LACROSSE HANDS OUT TEAM AWARDS

The Maryland men's lacrosse team and head coach Dave Cottle welcomed back the 2007 seniors that helped the Terps make four-straight NCAA tournament appearances, on Sunday, October 7, for the annual awards banquet at Sprint Heritage Hall in the Comcast Center on the campus of the University of Maryland.

The highlight of the afternoon's awards was the presentation of the "Big Man" Award, given in honor of former coach Dick Edell. The award was created to honor the player that best exemplified the selfless and positive qualities of the retired coach. The 2007 award was given to short-stick defensive midfielder Jimmy Borell.

The Daniel Slafkosky Coach's Award was also given out, in memory of assistant coach Dave Slafkosky's son, who passed away prior to the 2001 season. The coaches chose this year's recipient, defender Sean Sullivan, as the player who best illustrated Dan's positive attitude on and off the field.

The Edwin Powell Award, which is presented to the Team MVP, was given to Ray Megill. The native of Clark, N.J., was a second team USILA All-American and was a nominee for the 2007 Tewaaraton Trophy, which is presented annually to the nation's top lacrosse player.

FOUR TERPS EARN ALL-AMERICA HONORS

Seniors Ray Megill and Steve Whittenberg led four Terps who were named to USILA All-America teams, which were announced during the Final Four on May 27 in Baltimore.

Defenders Megill and Whittenberg were each named to the second team, while sophomore Dan Groot was a third team honoree. Senior attackman Michael Phipps was an honorable mention selection.

Megill, a native of Clark, N.J., is now a three-time All-American and made the second team after being a third team selection in 2006. Last year the athletic defender was among the team leaders with 27 groundballs and 20 caused turnovers. He also proved to be an offensive threat in transition and finished with three goals and two assists.

Whittenberg, a native of Springfield, Va., is also a three-time All-American and made his second straight appearance on the second team. Regarded as one of the top on-ball defenders in the country he led the Terps with 32 caused turnovers in 2007 and also finished the season with 32 groundballs.

Groot, a native of Canandaigua, N.Y., earned his first All-America selection as a sophomore. He finished third on the team in goals and points with 21 and 32, respectively. Of his 21 goals, an amazing eight came on the Terps' man-up unit and Groot also tallied three game-winning goals, including the overtime winner at Navy on April 6.



Phipps, a native of Annapolis, Md., was selected after having his best season for the Terrapins as a senior. He led the team in points and goals with 50 and 28, respectively. He finished the year with a phenomenal .394 shooting percentage and picked up 37 groundballs, while averaging less than one turnover per game.

MEGILL TAKEN IN FIRST ROUND OF MLL DRAFT

All-America defender Ray Megill was selected by the Boston Cannons with the ninth pick in the first round of the 2007 Major League Lacrosse collegiate draft on May 31. Overall, four Maryland players were selected in the five-round draft.

Megill, a native of Clark, N.J., is a three-time All-American and is the third Terrapin to go in the first round of the MLL Draft in the past two years.

Another Maryland All-America defender was selected in the second round by the Chicago Machine. Steve Whittenberg was taken by the Machine with the 15th overall selection.

The other two Terrapins, goalie Harry Alford and defensive midfielder Jimmy Borell, were taken in the fifth round with picks Nos. 45 and 46, respectively. Alford was another selection by Chicago, while Borell was taken by the Los Angeles Riptide.

BRIAN PHIPPS NAMED 2007 ACC ROOKIE OF THE YEAR

Brian Phipps was named the Atlantic Coast Conference Men's Lacrosse Rookie of the Year as selected by a vote of the league's four coaches. Phipps' selection marks the sixth time that a Maryland player has been named the ACC's top freshman. Phipps, a native of Annapolis, Md., entered the 2007 season as the third-string goalie on the Terrapin roster, but was pressed into service when Maryland's other two goalies went down with injuries.

The nation's top goalie prospect, according to *Inside Lacrosse*, began his career with nine saves in the Terps' season opener and got even better from there. He turned in his finest performance of the season on March 10 at Towson. Phipps made a career-best 16 saves and helped the defense hold the Tigers scoreless for a stretch of 29:57 in the 8-7 Maryland win.

Phipps also came up big in some of the Terps' biggest games of the season. He made 15 saves in a 14-8 win over then-No. 11 North Carolina. Phipps stopped 13 shots in his return to Annapolis on April 6, helping Maryland pull out an 8-7 win in double-overtime at then-No. 7 Navy.



MISSING TIME

All athletic teams have injuries, but last season the Terps had more than their fair share. From torn ligaments to broken bones to food poisoning and everything in between, Maryland men's lacrosse student-athletes missed games at what seemed like a record pace.

Not counting the Terps' four preseason scrimmages and valuable practice time, no fewer than 17 Terps missed a total of 108 games due to injury or illness: Ryne Adolph (2 games), Harry Alford (7), Paul Andrews (1), Jimmy Borell (6), Jason Carter (16), Chris Feifs (1), Dean Hart (2), Travis Holmes (7), Patrick Hutchinson (16), Ray Megill (1), Rob Morrison (8), Jeff Reynolds (14), Chris Rhine (2), Kevin Slafkosky (7), Scott Tompkins (4), Matt Trautman (13), Nick Ward (1).



