RUBBER MATCH: NO. 7 TERPS AND NO. 2 CAVALIERS MEET FOR THIRD TIME WITH TRIP TO THE FINAL FOUR ON THE LINE

- No. 7 seed Maryland will take on No. 2 seed Virginia in the NCAA Quarterfinals this Saturday at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium in Annapolis, Md. Face-off is set for 12:00 p.m. in a game that will be televised live on ESPNU. Dave Ryan will be on play-by-play with Quint Kessinich providing the analysis.
- The Terps and Cavaliers are both making their 31st NCAA Tournament appearance, tying them for second most in NCAA history.
- The winner of the Maryland/Virginia game will advance to the Final Four next weekend in Foxboro, Mass., and will face on the winner of the No. 3 Syracuse (13-2)/No. 6 Notre Dame (14-2) game on Saturday, May 24 at Gillette Stadium. The Orange and the Fighting Irish play in Ithaca, N.Y., on Sunday, May 18 at 3 p.m. at Schoellkopf Field.

MARYLAND'S 31ST TIME AT NCAA'S

- Maryland is making its 31st overall NCAA Tournament appearance in 2008. The Terps have played in the second-most tournaments since the event began in 1971. Only Hopkins has played in more with 36. Virginia is also making its 31st NCAA appearance.
- In the quarterfinals of the tournament, the Terrapins have a 19-8 (.704) record overall. The last time the Terps advanced to the quarters was 2006. Maryland defeated Princeton at Unitas Stadium in Towson, Md., by a final of 11-6. The last time Maryland reached the quarterfinals and did not advance to the Final Four was 2004 when No. 7 Princeton upset No. 3 Maryland 9-8 in overtime.
- The Terps have captured two NCAA championships, 1973 and 1975, and have now reached the NCAA Semifinals 19 times, including three of the last four years.

MARYLAND'S RECORD IN NCAA'S

- The Terps have won the third-most Division I NCAA Tournament games, compiling a 40-28 overall record in 68 games. Only Johns Hopkins (62-27) and Syracuse (51-18) have won more Division I tournament games.
- Maryland is fifth by percentage (.588) among all teams ever to play in the tournament. Only Syracuse (51-18, .739), Princeton (29-11, .725), Johns Hopkins (62-27, .697) and Virginia (38-26, .594) are ahead of the Terps.
- The Terps have captured two titles. Only six other schools have ever won the NCAA Championship: Johns Hopkins (9), Syracuse (8), Princeton (6), North Carolina (4), Virginia (4) and Cornell (3).

MARYLAND AS THE NO. 7 SEED

- This marks the fourth time that Maryland has been named the No. 7 seed in the NCAA tournament. Maryland is 3-3 all-time as the No. 7 seed.
- The Terps were previously a No. 7 seed in 1982, 1991 and last season. In 1982, Maryland lost a first round game to Johns Hopkins by a 14-9 margin. In 1991, Maryland advanced to the Final Four, but lost to Towson, 15-11, in the semifinals. Last year, the Terps were upset in the first round by UMBC, 13-9. Last Saturday the seventh-seeded Terps defeated Denver, 10-7, to advance to the quarters for the fifth time in the past six seasons.

MARYLAND VS. THE NO. 2 SEED

- This marks the 11th time that Maryland has faced the No. 2 seed in the NCAA tournament. Maryland is 3-8 all-time when playing the No. 2 seed.
- The Terps previously played the No. 2 seed in 1971, 1973, 1974, 1976, 1977, 1978, 1982, 1983, 1991, 1998 and 2003. In 1971, the first year for the NCAA tournament, the Terps topped No. 2 Navy 10-7. Maryland then won its first NCAA title in 1973 by defeating No. 2 Johns Hopkins, 9-8 in two overtimes. The Terps lost their next six meetings with the second seed before topping No. 2 Brown, 16-13, in 1991. Maryland advanced to the title game in 1991, but lost to No. 2 seed Princeton 15-5. The last time the Terps faced a No. 2 seed was 2003 - a 14-4 loss to Virginia in the semifinals in Baltimore.
- Only twice in those 11 meetings with the No. 2 seed has Maryland been the seventh seed. In 1982, No. 2 Hopkins beat No. 7 Maryland, 14-9, in the quarterfinals. The only other time was in 1991 with the Terps handing Brown a 16-13 loss in the quarters.

COTTLE IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

- This is **Dave Cottle's** sixth NCAA Tournament appearance as the head coach of Maryland. He is coaching his 20th team to the NCAA Tournament, with the first 14 coming during his stint at Loyola. All 14 of his appearances with the Greyhounds came consecutively starting with the 1988 season and going through the 2001 campaign.
- Overall, Cottle is 16-19 in NCAA Tournament games, which ranks him fifth among all coaches in the 2008 tournament in wins. Only Princeton's Bill Tierney (29-11), Virginia's Dom Starsia (25-16), Syracuse's John Desko (22-5) and Hopkins' Dave Pietramala (17-6) have more tournament wins to their credit among this year's crop.
- With his 20th tournament appearance, Cottle is tied for first place on the all-time list for most NCAA Tournament Division I appearances as a head coach with Virginia's Dom Starsia. Syracuse's Roy Simmons Jr. and Towson's Tony Seaman are second with 19. With his streak of 14-consecutive tournaments while at Loyola, Cottle is behind only to Simmons Jr. (19) and Bill Tierney (15), for the longest-consecutive streak.
- Cottle has led his teams to the NCAA Quarterfinals on 16 occasions and to the NCAA semifinals five times, making an appearance in the 1990 championship game where Loyola fell to Syracuse, 21-9. He also reached the NCAA semifinals as the No. 1 seed with Loyola, but lost to Maryland, 19-8, at Byrd Stadium on May 23, 1998. At Maryland he has now lead the Terps to three semifinal berths, falling to eventual champion Virginia, 14-4, at M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore on May 24, 2003, a 18-9 loss to No. 2 seed Duke, 18-9, on May 28, 2005, and an 8-5 loss to UMass in 2006.

BALTIMORE, Md. - History failed to repeat itself Saturday at the 2003 NCAA Men's Lacrosse Semifinals, as Virginia goalie Tillman Johnson made spectacular save after spectacular save en route to a 14-4 victory over Maryland, avenging a regular season 8-7 loss to the Terps earlier this year in Charlottesville. Virginia went on to win their third national championship and since since 1999 with a 9-7 victory over No. 1 Johns Hopkins n Memorial Day.

Playing in front of a record crowd of 37,823 and a national television audience on ESPN2, Johnson recorded a career-high 18 saves and a stifling Cavalier defense kept the Terrapin offense off the scoreboard for much of the day.

Although Terrapin defenders Michael Howley and Brett Harper held Virginia's top two scorers, John Christmas and Chris Rotelli scoreless, Matt Ward paced the Virginia attack with four goals and an assist. Joe Yevoli also tallied five points on three goals and two assists.

Four Terrapins scored one goal apiece, including senior Mike Mollot, who finished his collegiate career with 77 goals and 95 assists, placing him 14th in career point scoring and ninth on the Terrapins' all-time assist leaders.

Despite several early scoring opportunities for Maryland, it was the Cavs who built an early lead on unassisted goals by Matt Ward and Trey Whitty.

Defensive midfielder Joe Parker found an ideal time to score his first goal of the year - a 15-yard blast off a feed from Paul Gillette - to pull the Terps to within one after the first quarter at 2-1.

But Virginia responded on scores by A.J. Shannon and Billy Glading to push the lead to 4-1 midway through the second quarter.

Maryland again received offense from an unlikely source when senior midfielder Sean Leary found the back of the net one minute later on a rocket shot past Johnson, who made several spectacular saves in the first half to hold Maryland at bay, including a stop of Brian Hunt on a multiple deke at point-blank range.

Virginia broke the game wide open after halftime, scoring six times in the third quarter. Ward completed his hat trick one minute into the second half, pushing Virginia's lead to 6-2. Mollot's goal kept the Terps within four at the 12-minute mark of the period, before the Cavs tallied six consecutive goals - including three by Yevoli and Ward's fourth score of the game - while Johnson continued his superior play, keeping Maryland off the board for almost 24 minutes until the waning moments of the contest.

Brendan Healy's first goal of the season ended the drought with three remaining in the game, but it was too little too late for the Terps, who finished the year with a 12-4 record.

COACHING MATCH-UP

- Now in his 26th season as a head coach, **Dave Cottle** enters today's game with a 258-103 career record for a 71.5 win percentage, sixth-highest among active coaches with at least 100 career wins. His win total is fourth among active coaches. He is 77-33 (70.0) in his seven seasons at Maryland.
- Dom Starsia, also in his 26th season as a head coach, has won 72.6 percent of his games at Brown and Virginia (284-107) overall record) and is fourth on the active coaches' winning percentage list. His 284 wins also ranks him second among active coaches.
- Cottle has a 8-13 record vs. Virginia. He went 3-5 vs. Virginia while he was the coach at Loyola, but none of the games came against a Dom Starsia-led team. Cottle is 5-8 against the Wahoos while at Maryland. Prior to 2002, the last time Cottle coached against Virginia came in 1991, finishing a run of eight games in a nine-year span.

