#### TERPS REPEAT AS ACC CHAMPS, MAKE FINAL FOUR.

##### LACROSSE HANDS OUT TEAM AWARDS

The Maryland men's lacrosse team and head coach Dave Cottle welcomed back the 2005 seniors that led the Terps to back-to-back ACC Championships and a berth in the 2005 NCAA Final Four, on Sunday, October 16, for the annual awards banquet at Heritage Hall in the Comcast Center on the campus of the University of Maryland.

The highlight of the afternoon's awards was the presentation of the "Big Man" Award, given in honor of former coach Dick Edell. The award was created to honor the player that best exemplified the selfless and positive qualities of the retired coach. The 2005 award was given to **Andrew Schwartzman**, who scored one of the most memorable goals in Maryland lacrosse history in overtime vs. Georgetown in the NCAA Quarterfinals to send the Terps to the Final Four for the second time in three years.



The Daniel Slafkosky Coach's Award was also given out, in memory of assistant coach Dave Slafkosky's son, who passed away prior to the 2001 season. The coaches chose this year's recipient, midfielder **Ian Healy**, as the player who best illustrated Dan's positive attitude on and off the field.

The Edwin Powell Award, which is presented to the Team MVP, was given to junior attackman **Joe Walters**, who led the team with 53 points and 38 goals.

##### MARYLAND WINS ACC TOURNAMENT AND ADVANCES TO FINAL FOUR

Following a 5-5 start that saw Maryland on the verge of not making the NCAA tournament, the Terps rallied and strung together six straight victories to earn a trip to their second Final Four in the past three seasons.

The turnaround started at Fairfield with a 9-6 win over the 15th-ranked Stags and continued with an amazing weekend at the ACC Tournament in Baltimore. **Max Ritz** sent Maryland to the finals with a put-back goal to give the Terps a 9-8 win in overtime over No. 3 Virginia. Awaiting Maryland in the finals was second-ranked Duke, who gave Maryland its first loss of the season in March. The Terps dominated the Blue Devils, holding the nation's most prolific offense to a season-low five goals in a 9-5 Maryland win.

A 21-6 win over Penn in the regular-season finale at Lincoln Financial Field gave Maryland a lot of momentum heading into the NCAA Tournament.

Seeded third in the tournament, the Terps waited out a weather delay of more than two and a half hours before dispatching a tough Penn State team in the first round at Byrd Stadium.

That sent the Terps to Princeton, N.J., for a rematch with No. 6 seed Georgetown in the quarterfinals. Maryland seemed to have the game wrapped up with a two-goal lead with 93 seconds remaining, but **Bill McGlone's** goal was disallowed due to a stick infraction and the Hoyas tied the game and sent it into overtime. That just set the stage for **Andrew Schwartzman** to score the biggest goal of his four-year career and send the Terps to the Final Four. Schwartzman dodged and split a pair of Hoya defenders and slipped a shot over the left shoulder of the Hoya keeper to give Maryland the win and a trip to Philadelphia.

##### TERPS TOPS IN STRENGTH OF SCHEDULE

- According to the Wobus computer rankings, Maryland played the toughest schedule in all of college lacrosse in 2005.
- The Terps played seven of the teams in the top 11 of the final USILA Geico/STX Coaches' Poll, including three times against No. 2 Duke and twice vs. No. 6 Virginia.
- Of Maryland's 17 games only two were against an unranked opponent (UMBC on March 19 and Dartmouth on March 22). But Dartmouth finished the year ranked 14th. North Carolina was ranked when they played the Terps, but finished the season just receiving votes.

##### McGLONE LEADS SIX TERPS ON ALL-AMERICA TEAM

- Junior **Bill McGlone** was named to the USILA All-America first team for the first time in his career as the team's were announced Saturday morning before the NCAA Final Four began at Lincoln Financial Field in Philadelphia.
- A total of six Terps were honored by the USILA, bringing Maryland's three-year total to 22. Junior attackman **Joe Walters**, a first-team selection in 2004 and an honorable mention honoree in 2003, was named to the second team, while sophomore defender **Steve Whittenberg** was named to the third team. Maryland also had three honorable mention selections: sophomore goalie **Harry Alford**, junior midfielder **Brendan Healy** and sophomore defender **Ray Megill**.

