LACROSSE HANDS OUT TEAM AWARDS

The Maryland men's lacrosse team and head coach Dave Cottle welcomed back the 2008 seniors that helped the Terps make four-straight NCAA tournament appearances, on Sunday, October 19, for the annual awards banquet at Sprint Heritage Hall in the Comcast Center on the campus of the University of Maryland.

The highlight of the afternoon's awards was the presentation of the "Big Man" Award, given in honor of former coach Dick Edell. The award was created to honor the player that best exemplified the selfless and positive qualities of the retired coach. The 2008 award was given to midfielder Will Dalton.

The Daniel Slatkosky Coach's Award was also given out, in memory of assistant coach Dave Slatkosky's son, who passed away prior to the 2001 season. The coaches chose this year's recipient, defender Zach Hinton, as the player who best illustrated Dan's positive attitude on and off the field.

The Edwin Powell Award, which is presented to the Team MVP, was given to Joe Cinosky. The native of Boonton Township, N.J., was a second team USILA All-American.

THREE TERPS NAMED ALL-AMERICANS

Senior defender Joe Cinosky, redshirt junior midfielder Jeff Reynolds and sophomore long pole Brian Farrell were named to USILA All-America teams, which were announced during the Final Four in Foxborough, Mass.

Cinosky was named to the second team, while Reynolds and Farrell were honorable mention selections.

Cinosky, who was named a preseason All-American by Inside Lacrosse, was the Terps' best overall player throughout the 2008 season, according to head coach Dave Cottle, and earned the first All-America honor of his career. The Boonton Township, N.J., native led Maryland with 31 caused turnovers and was second on the squad with 46 groundballs.

Reynolds, a native of Bel Air, Md., earned his first All-America selection after leading all Terrapin midfielders with 19 goals, which ranked third on the team. An all-around midfielder, Reynolds also finished the year among the team's top 10 in groundballs (36) and caused turnovers (10). Reynolds returned to the Maryland line-up this season after missing nearly the entire 2007 season after suffering a torn ACL in the Terps' second game of the year.

Farrell, a native of Towson, Md., was selected for his first All-America honor after leading all ACC defenders in scoring with eight goals and three assists for 11 points. The 6-foot-5, 240-pound long pole was also fourth on the team with 40 groundballs and second with 23 caused turnovers. In just two seasons Farrell has 20 points on 13 goals and seven assists.

CINOSKY TAKEN IN FIRST ROUND OF MLL DRAFT

All-America defender Joe Cinosky was selected by the New Jersey Pride with the ninth pick in the first round of the 2008 Major League Lacrosse collegiate draft on May 28. Overall, four Maryland players were selected in the five-round draft.

Cinosky, a native of Boonton Township, N.J., is a three-time All-American is the fourth Terrapin to go in the first round of the MLL Draft in the past three years.

Later on in the summer, Cinosky was a first round pick of the Minnesota Swarm in the National Lacrosse League's 2008 Entry Draft.

DAVE COTTLE NAMED 2008 ACC COACH OF THE YEAR

For the second time in the last five seasons Maryland head coach Dave Cottle was named the Atlantic Coast Conference Men's Lacrosse Coach of the Year as selected by a vote of the league's four coaches.

Cottle led the Terrapins to a 2-1 conference record and a number two seed in the ACC Tournament. He previously won the award in 2004 and is the only coach in the conference to win the award twice in the past five seasons.

Maryland is the only team in the conference to have won at least one of the three individual awards in each of the past three seasons. (Joe Walters - 2006 Player of the Year, Brian Phipps - 2007 Freshman of the Year, Dave Cottle - 2008 Coach of the Year).

YOUTH MOVEMENT

How young was the 2008 Maryland team? Consider this ... a total of 31 Terps have played in at least 12 games last season and 14 of those were freshmen or sophomores.

Maryland's top three scorers were freshmen. Seven of the top 11 groundball totals belonged to sophomores or freshmen. Six of the 12 leaders in caused turnovers were also in their first or second seasons.

With 16 games played there was a total of 160 starts and 64 of those were made by sophomores or freshmen - that's 40% of the team's total starting positions.

SCHMIDT AND YOUNG HELP LEAD U.S. TO U-19 GOLD MEDAL


Maryland rising sophomores Max Schmidt and Ryan Young helped lead the U.S. U-19 team to a gold medal at the 2008 IFL World Championship at Coquitlam, British Columbia in July.

Young was a key figure on offense for the Red, White and Blue as the U.S. team raised it's U-19 winning streak to 36. Young totaled 19 points during the team's seven games and led the squad in assists. In the 19-12 victory over Canada in the gold medal game Young chipped in three points for the U.S. squad.

Schmidt started several of the U.S.'s seven games and played a significant role in a defense that allowed just 8.3 goals per game.

