## MEMORABLE SEASON CAPPED BY FINAL FOUR RUN.

### LACROSSE HANDS OUT TEAM AWARDS

The Maryland men's lacrosse team and head coach Dave Cottle welcomed back the 2006 seniors that led the Terps to back-to-back NCAA Final Fours, on Sunday, October 15, for the annual awards banquet at Heritage Hall in the Comcast Center on the campus of the University of Maryland.

The highlight of the afternoon's awards was the presentation of the "Big Man" Award, given in honor of former coach Dick Edell. The award was created to honor the player that best exemplified the selfless and positive qualities of the retired coach. The 2006 award was given to Brendan Healy.

The Daniel Slafkosky Coach's Award was also given out, in memory of assistant coach Dave Slafkosky's son, who passed away prior to the 2001 season. The coaches chose this year's recipient, defensive midfielder Ryan Lang, as the player who best illustrated Dan's positive attitude on and off the field.

The Edwin Powell Award, which is presented to the Team MVP, was given to Xander Ritz, who scored numerous big goals for the Terps throughout the season, including the game-winner in overtime over then No. 1 Duke in Durham, N.C.

### TERPS MAKE FINAL FOUR FOR THIRD TIME IN FOUR SEASONS, FINISH WITH 12 WINS

- Maryland returned to the NCAA Semifinals for the third time in four years, and finished the 2006 season with a 12-5 record and a No. 4 ranking in the USILA and *Inside Lacrosse* polls.
- Despite dropping an 8-5 decision to UMass in the NCAA semifinals, the 2006 Terps showed tremendous heart, determination and perseverance throughout the season. Maryland defeated seven nationally ranked teams, including then-No. 1 Duke, and held the No. 1 ranking for two weeks in March.
- The 2006 Terrapins will also be remembered for its dominating 11-4 victory at sixth-ranked Johns Hopkins on April 15. That win was the first for a Maryland team at Homewood Field since 1996.
- 1996 was also the last time before this season that the Terps earned the No. 2 seed in the NCAA Tournament. Maryland earned that honor by finishing the regular season with a 10-4 records against the nation's toughest schedule.

### WALTERS WINS TURNBULL AWARD AS NATION'S TOP ATTACKMAN

- Senior All-American Joe Walters added one more honor to his lengthy list of accomplishments as a Terrapin at the USILA All-America Banquet on Sunday, May 28, when he was awarded the 2006 Lt. Col. J.J. Turnbull Award as the nation's top attackman.
- Walters is the first Terrapin player to take home the Turnbull Award since 1991 when Mark Douglas won the award. Walters is the eighth Terp overall to win attackman of the year.

### SEVEN TERPS EARN ALL-AMERICA HONORS

- Seniors Bill McGlone and Joe Walters were named to the USILA All-America first team for the second time in their careers as the teams were announced Saturday, May 27, before the NCAA Final Four began at Lincoln Financial Field in Philadelphia. McGlone was the only member of the 2005 first team to repeat as a first-teamer in 2006.
- A total of seven Terps were honored by the USILA, bringing Maryland's four-year total to 29. Junior defender Steve Whittenberg was named to the second team, while fellow junior defender Ray Megill earned third team recognition. Senior attackman Xander Ritz, senior midfielder Brendan Healy and junior goalie Harry Alford were honorable mention selections.

### WALTERS SELECTED NO. 1 IN MLL DRAFT

- Joe Walters was selected as the No. 1 overall pick in the 2006 Major League Lacrosse Collegiate Draft Wednesday night in Fairfield, Conn. Walters, a Rochester, N.Y., native, was selected by his hometown team, the Rochester Rattlers.
- Walters was the first of four Terps to be selected in the first 27 picks. Bill McGlone was also a first-round pick, going to the Baltimore Bayhawks with the fifth selection. The Bayhawks also selected Brendan Healy in the second round with the 12th overall pick. Xander Ritz was the final Terp selected, going to his hometown Philadelphia Barrage in round three with the 27th overall pick.

### THE CLASS OF 2006

- Ten players finished their Terrapin careers in 2006: Brent Hargest, Michael Hartofilis, Brendan Healy, Ryan Lang, Bill McGlone, Teddy Murphy, Xander Ritz, Scott Slosson, David Tamberrino and Joe Walters.
- During their four-year careers Maryland compiled an overall record of 48-18 (.727). The 48 wins marks the most for any four-year span in the 81-year history of Maryland men's lacrosse.
- Maryland made four NCAA Tournament appearances, advancing to the Final Four three times. In the past four seasons the Terps also won two ACC Tournament titles (2004 & 2005) and also advanced to the 2006 championship game.

### SUPER SENIORS

- Maryland's foursome of Super Seniors - Joe Walters, Xander Ritz, Bill McGlone and Brendan Healy - could be the most productive group of seniors to ever come through College Park. While Walters' exploits (227 points on 153 goals and 74 assists) are well known and widely reported, the other three have put up some lofty numbers of their own.
- With his three-point game vs. Virginia in the ACC finals, McGlone eclipsed the 100-point mark for his career and finished with 107 points on 77 goals and 30 assists.
- Ritz reached the 100-point milestone for his Maryland career (100 points on 56 goals and 44 assists) with three goals and an assist vs. UNC in the ACC semifinals. He ended with 110 points as a Terp. His career totals are 80 goals and 70 assists for 150 points, including his freshman season at Delaware.
- Healy struggled at times, but turned things around at just the right time, helping lead the Terps going into the NCAA Tournament. He led all scorers with five goals and three assists in the ACC tournament. He followed that up with a hat trick vs. Penn, a five-point game vs. Denver in the first round of the NCAA Tournament and another hat trick vs. Princeton in the NCAA Quarterfinals. Healy finished his Maryland career with 88 points on 60 goals and 28 assists.
- Combined the quartet scored 370 goals and added 202 assists for 572 points.