##### SHOOTING TELLS THE STORY

- Coach Dave Cottle is on record saying that good teams will shoot at least 30%. As it turns out 30% is the magic number for the Terps this season.
- In Maryland's 11 victories this season the Terrapins are shooting 31.0% (131 goals/423 shots). In their six losses the Terps are shooting just 17.3% (39 goals/225 shots).
- Maybe just as telling is the shots on goal percentage. Maryland has put 250 of its 423 shots on goal (59.1%) in its 11 wins, but just 119 of 225 shots (52.8%) were on net in five defeats.
- The Terps' shooting relates directly to their scoring. In 11 victories Maryland is averaging nearly 12 points per game. In their six losses the Terps are scoring a mere 6.5 goals per game.

##### HOME VS. AWAY

- A lot is made in sports about the home-field advantage and for the Maryland men's lacrosse team in 2005 it was with good reason. The Terps played six games at home and 11 away from College Park (5 road, 6 neutral) and the numbers showed a decided edge for Terps when they were on familiar ground.
- Maryland averaged 11.0 goals per game in its six home games, but that number dipped to 9.37 on the road.
- Shooting percentage, which is one of Coach Cottle's key statistics, was another tell-tale stat. In College Park the Terps shot 28.8% (66/229), but on the road they shot 24.8% (104/419). Shots on goal percentage showed another advantage for home games, 59.0% to 55.8%.
- Joe Walters**, the team's overall leading scorer, was also Maryland's leading scorer in both home and away games. The All-American racked up 16 goals and seven assists at home, while amassing 22 goals and eight assists on the road.
- Harry Alford** was spectacular no matter where he's played last year. The Kelly Award candidate made 69 saves in the team's six home games with a 8.43 GAA and a .612 save pct. On the road he racked up 112 saves in 11 games with a 8.16 GAA and a .563 save pct.

##### HEALY ELECTED INTO PHI BETA KAPPA

- Maryland midfielder Ian Healy was elected into membership of Phi Beta Kappa, the nation's oldest and largest academic honor society. Healy became just the third Terrapin student-athlete in the history of the University to be elected into Phi Beta Kappa.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. – Maryland goalie **Harry Alford** stopped 25 Georgetown shots to lead the fourth ranked Terrapin men's lacrosse over the No. 5 Hoyas, 13-6, Saturday afternoon before a overflowing capacity crowd at the Maryland Field Hockey and Lacrosse Complex.

Making his first career start Alford, a sophomore from Washington, D.C., allowed only three goals through three quarters and made 10 saves in the fourth quarter alone.

Offensively Maryland showed a balanced attack that saw 11 different Terps score goals on the afternoon. Leading the way was junior All-American midfielder **Bill McGlone** with three goals to extend his goal scoring streak to 17, dating back to last season.

No other Terps scored more than one goal, but national player of the year candidate **Joe Walters** scored a goal to extend his goal scoring streak to 17. The junior attackman also added four assists for a five-point game, the seventh game of his stellar career with at least five points.

Other Terps with multiple-point games off of one goal and an assist were junior All-American **Brendan Healy**, senior attackman **Dave Matz** and sophomore attackman **Michael Phipps**.

The catalyst for the Maryland offense proved to be face-off specialist **David Tamberrino**, who won eight of the 11 draws that he took during the game. The junior also contributed four groundballs.

Two Terps scored in their first-ever games for Maryland. Freshman **Will Dalton** from Queenstown, Md., scored at the 6:03 mark of the first quarter off an assist from Walters to give Maryland a 3-1 lead. Sophomore **James Borell**, a transfer from Air Force, scored at 4:20 in the third to cap off a 7-1 scoring blitz for the Terps.

The Maryland defense, which was a question mark heading into this season, stifled the Hoya attack and didn't allow Georgetown clear looks at the goal. Sophomore **Steve Whittenberg**, a transfer from Air Force playing in his first game for the Terps, picked up a four groundballs and caused a turnover.

For the Hoyas, Trevor Casey and Sean Denihan each scored a pair of goals, while All-American defender Brodie Merrill picked up a game-high 11 groundballs, caused four turnovers and added an assist.

Sophomore goalie **Harry Alford** turned in another fine performance for the Terps, making 12 saves and collecting three ground balls. The Terps' defensive unit as a whole was outstanding all day, limiting the Tigers' starting attackmen to one goal and one assist on just four shots. Leading the way for the Maryland defense was sophomore defender **Steve Whittenberg** and sophomore defensive short-stick middle **Travis Holmes**, who each picked up four groundballs and caused two turnovers.