GAME 1 BELLARMINE.....6 NO. 6 MARYLAND11 FEBRUARY 17, 2007 FIELD HOCKEY & LACROSSE COMPLEX

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - For Maryland freshman Brian Farrell, his college debut is going to be a tough act to follow. The long pole defensive midfielder scored two goals in his first collegiate game to help the sixth-ranked Terrapin men's lacrosse team (1-0) to an 11-6 victory over Bellarmine (0-1) at the Field Hockey & Lacrosse Complex.

In total, nine different Terps scored on the afternoon with six players tallying double-digit points. In addition to Farrell's two scores, junior midfielder Drew Evans made his first college start a memorable one by setting his career high with a pair of goals against the Knights. The second of the Ithaca, N.Y., native's scores came on a nifty behind-the-back shot in the second quarter.

The first quarter proved to be a closely-fought contest. Maryland jumped out to a quick lead on Evans' first goal of the game off the first of a career-best three assists from junior attackman Max Ritz. But Bellarmine showed Maryland that it was a formidable opponent, scoring two goals in the next three minutes to take a 2-1 lead.

The Knights' only lead of the game would be a short-lived one as Maryland rattled off the next four goals to take a 5-2 lead into the second half. Sophomore midfielder Jeremy Sieverts, who transferred to Maryland from Butler when the Bulldogs dropped their men's lacrosse program prior to the 2007 season, got the ball rolling with his first goal as a Terp off of another Ritz assist.

Farrell gave Maryland the lead for good at the 6:53 mark of the second quarter with a transition goal to make the score 3-2. The play was started by a fantastic save by freshman goalie Brian Phipps on a shot by Bellarmine's Dylan MacDougall.

Senior attackman Michael Phipps scored his first goal of the season at the 5:25 mark on a diving shot from the left side of the Bellarmine crease. He also figured into Maryland's next goal, picking up the assist on Evans' behind-the-back score.

Maryland opened the third quarter with a man-up goal from senior midfielder Travis Holmes off an assist from sophomore middle Dan Groot to give Maryland a 6-2 advantage. Bellarmine answered back with its first goal in more than 24 minutes on an Adam Gardner goal.

The lead was back to four in a matter of seconds though as Maryland's face-off man Will Dalton cleanly picked up the ensuing face-off, bulled his way through the right alley and scored his first goal of the year. Dalton was a dominant force at the face-off stripe for the Terps all afternoon, winning 12-of-18 attempts.

Maryland increased its lead to 9-4 heading into the fourth quarter on man-up goals by Groot and senior midfielder Thomas Alford.

The Knights looked to build some momentum early in the fourth on back-to-back goals less than a minute apart by Bryan Brown and John Kirk. But Maryland's defense, which turned in a solid effort on the afternoon, shut Bellarmine out the final 11:46 of the game.

Sophomore attackman Danny Gallagher became the ninth Terp to score a goal with his first tally of the season off an assist from junior defensive midfielder Jeff Reynolds at the 9:23 mark. Reynolds picked up his second assist of the game five minutes later on Farrell's second goal to close the scoring at 11-6.

Defensively for the Terps, it was another tremendous display of both individual and team defense. Senior All-American Ray Megill tied his career best with five ground balls, while junior All-America candidate Joe Cinosky tied his career high with three caused turnovers. Senior long pole Ryan Clarke showed why he's an All-America candidate as he tied his career high with four caused turnovers in addition to picking up three groundballs.

Overall, Maryland's defense held the Knights without a goal for 24:59 and shut them out in the second quarter. Last season the Terps held opponents scoreless in 19 quarters and help the opposition without a goal for more than 20 minutes 11 times.

Brian Phipps was solid in his college debut, making nine stops and orchestrating Maryland clear attempts with precision. On the afternoon the Terps were 13-of-16 (81.3%) on clear attempts.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - A career-day by senior attackman Michael Phipps highlighted the fifth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team's 16-7 victory over Vermont at the Field Hockey & Lacrosse Complex.

Phipps set career highs with eight points on four goals, including the game-winner, and four assists. The Annapolis, Md., native scored a goal in each quarter and became the first player since Scott Hochstadt in 1998 to post a four-goal, four-assist game. But, Phipps wasn't the only standout performer on the afternoon for the Terps as nine other Maryland players scored goals as well.

Each of the other five Terrapin offensive starters had at least one goal. Junior attackman Max Ritz scored a goal and added two assists, all in Maryland's eight-goal fourth quarter. Sophomore Danny Gallagher, the Terps' third attackman, scored his lone goal in the fourth quarter as well.

The starting midfielder unit was also stellar, combining for 10 points on five goals and five assists. Sophomore midfielder Dan Groot set career bests with five points on his first-career hat trick and two assists. Junior middle Drew Evans also set his career high with four points on a goal and a personal-best three assists. Senior midfielder Chris Feifs made his season debut after missing the 2007 opener due to illness and scored his first career man-up goal.

The second midfield line also got into the scoring act with four goals and assist. Senior Thomas Alford tied his career high with two goals, while sophomore Jeremy Sieverts turned in his first multi-point game as a Terp with a goal and an assist. Rounding out the trio is senior Travis Holmes, who scored a goal on his lone shot of the afternoon.

The catalyst for the Terps proved to be Will Dalton's dominance at the face-off stripe and some outstanding play by Maryland's trio of long poles - seniors Ryan Clarke and Sean Sullivan, and freshman Brian Farrell. Dalton won 18-of-22 face-offs and picked up a career best eight groundballs. The junior from Queenstown, Md., started the game by winning the first eight face-offs.