MORAN AND STAINBROOK RETURN TO COLLEGE PARK

Two familiar faces returned to the Maryland men's lacrosse program in the offseason. Former All-America midfielder Ryan Moran returned to his alma mater as an assistant coach, while former defensive coordinator John Stainbrook returned after a six-year hiatus as the team's volunteer assistant coach.

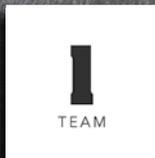



WASHINGTON, D.C. - Youth was served in the University of Maryland's men's lacrosse season opener as four Terrapin freshmen combined for nine goals in No. 7 Maryland's 11-6 victory over fourth-ranked Georgetown at the Hoyas' Multi-Sport Field.

Grant Catalino, who scored a game-high four goals, got the ball rolling for the Terps with an unassisted goal at the 9:35 mark. The freshman from Webster, N.Y., picked up a groundball off of a shot by fellow Terp freshman Travis Reed that hit the right post. Catalino scooped up the ball and quickly put the ball past Hoya goalie Miles Kass for a 1-0 Terrapin lead.

Georgetown and Maryland traded rapid-fire goals over the next two minutes of play. Andrew Brancaccio scored to tie the game at 8:50. Senior co-captain Will Dalton used the NCAA's new face-off rule to give the Terps a 2-1 lead on the ensuing face-off. Georgetown's Brian Taubb was whistled for moving early on the draw giving Maryland a fast-break opportunity. Dalton took full advantage by racing down the middle of the field and burying a shot from 10 yards out. Brendan Cannon scored his only goal of the game off of a rebound off the post to knot the score at 2-2.

But that's as close as the Hoyas would get to taking a lead in the game as Maryland ripped off the next five goals.

Freshman Ryan Young scored the first goal of his career, beating All-America defender Jerry Lambe around the back of the net before finishing with a nifty one-handed wraparound goal into the top left corner of the goal. Catalino scored his second of the game, converting on a man-up opportunity off an assist from Dan Groot.

Maryland closed out the first quarter with a 5-2 lead thanks to a high-bounce goal by redshirt junior Jeff Reynolds with just 15 seconds left on the clock.

The quarter break did little to stifle the Maryland momentum as the Terps tacked on another score - by another freshman - just 15 seconds into the period. Sophomore long pole controlled the ball off of the opening face-off and fed perfect pass to Travis Reed on the right wing, where he laced a shot into the Hoyas goal.

The freshman train kept rolling for the Terps with midfielder Tony Mendes who connected on his first career score at the 9:56 mark of the second quarter. The Chapel Hill, N.C., native got some separation with a great split dodge to the middle of the field and fired the ball into the top right corner of the goal.

After the Hoyas scored to make the game 7-3, Catalino scored his third of the game off an assist from junior midfielder Jeremy Sieverts to lift Maryland's lead back to five. Georgetown would convert on a man-up opportunity for the half's final score to cut its deficit to four at the half.

But Maryland came out of the intermission and scored off of the ensuing face-off. Georgetown won the draw, but Maryland forced a turnover near midfield. Young scooped up the loose ball and hit a 40-yard shot for his second goal of the game. Kass had come out away from the net as the Hoyas attempted to clear the ball into the Maryland zone, leaving an empty net for Young.

Young picked up his first collegiate assist on Maryland's next goal, feeding Reed on the right wing from behind the goal. Reed then hit a quick low shot to give Maryland a 10-4 lead.

Georgetown's Jake Samperton scored at the 6:15 mark of the third period, but Catalino, off another assist by Sieverts, rolled around and over a pair of Hoya defenders for his fourth goal of the game.

The fourth quarter saw only one goal, a man-up score by Georgetown's Craig Dowd off an assist by Cannon at the 6:45 mark. The Terps used a controlled, patient offense to run out the clock and take home the victory.

Redshirt junior Jason Carter, who missed all of 2007 with a broken collarbone, earned the start in cage for the Terps and made seven saves. He gave way to sophomore Brian Phipps in the second half and the 2007 Freshman of the Year allowed just two goals, while making three stops.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Dan Groot scored three times and Ryan Young dished out four assists to lead the No. 6 Maryland men's lacrosse team to a 12-7 win over No. 18 Towson at a soggy Ludwig Field.

The Terrapins dominated the game in the trenches, winning 16-of-23 face-offs and taking the groundball battle, 53-31. Sophomore Bryn Holmes, nine wins, and senior Will Dalton, seven wins, were

the catalysts for the Terps and combined for nine groundballs. Nine different Terps had at least four groundballs, led by senior defender Ryne Adolph, who picked up a career-best six off the turf.