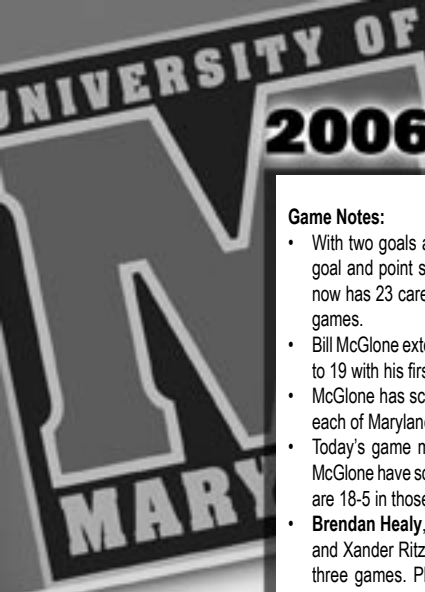

Maryland came right back to tie the game at 2-2 on an unassisted goal by **Xander Ritz** at 13:27. **Joe Walters**, off a feed from **Brendan Healy**, scored his first goal of the game three minutes later for a 3-2 Terrapin advantage. That advantage wouldn't last though as Steve Looney scored twice to lead Navy on a four-goal run spanning the end of the second quarter into the third for a 6-3 Midshipman lead.

Walters refused to let the Terps go away quietly, scoring his second and third goals of the night to bring Maryland to within a goal at 6-5. Then the unlikelyst of heroes stepped up for the Terps. 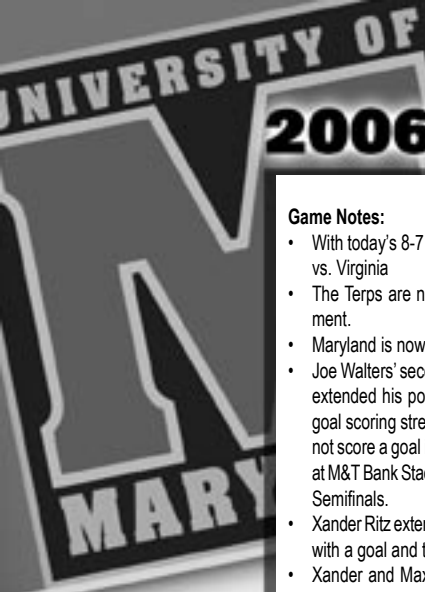

**BALTIMORE, Md.** - The Maryland Terrapins successfully defended their ACC title by defeating Duke, 9-5, Sunday afternoon in front of 5,681 fans at M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore. The Terp defense held the nation's most prolific offense to a season-low five goals.

The Terps were led by **Joe Walters'** four points on three goals and one assist. **Harry Alford** made 15 saves on the day and was named the tournament's most valuable player. **Will Dalton** won 7-of-10 face-offs as the Terps claimed their third-ever ACC title.

Matt Danowski added three assists and one goal to help pace the Blue Devils offensively. Aaron Fenton contributed 12 saves for Duke. Duke took an early 1-0 lead just 1:11 into the game as Matt Danowski connected on a pass to Kyle Dowd on an extra-man opportunity. Danowski notched his second assist five minutes later as he worked to his right and drew a pair of defenders and then tossed a pass back to the middle of the field where Dan Flannery fired a shot past **Harry Alford** for a 2-0 lead. **Jimmy Borell** got the Terps on the board after controlling a bounce pass from Joe Walters and firing past the Blue Devil keeper. Duke controlled the majority of the rest of the first quarter holding an 11-6 advantage in shots, but still only held a one-goal lead.

Walters tied the game at 2-2 at the 11:09 mark in the second quarter after taking a pass from Xander Ritz on the left side. The Terps recaptured a four-goal lead again after Steve Wittenberg picked off a Duke pass in the offensive zone and raced down the field. His pass was deflected but picked up by Maxwell Ritz who got the shot past the Duke goalie who had come out to try and get to the loose ball.

Ritz would add another score to make it 9-3 before the Blue Devils tacked on a pair of late scores from Peter Lamade and Dan Flannery for the 9-5 final.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. - The sixth-ranked Maryland men's lacrosse team scored early and often en route to a 21-6 victory over the Penn Quakers Saturday evening at Lincoln Financial Field in Philadelphia.