Clarke, Sullivan and Farrell also turned in big performances for Maryland. Clarke, an All-America candidate, picked up three groundballs and caused a turnover. Sullivan set his career high with five groundballs and also caused a turnover. Farrell set personal bests with four groundballs and two caused turnovers and figured into the scoring for the second-straight game by picking up his first career assist on Phipps' man-down goal in the third quarter.

Maryland's final goal of the contest was also a career-first. Sophomore Nick Ward, who made the transition from the midfield to attack in the off-season, scored his first-collegiate goal with 41 seconds remaining in the game.

Defensively, the Terps were led by goalie Brian Phipps. The freshman, in just his second college game, made 14 saves, picked up five groundballs and caused a pair of Catamount turnovers. Junior All-America candidate Joe Cinosky caused two Vermont turnovers, while freshman defensive midfielder Bryn Holmes picked up a pair of groundballs.

Overall, Maryland's defense held the Catamounts without a goal for 26:00 and shut them out in the third quarter. That marks the second time in two games that the Terrapin defense has held an opponent scoreless for more than 20 minutes and shut them out in a quarter. Last season the Terps held opponents scoreless in 19 quarters and help the opposition without a goal for more than 20 minutes 11 times.

The Catamounts were led by seniors Pete Hein and Dan Zwirko. Hein netted a hat trick, while Zwirko added a pair of goals.



Maryland's defense rose to the occasion, allowing just one goal in those three minutes to swing the momentum back to the Terps heading into the second half.

That was the beginning of a Georgetown scoreless drought that lasted for 25:14, which allowed the Terrapin offense the space it needed to make a 5-0 run to tie the game at 6-6 with 13:14 left in the game.

Once again it was Ritz that sparked the Maryland offense. The Wayne, Pa., native scored back-to-back goals just two minutes apart for his third career hat trick. Maryland closed out its third-quarter scoring barrage with a bang at the 4:06 mark with freshman long pole Brian Farrell's third goal of the season. The 6-foot-4, 240-pound Farrell then raced the length of the field and beat Hoya goalie Miles Kass with a bouncing shot.

The Terps closed the scoring gap completely with their second man-up goal of the game at the 13:04 mark. Senior midfielder Chris Feifs scored his second goal of the year off of another assist from Ritz.

The Hoyas finally put an end to their scoreless stretch at the 9:02 mark of the fourth to take a 7-6 lead. Dan D'Agnes scored the eventual game-winner, his second goal of the game, off of Andrew Baird's second assist on the afternoon.

Bryn Holmes, who started in the defensive midfield for the Terps in place of the injured Jeff Reynolds, caused three turnovers and picked up a groundball. Maryland's other starting defensive midfielder, Jimmy Borell, playing in his first game of the season after sitting out the Terps' first two contests due to a hand injury, picked up four groundballs. Freshman goalie Brian Phipps made nine saves on the afternoon for Maryland.

But that was as close as the Terps would come to the Blue Devils on this night as Duke scored three unanswered goals to take a 4-1 lead.

Ritz's first goal of the game cut the lead to a pair of goals heading into the second quarter, but the Blue Devils scored four of the next five goals for a five-goal halftime advantage.

TOWSON, Md. - The 10th-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team stifled a comeback effort by the No. 13 Towson Tigers to pull out an 8-7 win in front of 3,445 fans at Unitas Stadium.

The Terps got off to a fast start in the first quarter with a pair of goals from junior All-America candidate Max Ritx. He scored his first goal on an assist from freshman midfielder Adam Sear, but the play began with a terrific effort by freshman long pole Brian Farrell. Farrell out-hustled his defender to the midfield line allowing Sear a clean run into the attack zone. That bit of breathing room allowed Sear the space to find Ritz on the right side of the crease, where he buried a shot over the left shoulder of Towson goalkeeper Matt Antol.

Ritz gave Maryland a 2-0 lead with 4:03 left in the quarter with a goal from just about the same spot on the field. Sophomore midfielder Jeremy Sieverts fought through three Tiger defenders to pick up a groundball and work his way to the front of the Towson goal. He lost the ball on a good check by a Tiger defender, but Ritz was there to scoop up the loose ball and lace a shot into the right side of the Towson goal.

The second quarter got off to a slow start, but the Terps drew first blood once again, this time on Sear's second goal of the season. The play started with freshman defensive midfielder Bryn Holmes' fifth caused turnover of the game. He pushed the ball into the attack zone. Sear took the ball at the top of the zone, dodged around a defender and bounced a shot into the top left corner of the goal.

Ritz scored his third of the game less than two minutes later on a give-and-go with junior midfielder Drew Evans to push Maryland out to a 4-0 lead.

Towson managed to get on the board with just three seconds left in the second quarter when Adam Hagelin rolled around the back right side of the crease and found a cutting Nick Williams, who scored his second goal of the season.

The Tigers refused to quit and showed at the third quarter face-off that there were ten going away. Matt Eckerl, who won 14-of-18 draws on the afternoon, won his seventh face-off and raced down the right wing of Maryland's defensive zone. He skipped a shot from about nine yards out that bounced into the lower left corner of the Terrapin goal to cut the Maryland lead to 4-2.