The Terrapin offense was solid, but sloppy field conditions limited quality scoring opportunities in the first half. After junior midfielder Jeremy Sieverts gave the Terps a 1-0 lead with an unassisted runner down the left alley, Groot and Young hooked up for Maryland's second goal at the 11:06 mark. Towson then got on the board with an unassisted goal by Matt Hanzsche.

Sophomore long pole Brian Farrell scored his first of two goals on the day off an assist by redshirt freshman Dan Burns to give Maryland another two-goal lead. That play was made possible by a terrific hustle play that doesn't show up in the boxscore. Redshirt junior goalie Jason Carter beat a Tiger attackman to be nearest to the ball following a shot to give Maryland possession and start the Terps' transition attack that led to the Farrell score. Towson's Blake Best, playing in his first game of the season, scored for the Tigers with a little more than a minute left in the first quarter to trim the lead back to one.

Groot netted his second off an assist from Sieverts less than a minute into the second quarter, but Towson rallied to tie the score at 4-4 off goals by Randall Cooper and Eric Boyle. But Maryland would take a one-goal lead into halftime thanks to redshirt junior midfielder Jeff Reynolds, who laced a shot past Tiger goalie Billy Sadtler to make the score 5-4 for the Terps.

Reynolds continued his hot shooting in the third quarter with another unassisted goal to give him the first multi-goal game of his career. Towson's Jonathan Engelke scored nine seconds later off the ensuing face-off, but that was as close as the Tigers would get to the Terps. Maryland got back-to-back-to-back goals by freshman Grant Catalino, Dalton and freshman Travis Reed to build a 9-6 lead that it never relinquished.

Towson tried to rally and got back to within two on goals by Brian Vetter and Kyle Smedley in the final 45 seconds of the third quarter, but the Terps wore down the Tigers in the fourth quarter. Catalino had the highlight goal of the fourth quarter at the 7:22 mark. The 6-foot-5, 240-pound attackman dodged one Tiger defender in front of the goal and whirled around twice through a couple more Towson players before connecting on a shot from a yard or so in front of the crease.

Young picked up assists number three and four on the final two Terrapin scores. The first of which came on Farrell's second goal, a wild no-look backhand that sneaked past goalie Matt Antol, who took over for Sadtler at the start of the third quarter. Groot closed out the scoring with his third of the game as Young hit him cutting through the left alley for an easy finish.

Maryland sophomore Brian Phipps made seven saves while playing the final 30 minutes for the Terrapins. Carter was also solid, stopping six Tiger shots in his 30 minutes of work.

BALTIMORE, Md. - The sixth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team dropped a 9-8 decision in three overtimes at No. 19 UMBC at a rainy UMBC Stadium. Midfielder Maxx Davis scored the game-winning goal with 1.5 seconds left in the third overtime to give the Retrievers the victory.

The Retrievers took control of the first quarter right from the get-go. UMBC's Terry Kimener scored an unassisted goal less than two minutes into the game. Maryland freshman Tony Mendes knotted the score at 1-1 after finishing a score from the left side of the crease off of a great skip pass from junior midfielder Jeremy Sieverts. UMBC built the lead to 3-1 before the end of the period on goals by Matt Lathan and Alex Hopmann.

The Falcons (1-4) took an early 1-0 lead on Griffin Nevitt's unassisted goal at the 11:09 mark. Maryland responded with three straight goals by freshman Grant Catalino, sophomore Brian Farrell and junior All-American Dan Groot.

Nevitt and Tristan Newkirk scored for Air Force in the span of 27 seconds near the end of the first quarter to tie the game at 3-3, but that's where the Falcon upset bid came to an end. After Bart Wagner gave UNC a 1-0 lead just one minute into the game, the Terps got a lucky break at the 8:41 mark to tie the score. Carolina goalie Grant Zimmerman brought the ball near midfield on an attempted clear, but his pass attempt was picked off by junior midfielder Jeremy Sieverts, who brought the ball just across the midfield stripe before ripping a long shot into the empty Tar Heel goal.

UNC grabbed a 2-1 lead on a Bobby McAuley goal at the 7:26 mark. This time it was sophomore Adam Sear that had the answer for the Terps. The midfielder from Perth, Western Australia, ran by a UNC defender on the left wing and beat Zimmerman top side for a 2-2 tie.

Reynolds fought through a scrum for the ensuing face-off and pushed the ball straight down the middle of the field. No Carolina defender stepped out to pick up Reynolds, so he fired an overhand shot at the feet of Zimmerman for his ninth goal of the season.

The see-saw game continued at the beginning of the second quarter with UNC tying the score at 3-3 on Michael B. Burns' goal at

An unsportsmanlike conduct penalty by UNC's Brian Burke gave the Terps an extra-man opportunity and Maryland made the Tar Heels pay. Freshman attackman Travis Reed netted his fourth man-up goal of the season off an assist by Ritz for a 6-3 Maryland advantage.