### WALTERS IS FIRST TERP TO BE NAMED A FINALIST FOR THE TEWAARATON TROPHY

- Senior attackman Joe Walters was named one of five finalists for the Tewaaraton Trophy, which is awarded to the nation's top college lacrosse player, the Tewaaraton Award Foundation announced on May 16. Walters is the first Terrapin to be named a finalist for the prestigious honor.
- Senior midfielder/attackman Xander Ritz, who was one of three players added to the list on March 27 as a midseason addition to the watch list, was among the 25 on the official nominee list, but was not named a finalist.
- Senior Bill McGlone and junior Harry Alford were on the preseason "Watch List," but did not make the official nominee list.

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Xander and Max Ritz combined to score eight of the Terps' 10 goals to lead the third-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to a 10-4 win over No. 7 Georgetown at the Hoyas' Multi-Sport Field in Washington, D.C., Saturday afternoon.

The game, which proved to be an extremely physical contest that saw a combined 16 penalties called, started slowly in the first quarter and Georgetown was able to take a 2-1 lead into the second period following Andrew Baird's goal with 13 seconds left in the quarter. But that would be the last Hoya goal until the fourth quarter as the Maryland defensive unit shutdown the Hoya offense, holding Georgetown without a goal for 38:05.

The Terps didn't waste any time getting on the scoreboard in the second quarter. Max Ritz, a sophomore from Radnor, Pa., scored his second goal of the game less than three minutes into the quarter to knot the score at 2-2. Senior midfielder Michael Hartofilis scored his first goal of the season to give Maryland its first lead of the game at the 9:46 mark of the second period. The Terrapins would take a 4-2 lead into halftime when junior attackman Michael Phipps found senior All-American Bill McGlone in front of the crease and McGlone buried a shot past Hoya goalkeeper Miles Kass, who was making his first career start.

While the Maryland defense was shutting down the Hoya offense in the third period, the Terrapin offense was clicking on all cylinders. Xander Ritz scored four times in the third quarter, including a natural hat trick of three man-up goals.

The Terps, who were up 9-2 at the start of the fourth quarter, capped their scoring at 11:24 in the fourth on Max Ritz's career-best fourth goal of the game. The Hoyas scored two late goals to finish the game at 10-4.

Defensively Maryland was led by junior All-America goalie Harry Alford, who allowed only the four goals while making 14 saves. Junior defensive midfielder Ryan Clarke picked up a game-high six groundballs and caused three Hoya turnovers.

DURHAM, N.C. - The showdown between No. 1 Duke and No. 2 Maryland lived up to the hype as the Terrapins downed the Blue Devils, 8-7 in overtime on senior midfielder Xander Ritz's game winner with 2:46 remaining in the overtime period.

The first quarter saw the Blue Devils start out quickly, jumping out to a 1-0 lead just two minutes into the game when Matt Zash took a feed from Reade Seligmann and beat Terp goalie Harry Alford. The two teams traded possession and Alford and Duke goalie Dan Loftus, who finished with 20 saves, made several top-notch saves.

The Blue Devils committed the first penalty of the game with a holding call at 2:35. The Terps failed to capitalize on the penalty, but Ritz scored the tying goal just after the penalty was released. Duke would take a 2-1 lead into the second quarter on a Kyle Dowd goal with just 21 seconds left in the opening quarter.

The second quarter opened with Ritz scoring his second unassisted goal of the game with just 33 seconds elapsed. After scoring Maryland's first two goals, Ritz would pick up an assist on the Terps' third goal of the game, finding an open Dan Groot, who fired a shot past Loftus for his first collegiate goal and a 3-2 Terrapin lead. Ritz scored his third of the game with the Terps holding a two-man advantage at the 11:04 mark off an assist from Joe Walters.

The two teams ratcheted up the intensity over the next eight minutes with both team being assessed penalties. The Blue Devils pulled to within a goal at the 3:41 mark when Bret Thompson scored off an assist from Matt Danowski.

Maryland took a 4-3 lead into the third quarter, but Dowd scored his second goal of the game to tie the score at 4-4. Dowd's goal came at 12:01 with a man-advantage after Maryland's Bill McGlone was assessed a 30-second holding penalty. The Terps answered with a man-up goal of their own to regain a one-goal lead at the 6:17 mark. Walters laced a cross-crease pass to Ritz, who scored his fourth goal of the game.

The Terrapins continued to capitalize on Duke penalties to take a 6-4 lead with just under five minutes to go in the third quarter. Ritz fired a pass to McGlone, who dodged his defender and bounced a shot past Loftus for the two-goal Maryland lead. The Blue Devils came right back with a man-up goal from Matt Zash off an assist from Peter Lamade to make the score 6-5. Duke's Zack Greer scored less than two minutes later to knot the game at 6-6.

Danowski gave the Blue Devil's their first lead of the half at 14:24 of fourth quarter when he skipped a shot past Alford for a 7-6 Duke lead.

After an impressive display of stick skill by Walters to retain a Maryland possession, the Blue Devils called for a stick check at 10:33. Walters' stick proved to be legal and he responded two minutes later by scoring his first goal of the season to tie the score at 7-7. The game remained that way through the fourth quarter setting up Ritz's heroics.

The Blue Devils never had possession of the ball in the extra session as Maryland senior face-off specialist David Tamberrino won his 10th draw of the game to give the Terps the final possession. Tamberrino finished the game with 10 wins in 18 face-offs, helping Maryland control the tempo of the game and keeping the ball away from Duke's offense.

Defensively, the Terps were led by Alford, who made 12 saves and picked-up a team high four groundballs. Junior Jimmy Borell also picked up four groundballs, while junior Ryan Clarke and sophomore Joe Cinosky each caused two turnovers.

COLLEGE PARK, MD. - All-American Brendan Healy tallied his fourth career hat trick, including scoring the game-winning goal, to lead the No. 1-ranked Maryland men's lacrosse team to a 9-6 victory over No. 15 Towson Saturday afternoon at Byrd Stadium.

The Terps controlled the first half of play and dominated the Tigers in Maryland's defensive zone, but only took a 4-0 lead into the second half.

All-American Joe Walters opened the scoring for the Terps off an assist from Michael Phipps at the 9:41 mark. Maryland looked to be taking a 1-0 lead into the second period, but freshman midfielder Dan Groot laced a shot past Towson goalie Mark DeGroat with just eight seconds left for a 2-0 Terrapin lead.