Senior attackman Michael Phipps answered back for Maryland less than three minutes later with his first goal of the game. He scored his seventh of the season on a transition goal when sophomore Nick Ward found him with a perfect pass as Phipps was cut to the front of the Tiger goal.

Towson got off to another quick start in the fourth quarter as Eric Boyle scored on a skip-shot into the lower left corner to pull the Tigers to within two goals at the 14:38 mark.

Senior midfielder Thomas Alford gave Maryland a three-goal cushion with an unassisted goal at the 10:24 mark of the fourth. Alford dodged around a Tiger defender into the left alley and bounced a shot from 12 yards out for his fifth goal of the season.

Evans scored his fourth of the season less than three minutes later on an assisted by Ritz. The Ithaca, N.Y. native drilled a shot into the left side of the goal from 15 yards out directly in front of the Tiger net. Towson answered right back less than a minute later on Boyle's second goal of the game off an assist by Bobby Griebel to once again cut the Maryland lead to three.

The Terps' lead was cut to two, 7-5, at the 4:42 mark of the fourth when Hagelin scored his first of the game off an assist from Jonathan Engelke.

It looked like Towson was poised to trim the lead to one when Holmes was called for a slashing penalty at 4:28, but Maryland turned the tables and pushed the lead to three on a man-down goal by Farrell. The native of Towson, Md., took a pass from senior All-American Steve Whittenberg near midfield and raced the length of the field, bouncing a shot past Antol from seven yards out.

Towson made a late push as Justin Schneider scored an unassisted goal at the 1:37 mark to trim the deficit to two at 8-6.

An offside penalty with ten seconds to go gave Towson an extra-man opportunity and the Tigers took advantage as Schneider cashed in with his second-straight goal to pull Towson to within a goal of the Terps at 8-7.

The Tigers had one last shot to tie the game when Eckerl won the ensuing face-off and fired a desperation shot from the left wing, but senior defensive midfielder Jimmy Borell made sure the shot never got to the Maryland net by jumping in front of it and blocking it with his body.

Freshman goalie Brian Phipps turned in his finest performance of the season, stopping a career-best 16 shots and picking up four groundballs. Holmes also had a career-day for the Terps on defense, posting career highs with five caused turnovers and eight groundballs.

Maryland's starting close defense of Whittenberg, Ray Megill and Joe Cinosky, along with long pole Ryan Clarke, turned in a fine performance, totaling seven groundballs and three caused turnovers while holding Towson's starting attack and first midfield to just one goal.

The Leopards were not going to let the game get away from them early though. Lafayette attackman Matt Mersky scored two goals and assisted on another over the next 14 minutes to give the Leopards a 3-1 lead at the end of the first quarter.

But that was the last time Lafayette was in the game as the Terps ripped off the next nine goals to take a 10-4 lead and put the game safely out of reach.

Phipps kicked off the run with his first two goals of the game. Those were followed by a pair of transition goals by senior defensive midfielder Jimmy Borell, who scored set a career-best with his two-goal game.

Sophomore attackman Danny Gallagher, who picked up his first assist of the season on Phipps' first goal, scored three of the next four Maryland goals for his first career hat trick.

Michael Phipps picked up assists on Gallagher's first two goals, which were sandwiched around his third goal of the game. That goal came off of a tremendous defensive play by two-time All-American Steve Whittenberg. The senior defender caused a Lafayette turnover, scooped up the groundball and fired a perfect pass to a streaking Brian Farrell, who carried the ball into the Terp zone and found Phipps on the right side of the crease where he beat Leopard goalie Jeff Canfield to the lower left corner.

After Gallagher scored two more transition goals, Phipps capped off the 9-0 run with his fourth goal of the game off an assist from Ritz. That play started all the way back in the Maryland defensive zone with Terp goalie Brian Phipps, who heaved a pass down the field to avoid a turnover. Ritz went up between a pair of Leopard defenders and came down with the ball and found an open Michael Phipps for the easy score.

Lafayette snapped a 21:01 scoreless stretch with its final goal of the game by Trevor Orlando at the 9:21 mark of the third quarter.

The Terps finished the scoring with goals from a trio of sophomores in the third quarter. Attackman Nick Ward scored his third goal of the season off the first career assist by freshman Fran Gormley. Maryland's final goal came on its first extra-man opportunity of the game. Lafayette's Alex Heller was called for slashing at the 3:39 mark and it took the Terps just 17 seconds to cash in with a goal. Sophomore midfielder Jeremy Sieverts scored his first man-up goal of the season on quick shot off of a sharp pass from fellow sophomore middle Dan Groot.

The Terps got tremendous defensive effort from everyone on the roster. Maryland picked up a season-best 51 groundballs and caused 24 turnovers, one shy of a season high. Whittenberg and fellow All-American Ray Megill totaled five groundballs and five caused turnovers. Junior defender Ryne Adolph had his finest day as a Terp, picking up a career-high three groundballs and causing a turnover while playing three different defensive positions.

Maryland's trio of long poles, senior All-America candidate Ryan Clarke, senior Sean Sullivan and Farrell, combined for seven groundballs and four caused turnovers.

Other defensive standouts included freshman short-stick Bryn Holmes, who had three groundballs and a caused turnover, and sophomore defender Mike Griswold, who caused a career-high two turnovers.

Freshman goalie Brian Phipps was solid once again for the Terps. The Annapolis, Md., native made 14 saves, including stopping all eight Lafayette shots in the decisive second quarter, picked up four groundballs and caused a turnover.

