enshrined into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1989. During his career he re-wrote the NCAA record book, while earning All-America honors three times. He still holds many places in the Salisbury State record book, and was just the second player in collegiate lacrosse history to score over 100 points in a single season. The nation's leading scorer in 1975, he served as captain of the South team in the North-South All-Star Game.

Cottle received his bachelor of science degree in physical education in 1978 from Salisbury.

He was an assistant coach for Team USA 1994, which won the world championship in Manchester, England. Cottle has addressed many lacrosse gatherings across the country, including the USILA Coaches' Convention, and he serves as a member of the All-America Selection Committee. In February of 1998 he was inducted into the Baltimore Chapter of the Lacrosse Foundation's Hall of Fame.

A graduate of Baltimore's Northern High School, Cottle lives with his wife, Lynn, daughters, Taylor and Tory, and son, Sean, in Edgewater, Md.

WALTERS WINS TURNBULL AWARD AS NATION'S TOP ATTACKMAN

- Senior All-American Joe Walters added one more honor to his lengthy list of accomplishments as a Terrapin at the USILA All-America Banquet on Sunday, May 28, when he was awarded the 2006 Lt. Col. J.J. Turnbull Award as the nation's top attackman.
- Walters is the first Terrapin player to take home the Turnbull Award since 1991 when Mark Douglas won the award. Walters is the eighth Terp overall to win attackman of the year.

SEVEN TERPS EARN ALL-AMERICA HONORS

- Seniors Bill McGlone and Joe Walters were named to the USILA All-America first team for the second time in their careers as the teams were announced Saturday, May 27, before the NCAA Final Four began at Lincoln Financial Field in Philadelphia. McGlone was the only member of the 2005 first team to repeat as a first-teamer in 2006.
- A total of seven Terps were honored by the USILA, bringing Maryland's four-year total to 29. Junior defender Steve Whittenberg was named to the second team, while fellow junior defender Ray Megill earned third team recognition. Senior attackman Xander Ritz, senior midfielder Brendan Healy and junior goalie Harry Alford were honorable mention selections.

WALTERS SELECTED NO. 1 OVERALL IN MLL DRAFT

- Joe Walters was selected as the No. 1 overall pick in the 2006 Major League Lacrosse Collegiate Draft Wednesday night in Fairfield, Conn. Walters, a Rochester, N.Y., native, was selected by his hometown team, the Rochester Rattlers.
- Walters was the first of four Terps to be selected in the first 27 picks. Bill McGlone was also a first-round pick, going to the Baltimore Bayhawks with the fifth selection. The Bayhawks also selected Brendan Healy in the second round with the 12th overall pick. Xander Ritz was the final Terp selected, going to his hometown Philadelphia Barrage in round three with the 27th overall pick.
- In the first three rounds of the draft, 13 of the 31 picks were from ACC schools. Virginia led the way with five picks. Maryland was next with four, while Duke had three players selected. North Carolina had one player taken.

THE CLASS OF 2006

- Ten players finished their Terrapin careers in 2006: Brent Hargest, Michael Hartofilis, Brendan Healy, Ryan Lang, Bill McGlone, Teddy Murphy, Xander Ritz, Scott Slosson, David Tamberrino and Joe Walters.
- During their four-year careers Maryland compiled an overall record of 48-18 (.727). The 48 wins marks the most for any four-year span in the 81-year history of Maryland men's lacrosse.
- Maryland made four NCAA Tournament appearances, advancing to the Final Four three times. In the past four seasons the Terps also won two ACC Tournament titles (2004 & 2005) and also advanced to the 2006 championship game.

SUPER SENIORS

- Maryland's foursome of Super Seniors - Joe Walters, Xander Ritz, Bill McGlone and Brendan Healy - could be the most productive group of seniors to ever come through College Park. While Walters' exploits (227 points on 153 goals and 74 assists) are well known and widely reported, the other three have put up some lofty numbers of their own.
- With his three-point game vs. Virginia in the ACC finals, McGlone eclipsed the 100-point mark for his career and finished with 107 points on 77 goals and 30 assists.
- Ritz reached the 100-point milestone for his Maryland career (100 points on 56 goals and 44 assists) with three goals and an assist vs. UNC in the ACC semifinals. He ended with 110 points as a Terp. His career totals are 80 goals and 70 assists for 150 points, including his freshman season at Delaware.
- Healy struggled at times, but turned things around at just the right time, helping lead the Terps going into the NCAA Tournament. He led all scorers with five goals and three assists in the ACC tournament. He followed that up with a hat trick vs. Penn, a five-point game vs. Denver in the first round of the NCAA Tournament and another hat trick vs. Princeton in the NCAA Quarterfinals. Healy finished his Maryland career with 88 points on 60 goals and 28 assists.
- Combined the quartet scored 370 goals and added 202 assists for 572 points.

WALTERS IS FIRST TERP TO BE NAMED A FINALIST FOR THE TEWAARATON TROPHY

- Senior attackman Joe Walters was named one of five finalists for the Tewaaraton Trophy, which is awarded to the nation's top college lacrosse player, the Tewaaraton Award Foundation announced on May 16. Walters is the first Terrapin to be named a finalist for the prestigious honor.
- Also on the list of finalists are Kyle Dixon of Virginia, Sean Morris of Massachusetts, Chris Unterstein of Hofstra and Matt Ward of Virginia, who took home the trophy.
- Senior midfielder/attackman **Xander Ritz**, who was one of three players added to the list on March 27 as a midseason addition to the watch list, was among the 25 on the official nominee list, but was not named a finalist.
- Senior **Bill McGlone** and junior **Harry Alford** were on the preseason "Watch List," but did not make the official nominee list.

HEALY HONORED ON AND OFF THE FIELD

- Senior midfielder Brendan Healy was named an honorable mention All-American for the third time in his career by the USILA for his efforts on the playing field, but he was also honored for his work off the field as well.
- In April, Healy was named a National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA) All-American.
- His efforts in the classroom were also recognized. Healy, who graduated in May with a degree in marketing, was named a USILA Scholar All-American and was the recipient of an ACC Postgraduate Scholarship.
- Healy could take home another honor in June when the CoSIDA Academic All-America At-Large team is announced.