SERIES HISTORY VS. VIRGINIA

- The Maryland-Virginia rivalry is the third-longest in Terrapin lacrosse history with Maryland holding a 45-35 (.563) advantage, dating to the first game -- a Terps' 10-1 victory on April 24, 1926. The 45 wins are the third-highest number of victories Maryland has against any team. The Terps have defeated Duke 54 times and Navy 49 times.
- Maryland has won three of four meetings in the NCAA Tournament. The Terps topped the Cavaliers in a pair of first round games in 1978 and 1983 and won a 1997 quarterfinal game, 10-9, played at Byrd Stadium. In that last NCAA meeting, Virginia broke its three-game post-season losing streak to the Terps with a 14-4 win in the NCAA semifinals in Baltimore en route to the 2003 national championship.
- The two teams hooked-up in the ACC tournament for the fifth straight season and the Cavaliers prevailed with an 11-8 win on their home field in Charlottesville. **Grant Catalino** led the Terps with three points on a pair of goals and an assist.
- Earlier this season the then-No. 4 Terps knocked off the newly minted No. 1 Cavaliers, 13-7, at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium. Freshman **Travis Reed** had a breakout performance, scoring a hat trick, assisting on two other goals and grabbing three groundballs. Not to be outdone, goalie **Jason Carter** made a career-best 15 saves to help seal the victory for the Terrapins.
- These two teams locked up in a classic in the semifinals of the 2007 ACC tournament. Maryland jumped out to a 4-1 lead, but the Cavaliers rallied to take a four-goal lead at 10-6 in the fourth quarter. That's when Maryland stormed back, but the comeback fell short and Virginia was able to hold on for an 11-10 win. **Dan Groot** led Maryland with five points on four goals and an assist.
- In 2007's regular season meeting, the second-ranked Cavaliers defeated the No. 8 Terps 12-8 in Charlottesville. Wahoo attackman Ben Rubeor scored five goals to pace Virginia, while **Max Ritz** (3-0) and Michael Phipps (1-2) each had three points for the Terps.
- On April 1 of last season, the No. 1 Cavaliers jumped out early, scoring just 15 seconds into the game, and never looked back, handing Maryland a 15-5 loss at Byrd Stadium. The Ritz brothers, **Max** and Xander, each scored two goals with Max also picking up a pair of assists. Bill McGlone scored the other goal for the Terps.
- The two schools hooked up again in the ACC title game and again it was Virginia taking the game, this time by an 11-5 margin. Brendan Healy and Bill McGlone each had three points in the loss.
- The 2005 regular season game was tough for the fourth-ranked Terps as they were handed a 10-2 loss at No. 3 Virginia on April 2. The Cavaliers held Maryland scoreless until the 4:51 mark of the third quarter when Joe Walters scored. It was the first time Maryland had been held without a goal in a half since a 7-2 loss at Virginia in 2001.
- Things were a little different in the rematch on April 29, 2005 in the ACC Semifinals. Brendan Healy gave Maryland a 1-0 lead in the first, but the 'Hoos scored three unanswered to take a 3-1 lead. But the Terps stormed back with a 3-0 run of their own on goals from **Max Ritz**, Healy and Xander Ritz to take a 4-3 lead into the half. The Cavaliers took a 7-5 lead into the fourth quarter, but Andrew Schwartzman and Bill McGlone scored the final two goals in regulation to send the game into sudden death. In the overtime period, freshman **Max Ritz** proved to be the hero for Maryland, but putting back a rebound off of a McGlone shot to sent the Terps into the ACC finals with an 8-7 win.
- The 2004 regular season meeting between Maryland and Virginia saw the Terps enter the game as the No. 1 team in the country, the first time Maryland had earned the top ranking since 2001. Maryland lived up to its billing, pounding the Cavaliers 11-2 in College Park. Xander Ritz scored three goals and assisted on another three, while Joe Walters added a goal and three assists. The game was never really in doubt as the Terps opened the game with a 5-0 run. The Maryland defense was stellar all afternoon, holding Virginia's top seven scorers without a single point.
- The Cavaliers would not go so quietly in the 2004 ACC title game. The Terps built a 12-7 lead heading into the fourth quarter, behind a career-high six goals from Joe Walters, who would be named Tournament MVP. But the Wahoos scored four goals in the fourth and shutdown the Maryland offense to close the gap to 12-11.

DAVE COTTLE

HEAD COACH • SEVENTH SEASON AT MARYLAND • SALISBURY '78

Since arriving to the College Park campus in the fall of 2001, Dave Cottle has continued the storied tradition of excellence of the Maryland men's lacrosse program and helped usher the Terps into a new era of national prominence.

Under Cottle's leadership the Terrapins have made five-straight trips to the NCAA tournament, earned a top-three seed four times and advanced to the Final Four in 2003, 2005 and 2006. Since 2003, Maryland is one of only four programs to make three final four appearances.

Cottle is also deeply involved in the national leadership for the sport of lacrosse. He is currently serving a term on the NCAA Division I men's lacrosse committee and is the vice-president of the Intercollegiate Men's Lacrosse Coaches Association.

Prior to arriving in College Park, Cottle spent 19 seasons as the head coach at Loyola College. There he led the Greyhounds to 14 straight NCAA tournament appearances, including a pair of berths in the national semifinals.

Cottle, now in his 26th season as a head coach, is tied for first all-time in NCAA history with 19 NCAA tournament bids. He is currently fifth among active coaches in wins with 248. His overall mark of 248-98 gives him a 71.7 winning percentage, which ranks sixth among active coaches with at least 100 wins.

During his tenure at Maryland, not only has the program continued to be among the sport's elite, but Terrapin players have also thrived and received national attention. In the past six seasons under Cottle a total of 20 Terps have earned 38 All-America honors. Two Terps, Michael Howley in 2003 and Lee Zink in 2004, won the Schmeisser Memorial Cup, which is given annually to the nation's outstanding defender. In 2006, Joe Walters became Maryland's all-time leader in goals and points and was named the winner of the Jack Turnbull Memorial Award as the nation's top attackman.

The backbone of Cottle's success has been a strong work ethic and an emphasis on "student-athletes." Six of Cottle's Terrapin players earned USILA Scholar All-America honors, including 2005 graduate Ian Healy, who became just the third Maryland student-athlete to be inducted into Phi Beta Kappa, the nation's oldest and most prestigious academic society.

Cottle, 52, was named the eighth coach in the storied history of Maryland lacrosse on Sept. 26, 2001, taking the reins from the ACC's all-time winningest coach, Dick Edell, who retired on Sept. 3, 2001 after 18 years with the Terps.

Last season, which was viewed by many as a "rebuilding year" for the Terps proved to be one of Cottle's finest seasons as a head coach. With an inexperienced offense and an injury-riddled defense, Cottle managed to lead Maryland to a 10-6 record and a No. 7-seed in the NCAA Tournament.

The Terps returned to the NCAA Final Four for the second straight season in 2006. Cottle's squad finished the year with a 12-5 record and earned Maryland the No. 2 seed in the NCAA tournament for just the second time in school history. Seven Terrapin players earned All-America honors with Walters and midfielder Bill McGlone being first team selections. Walters was also named the ACC Player of the Year for the second time in his career.

In 2005 Cottle directed Maryland to its ninth trip to the NCAA Semifinals and its second straight ACC tournament championship. The Terps ended the season with an overall record of 11-6, but finished the season winning six of their last seven games. Six Maryland players were named postseason All-Americans, including McGlone, who was a first team selection. Cottle's program also earned another honor in June of 2005 when Walters was named to the 2006 U.S. National Team, the only college player to be selected to the 23-man roster.

Cottle guided the 2004 Terps to a 13-3 record and their first ACC championship since 1998. Maryland finished the season ranked No. 3 in the USILA poll and made it to the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament. Eight Terrapin players earned All-America honors, including three first team honorees.

In 2003 he led Maryland back to the NCAA Semifinals for the first since 1998. The Terps had a stellar season, including a No. 3 final ranking. Maryland piled numerous accolades as they had eight USILA All-Americans including Howley, who was a first-team honoree. The Terps posted a 12-4 record in 2003 and gave Cottle his third trip to the national semifinals.

He led his Loyola teams to top-10 finishes in each his 14 seasons. The Greyhounds finished with a winning record the final 18 years of his tenure, dating to 1984. Loyola also played in 14 consecutive NCAA Tournaments, entering the 1998 and 1999 tournaments as the No. 1 seed.

A Baltimore native, Cottle took over a struggling Greyhound program in 1983. Since posting a first-year record of 5-9, his only losing season in 25 years as a college head coach, Cottle's Loyola teams reeled off 18 consecutive winning seasons. The 1998 team's 13-2 campaign, which ended with a berth in the NCAA semifinals, saw Loyola reach a No. 1 national ranking, and earn the school's first No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

In 1988 the Greyhounds began a run of 14 consecutive NCAA tournament appearances. Loyola advanced to the national championship game in 1990, and made 10 NCAA quarterfinal appearances under Cottle.

The 1990 team, a potent mix of seasoned veterans and talented underclassmen, marched all the way to the NCAA championship game. In the semifinals the Greyhounds staged an incredible comeback to beat Yale, 14-13, in overtime. Syracuse, the two-time defending champs, ended Loyola's quest for the national title, but the Greyhounds' 1990 season always will be remembered.