The second quarter was scoreless for both teams until Healy took a pass from Xander Ritz and beat DeGroat for his first goal of the season with 3:35 remaining. Walters scored his second goal of the game off an assist from Max Ritz less than a minute later to give the Terps their 4-0 halftime lead.

The third quarter started slowly, but the Tigers were woken up with seven and a half minutes gone in the period then Steve Mull found an open Bobby Griebie, who slipped the ball past Maryland goalie Harry Alford for Towson's first goal of the game. Tiger attackman Kyle Fiat scored the first of his two goals less than two minutes later to cut the Terrapin lead in half at 4-2.

Maryland responded with a man-up goal by Bill McGlone off an assist from Walters to up its lead to 5-2, but the Tigers responded with three unanswered goals, including Griebie's second of the game as the third quarter clock hit 0:00, to knot the game at 5-5 heading into the fourth quarter.

In the final quarter the Tigers seemed to have momentum in their favor, but Alford made a fantastic save at 12:18, robbing Griebie of his third goal of the game. Griebie, who slipped through the Terrapin defense and was on-on-one with Alford, made two fakes before taking a shot high, but Alford stayed with the Tiger attackman and made the save to swing the momentum back in the Terps' favor.

Ritz gave Maryland a 6-5 lead less than two minutes after Alford's save when he took advantage of a mismatch with Tiger offensive midfielder Nick Williams and banged home a shot past DeGroat. That set the stage for Healy, who scored two unassisted goals less than three minutes apart for an 8-5 Terps' lead.

It seemed Towson had one more run in it when midfielder Brian Vetter scored a man-up goal off an assist from Mull at the 4:15 mark to pull the Tigers to within a pair of goals at 8-6.

Alford stepped up and made another big save at 3:08 to squelch any hope of Towson building momentum in the game's final minutes. The Terps easily cleared the ball into the Tiger defensive zone where Walters scored his third goal to put the game out of reach at 9-6.

Maryland dominated possession all afternoon, with David Tamberrino winning 10-of-18 face-offs and the Terrapin defense forcing 24 Towson turnovers. Long-pole defensive midfielders Ryan Clarke and Charlie Wiggins combined to pick-up eight groundballs and force three Tiger turnovers. Alford finished the game with 12 saves and led the Terps with five groundballs. All-America defenseman Steve Whittenberg caused a career-high five turnovers to go along with four groundballs. Overall, Maryland won the groundball battle 40-21.

Maryland jumped out to a 1-0 lead less than 10 minutes into the first quarter when All-American Joe Walters laced a shot past Bison goalie Matt Baran, but that would be the last lead of the game for the Terps as Bucknell scored twice in the final five minutes of the quarter to take a 2-1 lead.

That pattern would repeat itself two more times as Maryland scored the opening goal in both the second and third quarters only to see Bucknell answer back with two of its own to take a 6-3 lead heading into the fourth quarter.

In the fourth it was Maryland's seniors that stepped up and took control of the game on the offensive end, leading the comeback to erase Bucknell's three-goal advantage, while the defense shutdown a deliberate Bison offense. Brendan Healy started the rally for the Terps with a man-up goal, his second score of the game, at the 11:39 mark. It was then Maryland's defense's time to rise to the occasion.

Baran stopped back-to-back shots from Walters and Healy, giving Bucknell a clear attempt at the 9:12 mark. CATONSVILLE, MD. - The senior trio of Bill McGlone, Xander Ritz and Joe Walters combined for eight of Maryland's nine goals to lead the No. 1-ranked Terps past UMBC, 9-4, at UMBC Stadium on a cold, windy Saturday afternoon.

Maryland was only up one heading into the fourth quarter, but the defense shutout the upset-minded Retrievers in the final period and the offense scored four goals to give the Terps their fourth victory of the season.

McGlone drew first blood in the opening period with his fifth goal of the season at the 4:54 mark. The senior All-American dodged his defender and raced through the UMBC crease and beat Retriever goalie Jeremy Blevins on his left side for a 1-0 Terrapin lead. UMBC tied the game less than two minutes later on an unassisted goal by junior attackman Drew Westervelt.

The Retrievers took their first lead of the game at 13:41 of the second quarter on an unassisted goal from James Hyland, who dodged to the left and fired a shot past Maryland goalie Harry Alford from the left wing.

Walters scored his second of the game with just under five minutes remaining to give Maryland its biggest lead of the game at 7-4. Xander Ritz put the game out of reach just over a minute later with his third goal of the game off an assist from McGlone. Walters added an empty-net goal to cap the scoring at 9-4.

Defensively for the Terps, junior All-American Steve Whittenberg turned in another outstanding performance, shutting out UMBC senior attackman Brendan Mundorf, who entered the game with 146 career points. Whittenberg finished with three caused turnovers and two groundballs. Sophomores Jacob Baxter and Jeff Reynolds each set career highs with two caused turnovers apiece. UMBC's scoreless fourth quarter was the sixth time this season that Maryland has held an opponent scoreless in a quarter.

Maryland (5-1) scored seven goals in the first quarter to put the game out of reach in the first 15 minutes of play. What is even more impressive is that the Terps outshot the Big Green 15-0 in the quarter. The Maryland defense did not allow a Dartmouth shot until 6:56 in the second quarter and the Big Green did not get a shot on goal until 3:13 during an extra-man opportunity.

All-American midfielder Bill McGlone started the scoring parade with 12:18 remaining in the quarter off an assist from senior All-American Joe Walters. Sophomore middle Will Dalton scored his first goal of the season just over a minute later for a 2-0 Terp advantage.

Walters scored his first of four goals on the day at the 9:29 mark, but the most amazing score of the game came at 7:46 when sophomore defenseman Joe Cinosky caused a Dartmouth turnover in the Big Green's attack zone and raced the length of the field and fired a high shot past Dartmouth goalie Pat Marshall for his first collegiate goal.

Senior captain Xander Ritz scored the next two Terrapin goals with both coming off assists from younger brother Max. It appeared Maryland would take a 6-0 lead into the second quarter, but Walters fired a low shot with one second remaining that beat Marshall for the Terps' seventh goal of the period.

The second quarter was more of the same for Maryland as Walters scored twice more and assisted on goals by McGlone and Xander Ritz, who assisted both of Walters' goals in the period.