DEFENSE PROVES TO BE STRONG AGAIN

- Heading into the 2006 season the big question mark surrounding the Terps was their defense. The entire starting close defense from 2004, consisting National Defensive Player of the Year Lee Zink and All-Americans Chris Passavia and Dave Wagner, Team MVP short-stick D-middle Paul Gillette, and All-America goalie Tim McGinnis were lost to graduation. Taking that group's place figured to be no easy task, but it proved to be easier than previously imagined. With nearly the entire 2005 defense returning for 2006 take a look at how this year's defense stacks up to the previous two:

- During the last two seasons, Maryland held its' opponents scoreless for long stretches of game time. The 2004 Terps kept opponents scoreless for stretches of 20 or more minutes eight times. Last year Maryland did it on seven occasions, and was just seconds away from keeping the high-powered Duke (1st meeting) and Navy offenses off the board for more than 20 minutes. This season the Terrapin defense did it 10 times in its 17 games.
- At No. 7 Georgetown in the season opener, the Hoyas took a 2-1 lead with 0:13 left in the first quarter. Maryland's defense, lead by sophomore goalie **Harry Alford**, who totaled 14 saves in the 10-4 victory, didn't allow the seventh-ranked Hoyas another goal until 7:09 in the fourth quarter, a total time of 38:05. Of the Hoyas' four goals, two were scored during a Maryland penalty.
- Even though the Terp defense did not hold No. 1 Duke scoreless for any 20-minute stretch, it did hold one of the nation's most prolific offenses to the Blue Devils' lowest scoring output of the season. Prior to scoring just seven goals vs. Maryland, Duke had put up 20 on Butler, 13 on Villanova and 16 on Bellarmine for an average of 16.3 goals per game.
- In their first home game of 2006 against No. 15 Towson, the Terps dominated the first half of play, holding the Tigers scoreless for a 4-0 Maryland advantage at the half. Towson didn't get on the board until the 8:28 mark of the third quarter, which ended its scoring drought to 36:32. The Terp defense caused 14 of the Tigers' 24 turnovers, including a career-best five CT's by **Steve Whittenberg**. Maryland also controlled the game on the ground, beating Towson in groundballs 40-21.
- Maryland may have lost its first game of 2006 to Bucknell, 7-6 in 2OT, but the Terrapin defense turned in another stellar effort, led by junior All-American **Steve Whittenberg**, who surpassed his Towson-effort by causing six Bison turnovers and picking up five groundballs. As a team, the Terps caused 15 of Bucknell's 23 turnovers and won the groundball battle, 37-22. Even though Bucknell scored twice in each of the first three quarters for a 6-3 lead heading into the fourth, Maryland's D shutout the Bison in the fourth, allowing the Terrapin offense to score three unanswered goals to tie the game. Overall the Terps held Bucknell scoreless for 27:47 before giving up the game-winning goal with nine seconds left in the second overtime.
- It didn't get to 20 scoreless minutes, but that's because the clock ran out during Maryland's dominating defensive performance in its 9-4 win at UMBC. The Terp defense gave up just the four goals and there was only one assist on the Retriever scores. Maryland held just a one-goal lead going into the fourth quarter, but the defense shutout UMBC in the final period to allow the offense to score four unanswered goals. It was the sixth time this season that Maryland has not allowed a goal in a quarter.
- It will be hard to top the Terrapin defense's effort in the 14-2 thrashing of Dartmouth. While it is impressive that the Terps held the Big Green scoreless for the first 53:32 of the game, it is even more impressive that Dartmouth did not even get off a shot until the 6:56 mark of the second quarter. The Big Green committed 25 turnovers in the game with 19 of those caused by a Maryland player, including four by **Ryan Clarke** and three each by **Joe Cinosky** and **Ray Megill**.
- Maryland turned in another impressive defensive performance in its 9-6 win at North Carolina to raise the Terps' record to 6-1. For the fifth time this season, Maryland held an opponent scoreless for more than 20 minutes - this time 21:26, bridging the third and fourth quarters, during which the Terrapin offense was able to score five unanswered goals. **Ryan Clarke** and **Jimmy Borell** were impressive in the defensive midfield, combining for eight groundballs and two caused turnovers.

- After struggling during the first half against Navy, the Terp defense turned things around by allowing just two goals in the final 30 minutes to allow the offense to get back on track and erase a 5-1 deficit. Maryland allowed a goal at the 5:48 mark of the third quarter and did not allow another goal until eight seconds left in the fourth, a span of 20:40. Back-up goalie **Jason Carter** made seven saves in the game after subbing in for Alford midway through the first period. The sophomore also caused three turnovers and picked up three groundballs. Junior All-American **Ray Megill** set a career-high with four caused turnovers vs. the Mids.
- Against Johns Hopkins, Maryland turned in one of its most dominating performances of the season against one of the nation's elite programs. The Terps held the Blue Jays to four goals (tying their season low) - more than six goals below their season average. **Harry Alford** made nine saves in goal for Maryland and picked up two groundballs. Other defensive standouts for the Terps include junior All-American **Ray Megill**, who caused three Hopkins' turnovers and picked up a career-high five groundballs. All-American **Steve Whittenberg** caused two turnovers and picked up four groundballs. Maryland's third starting defenseman, sophomore **Joe Cinosky**, finished the game with a career-best four groundballs. The Terps held the Blue Jays to just one goal in the first 27 minutes of the game and allowed the offense to build a 5-1 lead that was never surrendered.
- Much like the Dartmouth game, the Pioneers of Sacred Heart were smothered by the Terp defense en route to an 18-2 Maryland victory. The Terps shutout Sacred Heart in the first half and allowed the Pioneers' two goals in a 1:30 span in the third quarter before shutting Sacred Heart out for the final 22:18. The Terrapin defense didn't just play defense against SHU as three defenders got into the scoring column as well. Sophomores **Ryne Adolph** and **Jacob Baxter** tallied their first career assists, while junior long-pole **Ryan Clarke** picked up his third assist of the season.
- The defense started out slow in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament against North Carolina, which jumped out to a 6-1 lead midway through the second quarter. The Tar Heels took that lead into halftime, but in the game's final 30 minutes the Terp defense allowed just three more Carolina goals to allow the offense to get on track and come back for a 10-9 win. Maryland's "D" held Carolina to one goal from the 6:54 mark of the second to 12:55 of the fourth quarter, a span of 23:59.
- While the Terps lost the ACC title game, 11-5, to No. 1 Virginia, their defense played tough, hard-nosed team defense in holding the Cavaliers, the nation's top scoring offense, to their second lowest goal total of the season. Virginia entered the game scoring 16.0 goals per game in its previous 12 games.
- The Terp D stood strong against No. 10 Penn in a 12-4 Maryland victory in the regular season finale. The Quakers entered the game averaging more than 10 goals per game in 2006, but could only manage four goals on a stingy Maryland defense that held them scoreless for more than 30 minutes from 9:14 in the first quarter to 9:04 in the third. **Harry Alford** was solid again in net, stopping nine Penn shots. **Steve Whittenberg** and **Ryan Lang** each caused two turnovers, while **Joe Cinosky** picked up three groundballs.
- In the first round of the NCAA Tournament, Maryland's defense shutout Denver in the first period, helping the Terps build a 6-0 lead after the first 15 minutes of play. That marked the 17th time this season that the Terps have held an opponent scoreless for an entire quarter. The Terrapins were so overpowering in that first quarter that Denver got off only one shot in that period. Overall, Maryland dominated the Pioneers, picking up a season high 49 groundballs and causing 23 of 27 Denver turnovers.
- The quarterfinal match-up with No. 7 seed Princeton looked to be on paper a meeting of two of the top defenses in the NCAA with each team allowing just 6.3 goals per game heading into the contest. The Terps locked down the Tiger offense in Maryland's 11-6 win, holding Princeton scoreless for 38:09 from midway through the second quarter to the closing seconds of the fourth. The Terps' starting close defense was phenomenal, combining for 10 groundballs and 10 caused turnovers. The top short-stick unit of **Jimmy Borell** and **Jeff Reynolds** also had an outstanding afternoon. Borell picked up five groundballs and caused a turnover, while Reynolds caused two Tiger TOs and had one GB.
- Maryland lost a tough 8-5 game to UMass in the semifinals of the NCAA Tournament, but the defense turned in another stellar effort. The high-powered Minutemen offense, which entered the game averaging nearly 11 points per game, was held to just eight goals. The Terp defense also held UMass scoreless for 20:13 spanning the second and third quarters.