Sieverts, a sophomore who transferred in from Butler when the Bulldogs dropped their men's lacrosse program in January, scored the game's first two goals to give the Terps a 2-0 lead. The first goal was unassisted as Sieverts beat Retriever goalie Jeremy Blevins on the short side with a spinning shot from the right side of the crease. His second score came at the 5:35 mark when he took a pass from freshman Adam Sear 12 yards out directly in front of the UMBC goal. Sieverts then drilled the shot into the top left corner of the net.

Midfielder Alex Hopmann got the Retrievers on the board with two minutes left in the first with a 13-yard blast off an assist from Terry Kimener. Kimener then tied the game early in the second quarter with his first of three goals on the day. Hopmann fired a shot wide of the Terps' goal, but Drew Westervelt was in the right place at the right time and picked up the groundball and quickly flipped a pass to a wide open Kimener, who was all alone on the right side of the crease for an easy score.

Junior All-America candidate Max Ritz scored his first of two goals on the afternoon off an assist from sophomore midfielder Dan Groot to push the Maryland lead to 6-2.

UMBC cut the lead to three on Hopmann's second goal of the game, but Maryland responded with senior midfielder Chris Feifs taking a pass from Ritz and cashing in on another extra-man opportunity for a 7-3 Terp lead at the half.

After the break, Maryland went on another 4-0 run in the third quarter to put the game out of reach.

Feifs tied his career high with his second goal of the game off at the 11:09 mark. He drilled an open shot from the left alley off a perfect skip pass from the right side of the field from Groot.

UMBC looked to have a sure-fire goal at the 7:25 mark of the third quarter when a Maryland turnover gave Kimener a one-on-one with Brian Phipps. Kimener put a double-move on Phipps, faking a quick, low shot before shooting high. But Phipps stayed with the play the whole way and made a spectacular save, preserving the 8-3 lead.

Maryland picked up its first penalty of the game during the ensuing fight for the groundball, giving the Retrievers a man-up advantage. But the advantage proved to be the Terps' when Phipps made another tough save and starting the Maryland transition attack with another perfect outlet to Megill.

But that was as close as the Mount would get. Maryland rattled off six goals before Bello would pick up the Mount's second goal.

Phipps picked up assists on the Terps' next two goals from midfielders Drew Evans and Adam Sear. Evans scored another unassisted goal to give Maryland a 4-1 lead. Jon Beard scored his first of the season off an assist from freshman midfielder Casey Creaney to close the first quarter.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Led by sophomore Dan Groot's second career hat trick, the first two midfields for the ninth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team combined to score nine goals in the Terps' 14-8 victory over No. 11 North Carolina at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium.

The victory boosted Maryland to a 7-2 overall record and 1-1 in the ACC. Carolina fell to 6-3 on the year and 0-2 in conference play.

The Terps came out firing in the first quarter with sophomore midfielder Jeremy Sieverts drawing first blood at the 11:51 mark with a running shot sweeping through the right alley.

Senior attackman Michael Phipps built the lead to 2-0 just 40 seconds later. Freshman defensive midfielder Bryn Holmes caused one of his two turnovers on the day to start the play, dislodging the ball from the Tar Heels' Nick Tintle. Sophomore attackman Danny Gallagher ended up with the groundball and found Phipps along the right side of the crease where he dodged around a defender and scored his 17th goal of the season.

Carolina got on the board and cut the Terrapin lead to 2-1 with a man-up goal from Tintle at the 9:41 mark. But that was the closest the Tar Heels would get to the lead as Maryland scored the game's next six goals to take a commanding 8-1 lead.

Groot started the scoring spree off with a running shot from the left alley to the top corner on Carolina goalie Grant Zimmerman's short side.

The Terps' transition game was in full effect on their next goal. Freshman goalie Brian Phipps cleanly picked a skip shot by Ryan Walterhoefer and threw a perfect outlet pass to his brother Michael over the midfield stripe. Michael Phipps then raced into the attack zone and dodged around a pair of Tar Heel defenders to score his second goal of the game.

Junior All-America candidate Max Ritz set-up the next Maryland goal with a strong skip pass from behind the net to senior midfielder Chris Feifs, who buried a bounce shot from 10 yards out in the left alley.

The first quarter came to a close with a bang for the Terps when Adam Sear continued his scoring streak with his only goal of the game with just five seconds remaining. The freshman midfielder beat Zimmerman with a hard underhanded shot from the right alley from eight yards away.

The momentum from the first quarter didn't carry over for the Terps and both teams struggled to gain the advantage. Maryland finally broke through

with an unassisted goal by senior midfielder Thomas Alford, beat his defender in the right alley and connected with a bounce shot at the 2:48 mark to give Maryland a 7-1 lead.

Hustle earned Maryland an 8-1 lead a minute and a half later. Senior co-captain Jimmy Borell helped clear the ball into the Terrapin offensive zone following Brian Phipps' eighth save of the game, and beat a Carolina offensive midfielder back to the midfield stripe during a substitution by a wide enough margin to allow junior midfielder Drew Evans a free run into the play. Feifs recognized the advantage and fed the ball to Evans on the right wing where he laced a shot past Zimmerman for his seventh goal of the season.