All-American midfielder **Bill McGlone** got the Terps on the board less than three minutes into the game, scoring on a bounce shot the skipped past Denis Cole for a 1-0 Maryland lead. Senior **Dave Matz**, who started his fifth game of the season, upped the lead to 2-0 a minute later with a laser-like shot into the upper left corner of the Penn net.

The Healy brothers then scored back-to-back goals to give Maryland a 4-0 lead in the first quarter. **Brendan Healy** scored at the 7:01 mark when his shot trickled into the goal despite Cole getting a piece of the ball. **Ian Healy** then scored at 5:43 when All-American **Joe Walters** drew the attention of the Quaker defense and fed Healy for a wide-open shot just outside the crease.

The Quakers got on the board just 11 seconds later with the final score of the quarter when Patrick Rogers found Zandy Reich who scored his ninth goal of the season to cut the lead to 4-1.

Maryland came out firing again at the start of the second quarter. Walters scored his team-leading 28th goal of the season off an assist from senior midfielder **Andrew Schwartzman**. Junior **Xander Ritz** scored just 10 seconds after Walters' goal for a 6-1 Terrapin lead.

Penn answered back a minute and a half later when Luke Dixon scored, but Maryland kept up the offensive pressure. Freshman attackman **Max Ritz** scored for the fourth straight game at the 11:19 mark for a 7-2 Terps lead. Freshman midfielder **Will Dalton** then scored his second goal of the season to make the score 8-2 off a pass from fellow freshman **Drew Evans**, who picked up his first collegiate assist, at the 10:50 mark.

The game remained 8-2 until the 7:17 mark when **Brendan Healy** raced through the left side of the Quaker defense and fired a shot past Cole for a 9-2 Terrapin lead. McGlone then scored his second of the game on an unassisted goal to push the lead to 10-2.

Penn answered back at 2:35 of the second quarter when Greg Voight threaded a pass from the lower right, through the crease to a wide open Brian Amen, who laced a high shot past Maryland goalie **Harry Alford**.

That score would not hold long as Walters found junior midfielder **Ryan Lang** open in front of the Penn net and Lang beat Cole for his first goal of the season and an 11-3 Maryland advantage.

Maryland then reeled off seven straight goals off scores from Feifs, **Brent Hargest**, **Matt Aksionoff**, Feeley, another from Hargest and the first of the season from **Patrick Howell** for a 21-6 Maryland victory. For Aksionoff, who has struggled through several injuries during his four seasons in College Park, it was the first goal of his career.

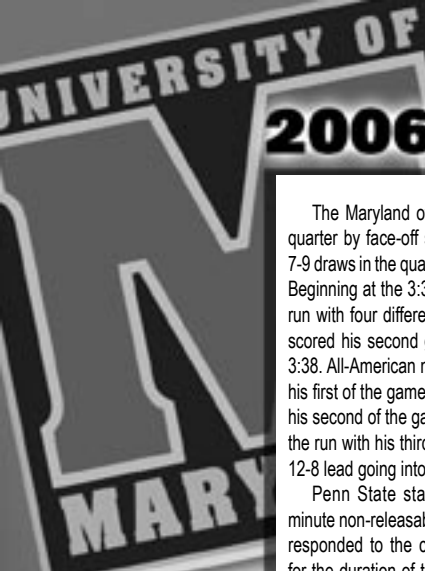
COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The No. 3 seed Maryland Terrapins got four points each from All-American **Joe Walters** and **Xander Ritz** and rallied from a 6-5 halftime deficit to defeat Penn State, 14-10, at Byrd Stadium Saturday night and advance to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament.

The Terps dominated the opening quarter, scoring four straight goals from **Andrew Schwartzman**, **Bill McGlone**, **Mike Hartofilis** and **Ian Healy**. But the Nittany Lions roared back in the second quarter with five goals of their own to take a 6-5 lead into the break.

Maryland responded by dominating the third quarter, scoring seven times and limiting the Penn State offense to just two goals. **Xander Ritz** scored a man-up goal at 12:58 to tie the game at the 12:58 mark, but PSU's Patrick Heim scored an unassisted goal a little more than a minute later to give Penn State the lead back at 7-6.