HOME VS. AWAY

- A lot is made in sports about the home-field advantage, and for the Maryland men's lacrosse team that advantage held true in 2006. The Terps have played eight games at home (5-3) and nine away from College Park (7-2: 5-0 Away, 2-2 Neutral) and the numbers show an edge for the Terps when they are on campus in College Park.
- After putting up 16 goals on Denver at Byrd Stadium on May 13, Maryland averaged 10.58 goals per game in its home games, which was nearly two goals better than the 8.65 goals the Terps averaged on the road.
- Shooting percentage, which is one of Coach Dave Cottle's key statistics, is another tell-tale stat, and it shows that Maryland is shooting slightly better on the road. In College Park the Terps shot 26.1% (86/329) and on the road they were shooting 22.9% (78/340). Shots on goal percentage was better at home than on the road, 58.1% to 56.2%.
- **Joe Walters**, the team's leading scorer overall, was also the Terps' top scorer on the road with 18 goals and nine assists for 27 points. **Xander Ritz** had 22 points in road games on 18 goals and four assists. **Walters** also led the squad in scoring at home with 18 goals and 15 assists for 33 points. Ritz was second in home scoring, totaling 24 points on 16 goals and eight assists.
- The Maryland defense was dominating no matter where it played in 2006. As a team, the Terps allowed opponents 6.27 goals per game at home and just 6.54 gpg on the road. In goal, All-American **Harry Alford** made 60 saves in the team's home games with a 6.45 GAA and a .619 save pct. On the road the junior racked up 94 saves with a 6.59 GAA and a .614 save pct.

SHOOTING TELLS THE STORY

- The difference between winning and losing for Maryland this season is simple - when the Terps shoot well they win. Coach Dave Cottle is on record saying that good teams will shoot at least 30%. As it turns out 30% was the magic number for the Terps in 2006.
- In Maryland's 12 victories the Terrapins shot nearly 30% (29.3%, 137 goals/468 shots). In their five losses the Terps' shooting percentage was cut in half to 13.4% (27 goals/201 shots).
- Maybe just as telling is the shots on goal percentage. Maryland put 284 of its 468 shots on goal in its 12 wins (60.7%), but just 98 of 201 shots were on net in five defeats (48.8%).
- Sometime things are not always black and white. The Terps actually averaged more groundballs per game in their five losses (37.4) than in their 12 wins (36.0). Maryland also faced-off slightly better in defeat, winning 55.8% as opposed to 54.5% in victories.

WALTERS NAMED 2006 ACC PLAYER OF THE YEAR

- Joe Walters** became the first Maryland player to be named the ACC Player of the Year twice in his career when he was announced as the 2006 winner at the league's annual awards banquet on April 27. He previously won the award in 2004 and was also the ACC Rookie of the Year in 2003. The Rochester, N.Y., native is also one of two current players in the conference to be named to the All-ACC team three times.

- In addition to being named player of the year Walters was also on the All-ACC team. He was joined by four of his teammates: senior midfielders **Bill McGlone** and **Xander Ritz** and junior defenders **Ray Megill** and **Steve Whittenberg**.

TERPS' 81ST SEASON OF LACROSSE

- The Terps boast an all-time record of 673-219-4 (.753), dating back to the first varsity team in 1924 (a team was not fielded in 1944 and 1945 due to World War II). Maryland has finished every one of its previous 80 seasons with a .500 or better record, including last season when the Terps went 11-6. The program reached the 650-win milestone with a 16-12 win over Army in the first round of the 2004 NCAA tournament at Byrd Stadium.
- Since 2000, Maryland is 80-29 for a .734 win percentage. In the decade of the 1990s, Maryland recorded its most wins in any decade with a 95-47 record. The .669 winning percentage matched Maryland's win percentage of the 1980s when the Terps went 83-41 and also compiled a .669 win percentage.

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Xander and Max Ritz combined to score eight of the Terps' 10 goals to lead the third-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to a 10-4 win over No. 7 Georgetown at the Hoyas' Multi-Sport Field in Washington, D.C., Saturday afternoon.

The game, which proved to be an extremely physical contest that saw a combined 16 penalties called, started slowly in the first quarter and Georgetown was able to take a 2-1 lead into the second period following Andrew Baird's goal with 13 seconds left in the quarter. But that would be the last Hoya goal until the fourth quarter as the Maryland defensive unit shut down the Hoya offense, holding Georgetown without a goal for 38:05.

The Terps didn't waste any time getting on the scoreboard in the second quarter. Max Ritz, a sophomore from Radnor, Pa., scored his second goal of the game less than three minutes into the quarter to knot the score at 2-2. Senior midfielder Michael Hartofilis scored his first goal of the season to give Maryland its first lead of the game at the 9:46 mark of the second period. The Terrapins would take a 4-2 lead into halftime when junior attackman Michael Phipps found senior All-American Bill McGlone in front of the crease and McGlone buried a shot past Hoya goalkeeper Miles Kass, who was making his first career start.

While the Maryland defense was shutting down the Hoya offense in the third period, the Terrapin offense was clicking on all cylinders. Xander Ritz scored four times in the third quarter, including a natural hat trick of three man-up goals.

The Terps, who were up 9-2 at the start of the fourth quarter, capped their scoring at 11:24 in the fourth on Max Ritz's career-best fourth goal of the game. The Hoyas scored two late goals to finish the game at 10-4.

Defensively Maryland was led by junior All-America goalie Harry Alford, who allowed only the four goals while making 14 saves. Junior defensive midfielder Ryan Clarke picked up a game-high six groundballs and caused three Hoya turnovers.

DURHAM, N.C. - The showdown between No. 1 Duke and No. 2 Maryland lived up to the hype as the Terrapins downed the Blue Devils, 8-7 in overtime on senior midfielder **Xander Ritz's** game winner with 2:46 remaining in the overtime period.