The 3-0 Maryland run was interrupted by a bit of bad luck. After he made a save on a Groot, Zimmerman picked up the groundball and tried to run the ball out of danger, but freshman attackman Ryan Young's feet inadvertently got caught up with Zimmerman's giving UNC a one-minute man-advantage. But the Tar Heels didn't need that long. Cryder DiPietro scored from the right alley seconds into the penalty to cut the lead to 6-4 at 2:22.

But the momentum swung Maryland's way again less than 30 seconds following DiPietro's goal when freshman attackman Grant Catalino scored an unassisted goal at the 1:59 mark to send the game to the half with the Terps holding a 7-4 lead.

For the third consecutive quarter the Tar Heels drew first blood when Ben Hunt scored an unassisted goal at the 13:35 mark. But for the third straight time the Terps answered right back. Reynolds scored his second of the game on a running jump shot from the right alley to boost the lead back to three goals.

After more than eight scoreless minutes Maryland added another goal to build a 9-5 lead. Senior midfielder Drew Evans ran past a Tar Heel defender behind the left side of the UNC goal and slipped a shot past Zimmerman.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Redshirt junior goalie Jason Carter had a career-day, making a career-best 15 saves, to help lead the fourth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to a 13-7 win over No. 1 Virginia in front of more than 4,000 fans at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium and a national television audience tuning in on ESPN2.

The Terps' victory over the top-ranked Cavaliers is the programs' first win over a No. 1 team at home since 1996 when Maryland topped Virginia 13-11. The last time Maryland dropped a No. 1 team overall was on March 4, 2006 when the Terps took down No. 1 Duke, 8-7 in overtime, at Koskinen Stadium in Durham, N.C.

Carter and the entire Terrapin defense were spectacular in the cage for the Terps, especially in the first half. The Crownsville, Md., native made seven of his 15 saves in the first 30:00 to help Maryland hold the Cavaliers to just three goals, allowing the Terrapin offense to build a 9-3 lead at the half. Coming into the game, Virginia had been averaging more than eight goals per game in the first half and had not trailed at halftime in any of its games this year.

While the defense took care of business on its end of the field, the Maryland offense was clicking on all cylinders at the other side of the field. The freshman attack trio of Travis Reed, Grant Catalino and Ryan Young combined for six goals and three assists. Young got the ball rolling for Maryland with the game's opening goal at the 13:01 mark.

Redshirt junior Jeff Reynolds continued his hot shooting streak, scoring the next two goals to give the Terps a 3-0 lead with less than five minutes elapsed. Reynolds' first score came off a face-off, which was won by sophomore Bryn Holmes. Holmes was jumped as he entered the Cavalier box, but was able to flip the ball to Reynolds, who got a shot past Virginia goalie Adam Ghitelman.

Virginia finally got on the board at the 3:34 mark on an unassisted goal by Peter Lamade, but Maryland responded with back-to-back goals by Reed and senior midfielder Will Dalton to boost the lead to 5-1. Reed scored on a wrap-around shot from behind the right side of the Wahoo goal. Dalton, who won 8-of-14 face-offs on the day, took then ensuing draw straight down the field and beat Ghitelman from the right alley.

Brian Carroll seemed to give Virginia a little momentum with a man-up goal at the 10:45 mark, but it was Maryland that would go on a run and really take control of the game. Dalton won the face-off following Carroll's score and it took the Terps just 61 seconds to strike back. Young skipped a pass to Reed on the left side, where the Cockeysville, Md., native ripped a shot into the Virginia net.

Reed followed that up with his third goal of the game on a low shot from the left wing. The Terrapin lead grew to 9-2 on unassisted goals by junior midfielder Rob Morrison and freshman Tony Mendes. Virginia was able to cut the lead to six going into halftime thanks to another goal by Lamade.

The Wahoos came out of the break looking to whittle away at the Maryland lead and back-to-back goals by Ben Rubeor and Rhamel Bratton had it down to four, the closest it had been since the 9:37 mark of the second quarter.

But the Terps would not allow the game to slip away from them and responded with a pair of goals of their own. Reed found Reynolds open on the right alley and the Bel Air, Md., native ripped an overhand shot past Ghitelman for his second straight hat trick. Catalino followed that up with his first goal of the game, an unassisted score from the left alley. The freshman from Webster, N.Y., used his entire 6-foot-5 frame to screen Ghitelman, who didn't see the shot until it was already in the goal.

For the third-straight quarter, Virginia closed the scoring, this time on Bratton's second goal of the period to send Maryland into the final 15 minutes with an 11-6 lead.

That lead grew to six goals just 10 seconds into the quarter thanks to an incredible individual effort by Catalino. With Virginia's Matt Kelly draped all over his back, Catalino was able find a way to get off a good shot that found a way into the Cavalier goal.

