THE COUNT DOWN

- 10 ... 10 different Terps have tallied at least 10 points this season (2008 was the only other time since 2002 that this has happened).
- 9 ... Brian Phipps made nine saves in the Terps' 7-3 victory over Notre Dame in the first round of the 2009 NCAA tournament.
- 8 ... This is Maryland's eighth straight appearance in the NCAA tournament, which is the second-longest active streak.
- 7 ... Over the Terps' last seven games, Bryn Holmes has won 82 of 128 face-offs (.641).
- 6 ... Six Terp long poles have combined for 20 points (9g, 11a), which leads all NCAA Div. I schools in long-pole scoring.
- 5 ... Five Terps (B. Schmidt, Farrell, Bohlander, M. Schmidt, Je. Bernhardt) have double-digit caused turnovers.
- 4 ... Maryland and Notre Dame have met four times with the Terps winning all four games by a combined total of 45-26.
- 3 ... For the first time since 2001, the Terps have three players with at least 37 points (Catalino, Young & Reed)
- 2 ... The Terps have played two NCAA tournament games at Princeton (2005 vs. Georgetown, 1992 vs. Princeton).
- 1 ... ACC schools have lost only one non-conference game in 2010 - ND d. Duke, 11-7, on Feb. 20.

FACING OFF

#3 TERPS FACE NOTRE DAME IN NCAA QUARTERFINALS AT PRINCETON

- The No. 3 seeded Maryland men's lacrosse team will face unseeded Notre Dame in the quarterfinals of the 2010 NCAA Tournament at Princeton Stadium. Face-off is set for 12 noon, as the Terps (12-3 overall) battle the Fighting Irish (8-6) for the third time in post-season play. The game will be televised live on ESPNU. Eamon McEnaney will provide the play-by-play, while the analysis will come from Quint Kessenich.
- The Terps are making their 33rd NCAA Tournament appearance, the second most of any school in NCAA history. Notre Dame is making its 15th appearance in the NCAA men's lacrosse tournament after earning an at-large bid out of the Big East.
- The winner of the Maryland/Notre Dame game will advance to the Final Four in Baltimore and will face the winner of the No. 7 seed Cornell (11-5)/Army (11-5) game on Saturday, May 29 at M&T Bank Stadium. The Big Red and the Black Knights play in Stony Brook, N.Y., on Sunday, May 23 at noon.
- Maryland is 12-3 on the year and is coming off of a tough 11-18 victory over Hofstra in the first round of the tournament. The Terps had 10 different goal scorers in the victory over the Pride. Notre Dame advanced with an 8-5 road victory over No. 6 seed Princeton. David Early scored five goals vs. the Tigers, while Scott Rodgers made 14 saves.

GAME NOTES

COACHING MATCH-UP

- Now in his 28th season as a head coach, Dave Cottle enters today's game with a 280-114 career record for a .711 win percentage, sixth-highest among active coaches with at least 100 career wins. His win total is seventh among active coaches. He is 99-44 (.692) in nine seasons at Maryland.
- Kevin Coorigan is in his 24th season as a head coach, with all but one of them at the helm of the Notre Dame Fighting Irish. During his 24 years as a head coach he has compiled a 214-117 (.646) career record. At Notre Dame his record is 204-102 (.667).
- Cottle has a 12-2 career record vs. Notre Dame. He is 3-0 vs. the Irish as the Terrapin's head coach. Prior to arriving in College Park he was 9-2 as the head coach at Loyola.

SERIES HISTORY VS. NOTRE DAME

- Maryland has won all four games against the Irish, which started a varsity men's lacrosse program in 1981.
- These two teams met in the first round of the NCAA tournament in 2009 in South Bend, Ind., but it was the visiting, unseeded Terps that pulled off the 7-3 upset over the Fighting Irish. Dan Groot scored two goals, while Will Yeatman, who returned to the Notre Dame campus for the first time since transferring to Maryland prior to the 2009 season, and Ryan Young each had two assists. Brian Phipps was solid in cage for the Terps, stopping nine Irish shots.
- The teams played a one-for-one series in 2003 and 2004. Before that the team's played their first-ever game in 1995 in the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament.

- It took two overtimes to decide the 2004 meeting between the Terps and the Irish, but in the end it was Maryland leaving Bryd Stadium with the 9-8 victory. Brendan Healy was the hero for the Terrapins, scoring the game-winner just nine seconds into the second overtime. Those heroics wouldn't have been possible without some from J.R. Bordley, who's goal with 19 seconds left in regulation tied the game at 8-8. Joe Walters led all scorers in the game with three goals, while goalie Tim McGinnis was sensation in cage for the Terps, stopping 16 Notre Dame shots.

- The 2003 meeting saw Maryland post a 10-4 win at Moose Krause Stadium in Notre Dame, Ind. on May 3. A stifling defense shutdown the Irish's top two scorers as the then-No. 4 Terps gave coach Dave Cottle his 200th career coaching victory. The Terps' All-American defense of Michael Howley, Chris Passavia and Lee Zink, along with goalie Danny McCormick, held Patrick Walsh and Dan Berger pointless. Zink had a huge game with nine groundballs and seven caused turnovers. On offense, Justin Smith, Ryan Moran, Joe Walters and Brian Hunt each had two goals.
- Maryland eliminated Notre Dame from the 1995 NCAA Tournament with a 19-11 win at Byrd Stadium on May 20, 1995. The Terps advanced to the national championship game for the first of three times in a four-year span that season. In that game, Maryland built a 10-2 lead with 5:59 left in the third quarter before the Irish mounted a furious comeback to cut the score to 11-10 Maryland with 9:48 left in the fourth quarter. But Maryland held on behind the Nation's Outstanding Goalie of the Year Brian Dougherty, who made 16 saves. Ten different Terps scored goals including two each by Pat McGuire, Peter Hilgartner and Kip Fulks. Rob Chomo had four assists and a goal in the win.

MARYLAND'S 33RD TIME AT NCAA'S

- Maryland is making its 33rd overall NCAA Tournament appearance in 2010. The Terps have played in the second-most tournaments since the event began in 1971. Only Hopkins has played in more with 38. Virginia is also making its 33rd NCAA appearance.
- In the quarterfinals of the tournament, the Terrapins have a 19-10 (.655) record overall. The last time the Terps advanced to the quarters was last season. Maryland, the lone unseeded team to make it past the first round, battled No. 2 seed Syracuse. The Orange won the game, which was notable for **Brian Phipps** tearing his left ACL early in the first quarter, 11-6 en route to their second consecutive national championship.
- The Terps have captured two NCAA championships, 1973 and 1975, and have reached the NCAA Semifinals 19 times, including three of the last seven years.

MARYLAND'S RECORD IN NCAA'S

- The Terps have won the third-most Division I NCAA Tournament games, compiling a 42-30 overall record in 72 games. Only Johns Hopkins (65-30) and Syracuse (57-19) have won more Division I tournament games. Virginia has also won 42 games in NCAA tournament play.
- Maryland is sixth by percentage (.583) among all teams ever to play in the tournament. Only Syracuse (58-19, .753), Princeton (30-13, .698), Johns Hopkins (65-30, .684), Virginia (42-28, .600) and Cornell (28-19, .596) are ahead of the Terps.
- The Terps have captured two titles. Only six other schools have ever won the NCAA Championship: Syracuse (10), Johns Hopkins (9), Princeton (6), North Carolina (4), Virginia (4) and Cornell (3) and all of them are in this year's field of 16.

COTTLE IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

- This is **Dave Cottle's** eighth NCAA Tournament appearance as the head coach of Maryland. He is coaching his 22nd team to the NCAA Tournament, with the first 14 coming during his stint at Loyola. All 14 of his appearances with the Greyhounds came consecutively starting with the 1988 season and going through the 2001 campaign.
- Overall, Cottle is 18-21 in NCAA Tournament games, which ranks him fifth among all coaches in the 2010 tournament in wins. Only Denver's Bill Tierney (30), Syracuse's John Desko (30), Virginia's Dom Starsia (30) and Hopkins' Dave Pietramala (20) have more tournament wins to their credit among this year's crop.
- With his 22nd tournament appearance, Cottle is tied for first place on the all-time list for most NCAA Tournament Division I appearances as a head coach with Virginia's Dom Starsia. Syracuse's Roy Simmons Jr. and Towson's Tony Seaman are second with 19. With his streak of 14-consecutive tournaments while at Loyola, Cottle is behind only to Simmons Jr. (19) and Bill Tierney (15), for the longest-consecutive streak.
- Cottle has led his teams to the NCAA Quarterfinals on 18 occasions and to the NCAA semifinals five times, making an appearance in the 1990 championship game where Loyola fell to Syracuse, 21-9. He also reached the NCAA semifinals as the No. 1 seed with Loyola, but lost to Maryland, 19-8, at Byrd Stadium on May 23, 1998. At Maryland he has now lead the Terps to three semifinal berths, falling to eventual champion Virginia, 14-4, at M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore on May 24, 2003, a 18-9 loss to No. 2 seed Duke, 18-9, on May 28, 2005, and an 8-5 loss to UMass in 2006.

MARYLAND AS THE NO. 3 SEED

- Maryland is the No. 3 seed in the NCAA Tournament for the ninth time ever and fifth time since 2001. Maryland was previously a No. 3 seed in 1971, 1975, 1977, 1978, 2001, 2003, 2004 and 2005.
- The last time Maryland won the NCAA championship in 1975, the Terps were seeded No. 3. In 18 games as the No. 3 seed, Maryland has a 13-6 record.
- The last time the Terps were the third seed was 2005 when they beat Penn State, 14-10, in the first round. In the quarterfinals at Princeton, Maryland defeated Georgetown 9-8 in overtime. The Terps fell to Duke the Final Four in Philadelphia, 18-9.
- In 2004 the Terps topped Army, 16-12, in the first round in College Park. Maryland then suffered a 9-8 overtime loss to Princeton in Charlottesville, Va.
- No. 3 Maryland beat Ohio State, 8-5, in the first round in 2003 and then UMass, 13-7, in the quarterfinals at Syracuse before falling to eventual champion Virginia in the semifinals, 14-4.
- Maryland fell to No. 6 seed Towson, 12-11 at Byrd Stadium in the 2001 quarterfinals after receiving a first-round bye. That game was the finale for coach **Dick Edell**, who retired the following fall due to health problems.
- The 1978 tournament saw Maryland beat Virginia, 15-10, in the first round before losing to Johns Hopkins, 17-11, in the semifinals.

- The Terps were again the No. 3 seed in the 1977 tournament and handled Washington & Lee easily in the first round, 14-8. Maryland then lost to Johns Hopkins, 16-9, in the semifinals.
- Maryland's 1975 championship run started with a 19-11 victory over Hofstra. The Terps topped Washington & Lee in the semis by a 15-5 margin. Maryland then throttled Navy in the finals, 20-13.
- Maryland was the No. 3 seed in the very first NCAA tournament in 1971. The Terps beat Air Force, 10-1, in the first round. The Terps then defeated Navy in the semifinals, 10-7, before losing to No. 1 Cornell, 12-6, in the title game.

GET TO 10 AND WIN

- One of the things Coach Cottle often says is that if the Terps score 10 goals or more the chances of winning are pretty good. Well, a look at the results since Cottle arrived in College Park in 2002 shows that when Maryland scores 10 or more goals there's not just a pretty good chance the Terrapins will win; it's an almost certainty. Since 2002 Maryland has won 73 of the 79 games in which the Terps have scored 10 or more goals for a .924 winning percentage.
- On April 3 of this season the Terps lost to No. 1 Virginia by a final of 11-10, giving Maryland its first loss when scoring 10 or more goals this season.
- Last season the Terps lost to Georgetown, 13-10 on Feb. 21 and lost again when scoring 10 in the ACC Semifinals in a 16-10 defeat at North Carolina. Prior to that, Maryland had not lost when scoring 10 or more goals since dropping an 11-10 decision to Virginia in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament in Durham, N.C. The Terrapins got to 10 goals in the 100th game against Johns Hopkins, but the Blue Jays took the game 14-10. Virginia is the only team to beat the Terps twice when allowing 10 or more goals. The Wahoos did it first in 2002 with another 11-10 decision.

SHOOTING TELLS THE STORY

- The difference between winning and losing for Maryland this season is simple - when the Terps shoot well they win. Coach Dave Cottle is on record saying that good teams will shoot at least 30%. As it turns out 30% is the magic number for the Terps this season. Maryland is 12-3 on the year and has shot better than 30% in eight of the 15 contests.
- Since 2005 the Terps are a remarkable 38-2 (.950) when shooting 30% or better in a game. The first game Maryland lost during that stretch was a 13-10 decision to Georgetown in 2009 (the Terps shot 10 of 30 for 33.3% vs. the Hoyas). The second loss came this season in the controversial 11-10 loss to No. 1 Virginia on April 3. The Terps shot 10 of 33 for 30.3%.

BIG CAT CONTINUES TO PLAY BIG

- How good has Grant Catalino been in his first three seasons? The easy answer would be pretty good, but here's some numbers to back that claim up.
- In his first three seasons Catalino has the fourth-highest point total since freshman records were first kept in 1970.

- Here's how Catalino has moved up the charts this season: In the opener at Bellarmine he tied his career high with four assists and added a pair of goals for a six-point game in the 12-7 victory. In the Georgetown game, Catalino was matched-up with preseason Big East defensive player of the year Barney Ehrman, but Catalino still managed to tally three points on a goal and two assists. Catalino showed that the Konica Minolta Face-Off Classic is his own personal playground when he totaled six points on five goals, including the game winner in OT, in the Terps' 11-10 win over Duke. He was named the Player of the Game for the second straight year (last year in the Face-Off Classic he had two goals and four assists vs. the Blue Devils). Towson shadowed Catalino all over the field, but he still managed to get a point on an extra-man assist. Catalino showed his versatility against Penn by scoring twice, including once on the extra-man unit, and adding four assists. The Big Cat continued his hot shooting at UMBC, tying his career high with seven points on four goals, including the game-winner, and three assists. UNC tried to shutoff Catalino, but he still managed a multi-point game with a goal and an assist. Virginia again proved to be a thorn in Catalino's side, holding him without a point for the first time this season. Catalino rebounded nicely with a natural hat trick in the second quarter in the 11-9 win over Navy. M&T Bank Stadium continued to be good luck for Catalino as he tallied two goals and an assist vs. Johns Hopkins in the Smartlink Day of Rivals. Catalino had another signature game in the ACC semifinals vs. North Carolina when he tallied a career-best six goals, becoming the first Maryland player to score six times in a game since 2006 when Joe Walters had six at Johns Hopkins. He added a goal and an assist vs. Virginia in the ACC championship to up his tournament total to eight points on seven goals and one assist. Against Fairfield, Catalino had four goals and one assists to hit the 50-point mark for the first time in his career. Catalino finished the regular season with another three-point day, scoring two goals and adding one assist vs. Colgate. The first round of the NCAA tournament saw 10 different Terps score goals vs. Hofstra and Catalino was one of them, converting on Maryland's second goal of the day.
- With his second goal (out of five total on the day) vs. Duke Catalino became just the fifth Terp to reach the 100-point mark since Coach Cottle arrived in College Park in 2002. Catalino's one goal vs. Hofstra gives him 143 points on 88 goals and 55 assists, which puts him 21st on the all-time points list at Maryland. He is eight points away from tying Mike Mynes (1974-77, 151) for the 20th spot.
- Catalino is also moving up the career goals list. His 88 career goals ties him with Pat O'Meally (1972-74, 88) for 15th on the all-time list.