**Xander Ritz** answered right back for the Terps at the 10:09 mark and tied the game at 7-7. Walters then gave Maryland an 8-7 advantage at 6:57 on a brilliant assist from Schwartzman. The Nittany Lions tied the game again, the fourth time the score was tied, on a goal by Gil Pearsall at 5:55.

The Maryland offense, which was sparked in the third quarter by face-off specialist **David Tamberrino** who won 7-9 draws in the quarter, started to exert control of the game. Beginning at the 3:38 mark, the Terps went on another 4-0 run with four different goal scorers. Midfielder **Ryan Lang** scored his second goal of the season to begin the run at 3:38. All-American midfielder **Brendan Healy** followed with his first of the game just 31 seconds later. **ANDREW SCHWARTZMAN'S GAME-WINNER VS. GEORGETOWN SENT THE TERPS TO THE NCAA FINAL FOUR**

### GAME 16 NCAA QUARTERFINALS NO. 4 MARYLAND ..... 9 NO. 8 GEORGETOWN. . 8 (OT) May 22, 2005 Princeton Stadium

**PRINCETON, N.J.** - The No. 3 seed University of Maryland men's lacrosse team is going back to the NCAA Final Four after senior midfielder **Andrew Schwartzman** scored the game-winning goal to defeat Georgetown, 9-8, in overtime at Princeton Stadium Sunday afternoon.

The Terps looked to have iced the game with 1:33 left in the fourth quarter, when **Bill McGlone** scored to give Maryland a 9-7 lead, but the goal was disallowed when McGlone's stick was challenged and ruled to have an illegal pocket.

With the score changed back to 8-7 and an unreleasable three-minute man advantage, Georgetown seized the opportunity less than 30 seconds later when Pete Cannon scored his second goal of the game to knot the game at 8-8 and send the game into overtime.

Georgetown, which dominated on face-offs, winning 16-of-21 draws, looked to have all of the momentum, but junior face-off specialist **David Tamberrino** gave the Terps a lift by winning the opening draw of the extra session. The teams traded possession and Georgetown forced another turnover to get the ball back, but Maryland junior midfielder **Brendan Healy** caused a turnover on a Hoya clear attempt and drew a 30 second pushing penalty to give the Terps control of the ball, setting up Schwartzman's overtime heroics.

The game started at a much easier pace. Both teams play disciplined lacrosse, but it was Georgetown that drew first blood when Scott Kahoe scored an unassisted goal at 11:26 for a 1-0 lead. Maryland tied the score just three minutes later when All-American **Joe Walters** fired a low-angle shot past Hoya goalie Rich D'Andrea.

Freshman attackman **Max Ritz** gave the Terps their first lead of the game at 3:51 of the first when he banged home a shot in the crease off an assist from Schwartzman, who dodged past his defender to find Ritz.

Sophomore goalie **Harry Alford** kept the Hoyas off the board for the remainder of the first period and finished with five saves in the quarter.

The intensity picked up in the second quarter, but Schwartzman picked up where he left off in the first, dodging past his defender and feeding a wide-open **Xander Ritz**, who scored his 15th goal of the season for a 3-1 Terp lead. Georgetown capitalized on a failed Maryland clear to pull to within a goal when Brendan Cannon found Trevor Casey at the top of the attack zone and Casey ripped a shot into the top left of the Terp net.

Walters gave Maryland a two-goal cushion early in the third quarter lacing a shot from the left side past D'Andrea for a 4-2 Terrapin lead. The two teams held each other in check until the 4:22 mark when Matt McBride trimmed the lead to one when he raced around the right side and scored on a shot to the top left corner.

Brendan Healy made the Hoyas pay for a careless offsides turnover at 2:12 when he scored his first goal of the game off a high shot into the top left corner. Cannon answered back for Georgetown with just 25 seconds left in the quarter when he curled around the crease and scored on an underhanded scoop shot.

The fourth quarter began with Walters scoring back-to-back goals, for a personal NCAA single game-best four goals, off of Hoya turnovers for a 7-4 Terrapin lead. Georgetown refused to go away quietly and scored twice in 20 seconds to cut the lead to 7-6.

Max Ritz scored his second goal of the game to give the Terps another two-goal lead, but Pete Cannon came back for the Hoyas with a high-hard shot that found the back of the Maryland net, setting up the dramatic final minutes of the quarter.