Both defenses controlled much of the fourth quarter and it was fitting that a defensive player netted the Terps' final goal of the game. Sophomore long pole Brian Farrell finished a successful clear for Maryland and used a terrific ball fake to get a clear shot at the Virginia goal and the Towson, Md., native buried a shot for his fifth goal of the season.

Virginia's Garrett Billings scored the game's final goal at the 1:06 mark to make the final score 13-7 in favor of the Terps.

Maryland's face-off duo of Holmes and Dalton controlled the tempo of the game at the face-off X, winning 15-of-23 draws and picking up four groundballs apiece.

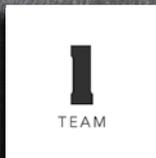

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The University of Maryland men's lacrosse team mounted a valiant comeback attempt, but it fell one goal short in a 5-4 loss to No. 9 Navy in front of 7,106 fans at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium.

The Midshipmen built a 5-0 lead through the first 30 minutes of play, but the Terps came out from halftime determined to climb back into the contest.

The Terrapins were finally able to break through a staunch Navy defense at the 4:04 mark of the third quarter. Freshman attackman Ryan Young picked up the first of his two assists by dumping a pass to the right side of the crease where senior midfielder Drew Evans banded it home to get the Terps on the board.



Senior Max Ritz and junior Dan Groot hooked up for the next two Maryland scores, converting on both of the Terrapins' man-up opportunities. Groot scored with 1:30 left in the third off an assist by Ritz. Groot then returned the favor by assisting Ritz's man-up score at the 9:30 mark. That goal made the game 5-3 in favor of Navy, but all of the momentum was on Maryland's side.

That momentum continued less than two minutes later when sophomore long pole Dan Halayko caused a turnover, which led to the next Maryland goal. Halayko stripped Tim Paul and senior defenseman Joe Cinosky pushed the ball up the field. BALTIMORE - The University of Maryland men's lacrosse team dropped a 10-4 decision at No. 15 Johns Hopkins in front of 8,626 fans at Homewood Field.

The first quarter was, as expected, a hard-hitting, physical start to the game. Hopkins jumped out to a 1-0 lead thanks to a running left-hander down the left alley by Paul Rabil. The Blue Jays upped their lead to 2-0 at the 2:47 mark when Steven Boyle dumped a pass to Michael Doneger in front of the crease where he one-timed a shot past Maryland goalie Jason Carter.

After another Doneger goal grew the lead to 3-0, the Terps finally got on the board with 7:15 left in the second quarter. Senior All-American Joe Cinosky stabbed a Hopkins pass out of the air and hit a running Brian Farrell in stride to start the fast break. COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The only player who could score on Brian Phipps at Ludwig Field was Brian Phipps. The sophomore goalie made a career-best 17 saves to lead the No. 7 Maryland men's lacrosse team to a 9-4 win over Penn.

Phipps, the 2007 ACC Freshman of the Year, was spectacular in the cage, stopping everything shot his way from a simple stab to stop a simple shot headed for the top corner to a sensational diving save in the second quarter when he left the crease to go after a loose ball. The only goal Phipps allowed on the day came at the 9:05 mark of the first quarter. Phipps made his fourth save of the game, stopping a shot by Corey Winkoff, but the ball was knocked out of his stick and bounced into the Terrapin goal.

But that was the last time the Quakers would score for the next 51:12. The Terrapin defense was solid all afternoon and while Penn did out-shoot Maryland 43-32 the Terps' "D" held the Quakers to a shooting percentage of less than 10 percent. The defensive effort was spearheaded by senior All-America candidate Joe Cinosky, who

set a career-best with six groundballs to go along with two caused turnovers.

Also contributing to the defensive performance was the play of face-off men Bryn Holmes and Will Dalton. The two combined to win 9-of-15 draws and pick up eight groundballs.

Not to be outdone, the Terrapin offense played its best game since the end of March. Freshman attackman Travis Reed made his return to the Maryland line-up noticeable right from the start by picking up the first of his career-best four assists on senior Max Ritz's goal at the 12:15 mark of the first quarter on a runner from the right alley.

Maryland built a 2-0 lead on another runner, this one coming from the left alley by junior Jeremy Sieverts off an assist from freshman Grant Catalino.

After Winkoff was credited with the lone goal allowed by Phipps, the game remained 2-1 in favor of Maryland until just under the seven-minute mark of the second quarter. Sophomore long pole Brian Farrell keyed the Terrapin transition game, picking-off a J.J. Lian pass and taking it the other way into the Maryland offensive zone. The ball found its way to Reed just behind the right side of the Quaker goal. He spotted a hustling Chris Rhine and zipped a pass into the crease that Rhine deftly one-timed past Penn goalie Chris Casey.