SOUTH BEND, Ind. - A dominating defensive performance, including nine saves by junior goalie Brian Phipps, led the University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to a 7-3 victory over previously unbeaten Notre Dame in the first round of the NCAA Men's Lacrosse tournament at Alumni Field on Sunday afternoon.

The Terps (10-6) got some good luck early as they jumped out to an early 2-0 lead. Senior Jeremy Sieverts tallied the first goal of the day, burying a bouncer from eight yards out from the center of the goal. The luck really kicked in on the second goal as junior Will Yeatman found a cutting Joe Cummings on the right side of the crease. The freshman got off a good shot that bounced off the body of Irish goalie Scott Rodgers and trickled into the Notre Dame goal.

The Irish cut the lead down with their first goal at the 10:22 mark as Zach Brenneman scored on a runner from the left side.

Maryland opened the second quarter with a slick two-man goal to push the lead back to a pair. Sophomore Ryan Young raced around the right side of the goal and slipped a pass to sophomore Grant Catalino, who rolled around the left side and stuck a shot into the top right corner for a 3-1 Terrapin lead.

The Terps got a boost from their third midfield with 5:11 in the second quarter when sophomore Warren Hansen fired a pass to the left alley where junior Adam Sear ripped a laser into the right side of the Irish net for a 4-1 Maryland advantage.

The third quarter started just like the first two with the Terps scoring early. This time it was senior Dan Groot finding the back of the Irish goal with a low-and-away lefty shot to build the lead to 5-1 in favor of Maryland.

The third midfield struck again to give Maryland a five-goal advantage with 10 minutes left in the third. Senior Rob Morrison took a pass from Young on the right alley and laced a sidearm shot stick-side past Rodgers.

The long scoreless stretch for the Irish, which spanned 30:47, finally was snapped by an unassisted goal by Peter Christman with 3:51 left in the third, but the Terps stymied the Notre Dame push and headed into the fourth quarter with a 6-2 lead.

The lead grew back to five with less than two minutes into the fourth. The Notre Dame defense was busy trying to adjust to Maryland's substitutions and lost track of Groot, who cut to the crease and one-timed a pass from Yeatman for his second goal of the day.

Notre Dame refused to give in and tried to climb back into the game with a goal by Grant Krebs with 7:38 left. But a standout performance by Phipps in goal and a dominating performance for the Maryland defense preserved the victory for the Terps. Sophomores Brett Schmidt and Max Schmidt combined for six groundballs and a pair of caused turnovers, while junior Dan Halayko had three groundballs.

Game Notes:

- With today's 7-3 win Maryland is now 4-0 all-time vs. Notre Dame and 2-0 all-time vs. the Irish in NCAA tournament play.
- Sophomore Ryan Young, with two assists, now has 23 multi-point and 10 multi-assist games in his career.
- Senior Dan Groot, with two goals, now has 26 multi-point and 13 multi-goal games in his career.
- The Maryland defense held Notre Dame scoreless for 30:47, spanning the first to third quarters. It was the eighth time this season a Terrapin opponent has been held without a goal for 20+ minutes.
- Maryland shutout the Irish in the second quarter, marking the eighth time this season that the defense has held an opponent scoreless in a quarter.

- Since Coach Cottle arrived in College Park in 2002 only 10 players (for a total of 17 times) have totaled 35 points or more in the first 15 games of a season. Three of those are on the 2010 team.
- Junior **Grant Catalino** is on an amazing pace (34-20=55). His total trails only Joe Walters' 66 points in 2004 and his 56 points in 2006. Catalino and Walters are the only two players to have 50 or more points in the first 15 games since 2002. Catalino and Walters are the only two players to make the list more than twice. Walters is on it four times (45-21=66, 2004; 34-22=56, 2006; 33-13=46, 2003; 31-15=46, 2005), while Catalino is on it three times. Catalino had 40 points on 27 goals and 13 assists as a freshman in 2008. He made the list again in 2009 with 43 points on 22 goals and 21 assists.
- Junior **Ryan Young** is also on the list this season with 47 points on 18 goals and 29 assists this year. His 29 assists are the most by any Terp through 15 games since 2002. Young is also on the list for his 2009 season when he had 35 points on 19 goals and 16 assists through 15 games.
- Junior **Travis Reed** also appears on the list. He now has 37 points on the season on 20 goals and 17 assists.
- This season marks the first time since 2002 that three Terp teammates have 35 or more points through 15 games. There are two players on the list from 2002 (Mike Mollot & Dan LaMonica), 2003 (Walters & Mollot), 2005 (Walters & Bill McGlone), 2006 (Walters & Xander Ritz), 2007 (Michael Phipps & Max Ritz) and 2009 (Catalino & Young).

NO TIME OFF FROM LAX

- For the first time since picking up a lacrosse stick as a youngster **Will Yeatman** did not take the fall off from lacrosse to play football. The 6-foot-6, 250-pounder has always missed fall lacrosse practice in the past, but due to NCAA scholarship rules he did not practice with the Terrapin football team this past fall. Yeatman will play for the Maryland football team this fall.
- Yeatman asked to try playing midfield this year and has been solid - both offensively and defensively - in the early part of the season. Yeatman had one goal in the season opener at Bellarmine. But Yeatman made his most significant impact as a Terps in the 15-13 win at No. 13 Georgetown on Feb. 27. He scored his first hat trick as a Terp with all three goals coming in a span of 5:47 during Maryland's 7-0 come-from-behind run. Yeatman didn't get another hat trick, but he had two key goals, including an extra-man score, in the 11-10 overtime win vs. Duke at the Face-Off Classic. The entire first midfield failed to register a point in the Towson win, but Yeatman got back on track against Penn with an extra-man assist in the first quarter. The entire first midfield kicked things into gear at UMBC and Yeatman contributed one goal in the 13-7 win.
- While Yeatman's time in the midfield was productive, and provided necessary time for the Terps' younger midfielders to gain experience, his move back to his natural attack position was phenomenal. In his first game back starting on attack, Yeatman scored a career high four goals and added an assist vs. No. 1 Virginia. A broken thumb sustained in practice on April 5 caused Yeatman to miss the Navy game, but he returned 10 days after undergoing surgery and had a goal and an assist vs. Johns Hopkins in the Smartlink Day of Rivals. Yeatman suffered a concussion vs. North Carolina in the ACC semifinals and missed the ACC finals vs. Virginia and the Fairfield game. He returned to action vs. Colgate and had two goals and one assist. Yeatman came off the bench again in the first round of the NCAA tournament vs. Hofstra and had another three-point game with one goal and two assists.

YOUNG BLOOD

- Ryan Young** has been the one constant to the Terps' attack during the past two seasons. The junior from Manhasset, N.Y., has missed just one game during his three years as a Terp and has only missed two start (the 2009 home finale when three senior attackmen were given the start vs. Binghamton and the 2010 senior day when he volunteered to come off the bench, allowing Fran Gormley to start). During his first three years he has racked up 114 points on 46 goals and 68 assists (which led the team over that three-year stretch). And Young has accomplished all of this while running the Terrapin offense from the X-spot. In 2009 he led the team with a .388 shooting percentage, which is the highest for a Maryland starting attackman since 2007 when Michael Phipps shot .394 for the year.
- After being shutout in the Terps' opener at Bellarmine, Young rebounded with a career day at No. 13 Georgetown. Against the Hoyas, Young set career highs with six points and five assists (four coming in the first half to help keep Maryland in the game). Young followed that performance with a solid one-goal, two-assist day in the Terps' 11-10 overtime win vs. Duke in the Face-Off Classic. In the Terps' home opener vs. Towson, Young scored twice and picked up three groundballs. Young's torrid streak continued against Penn with a four-point effort on two goals and two assists. The hot streak continued for Young at UMBC as he racked up three assists in the 13-7 victory. Young showed off his shooting touch at No. 2 North Carolina with a pair of goals, including a man-up tally. In the Virginia game, Young had a goal and two assists to help the Terps nearly overcome an early six-goal deficit. He followed that up with a five-point effort on a goal and four assists in the 11-9 win over Navy. Young had another solid outing in the Smartlink Day of Rivals event vs. Johns Hopkins with a goal and two assists. He continued his torrid pace with four points on a goal and three assists vs. North Carolina in the ACC tournament semifinals. After going point-less in the ACC finals vs. Virginia, Young got things back on track with a five-point outing vs. Fairfield (2g, 3a). Young returned home to Manhasset, N.Y., and had four points on two goals and two assists vs. Colgate at the Indians Rock Day of Champions. He then led the Terps with two goals and an assist vs. Hofstra in the first round of the NCAA tournament.
- With the one assist vs. Hofstra, Young has 68 for his career, placing him second in the "Cottle Era" in assists behind only Joe Walters, who had 74 assists from 2003-06.
- With his second point (an assist on Grant Catalino's second goal) vs. UNC in the ACC semis, Young became just the sixth Terp to reach the 100-point mark since Coach Cottle arrived in College Park in 2002, joining Joe Walters (227), **Grant Catalino (143)**, Max Ritz (111), Xander Ritz (110) and Bill McGlone (107). The thing that sets Young apart from the other five is that he is the only one to reach the 100-point plateau by having more assists than goals.
- Young's 114 points during his first three seasons is the 10th highest total point total since freshman records were first kept in 1970.

DAVE COTTLE

HEAD COACH • NINTH SEASON AT MARYLAND • SALISBURY '78

Since arriving to the College Park campus in the fall of 2001, Dave Cottle has continued the storied tradition of excellence of the Maryland men's lacrosse program and helped usher the Terps into a new era of national prominence.

Under Cottle's leadership the Terrapins have made eight-straight trips to the NCAA tournament, earned a top-three seed four times and advanced to the Final Four in 2003, 2005 and 2006. Since 2003, Maryland is one of only four programs to make three final four appearances.

Cottle is also deeply involved in the national leadership for the sport of lacrosse. He is currently serving a term on the NCAA Division I men's lacrosse committee and sits on the board of directors of the Intercollegiate Men's Lacrosse Coaches Association.

Prior to arriving in College Park, Cottle spent 19 seasons as the head coach at Loyola College. There he led the Greyhounds to 14 straight NCAA tournament appearances, including a pair of berths in the national semifinals.

Cottle, now in his 28th season as a head coach, is tied for first all-time in NCAA history with 22 NCAA tournament bids. He entered 2010 seventh among active coaches in wins with 268. His overall mark of 268-111 gives him a 70.7 winning percentage, which ranks sixth among active coaches with at least 100 wins.

During his tenure at Maryland, not only has the program continued to be among the sport's elite, but Terrapin players have also thrived and received national attention. In the past eight seasons under Cottle a total of 26 Terps have earned 45 All-America honors. Two Terps, Michael Howley in 2003 and Lee Zink in 2004, won the Schmeisser Memorial Cup, which is given annually to the nation's outstanding defender. In 2006, Joe Walters became Maryland's all-time leader in goals and points and was named the winner of the Jack Turnbull Memorial Award as the nation's top attackman.

The backbone of Cottle's success has been a strong work ethic and an emphasis on "student-athletes." Six of Cottle's Terrapin players earned USILA Scholar All-America honors, including 2005 graduate Ian Healy, who became just the third Maryland student-athlete to be inducted into Phi Beta Kappa, the nation's oldest and most prestigious academic society.

Cottle was named the eighth coach in the storied history of Maryland lacrosse on Sept. 26, 2001, taking the reins from the ACC's all-time winningest coach, Dick Edell, who retired on Sept. 3, 2001 after 18 years with the Terps.

Maryland advanced to its seventh-straight NCAA tournament in 2009 and advanced to the quarterfinals before losing to eventual-champion Syracuse. The Terps had several signature moments in 2009, including a dominating victory over Duke at M&T Bank Stadium at the Face-Off Classic and a first round victory in the NCAA tournament over undefeated Notre Dame in South Bend., Ind.

The 2008 Terps proved to be another masterful coaching job by Cottle. The squad featured an all-freshman starting attack that saw the trio finish 1-2-3 in team scoring. Maryland finished the season with a 10-6 mark and advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Tournament before falling in overtime.

The 2007 season, which was viewed by many as a "rebuilding year" for the Terps proved to be one of Cottle's finest seasons as a head coach. With an inexperienced offense and an injury-riddled defense, Cottle managed to lead Maryland to a 10-6 record and a No. 7-seed in the NCAA Tournament.

The Terps returned to the NCAA Final Four for the second straight season in 2006. Cottle's squad finished the year with a 12-5 record and earned Maryland the No. 2 seed in the NCAA tournament for just the second time in school history. Seven Terrapin players earned All-America honors with Walters and midfielder Bill McGlone being first team selections. Walters was also named the ACC Player of the Year for the second time in his career.

In 2005 Cottle directed Maryland to its ninth trip to the NCAA Semifinals and its second straight ACC tournament championship. The Terps ended the season with an overall record of 11-6, but finished the

season winning six of their last seven games. Six Maryland players were named postseason All-Americans, including McGlone, who was a first team selection. Cottle's program also earned another honor in June of 2005 when Walters was named to the 2006 U.S. National Team, the only college player to be selected to the 23-man roster.

Cottle guided the 2004 Terps to a 13-3 record and their first ACC championship since 1998. Maryland finished the season ranked No. 3 in the USILA poll and made it to the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament. Eight Terrapin players earned All-America honors, including three first team honorees.

In 2003 he led Maryland back to the NCAA Semifinals for the first since 1998. The Terps had a stellar season, including a No. 3 final ranking. Maryland piled numerous accolades as they had eight USILA All-Americans including Howley, who was a first-team honoree. The Terps posted a 12-4 record in 2003 and gave Cottle his third trip to the national semifinals.

He led his Loyola teams to top-10 finishes in each his 14 seasons. The Greyhounds finished with a winning record the final 18 years of his tenure, dating to 1984. Loyola also played in 14 consecutive NCAA Tournaments, entering the 1998 and 1999 tournaments as the No. 1 seed.

A Baltimore native, Cottle took over a struggling Greyhound program in 1983. Since posting a first-year record of 5-9, his only losing season in 25 years as a college head coach, Cottle's Loyola teams reeled off 18 consecutive winning seasons. The 1998 team's 13-2 campaign, which ended with a berth in the NCAA semifinals, saw Loyola reach a No. 1 national ranking, and earn the school's first No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

In 1988 the Greyhounds began a run of 14 consecutive NCAA tournament appearances. Loyola advanced to the national championship game in 1990, and made 10 NCAA quarterfinal appearances under Cottle.