In 1994 Cottle guided the Greyhounds to one of their best seasons ever. Loyola finished 11-2, recording wins against four NCAA tournament teams. The Greyhounds earned the nation's No. 1 ranking for only the second time in their history. Loyola concluded the regular season with a 17-15 victory over Johns Hopkins, the program's first victory ever against the Blue Jays.

Cottle's 1988 squad finished with a 12-2 record, earning Loyola's first NCAA Division I tournament berth. Loyola defeated Air Force for its first NCAA postseason victory before losing to Penn in the quarterfinals. The Greyhounds concluded the season ranked fifth in the nation, and Cottle earned USILA Coach-of-the-Year honors, becoming the first coach in Loyola athletic history to receive a national award. Cottle was also selected to coach the South team in the 1988 North-South All-Star Game.

The 1989 Greyhounds became the only Loyola lacrosse team to complete an undefeated regular season. The Greyhounds beat four nationally ranked teams en route to a perfect 10-0 mark. Loyola was ranked third in the final poll, behind eventual national champion Syracuse and Johns Hopkins.

Cottle came to Loyola in 1982 after leading Severn School to a 26-9 record and consecutive Maryland Scholastic Association championships. Prior to his success at Severn, Cottle served for two years as a graduate assistant coach, assistant varsity lacrosse coach and physical education instructor at his alma mater, Salisbury State University.

One of the finest players in Salisbury State history, Cottle was enshrined into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1989. During his career he re-wrote the NCAA record book, while earning All-America honors three times. He still ranks among the top three in goals (179), assists (123) and points (302) in Seagull history. In 1975 Cottle led the nation in scoring and was just the second player in collegiate lacrosse history to score more than 100 points in a single season. Following his senior season in 1977, he served as captain of the South team in the North-South All-Star Game.

Cottle received his Bachelor of Science degree in physical education in 1978 from Salisbury.

He was an assistant coach for Team USA 1994, which won the world championship in Manchester, England. Cottle has addressed many lacrosse gatherings across the country, including the USILA Coaches' Convention, and he serves as a member of the All-America Selection Committee. In February of 1998 he was inducted into the Baltimore Chapter of the Lacrosse Foundation's Hall of Fame.

A graduate of Baltimore's Northern High School, Cottle lives with his wife, Lynn, daughters, Taylor and Tory, and son, Sean, in Edgewater, Md.

SHOOTING TELLS THE STORY

- The difference between winning and losing for Maryland this season is simple - when the Terps shoot well they win. Coach Dave Cottle is on record saying that good teams will shoot at least 30%. As it turns out 30% is the magic number for the Terps this season.
- In Maryland's 10 victories this season the Terrapins are shooting above 30% (32.4%, 130 goals/401 shots). In their five losses the Terps' shooting percentage is cut to 20.5% (31 goals/151 shots).
- Another standout statistic from Terp wins and losses is man-up conversion percentage. Maryland has converted 15-of-31 opportunities (.484) in its 10 wins, but is 5-of-14 (.357) in five defeats.

HOME VS. AWAY

- A lot is made in sports about the home-field advantage, but for the Maryland men's lacrosse team it has been better away from home than it has been in College Park. The Terps have played eight games at home (7-1) and seven on the road (3-4) and the numbers are mixed through 15 games - except for the all-important win column.
- Maryland is averaging 11.6 goals per game in its home games, which is better than two goals more than the 9.4 goals the Terps average on the road.
- The Maryland defense has been good whether it is playing at home or on the road, but the numbers favor the Terps when they are at home so far in 2008. Maryland is allowing opponents just 6.1 goals per game at home, but that inflates by to 9.2 gpg on the road.
- A Freshman leads the Terps in overall scoring and is tops in both at home and on road scoring as well. **Grant Catalino** is the team's leading scorer overall with 40 points. He is also the Terps' leading scorer at home with 23 points on 15 goals and eight assist. Catalino also leads the squad in scoring on the road with 12 goals and five assists for 17 points.

PUTTING ON THE RITZ

- Senior midfielder **Max Ritz** might go down as one of the most under-appreciated player in Maryland men's lacrosse history. The Wayne, Pa., native has continually put up "big game" performances throughout his career. During his four seasons as a Terp, Ritz has played in eight NCAA tournament games and has scored at least one point in seven of those. All told, Ritz has 14 goals and five assists for 19 points - an average of 2.375 points per tournament game.
- Ritz's 14 goals puts him in some elite company in Maryland's record books. He is now tied for ninth all-time in total goals in NCAA tournament games with Andrew Whipple, Rob Wurzburger, Bert Caswell and Brian Zeller.
- For his career he has totaled 110 points, tying him with his brother Xander for second-most since Coach Cottle arrived in College Park. His 66 goals is third-best since 2002. He's taken 216 shots to get those 66 goals for a shooting percentage of .306. That's the highest of all of the top five goal scorers during the Cottle Era - Joe Walters (.278), Bill McGlone (.291), Xander Ritz (.292), Brendan Healy (.200).

DEFENSE READY TO MEET EXPECTATIONS

On paper this year's Maryland defense may appear to have some holes, but the 2008 Terrapin defense is looking to uphold the Terps' tradition of great defenses. Sure, the unit lost two second team All-Americans in seniors **Ray Megill** and **Steve Whittenberg** and also three-year starting long pole **Ryan Clarke**, but one look at the talent this year's "D" and you'll see it's more than capable. Three-year starter **Joe Cinosky** returns for his senior season along with a trio of experienced seniors in **Ryne Adolph**, **Jacob Baxter** and **Zach Hinton**. Talented freshman **Max Schmidt** is expected to see plenty of playing time as well at close defense. At long pole sophomore **Brian Farrell** is one of the best in the NCAA and the Terps have depth behind him in senior **Matt Rankin**, junior **Chris Rhine** and sophomore **Dan Halayko**. Redshirt junior **Jeff Reynolds** is back after missing 14 games in 2007 with a torn ACL. This season he's set to pair up with sophomore **Bryn Holmes** to give Maryland one of the best short-stick tandems in the country.

During the last four seasons, Maryland held its' opponents scoreless for long stretches of game time. The 2004 Terps kept opponents scoreless for stretches of 20 or more minutes eight times. In 2005 Maryland did it on seven occasions, and was just seconds away from keeping the high-powered Duke (1st meeting) and Navy offenses off the board for more than 20 minutes. The 2006 season saw the Terrapin defense do it 10 times in 17 games. In 2007 Terp "D" had 11 20+ minute scoring droughts to its credit in 16 contests. So far in 2008, Maryland has held opponents scoreless for more than 20 minutes six times.

The emphasis on team defense was evident in the Terps' 2008 opener at No. 4 Georgetown. Maryland held the lauded Hoya offense to just six goals and two of those came when Georgetown converted on man-up opportunities. The Terrapin defense held Georgetown's starting attack and first midfield, which combined for 95 goals (6.3 per game) in 2007, to just three scores.

The defense was solid in allowing just seven goals at Mount St. Mary's on a rainy, foggy afternoon. The fog was the most difficult on the defense as it made the ball very hard for the goalies to see shots clearly. Even so, the Terrapins came up with a good defensive effort, holding the Mount to just one goal over a 22-minute span covering parts of the first, second and third quarters. Junior Mike Griswold led the Terps with three caused turnovers on the afternoon. Overall, 12 Terps combined to force 19 of the Mount's 25 turnovers.

The defense turned in its first shutout quarter of the season in the 13-5 win over Providence. The Terps held the Friars scoreless in the first quarter, allowing the offense to jump out to a 5-0 lead. Overall, Providence was held off the board for the first 23:30 of the game. Maryland forced 20 of the Friars' 21 turnovers. Leading the way was sophomore long pole **Brian Farrell** who had three caused turnovers to go along with four groundballs.

In the Terps' 12-7 win over No. 18 Towson, Maryland's "D" proved to be a physically dominant unit. The Terrapins forced 16 of the Tigers' 23 turnovers. Even more impressive was Maryland's plus-22 advantage in groundballs (53-31). Senior defender **Ryne Adolph** had a career-best six pick-ups off the turf and led a contingent of nine Terps who had at least four groundballs apiece. In addition to playing great on its side of the field, the defense also contributed on the offensive side of things vs. Towson as **Brian Farrell** scored two of Maryland's 12 goals.

The Maryland defense had its finest showing of the season to date against Air Force, holding the Falcons to just four goals. After surrendering three scores in the first quarter, the Terrapin defense tightened down and did not allow another goal for 44:03; the longest scoreless stretch for the season by the Terp "D". Maryland's defenders also got into the scoring act against Air Force. Five Terrapin defenders combined for a pair of goals and three assists.