Reed added his third assist less than two minutes later with another dump pass inside the crease. This time it was Catalino on the receiving end and the big 6-foot-5, 240-pound attackman was able to get a good handle on the pass and finish the play despite a Quaker defender draped on his back.

Dan Groot kept the momentum going for the Terps at the start of the third quarter with an unassisted goal at the 11:58 mark. The Junior all-American dodged inside of a Penn defender and slipped a left-handed shot low past Casey to give the Terps a 5-1 lead.

That four-goal margin remained until the Terps went on a four-goal scoring spree, stretching from the final 3:55 of the third quarter until the 14:49 mark of the fourth.

Junior attackman Scott Tompkins started the run for the Terps and was the beneficiary of a good groundball and feed from Ritz. A scramble to the side of the Quaker goal ended when Ritz picked up a tough groundball in a crown and was able to find Tompkins all alone in front of the Penn goal. Tompkins was then able to fake-out Casey and slip a shot between Casey's legs for the score.

Maryland's next goal came on its lone extra-man opportunity of the game. Freshman attackman Brett Weiss sent a quick skip pass over to Catalino on the right wing and Catalino dipped down and laced a low shot for the score at the 1:15 mark.

Sophomore midfielder Adam Sear got into the scoring column for the Terps as the second ticked down in the third quarter. Sear gave Reed his fourth assist of the day by firing another low shot from the left alley past Casey for an 8-1 Terrapin advantage.

The 4-0 run came to a close off of the opening face-off of the fourth quarter. Holmes picked the ball clean from Penn's Justin Lynch and got the ball to redshirt-junior Jeff Reynolds, who was running free down the right alley. Reynolds then ripped a shot into the Quaker goal for an eight-goal Maryland lead.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. -The University of Maryland men's lacrosse team dropped an 11-8 decision to No. 3 Virginia at Klöckner Stadium in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament.

The Cavaliers jumped out on top early with back-to-back goals by Garrett Billings. The Terps got on the board with a terrific wrap-around goal by freshman Ryan Young to cut the lead to one. Ben Rubeor pushed it back to two goals with an unassisted goal with 5:36 left in the first quarter. The lead was almost three, but redshirt junior goalie Jason Carter made a fantastic 1-on-1 save during a Cavalier man-up opportunity. COLLEGE PARK, Md. -It was "Senior Day" for the eighth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team, but it was freshman Grant Catalino that stole the show in the Terps' 16-10 win over the Yale Bulldogs at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium.

The 6-foot-5, 240-pound attackman from Webster, N.Y., led all scorers with a career-high seven points on four goals and a career-best three assists. Catalino's seven points are the most by a Terp since March 20, 2007 when Michael Phipps had seven in a win over Mount St. Mary's.

Maryland (9-5) never trailed in the game and showed a good inside-outside scoring balance. That was evident with the Terps' first two goals, both of which featured Catalino. The Webster, N.Y., native showed off his feeding ability with a great look inside to a cutting Scott Tompkins, who was making his first career start. Tompkins smoothly caught the ball and ripped a shot into the Bulldog goal for a 1-0 lead. Catalino's shooting prowess was on display less than two minutes later when he picked up a groundball in the left alley and ripped a quick low-to-high shot past Eli goalie George Carafides.

Yale scored two of the game's next three goals to pull to within one at 3-2, but senior midfielder Drew Evans' goal off an assist from junior All-American Dan Groot at the 6:18 mark kicked off a seven-goal Maryland scoring run that put the game out of reach. Groot fed Evans with a quick look inside the crease for the easy score. The play began back in the Eli zone with a turnover caused by sophomore long pole Dan Halayko.

Maryland's outside-shooting midfielders picked up the next two goals with freshman Tony Mendes and redshirt junior Jeff Reynolds both ripping shots into the cage from outside of 12 yards.

Evans was on the giving end of the Terps' next goal. He dropped a simple pass into the crease to freshman Travis Reed, who one-timed the ball past Carafides to give Maryland a 7-2 lead with 12:39 left in the second quarter. Reynolds followed that up with another outside laser from the left alley less than a minute later to boost the lead to six goals.

Reed scored his second goal of the game with a low-to-high shot from a tight angle just inside the right goal line extended. Picking up an assist on Reed's goal was freshman attackman Brett Weiss.

The scoring-run was finished with some trickery by sophomore Brian Farrell. After Holmes won the face-off following Reed's goal, Farrell lost his defender by faking like he was going to sub out for an offensive midfielder. Redshirt freshman Dan Burns, who picked up the groundball off the face-off recognized the opening and quickly fired a pass to Farrell. A Yale defender slid to cover the long pole, but Farrell was able to find a wide-open Holmes on the crease, who bounced a shot in for the score.