The 1990 team, a potent mix of seasoned veterans and talented underclassmen, marched all the way to the NCAA championship game. In the semifinals the Greyhounds staged an incredible comeback to beat Yale, 14-13, in overtime. Syracuse, the two-time defending champs, ended Loyola's quest for the national title, but the Greyhounds' 1990 season always will be remembered.

In 1994 Cottle guided the Greyhounds to one of their best seasons ever. Loyola finished 11-2, recording wins against four NCAA tournament teams. The Greyhounds earned the nation's No. 1 ranking for only the second time in their history. Loyola concluded the regular season with a 17-15 victory over Johns Hopkins, the program's first victory ever against the Blue Jays.

Cottle's 1988 squad finished with a 12-2 record, earning Loyola's first NCAA Division I tournament berth. Loyola defeated Air Force for its first NCAA postseason victory before losing to Penn in the quarterfinals. The Greyhounds concluded the season ranked fifth in the nation, and Cottle earned USILA Coach-of-the-Year honors, becoming the first coach in Loyola athletic history to receive a national award. Cottle was also selected to coach the South team in the 1988 North-South All-Star Game.

The 1989 Greyhounds became the only Loyola lacrosse team to complete an undefeated regular season. The Greyhounds beat four nationally ranked teams en route to a perfect 10-0 mark. Loyola was ranked third in the final poll, behind eventual national champion Syracuse and Johns Hopkins.

Cottle came to Loyola in 1982 after leading Severn School to a 26-9 record and consecutive Maryland Scholastic Association championships. Prior to his success at Severn, Cottle served for two years as a graduate assistant coach, assistant varsity lacrosse coach and physical education instructor at his alma mater, Salisbury State University.

One of the finest players in Salisbury State history, Cottle was enshrined into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1989. During his career he re-wrote the NCAA record book, while earning All-America honors three times. He still ranks among the top three in goals (179), assists (123) and points (302) in Seagull history. In 1975 Cottle led the

nation in scoring and was just the second player in collegiate lacrosse history to score more than 100 points in a single season. Following his senior season in 1977, he served as captain of the South team in the North-South All-Star Game.

Cottle received his Bachelor of Science degree in physical education in 1978 from Salisbury.

He was an assistant coach for Team USA 1994, which won the world championship in Manchester, England. Cottle has addressed many lacrosse gatherings across the country, including the USILA Coaches' Convention, and he serves as a member of the All-America Selection Committee. In February of 1998 he was inducted into the Baltimore Chapter of the Lacrosse Foundation's Hall of Fame.

A graduate of Baltimore's Northern High School, Cottle lives with his wife, Lynn, daughters, Taylor and Tory, and son, Sean, in Edgewater, Md.

ATTACK RANKED TOP UNIT IN NATION

- Maryland has long had one of the best attack units in the nation, but this year, according to *Inside Lacrosse* at least, the Terps' attack unit is **the best** in the country. One thing in Maryland's favor is the depth of the unit. The Terps go five deep, all upperclassmen, on attack with juniors **Grant Catalino**, **Travis Reed** and **Ryan Young** and senior **Will Yeatman**, joined by sophomore **Joe Cummings**, who is also running with the first midfield.
- While it is hard to compare units across the country time provides perspective on how good this Terp attack unit is. Since 2004, this attack unit returns with more goals, assists and points than any other, taking into account just the top four attackmen. Take a look (*-returned the following year):

- The unit's total of 138 points is the second-best of the past six years, topped only by the 158 points of the 2006 attack that featured Turnbull Award winner Joe Walters, All-American Xander Ritz and 2007 All-American Michael Phipps.
- The total for the 2009 unit and the returning total is even more impressive when you add the 12 goals and two assists for Cummings. Although he played some midfield as a freshman in 2009, Cummings played crease attack on the man-up unit.
- The 2010 unit will be tracked in the chart above to see how they stack-up against the recent Terp attack units. The list was changed after the Virginia game when Yeatman was moved back to attack and Cummings was switched to the first midfield.

DEFENSE READY TO MEET EXPECTATIONS

- On paper this year's Maryland defense looks to be one of the best in recent memory, which says a lot about this group of Terps, but that also brings with it the pressure of living up to some pretty high standards. Maryland lost only one starter from this unit (2009 senior Mike Griswold), but the core remains in tact with 2009 All-American **Max Schmidt** returning to anchor the group. Along side him will be junior **Brett Schmidt** (no relation), who moved to close defense last season before the Duke game and turned in an All-American-caliber season. The third close defender spot was won in the preseason by junior **Ryder Bohlander**. The defense is sure to provide an offensive boost to the Terps thanks to the return of All-American long pole **Brian Farrell**, who missed all but three games in 2009 due to injury. The second long pole spot will be filled by senior **Dan Halayko**, who was the team's top long-stick middle during Farrell's absence. Preseason injuries junior long pole **Chris Ready** and sophomore **Grant Oliver** leaves the fourth defender and third long pole spot in the hands of freshman **Jesse Bernhardt**.

- During the last six seasons, Maryland held its' opponents scoreless for long stretches of game time. The 2004 Terps kept opponents scoreless for stretches of 20 or more minutes eight times. In 2005 Maryland did it on seven occasions, and was just seconds away from keeping the high-powered Duke (1st meeting) and Navy offenses off the board for more than 20 minutes. The 2006 season saw the Terrapin defense do it 10 times in 17 games. In 2007 Terp "D" had 11 20+ minute scoring droughts to its credit in 16 contests. In 2008, the Terp defense had six 20+-minute scoring droughts. The 2009 Terps held opponents scoreless for 20 minutes or more eight times, including two separate stretches at Penn. Maryland didn't have a 20+-minute scoreless stretch in its first nine games, but has had six since.
- Maryland's defense didn't get a 20-minute scoreless stretch at Bellarmine in the season opener, but it did hold the highly-motivated Knights, who were playing for their coach Jack McGetrick to whom the new locker room and concourse plaza was dedicated to prior to the game, off the board for 19:06. The starting close defense of **Ryder Bohlander**, **Brett Schmidt** and **Max Schmidt** combined for five groundballs and four caused turnovers. Junior **Scott LaRue** made the switch to defensive short-stick in the preseason and got into the scoring act with an assist on **Grant Catalino's** second goal.
- While the overall defensive stats don't look impressive, the defense came up big when it mattered most in the 15-13 come-from-behind win at No. 13 Georgetown. The Hoyas scored with 7:54 remaining in the third quarter to take an 11-7 lead, but the Terp "D" kept them off the board for the next 15:00 (not allowing another Hoya goal until the 7:54 mark of the fourth). That allowed the offense to go on a 7-0 scoring blitz to take a 14-11 lead. The defense also go into the scoring act at Georgetown. Freshman **Jesse Bernhardt** scored the fifth goal of the 7-0 run for his first career goal. Junior short stick **Scott LaRue** got his first career goal in the first half with the assist going to redshirt junior long pole **Brian Farrell**.

All-Americans:	Brett Schmidt
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- In the Face-Off Classic vs. Duke the defense was sharp for most of the game, led by senior goalie **Brian Phipps** who made 15 saves in the 11-10 overtime win. While **Grant Catalino** scored the game-winner it was really set-up by four defensive players for Maryland. With Duke's Will McKee going for the game-ending goal with 2:01 on the clock, senior **Bryn Holmes** crashed down on him causing a near-certain goal to be changed to a weak shot that Phipps made a diving save on. With the ball on the turf in front of the Terrapin goal, redshirt junior **Brian Farrell** raced into the scrum to scoop up the loose ball and start the transition opportunity. He moved the ball up the field and flipped a pass to senior shortie **Dean Hart**, who in turn made the "one-more" pass to Catalino on the left win for the winning shot. In total, Maryland possessed the ball for eight seconds of the 1:50 played in the overtime.
- The Terps looked like they may get their first 20+ minute scoring drought of the season vs. Towson, but fell a few minutes shy, holding the Tigers off the board for just over 17 minutes in the first half of play. Sloppy, deteriorating field conditions hampered Maryland's aggressive defensive style, but the Terps still managed to hold the Tigers to two goals below their season average in the 12-8 win. **Brian Farrell** was up to his old tricks with a length-of-the-field charge for a goal and had chances for at least one more goal and a few assists on the day. Fellow long pole **Dan Halayko** had a terrific game, picking up four groundballs and causing three turnovers.
- Maryland's "D" was solid in the Terps' 10-7 win over Penn, holding the Quakers three goals below their season average. Terp defenders were also offensive-minded in the Penn game with **Brian Farrell** scoring for the second straight game and **Dan Burns** and **Dan Halayko** picking up assists.
- The defense helped the Terps snap a three-game losing skid to the Retrievers in Maryland's 13-7 win at UMBC by holding the Retrievers to just seven goals. **Brian Phipps** was terrific in cage, stopping 12 shots, including nine in the first half of play. **Max** and **Brett Schmidt** combined for six groundballs and four caused turnovers, while **Bryn Holmes'** five-groundball day put him over the 200-groundball plateau for his career.
- Maryland may have dropped its first game of the season at No. 2 North Carolina, but the defense held the Tar Heels to just nine goals, three below their season average. **Brett Schmidt** had four groundballs and three caused turnovers, while **Brian Farrell** had two groundballs and one caused turnover. The Terps "D" also helped on the offensive end with Farrell assisting **Dean Hart** on the game's first goal.
- Brian Phipps** posted a season-best 16 saves, including eight in the first quarter, vs. Virginia. The Terp defense allowed just five goals over the final three quarters to the high-scoring Cavaliers. **Brett Schmidt** had two groundballs and four caused turnovers and shutout Shamel Bratton while he was guarding him. **Max Schmidt** and **Ryder Bohlander** combined for three groundball and five caused turnovers. **Dean Hart** and **Brian Farrell** hooked up to score the final goal of Maryland's 3-0 run in the third quarter.
- The "D" was solid in helping topple Navy for the first time since 2007. **Brett Schmidt** was once again stellar in holding his assignment, Navy's second-leading scorer Andy Warner, to just one assist and one shot. **Max Schmidt** and **Brian Farrell** led the Terps, who won the groundball battle 47-26, with five groundballs each. **Jesse Bernhardt** has a career high four groundballs, as well. Farrell and **Bryn Holmes** got into the offense as well, with each tallying an assist in the victory.
- Maryland's defense picked up its first 20+-minute scoreless stretch of the season, holding Johns Hopkins off the board for 23:00, spanning the second and third quarters. From the 4:54 mark of the first quarter to 5:51 to go in the third, the Terps allowed the Blue Jays just one goal in 29:03. **Brian Farrell** was a beast when the ball was on the ground, picking up a game-high six GBs. **Brett Schmidt** continued to be a dominant defender, holding Hopkins attackman Tom Palasek without a point and without a shot. **Jesse Bernhardt** had a rough first 53 minutes, racking up three penalties for 2:30 of box time, but he made up for it by scooping up a groundball from the face-off wing, charging into the Blue Jay box, faking a pass to **Grant Catalino**, who was set-up in the left alley ready to shoot, and ripping a shot past JHU goalie Pierce Basset to score the game-winning goal.
- Enough can't be said about the defensive effort in the Terps' 13-5 victory over No. 3 North Carolina in the ACC semifinals. **Brett Schmidt** backed up his All-ACC selection by shutting out Tar Heel All-American Billy Bitter for the first time in 30 consecutive games. Bitter ended the game with only one shot and six turnovers, while Schmidt had two groundballs and four caused turnovers. Schmidt was supported by fellow close defenders **Max Schmidt** and **Ryder Bohlander** who each had four groundballs and a caused turnover. The defensive midfield was also strong, both defensively and offensively. **Brian Farrell** scored twice in transition, while **Bryn Holmes** and **Dean Hart** each had an assist.
- Maryland held the potent Virginia offense to three goals below its season average in the ACC finals. **Max Schmidt** and **Ryder Bohlander** were solid, combining for five groundballs and four caused turnovers. **Brian Farrell**, who was named to the all-tournament team, contributed one assist, one groundball and two caused turnovers. **Brett Schmidt** was also named to the all-tournament team.
- The defense was smothering, holding Fairfield to just four goals, three of which came in the fourth quarter. **Brett Schmidt** led the defense with a career high five caused turnovers. Fellow junior close defenders **Ryder Bohlander** and **Max Schmidt** combined for five groundballs and three caused turnovers. **Brian Phipps** stopped seven shots and allowed just one goal in his final regular season home game. Maryland defenders also made offensive contributions vs. the Stags. **Brian Farrell** and **Scott LaRue** scored goals, while Bohlander and **Jesse Bernhardt** added assists.
- The Terps were solid defensively vs. Colgate at the Indians Rock Day of Champions. Maryland held the Raiders to six goals through three quarters before allowing Colgate to score four times in the fourth. **Max Schmidt** was stellar not only on the defensive side of the field with one groundball and two caused turnovers, but he also contributed on the offensive side. Schmidt scored on a back-handed shot in the third quarter to record his first career point. Schmidt wasn't the only defensive player to tally a point. Short sticks **Bryn Holmes** and **Scott LaRue** each scored goals, while **Jesse Bernhardt** and **Brian Farrell** had assists.
- In the first round of the NCAA tournament the Terrapin "D" was challenged with a talented and explosive Hofstra offense, but the Terps proved to be up to the challenge, holding the Pride to just eight goals. Key to the defensive effort was **Ryder Bohlander** who was charged with covering Hofstra's top scorer Jamie Lincoln. Bohlander held Lincoln to just one shot and forced two turnovers. **Jesse Bernhardt** force two key turnovers that each led directly to Maryland goals. Maryland defenders also figured in on the offense, which featured 10 different goal scorers. **Brian Farrell** score the game's first goal, while **Dean Hart** scored the final goal of the third quarter.

GROUNDBALL BATTLERS

- The Terps have been very good so far in 2010 when the ball is on the ground.
- Maryland is currently ranked third in the NCAA in groundballs per game with an average of 36.9. But total groundballs or groundballs per game is only part of the story. The rest of the story is the individual game battles when the ball is on the ground.
- The Terps have won the groundball battle in 11 of 15 games in 2010. The first game Maryland didn't have the advantage in groundballs was vs. Duke in the Konica Minolta Face-Off Classic. The Blue Devils owned a 42-33 lead in groundballs, thanks in large part to an 11-3 advantage in the third quarter (Maryland outscored Duke, 3-2 in that quarter). Maryland also came up short vs. Virginia, which had a 12-1 lead in groundballs after one quarter, but the Terps fought back and were outdone for the game by four, 34-30. The Cavaliers won groundballs, 32-28, in the rematch in the ACC championship game. Colgate had more groundballs in the regular season finale, 41-34.
- Maryland has been especially strong when the ball is on the ground in 6-on-6 situations. If you take out face-offs, Maryland has 405 groundballs (the Terps have won 39 face-offs on violations) for a per-game average of 27.0. Terrapin opponents have 308 groundballs if you take off the 138 face-offs won without a violation (29 total violations). That gives Maryland's opponents with a per-game groundball average of 20.5, which gives the Terps a 6.5 groundball per game advantage in 6-on-6 situations.
- Overall this season Maryland has a groundball percentage of .554, meaning that when the ball is on the ground a Terp will come up with it 55.4 percent of the time.