With an 11-0 lead at the half, the Terps were able to get their reserves some valuable playing time in the third and fourth quarters.

Junior midfielder Travis Holmes, who has primarily seen time as a defensive midfielder, scored his first goal of the season at the 2:23 mark of the third off an assist from freshman Danny Gallagher.

Gallagher followed up his first collegiate point with his first collegiate goal in the fourth quarter off an assist from junior Michael Phipps just 50 seconds into the period.

Dartmouth got on the board with a goal from Bread Heritage at the 6:28 mark, but Maryland responded with its first man-down goal of the season on freshman Scott Tompkins' first collegiate goal with an assist by sophomore midfielder Drew Evans.

The Big Green's Brian Koch closed out the scoring with 3:55 remaining with an unassisted goal.

One of the main reasons for Maryland's dominance was the performance of its face-off men. After winning just four of 16 face-offs last Saturday at UMBC, the Terps won 17 of 20 at the X, including 12 wins in 13 draws by senior David Tamberrino. Junior Thomas Alford had his best outing of the season facing-off, winning five of seven attempts.

Defensively for the Terps, it was another tremendous display of both individual and team defense. Junior All-American Steve Whittenberg, who shutout Nick Bonacci, Dartmouth's leading scorer, finished the game with two groundballs and one caused turnover. In addition to scoring a goal, Cinosky also caused three Big Green turnovers and picked up a groundball. The third member of Maryland's starting defense, All-American Ray Megill, also had an outstanding game with three caused turnovers and three groundballs.

Overall, Maryland's defense held the Big Green without a goal for 53:32 and shut them out for three quarters raising its season total of scoreless quarters to nine. The last time a Terrapin team gave up just two goals in a game was April 3, 2004, an 11-2 win over Virginia in College Park.

Junior All-American goalie Harry Alford was only forced to make two saves in 30 minutes of action, while sophomore goalie Jason Carter saw the most extensive playing time of his career, making five saves in just over 20 minutes of work.

The game was all Navy during the first 30 minutes of play as the Midshipmen bottled up the Maryland offense and were leading 5-1 at the half. Senior All-American Joe Walters scored the lone Terrapin goal in the first half of play, converting an extra-man opportunity off an assist from sophomore Max Ritz.



Maryland came out at the start of the third quarter with renewed energy and it showed just 23 seconds into the period when Walters found an open Xander Ritz on the right side of the crease. Ritz buried a shot past Navy All-America goalie Matt Russell to score the Terps' second man-up goal of the game.

Senior All-American Bill McGlone pulled Maryland to within two goals just over 30 seconds later with his only goal of the game and the comeback seemed to be on. But Navy settled down and built the lead back to three goals on Terrence Higgins' second goal of the season at the 5:48 mark.

The Terps would cut the lead back to one on goals from freshman Dan Groot and Max Ritz and looked to complete the comeback with 12:22 left in the game, but Russell would not let Navy fall apart. With momentum on the Terps' side, Russell made two big saves on Walters and Xander Ritz to maintain the one-goal advantage.

That lead held up until the 3:22 mark when Walters took a feed from Brendan Healy and laced a shot past Russell to tie the game at 6-6. The play started with junior Ray Megill stripping Steve Looney of the ball in the Terrapin defensive zone and starting the clear that led to Walters' second goal of the game.

It looked as if the Terps would take the lead for the first time in the game on the ensuing face-off. Senior David Tamberrino won his 11th draw of the game to give Maryland possession of the ball with the clock winding down. But the Terps never got another shot off. The Mids caused a Maryland turnover with 1:16 left in the game and cleared the ball, setting up Dingman's game-winner.

The loss was the second-straight heartbreaker in the series for the Terps. Last season in Annapolis, Graham Gill scored with 14 seconds left in the game to give Navy a 9-8 win.

Defensively for Maryland, sophomore Jason Carter made seven saves after replacing starter Harry Alford midway through the first quarter. Megill finished the game with a career-best four caused turnovers in addition to two groundballs. Tamberrino finished with a game-high seven groundballs.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. - Joe Walters was determined to beat Johns Hopkins before his time at the University of Maryland was finished. The Tewaaron Trophy nominee put the No. 7 Terrapin men's lacrosse team on his shoulders by scoring six goals and dishing out two assists to lead the Terps to an impressive 11-4 victory over the sixth-ranked Blue Jays in front of 9,778 fans at Homewood Field on Saturday night.

Walters showed why he was selected to be on Team USA this summer at the ILF World Games by dominating the Blue Jay defense. The senior from Rochester, N.Y., scored in every quarter, including two man-up goals. The eight-point game set a new career-best for Walters and is the first eight-point game by a Terp since 2002 when Mike LaMonica scored six goals and added two assists at UMBC.

The win ended a 10 years of frustration for Maryland at Homewood Field and is Maryland's first in the series since 2001. The victory also marked the first time the Terps have defeated Hopkins since Dave Cottle took over as head coach in 2002.

The first quarter was a good one for the Terps and it began with an unlikely source. Just over five minutes into the game junior midfielder Travis Holmes took a pass from Walters on the right wing and bounced a shot past Hopkins goalie Jesse Schwartzman for a 1-0 Terp lead. Walters stretched that advantage to 2-0 with his first goal of the evening, converting a man-up opportunity by lacing a shot past Schwartzman to the top left corner of the goal.

The Terps essentially put the game away in the second quarter with four goals, two from Walters and one each for senior midfielders Xander Ritz and Bill McGlone. Hopkins started the quarter with a man-up goal by Tom Duerr to cut the lead to 2-1. The Blue Jays got the man-advantage when Walters was assessed a 30-second illegal procedure penalty for throwing teammate David Tamberrino's stick to the sidelines after Tamberrino lost his stick in a pile-up.

That may have been the spark that got Walters to another level as he returned to the game after Duerr's goal and scored his second goal of the game 50 seconds later. He isolated his defender behind the Hopkins goal and raced around the cage and fired a low shot from the right side of the net.

Ritz got Walters his second assist of the game and gave the Terps a 4-1 lead with 7:06 left in the second quarter by ripping a shot into the top left corner of the net from the lower right wing.