Kyle Washabaugh broke up the scoring run with his only goal of the game at the 2:38 mark, but Maryland answered right back with an unassisted goal by junior David O'Quinn. Greg DuBoff closed out the first half with his second goal of the game with 1:05 left on the clock.

After seven goals combined in the first and eight in the second, the teams settled in in the third quarter. The Bulldogs outscored the Terps 3-1 in the third. Senior face-off man Will Dalton sandwiched the only Maryland goal between two Davis Lindsey goals. Catalino got his third assist on Dalton's score with a quick skip pass from the left alley cross-field to the right alley, where Dalton ripped a shot for his first of two goals on the day.

The Eli's scored twice more following Lindsey's second goal to get to within four goals at 12-8, but Dalton scored on his patented bull-dodge through the right alley after picking the face-off clean at the 10:47 mark. Catalino then scored back-to-back goals off assists by Jeremy Sievers and Groot, respectively, to boost the lead back to seven at 15-8 with 5:57 left in the fourth.

Brendan Gibson scored two of his three goals on the day less than two minutes apart to trim the Bulldog deficit to five, but Catalino put the icing on the Terps' cake with his fourth goal of the day off an assist by Burns at the 2:06 mark to give Maryland the 16-10 victory.

Maryland's face-off combination of Dalton (6-of-14), Holmes (9-of-13) and Reynolds (2-of-3) won 17-of-30 battles at the X, including a decisive 6-of-9 in the second quarter that led to six Terrapin goals. Dalton led the Terps with five groundballs, while Holmes and Reynolds had three apiece.

Senior All-American Joe Cinosky had a tremendous final regular season home game with three groundballs and a pair of caused turnovers. Fifth-year seniors Ryne Adolph and Jacob Baxter each had a groundball and a caused turnover in the game as well. Senior long pole Matt Rankin set his career high with three groundballs.



COLLEGE PARK, Md. -The seventh-seeded University of Maryland men's lacrosse team used a 7-0 run to put away the Denver Pioneers by a 10-7 margin in the first round of the NCAA men's lacrosse tournament at Chevy Chase Bank Field at Byrd Stadium.

Freshman attackman Grant Catalino had four points on two goals and a pair of assists to lead five Terps with at least two points. The defense, which held the Pioneers without a goal for 30:06, was led by senior All-American Joe Cinosky, who had four groundballs and four caused turnovers.

The Pioneers jumped out to an early 2-0 lead on goals by John Dickenson and Joey Murray, but Maryland got on the board at the 8:31 mark of the first quarter on Catalino's first score of the day on an assist by sophomore Bryn Holmes. Denver's Brett Koll built the lead back to two goals with his only goal of the game with 6:12 to play in the quarter.

Senior midfielder Max Ritz scored the first of his two goals to trim the deficit to one at the 3:54 mark. Freshman Ryan Young picked up the assist with a great pass from behind the net to Ritz, who was cutting across the field to the right wing.

The second quarter started just like the first with the Pioneers scoring the first two goals of the quarter to take a 5-2 lead, but that's as close as they would get the rest of the afternoon as the Terps would go on a 7-0 run to take control of the game.

Helping the Terps' cause was Denver's penchant for fouling. Down by three with seven minutes remaining in the half the Maryland extra-man unit converted on 3-of-5 opportunities to tie the game at 5-5 going into halftime.

Junior midfielder Jeremy Sieverts scored the first man-up goal for Maryland with a quick bounce shot from the left alley that was set-up by a good look from Catalino. Sieverts figured in on the next EMO goal, this time picking up the assist with a pass to Ritz, who scored with a terrific shot to the short-side on Denver goalie Austin Konkel, who kept the Pioneers in the game in the first half with 11 saves. He finished with 13 for the game.

The man-up group kept on clicking and tied the game at 5-5 with 48 seconds remaining in the half. Catalino earned his third point of the half with a quick look inside to freshman Brett Weiss, who quickly turned and got off a good low shot before the Denver defense could converge.

The third quarter was played closer to the vest and saw only two goals scored, both by the Terps - sort of. Junior All-American Dan Groot scored the period's first goal at the 6:12 mark. Groot fired a shot on the run from the right wing that appeared to be headed wide, but it hit Denver defender Dillon Roy and deflected into an open Pioneer net. That goal gave the Terps their first lead of the game.

Maryland's second goal of the third came off of one of Denver's 29 turnovers on the day. After a failed clear by the Pioneers, Terrapin sophomore long-pole Brian Farrell picked up the ball and rushed into the Denver zone. As the defense collapsed he flicked a pass to Young, who was laced a shot past Konkel for a 7-5 Maryland lead.