CATONSVILLE, MD. - The senior trio of Bill McGlone, Xander Ritz and Joe Walters combined for eight of Maryland's nine goals to lead the No. 1-ranked Terps past UMBC, 9-4, at UMBC Stadium on a cold, windy Saturday afternoon.

Maryland was only up one heading into the fourth quarter, but the defense shutout the upset-minded Retrievers in the final period and the offense scored four goals to give the Terps their fourth victory of the season.

McGlone drew first blood in the opening period with his fifth goal of the season at the 4:54 mark. The senior All-American dodged his defender and raced through the UMBC crease and beat Retriever goalie Jeremy Blevins on his left side for a 1-0 Terrapin lead. UMBC tied the game less than two minutes later on an unassisted goal by junior attackman Drew Westervelt.

The Retrievers took their first lead of the game at 13:41 of the second quarter on an unassisted goal from James Hyland, who dodged to the left and fired a shot past Maryland goalie Harry Alford from the left wing.

The Terps then knotted the game at 2-2 at 7:47. All-American Joe Walters started the play with a shot from the right wing that Blevins saved to start a UMBC clear attempt. McGlone broke up the Retriever clear attempt just over the midfield stripe and sent a pass to junior attackman Michael Phipps on the left side of net, who took a shot that rebounded off Blevins, but McGlone jumped on the other side of the circle and swatted the ball into the goal for his second score of the game.

The third quarter started well for the Terps as they claimed a 3-2 lead off a rocket from senior Xander Ritz, who ripped a shot past Blevins at 13:28. But the Retrievers came right back just over a minute later to tie the game at 3-3 on Hyland's second goal.

Xander Ritz continued his season-long scoring binge with his 14th of the season at the 7:57 mark of the third to put the Terps up 4-3. Max Ritz started the play, dodging under his defender and swinging a pass to Phipps behind the UMBC net. Xander Ritz slipped his defender and cut through the crease where Phipps found him for the easy score.

Phipps gave Maryland a two-goal lead at 5:02 on his first of the season, but UMBC's Andy Gallagher scored an extra-man goal less than a minute later to pull to within one.

The fourth quarter was a defensive struggle for both teams until 7:29 when McGlone picked up his first assist of the season after finding Walters free on the right side of the Retriever crease. Walters slipped by UMBC defender Justin Bergeguez and faked three times before beating Blevins over his left shoulder for a two-goal Terp lead.

Walters scored his second of the game with just under five minutes remaining to give Maryland its biggest lead of the game at 7-4. Xander Ritz put the game out of reach just over a minute later with his third goal of the game off an assist from McGlone. Walters added an empty-net goal to cap the scoring at 9-4.

Defensively for the Terps, junior All-American Steve Whittenberg turned in another outstanding performance, shutting out UMBC senior attackman Brendan Mundorff, who entered the game with 146 career points. Whittenberg finished with three caused turnovers and two groundballs. Sophomores Jacob Baxter and Jeff Reynolds each set career highs with two caused turnovers apiece. UMBC's scoreless fourth quarter was the sixth time this season that Maryland has held an opponent scoreless in a quarter.

COLLEGE PARK, MD. - Any thought that Dartmouth had of pulling off an upset of the Maryland men's lacrosse team was lost early, as the fourth-ranked Terrapins dominated the Big Green, 14-2, Tuesday afternoon at Ludwig Field.

Maryland (5-1) scored seven goals in the first quarter to put the game out of reach in the first 15 minutes of play. What is even more impressive is that the Terps outshot the Big Green 15-0 in the quarter. The Maryland defense did not allow a Dartmouth shot until 6:56 in the second quarter and the Big Green did not get a shot on goal until 3:13 during an extra-man opportunity.

All-American midfielder Bill McGlone started the scoring parade with 12:18 remaining in the quarter off an assist from senior All-American Joe Walters. Sophomore middle Will Dalton scored his first goal of the season just over a minute later for a 2-0 Terp advantage.

Walters scored his first of four goals on the day at the 9:29 mark, but the most amazing score of the game came at 7:46 when sophomore defenseman Joe Cinosky caused a Dartmouth turnover in the Big Green's attack zone and raced the length of the field and fired a high shot past Dartmouth goalie Pat Marshall for his first collegiate goal.

Senior captain Xander Ritz scored the next two Terrapin goals with both coming off assists from younger brother Max. It appeared Maryland would take a 6-0 lead into the second quarter, but Walters fired a low shot with one second remaining that beat Marshall for the Terps' seventh goal of the period.

The second quarter was more of the same for Maryland as Walters scored twice more and assisted on goals by McGlone and Xander Ritz, who assisted both of Walters' goals in the period.

With an 11-0 lead at the half, the Terps were able to get their reserves some valuable playing time in the third and fourth quarters.

Junior midfielder Travis Holmes, who has primarily seen time as a defensive midfielder, scored his first goal of the season at the 2:23 mark of the third off an assist from freshman Danny Gallagher.

Gallagher followed up his first collegiate point with his first collegiate goal in the fourth quarter off an assist from junior Michael Phipps just 50 seconds into the period.

Dartmouth got on the board with a goal from Bread Heritage at the 6:28 mark, but Maryland responded with its first man-down goal of the season on freshman Scott Tompkins' first collegiate goal with an assist by sophomore midfielder Drew Evans.

The Big Green's Brian Koch closed out the scoring with 3:55 remaining with an unassisted goal.

One of the main reasons for Maryland's dominance was the performance of its face-off men. After winning just four of 16 face-offs last Saturday at UMBC, the Terps won 17 of 20 at the X, including 12 wins in 13 draws by senior David Tamberrino. Junior Thomas Alford had his best outing of the season facing-off, winning five of seven attempts.

Defensively for the Terps, it was another tremendous display of both individual and team defense. Junior All-American Steve Whittenberg, who shutout Nick Bonacci, Dartmouth's leading scorer, finished the game with two groundballs and one caused turnover. In addition to scoring a goal, Cinosky also caused three Big Green turnovers and picked up a groundball. The third member of Maryland's starting defense, All-American Ray Megill, also had an outstanding game with three caused turnovers and three groundballs.

Overall, Maryland's defense held the Big Green without a goal for 53:32 and shut them out for three quarters raising its season total of scoreless quarters to nine. The last time a Terrapin team gave up just two goals in a game was April 3, 2004, an 11-2 win over Virginia in College Park.

Junior All-America goalie Harry Alford was only forced to make two saves in 30 minutes of action, while sophomore goalie Jason Carter saw the most extensive playing time of his career, making five saves in just over 20 minutes of work.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. - Player of the Year candidate Joe Walters scored five goals to lead the fourth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to a 9-6 win over North Carolina on a soggy Saturday afternoon at Fetzer Field.