OFFENSIVE DEFENDERS

- Through 15 games Terrapin defensive players have been surprisingly offensive. So far in 2010, 10 Maryland defenders (close, long poles and short-sticks) have scored goals or tallied assists. In total, Terp defenders have 15 goals and 17 assists for 32 points.
- Leading the way, of course, is **Brian Farrell**. The redshirt junior not only returned to the field after missing most of 2009 due to injury, but he has also returned to his natural spot as a long pole. The 6-foot-5, 240-pound Baltimore native, has six goals and six assists so far this year and has 21 goals and 14 assists for 35 career points. Easily the highest-scoring defender in school history, Farrell's 34 points has him tied for 20th in scoring since 2002 at Maryland (the Cottle Era).
- Short-stick middle **Scott LaRue** has a bit of an advantage as a defensive scoring threat since he spent his first two years in College Park as an offensive midfielder. But the athletic junior made the switch to defensive short-stick during the preseason and has paid big dividends so far - LaRue had a goal and two assists in the Terps' first three games this season. He got back in the scoring column with a goal vs. Fairfield. LaRue scored for the second straight game in the Terps' 18-10 win over Colgate.
- Freshman long pole **Jesse Bernhardt** got into the scoring act in the Terps' 15-13 come-from-behind win at Georgetown. He scored the team's fifth goal in the decisive 7-0 run. Bernhardt's goal gave the Terrapins their first lead of the game (12-11) at the 13:54 mark of the fourth quarter. Bernhardt "went from the outhouse to the penthouse," according to **Dave Cottle** when he followed up three penalties vs. Johns Hopkins with the game-winning goal at the 6:56 mark of the fourth quarter in the Smartlink Day of Rivals. Bernhardt picked up his first career assist by setting-up **Brian Farrell's** goal vs. Fairfield. He continued his helping ways by assisting on **Travis Reed's** second goal in the Terps' 18-10 win over Colgate.
- Senior shortie **Dean Hart** got into the scoring act in the Face-Off Classic vs. ACC rival Duke. He picked up the assist on the game-winning goal with 2:10 left in the first overtime to give Maryland an 11-10 victory. Carolina schools must be Hart's specialty as he scored the Terps' first goal in the 9-7 loss at No. 2 UNC on March 27. Or maybe it's ACC schools that Hart has on his radar as he scored his second goal (off an assist from Farrell) in as many games in the 11-10 loss to No. 1 Virginia. Hart continued to haunt ACC foes with another assist vs. Carolina in the ACC semifinals. Hart struck again in the first round of the NCAA tournament vs. Hofstra, taking advantage of a substitution situation to score a left-handed goal on a behind-the-cage roll.
- Senior long pole **Dan Halayko** and junior short-stick **Dan Burns** (before he was moved to offensive middle) got into the offensive act in the Terps' 10-7 win over Penn. Both guys picked-up assists in the transition game to help lead Maryland to the victory.
- Junior close defender **Brett Schmidt** added his name to the list with an assist on **Grant Catalino's** goal at North Carolina, while senior shortie **Bryn Holmes** also assisted on a Catalino goal vs. Navy. Holmes picked up his second assist of the season on Farrell's second goal vs. UNC in the ACC semifinals. Holmes finally got into the goals column with his first of the season in the 18-10 victory over Colgate.
- Another close defender added his name to the Terps' defensive scorers vs Fairfield when junior close defender **Ryder Bohlander** tallied his first career assist on **Travis Reed's** first quarter goal.
- Maryland's third close defender, junior **Max Schmidt**, became the 10th Terp defender to get on the scoresheet this season when he scored his first career goal on a back-handed shot in Maryland's 18-10 win over Colgate.

LONG POLES LEAD NATION IN SCORING

- So far this season six Maryland long poles (close defenders or long-stick middies) have scored nine goals and added 11 assists for 20 total points. That total is the highest for any long pole unit in Division I men's lacrosse.

TERPS' 85TH SEASON OF LACROSSE

- The Terps boast an all-time record of 716-241-4 (.747), dating back to the first varsity team in 1924 (a team was not fielded in 1944 and 1945 due to World War II). Maryland has finished every one of its previous 84 seasons with a .500 or better record, including last season when the Terps went 10-6. The program reached the 700-win milestone with a 15-6 victory over Penn on April 14, 2009 at Ludwig Field.
- During the decade of the 2000s, Maryland went 111-49 for a .694 win percentage, making it the winningest decade in Terrapin lacrosse history. In the decade of the 1990s, Maryland posted a 95-47 record. The .669 winning percentage matched Maryland's win percentage of the 1980s when the Terps went 83-41 and also compiled a .669 win percentage.

THE 700 CLUB

- Maryland's 15-6 victory over Penn on April 14, 2009 was the program's 700th victory in 84 seasons of varsity men's lacrosse. The Terps join Johns Hopkins, Syracuse, Navy and Army as the only programs with 700 or more Division I wins.
- Two things that make Maryland's accomplishment all the more impressive is that the Terps reached the 700-win plateau in just their 84th season. Only Syracuse reached win No. 700 in as few seasons, but it took the Orange 53 more games than Maryland. In fact, Maryland needed only 940 games to reach 700 wins and only Johns Hopkins needed fewer games (932) to hit the historic number, but the Blue Jays did so in their 105th season.

CONSECUTIVE 10-WIN SEASONS

- The 17-4 victory over Fairfield on May 1, 2010 was the 10th of the year for Maryland, giving it eight straight seasons with double-digit wins. (Special thanks to Patrick Stevens of the D1Score.com).
- How does that stack up against the rest of the college lacrosse programs? Take a look at programs with at least four-straight 10-win seasons:

TERPS ON ESPNU

- Maryland played eight-straight Saturdays on ESPNU winning six of the eight. Overall, Maryland has had 32 games on ESPNU since 2006. Maryland is 19-13 (.594) all-time in games broadcast on ESPNU.

HOME SWEET HOME

- After playing all of their 2009 home games at Ludwig Field due to the renovations at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium, the Terps return to their true home field in 2010. Maryland is scheduled to play four of its five home games at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium, the lone exception being the mid-week game on March 15 vs. Penn, which will be played at Ludwig Field.

HOME COOKING

- A lot is made in sports about the home-field advantage, and for the Maryland men's lacrosse team that advantage has held true since Coach Cottle arrived in College Park. Since 2002, the Terps are 52-18 (.743) when playing on the Maryland campus. At Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium Maryland is 33-13 (.717) under Cottle, while the Terps have gone 8-3 (.727) at the Field Hockey & Lacrosse Complex and 11-2 (.846) at Ludwig Field.

THE STRETCH: CAROLINA, VIRGINIA, NAVY, HOPKINS

- Since 1978 Maryland's schedule has been highlighted by a four-game stretch in the middle of its season: North Carolina, Virginia, Navy and Johns Hopkins. In the 33-year span only four times has the stretch been interrupted with another game added in between one of these traditional four (1981, 1997, 2001, 2003).
- Overall, Maryland is 60-72 (.455) since 1978 vs. those four teams during that time.
- The Terps have swept the four games only once - in 1987. Only twice (1981 & 1988) has Maryland lost all four games. Six times (1978, 1979, 1989, 1996, 1998, 2001) the Terps have won three of the four games. Johns Hopkins broke up the Terps' bid for a perfect stretch four times, while Carolina and Virginia broke it up one time each.

FIRST-TIME OPPONENTS

- Maryland has played 75 different opponents in its 85 seasons. The 2010 season added Colgate to that list. In the Terps' 75 first-time meetings Maryland is 71-4 in those games. Adelphi (12-13, 1982), Army (0-3, 1923), Syracuse (3-10, 1927) and Yale (3-5, 1925) are the only schools to beat the Terps the first time the schools met on a lacrosse field.

MARYLAND IN SEASON OPENERS

- Maryland has a 81-3-1 (.959) lifetime record in season openers dating back to the 1924 season. The Terps have won their last 17 openers and 24 of the last 25, with the only loss coming to Duke in 1993, when they fell to Duke 9-5 on March 6.
- After losing their 1925 opener to Yale, 5-3, the Terps went on to win 40 consecutive season openers from 1926 through 1967. The streak was broken when Maryland tied Princeton, 6-6, in the 1968 opener. Following the deadlock, Maryland went on to win its next 14 openers, giving the Terps a 54-0-1 record over a 57-year span (Maryland did not field a team in 1944 and 1945 due to World War II.)

17 STRAIGHT IN SEASON OPENERS

- After beating Bellarmine to open the 2010 season the Terps have a 17-game winning streak in season openers. Five of those wins came against Villanova (1994-98) and the last nine over Denver, Mount St. Mary's, Air Force, Hobart, Duke, Georgetown (four times), Bellarmine (twice) and Presbyterian. Over the 17-year stretch, Maryland outscored its foes 222-81 (an average score of 13.8-5.1) in those games.
- The Terps have not allowed more than seven goals to any opponent in a season opener over the last 17 years. Maryland has not allowed an opponent to score 10 or more goals in a season opener since Syracuse beat the Terps, 16-13 on March 9, 1983.

TERPS IN PRO STADIUMS

- Maryland has played 12 games in an NFL stadium. All-time the Terps are 6-5 in professional stadiums.
- The Terps will play two games in 2010 in NFL Stadiums in the regular season. Maryland defeated Duke 11-10 in overtime in the Konica Minolta Face-Off Classic. Maryland returned to M&T Bank Stadium in April for the Smartlink Day of Rivals and bested Johns Hopkins, 10-9.
- In 2009, Maryland topped Duke, 11-8, at the Konica Minolta Face-Off Classic at M&T Bank Stadium and lost a 10-9 decision to Johns Hopkins in the inaugural Smartlink Day of Rivals.
- In 2006, the Terps were 1-1 at M&T Bank Stadium, defeating North Carolina, 10-9, in the ACC semis at M&T Bank Stadium before dropping an 11-5 decision to Virginia in the finals. Maryland then lost to UMass, 8-5, at Lincoln Financial Field in the NCAA Semifinals.
- In 2005, Maryland was 3-1 in NFL stadiums - 1-1 at Lincoln Financial Field and 2-0 at M&T Bank Stadium.
- Maryland lost to Virginia in the 2003 NCAA Semifinals in M&T Bank Stadium.

- Maryland's family tradition doesn't end with brothers. Fathers and sons are also part of the Terps' tradition and that's never been more evident than this season. This year's Maryland men's lacrosse roster features three players whose father's not only played at Maryland, but won a nation title together. Mike Farrell, father of Brian, Wilson Phipps, father of Brian, and Jake Reed, father of Travis, were all members of the Terps' 1975 NCAA championship squad.
- The Terrapin family tree doesn't stop there for Brian Phipps. He is the fourth in a line of Phipps that donned the red and black for Maryland. The Phipps-family legacy started in the 1940's with Louis Phipps, who was an honorable mention All-American in 1949. His son, Wilson, was a member of the 1975 Terrapin National Championship squad. Brian is the second of Wilson's sons to play for the Terps. Michael Phipps played for Maryland from 2004-07 and was an honorable mention All-American as a senior after leading the squad in scoring with 50 points.

TERPS SET TO COMPETE AT 2010 FIL WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

- A pair of former Terps survived the rigorous try-out process and were named to the U.S. men's national team that will represent the United States at the 2010 FIL World Championships in Manchester, England from July 14-24, 2010. Former Maryland All-Americans Joe Cinosky and Brian Dougherty were among the 23 players selected to the final Team USA roster.
- Team USA won't be the only roster with a Maryland presence. Senior midfielder **Adam Sear** was among the 23 players selected to the Australian National Team that will compete in Manchester.

2010 CAPTAINS: FARRELL, HOLMES AND PHIPPS

- Three players have been named team captains for the 2010 season. The trio, which was voted on by the team during the preseason, consists of redshirt junior **Brian Farrell** and seniors **Bryn Holmes** and **Brian Phipps**. Farrell is the first junior to be named a team captain since 2005 when Bill McGlone was selected by his teammates.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. - Junior Grant Catalino had six points on two goals and four assists to lead the sixth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to a 12-7 season-opening victory over Bellarmine Saturday afternoon at Owsley B. Frazier Stadium.

The first quarter was slow for both teams with zeros on the scoreboard until 36 seconds left in the quarter when Derek Hopcroft gave the Knights a 1-0 lead. The goal woke up the Terps, who responded off the ensuing face-off. Jake Bernhardt won the face-off, thanks to a tough groundball by his brother Jesse Bernhardt. Jesse quickly fired a pass to Jake near the midfield line and Jake raced down the left alley and ripped a shot inside the near post to tie the game at 1-1 with 21 ticks on the clock remaining.

Maryland opened the second quarter with a pair of quick goals to take its first lead of the game. Drew Snider scored on another runner from the left alley, this one hitting the far upper corner at the 13:12 mark. The attack unit got into the mix just over a minute later. Travis Reed slipped a pass to Catalino on the left wing and Catalino scored his first of the year to give the Terps a 3-1 lead. The Knight's Sean Doyle cut that lead to one with a goal at the 10:59 mark.

The game settled down for a little while before Michael Shakespeare scored on a low runner down the right alley, building the Maryland lead back to two goals with 4:52 left in the quarter. The Maryland grew the lead to three with a goal by Warren Hansen off a feed from Catalino with 3:20 left.

Bellarmine capitalized on its first face-off win to open the third quarter with a goal by Austin Bright to cut the lead back to two at the 14:07 mark.

The Terps man-down unit killed off a 30-second pushing penalty and Bryn Holmes drew a pushing penalty on the Knights to give the Terps an extra-man opportunity. Maryland didn't squander the chance with Catalino finding Joe Cummings on the crease for the easy score. Cummings was fouled on the goal, giving the Terps EMO unit another scoring chance. Catalino picked up his third assist of the day at the 9:00 mark, feeding Reed on the right wing where he beat Knight goalie Dillon Ward to give Maryland a 7-3 lead.

Bellarmine's extra-man unit got into the act at the 6:27 mark, cutting the lead back to three, on a goal by Chase Williams. Williams then scored his second of the day with 2:50 left in the third. But Maryland responded quickly as Adam Sear fired a pass to Jake Bernhardt as he raced down the center of the field and Bernhardt ripped another shot inside the left post for his second goal of the day and an 8-5 Terrapin lead.

Will Yeatman got the Terps on the board with 8:18 in the fourth with a quick shot from the right wing. Jake Bernhardt picked up the assist after freeing himself from his defender with a good dodge in the center of the box.

Maryland's transition game gave the Terps their next goal. Brian Farrell picked off a pass at the top of the Knight attack box and raced down the field. He skipped the ball to Catalino, who then fed Cummings for the quick score.

Catalino scored for the second time in the game, this time off an assist by Scott LaRue, to up Maryland's lead to 11-5 with 7:06 left in the fourth. The lead grew to 12-5 on Snider's second unassisted goal of the day at the 3:34 mark.

Bellarmine's man-up unit capitalized on another Terrapin penalty with a goal by Luke Acton at the 2:38 mark. The Knights closed out the scoring with a goal by Hopcroft with less than a minute remaining in the game.