Walters picked up the game winner with 6:05 in the second quarter on his second man-up goal of the game. Max Ritz picked up his eighth assist of the season by sending a pass to Walters 14 yards out in front of the Hopkins goal. The three-time All-American wound up and ripped a shot past Schwartzman for a 5-1 Maryland lead.

The Blue Jays scored their second goal of the game with 2:21 in the second and seemed to be building some momentum heading into halftime, but McGlone scored his first of two goals with 15 seconds left before the break to shift the advantage back to the Terps and send them into the locker room with a 6-2 lead.

McGlone, a first team All-American in 2005, started the third quarter the way he finished the second, scoring a goal for the Terps and helping keep Hopkins on its heels. The Ridley, Pa., native, took a pass from junior attackman Michael Phipps on the right wing and sent a low shot from around his ankles that beat Schwartzman for a 7-2 lead.

Hopkins got a glimmer of hope when midfielder Stephen Pysler returned from injury to score his first goal of the season at the 11:04 mark of the third. But that glimmer was short-lived as Walters scored his fourth goal of the game to extend Maryland's lead back to five at 8-3.

The fourth quarter was all Maryland and the Terps jumped out quick again as senior All-American Brendan Healy scored his first goal in five games for a 9-3 Terrapin lead. The Great Falls, Va., native, scored unassisted on a bounce-shot when he dodged past his defender on the left wing and fired a shot from seven yards out.

Hopkins tried to make something happen and pulled Schwartzman out of the net to double the ball on Maryland's next possession. But that plan back-fired when the ball got into Walters' hands. He fought through four defenders and slipped an easy empty-net goal for his fifth of the game.

Walters capped the scoring for the Terps by tying his career-high with his sixth goal of the game at the 6:24 mark. Sophomore midfielder Drew Evans picked up his second assist of the game by passing the ball to Walters in front of the Hopkins net and in a shot very similar to his third goal of the game, Walters ripped a shot from 14 yards for an 1-3 Terrapin lead.

Junior All-American Harry Alford rebounded from a pair of disappointing performances the past two weeks to have a tremendous showing vs. the Blue Jays. Alford made nine saves, picked up two groundballs and allowed only four goals in more than 57 minutes of action.

Other defensive standouts for the Terps include junior All-American Ray Megill who caused three Hopkins' turnovers and picked up a career-high five groundballs. All-American Steve Whittenberg caused two turnovers and picked up four groundballs. Maryland's third starting defenseman, sophomore Joe Cinosky, finished the game with a career-best four groundballs.

COLLEGE PARK, MD. - A dozen Terps scored goals in the fourth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team's 18-2 victory over Sacred Heart Tuesday afternoon in Byrd Stadium.

Leading the way for the Terrapins was senior Tewaaron Trophy nominee Joe Walters, who is closing in on the school's all-time points and goals scored records. The three-time All-American scored three goals and added an assist to bring his career totals to 145 goals and 211 points, leaving him five goals and nine points away from the school records.

All seven of Maryland's offensive starters scored at least one goal. Seniors Bill McGlone and Xander Ritz and sophomore Max Ritz each scored twice and added assists, while junior Michael Phipps had a goal and an assist. Senior All-American Brendan Healy also chipped in a goal.

The Terrapins' starting defense unit, which dominated Johns Hopkins last Saturday, turned in a workman-like performance. Junior All-America goalie Harry Alford had to make only three saves in 30 minutes of work. The starting defense of Joe Cinosky, Ray Megill and Steve Whittenberg held the Pioneers scoreless for the first two quarters and allowed only five Sacred Heart shots.

Maryland (8-3/2-1 ACC) got seven goals from its reserves with freshman attackman Scott Tompkins leading the way with two goals for the first multi-goal game of his college career.

The Terps got two goals from their second midfield as junior Travis Holmes scored for the second-straight game and freshman Dan Groot tallied his fourth goal of the season. Sophomore middle Drew Evans also played on the second unit and picked up his third assist in the last two games.

The third midfield unit also chipped in with three points on senior Michael Hartofilis second goal of the season. Thomas Alford scored his first of the year and senior Brent Hargest picked up his first career assist.

Capping off the scoring for Maryland was junior attackman Jon Beard. The 2005 JUCO player of the year scored his first goal as a Terp with just over a minute left in the fourth quarter off an assist from junior Jay Feeley, the second of his career.

A trio of defensive players even got into the scoring column for the Terps. Junior long-pole Ryan Clarke notched his third assist of the season, while sophomores Jacob Baxter and Ryne Adolph each collected their first career assists.

The catalyst for Maryland was an outstanding effort by its face-off men, who won 15 of 24 at the X. Senior face-off specialist David Tamberrino won 10 of 13 draws in a little over a half of work. He is now just 10 wins away from 250 for his career. Sophomore Will Dalton also had a good day facing-off, winning three out of five.

For the game, Maryland outshot the Pioneers 53-21 and was just as dominating on the ground, picking up 36 groundballs to Sacred Heart's 25. McGlone led the groundball-effort with four, while sophomore long-pole Charlier Wiggins and Tamberrino each had three.

The Pioneers (2-10/2-3 CAA) got back-to-back goals from Peter Greco and Kevin Walker in the third quarter for their only two scores of the game.

Senior All-American Brendan Healy led all scorers with a career-high five points on three goals and two assists, setting a career high with five points. Xander Ritz, who earned All-ACC honors this season, scored two of his three goals, including the game winner, in the final eight minutes of play.

Sophomore attackman Michael Phipps dished out three assists, including the feed to Ritz for the game-winner, in the come-from-behind victory.

North Carolina controlled the early going jumping out to a 4-0 lead in the first quarter on goals from Ben Hunt, Andrew McEluff, Nick Tintle and Michael Burns. Ritz got Maryland on the scoreboard early in the second period on a man-up goal, but UNC tacked on a pair of goals to take a 6-1 lead into the half.

The Terps got things going in the second half with a huge third quarter, outscoring the Tar Heels 6-1 to pull the game even at 7-7. Max Ritz opened the scoring for the Terrapins in the second half with a goal just 49 seconds into the period. Healy then continued the charge with three-straight goals midway through the quarter. All-American Bill McGlone and ACC Player of the Year Joe Walters each added scores for the Terps. Carolina's lone goal came from Hunt on a man-up opportunity.