Carolina broke a 24-minute scoreless streak with a pair of goals in the final 13 seconds of the second quarter. Ben Hunt scored an unassisted goal with 13 seconds left. Tintle picked up the groundball on the ensuing face-off and sent a quick pass to Ben Hunt, who scored with just three ticks left on the clock.

The Tar Heels continued to put pressure on the Terps midway through the third quarter by cashing in with a transition goal by Rob Driscoll at the 8:38 mark. Zimmerman started the play by making a tremendous one-on-one save on Michael Phipps.

Groot stopped Carolina's three-goal run with his second goal of the game on the exact same play that his first goal came on.

The Tar Heels caught a lucky break and cut the Maryland lead to 9-5 to close the third quarter. The Terrapin defense looked to have forced Michael Burns to turn the ball over, but the ball skipped into the right alley where Hunt picked it up and got off a quick shot for his second score of the game.

Momentum seemed to be with the Tar Heels entering the fourth quarter, but Maryland took it back with a four-goal scoring binge over 5:20 to take a 13-5 lead. Alford got the ball rolling with his second of the game on a huge, top corner shot from 17 yards out.

It was like déjà vu all over again on Maryland's next score as Groot buried another runner from the left alley at the 10:50 mark.

Sophomore attackman Danny Gallagher picked up the next Terrapin score 49 seconds later. Senior Jon Beard picked up the assist on the play, feeding the ball to Gallagher in front of the crease, where he flipped a low shot past Zimmerman from eight yards out.

Ritz capped the scoring streak for the Terps with another score from the left alley at the 6:51 mark. The score came during a five-on-five situation with both teams down a man due to penalties.

Carolina cut the lead to 13-8 with goals from Gavin Petracca, Ryan Walterhoefer and Driscoll, but it was too little, too late. Borell would tack on another unassisted goal from the left alley to finish the scoring at 14-8.

Freshman goalie Brian Phipps had another stellar game for the Terps, stopping 15 Tar Heel shots. Maryland's trio of close defensemen, Steve Whittenberg, Ray Megill and Joe Cinosky, held the high-powered Carolina starting attack to just a pair of goals and one assist. Coming into today's game the Tar Heels' starting attackmen had been averaging five goals and three assists per game.

Defensive midfielder Paul Andrews, a graduate student, had the finest game of his career, picking up three groundballs and causing two Carolina turnovers. Megill and Holmes also caused a pair of turnovers apiece, while Whittenberg had four groundballs.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. - Three unanswered goals during a 5-2 third quarter propelled the second-ranked Virginia Cavaliers to a 12-8 win over the No. 8 University of Maryland men's lacrosse team at Klöckner Stadium.

The Terps drew first blood just two minutes into the game on freshman defensive midfielder Bryn Holmes' first career goal off an assist from Michael Phipps. Junior All-American candidate Max Ritz tied the game at two goals apiece with his 14th score of the season two minutes later. ANNAPOLIS, Md. - Sophomore midfielder Dan Groot scored the game-winning goal at the 3:18 mark of the second overtime to give the 10th-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team an 8-7 win over No. 7 Navy in front of a crowd of 14,625 at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium.

The game was sent into overtime by a miraculous goal by midfielder Drew Evans. The junior from Ithaca, N.Y., scored his only goal of the game with seven seconds remaining in regulation, lacing a low-to-high shot from 16 yards out over the right shoulder of Navy goalie Colin Finnegan.

All-America defender Ray Megill turned in a career-defining performance and provided the spark that turned the tide for the Terps.

The Midshipmen had just ripped off three-straight goals to take a 6-4 lead midway through the fourth quarter. Navy had won 10-of-13 face-offs at that point and had momentum building. Enter Megill, who trotted out to the X to take his first-ever college face-off against Mikelis Visgauss, who only lost one draw in seven attempts. That lone loss became Megill's first win. The senior from Clark, N.J., picked up the groundball, raced down the middle of the field and buried a shot from eight yards out to pull the Terps to within a goal.

Navy's Tommy Wallin scored less than three minutes later on a wild falling-down shot to push the lead back to two, but that's just when the game got interesting for Maryland.

Megill won the ensuing face-off to give the Terps possession and they cashed in less than a minute later. Senior All-America candidate Michael Phipps, who also scored a goal, fired a skip pass to sophomore midfielder Jeremy Sieverts, who was cutting in front of the Navy goal. Sieverts one-timed a shot past Finnegan for his second goal of the game to cut the Midshipman lead to 7-6.

That's the way the game would stay until the final minute of regulation. Maryland looked to have tied the game when Evans had a clean look at the goal on the doorstep, but Finnegan was there to make the save and preserve the one-goal lead. The Mids tried to run out the clock, but the Terps would get one more crack at it thanks to senior All-America candidate Ryan Clarke, who

caused his third turnover of the game with 56 seconds left. Two-time All-American Steve Whittenberg came up with the big groundball and cleared the ball into the Maryland offensive zone.

That set the stage for Evans' heroics. With time running out, Evans drove high and used multiple roll dodges to separate from his defender. That gave him just enough space to get off the game-tying shot.

The first overtime was a physical struggle with Maryland goalie Brian Phipps making two of his 13 saves and Finnegan coming up with another key save.

Navy never got possession in the second overtime thanks to freshman defensive midfielder Bryn Holmes, who beat Navy's face-off specialist William Wallace. Senior short stick Jimmy Borell grabbed the loose ball and raced into the attack zone. Junior All-America candidate Max Ritz, who scored a goal and added an assist in the game, looked to end the game, but Finnegan was there to make the save. Sieverts came up with the groundball off of the save to keep possession for the Terps.