Game Notes:

- With today's 12-7 win Maryland is now 2-0 all-time vs. Bellarmine.
- Maryland has won 17 straight season openers and is 81-3-1 all-time to start the season.

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Senior Will Yeatman's three goals in a dramatic 7-0 run spurred the No. 7 Maryland men's lacrosse team to a 15-13 come-from-behind victory over the No. 13 Georgetown Hoyas in front of a crowd of 2,532 at the Hoyas' Multi-Sport Field.

Maryland (2-0) trailed by four goals midway through the third quarter, but the Terps ran off seven straight over a span of 10:26 to take the lead and stun the Hoyas (0-1) on their home field. Junior Ryan Young, who helped keep the Terps in the game in the first half with four assists and finished the game with career-bests of six points and five assists, started the run with a goal and then assisted on the second Terrapin goal.

Yeatman then scored the final goal of the third quarter to cut the Georgetown lead to one at 11-10 and then scored again a minute into the fourth quarter to tie the score for the first time since it was 2-2 at the 8:26 mark of the first. After freshman Jesse Bernhardt gave Maryland its first lead of the day with 13:46 remaining, Yeatman scored his third to extend the lead to a pair. Freshman John Haus then finished the run with an unassisted goal that proved to be the game-winner.

The amazing comeback was Maryland's largest come-from-behind win since 2006 when the Terps came back from a five-goal deficit to beat North Carolina in the semifinals of the ACC tournament in M&T Bank Stadium, 10-9.

The first quarter saw the Hoyas jump out of an early 1-0 lead, but sophomore midfielder Jake Bernhardt tied the score by picking up a rebound off of a shot by Joe Cummings and quickly putting it past C.T. Fisher.

Georgetown responded with a man-up goal to take a 2-1 lead, but that lasted just over a minute when Maryland responded with an EMO goal of its own. Senior Adam Sear took a pass from sophomore Ryan Young and bounced a shot from the left wing to tie the game at two goals apiece.

But the rest of the first period belonged to the Hoyas as Georgetown scored three straight, including a goal by Ryan Shuler with two seconds left on the clock.

The second quarter saw the Terps get on the board quickly on another extra-man goal by Sear from the left wing, this time on a sidearm shot to the far post. That the Hoya lead to 5-3 at the 14:13 mark, but Georgetown responded with a goal by Ricky Mirabito to push the lead back to three.

The Terps continued to try to claw their way back into the game with a goal by redshirt sophomore Drew Snider off an assist by Young with 10:59 left in the quarter. The Hoyas responded with two goals in the next two minutes to increase their lead to 8-4.

Maryland won the ensuing face-off on a groundball by redshirt junior Brian Farrell. He pushed the ball in transition and found junior Scott LaRue running free down the middle of the field. The Hoyas didn't cut LaRue off and with time and room he scored on a bounce shot from eight yards out to cut the Terrapin deficit to three.

The Hoyas got a rebound goal by Travis Comeau to push the lead back to four, but the Terps scored twice in less than two minutes to make it a 9-7 game. Junior Travis Reed scored an extra-man goal with a low-to-low shot from the right wing off an assist by Young. Young then picked up his fourth assist of the game on a goal by Cummings that bounced off both pipes before hitting the net.

But Georgetown regained some momentum before the game went to halftime with a goal by Mirabito with 2:27 left in the second.

After the fast and furious first half, the third quarter was scoreless until the 7:54 mark when Shuler scored from just outside the right side of the crease to push the Hoya lead back to four at 11-7, but that is when Maryland made its move and went on the 7-0 run to take control of the game.

The ensuing face-off was won by Georgetown but Jake Bernhardt caused a turnover that was picked-up by Jesse Bernhardt. He flipped it back to Jake who found Young behind the goal. Young then raced around the cage and beat Fisher at the 7:30 mark.

Young's career day continued with his career-best fifth assist on a Grant Catalino goal less than a minute later to cut the lead back to two at 11-9. While Young picked up the assist, the key to the goal was Yeatman who fought through pressure and drew a slide that freed up Young.

The Maryland run grew to three goals at the 3:33 mark when Yeatman scored an unassisted goal to cut the Hoyas lead to one at 11-10. Yeatman backed his defender down on the right side of the crease and used a spin move to free his hands and put a shot inside the top right corner of the goal.

The fourth quarter started with the momentum clearly in the Terps' favor coming into the final 15:00 with the 3-0 run, but that run would increase to 7-0 before it ended. Yeatman scored his second goal, off an assist by Catalino, on a rip from the right alley to tie the game at 11-11 at the 13:56 mark.

Maryland took its first lead of the day on the ensuing face-off. Senior Bryn Holmes won the draw and Jesse Bernhardt picked-up the groundball. Bernhardt then pushed the ball up right side and took a clean 12-yard shot that beat Fisher, giving Maryland the 12-11 advantage.

Yeatman scored again unassisted to make it a 13-11 Terrapin lead with 12:46 left in the game. That was followed-up 42 seconds later by the first career goal by Haus to give Maryland a 14-11 lead.

Georgetown ended the run with back-to-back goals by Stu Shannon and Scott Kocis to pull the Hoyas to within one at 14-13 with 6:41 left.

But the Hoyas momentum was cut short by an unassisted goal by Jake Bernhardt to push the lead back to two. Bernhardt face-dodged a defender on the left side and cut to the middle and beat Fisher from 10 yards out for the insurance goal and a 15-13 Maryland lead with 3:56 left in the game.

BALTIMORE, Md. - The seventh-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team, possessed the ball for just seconds of overtime, but that was all it needed to pull out an 11-10 win over No. 9 Duke at the Konica Minolta Face-Off Classic at M&T Bank Stadium.

Junior attackman Grant Catalino scored a career-best five goals, including the game-winner, to lead the Terps, who are 3-0 on the season for the first time since 2006. Catalino was named MVP of the Maryland-Duke game of the Face-Off Classic for the second straight season. Last year he scored two goals and added four assists in Maryland's 11-8 victory over Duke.

The Blue Devils controlled the ball for nearly the entire overtime period, but senior goalkeeper Brian Phipps made a diving save on a weak shot by Duke midfielder Will McKee to keep the Blue

Devils, who scored the final three goals of regulations to send the game to OT, off the board. The shot didn't have much on it thanks to senior Bryn Holmes, who crashed down on McKee on the left side of the crease.

Redshirt junior Brian Farrell scooped up the loose ball in front of the Maryland net and charged down the field. He flipped a pass to senior Dean Hart, who quickly made the one-more pass to Catalino on the left wing, where he ripped a low-to-low shot that beat Duke goalie Dan Wigrizer and triggered an on-field celebration.

After the Blue Devils opened the game with an unassisted goal by Ned Crotty, Maryland went on a 3-0 run over the final 7:38 of the first quarter to take a 3-1 lead. Catalino tied the game with his first of the day on a quick dodge and shoot from the left goal line extended. The Terps' transition game led to its next goal. After a Phipps save, junior Scott LaRue one-timed a pass to Ryan Young on the left side of the crease for the easy score and a 2-1 Maryland advantage. Catalino closed the scoring in the first with an extra-man goal on a terrific shot to the top near corner from the right alley off a good feed from junior Travis Reed.

The Blue Devils responded with a Max Quinzani goal less than three minutes into the second quarter to trim the lead back to one, but Maryland senior Adam Sear took a pass from Catalino and ripped a low-to-low shot from the top right side to up the Maryland lead back to two.

Duke fought back with a three-goal run of its own, with another Quinzani goal followed by two from Zach Howell, to take a 5-4 lead with 5:15 left in the second.

But the Terps responded by scoring the final two goals of the first half to take a 6-5 lead into the break. Again it was Catalino leading the way, this time taking a cross-field skip pass from freshman John Haus and burying a shot into the upper right corner.

Maryland took the 6-5 lead on an extra-man goal that was almost too good to be true. Young and Reed played a two-man game behind the goal with Young faking a flip pass to Reed. Wigrizer believed Reed had the ball and followed him as he came around the right side of the net. But Young kept the ball and quickly fed a pass to senior Will Yeatman on the left wing where he scored a near empty net goal.

Yeatman scored again just over a minute into the second half on an unassisted goal to the near post from the right wing, upping the Maryland lead to 7-5. Duke then got back-to-back goals in less than a minute from Mike Catalino, Grant's older brother, and Quinzani to knot the game at 7-7 with 9:37 left in the third.

Maryland fired back with the last two goals in the third and the first in the fourth to take its largest lead of the day at 10-7 at the 13:47 mark of the fourth. Haus gave the Terps the lead again at 8-7 with a 13-yard shot inside the near post.

Catalino then scored his fourth of the day off an assist by Young with 4:05 remaining in the third. While Catalino and Young got the goal and the assist, the play was set-up by redshirt freshman Owen Blye, who ducked under a Duke defender, drawing a slide from Young's defender. That caused Catalino's defender to try to cover Young, who made the simple pass to a wide-open Catalino on the left wing.

Reed finished the 3-0 scoring run less than two minutes into the fourth when he scooped up a rebound off of a Catalino shot and put it back past Wigrizer.

But the game wasn't over yet. Duke increased its defensive pressure and went on a 3-0 run over the final 4:22. Howell scored twice to pull the Blue Devils to within a goal at 10-9 with 1:38 remaining. McKee then tied the game with 13 seconds left, setting up the overtime heroics of Catalino, Phipps, Farrell and Hart.

Farrell led the Terrapin defense with four groundballs and two caused turnovers, while Phipps made 15 saves to go along with three groundballs and a caused turnover.

CAPITAL ONE FIELD AT BYRD STADIUM

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The second midfield unit of John Haus, Michael Shakespeare and Drew Snider combined to score six of the sixth-ranked University of Maryland men's lacrosse team's 12 goals in the Terps' 12-8 win over Towson at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium.

The game marked Maryland's return to Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium after construction to Tyser Tower forced the Terps to play their 2009 home games at nearby Ludwig Field. Maryland's last game at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium was a victory over Denver in the first round of the 2008 NCAA Tournament.

The game was close through the first quarter with Maryland (4-0) holding a one-goal lead after the first 15:00. Haus, a freshman out of Lutherville, Md., got the Terps, who never trailed in the game, on the board first with a quick runner that beat Towson goalie Rob Wheeler into the bottom right corner of the goal.

Junior Warren Hansen gave the Terrapins a two-goal cushion when he one-timed a pass from junior Travis Reed at the 9:20 mark. Hansen slipped through the defense and found an open spot on the right side of the crease and Reed sent a crisp pass across the crease for the easy score.

Towson (0-3) got on the board with 6:23 left in the first when Will Harrington scored his first of three goals on the day, converting on an extra-man opportunity. Maryland responded with its own extra-man goal three minutes later. On a restart Reed flipped a quick pass to sophomore Joe Cummings, who made a good cut to the crease and he finished with a low shot past Wheeler.

It looked like Maryland would have a two-goal lead going into the second quarter, but the Tigers got a goal from Stephen Norris with 13 seconds left on the clock to make the score 3-2.

Maryland started the second quarter just like it started the first. Only this time it was junior All-American Ryan Young getting the Terps going with an unassisted goal at the 11:56 mark. Towson's Christian Pastirik scored a minute later to cut the lead back to one at 4-3, but that was as close as the Tigers would get on the day. Maryland closed out the second quarter with a 4-0 run spanning the final 9:58 of the quarter to take an 8-3 lead into halftime.

Shakespeare, a sophomore from Walpole, Mass., scored his first on the day to get the run going. A Towson defender knocked the ball away from Cummings, but Shakespeare was there to pick-off the loose ball. He then ripped a 15-yard shot inside the right post for a 5-3 Maryland lead.

The Terps' second midfield completed their first circuit of goals with Snider, a redshirt sophomore from Seattle, Wash., hitting a runner from the right alley for the 6-2 advantage.

Maryland's extra-man unit, which entered the weekend ranked No. 2 in the country with a .667 conversion percentage, scored its second of the day in a near repeat of its first goal. Once again it was Cummings picking up the goal, but this time the feed came from the top of the box on a quick dump down from junior Grant Catalino.

The run came to a close at the 2:12 mark with a terrific transition goal by redshirt junior Brian Farrell. The play started deep in the Maryland defensive end when junior goalie Brian Phipps picked-off a cross-crease pass by Towson's Tim Stratton. He then saw Farrell breaking out down the middle of the field and hit him in stride with a perfect outlet pass. Farrell, a long pole who came into the game with 15 career goals, had a clear run down the field and the Tiger defense did not cut off his charge toward the goal, so he took a 10-yard shot and beat Wheeler low to make it an 8-3 Maryland lead heading into the halftime break.

After the intermission Towson made a change in goal and Travis Love made five saves in the first four minutes of the third quarter to give the Tigers some momentum. Towson then drew first blood at the 8:08 mark on a goal by Matt Hughes, snapping a 17:36 scoreless stretch.

Maryland responded with Snider's second goal of the day on a runner from the right alley that pushed the Terps' lead back to five at 9-4 at the 5:30 mark.

Towson then went on its own run, scoring three straight on two by Harrington and one by Stratton to make it a three-goal game with 13:57 left in the fourth.

But the second line responded for the Terps with unassisted goals by Shakespeare and Haus, respectively, to give Maryland a four-goal cushion at 11-7. Reed took a shot that hit the crossbar and the ball ended up on being swatted to the ground in front of the crease. That's where Shakespeare fought through a crowd and swiped the ball of the ground into the Tiger goal. Haus' second goal of the day was a bit more orthodox as he dodged down the left alley and ripped a left-handed shot inside the far pipe.

Pastirik scored his second of the day to cut the Terrapin lead to 11-8 with 5:28 to go. The Tigers tried to double the ball when Maryland had possession in the Tigers' defensive zone, but Cummings was able to split the double-team and slip a pass to Young, who scored an empty-netter with 1:37 left to finish the scoring.

Maryland's man-down unit was terrific on the day. A steady rain and deteriorating field conditions led to some sloppy penalties for the Terps and Towson entered the game converting on 62.5% of its extra-man chances. But the Terps man-down unit allowed just one Tiger EMO goal in eight opportunities.

The Terrapin defense was led by senior long pole Dan Halayko, who had four groundballs and three caused turnovers, and Farrell, who had three caused turnovers and two groundballs. Senior Bryn Holmes led the Terps with five groundballs.

COLELGE PARK, Md. - The attack unit of Grant Catalino, Travis Reed and Ryan Young combined for six goals and seven assists to lead the No. 5 University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to a 10-7 victory over Penn Monday afternoon at Ludwig Field.

Maryland moves to 5-0 on the season and has won five straight to open a season for the first time since 2004. It's the Terps first five-game winning streak of any kind since 2007 when Maryland took five in a row from March 10-24.

Reed and Catalino got the Terps, who never trailed in the game, off to a fast start just over two minutes into the game. Catalino slipped a pass to Reed, who buried a low-to-low shot from the right wing for the 1-0 Maryland lead.

The Terps' extra-man unit gave them a 2-0 advantage with 10:30 to play in the first when Catalino scored off of a feed from senior Will Yeatman. The Quakers' EMO unit got Penn on the board at the 9:07 mark on a goal by Al Kohart.