With its five-goal cushion erased and all of the game's momentum in Maryland's favor, Carolina regained control of the game at the start of the fourth quarter with back-to-back goals by Ben Staines and Drew Habeck to pull out to a 9-7 lead.

Xander Ritz pulled the Terps to within a goal at the 8:08 mark of the fourth when Tar Heel goalie Grant Zimmerman saved a hard shot by McGlone but could not control the rebound. Ritz pounced on the groundball and quickly fired a shot over Zimmerman's left shoulder into the top corner of the net.

McGlone tied the game for Maryland with four and a half minutes left off Healy's second assist of the game, setting the stage for Ritz's third game-winning shot of the season.

The play started for the Terps at 2:53 when All-America defender Steve Whittenberg caused his third UNC turnover of the game and picked up a groundball to help clear the ball into Maryland's offensive zone. Walters appeared to give the Terrapins the lead when he beat Zimmerman with a high, hard shot from the right wing, but the ball clipped the crossbar preserving the Carolina lead. Phipps picked up the tough groundball in traffic to keep the possession with the Terps and head coach Dave Cottle called a timeout to settle his team and setup the ensuing possession.

That possession started with the ball finding Walters, who drew an immediate double-team from the Carolina defense. The Tewaaron Trophy nominee drew the defenders out a step further before sending a pass to Phipps on the right side of the crease. Phipps looked across the goal mouth and laced a pass to a wide-open Ritz, who beat Zimmerman to send Maryland to the ACC Championship game.

Defensively for Maryland, All-America goalie Harry Alford tied his season high with 14 saves, while All-ACC defenders Whittenberg and Ray Megill combined for four groundballs and four caused turnovers. Ritz picked up a game-high six groundballs and junior defensive midfielder Jimmy Borell set his career best with five pick-ups.

BALTIMORE, Md. - The top-ranked Virginia Cavaliers ended the third-ranked Maryland men's lacrosse team's two-year reign as ACC champions with an 11-5 victory Sunday afternoon in front of 5,739 at M&T Bank Stadium.

The Terps were led by senior All-Americans Brendan Healy and Bill McGlone, who were each selected to the all-tournament team. Healy followed up his five-point performance in Friday night's semifinal with a two-goal, one-assist outing vs. the Cavaliers. McGlone's weekend total rose to seven with two goals and an assist after scoring twice and adding two assists on Friday vs. North Carolina.

Junior goalie Harry Alford was also selected to the all-tournament team. The All-American from Washington, D.C., made 11 saves vs. Virginia, bringing his tournament total to 25.

The Cavaliers, who raced out to six unanswered goals in the first meeting between the two teams, scored the game's first two goals in the first four minutes, but Maryland's defense played tough and settled things down before Virginia could get into rhythm. McGlone scored his first goal of the game at the 2:47 mark of the first quarter to close the gap to 2-1, but the Cavaliers' Matt Ward scored his first of two on the day with eight seconds left on the clock for a 3-1 Wahoo advantage.

The second period started slow with several turnovers by both teams before Virginia scored its fourth goal of the game by Steve Giannone at 7:09 on the clock. Maryland answered back a minute and a half later with Healy's first goal of the game coming off an assist by McGlone. The Cavaliers tacked on another for a 5-2 lead less than a minute later and looked to be building momentum.

But the Terps came right back with an unassisted goal by Healy, his fifth of the tournament, at the 3:57 mark to close the deficit to 5-3. Virginia built the lead back to three goals with Danny Gladding's unassisted goal 48 seconds later. The Wahoos looked like they would up that lead to four before the half when Maryland's Jeff Reynolds was called for a cross check penalty with 1:30 remaining, but Alford stepped up and made two big saves to help the Terps kill the penalty and go into the break just down by three.

Maryland was able to close the gap to 6-4 when junior attackman Michael Phipps scored an unassisted goal, beating Virginia goalie Kip Turner, who was a high school teammate of Phipps' at Severn. But that was as close as the Terps could get, as Virginia scored three unanswered goals in the final four minutes of the third quarter to open up a 9-4 lead.

McGlone scored off an assist from Healy less than a minute into the fourth, but the Cavaliers put the game out of reach with two more goals and a solid defensive performance.

The Terrapin defense, which held Virginia to its second lowest scoring output of the season (five goals below its season average of 16.0), was led by junior All-Americans Steve Whiteberg and Ray Megill. Whiteberg finished the game with five groundballs and a pair of caused turnovers, while Megill picked up three groundballs and caused one turnover. The third member of Maryland's close defensive unit, sophomore Joe Cinosky, caused three Virginia turnovers with one groundball.

COLLEGE PARK, MD. - With his fourth goal of the day, with 1:02 left in the third quarter, senior attackman Joe Walters became Maryland's all-time leader in goals scored with the 150th of his brilliant career. The fact that it came on "Senior Day" with family and friends in the stands cheering him on made it sweet. But the fact that it helped the fourth-ranked Maryland men's lacrosse team to a dominating 12-4 victory over No. 10 Penn was the sweetest thing for Walters.

"Senior Day" turned out to be a showcase for Maryland's high-scoring senior quartet of Walters, Bill McGlone, Brendan Healy and Xander Ritz, but in the end the day belonged to Walters. Entering the game, the two-time ACC Player of the Year was three goals behind Matt Hahn on the all-time goal scoring list with 146 to Hahn's 149.

But even with history within his grasp the Tewaaron Trophy nominee didn't press the action. He took only one shot in the first quarter. He started to get on a roll in the second period with his first goal of the day, capitalizing on a man-up situation, off an assist from junior attackman Michael Phipps at the 10:29 mark. He picked up goal No. 148 about ten minutes later. With 1:38 left on the clock, off an assist from Ritz, he laced a shot from about eight yards out past Quaker goalie Greg Klossner.



The record-tying goal for Walters came 11 minutes later, with 5:17 to go in the third. McGlone skipped a pass to the Rochester, N.Y., native, who buried a shot from five yards out.