With Carolina (2-7, 0-2 ACC) clinging to a 5-4 lead midway through the third quarter, the Terps (6-1, 2-0 ACC) scored five unanswered goals to pull out the victory.

The first quarter was played at a meticulous pace by both teams with Maryland scoring the lone goal of the period on Walters' 13th goal of the season at the 11:44 mark. The play started in the Carolina offensive zone when Joe Cinosky caused a UNC turnover that Ray Megill scooped up, starting the Maryland break. Junior long pole Ryan Clarke found Walters on the right wing, who rocketed a shot past Tar Heel goalie Grant Zimmerman.

Carolina tied the game at 1-1 with 10:11 remaining in the second quarter when attackman Ryan Blair scored an unassisted goal on a diving shot from the back left of the Maryland goal.

Walters put the Terps back on top with an unassisted goal midway through the second period. After Maryland settled the ball into its offensive zone after a successful clear, Walters scored on an iso play from the right side of the Tar Heel net and beat Zimmerman to the top left corner of the goal.

That lead was short-lived for the Terrapins because less than a minute later Carolina midfielder Rob Driscoll scored an unassisted goal to tie the game at 2-2.

The Tar Heels took their first lead of the game at the 2:56 mark when UNC's Ben Hunt took advantage of an extra-man opportunity.

It looked as if Carolina would take a 3-2 lead into halftime, but Maryland junior defensive middle Travis Holmes caused a Tar Heel turnover in the final minute to give the Terps a chance to tie the game. Walters made sure that chance would not be wasted by scoring his third goal of the game off an assist from senior All-American Brendan Healy.

The Tewaaratron Trophy nominee put the No. 7 Terrapin men's lacrosse team on his shoulders by scoring six goals and dishing out two assists to lead the Terps to an impressive 11-4 victory over the sixth-ranked Blue Jays in front of 9,778 fans at Homewood Field on Saturday night.

COLLEGE PARK, MD. - A dozen Terps scored goals in the fourth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team's 18-2 victory over Sacred Heart Tuesday afternoon in Byrd Stadium.

Leading the way for the Terrapins was senior Tewaaraton Trophy nominee Joe Walters, who is closing in on the school's all-time points and goals scored records. The three-time All-American scored three goals and added an assist to bring his career totals to 145 goals and 211 points, leaving him five goals and nine points away from the school records.

All seven of Maryland's offensive starters scored at least one goal. Seniors Bill McGlone and Xander Ritz and sophomore Max Ritz each scored twice and added assists, while junior Michael Phipps had a goal and an assist. Senior All-American Brendan Healy also chipped in a goal.

The Terrapins' starting defense unit, which dominated Johns Hopkins last Saturday, turned in a workman-like performance. Junior All-America goalie Harry Alford had to make only three saves in 30 minutes of work. The starting defense of Joe Cinosky, Ray Megill and Steve Whittenberg held the Pioneers scoreless for the first two quarters and allowed only five Sacred Heart shots.

Maryland (8-3/2-1 ACC) got seven goals from its reserves with freshman attackman Scott Tompkins leading the way with two goals for the first multi-goal game of his college career.

The Terps got two goals from their second midfield as junior Travis Holmes scored for the second-straight game and freshman Dan Groot tallied his fourth goal of the season. Sophomore middle Drew Evans also played on the second unit and picked up his third assist in the last two games.

The third midfield unit also chipped in with three points on senior Michael Hartofilis second goal of the season, Thomas Alford scored his first of the year and senior Brent Hargest picked up his first career assist.

Capping off the scoring for Maryland was junior attackman Jon Beard. The 2005 JUCO player of the year scored his first goal as a Terp with just over a minute left in the fourth quarter off an assist from junior Jay Feeley, the second of his career.

A trio of defensive players even got into the scoring column for the Terps. Junior long-pole Ryan Clarke notched his third assist of the season, while sophomores Jacob Baxter and Ryne Adolph each collected their first career assists.

The catalyst for Maryland was an outstanding effort by its face-off men, who won 15 of 24 at the X. Senior face-off specialist David Tamberrino won 10 of 13 draws in a little over a half of work. He is now just 10 wins away from 250 for his career. Sophomore Will Dalton also had a good day facing-off, winning three out of five.

For the game, Maryland outshot the Pioneers 53-21 and was just as dominating on the ground, picking up 36 groundballs to Sacred Heart's 25. McGlone led the groundball-effort with four, while sophomore long-pole Charlier Wiggins and Tamberrino each had three.

The Pioneers (2-10/2-3 CAA) got back-to-back goals from Peter Greco and Kevin Walker in the third quarter for their only two scores of the game.

Walters showed why he was selected to be on Team USA this summer at the ILF World Games by dominating the Blue Jay defense. The senior from Rochester, N.Y., scored in every quarter, including two man-up goals. The eight-point game set a new career-best for Walters and is the first eight-point game by a Terp since 2002 when Mike LaMonica scored six goals and added two assists at UMBC.

The win ended a 10 years of frustration for Maryland at Homewood Field and is Maryland's first in the series since 2001. The victory also marked the first time the Terps have defeated Hopkins since Dave Cottle took over as head coach in 2002.

The first quarter was a good one for the Terps and it began with an unlikely source. Just over five minutes into the game junior midfielder Travis Holmes took a pass from Walters on the right wing and bounced a shot past Hopkins goalie Jesse Schwartzman for a 1-0 Terp lead. Walters stretched that advantage to 2-0 with his first goal of the evening, converting a man-up opportunity by lacing as shot past Schwartzman to the top left corner of the goal.

The Terps essentially put the game away in the second quarter with four goals, two from Walters and one each for senior midfielders Xander Ritz and Bill McGlone. Hopkins started the quarter with a man-up goal by Tom Duerr to cut the lead to 2-1. The Blue Jays got the man-advantage when Walters was assessed a 30-second illegal procedure penalty for throwing teammate David Tamberrino's stick to the sidelines after Tamberrino lost his stick in a pile-up.

That may have been the spark that got Walters to another level as he returned to the game after Duerr's goal and scored his second goal of the game 50 seconds later. He isolated his defender behind the Hopkins goal and raced around the cage and fired a low shot from the right side of the net.

Ritz got Walters his second assist of the game and gave the Terps a 4-1 lead with 7:06 left in the second quarter by ripping a shot into the top left corner of the net from the lower right wing.

Walters picked up the game winner with 6:05 in the second quarter on his second man-up goal of the game. Max Ritz picked up his eighth assist of the season by sending a pass to Walters 14 yards out in front of the Hopkins goal. The three-time All-American wound up and ripped a shot past Schwartzman for a 5-1 Maryland lead.

The Blue Jays scored their second goal of the game with 2:21 in the second and seemed to be building some momentum heading into halftime, but McGlone scored his first of two goals with 15 seconds left before the break to shift the advantage back to the Terps and send them into the locker room with a 6-2 lead.