- At fifth-ranked North Carolina, the Terps bottled up the Tar Heels offense, holding them to just eight goals. Senior All-America candidate **Joe Cinosky** continued his dominant play with four groundballs and a pair of caused turnovers. In total, the Maryland defense held Carolina's starting attack to two goals and one assist. The "D" held the Tar Heels without a goal for 20:13, spanning the third and fourth quarters. That allowed the Maryland offense to go on a 5-0 scoring run and put the game out of reach.
- A masterful performance by the Terrapin defense helped the Terps knock off then-No. 1 Virginia, 13-7. The Cavaliers were held to their lowest scoring output of the season and were held to just three goals in the first half. Virginia had entered the game averaging more than eight goals per game in the first half alone. Redshirt junior goalie **Jason Carter** was brilliant in the cage, stopping a career-best 15 saves in the victory.
- The Terps held Navy to just five goals - more than four lower than its season average - and shutout the Midshipmen for the final 30:44 of the game. **Joe Cinosky** tied his career-high with five groundballs and also caused three of Navy's 24 turnovers. The Mids turned the ball over on 14 of their 16 second-half possessions against a tenacious Maryland defense.
- Goalie **Brian Phipps** set career-highs with 17 saves and six groundballs in Maryland 9-4 win over Penn. The sophomore from Annapolis, Md., allowed only one goal and helped hold the Quakers scoreless for a stretch of 51:12. **Joe Cinosky** also had a career-best six groundballs, while defensive midfielders **Chris Rhine** (goal) and **Bryn Holmes** (assist) added to the offensive effort.
- The defense was solid if not spectacular in the 16-10 win over Yale on May 3, but the "D" contributed to the offensive effort vs. the Elis with two goals and two assists coming from defensive players. **Bryn Holmes** scored both goals for the Maryland defense, while long pole **Brian Farrell** and short-stick **Dan Burns** picked up the assists.
- Trailing 5-2 in the second quarter against Denver in the first round of the NCAA tournament the defense took over and held the Pioneers scoreless for 30:06, allowing the offense to go on a 7-0 run to take control of the game en route to a 10-7 Terrapin win. But it wasn't just the offense contributing to that scoring spurt as **Joe Cinosky** scored an man-down goal that proved to be the game-winner.

OFFENSIVE DEFENDERS

- Through 15 games Terrapin defensive players have been surprisingly offensive. So far in 2008, seven Maryland defenders (close, long poles and short-stick d-middies) have scored goals or tallied assists. In total, Terrapin defenders have 15 goals and 13 assists for 28 points. The Terps have totaled 254 points as a team, which means that more than 11 percent of Maryland's offense has come from a defensive player.
- Sophomore long pole **Brian Farrell** leads the defense with six goals and three assists and is actually 10th on the squad in points and goals. The 6-foot-4, 230-pound Baltimore native, had scored at least one point in seven of the Terps' last 11 games.
- Sophomore short-stick **Bryn Holmes** is next up for the defenders with six points on three goals and three assists, including a career-best two goals in the 16-10 win over Yale on May 3.
- Junior **Chris Rhine**, who has played both long- and short-stick this season, has two goals and an assist for three points. In the Yale win, Rhine's perfect career shooting percentage (4-of-4 heading into the game vs. the Bulldogs) dropped to .800 when his second-quarter shot sailed over the Yale goal.
- Three other short-sticks have contributed to the offensive production this season. **Dan Burns** has three assists, **Spencer McAllister** has two goals, while **Dean Hart** has two assists.
- Senior All-America candidate **Joe Cinosky** has one goal and one assist, while long-pole **Dan Halayko** has a goal.

RANKING THE GOALIES

- In order for a goalie to be ranked among the NCAA leaders they must have played at least 60% of their team's minutes. That leaves out the Terps' tandem of **Brian Phipps** (44%) and **Jason Carter** (52%), but both would be in the top 25 in goals-against average and save percentage under different circumstances.
- Phipps' 5.92 GAA would be the best in the nation, while Carter's GAA of 8.55 would rank 22nd.
- Phipps would be second in save percentage with .649. Carter's save pct. of .561 would tie for 27th. Combined, Phipps and Carter have a .598 save percentage, which would be seventh on this week's NCAA chart.

WHERE'S THE BEEF? CHECK THE "D"

- How big is Maryland's defense this season? Well, Towson head coach Tony Seaman, who's Tigers have a big defensive unit of their own, had this to say: "We're certainly nothing like the bullies down at Maryland with size or strength ...". Take a look at the top seven close defensemen and/or long poles for the Terps in 2008 - the average for the group is 6-foot-3, 221 pounds.

FRESHMEN LEADING THE WAY

- The season is in the home stretch and the top three scorers for the Terps are still freshmen. This is rare air for the Maryland program.
- Going back to 1962 only two Terrapins (Mike Mollot, who was a redshirt freshman, in 2000 and Joe Walters in 2003) led the team in points as a rookie. Only four (Walters, Matt Hahn in 1995, Rob Wurzbarger in 1988 and Pete Worstell in 1977) led the team in goals and another four (Dan LaMonica in 2001, Mollot, Rob Chomo in 1991 and Tim Cox in 1989) led the squad in assists.
- Travis Reed, Ryan Young** and **Grant Catalino** are already approaching some freshmen milestones and are poised to climb the freshman class records in several categories. Catalino cracked the top 10 in points with his seven-point performance against Yale and is now ninth with 40 points. Reed is in 13th with 31, while Young is tied for 14th with Jim Wilkerson, who had 27 points in 1980. Catalino is now sixth on the goals list with 27. Reed is ninth with 20 goals. Young's 18 assists has him in eighth place on the freshman assist chart and needs just two more to tie Andrew Whipple (1995) and Frank Urso (1973) for sixth. Catalino is 10th, tied with Joe Walters with 13 assist, while Reed has 11 and is one shy of Jack Lamon, who sits at No. 12 with 12 in 1976.

FRESHMEN STARTERS

- There was a lot of speculation about which freshmen would start in the season opener at Georgetown. The question was answered with four (see below). But freshmen starting the season opener is nothing new for the Terps under Coach Cottle. Since 2002 there have now been eight Terrapins that have started the season opener as freshmen.

MEMORABLE DEBUT

- Freshman **Grant Catalino** scored four goals in the Terps' 11-6 season-opening win at Georgetown on Feb. 23. That performance marked the most goals by a Maryland freshman since Rob Wurzbarger tallied four scores in a 19-4 win over Hambden-Sydney.
- For his performance against the Hoyas, Catalino was named both the ACC Player of the Week (along with UNC goalie Grant Zimmerman) and the University of Maryland's male athlete of the week.

YOUTH MOVEMENT

- How young is this Maryland team? Consider this ... a total of 34 Terps have played in at least 10 games this season and 15 of them are freshmen or sophomores.
- Maryland's top three scorers are freshmen. Seven of the top 11 groundball totals belong to sophomores or freshmen. Six of the 12 leaders in caused turnovers are also in their first or second seasons.
- With 15 games played there have been 150 starts and 60 of those have been made by sophomores or freshmen - that's 40% of the team's total starting positions.

STREAKING TERPS

- Last season two Terps finished the season with at least one point in every game. This year no one will have that honor, but there are a couple of Terps that will come close.
- Grant Catalino** was held without a point in Maryland's loss at Duke on March 1, but that's the only time this season that he's been held scoreless. Catalino has a current points streak of 12 games and has scored multiple points in 12 of 15 games this season.
- Travis Reed** has played in 13 of Maryland's 15 games and has had at least one point in 11 of those, including nine multi-point games.
- Max Ritz** entered the season with a 20 straight games with at least one point - but that was as an attackman. This year he was moved to midfield, where he experienced some growing pains, including being held scoreless in the first two games. Since then he has had at least one point in 10 of 13 games with seven multi-point games to his credit.

TERPS VS. NO. 1

- Since 1978 (the first year rankings were recorded in the Terp media guide), Maryland has played a No. 1-ranked team on 23 occasions and has pulled off the upset six times.
- The most recent occasion of Maryland knocking off a No. 1 team came just last Saturday, March 29. The No. 4 Terps controlled the game from the outset and pulled off a 13-7 win over Virginia at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium. Redshirt junior goalie **Jason Carter** had a career-day vs. the Wahoos, stopping 15 shots. Freshman attackman **Travis Reed** led the Terrapin offense with a career-best five points on three goals and two assists.
- Prior to the victory over Virginia, Maryland last upset the nation's top-ranked team on March 4, 2006 when the Terps pulled out a thrilling 8-7 overtime victory at then-No. 1 Duke. Xander Ritz scored five goals vs. the Blue Devils, including the game-winner for the Terrapins. The last time the Terrapins faced a No. 1-ranked team was on April 1, 2006 against Virginia. The Wahoos, who would storm through an undefeated season en route to a national title, took that game by a 15-5 margin.
- Before that 2006 win over Duke, the last time the Terps defeated the nation's top team was on May 23, 1998 vs. Loyola in the NCAA Semifinals at Piscataway, N.J. Maryland's Matt Hahn scored five goals to help the Terrapins to a dominating 19-8 win over the Greyhounds, who were coached by current Maryland head coach **Dave Cottle**.
- Coincidentally, the last time the Terps upset the No.1 team at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium was a 13-11 win over Virginia on March 30, 1996.

HOME COOKING

- A lot is made in sports about the home-field advantage, and for the Maryland men's lacrosse team that advantage has held true since Coach Cottle arrived in College Park. Since 2002, the Terps are 42-14 (.750) when playing on the Maryland campus. At Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium Maryland is 27-11 (.711) under Cottle, while the Terps have gone 8-3 (.727) at the Field Hockey & Lacrosse Complex and 7-0 at Ludwig Field.