That set the stage for Groot, who dodged past his defender through the left alley and was able to beat Finnegan over the left shoulder to give Maryland its first victory over the Mids since 2003.

Maryland's defense was tremendous in the victory, especially the man-down unit that held Navy without a goal in five extra-man opportunities, including one when the Terps were two men down.

Megill finished the game with a career-best seven groundballs, while Whittenberg picked up four. Along with Megill and Whittenberg, Clarke and junior Joe Cinosky combined for 12 of Maryland's 15 caused turnovers.





COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The seventh-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team rallied from a two-goal deficit in the fourth quarter to send the game into overtime, but All-American Paul Rabil gave No. 10 Johns Hopkins the stunning 8-7 victory at a rain-soaked Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium.

The first period proved even with both teams picking up a single goal. Maryland opened up a 2-1 lead a minute and a half into the second period on Adam Sear's sixth goal of the season.

But the lead was short-lived as the Blue Jays would go on a three-goal run, the first two coming on unassisted goals by Austin Walker, to take a 4-2 advantage into halftime.

That's where Rabil, who was 0-of-5 shooting in regulation, sent Hopkins home with the 8-7 win 43 seconds into the extra session.

Defensively Maryland got tremendous play from senior All-Americans Steve Whittenberg and Ray Megill. Whittenberg, who held Hopkins' leading scorer Steven Boyle to no goals and just one assist, caused three Blue Jay turnovers. Megill caused a pair of turnovers and picked up three groundballs. Senior All-America candidate Ryan Clarke turned in a solid effort with four groundballs and three caused turnovers.

The junior All-America candidate took a feed from junior midfielder Drew Evans in front of the crease and as momentum and a Quaker defender were taking Ritz to the right side, he flipped the ball over his left shoulder for a behind-the-back goal.

The Quakers were determined to put up a fight and took their fifth lead of the game just 26 seconds into the third quarter on Craig Andrzejewski's second goal of the game. Senior All-America candidate Michael Phipps figured in on two of the goals, scoring a goal and adding an assist. DURHAM, N.C. - The sixth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team battled back from a four-goal deficit in the fourth quarter, but fell to No. 3 Virginia, 11-10, in the ACC Semifinals at Duke's Koskinen Stadium.

After Virginia took a 1-0 lead less than a minute, the Terps went on a 4-0 run over the next 11 minutes to take a 4-1 lead. Senior attackman Michael Phipps started the run off an assist from freshman Bryn Holmes. Sophomores Dan Groot and Jeremy Sieverts, who started his first game at attack, scored the next two for Maryland. Sieverts then set up the fourth goal, which came on a man-up opportunity, with a good skip pass to Durham, N.C., native Chris Feifs, who buried a shot from the left wing into the top right corner of the goal.

Cavalier attackman Ben Rubeer pulled the Wahoos to within a goal at 4-3 before the close of the first quarter with a pair of goals in the final two minutes.

The Terps built the lead to 5-3 less than two minutes into the second quarter on Groot's second goal of the game with a top-shelf shot from the left wing off an assist from Phipps. But that lead vanished as Virginia reeled off three unanswered goals from Steve Giannone, Danny Glading, and Rubeer, who added assists on the other two goals.

The defense stepped-up to stop the bleeding as junior All-America candidate Joe Cinosky caused a turnover on the defensive end and raced down the field before feeding freshman long pole Brian Farrell, who scored his first goal since the Towson game on March 10 to tie the score at 6-6 with 5:54 to play in the second quarter.

Virginia took a one-goal lead into the locker room when Jack Riley scored off an assist by Garrett Billings. The Cavaliers built that lead to 9-6 in the third quarter by scoring the only two goals of the period. Billings scored Virginia's eighth goal when he picked up his own rebound on the right wing and fired another shot that Maryland goalie Harry Alford got a piece of, but the ball just trickled across the goal line for the score. Giannone scored with 2:30 remaining in the quarter for the three-goal advantage.

Ryan Kelly finished a 4-0 Virginia run with an unassisted goal to give the Cavaliers a 10-6 lead. Phipps gave the Terps some life when he snapped a 21-minute Maryland scoreless streak with his second score of the game at 9:38 in the fourth.

The Terps cut the lead to two less than two minutes later when Groot connected on his third score of the game, capitalizing on an extra-man opportunity off an assist by Max Ritz. The Wahoos got the lead back up to three at the 5:13 mark when Brian Carroll scored off a feed from Glading.

Maryland remained resilient as it bounced back with an 18-yard cannon into the upper right off an assist from Groot to trim the lead to 11-9. Groot then scored his second man-up goal, and career-best fourth overall, of the game to cut the lead to one.

The Terps had a chance to tie the game on extra-man with 1:11 left when Adam Fassnacht was called for a holding, but Virginia goalie Kip Turner came up with a big save on a Groot shot from 10 yards out in the right alley to preserve the tie.

Harry Alford started his first game of the season in goal for the Terps and finished with nine saves.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Seniors Chris Feifs and Michael Phipps combined for seven of Maryland's 12 goals to lead the sixth-ranked Terrapins to a 12-4 victory over Yale on Senior Day at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium.