That tandem would hook up again for the record-setting goal just four minutes later and it was vintage Walters. McGlone skipped a pass across the crease to Walters, who dropped his stick and fired a shot from near his ankles past Klossner. A moment passed as realization set in and Walters was mobbed by teammates, who congratulated him and recognized him as the most prolific scorer in the 81-year history of Maryland men's lacrosse.

But the game was not just about Walters' pursuit of the scoring record. The remainder of Maryland's senior quartet each had outstanding games in their last regular season game at Byrd Stadium.

Healy scored Maryland's first two goals to give the Terps a 2-1 lead after the first quarter. He would book-end those with the Terps' final score of the game with 2:18 left in the fourth quarter.

Ritz joined Walters and McGlone as 100-point scorers as a Terp with his two-goal, two-assist afternoon. The Wayne, Pa., native scored back-to-back goals in the second quarter, including what turned out to be the game winner with 9:58 left in the quarter.

McGlone extended his goal-scoring streak to 14 games with Maryland's first goal of the second quarter to build the Terrapin lead to 3-1. The two-time All-ACC honoree also added three assists. In addition to his assists on Walters' record-tying and record-setting goals, he also picked up an assist on Healy's second goal of the first quarter.

Ten of Maryland's 12 goals were scored by the Walters (4), Healy (3), Ritz (2) and McGlone (1). The remaining two goals came from sophomores. Max Ritz scored his 13th goal of the season with a transition tally off an assist from junior long-pole Ryan Clarke. Senior short-stick middle Ryan Lang started the play by causing a Quaker turnover and shuffling the groundball to All-ACC defenseman Steve Whittenberg. Whittenberg found Clarke with a clearing pass and Clarke raced down the middle of the Quaker defense and looked to be positioning himself for a shot, but a pair of Penn defenders converged on him. But that left Max Ritz open on the left side of the crease. Clarke found him with a quick pass and Max Ritz buried the shot past Klossner to give Maryland a 10-4 lead with 11:26 left in the fourth.

The other Terp sophomore to find the back of the Quaker net was midfielder Drew Evans. The Ithaca, N.Y., native scored his first career goal on a one-timer from five yards out on the left side of Penn's crease. Freshman midfielder Dan Groot picked up his first career assist on the play. After dodging his defender, Groot was able to avoid Penn's slider and shuffled a low pass to Evans to tally the helper.

"Senior Day" also turned out to be a showcase for senior David Tamberrino. The face-off specialist from Lutherville, Md., won eight of 11 face-offs and picked up a game-high six groundballs.

Defensively the Terps were led by its trio of close defensemen. Whittenberg, who marked Penn's leading scorer DJ Andrzejewski and held him without a point on 0-4 shooting, caused two Quaker turnovers and picked up one groundball. Sophomore Joe Cinosky totaled three groundballs on the afternoon, while All-ACC selection Ray Megill had one caused turnover and a groundball.

In goal, junior All-American Harry Alford had another steady showing, stopping nine Quaker shots and picking up two groundballs. Senior Teddy Murphy played the final 3:52 for the Terps and made one save.

In addition to Walters, McGlone, Ritz, Healy, Lang, Tamberrino and Murphy, the game also marked the final regular season home game for Brent Hargest, Michael Hartofilis and Scott Slosson.

COLLEGE PARK, MD. - The No. 2 seeded Maryland men's lacrosse team scored the game's first six goals and never looked back en route to a 16-8 win over Denver in the first round of the NCAA Tournament at Byrd Stadium.

With today's victory the Terps advance to the quarterfinals to face No. 7 seed Princeton on May 21 at Towson's Unitas Stadium. The Tigers move on following an 11-8 victory over UMBC in Princeton, N.J. Game time will be decided on Monday, May 15.

Joe Walters, the 2006 ACC Player of the Year, became Maryland's all-time leader in points with six points on the day to raise his career total to 223 points. The native of Rochester, N.Y., surpassed Bob Boniello's mark of 219 with his third assist of the day at the 12:56 mark of the third quarter. The five assists set a career high for Walters, who had previously had four assists twice in his career.

Sophomore attackman Max Ritz also totaled six points on the day with a career-high five goals and one assist. He started the Terrapin scoring run in the first quarter with an unassisted goal from the left side

of the Pioneer goal crease. The Wayne, Pa., native scored one more in the first and assisted on Bill McGlone's second quarter goal, the eventual game winner, to finish the first half with three points.

He opened the scoring for the Terps again in the third, getting the goal on Walters' record-setting assist. Ritz picked up the goal after inadvertently tipping a Walters' shot from the right wing, past the right shoulder of Denver goalie Austin Konkel and into the Pioneer net. Ritz scored twice more in the fourth, including Maryland's final goal off an assist from Brendan Healy.

Healy, a two-time All-American, continued his hot scoring streak with a five-point game on three goals and a pair of assists. The Great Falls, Va., native scored a goal in each of the first three quarters and added assists on Xander Ritz's second goal of the game and Max Ritz's fifth goal.


Xander Ritz scored his 11th career hat trick on three of five shooting. The All-ACC midfielder also was a force off the ball, picking up two groundballs and forcing two caused turnovers.

McGlone scored twice, including the game-winner in the second quarter to extend his goal scoring streak to 15 games.

The other two Terrapin goals came from unlikely sources as short-stick defensive midfielder Jimmy Borell scored his first goal of the season on a fast break at 8:24 in the second quarter to extend Maryland's lead to 9-2. Sophomore midfielder Drew Evans scored Maryland's fourth goal of the game in the first quarter on an assist from Walters.

The Terrapin defense was led by a pair of junior All-Americans. Steve Whittenberg tied his career high with five groundballs and causing five Pioneer turnovers, while Ray Megill caused three turnovers and picked up three groundballs. The third member of Maryland's starting close defense, sophomore Joe Cinosky, also chipped in with three groundballs. Reserve defenseman Jacob Baxter also made an impact, tying his career high with three caused turnovers.

Maryland also got a spark from sophomore face-off man Will Dalton, who won 12 of 22 face-offs against Denver's Geoff Snider, who entered the game leading the NCAA in face-off winning percentage.