A FAMILY AFFAIR

- Many school's refer to their sports programs as families, but under Coach Cottle the Maryland men's lacrosse program has really become a family affair. Since arriving in College Park in 2002, Cottle has had eight sets of brothers don the red and black together for at least one season.

FATHERS AND SONS

- Maryland's family tradition doesn't end with brothers. Fathers and sons are also part of the Terps' tradition and that's never been more evident than this season. This year's Maryland men's lacrosse roster features three players whose father's not only played at Maryland, but won a nation title together. Mike Farrell, father of **Brian**, Wilson Phipps, father of **Brian**, and Jake Reed, father of **Travis**, were all members of the Terps' 1975 NCAA championship squad.

TERPS' 83RD SEASON OF LACROSSE

- The Terps boast an all-time record of 693-230-4 (.750), dating back to the first varsity team in 1924 (a team was not fielded in 1944 and 1945 due to World War II). Maryland has finished every one of its previous 82 seasons with a .500 or better record, including last season when the Terps went 10-6. The program reached the 650-win milestone with a 16-12 win over Army in the first round of the 2004 NCAA tournament at Byrd Stadium.
- Since 2000, Maryland is 101-41 for a .711 win percentage. In the decade of the 1990s, Maryland recorded its most wins in any decade with a 95-47 record. The .669 winning percentage matched Maryland's win percentage of the 1980s when the Terps went 83-41 and also compiled a .669 win percentage.

ROAD WORK

- For just the second time in program history, the Terps opened the season with three-straight games away from College Park. In 1978 Maryland opened with a pair of games in North Carolina - a 25-11 win at NC State and a 14-7 win at Duke - before beating Dartmouth, 16-3, in a neutral site game at Garden City, Long Island.
- 2008 marks the 12th time in the 83 years of Maryland lacrosse that the Terps will open a season with at least two road games. In the previous 11 seasons (1952, 1954, 1971, 1973, 1974, 1978, 1980, 1982, 2001, 2004 and 2006) Maryland has a combined record of 23-0 in those road games. This season the Terps were 2-1 in its three-game road trip to open the season, bringing its record to 25-1 (.962).

MARYLAND IN SEASON OPENERS

- Maryland has a 79-3-1 (.958) lifetime record in season openers dating back to the 1924 season. The Terps have won their last 15 openers and 23 of the last 24, with the only loss coming to Duke in 1993, when they fell to Duke 9-5 on March 6.
- After losing their 1925 opener to Yale, 5-3, the Terps went on to win 40 consecutive season openers from 1926 through 1967. The streak was broken when Maryland tied Princeton, 6-6, in the 1968 opener. Following the deadlock, Maryland went on to win its next 14 openers, giving the Terps a 54-0-1 record over a 57-year span (Maryland did not field a team in 1944 and 1945 due to World War II.)

15 STRAIGHT IN SEASON OPENERS

- After beating No. 4 Georgetown to open the 2008 season the Terps now have a 15-game winning streak in season openers. Five of those wins came against Villanova (1994-98) and the last nine over Denver, Mount St. Mary's, Air Force, Hobart, Duke, Georgetown (four times) and Bellarmine. Over the 15-year stretch, Maryland outscored its foes 204-78 (an average score of 13.6-5.2) in those games.
- The Terps have not allowed more than seven goals to any opponent in a season opener over the last 15 years. Maryland has not allowed an opponent to score 10 or more goals in a season opener since Syracuse beat the Terps, 16-13 on March 9, 1983.

TWO TERPS NAMED TO TEWAARATON TROPHY WATCH LIST

- A pair of seniors - defenseman **Joe Cinosky** and midfielder/attackman **Max Ritz** - were named to the preseason "Watch List" for the 2008 Tewaaraton Trophy. For Cinosky this is his second time on the list, while Ritz is making his first appearance.
- The Tewaaraton Trophy is awarded each year to the top male and female varsity lacrosse player, as chosen by the selection committee. The seventh annual award will be given at a banquet in June. The event will take place in Washington D.C. at the National Geographic Society headquarters.

THREE TERPS NAMED TO U.S. U-19 TEAM

- Three Terrapin freshmen will represent the University of Maryland this summer at the 2008 ILF Under-19 World Championships, which are scheduled for July 3-12 in Coquitlam, British Columbia.
- Midfielder **Tony Mendes**, defender **Max Schmidt** and attackman **Ryan Young** were selected to the 23-man roster following a four-day tryout last summer in Baltimore.

2008 CAPTAINS: ADOLPH, CINOSKY, DALTON, EVANS & RITZ

- Five players have been named team captains for the 2008 season. The quintet, which was voted on by the team during the preseason, consists of seniors **Ryne Adolph**, **Joe Cinosky**, **Will Dalton**, **Drew Evans** and **Max Ritz**.



WASHINGTON, D.C. - Youth was served in the University of Maryland's men's lacrosse season opener as four Terrapin freshmen combined for nine goals in No. 7 Maryland's 11-6 victory over fourth-ranked Georgetown at the Hoyas' Multi-Sport Field Saturday afternoon.

Grant Catalino, who scored a game-high four goals, got the ball rolling for the Terps with an unassisted goal at the 9:35 mark. The freshman from Webster, N.Y., picked up a groundball off of a shot by fellow Terp freshman Travis Reed that hit the right post. Catalino scooped up the ball and quickly put the ball past Hoya goalie Miles Kass for a 1-0 Terrapin lead.

Georgetown and Maryland traded rapid-fire goals over the next two minutes of play. Andrew Brancaccio scored to tie the game at 8:50. Senior co-captain Will Dalton used the NCAA's new face-off rule to give the Terps a 2-1 lead on the ensuing face-off. Georgetown's Brian Taubb was whistled for moving early on the draw giving Maryland a fast-break opportunity. Dalton took full advantage by racing down the middle of the field and burying a shot from 10 yards out. Brendan Cannon scored his only goal of the game off of a rebound off the post to knot the score at 2-2.

But that's as close as the Hoyas would get to taking a lead in the game as Maryland ripped off the next five goals.

Freshman Ryan Young scored the first goal of his career, beating All-America defender Jerry Lambe around the back of the net before finishing with a nifty one-handed wraparound goal into the top left corner of the goal. Catalino scored his second of the game, converting on a man-up opportunity off an assist from Dan Groot.

Maryland closed out the first quarter with a 5-2 lead thanks to a high-bounce goal by redshirt junior Jeff Reynolds with just 15 seconds left on the clock.

The quarter break did little to stifle the Maryland momentum as the Terps tacked on another score - by another freshman - just 15 seconds into the period. Sophomore long pole controlled the ball off of the opening face-off and fed perfect pass to Travis Reed on the right wing, where he laced a shot into the Hoyas goal.

The freshman train kept rolling for the Terps with midfielder Tony Mendes who connected on his first career score at the 9:56 mark of the second quarter. The Chapel Hill, N.C., native got some separation with a great split dodge to the middle of the field and fired the ball into the top right corner of the goal.

After the Hoyas scored to make the game 7-3, Catalino scored his third of the game off an assist from junior midfielder Jeremy Sieverts to lift Maryland's lead back to five. Georgetown would convert on a man-up opportunity for the half's final score to cut its deficit to four at the half.

But Maryland came out of the intermission and scored off of the ensuing face-off. Georgetown won the draw, but Maryland forced a turnover near midfield. Young scooped up the loose ball and hit a 40-yard shot for his second goal of the game. Kass had come out away from the net as the Hoyas attempted to clear the ball into the Maryland zone, leaving an empty net for Young.

Young picked up his first collegiate assist on Maryland's next goa, feeding Reed on the right wing from behind the goal. Reed then hit a quick low shot to give Maryland a 10-4 lead.

Georgetown's Jake Samperton scored at the 6:15 mark of the third period, but Catalino, off another assist by Sieverts, rolled around and over a pair of Hoya defenders for his fourth goal of the game.

The fourth quarter saw only one goal, a man-up score by Georgetown's Craig Dowd off an assist by Cannon at the 6:45 mark. The Terps used a controlled, patient offense to run out the clock and take home the victory.

Redshirt junior Jason Carter, who missed all of 2007 with a broken collarbone, earned the start in cage for the Terps and made seven saves. He gave way to sophomore Brian Phipps in the second half and the 2007 Freshman of the Year allowed just two goals, while making three stops.

Defensively, Maryland was led by Farrell, who led the Terps with three caused turnovers and three groundballs. Senior All-America candidate Joe Cinosky also had three groundballs and caused one Hoya turnover.

Game Notes:

- With today's 11-6 win Maryland is now 7-1 all-time vs. Georgetown.
- Maryland has won 15 straight season openers and is 79-3-1 all-time to start the season.
- The victory also gives the Terps a 20-0 record in season openers on the road.
- Junior Jeremy Sieverts had a pair of assists to give him 14 career multi-point games.
- Senior Max Ritz did not score in the game, ending his point scoring streak at 20. The last time Ritz did not have at least one point in a game was against Virginia in the ACC tournament semifinals on April 30, 2006.