McGlone, a first team All-American in 2005, started the third quarter the way he finished the second, scoring a goal for the Terps and helping keep Hopkins on its heels. The Ridley, Pa., native, took a pass from junior attackman Michael Phipps on the right wing and sent a low shot from around his ankles that beat Schwartzman for a 7-2 lead.

Hopkins got a glimmer of hope when midfielder Stephen Pysier returned from injury to score his first goal of the season at the 11:04 mark of the third. But that glimmer was short-lived as Walters scored his fourth goal of the game to extend Maryland's lead back to five at 8-3.

The fourth quarter was all Maryland and the Terps jumped out quick again as senior All-American Brendan Healy scored his first goal in five games for a 9-3 Terrapin lead. The Great Falls, Va., native, scored unassisted on a bounce-shot when he dodged past his defender on the left wing and fired a shot from seven yards out.

Hopkins tried to make something happen and pulled Schwartzman out of the net to double the ball on Maryland's next possession. But that plan back-fired when the ball got into Walters' hands. He fought through four defenders and slipped an easy empty-net goal for his fifth of the game.

Walters capped the scoring for the Terps by tying his career-high with his sixth goal of the game at the 6:24 mark. Sophomore midfielder Drew Evans picked up his second assist of the game by passing the ball to Walters in front of the Hopkins net and in a shot very similar to his third goal of the game, Walters ripped a shot from 14 yards for an 11-3 Terrapin lead.

Junior All-American Harry Alford rebounded from a pair of disappointing performances the past two weeks to have a tremendous showing vs. the Blue Jays. Alford made nine saves, picked up two groundballs and allowed only four goals in more than 57 minutes of action.

Other defensive standouts for the Terps include junior All-American Ray Megill who caused three Hopkins' turnovers and picked up a career-high five groundballs. All-American Steve Whittenberg caused two turnovers and picked up four groundballs. Maryland's third starting defenseman, sophomore Joe Cinosky, finished the game with a career-best four groundballs.

BALTIMORE, MD. - The third-ranked Maryland men's lacrosse team outscored North Carolina 9-3 in the second half to come away with a 10-9 victory over the Tar Heels Friday night at M&T Bank Stadium. Xander Ritz gave Maryland its first lead of the day with just 1:25 left in the fourth quarter to send the Terps to a third-straight ACC Final Sunday afternoon against No. 1 Virginia.

Senior All-American Brendan Healy led all scorers with a career-high five points on three goals and two assists, setting a career high with five points. Xander Ritz, who earned All-ACC honors this season, scored two of his three goals, including the game winner, in the final eight minutes of play.

Sophomore attackman Michael Phipps dished out three assists, including the feed to Ritz for the game-winner, in the come-from-behind victory.

North Carolina controlled the early going jumping out to a 4-0 lead in the first quarter on goals from Ben Hunt, Andrew McElduff, Nick Tintle and Michael Burns. Ritz got Maryland on the scoreboard early in the second period on a man-up goal, but UNC tacked on a pair of goals to take a 6-1 lead into the half.

The Terps got things going in the second half with a huge third quarter, outscoring the Tar Heels 6-1 to pull the game even at 7-7. Max Ritz opened the scoring for the Terrapins in the second half with a goal just 49 seconds into the period. Healy then continued the charge with three-straight goals midway through the quarter. All-American Bill McGlone and ACC Player of the Year Joe Walters each added scores for the Terps. Carolina's lone goal came from Hunt on a man-up opportunity.

With its five-goal cushion erased and all of the game's momentum in Maryland's favor, Carolina regained control of the game at the start of the fourth quarter with back-to-back goals by Ben Staines and Drew Habeck to pull out to a 9-7 lead.

Xander Ritz pulled the Terps to within a goal at the 8:08 mark of the fourth when Tar Heel goalie Grant Zimmerman saved a hard shot by McGlone but could not control the rebound. Ritz pounced on the groundball and quickly fired a shot over Zimmerman's left shoulder into the top corner of the net.

McGlone tied the game for Maryland with four and a half minutes left off Healy's second assist of the game, setting the stage for Ritz's third game-winning shot of the season.

The play started for the Terps at 2:53 when All-America defender Steve Whittenberg caused his third UNC turnover of the game and picked up a groundball to help clear the ball into Maryland's offensive zone. Walters appeared to give the Terrapins the lead when he beat Zimmerman with a high, hard shot from the right wing, but the ball clipped the crossbar preserving the Carolina lead. Phipps picked up the tough groundball in traffic to keep the possession with the Terps and head coach Dave Cottle called a timeout to settle his team and setup the ensuing possession.

That possession started with the ball finding Walters, who drew an immediate double-team from the Carolina defense. The Tewaaraon Trophy nominee drew the defenders out a step further before sending a pass to Phipps on the right side of the crease. Phipps looked across the goal mouth and laced a pass to a wide-open Ritz, who beat Zimmerman to send Maryland to the ACC Championship game.

Defensively for Maryland, All-America goalie Harry Alford tied his season high with 14 saves, while All-ACC defenders Whittenberg and Ray Megill combined for four groundballs and four caused turnovers. Ritz picked up a game-high six groundballs and junior defensive midfielder Jimmy Borell set his career best with five pick-ups.

BALTIMORE, Md. - The top-ranked Virginia Cavaliers ended the third-ranked Maryland men's lacrosse team's two-year reign as ACC champions with an 11-5 victory Sunday afternoon in front of 5,739 at M&T Bank Stadium.

The Terps were led by senior All-Americans Brendan Healy and Bill McGlone, who were each selected to the all-tournament team. Healy followed up his five-point performance in Friday night's semifinal with a two-goal, one-assist outing vs. the Cavaliers. McGlone's weekend total rose to seven with two goals and an assist after scoring twice and adding two assists on Friday vs. North Carolina.

Junior goalie Harry Alford was also selected to the all-tournament team. The All-American from Washington, D.C., made 11 saves vs. Virginia, bringing his tournament total to 25.

The Cavaliers, who raced out to six unanswered goals in the first meeting between the two teams, scored the game's first two goals in the first four minutes, but Maryland's defense played tough and settled things down before Virginia could get into rhythm. McGlone scored his first goal of the game at the 2:47 mark of the first quarter to close the gap to 2-1, but the Cavaliers' Matt Ward scored his first of two on the day with eight seconds left on the clock for a 3-1 Wahoo advantage.

The second period started slow with several turnovers by both teams before Virginia scored its fourth goal of the game by Steve Giannone at 7:09 on the clock. Maryland answered back a minute and a half later with Healy's first goal of the game coming off an assist by McGlone. The Cavaliers tacked on another for a 5-2 lead less than a minute later and looked to be building momentum.