Defensively for the Terps, Harry Alford, who saved 25 shots when Georgetown and Maryland met on February 26, finished the game with 12 saves and a team-best seven groundballs. Sophomore defender **Ray Megill** tied his career-high with four groundballs.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. - The third-seeded University of Maryland's men's lacrosse team's run in the NCAA Tournament came to an end with a 18-9 semifinal loss to No. 2 seed Duke, Saturday afternoon at Lincoln Financial Field in Philadelphia.

The Terps jumped out to an early 1-0 lead on Bill McGlone's 26th goal of the season, but the Blue Devils took the game over, scoring the next nine goals. Senior midfielder Andrew Schwartzman gave Maryland a boost heading into the half with two scored late in the second quarter, but Duke answered right back with a goal at the end of the quarter to push the lead to 10-3 at the break.

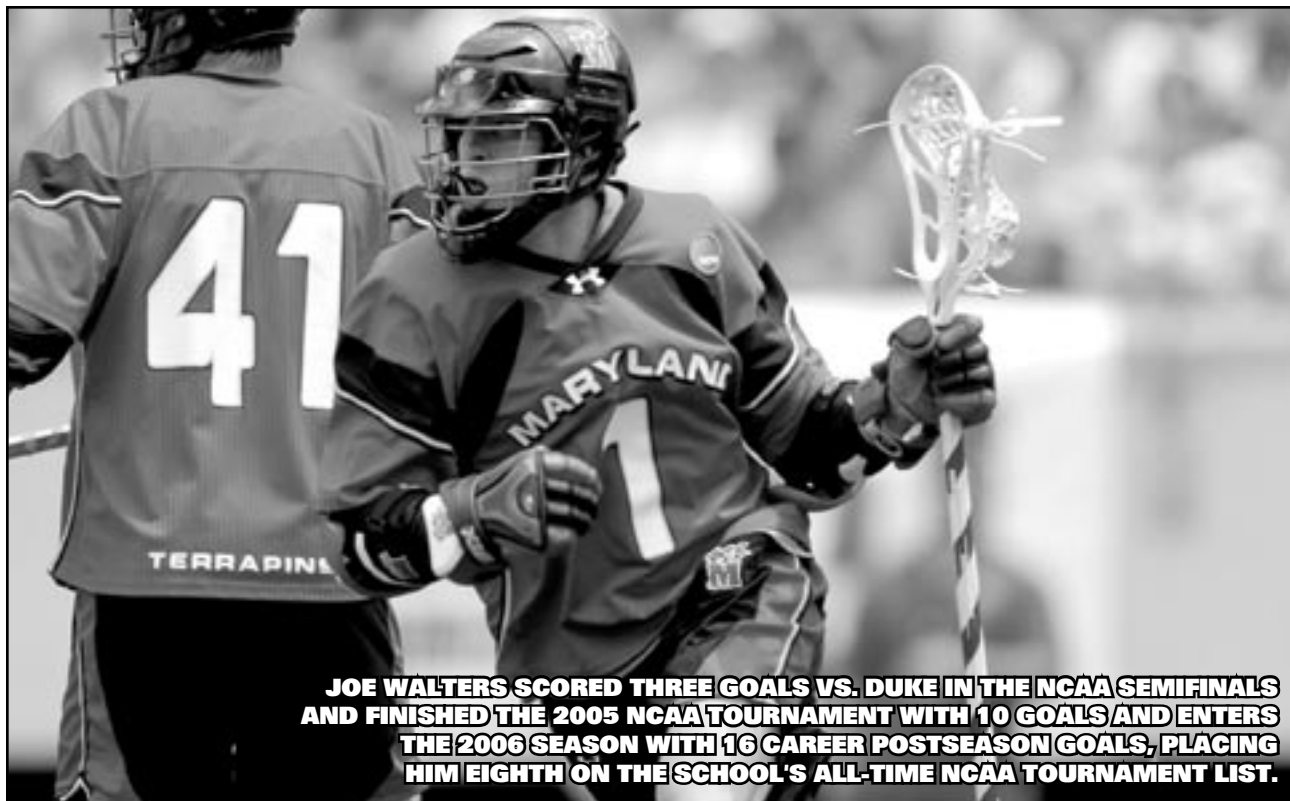