Junior midfielder Jeremy Sieverts scored off of an assist from freshman Brett Weiss. The 8-0 run was capped off by a nice finish by junior attackman Scott Tompkins, who buried a shot from the left alley following a terrific skip-pass from freshman midfielder Tony Mendes.

The Friars' Devin McBride scored the first of his two goals to finish the scoring in the first half with Maryland holding an 8-1 advantage.

The fourth quarter opened with an unassisted goal by Mendes at the 11:31 mark. Redshirt junior midfielder Jeff Reynolds took the opening face-off following a Friar goal by Mark Dillon down the field and answered with an unassisted goal of his own to make it a 12-4 Terrapin advantage.

Tompkins closed out the scoring for the Terps with his second goal of the day off the first career assist by Seattle, Wash., native Drew Snider. Providence's Mike Feldberg scored with 21 seconds left to end the game with the 13-5 final score.

Maryland's goalies were not really challenged much in the game. The Terrapin defense was stifling, holding the Friars to just 14 shots on the afternoon. Providence did not get off its first shot until the 7:04 mark of the second quarter, going a span of 22:56 without a shot to open the game. Sophomore Brian Phipps got the start in the cage for the Terps and made two saves. He was relieved in the second half by redshirt junior Jason Carter who stopped three Friar shots.

Freshman Travis Reed, who was one of eight Terrapins with multiple points in the game, scored the eventual game winner off of Young's second assist of the game. Redshirt junior goalie Jason Carter, who made a career-best nine saves in just 30:00 of work, started the play for the next Maryland score with a terrific save on a Brian Massa shot. Farrell scooped up the groundball off the rebound and flipped a pass to senior defender Joe Cinosky, who was streaking through the midfield. Cinosky carried the ball into the Maryland attack zone, drew a couple of Falcon defenders to him and slipped a nifty pass to junior attackman Danny Gallagher, who beat Johnson from the left wing.

Redshirt junior midfielder Jeff Reynolds closed out the scoring in the first half for the Terps with his first of two goals on the day at the 4:30 mark in the second quarter.

Catalino and Dalton each scored their second goals of the day to open the second half. After assisting on Dalton's second score, senior midfielder Drew Evans got into the scoring act himself, connecting on a great pick-and-roll play with Young, who picked up his third assist on the day.

Junior midfielder Rob Morrison then scored his first career goal and followed that up with his second career goal less than two minutes later. Morrison's first goal came on a blistering low-to-high shot from the right wing that found the upper left corner of the net. His second goal, which gave Maryland a 12-3 advantage, gave Young his fourth assist and his second four-assist game of the season.

Senior midfielder Max Ritz scored the game's only man-up goal off an assist by Reed. Combined with an assist on Catalino's third quarter goal, Ritz's two-point game gives him 99 points in his career.

Reynolds and junior defensive midfielders Chris Rhine and Spencer McAllister finished the scoring for the Terps. Redshirt freshman Dan Burns and junior attackman Scott Tompkins picked up assists on Rhine's and McAllister's goals, respectively.

After withstanding the Falcons' spirited first quarter, the Maryland defense turned in an outstanding team effort, holding Air Force without a goal for 44:03 spanning the final 22 seconds of the first quarter to the 1:19 mark of the fourth quarter when the Falcons' Ridge Flick scored the game's final goal.

Cinosky, a preseason All-American, led the Terrapin defense with a career-best five groundballs along with three caused turnovers. Farrell also had five groundballs and a pair of caused turnovers. For the game, Maryland had a 52-29 advantage in groundballs with seven Terps having at least three groundballs.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. - Redshirt junior midfielder Jeff Reynolds scored his first career hat trick to lead the No. 9 University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to a decisive 13-8 win over fifth-ranked North Carolina at Fetzer Field on Saturday evening.

After Bart Wagner gave UNC a 1-0 lead just one minute into the game, the Terps got a lucky break at the 8:41 mark to tie the score. Carolina goalie Grant Zimmerman brought the ball near midfield on an attempted clear, but his pass attempt was picked off by junior midfielder Jeremy Sieverts, who brought the ball just across the midfield stripe before ripping a long shot into the empty Tar Heel goal.

UNC grabbed a 2-1 lead on a Bobby McAuley goal at the 7:26 mark. This time it was sophomore Adam Sear that had the answer for the Terps. The midfielder from Perth, Western Australia, ran by a UNC defender on the left wing and beat Zimmerman top side for a 2-2 tie.

Reynolds fought through a scrum for the ensuing face-off and pushed the ball straight down the middle of the field. No Carolina defender stepped out to pick up Reynolds, so he fired an overhand shot at the feet of Zimmerman for his ninth goal of the season.

The see-saw game continued at the beginning of the second quarter with UNC tying the score at 3-3 on Michael B. Burns' goal at 10:17. But the tie wouldn't last long thanks to Maryland co-captain Will Dalton. The 6-foot-4, 270-pound midfielder started out high on the left alley and crossed over, bull-dodging his way down the right side before beating Zimmerman for the 4-3 lead.

Maryland's lead grew to 5-3 less than two minutes later when junior midfielder Dan Groot skipped a pass to senior middle Max Ritz on the left alley. Ritz then laced a skip shot into the lower left corner of the Carolina goal for the score.

An unsportsmanlike conduct penalty by UNC's Brian Burke gave the Terps an extra-man opportunity and Maryland made the Tar Heels pay. Freshman attackman Travis Reed netted his fourth man-up goal of the season off an assist by Ritz for a 6-3 Maryland advantage.

The 3-0 Maryland run was interrupted by a bit of bad luck. After he made a save on a Groot, Zimmerman picked up the groundball and tried to run the ball out of danger, but freshman attackman Ryan Young's feet inadvertently got caught up with Zimmerman's giving UNC a one-minute man-advantage. But the Tar Heels didn't need that long. Cryder DiPietro scored from the right alley seconds into the penalty to cut the lead to 6-4 at 2:22.

But the momentum swung Maryland's way again less than 30 seconds following DiPietro's goal when freshman attackman Grant Catalino scored an unassisted goal at the 1:59 mark to send the game to the half with the Terps holding a 7-4 lead.

For the third consecutive quarter the Tar Heels drew first blood when Ben Hunt scored an unassisted goal at the 13:35 mark. But for the third straight time the Terps answered right back. Reynolds scored his second of the game on a running jump shot from the right alley to boost the lead back to three goals.

After more than eight scoreless minutes Maryland added another goal to build a 9-5 lead. Senior midfielder Drew Evans ran past a Tar Heel defender behind the left side of the UNC goal and slipped a shot past Zimmerman.

An extra-man opportunity, thanks to a pair of penalties on UNC's Rob Driscoll, let the Terps draw first blood at the beginning of the fourth quarter. After the ball circled around the perimeter, Sieverts dropped a quick pass to freshman attackman Brett Weiss on the left side of the crease where he tucked a quick shot into the left side of the Tar Heel net.

Reynolds continued his scoring barrage at the 11:47 mark with a man-down goal. The play started when sophomore midfielder Bryn Holmes intercepted a Tar Heel pass in front of the Maryland goal. The lead grew to 12-5 just over two minutes later when Maryland converted on another man-up chance. Catalino dumped a pass inside to Weiss, who quickly turned and shot.

Carolina scored three straight goals to cut the lead to 12-8, but UNC chose to bring Zimmerman out of the net to double-team the ball. That didn't work the way the Tar Heels planned as Groot split the double-team and scored an empty-netter to give the Terps a five-goal cushion at 13-8 with 4:10 remaining and that's how the game would end, giving the Terps their first ACC win of the season.

Senior All-America defender Joe Cinosky continued his stellar play, leading the Terps with four groundballs and a pair of caused turnovers. Holmes and freshman defender Max Schmidt each had a pair of caused turnovers in the Terrapin victory. Sophomore goalie Brian Phipps picked up the win in the cage for Maryland after making five saves in 30:00 of work.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Redshirt junior goalie Jason Carter had a career-day, making a career-best 15 saves, to help lead the fourth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to a 13-7 win over No. 1 Virginia in front of more than 4,000 fans at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium and a national television audience tuning in on ESPN2.

The Terps' victory over the top-ranked Cavaliers is the programs' first win over a No. 1 team at home since 1996 when Maryland topped Virginia 13-11. The last time Maryland dropped a No. 1 team overall was on March 4, 2006 when the Terps took down No. 1 Duke, 8-7 in overtime, at Koskinen Stadium in Durham, N.C.

Carter and the entire Terrapin defense were spectacular in the cage for the Terps, especially in the first half. The Crownsville, Md., native made seven of his 15 saves in the first 30:00 to help Maryland hold the Cavaliers to just three goals, allowing the Terrapin offense to build a 9-3 lead at the half. Coming into the game, Virginia had been averaging more than eight goals per game in the first half and had not trailed at halftime in any game this year.

While the defense took care of business on its end of the field, the Maryland offense was clicking on all cylinders at the other side of the field. The freshman attack trio of Travis Reed, Grant Catalino and Ryan Young combined for six goals and three assists. Young got the ball rolling for Maryland with the game's opening goal at the 13:01 mark.