But the Terps came right back with an unassisted goal by Healy, his fifth of the tournament, at the 3:57 mark to close the deficit to 5-3. Virginia built the lead back to three goals with Danny Gladding's unassisted goal 48 seconds later. The Wahos looked like they would up that lead to four before the half when Maryland's Jeff Reynolds was called for a cross check penalty with 1:30 remaining, but Alford stepped up and made two big saves to help the Terps kill the penalty and go into the break just down by three.

Maryland was able to close the gap to 6-4 when junior attackman Michael Phipps scored an unassisted goal, beating Virginia goalie Kip Turner, who was a high school teammate of Phipps' at Severn. But that was as close as the Terps could get, as Virginia scored three unanswered goals in the final four minutes of the third quarter to open up a 9-4 lead.

McGlone scored off an assist from Healy less than a minute into the fourth, but the Cavaliers put the game out of reach with two more goals and a solid defensive performance.

The Terrapin defense, which held Virginia to its second lowest scoring output of the season (five goals below its season average of 16.0), was led by junior All-Americans Steve Whitteberg and Ray Megill. Whittenberg finished the game with five groundballs and a pair of caused turnovers, while Megill picked up three groundballs and caused one turnover. The third member of Maryland's close defensive unit, sophomore Joe Cinosky, caused three Virginia turnovers with one groundball.

COLLEGE PARK, MD. - With his fourth goal of the day, with 1:02 left in the third quarter, senior attackman Joe Walters became Maryland's all-time leader in goals scored with the 150th of his brilliant career. The fact that it came on "Senior Day" with family and friends in the stands cheering him on made it sweet. But the fact that it helped the fourth-ranked Maryland men's lacrosse team to a dominating 12-4 victory over No. 10 Penn was the sweetest thing for Walters.

"Senior Day" turned out to be a showcase for Maryland's high-scoring senior quartet of Walters, Bill McGlone, Brendan Healy and Xander Ritz, but in the end the day belonged to Walters. Entering the game, the two-time ACC Player of the Year was three goals behind Matt Hahn on the all-time goal scoring list with 146 to Hahn's 149.

But even with history within his grasp the Tewaaraton Trophy nominee didn't press the action. He took only one shot in the first quarter. He started to get on a roll in the second period with his first goal of the day, capitalizing on a man-up situation, off an assist from junior attackman Michael Phipps at the 10:29 mark. He picked up goal No. 148 about ten minutes later. With 1:38 left on the clock, off an assist from Ritz, he laced a shot from about eight yards out past Quaker goalie Greg Klossner.

The record-tying goal for Walters came 11 minutes later, with 5:17 to go in the third. McGlone skipped a pass to the Rochester, N.Y., native, who buried a shot from five yards out.

That tandem would hook up again for the record-setting goal just four minutes later and it was vintage Walters. McGlone skipped a pass across the crease to Walters, who dropped his stick and fired a shot from near his ankles past Klossner. A moment passed as realization set in and Walters was mobbed by teammates, who congratulated him and recognized him as the most prolific scorer in the 81-year history of Maryland men's lacrosse.

But the game was not just about Walters' pursuit of the scoring record. The remainder of Maryland's senior quartet each had outstanding games in their last regular season game at Byrd Stadium.

Healy scored Maryland's first two goals to give the Terps a 2-1 lead after the first quarter. He would book-end those with the Terps' final score of the game with 2:18 left in the fourth quarter.

Ritz joined Walters and McGlone as 100-point scorers as a Terp with his two-goal, two-assist afternoon. The Wayne, Pa., native scored back-to-back goals in the second quarter, including what turned out to be the game winner with 9:58 left in the quarter.

McGlone extended his goal-scoring streak to 14 games with Maryland's first goal of the second quarter to build the Terrapin lead to 3-1. The two-time All-ACC honoree also added three assists. In addition to his assists on Walters' record-tying and record-setting goals, he also picked up an assist on Healy's second goal of the first quarter.

Ten of Maryland's 12 goals were scored by the Walters (4), Healy (3), Ritz (2) and McGlone (1). The remaining two goals came from sophomores. Max Ritz scored his 13th goal of the season with a transition tally off an assist from junior long-pole Ryan Clarke. Senior short-stick middle Ryan Lang started the play by causing a Quaker turnover and shuffling the groundball to All-ACC defenseman Steve Whittenberg. Whittenberg found Clarke with a clearing pass and Clarke raced down the middle of the Quaker defense and looked to be positioning himself for a shot, but a pair of Penn defenders converged on him. But that left Max Ritz open on the left side of the crease. Clarke found him with a quick pass and Max Ritz buried the shot past Klossner to give Maryland a 10-4 lead with 11:26 left in the fourth.

The other Terp sophomore to find the back of the Quaker net was midfielder Drew Evans. The Ithaca, N.Y., native scored his first career goal on a one-timer from five yards out on the left side of Penn's crease. Freshman midfielder Dan Groot picked up his first career assist on the play. After dodging his defender, Groot was able to avoid Penn's slider and shuffled a low pass to Evans to tally the helper.

"Senior Day" also turned out to be a showcase for senior David Tamberrino. The face-off specialist from Lutherville, Md., won eight of 11 face-offs and picked up a game-high six groundballs.

Defensively the Terps were led by its trio of close defensemen. Whittenberg, who marked Penn's leading scorer DJ Andrzejewski and held him without a point on 0-4 shooting, caused two Quaker turnovers and picked up one groundball. Sophomore Joe Cinosky totaled three groundballs on the afternoon, while All-ACC selection Ray Megill had one caused turnover and a groundball.

In goal, junior All-American Harry Alford had another steady showing, stopping nine Quaker shots and picking up two groundballs. Senior Teddy Murphy played the final 3:52 for the Terps and made one save.

In addition to Walters, McGlone, Ritz, Healy, Lang, Tamberrino and Murphy, the game also marked the final regular season home game for Brent Hargest, Michael Hartofilis and Scott Slosson.

COLLEGE PARK, MD. - The No. 2 seeded Maryland men's lacrosse team scored the game's first six goals and never looked back en route to a 16-8 win over Denver in the first round of the NCAA Tournament at Byrd Stadium.

With today's victory the Terps advance to the quarterfinals to face No. 7 seed Princeton on May 21 at Towson's Unitas Stadium. The Tigers move on following an 11-8 victory over UMBC in Princeton, N.J. Game time will be decided on Monday, May 15.

Joe Walters, the 2006 ACC Player of the Year, became Maryland's all-time leader in points with six points on the day to raise his career total to 223 points. The native of Rochester, N.Y., surpassed Bob Boniello's mark of 219 with his third assist of the day at the 12:56 mark of the third quarter. The five assists set a career high for Walters, who had previously had four assists twice in his career.

Sophomore attackman Max Ritz also totaled six points on the day with a career-high five goals and one assist. He started the Terrapin scoring run in the first quarter with an unassisted goal from the left side of the Pioneer goal crease. The Wayne, Pa., native scored one more in the first and assisted on Bill McGlone's second quarter goal, the eventual game winner, to finish the first half with three points.