Maryland (10-5) was never threatened in the game, jumping out to a 4-0 lead in the first quarter. Feifs got the Terps started with his first of a career-high four goals on the day less than a minute into the game. Senior All-America defender Ray Megill picked up his third assist of the season on the goal.

Phipps then stole the show with all three of his scores coming in a span of 1:07. The first came in transition from the right wing off an assist from senior long pole Ryan Clarke, who last picked up an assist on May 6, 2006. Phipps then tried the left wing and skipped a low shot in off an assist from junior attackman Max Ritz. His third score came 10 seconds later off an assist from Bryn Holmes, who won the face-off clean and laced a pass to Phipps on the right side of the crease where he ripped off a low-to-high shot for the goal.

Feifs built the lead up to 5-0 midway through the second quarter when he took a pass from sophomore Jeremy Sieverts and ripped a 10-yard bounce-shot past Bulldog goalie George Carafides, who finished the game with 18 saves, which is the most by any single goalie against Maryland this season.

Yale (7-6) scored with just under three minutes remaining in the first half on a score from Tyler Casertano to trim the lead to 5-1, but the Terps would come out in the third quarter and put the game away with a dominating 15 minutes.

Sieverts scored three goals in the third quarter to lead Maryland on a 7-0 run. Junior midfielder Drew Evans got the run started with a jumping skip-shot before Sieverts rattled off two scores in 10 seconds. Feifs netted his third of the game next off an assist from Evans before Sieverts finished his hat trick with an unassisted goal at the 9:24 mark.

Sophomore midfielder Dan Groot got into the scoring column for the ninth time in the last 10 games with a rocket from 15 yards out in front of the Bulldog goal. The run was capped off with Feifs' fourth goal of the day off a skip pass from Sieverts for a 12-1 Maryland lead.

Yale got three goals in the fourth quarter from Chris Kempner, Brendan Gibson and Michael Karwoski to close out the scoring.

Maryland's defense was spearheaded by its senior leaders. Two-time All-American Harry Alford, who started for just the second-time in goal this season, made five saves and allowed just one goal. He also picked up three groundballs and caused a turnover.

Steve Whittenberg, another two-time All-American on the Terp defense, locked in on Casertano and allowed the Bulldogs' leading scorer just one goal while he was on him. Whittenberg also finished the day with two caused turnovers and picked up two groundballs.

A quintet of seniors also stepped-up defensively for the Terrapins as Paul Andrews, Ryan Clarke, Jay Feeley, Travis Holmes and Sean Sullivan combined for six groundballs and four caused turnovers.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Unseeded UMBC used a 9-2 run spanning the second and third quarters to pull away from No. 7 seed Maryland en route to a 13-9 win in the first round of the NCAA Tournament in front of 2,200 at Chevy Chase Bank at Byrd Stadium.

The night started out well for the Terps (10-6) as they jumped out to a 3-0 lead early in the first quarter on goals by seniors Chris Feifs and Travis Holmes and junior Max Ritz. But the Retrievers (11-5) battled back to within a goal at 3-2 on back-to-back goals by Drew Westervelt and Cayle Ratcliffe.

Ritz scored his second of three goals on the night to give Maryland a 4-2 lead less than three minutes into the second quarter, but that was the last lead the Terps would hold as UMBC rattled off three straight scores for its first lead at 5-4.

Maryland tied the game at 5-5 on Ritz's third goal off an assist from Dan Groot at the 7:04 mark, but that's when Retriever goalie Jeremy Blevins got hot and helped shutout the Terrapin offense for the next 23:14 and UMBC built its lead to 11-5 on a 6-0 scoring run. In those decisive middle quarters Blevins made 11 of his career-best 18 saves.

P.J. Kimmner got the ball started with an unassisted goal, followed by a pair from Ratcliffe and two from Alex Hopmann. Josh Porcell capped the streak with his second goal of the game at the 4:01 mark of the third quarter.

Maryland tried to get back in the game in the fourth quarter and did outscore the Retrievers 4-2 in the final period, but the deficit was too great to overcome.

Groot scored his lone goal of the game on an extra-man opportunity to end the Terrapins' scoring drought off an assist from Ritz at the 13:50 mark.

Andy Gallagher's second goal of the game came less than three minutes later and stymied any momentum that Maryland was building.

The Terps trimmed the gap to 12-8 on goals by Michael Phipps and Drew Evans, but Ratcliffe scored his fourth of the game with 6:28 remaining to seal Maryland's fate. Sophomore Jeremy Sieverts capped the scoring 14 seconds later with his lone goal of the game.

Maryland's defense, which caused 13 of 19 Retriever turnovers, was led by senior All-American Steve Whittenberg, who had four caused turnovers and four groundballs and junior All-America candidate Joe Cinosky, who has four groundballs and a pair of caused turnovers.

The Terps also got a huge contribution from freshman defensive midfielder Bryn Holmes, who won 10-of-14 face-offs and picked up a career-high nine groundballs. The 5-foot-7, 160-pound Holmes also caused two UMBC turnovers.

With the loss Maryland finishes the season with a 10-6 record. The defeat also marked the end for 13 Maryland seniors: Harry Alford, Thomas Alford, Paul Andrews, Jon Beard, Jimmy Borell, Ryan Clarke, Jay Feeley, Chris Feifs, Travis Holmes, Ray Megill, Michael Phipps, Sean Sullivan and Steve Whittenberg.