Redshirt junior Jeff Reynolds continued his hot shooting streak, scoring the next two goals to give the Terps a 3-0 lead with less than five minutes elapsed. Reynolds' first score came off a face-off, which was won by sophomore Bryn Holmes. Holmes was jumped as he entered the Cavalier box, but was able to flip the ball to Reynolds, who got a shot past Virginia goalie Adam Ghitelman.

Virginia finally got on the board at the 3:34 mark on an unassisted goal by Peter Lamade, but Maryland responded with back-to-back goals by Reed and senior midfielder Will Dalton to boost the lead to 5-1. Reed scored on a wrap-around shot from behind the right side of the Wahoo goal. Dalton, who won 8-of-14 face-offs on the day, took then ensuing draw straight down the field and beat Ghitelman from the right alley.

Brian Carroll seemed to give Virginia a little momentum with a man-up goal at the 10:45 mark, but it was Maryland that would go on a run and really take control of the game. Dalton won the face-off following Carroll's score and it took the Terps just 61 seconds to strike back. Young skipped a pass to Reed on the left side, where the Cockeysville, Md., native ripped a shot into the Virginia net.

Reed followed that up with his third goal of the game on a low shot from the left wing. The Terrapin lead grew to 9-2 on unassisted goals by junior midfielder Rob Morrison and freshman Tony Mendes. Virginia was able to cut the lead to six going into halftime thanks to another goal by Lamade.

The Wahos came out of the break looking to whittle away at the Maryland lead and back-to-back goals by Ben Rubeor and Rhamel Bratton had it down to four, the closest it had been since the 9:37 mark of the second quarter.

But the Terps would not allow the game to slip away from them and responded with a pair of goals of their own. Reed found Reynolds open on the right alley and the Bel Air, Md., native ripped an overhand shot past Ghitelman for his second straight hat trick. Catalino followed that up with his first goal of the game, an unassisted score from the left alley. The freshman from Webster, N.Y., used his entire 6-foot-5 frame to screen Ghitelman, who didn't see the shot until it was already in the goal.

For the third-straight quarter, Virginia closed the scoring, this time on Bratton's second goal of the period to send Maryland into the final 15 minutes with an 11-6 lead.

That lead grew to six goals just 10 seconds into the quarter thanks to an incredible individual effort by Catalino. With Virginia's Matt Kelly draped all over his back, Catalino was able find a way to get off a good shot that found a way into the Cavalier goal.

Both defenses controlled much of the fourth quarter and it was fitting that a defensive player netted the Terps' final goal of the game. Sophomore long pole Brian Farrell finished a successful clear for Maryland and used a terrific ball fake to get a clear shot at the Virginia goal and the Towson, Md., native buried a shot for his fifth goal of the season.

Virginia's Garrett Billings scored the game's final goal at the 1:06 mark to make the final score 13-7 in favor of the Terps.

All-America candidate Joe Cinosky continued to be a dominant defender for the Terps. The native of Boonton Township, N.J., had three groundballs and limited Cavalier attackman Danny Glading to three assists and no goals.

Maryland's face-off duo of Holmes and Dalton controlled the tempo of the game at the face-off X, winning 15-of-23 draws and picking up four groundballs apiece.

- The win is the 690th victory in the 83-year history of the Maryland men's lacrosse program. The Terps are now 690-227-4 all-time.

BALTIMORE - The University of Maryland men's lacrosse team dropped a 10-4 decision at No. 15 Johns Hopkins in front of 8,626 fans at Homewood Field Saturday afternoon.

The first quarter was, as expected, a hard-hitting, physical start to the game. Hopkins jumped out to a 1-0 lead thanks to a running left-hander down the left alley by Paul Rabil. The Blue Jays upped their lead to 2-0 at the 2:47 mark when Steven Boyle dumped a pass to Michael Doneger in front of the crease where he one-timed a shot past Maryland goalie Jason Carter.

After another Doneger goal grew the lead to 3-0, the Terps finally got on the board with 7:15 left in the second quarter. Senior All-American Joe Cinosky stabbed a Hopkins pass out of the air and hit a running Brian Farrell in stride to start the fast break. Farrell fought a Blue Jay defender the whole way down the field and was able to get off a one-handed bounce shot from the right alley that beat Hopkins goalie Michael Gvozden.

The Terps continued to try to claw back into the game and got a lucky bounce that led to their next score. Gvozden stopped a Tony Mendes shot, but was unable to control the ball. Senior Max Ritz picked up the groundball and laced a quick pass to Drew Evans on the left side of the crease, where Evans ripped a quick shot to the short side to trim the lead to 3-2.

After Hopkins went on a 5-0 run to start the third quarter to open up an 8-2 advantage, Maryland finally got back on the scoreboard thanks to a pair of Blue Jay penalties. The Terps used every second of the extra-man opportunity, but finally Dan Groot found Grant Catalino 12-yards out at the top of the goal, where the Webster, N.Y., native ripped a low shot for the Terrapins' third goal of the game.

The third quarter was closed out with another Blue Jay goal to send the game into the fourth quarter with a 9-3 Hopkins lead.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The only player who could score on Brian Phipps Saturday afternoon at Ludwig Field was Brian Phipps. The sophomore goalie made a career-best 17 saves to lead the No. 7 Maryland men's lacrosse team to a 9-4 win over Penn.

Phipps, the 2007 ACC Freshman of the Year, was spectacular in the cage, stopping everything shot his way from a simple stab to stop a simple shot headed for the top corner to a sensational diving save in the second quarter when he left the crease to go after a loose ball. The only goal Phipps allowed on the day came at the 9:05 mark of the first quarter. Phipps made his fourth save of the game, stopping a shot by Corey Winkoff, but the ball was knocked out of his stick and bounced into the Terrapin goal.

But that was the last time the Quakers would score for the next 51:12. The Terrapin defense was solid all afternoon and while Penn did out-shoot Maryland 43-32 the Terps' "D" held the Quakers to a shooting percentage of less than 10 percent. The defensive effort was spearheaded by senior All-America candidate Joe Cinosky, who set a career-best with six groundballs to go along with two caused turnovers.

Also contributing to the defensive performance was the play of face-off men Bryn Holmes and Will Dalton. The two combined to win 9-of-15 draws and pick up eight groundballs.

Not to be outdone, the Terrapin offense played its best game since the end of March. Freshman attackman Travis Reed made his return to the Maryland line-up noticeable right from the start by picking up the first of his career-best four assists on senior Max Ritz's goal at the 12:15 mark of the first quarter on a runner from the right alley.

Maryland built a 2-0 lead on another runner, this one coming from the left alley by junior Jeremy Sieverts off an assist from freshman Grant Catalino.

After Winkoff was credited with the lone goal allowed by Phipps, the game remained 2-1 in favor of Maryland until just under the seven-minute mark of the second quarter. Sophomore long pole Brian Farrell keyed the Terrapin transition game, picking-off a J.J. Lian pass and taking it the other way into the Maryland offensive zone. The ball found its way to Reed just behind the right side of the Quaker goal. He spotted a hustling Chris Rhine and zipped a pass into the crease that Rhine deftly one-timed past Penn goalie Chris Casey.

Reed added his third assist less than two minutes later with another dump pass inside the crease. This time it was Catalino on the receiving end and the big 6-foot-5, 240-pound attackman was able to get a good handle on the pass and finish the play despite a Quaker defender draped on his back.

Dan Groot kept the momentum going for the Terps at the start of the third quarter with an unassisted goal at the 11:58 mark. The Junior all-American dodged inside of a Penn defender and slipped a left-handed shot low past Casey to give the Terps a 5-1 lead.

That four-goal margin remained until the Terps went on a four-goal scoring spree, stretching from the final 3:55 of the third quarter until the 14:49 mark of the fourth.

Junior attackman Scott Tompkins started the run for the Terps and was the beneficiary of a good groundball and feed from Ritz. A scramble to the side of the Quaker goal ended when Ritz picked up a tough groundball in a crown and was able to find Tompkins all alone in front of the Penn goal. Tompkins was then able to fake-out Casey and slip a shot between Casey's legs for the score.

Maryland's next goal came on its lone extra-man opportunity of the game. Freshman attackman Brett Weiss sent a quick skip pass over to Catalino on the right wing and Catalino dipped down and laced a low shot for the score at the 1:15 mark.

Sophomore midfielder Adam Sear got into the scoring column for the Terps as the second ticked down in the third quarter. Sear gave Reed his fourth assist of the day by firing another low shot from the left alley past Casey for an 8-1 Terrapin advantage.

The 4-0 run came to a close off of the opening face-off of the fourth quarter. Holmes picked the ball clean from Penn's Justin Lynch and got the ball to redshirt-junior Jeff Reynolds, who was running free down the right alley. Reynolds then ripped a shot into the Quaker goal for an eight-goal Maryland lead.

The Quakers finally broke their scoreless skid at the 2:53 mark of the fourth quarter, just 28 seconds after Phipps came out of the game, when Garve Heiderman scored off an assist by Winkoff. Penn rounded out the scoring with a pair of man-up goals by Al Kohart and Alex Webber.

BALTIMORE -The University of Maryland men's lacrosse team dropped an 11-8 decision to No. 3 Virginia Friday night at Klockner Stadium in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament.