**TOWSON, MD.** - The second seeded University of Maryland men's lacrosse team returns to the NCAA Final Four for the third time in the past four seasons after defeating No. 7 seed Princeton, 11-6, in the quarterfinals Sunday afternoon in front of 7,260 at Towson's Unitas Stadium.

The Terps (12-4) used an opportunistic offense and a stingy defense to stifle the Tigers for much of the contest. Senior midfielder Brendan Healy scored his third straight hat trick to pace the Maryland offense, while junior All-America defenseman Steve Whittenberg tied his career high with six caused turnovers to lead the defense.

Maryland jumped out to a 4-0 lead in the first quarter on a pair of goals from Healy and one each from senior All-American Joe Walters and sophomore middle Drew Evans. Princeton finally got on the board with an unassisted goal from Scott Sowanick at the 4:19 mark, but junior attackman Michael Phipps scored a minute later for the Terps to take a 5-1 lead into the second quarter.

That second period saw the Tigers score four goals in 2:57 to tie the game at 5-5. But Princeton would never take the lead as Maryland settled down and took control of the game again with a goal by freshman midfielder Dan Groot at 5:42 of the second quarter. Phipps would add another Maryland goal, his second of the game and the eventual game-winner, at 3:24 to give the Terps a 7-5 halftime advantage.

The two teams battled in the third quarter with both defenses holding the opposing offense in check. Healy tallied the lone goal of the quarter at 9:58, his third of the game. Walters started the play by drawing a double team on the right side of the Tiger crease before skipping a pass to Healy, who laced a shot from 15 yards out on the right wing past Tiger keeper Alex Hewit.

The fourth quarter started well for the Terps when Princeton's Alex Haynie was penalized for illegal procedure at 13:49 to give Maryland a man-up opportunity. The Terrapins, who are second in the nation in extra-man efficiency, took a 9-5 lead when senior Xander Ritz scored his 10th man-up goal of the season off of a quick feed from Walters to the left side of the crease.

Sophomore attackman Max Ritz score Maryland's 10th goal of the game at the 7:31 mark off an assist from older brother Xander. Walters would finish off the scoring for the Terps with his second goal of the day at 3:24. Princeton's Josh Lesko scored the game's final goal with 32 seconds left, ending a 38:09 scoreless stretch for the Tigers.

In addition to Whittenberg's six caused turnovers, the Maryland defense received outstanding efforts from its other starting close defenders. Sophomore Joe Cinosky caused three turnovers and picked up three groundballs, while junior All-American Ray Megill had four groundballs and one caused turnover. In goal, All-American Harry Alford stopped eight shots, including six in the second half.

The Terps also controlled the game from the face-off circle with senior David Tamberrino winning 11 of 20 draws and picking up a game-high seven groundballs. Junior defensive midfielder Jimmy Borell was outstanding on the wing for the Terps, tying his career best with five groundballs.

The Terps will meet unseeded Massachusetts in the semifinals on Saturday, May 27, at Lincoln Financial Field. Face-off between the Minutemen and the Terrapins is scheduled for 11:30 a.m. The second semifinal will pit No. 1 seed Virginia vs. No. 5 seed Syracuse at 2 p.m.


**PHILADELPHIA, PA.** - The second seeded University of Maryland men's lacrosse team dropped a tough 8-5 decision to the University of Massachusetts in the semifinals of the NCAA Tournament Saturday afternoon at Lincoln Financial Field.

The first quarter was dominated by outstanding goalie play for both teams with junior All-American Harry Alford making six saves for Maryland and UMass' Doc Schneider stopping four Terp shots. Alford was spectacular from the get-go, making two tough saves on the Minutemen's first possession. Maryland jumped out to a 1-0 lead on senior All-American Xander Ritz's wrap-around goal at the 9:12 mark. UMass tied the game at one apiece when Jim Connolly bounced a shot past Alford about 30 seconds later.

The Minutemen took their first lead of the day with just more than five minutes remaining in the first on a Rory Pedrick behind the back shot into the top right corner of the Maryland goal. The quarter would end in a 2-2 tie after junior long-pole Ryan Clarke scored just the second goal of his career off a feed from senior Ryan Lang on a fast break. The breakaway was started by Alford, who made an amazing one-on-one save on UMass' Brian Jacovina, who was on a breakaway for the Minutemen.

The second quarter was a close-fought affair with the Minutemen scoring the lone goal of the quarter just a minute and a half into the period when senior attackman Sean Morris laced a low shot from nine yards out on the right wing for a 3-2 UMass lead. Maryland controlled the ball for much of the period, but could not get any really good looks on the Minutemen goal. The Terps' best scoring chance came at the 2:27 mark when senior All-American Joe Walters ripped a shot from the left wing that beat Schneider but hit off the right corner of the crossbar.

The third quarter belonged to the Minutemen, who scored three times and held the Terps scoreless for the second straight period to take a 6-2 advantage into the fourth quarter. Morris picked up his second goal of the game at the 8:43 mark on a low shot from 10 yards out in front of the goal. The other two UMass goals came in a five second span starting with a rebound goal by Jacovina. Alford made the save on Morris' original shot, but Jacovina was in the

Maryland got back into the game with two quick scored to start the fourth quarter. Junior attackman Michael Phipps scored his seventh of the season on an easy shot from the right side of the Minutemen goal. The ensuing face-off saw Alford make another remarkable save, robbing Connolly with a diving save.

Sophomore attackman Max Ritz pulled the Terps to within two goals at 6-4 with his 20th goal of the season at the 12:48 mark. Connolly ended Maryland's two-goal run with his second goal of the day off less than a minute after Ritz's score.

Freshman midfielder Dan Groot scored the Terrapins' final goal of the game off an assist from Max Ritz at 10:10 in the fourth. Morris capped off the scoring for the Minutemen with an unassisted goal, his third of the day, at 6:33.

Schneider made seven of his 15 saves in the fourth quarter, while Alford finished with 10 saves on the afternoon.

The game marked the end of 10 Maryland senior's careers: Brent Hargest, Michael Hartofilis, Brendan Healy, Ryan Lang, Bill McGlone, Teddy Murphy, Xander Ritz, Scott Slosson, David Tamberrino and Joe Walters.