But less than two minutes later Maryland got back-to-back goals from Young off feeds from Catalino to take a 4-1 lead. On Young's first goal, freshman John Haus' shot hit the post and Catalino picked-off the rebound and quickly flipped the ball to Young on the left goal line extended where he beat Penn goalie Chris Casey. It was déjà vu all over again off the ensuing face off. Senior Bryn Holmes won the face-off clean and pushed the ball up field before passing it to Catalino on the left win. Catalino then flipped it to Young, who beat Casey again from the left side of the crease.

Penn cut the lead back to one with back-to-back goals (one at the end of the first quarter and then to start the second) by Corey Winkoff and John Conneely, but Maryland scored the last two goals of the second quarter to take a 6-3 lead into halftime.

Sophomore Jake Bernhardt scored off of a feed from Catalino with a rip from the right alley into the top left corner at the 6:10 mark to make it a 5-3 advantage.

Redshirt junior long pole Brian Farrell scored a goal in his second consecutive game to make it a three-goal Maryland lead. Senior goalie Brian Phipps made one of his eight saves on a shot by Penn's Dan Savage and junior Brett Schmidt picked up the groundball to start the Terrapin transition game. Schmidt found Farrell near the midfield stripe with a pass and Farrell patiently pushed the ball into the Penn defensive zone. He slipped the ball to senior Dean Hart, who quickly found Reed on the right side of the crease. Reed then looked up and hit Farrell with a pinpoint pass that Farrell one-timed past Casey.

A Rob Fitzpatrick goal opened the second half scoring at the 8:59 mark to pull the Quakers back to within two. But Reed scored his second of the game 17 seconds later to up the lead back to three for the Terps. Phipps picked up a loose ball in front of the Maryland goal and laced an outlet pass to senior Dan Halayko, who took the ball into the Quaker zone and found Reed on the right wing where he ripped a shot past Joe Hegener, who replaced Casey in the Penn goal at the beginning of the third quarter.

Maryland's man-down unit was solid on the day, shutting down the Quakers three times in five extra-man chances, but after the Terps killed a pushing penalty by redshirt sophomore Drew Snider, Penn was able to convert on a Holmes interference penalty with a goal by Savage to cut the lead to 7-5 heading into the fourth quarter.

The Terrapin lead was cut back to one at 7-6 with a Quaker goal by Rob McMullen 50 seconds into the fourth, but Maryland responded with a goal by sophomore Joe Cummings on a terrific shot inside the near post from the left alley with 12:25 left in the game.

McMullen scored his second of the day at the 10:42 mark to make it a one-goal Maryland lead for the fifth time in the game, but Maryland got goals from Haus and Catalino 13 seconds apart to finish the scoring and put the game away.

Maryland used a big-little pick behind the goal to get Young matched up with a Quaker short-stick and he beat his defender with some quick footwork and found Haus cutting to the crease, where he one-timed it into the left side of the Penn goal at the 9:33 mark.

Catalino's goal was another picture-perfect display of transition offense off of the face-off. Holmes won the draw with Farrell scooped up the groundball. He passed the ball back to Holmes in the middle of the field and he moved it to junior Dan Burns on the left side. Burns then found Catalino set up in the left alley with time and room and Catalino ripped a shot from 10 yards out past a defenseless Hegener.

Holmes finished the game with seven groundballs and tied for the team lead with junior Ryder Bohlander, who set his career-high. All-America junior Max Schmidt had a season-best five groundballs, while junior Brett Schmidt and Farrell each had three.

CATONSVILLE, Md. - Junior Grant Catalino tied his career high with seven points on four goals and three assists to lead the No. 5 University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to a 13-7 victory over UMBC at UMBC Stadium Saturday afternoon.

The Terps' starting attack unit of Catalino, Travis Reed (two goals and two assists) and Ryan Young (three assists) blitzed the Retrievers for 14 points, while Maryland's first midfielder of Jake Bernhardt, Adam Sear and Will Yeatman, which had been quiet in the Terrapins' previous two games, combined for five goals.

The offense wasn't the only bright spot for the Terps as the defense stepped up to help snap a three-game losing streak to UMBC. Senior goalie Brian Phipps made a season-best 12 saves, while All-America defender Max Schmidt had three groundballs and three caused turnovers.

With the victory Maryland moves to 6-0 for the first time since 2004 when the Terps got off to an 8-0 start. The loss pushes the Retrievers to 1-5 this season.

The game got off to a shaky start with an early penalty giving UMBC an extra-man chance, but the Terps' man-down unit killed the penalty, giving the offense a chance to go to work. It didn't take Maryland long to take the 1-0 lead as Sear scored on a low-to-low shot from the right alley off an assist from junior Travis Reed at the 11:29 mark.

After the Retrievers tied the game with 5:48 left in the first on a goal by Shane Ryznar, Catalino gave the Terps the lead back a minute later. He took the ball on the right wing and dodged around UMBC's Matt Kresse and snuck a low shot past Kevin Kohri for the 2-1 advantage.

With the clock winding down in the opening period the Terps' second midfield provided a boost once again. Redshirt sophomore Drew Snider dodged a UMBC defender on the left wing and weaved his way to the middle of the Retriever defensive box and slipped a shot past the right hip of Kohri for a 3-1 Maryland lead.

The Terps drew first blood in the second quarter with another Catalino goal at the 13:26 mark. The Terrapin lead grew to 5-1 30 seconds later when Bernhardt ripped a laser from 12 yards out into the upper left corner. Bernhardt just entered the game from the substitution box and had a full head of steam as he dodged down the middle of the field.

Senior Fran Gormely picked up his first assist since March 13, 2007 when he got the ball to sophomore Michael Shakespeare in front of the crease and Shakespeare bounced a shot past Kohri for a 6-1 lead at the 8:30 mark of the second.

UMBC snapped a scoreless stretch of 14:31 with a goal by Matt Latham at the 6:17. But a illegal substitution penalty on the Retrievers gave the Terps their first man-up chance of the day and it took Maryland just nine seconds to convert. UMBC stopped the bleeding with Ryznar's second goal of the game with just six ticks left in the half.

Catalino's big day continued early in the third quarter, assisting on Maryland's first two goals after the break.

While Catalino earned the assist, Maryland's ninth goal of the day was really earned by the defense. Phipps' 10th save of the game was picked up by junior Dan Burns and he found redshirt junior Brian Farrell breaking out up field. Farrell drew the UMBC defense to him before flipping a pass to Catalino, who made the "one-more" pass to Reed, who finished from the right goal line extended.

Catalino's third assist of the day came when he fired a pass from behind the goal, over the cage to Sear, who ripped a high-to-low shot from 13-yards straight out for a 10-3 Maryland lead with 12:41 left in the third.

Ryznar scored his third of the day for UMBC to make it a 10-4 game, but Bernhardt converted on a pass from Young to build the Terrapin lead back to seven at the 8:57 mark.

Back-to-back goals by Ryznar and Max Davis cut the UMBC deficit to five at the end of the third quarter.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. - The No. 2 North Carolina Tar Heels edged No. 4 Maryland, 9-7, in a battle of undefeated men's lacrosse heavyweights in front of 4,542 fans at Fetzer Field.

The loss was Maryland's first of the season and gives the Terps a 6-1 overall record and a 1-1 mark in ACC play. North Carolina ups its overall record to 9-0 and 2-0 in the conference.

The Terps got off to a good start with the game's first goal at the 13:49 mark. Junior Brett Schmidt forced a Carolina turnover and redshirt junior Brian Farrell pushed the ball in transition. He flipped the ball to senior Dean Hart who was running free down the right alley. The Tar Heels never stopped Hart's progress and he stepped into a shot and buried it in the upper left corner for the 1-0 Maryland lead.

But the rest of the first quarter belonged to the Tar Heels. Thomas Wood scored twice, sandwiched around a Marcus Holman tally, to give Carolina a 3-1 lead going into the second quarter.

Jimmy Dunster gave Carolina a 4-1 lead with an unassisted goal at the 8:21 mark of the second, but Maryland answered back two minutes later with an unassisted goal of its own. Redshirt freshman Owen Blye inverted behind the goal and beat his defender around the left side to score his first career goal.

The extra-man unit pulled the Terps to within one at the 3:03 mark. Good ball movement around the back of the goal ended when junior Travis Reed found senior Adam Sear open straight in front of the goal and the Perth, Australia, native ripped a low-to-low shot from 13 yards out to make it a 4-3 game.

The game got back to all-square less than a minute later when junior All-American Ryan Young scored on another wrap-around from the left side. A terrific screen set by junior Grant Catalino helped Young's goal. The goals wouldn't have happened if not for All-American defender Max Schmidt diving to gain possession for the Terps following a Carolina shot.

Carolina retook the lead with a goal by Sean DeLaney at the 12:15 mark. The Tar Heels upped their advantage three minutes later with an extra-man goal by Gavin Petracca. Holman scored his second of the game with 1:36 left in the third to give UNC a 7-4 lead going into the fourth quarter.

The Terps' extra-man unit rose to the occasion again. Catalino's pin-point pass to the crease found Sear open and he was able to quickly turn and shoot to make it a two-goal game at 12:32 of the fourth quarter.

But UNC answered right back off the ensuing face-off as Holman scored his third of the game to up the Carolina lead back to three at the 12:18 mark.

The Terps refused to go away and once again it was the extra-man unit leading the charge, but this time it was anything but a conventional EMO goal. A loose ball scramble ended with a tough groundball by Young, who weaved his way to the middle of the attack zone and ripped a 12-yard shot past UNC goalie Chris Madalon to make it a two-goal Tar Heel lead at the 7:16 mark.

Holman continued to keep the Tar Heels in control of the game, scoring his fourth goal of the day with 2:31 left, sealing the game for Carolina.

Catalino scored for the Terps as the clock was winding down to make the final score 9-7.

Defensively, Brett Schmidt, who finished with four groundballs and three caused turnovers, and Bryn Holmes, who had a team-high five groundballs, led Maryland. Senior goalie Brian Phipps made seven saves in holding Carolina to three goals under its season average.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Senior Will Yeatman scored a career high four goals to lead the No. 4 University of Maryland men's lacrosse team back from a 6-0 first quarter deficit, but the No. 1 Virginia Cavaliers held on to take an 11-10 decision in front of 7,636 fans Saturday night at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium.

The Terps (6-2, 1-2 ACC) outscored the Cavaliers (10-0, 1-0 ACC) 10-5 over the last 45:06. But, like the last two Maryland-Virginia games, this one was not without controversy. With just a little more than two minutes remaining Virginia goalie Adam Ghitelman stopped a shot by junior Grant Catalino, but the rebound bounced in front of the crease where junior All-American Ryan Young swatted the loose ball into the Cavalier goal. But the goal was waived off when an official whistled Young for being in the crease, disallowing the goal. However, the controversy came after television replays showed that Young was not in the crease when the goal was scored.

The Cavaliers won the first seven face-offs of the game to help build their 6-0 lead. Chris Bocklet scored the first three Wahoo goals, with the next three coming from Brian Carroll, Steele Stanwick and John Haldy.

The deficit could have been insurmountable if not for the play of senior goalie Brian Phipps. The Annapolis, Md., native made eight of his 16 saves in the first quarter to keep the Terps in the game.

Maryland finally broke through with just six ticks left on the first quarter clock when Yeatman took a feed from Young and ripped a low shot past Ghitelman to make it a 6-1 game.

The second quarter saw more good defense by Maryland, including the man-down unit killing two extra-man chances by the Cavaliers on two key stops by Phipps.

Stanwick broke the scoreless drought for both teams with his second goal at the 3:38 mark. That was quickly followed up by an unassisted tally by Yeatman, who scored from the right wing on a open shot that was setup by a terrific pick by sophomore Joe Cummings that gave Yeatman the time and space needed for the shot.

Virginia had a last-second scoring chance before the half ended, but Phipps made his 13th save of the first half to send the the Terps into the break trailing 7-2.

Once again it was the Cavaliers drawing first blood in the opening minutes of the third quarter on Bocklet's fourth goal of the night, but Maryland's defense kept Virginia off the board for the rest of the quarter, allowing the offense to go on a 3-0 run to cut the deficit to four goals heading into the fourth quarter.

Yeatman scored the first goal of the run at the 12:26 mark. The Terps' second midfield got into the scoring act on the next Maryland goal when redshirt sophomore Drew Snider found freshman John Haus at the top of the right alley where he ripped a shot into the Cavalier goal with 10:44 remaining in the third.

Virginia won the ensuing face-off, but again the Maryland defense held strong. Junior All-American Max Schmidt had both of his caused turnovers in a one minute span and Phipps made both of his third quarter saves to keep the Wahoos off the board.

The final tally of the three-goal run for the Terps was another terrific transition effort by the Terps' defense. Senior Bryn Holmes forced a turnover by Virginia's Rhamel Bratton. The loose ball was scooped up by redshirt junior All-American Brian Farrell, who pushed the ball down the field. He flipped a pass to senior Dean Hart, who beat Ghitelman with just five seconds remaining in the quarter.

Virginia looked to stem the tide with back-to-back goals by Stanwick to open the fourth quarter, but Maryland refused to give in and fought back with a four-goal run to make it an 10-9 game, leading into the controversial crease violation.

The Terrapin man-up unit scored the first and fourth goals of the run. Senior Adam Sear scored the first extra-man goal for Maryland off an assist from junior Travis Reed with 12:01 remaining. Cummings finished the run with a man-up goal of his own with Yeatman picking up the assist at the 3:36 mark.

Sandwiched in between was another goal by Cummings off an assist by Young with 7:41 left. That was quickly followed by Young scoring his only credited goal at the 7:17 mark.

The crease violation call proved all the more damaging for the Terps when Bratton scored an unassisted goal 23 seconds later to put Virginia up by two goals with 1:51 left.

But Maryland continued to fight until the end and pulled back to within a goal with 57 seconds left on Yeatman's fourth goal of the day off an assist from Reed.

Virginia won the following face-off, but junior Brett Schmidt forced a Cavalier turnover with 10 seconds left. He grabbed the loose ball and raced down the field, but his desperation shot went over the Cavalier goal, ending the Terrapin threat.

Maryland's defense was led by Brett Schmidt, who had two groundballs and four caused turnovers. He also drew the assignment of covering Bratton, who's only goal came in the fourth quarter during an unsettled situation. Max Schmidt finished with a pair of groundballs and two caused turnovers, while junior Ryder Bohlander set his career high with four caused turnovers. The Terps' trio of long poles - Farrell, Jesse Bernhard and Dan Halayko - combined for nine groundballs and two caused turnovers.

COLELGE PARK, Md. - The junior attack unit of Grant Catalino, Travis Reed and Ryan Young combined for eight goals and five assists to pace the No. 5 University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to an 11-9 victory over in-state rival Navy in front of 5,618 fans at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium Saturday afternoon.

The victory improves the Terps to 7-2 on the season, while the Midshipmen fall to 5-6.