The Terps' scoring run continued in the fourth quarter only this time it wasn't the man-up unit doing the damage it was the man-down group that put up a goal. After Jeff Reynolds was called for a delay of game penalty, Farrell picked off a pass by Denver's Cliff Smith and connected on an outlet pass to Cinosky for the clear attempt. Cinosky advanced the ball into the Maryland attack zone, but none of the Pioneer defenders stepped out to stop him, so Cinosky gave the ball a quick cradle and laced a shot from 10 yards out for his first career goal.

The run finished with Catalino's second score of the day and the play was started with another Pioneer turnover caused by Cinosky. Groot picked up the assist on the goal by dodging down the left alley, drawing a pair of Denver defenders. That left Catalino wide open along the right goal-line extended and he beat Konkel one-on-one to give Maryland a 9-5 lead with 10:31 left in the game.

Denver, which had outscored its opponents by 21 goals in the fourth quarter during the season, refused to give in and got goals from Charley Dickenson and Ilija Gajic to bring the Pioneers to within a pair of goals at 9-7.

But with just over four minutes remaining the Pioneers started pressing on the defensive end, including double-teaming the ball with their goalie. That left an open net for the Terps and senior Drew Evans was able to split the double and score an empty-netter with 1:01 left to close the scoring and send Maryland into the quarterfinals with the 10-7 win.

Sophomore goalie Brian Phipps played the final 30:00 for the Terps in goal and made six saves while allowing just two goals. Redshirt junior Jason Carter made three saves in the first half for Maryland. Overall 10 Terps combined to force 21 of Denver's 29 turnovers. Farrell caused a career-best four, while senior Ryne Adolph and Reynolds tied their career-highs with three apiece.

ANNAPOLIS, Md. -Ben Rubeor scored his third goal of the game with 34 seconds left in overtime to send the No. 2 Virginia Cavaliers to an 8-7 win over No. 7 Maryland in the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium.

The first quarter was one of runs with both teams putting together 3-0 scoring spurts. The Terps started things off with a goal from freshman Grant Catalino off an assist from senior Max Ritz. A slick pick-and-roll ended with Catalino one-on-one with Virginia goalie Bud Petit, but Catalino ball-faked three times before sticking it in for the 1-0 lead.

Maryland took a 2-0 lead just 10 seconds later off the ensuing face-off. Redshirt junior Jeff Reynolds scooped up the ball of the wing and raced down the center of the field and hit a runner at the 9:04 mark.

An unlikely source gave the Terps their 3-0 lead with 7:16 left in the opening quarter. After sophomore Bryn Holmes caused a

Wahoo turnover near midfield on a Virginia clear attempt, freshman longstick Brett Schmidt picked up the loose ball and fired a shot from 30 yards into the Cavalier net, which was open with Petit out of the goal on the clear.

That lead wouldn't hold though and the teams headed to the second quarter tied at 3-3 after Virginia scored three times in the last 5:41 of the first. Steve Giannone scored first for Virginia followed by scores by Garrett Billings and Danny Glading.

Catalino put the Terps out ahead early in the second with a low-to-low shot from the left wing off an assist by junior Jeremy Sieverts. Sieverts then got into the scoring act himself with an unassisted goal at the 10:51 mark. Sieverts took the ball near midfield and dodged down the left alley and ripped a shot into the upper right corner for a 5-3 Maryland lead.

An unassisted goal by Rubeor at 1:29 pulled the Cavaliers to within one, but Maryland's defense chalked up another goal to push the lead back to a pair heading into halftime. Sophomore Bryn Holmes, who had four caused turnovers and three groundballs in the opening 30 minutes, led the charge into the Wahoo zone and flipped a pass to sophomore longstick Brian Farrell in the left alley. Farrell faked a pass to get free and laced a low-to-low shot from 12 yards out for the 6-4 Terrapin advantage.

Farrell gave Maryland a three-goal cushion with his second goal of the game to start the scoring in the second half. He caused a turnover in the Terps' defensive zone, hustled back on the fast break and got the ball back from Sieverts in the right alley and hit a bounce shot past Petit.

But the Cavaliers fought back and trimmed the Maryland lead back to a goal heading into the fourth. Glading scored an unassisted goal at 4:05 on a wrap-around from behind the left side of the Maryland goal. Rhamel Bratton scored another unassisted goal for Virginia with a quick shot into the top right corner of the Terp goal.

Maryland appeared to draw first blood at the 13:55 mark of the fourth to take a two-goal lead on a Travis Reed goal, but the goal was waived off by the officials due to a Virginia loose-ball push prior to the shot.

Virginia took advantage of the call and knotted the game at 7-7 with 8:43 remaining on an unassisted goal by Rubeor from the right wing. Both teams had opportunities during the quarter, but neither could get another goal sending the game into overtime.

Defensively Maryland was led by Holmes, who finished the game with six groundballs and five caused turnovers. Senior Jacob Baxter had four groundballs and a caused turnover, while Farrell had two groundballs and a pair of caused turnovers.