The Cavaliers jumped out on top early with back-to-back goals by Garrett Billings. The Terps got on the board with a terrific wrap-around goal by freshman Ryan Young to cut the lead to one. Ben Rubeor pushed it back to two goals with an unassisted goal with 5:36 left in the first quarter. The lead was almost three, but redshirt junior goalie Jason Carter made a fantastic 1-on-1 save during a Cavalier man-up opportunity. Freshman Grant Catalino scored to trim the lead back to one at the 1:03 mark with a huge shot from 18-yards out from the top of the Maryland attack zone.

Maryland knotted the score at 3-3 just 34 seconds into the second quarter on senior Max Ritz's goal off an assist by freshman Travis Reed. COLLEGE PARK, Md. -It was "Senior Day" for the eighth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team, but it was freshman Grant Catalino that stole the show in the Terps' 16-10 win over the Yale Bulldogs Saturday afternoon at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium.

The 6-foot-5, 240-pound attackman from Webster, N.Y., led all scorers with a career-high seven points on four goals and a career-best three assists. Catalino's seven points are the most by a Terp since March 20, 2007 when Michael Phipps had seven in a win over Mount St. Mary's.

Maryland (9-5) never trailed in the game and showed a good inside-outside scoring balance. That was evident with the Terps' first two goals, both of which featured Catalino. The Webster, N.Y., native showed off his feeding ability with a great look inside to a cutting Scott Tompkins, who was making his first career start. Tompkins smoothly caught the ball and ripped a shot into the Bulldog goal for a 1-0 lead. Catalino's shooting prowess was on display less than two minutes later when he picked up a groundball in the left alley and ripped a quick low-to-high shot past Eli goalie George Carafides.

Yale scored two of the game's next three goals to pull to within one at 3-2, but senior midfielder Drew Evans' goal off an assist from junior All-American Dan Groot at the 6:18 mark kicked off a seven-goal Maryland scoring run that put the game out of reach. Groot fed Evans with a quick look inside the crease for the easy score. The play began back in the Eli zone with a turnover caused by sophomore long pole Dan Halayko.

Maryland's outside-shooting midfielders picked up the next two goals with freshman Tony Mendes and redshirt junior Jeff Reynolds both ripping shots into the cage from outside of 12 yards.

Evans was on the giving end of the Terps' next goal. He dropped a simple pass into the crease to freshman Travis Reed, who one-timed the ball past Carafides to give Maryland a 7-2 lead with 12:39 left in the second quarter. Reynolds followed that up with another outside laser from the left alley less than a minute later to boost the lead to six goals.

Reed scored his second goal of the game with a low-to-high shot from a tight angle just inside the right goal line extended. Picking up an assist on Reed's goal was freshman attackman Brett Weiss.

The scoring-run was finished with some trickery by sophomore Brian Farrell. After Holmes won the face-off following Reed's goal, Farrell lost his defender by faking like he was going to sub out for an offensive midfielder. Redshirt freshman Dan Burns, who picked up the groundball off the face-off recognized the opening and quickly fired a pass to Farrell. A Yale defender slid to cover the long pole, but Farrell was able to find a wide-open Holmes on the crease, who bounced a shot in for the score.

Kyle Washabaugh broke up the scoring run with his only goal of the game at the 2:38 mark, but Maryland answered right back with an unassisted goal by junior David O'Quinn. Greg DuBoff closed out the first half with his second goal of the game with 1:05 left on the clock.

After seven goals combined in the first and eight in the second, the teams settled in in the third quarter. The Bulldogs outscored the Terps 3-1 in the third. Senior face-off man Will Dalton sandwiched the only Maryland goal between two Davis Lindsey goals. Catalino got his third assist on Dalton's score with a quick skip pass from the left alley cross-field to the right alley, where Dalton ripped a shot for his first of two goals on the day.

The Eli's scored twice more following Lindsey's second goal to get to within four goals at 12-8, but Dalton scored on his patented bull-dodge through the right alley after picking the face-off clean at the 10:47 mark. Catalino then scored back-to-back goals off assists by Jeremy Sievers and Groot, respectively, to boost the lead back to seven at 15-8 with 5:57 left in the fourth.

Brendan Gibson scored two of his three goals on the day less than two minutes apart to trim the Bulldog deficit to five, but Catalino put the icing on the Terps' cake with his fourth goal of the day off an assist by Burns at the 2:06 mark to give Maryland the 16-10 victory.

Maryland's face-off combination of Dalton (6-of-14), Holmes (9-of-13) and Reynolds (2-of-3) won 17-of-30 battles at the X, including a decisive 6-of-9 in the second quarter that led to six Terrapin goals. Dalton led the Terps with five groundballs, while Holmes and Reynolds had three apiece.

Senior All-American Joe Cinosky had a tremendous final regular season home game with three groundballs and a pair of caused turnovers. Fifth-year seniors Ryne Adolph and Jacob Baxter each had a groundball and a caused turnover in the game as well. Senior long pole Matt Rankin set his career high with three groundballs.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. -The seventh-seeded University of Maryland men's lacrosse team used a 7-0 run to put away the Denver Pioneers by a 10-7 margin in the first round of the NCAA men's lacrosse tournament Saturday afternoon at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium.

Freshman attackman Grant Catalino had four points on two goals and a pair of assists to lead five Terps with at least two points. The defense, which held the Pioneers without a goal for 30:06, was led by senior All-American Joe Cinosky, who had four groundballs and four caused turnovers.

The Pioneers jumped out to an early 2-0 lead on goals by John Dickenson and Joey Murray, but Maryland got on the board at the 8:31 mark of the first quarter on Catalino's first score of the day on an assist by sophomore Bryn Holmes. Denver's Brett Koll built the lead back to two goals with his only goal of the game with 6:12 to play in the quarter.

Senior midfielder Max Ritz scored the first of his two goals to trim the deficit to one at the 3:54 mark. Freshman Ryan Young picked up the assist with a great pass from behind the net to Ritz, who was cutting across the field to the right wing.

The second quarter started just like the first with the Pioneers scoring the first two goals of the quarter to take a 5-2 lead, but that's as close as they would get the rest of the afternoon as the Terps would go on a 7-0 run to take control of the game.

Helping the Terps' cause was Denver's penchant for fouling. Down by three with seven minutes remaining in the half the Maryland extra-man unit converted on 3-of-5 opportunities to tie the game at 5-5 going into halftime.

Junior midfielder Jeremy Sieverts scored the first man-up goal for Maryland with a quick bounce shot from the left alley that was set-up by a good look from Catalino. Sieverts figured in on the next EMO goal, this time picking up the assist with a pass to Ritz, who scored with a terrific shot to the short-side on Denver goalie Austin Konkell, who kept the Pioneers in the game in the first half with 11 saves. He finished with 13 for the game.

The man-up group kept on clicking and tied the game at 5-5 with 48 seconds remaining in the half. Catalino earned his third point of the half with a quick look inside to freshman Brett Weiss, who quickly turned and got off a good low shot before the Denver defense could converge.

The third quarter was played closer to the vest and saw only two goals scored, both by the Terps - sort of. Junior All-American Dan Groot scored the period's first goal at the 6:12 mark. Groot fired a shot on the run from the right wing that appeared to be headed wide, but it hit Denver defender Dillon Roy and deflected into an open Pioneer net. That goal gave the Terps their first lead of the game.

Maryland's second goal of the third came off of one of Denver's 29 turnovers on the day. After a failed clear by the Pioneers, Terrapin sophomore long-pole Brian Farrell picked up the ball and rushed into the Denver zone. As the defense collapsed he flicked a pass to Young, who was laced a shot past Konkel for a 7-5 Maryland lead.

The Terps' scoring run continued in the fourth quarter only this time it wasn't the man-up unit doing the damage it was the man-down group that put up a goal. After Jeff Reynolds was called for a delay of game penalty, Farrell picked off a pass by Denver's Cliff Smith and connected on an outlet pass to Cinosky for the clear attempt. Cinosky advanced the ball into the Maryland attack zone, but none of the Pioneer defenders stepped out to stop him, so Cinosky gave the ball a quick cradle and laced a shot from 10 yards out for his first career goal.

The run finished with Catalino's second score of the day and the play was started with another Pioneer turnover caused by Cinosky. Groot picked up the assist on the goal by dodging down the left alley, drawing a pair of Denver defenders. That left Catalino wide open along the right goal-line extended and he beat Konkel one-on-one to give Maryland a 9-5 lead with 10:31 left in the game.

Denver, which had outscored its opponents by 21 goals in the fourth quarter during the season, refused to give in and got goals from Charley Dickenson and Ilija Gajic to bring the Pioneers to within a pair of goals at 9-7.

But with just over four minutes remaining the Pioneers started pressing on the defensive end, including double-teaming the ball with their goalie. That left an open net for the Terps and senior Drew Evans was able to split the double and score an empty-netter with 1:01 left to close the scoring and send Maryland into the quarterfinals with the 10-7 win.

Sophomore goalie Brian Phipps played the final 30:00 for the Terps in goal and made six saves while allowing just two goals. Redshirt junior Jason Carter made three saves in the first half for Maryland. Overall 10 Terps combined to force 21 of Denver's 29 turnovers. Farrell caused a career-best four, while senior Ryne Adolph and Reynolds tied their career-highs with three apiece.