He opened the scoring for the Terps again in the third, getting the goal on Walters' record-setting assist. Ritz picked up the goal after inadvertently tipping a Walters' shot from the right wing, past the right shoulder of Denver goalie Austin Konkol and into the Pioneer net. Ritz scored twice more in the fourth, including Maryland's final goal off an assist from Brendan Healy.

Healy, a two-time All-American, continued his hot scoring streak with a five-point game on three goals and a pair of assists. The Great Falls, Va., native scored a goal in each of the first three quarters and added assists on Xander Ritz's second goal of the game and Max Ritz's fifth goal.

Xander Ritz scored his 11th career hat trick on three of five shooting. The All-ACC midfielder also was a force off the ball, picking up two groundballs and forcing two caused turnovers.

McGlone scored twice, including the game-winner in the second quarter to extend his goal scoring streak to 15 games.

The other two Terrapin goals came from unlikely sources as short-stick defensive midfielder Jimmy Borell scored his first goal of the season on a fast break at 8:24 in the second quarter to extend Maryland's lead to 9-2. Sophomore midfielder Drew Evans scored Maryland's fourth goal of the game in the first quarter on an assist from Walters.

The Terrapin defense was led by a pair of junior All-Americans. Steve Whittenberg tied his career high with five groundballs and causing five Pioneer turnovers, while Ray Megill caused three turnovers and picked up three groundballs. The third member of Maryland's starting close defense, sophomore Joe Cinosky, also chipped in with three groundballs. Reserve defenseman Jacob Baxter also made an impact, tying his career high with three caused turnovers.

Maryland also got a spark from sophomore face-off man Will Dalton, who won 12 of 22 face-offs against Denver's Geoff Snider, who entered the game leading the NCAA in face-off winning percentage.

TOWSON, MD. - The second seeded University of Maryland men's lacrosse team returns to the NCAA Final Four for the third time in the past four seasons after defeating No. 7 seed Princeton, 11-6, in the quarterfinals Sunday afternoon in front of 7,260 at Towson's Unitas Stadium.

The Terps (12-4) used an opportunistic offense and a stingy defense to stifle the Tigers for much of the contest. Senior midfielder Brendan Healy scored his third straight hat trick to pace the Maryland offense, while junior All-America defenseman Steve Whittenberg tied his career high with six caused turnovers to lead the defense.

Maryland jumped out to a 4-0 lead in the first quarter on a pair of goals from Healy and one each from senior All-American Joe Walters and sophomore middle Drew Evans. Princeton finally got on the board with an unassisted goal from Scott Sowanick at the 4:19 mark, but junior attackman Michael Phipps scored a minute later for the Terps to take a 5-1 lead into the second quarter.

That second period saw the Tigers score four goals in 2:57 to tie the game at 5-5. But Princeton would never take the lead as Maryland settled down and took control of the game again with a goal by freshman midfielder Dan Groot at 5:42 of the second quarter. Phipps would add another Maryland goal, his second of the game and the eventual game-winner, at 3:24 to give the Terps a 7-5 halftime advantage.

The two teams battled in the third quarter with both defenses holding the opposing offense in check. Healy tallied the lone goal of the quarter at 9:58, his third of the game. Walters started the play by drawing a double team on the right side of the Tiger crease before skipping a pass to Healy, who laced a shot from 15 yards out on the right wing past Tiger keeper Alex Hewit.

The fourth quarter started well for the Terps when Princeton's Alex Haynie was penalized for illegal procedure at 13:49 to give Maryland a man-up opportunity. The Terrapins, who are second in the nation in extra-man efficiency, took a 9-5 lead when senior Xander Ritz scored his 10th man-up goal of the season off of a quick feed from Walters to the left side of the crease.

Sophomore attackman Max Ritz score Maryland's 10th goal of the game at the 7:31 mark off an assist from older brother Xander. Walters would finish off the scoring for the Terps with his second goal of the day at 3:24. Princeton's Josh Lesko scored the game's final goal with 32 seconds left, ending a 38:09 scoreless stretch for the Tigers.

In addition to Whittenberg's six caused turnovers, the Maryland defense received outstanding efforts from its other starting close defenders. Sophomore Joe Cinosky caused three turnovers and picked up three groundballs, while junior All-American Ray Megill had four groundballs and one caused turnover. In goal, All-American Harry Alford stopped eight shots, including six in the second half.

The Terps also controlled the game from the face-off circle with senior David Tamberrino winning 11 of 20 draws and picking up a game-high seven groundballs. Junior defensive midfielder Jimmy Borell was outstanding on the wing for the Terps, tying his career best with five groundballs.

The Terps will meet unseeded Massachusetts in the semifinals on Saturday, May 27, at Lincoln Financial Field. Face-off between the Minutemen and the Terrapins is scheduled for 11:30 a.m. The second semifinal will pit No. 1 seed Virginia vs. No. 5 seed Syracuse at 2 p.m.

PHILADELPHIA, PA. - The second seeded University of Maryland men's lacrosse team dropped a tough 8-5 decision to the University of Massachusetts in the semifinals of the NCAA Tournament Saturday afternoon at Lincoln Financial Field.

The first quarter was dominated by outstanding goalie play for both teams with junior All-American Harry Alford making six saves for Maryland and UMass' Doc Schneider stopping four Terp shots. Alford was spectacular from the get-go, making two tough saves on the Minutemen's first possession. Maryland jumped out to a 1-0 lead on senior All-American Xander Ritz's wrap-around goal at the 9:12 mark. UMass tied the game at one apiece when Jim Connolly bounced a shot past Alford about 30 seconds later.

The Minutemen took their first lead of the day with just more than five minutes remaining in the first on a Rory Pedrick behind the back shot into the top right corner of the Maryland goal. The quarter would end in a 2-2 tie after junior long-pole Ryan Clarke scored just the second goal of his career off a feed from senior Ryan Lang on a fast break. The breakaway was started by Alford, who made an amazing one-on-one save on UMass' Brian Jacovina, who was on a breakaway for the Minutemen.

The second quarter was a close-fought affair with the Minutemen scoring the lone goal of the quarter just a minute and a half into the period when senior attackman Sean Morris laced a low shot from nine yards out on the right wing for a 3-2 UMass lead. 

Great shooters change levels and are unpredictable (not releasing from the same point all the time). Elite shooters also can everything with time and room. What impressed me possibly the most were a few near misses Walters had with pressure on his hands. He was able to get a shot off when it appeared he lost his angle. The quick wrists are a part of Walters's game that most others wish for. He is the perfect left-handed compliment to Team USA's attackmen - the three Powell Brothers and Ryan Boyle - who can create from behind and set-up a finisher like Walters. The fact remains, do not give No. 1 time and room, because he will make you pay.