The opening quarter started as a defensive battle with Navy goalie RJ Wickham making three of his 17 saves in the first nine minutes, while Maryland goalie Brian Phipps made two stops in the first 7:30. The deadlock was finally snapped by Maryland redshirt freshman Owen Blye, who wrapped around the right side of the crease and snuck the ball past Wickham at the 5:34 mark.

But the Mids scored twice, on goals by Joe Lennon and Patrick Moran, in the final two minutes of the first quarter to take a 2-1 lead heading into the second. Lennon would then score again with 10:55 to go in the second to put Navy up 3-1.

Maryland was held without a goal for more than 15 minutes, but Catalino put a stop to the scoreless stretch with three straight goals in a span of 2:28 as the second quarter was coming to a close. He scored his first at the 5:13 mark from the left wing off a feed from redshirt sophomore Drew Snider on a hard shot to the lower right corner.

Catalino's second tally came just over two minutes later off an assist from Young. Young rolled around the back of the cage and fired a great pass to Catalino on the left side where he beat Wickham to tie the game at 3-3.

Catalino finished the natural hat trick 15 seconds later to give Maryland a 4-3 lead heading into halftime. Senior Bryn Holmes won the ensuing face-off with junior Dan Burns picking up one of his five groundballs on the day. Burns flipped the ball back to Holmes, who raced into the attack zone and found Catalino perched on the left wing where he ripped a shot inside the far post.

The Mids would not go down without a fight in the second half and tied the game at 4-4 on Nikk Davis' goal a minute and a half into the third quarter. But that would be the last time Navy shared the lead in the game.

Freshman Jesse Bernhardt caused a turnover during the ensuing face-off to give possession back to the Terps. From there it didn't take Maryland long to regain the lead thanks to the Young-to-Reed connection, which hooked-up for three goals in the game. The first of which came when Bernhardt flipped the ball to Young, who found Reed on the right wing, where he laced a low-to-high shot into the Navy goal to make it a 5-4 game in favor of the Terps.

Sophomore Joe Cummings upped the Maryland lead to 6-4 less than a minute later with a bounce shot from the right alley into the left side of the Midshipmen goal.

Moran scored his second of the day to trim the lead back to one with 11:35 left in the third, but Reed scored back-to-back goals off assists from Young to give Maryland its biggest lead at 8-5 at the 8:13 mark. Reed's second goal of the day was a top-shelf rip from the right wing. His third tally was from the same spot on the wing, but this time he went top near corner and the ball rattled off of the crossbar and the near pipe before bouncing into the net.

Navy continued to fight back and got back to within a goal on back-to-back goals by Kyle Kapron. The second Kapron score came with just 14 seconds left and seemed to give Navy the momentum heading into the fourth quarter, but redshirt junior Brian Farrell and Burns had another idea.

A violation by Navy's Robby Battle on the face-off following Kapron's second goal gave Maryland the ball. Farrell pushed it up the field and passed it to Burns in the left alley. Burns used a quick ball fake to get some separation from his defender and got off a good bounce shot that beat Wickham with four ticks left in the third quarter to push the Maryland lead back to two at 9-7.

The fourth quarter saw Navy and Maryland trade goals with Kapron finishing his hat trick with his third unassisted goal of the day with 12:04 left to make it a one-goal game again at 9-8.

Maryland answered back less than two minutes later on Reed's fourth goal of the day. Cummings dodged past his defender on the left side of the attack box and skip a hard cross-field pass to Reed, who ripped a shot into the far upper corner of the net from his favorite spot on the right wing.

Lennon capped off his hat trick for the Mids with 9:14 left to cut the lead back to one at 10-9, but Young and Reed hooked-up again to score the insurance goal and finish the scoring at the 7:16 mark. Catalino started the play with a skip pass across the field to Reed, who made the "one-more" pass to Young. Young then wrapped around the right side of the crease and scored his lone goal of the day.

While the offense shined, putting up its highest goal total against Navy since 1998, the Terrapin defense also put on a display. The Terps dominated the Mids when the ball was on the ground, winning the groundball battle 47-26. Farrell and junior All-American Max Schmidt led the way for the Terps with five groundballs each, while Bernhardt tied his career high with four. Bernhardt also contributed a career best three caused turnovers in the victory. Junior Brett Schmidt easily won his match-up with Navy's top attackman, Andy Warner, holding the Mids' second leading scorer to just one assist and one shot on the day. Phipps finished the afternoon with 10 saves, to go along with four groundballs.

Both teams entered the game struggling facing-off, but Holmes controlled the X, winning 15 of the 21 draws he took. Overall, the Terps won 17 of 23 face-offs and were a perfect 17-for-17 in the clearing game.

Redshirt sophomore Drew Snider gave Maryland its first lead of the game just over a minute later when he hit a runner from the left alley, putting the Terps up 5-4.

Michael Kimmel, who finished with two goals and two assists on the day, stopped the bleeding for the Blue Jays with an unassisted goal at the 5:51 mark. That goal snapped a 23-minute scoreless stretch for Hopkins, which is the longest Maryland's defense has held an opponent without a goal this season.

But with the game tied at 5-5 Maryland's man-up unit took over the game, scoring three straight over 2:34 to give the Terps an 8-5 lead.

A Sam DeVore holding penalty gave Maryland its first chance of the second half and it took the Terps just 19 seconds to convert. Reed dumped the ball inside to sophomore Joe Cummings, who ball-faked low and finished high for his only goal of the game.

The Blue Jays had two penalties called against them with 11 seconds left in the third, one being an unrelasable unsportsmanlike conduct penalty against Orry Michael, giving the Terps man-up group another chance to score.

This time it took the Terps just 14 seconds to score in the six-on-four situation. Reed put Maryland up 7-5 with a lightning-quick release from the right wing off a feed from Yeatman. That score cancelled out the cross check penalty on Hopkins' Matt Drenan, but Michael had to remain in the box giving the Terps another extra-man opportunity and they did not waste it.

Reed sent a pass from the top center position to Catalino on left side of the crease. Catalino dodged past Tucker Durden and got the front of the crease where he beat Bassett with 14:25 remaining in the fourth quarter.

Maryland took its biggest lead of the game with 12:12 to go in the fourth. Yeatman split a Blue Jay double-team and took a shot from the left side of the crease that looked like Bassett got a piece of, but it trickled into the goal, giving Maryland a 9-5 advantage.

But the Blue Jays would not go down without a fight and regained some momentum with back-to-back goals by Steven Boyle, who finished with three goals, and Marshall Burkhardt, cutting the Terrapin lead back to a pair at 9-7 with 7:04 left in the fourth.

The ensuing face-off proved to be one of the decisive moments in the game as freshman Jesse Bernhardt scooped up the groundball and went charging into the Hopkins zone. Bernhardt faked a quick pass to Catalino, who was camped out in the left alley, and ripped a shot from the right alley inside the near post to give Maryland the 10-7 lead at the 6:56 mark.

Johns Hopkins pulled Bassett away from the net and double-teamed whenever Maryland had the ball with just over three minutes left in the game. The strategy nearly paid off. The Terps tried to run out the clock and did not attempt a shot on the open goal, but two turnovers turned into Hopkins' goals in the final two minutes to trim the Terrapin lead to one at 10-9 at the 1:00 mark.

The final face-off of the game was crucial and senior Bryn Holmes won the last of his 13 face-off victories to give Maryland possession and stymie the Hopkins comeback attempt. Redshirt junior Dan Burns picked up the groundball and flipped the ball to Holmes, who ran off more than 40 seconds off the clock before the Blue Jays could force the turnover, giving them one final shot with 13 seconds remaining. But the Blue Jays never got another shot off as Maryland was able to force a turnover and redshirt junior Brian Farrell picked up his game-high sixth groundball to end the threat and the game.

As good as the Maryland man-up unit was, the Terps' man-down groups was equally as good, stopping Hopkins' first six extra-man attempts.

Maryland's comeback was keyed by its effort at the face-off X and when the ball was on the ground. Hopkins won five of the nine face-offs and had a 15-12 lead in groundballs at the half. But the Terps turned things around in the second half, winning nine of the 13 face-offs, all of them by Holmes, and overpowering the Blue Jays 19-6 in groundballs.

Junior Brett Schmidt continued his defensive dominance, holding Tom Palasek without a point or a shot in the game. Schmidt finished the game with two groundballs and a caused turnover. Junior All-American Max Schmidt also had two groundballs and a caused turnover, while junior Ryder Bohlander had four groundballs.

In addition to winning 13 of 21 face-offs, Holmes had three groundballs and two caused turnovers. Senior goalie Brian Phipps was solid in cage for the Terps, stopping eight Blue Jay shots.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Junior attackman Grant Catalino scored a career-high six goals to lead the No. 4 University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to a decisive 13-5 victory over No. 3 North Carolina in the semifinals of the ACC tournament Friday night at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium.

Maryland (9-2) will compete for the ACC tournament championship for the first time since 2006 on Sunday, April 25, when it takes on No. 1 seed Virginia, which dispatched No. 4 seed Duke in the first semifinal by a score of 16-12. The Terps and Cavaliers are slated for a 3:30 p.m. start at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium.

The Terps never trailed in the game and jumped out to an early 1-0 lead on Catalino's first tally of the day, a simple dodge around his defender that he finished with a sneaky shot over Carolina goalie Chris Madalon's shoulder.

Junior attackman Ryan Young, who finished with four points on a goal and a game-high three assists, gave Maryland a 2-0 lead going into the second quarter with a wrap-around goal at the 2:26 mark of the first.

Maryland was able to get off to such a good start thanks to senior Bryn Holmes, who dominated the face-off X. Holmes won all three first quarter face-offs and 4 of 6 in the second quarter to give Maryland an overwhelming advantage in possession time. He finished the day winning 13 of 20 face-offs.

Redshirt-junior Brian Farrell gave the Terps a 3-0 lead in early in the second quarter with a nice transition goal that started with a big save by senior Brian Phipps on a tough shot by UNC's Gavin Petracca. Phipps made the save and the rebound was picked up by senior Dean Hart, who got the ball ahead to Farrell. Carolina didn't pick Farrell up as he entered the attack zone and he made the Tar Heels pay by ripping a shot past Madalon.

Carolina finally got on the board, snapping a scoreless stretch of 22:44 with Jimmy Dunster's only goal of the evening at the 8:16 mark of the second.

But Maryland responded with Catalino's second goal of the night four minutes later. Redshirt junior Dan Burns dodged his defender and slipped a pass to Catalino, who curled into the right wing and buried a shot inside the near pipe.

After a Carolina goal by Thomas Wood cut the Maryland lead back to 4-2 freshman John Haus, who grew up playing lacrosse in North Carolina, scored his first of three on the night. It was again a save by Phipps that started the transition opportunity, but this time it was Hart pushing the ball up the field. He drifted into the left side of the UNC box and saw Haus coming in from the midfield line. Hart hit Haus with a good pass in stride and Haus stepped into a shot and laced a low 12-yarder past Madalon to give the Terps a three-goal cushion going into halftime.

The third quarter was all Maryland as the Terps outscored the Tar Heels 3-0. Haus scored his second of the game at the 10:30 mark to put the Terps up 6-2. Catalino then scored back-to-back goals, the first coming on the extra-man unit off an assist from Young and the second off an assist from Burns, to up the Maryland lead to 8-2 at the end of the third.

Maryland's scoring barrage continued into the fourth quarter with Haus's third goal of the evening, just 40 seconds into the quarter. Haus came around from behind the left side of the Carolina goal on the invert and was knocked to the ground, falling away from the crease. But Hause somehow managed to flip the ball over his shoulder past Madalon for the 9-2 Terrapin lead.

A violation on the ensuing face-off gave Maryland the ball right back and Farrell made the Tar Heels pay immediately. Holmes took the free possession and raced into the Carolina box. The Tar Heels stopped his progression, but Holmes found Farrell in the left alley, where he ripped a shot from 15 yards into the upper far corner to give the Terps an eight goal lead.

Carolina tried to claw back into the game with goals by Marcus Holman, Wood and Petracca, but the Terps would not be denied on this night.

Catalino scored back-to-back goals midway through the fourth quarter to put the game out of reach for good. Catalino's six goals marks the first time a Terp has scored that many since Joe Walters put up six goals at Johns Hopkins in 2006.

Senior attackman Fran Gormley closed out the scoring with his fist goal since 2007 off an assist from Young at the 2:58 mark.

The offense wasn't the only key to the victory as the Terrapin defense was tremendous, playing its best complete game of the season. Junior Brett Schmidt took center stage for the Terps' "D" with his match-up against UNC All-American Billy Bitter. Schmidt was dominating in his performance, holding Bitter without a point for the first time in 30 games. Schmidt, along with help from the rest of the Maryland defense that supported him whenever he needed it, allowed Bitter only one shot in the game and helped four Bitter into committing six turnovers. Schmidt finished the game with two groundballs and a game-high four caused turnovers.

Junior All-American Max Schmidt and junior Ryder Bohlander were also terrific for the Terps at close defense with four groundballs and a caused turnover each. Farrell finished with two groundballs and two caused turnovers, while freshman Jesse Bernhardt had three groundballs and one caused turnover. Phipps was solid in cage for the Terps, stopping 13 shots.

Maryland won the groundball battle over the Tar Heels, 42-33, thanks in large part to winning groundballs in its offensive end of the field. Young finished with five groundballs, while Catalino had four. Gormley and sophomore Joe Cummings each had three groundballs.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The No. 4 University of Maryland men's lacrosse team could not solve Cavalier goalie Adam Ghitleman, who made 16 saves, in a 10-6 loss to No. 2 Virginia in the ACC tournament championship game Sunday afternoon at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium.

The Terps (9-3) got off to a fast start, scoring the first three goals of the game before Ghitleman even made a save.

Redshirt freshman Owen Blye got thing going for Maryland when he took a pass from junior Grant Catalino on the crease and finished for the 1-0 lead at the 10:52 mark of the first.

Redshirt sophomore Drew Snider scored an unassisted goal less than two minutes later to up the Terrapin lead to 2-0.

The lead grew to 3-0 with 7:34 to go in the first when sophomore Michael Shakespeare dodged from the top of the box and got a step on his defender and bounced a shot over Ghitleman's shoulder.

From there the Terrapin offense slowed down, while Ghitleman and the Cavalier's heated up. Virginia (13-1) went on a four-goal run, beginning with a Brian Carroll goal at the 6:49 mark of the first, to take a 4-3 lead with just 2:02 left in the second. Matt White, Rhamel Bratton and Mikey Thompson each scored in the run.

Maryland broke a near 21 minute scoreless stretch off the face-off following Thompson's goal. Senior Bryn Holmes won the face-off by picking up a tough groundball and moving it ahead to redshirt junior Brian Farrell. COLLEGE PARK, Md. - There was no more fitting way for Senior Day to end for the No. 3 University of Maryland men's lacrosse team than with senior Fran Gormley scoring the final goal of the Terps' 17-4 rout of Fairfield on Saturday afternoon at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium.

Maryland (10-3) jumped on the injury-riddled Stags (8-5), who played without three starters, early with six first-quarter goals and never looked back.

Getting things started was the Terps' extra-man unit, which entered the game as the top ranked unit in the nation and, fittingly, it was a senior who got things going for the Terrapins. Senior Adam Sear took a feed from junior Ryan Young and bounced a shot past Stag goalie Joseph Marra, who was the nation's top goalie in both goals-against average and save percentage coming into the game.

Sophomore Joe Cummings, who had his second career hat trick in the game, scored back-to-back goals off feeds from junior Grant Catalino and Young, respectively to push the lead to 3-0 with just under 6:00 in the first.

The Terps' defense, which was smothering all day, keyed the next goal with junior Ryder Bohlander stripping his man of the ball. He then picked up the groundball and pushed it into the Terps' offensive zone. Bohlander made a quick pass to junior Travis Reed, who ripped a shot from the right wing to make it a 4-0 game at the 2:23 mark.

Senior Bryn Holmes won the ensuing face-off with Dan Burns picking up the groundball. Burns pushed the ball up the right alley and tried to feed Holmes with a tricky pass to the front of the crease, but Holmes couldn't come up with it. The ball skipped through the zone right to Catalino, who scooped it up on the left wing and in one motion ripped a shot into to upper right corner of the goal for a 5-0 Maryland lead.

Maryland's offense was clicking on all cylinders and it showed on the Terps' sixth goal of the quarter, which is the most for the Terrapins in any quarter this season. Maryland passed the ball crisply around the perimeter with it eventually making its way to Reed on the right goal line extended. From there, he laced a quick pass across the crease to Young, who one-timed it into the Fairfield goal.

The first quarter came to a close, but the Maryland onslaught continued in the second quarter. Redshirt junior Eric Boyle scored his first goal as a Terp in an unusual manner. Boyle ripped a hard shot from the left alley that Marra got a piece of, but the ball bounced out of his stick and as Marra went to keep it from trickling into the goal he actually helped push it over the line, giving Maryland a 7-0 lead with 13:31 left in the second.

Cummings finished off his hat trick with just over eight minutes left in the first half when he one-timed a bounce shot from the left goal line extended off of a nice cross-field pass from junior Warren Hansen.

Fairfield finally got on the board at the 6:57 mark of the second on a Brent Adams goal, but the Terps scored the final two goals of the second quarter to push its lead to 10-1 at the half.

Catalino got a tricky, but easy score to make it a 9-1 game with 3:11 to go in the quarter. Fairfield was attempting a clear and Marra brought the ball out of the box toward midfield. He tried to lob a pass over Catalino, but he used all of his 6-foot-5 frame and snagged the ball out of midair. He quickly recognized that Marra was out of the goal and quickly shot from 35 yards out and the ball took one bounce and hit the back of the empty net.

In a quarter filled with unusual goals, Maryland's final goal could have been the most unusual with a long pole assisting on a goal scored by another long pole. Senior Brian Phipps stopped a shot by Fairfield's Ryan Mulford and junior Max Schmidt cleared the rebound. He got the ball to freshman long pole Jesse Bernhardt on the break and Bernhardt pushed the transition opportunity. When Bernhardt got into the Fairfield box he saw redshirt junior long pole Brian Farrell free in the left alley and he quickly got the ball to Farrell and Farrell ripped a low shot past Marra.

The halftime break did little to quell the Maryland offense's momentum. Catalino scored his third of the day off an assist by Young to make it an 11-1 game less than four minutes into the third.

Maryland's second midfield got into the scoring act to make it 12-1 when redshirt sophomore Drew Snider slipped a pass to freshman John Haus on the crease and Hause finished the play at the 8:49 mark.

Catalino finished his five-point day with his fourth goal with 4:43 left in the third. Reed fired a pass to Catalino on the left goal line extended, leaving Catalino one-on-one with Charlie Cipriano, who replaced Marra at the start of the third quarter. Catalino faked high before finishing low, upping Maryland's lead to 13-1.

Snider was on the giving end of the next Terrapin goal, giving him his first career multi-assist game. He sent a great pass to Young on the right goal line extended, leaving him one-on-one with Cipriano. This time Young faked low and finished high to give Maryland a 14-1 lead.

Junior Scott LaRue closed out the Terps' 7-0 scoring blitz with a runner down the left alley with 51 seconds left in the third.

Fairfield scored three goals to open the fourth quarter to make it a 15-4 game, but the Terps would score the game's last two to make it a 17-4 final.

Freshman Mike Poiter scored his first career goal at the 4:59 mark off an assist by redshirt freshman Owen Blye.

Blye was again the giver on Gormley's goal to close things out, sending a pass from behind the cage to Gormley on the left wing where he ripped a shot into the upper right corner with 2:21 to go in the fourth.

Maryland's defense was terrific all day, allowing just four goals, which marks the fewest goals allowed in any game this season. Phipps was not challenged much on the day, but finished with seven saves, while allowing just one goal in 44:09 of work. Redshirt sophomore Mark White played the final 15:51 of the game and finished with two saves.

The starting close defense of Bohlander and juniors Brett Schmidt and Max Schmidt were a big reason why the Stags' offense was unable to get anything going. Brett Schmidt set a career best with five caused turnovers to go along with three groundballs. Max Schmidt had three groundballs and a caused turnover, while Bohlander had two groundballs and two caused turnovers.

Maryland's long poles were also terrific. Bernhardt, Farrell and senior Dan Halayko combined for four groundballs and three caused turnovers.

Bryn Holmes continued to dominate the face-off X, winning 9 of 12 face-offs. Curtis Holmes also had a solid day facing-off with five wins and three groundballs.

The game marked the final regular season home game for 10 Maryland seniors: student assistant coach Patrick Hutchinson, student athletic trainer Billy Langenstein, Gormley, Halayko, Dean Hart, Bryn Holmes, Phipps, Chris Ready, Sear and Will Yeatman. Hometown product Ryan Young returned to his alma mater and had four points on two goals and two assists. Grant Catalino and Will Yeatman each had three points on two goals and an assist apiece.

Maryland jumped on the Raiders early, scoring the first three goals of the game. Catalino netted his first following a good face-dodge at the 11:53 mark. Sophomore Joe Cummings converted on Maryland's only man-up opportunity of the game off of an assist from freshman John Haus 47 seconds later. Reed scored his first of the day, finishing from the left wing off an assist by redshirt sophomore Drew Snider with 9:31 left in the first.

Colgate got on the board at the 8:28 mark with a goal by Patrick Campbell, but Maryland answered right back with three goals in less than three minutes to take a 6-1 lead.

Freshman Jesse Bernhardt scooped up the face-off following Campbell's goal and flipped the ball to Reed, who ripped a shot past Raider goalie Jared Madison at the 8:13 mark. Junior Scott LaRue scored an unassisted goal with 7:08 left to make it a 5-1 game.

The lead grew to 6-1 when the Terps' defense led to offense when redshirt junior Brian Farrell pushed a transition opportunity and flipped the ball behind him to redshirt junior Dan Burns, who bounced a 15-yard shot past Madison at the 5:52 mark.

Andrew Mold scored for the Raiders with 3:58 to go in the first to cut the lead back to four, but Maryland scored the final two goals of the quarter to take an 8-2 lead. Young scored his first of the day off of a nice cross-crease pass from Reed with 2:21 remaining.

The transition game came into play again on the next goal as a defensive stop led to an odd-man situation that ended when Reed found senior Bryn Holmes with time-and-room and Holmes finished for his first goal of the season with 1:22 left on the clock.

Colgate opened the second quarter with Mould's second goal of the game, but Maryland responded with Reed scoring on an assist from Cummings with 12:43 left. Back-to-back goals by Peter Baum cut the Maryland lead to 9-5, but another three-goal run pushed the Terp advantage to 12-5.

Junior Warren Hansen and sophomore Jake Bernhard each had unassisted goals, while Yeatman finished the run with his first goal off an assist from Burns.

Colgate's Rob Bosco scored an unassisted goal with 2:14 left and it seemed as if that would give the Raiders some momentum heading into the half, but Young had other ideas. Yeatman picked up the ball following a missed shot with six seconds on the clock. He fired a pass to Young on the right alley and Young took a desperation shot that bounced past Madison with one second left on the clock to send the Terps into the intermission up 13-6.

The third quarter was all Maryland as the Terps held the Raiders scoreless for the quarter and put up five goals of their own to open a 18-6 lead.

Catalino opened the scoring run with an unassisted goal, while Yeatman had the third and Reed had the final two. But the highlight of the quarter was the first career goal by junior defender Max Schmidt. Schmidt scooped up a groundball in the Maryland defensive zone and ran it all the way down to the Colgate defensive zone. The Raiders shutoff the rest of the Terps on that side of the field and tried to strip the ball from Schmidt, but he got through the defense and got off a back-handed shot in front of the crease that got past goalie Tim Harrington.

The Raiders scored four goals in the fourth to make it an 18-10 final.

Senior Brian Phipps was solid in net for the Terps, stopping six shots in just under 43 minutes of action. Back-up goalies Mark White and MJ Leonard played the final 17:24 and had two and three saves, respectively.

Holmes won 10 of 17 face-offs and led the Terps with five groundballs. Max Schmidt finished with one groundball and two caused turnovers, while fellow junior close defenders Ryder Bohlander and Brett Schmidt combined for one groundballs and three caused turnovers. COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Ten different Terps scored goals and senior goalie Brian Phipps made 14 saves to lead the No. 3-seeded University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to an 11-8 victory over Hofstra in the first round of the NCAA Tournament at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium.

Both goalies started out hot with Hofstra's Andrew Gvozden and Phipps each making three saves in the game's opening minutes. The Terps broke through with the game's first goal at the 11:31 mark. After Phipps' third save, junior Brett Schmidt sent an outlet pass to redshirt junior Brian Farrell, who raced untouched down the middle of the field and buried a bounce shot to give Maryland the 1-0 lead.

A Terps' holding penalty gave the Pride the first half's only extra-man opportunity and Jay Card converted with 8:28 to go in the first to knot the score at 1-1.

A terrific heads-up play by junior Grant Catalino gave the Terps a 2-1 lead at the 7:01 mark of the first. A shot by junior Ryan Young went wide and Catalino beat the defender to the ball to retain possession. He then grabbed a ball for a quick restart and scored easily from the left wing.

The lead grew to 3-1 early in the second quarter when freshman John Haus scored from the left wing by ripping a shot into the top right corner of the Pride goal.

Both goalies continued to play well in the second quarter following the Haus goal, keeping the game scoreless for the next 8:47. Gvozden made four saves in that span, while Phipps made a terrific save on a shot by Drew Coholan. The scoreless stretch was finally snapped with Hofstra's Stephen Benz scored an unassisted goal at the 2:59 mark to make it a one-goal game at 3-2.

Redshirt freshman Owen Blye scored with 1:24 left to make it a two-goal Maryland lead off an assist by senior Will Yeatman. But, the play began with a solid screen set by Young, which gave Yeatman enough space to roll around the back right side of the cage and zip a cross-crease pass to Blye, who one-timed the ball after a good backside cut.

It looked like that was how the game would go into halftime, but Card scored his second of the day with seven seconds left on the clock to cut the Maryland lead to one at 4-3.

The Pride took the momentum from Card's late goal and scored the first two of the third quarter to take its first, and only, lead of the day. Kevin Ford scored an unassisted goal to tie the game at 4-4 at the 13:08 mark. Hofstra then took the lead on Tim Holman's first goal of the year with 8:40 left in the third.

Even though they were behind for the first time in the game, the Terps were never rattled and came back with three straight scores to take the lead and control of the game. Sophomore Joe Cummings got things rolling with an unassisted goal at the 7:36 mark to tie the game at 5-5. Cummings dodged from near the top of the restraining line down the left alley, switching from right-handed to left-handed before beating Gvozden inside the far post.

Maryland's transition game, which has been superb all season and was again today, was responsible for giving the Terps the lead back with 5:06 left in the quarter. Freshman Jesse Bernhardt forced a Hofstra turnover, picked up the groundball and got the ball to his brother Jake on the breakout. The ball was checked out of Jake Bernhardt's stick as he entered the offensive zone, but redshirt freshman Dan Bruns picked up the loose ball and got it back to Jake Bernhardt, who scored to give Maryland the 6-5 lead.

The Pride only had three failed clears on the day, but one of them led to the Terps' seventh goal. Senior Dan Halayko caused a turnover on the ride, picked up the groundball and got it ahead to senior Dean Hart. Maryland looked to be setting up its substitution pattern, but Hart took the ball around the back of the cage, got a step on his defender and saw a lot of open space between him and the front of the goal. Hart then rolled around the right side of the game and beat Gvozden left-handed with 2:43 on the clock to make it a 7-5 game going into the fourth quarter.

Hofstra cut the Terps momentum by scoring off the opening face-off of the fourth, but Maryland went on a 4-0 run after that to put the game away.

Once again it was Jesse Bernhardt starting the play by causing a turnover in the Terps' defensive end of the field. He flipped the ball to Burns, who charged down the middle of the field into the Pride defensive zone. A Hofstra defender slid off of junior Travis Reed to stop Burns' run, but Burns recognized the play and got the ball to Reed on the goal line extended. That pass caused another slide from the Pride defense and Reed found a wide-open Young with a cross-crease pass for an easy score, giving the Terps an 7-6 advantage.

An on-field scuffle between Hofstra face-off man John Antoniadis and Young resulted in Antoniadis being given two unsportsmanlike conduct penalties, while Young had to serve one. Maryland was given possession of the ball and killed Young's penalty before settling into its extra-man offense. The Terps precision passing ended when Yeatman moved the ball to senior Adam Sear, who ripped a low shot from the right alley to put the Terps up by three with 7:17 left on the clock.

The third goal of the run was the most acrobatic and athletic goals in recent Terp history. Phipps started the play with a clean save on a shot by Bentz and Maryland quickly advanced the ball into the Pride's defensive zone. Cummings got free moving away from the crease and saw Young cutting from behind the right side of the game to where he just left in front on the crease. Cummings' pass was a bit high, but Young elevated, snagged the ball and had the presence of mind to make sure he landed outside the crease before bouncing a shot that beat Gvozden at the 5:15 mark.

Trailing by four goals with under five minutes to play, Hofstra pulled its goalie and tried to double-team the ball. But the Terps, who had struggled in situations like this earlier in the season, maintained their composure. Yeatman eventually broke through a double-team and scored an empty-netter to make it an 11-6 game with 3:08 to go.

Card scored two goals in the final 1:11, both coming off assists from Holman to make the final score 11-8.

Phipps ended up winning the goalie match-up with Gvozden, 14 saves to 13. Phipps also ended up with three groundballs and a caused turnover in his last game at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium. The Terps' close defense was terrific in front of Phipps. The junior trio of Ryder Bohlander, Brett Schmidt and Mach Schmidt each finished with three groundballs. Bohlander was assigned to cover Hofstra's leading scorer Jamie Lincoln and held Lincoln to just one shot.

Maryland's long poles were also solid with Farrell picking up a game-high six groundballs and causing two turnovers. Jesse Bernhardt had three groundballs and two caused turnovers, while Halayko had two groundballs and one caused turnover.

Another key factor coming into the game was face-offs and senior Bryn Holmes tied his career high with 15 wins at the X.


