THE COUNT DOWN

- ... Since 2002 Maryland has won 93 of the 102 games in which the Terps have scored 10 or more goals for a .912 winning percentage.
- ... Maryland is 110-25 in games since 2002 when it allows nine goals or less, for an .815 winning percentage.
- ... John Tillman is 6-2 in eight NCAA tournament game as Maryland's head coach.
- ... Seven Terrapin seniors - Joe Cummings, MJ Leonard, David Miller, Pat Morrison, Tim Shaeffer, Michael Shakespeare and Drew Snider - finished their Maryland careers in 2012.
- ... Maryland defeated six teams that were ranked in the top 10 when the game was played in 2012.
- ... Maryland has made the Final Four five times since the field expanded to 16 teams in 2003.
- ... Drew Snider had four of his six career hat tricks in NCAA tournament play.
- ... Three Terps - Jesse Bernhardt, Joe Cummings and Drew Snider - were named to the 2012 NCAA All-Tournament Team.
- ... Maryland finished No. 2 in the final Inside Lacrosse media poll.
- ... Only one NCAA Division I school has never had a losing season - Maryland.

FACING OFF

TERPS END 2012 SEASON IN NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

- The unseeded Maryland men's lacrosse team was unseeded going into the 2012 NCAA tournament, but the Terps pulled off three upset wins to reach the championship game for the second consecutive season, but the dream season came to an end with a 9-3 loss to No. 1 seed Virginia on Memorial Day.
- Maryland finished with a 12-6 record after making its first back-to-back appearances in the Final Four since 2005-06. Maryland was led by senior attackman **Joe Cummings**, who had 31 goals and 19 assists for 50 points. Cummings becomes the first Terrapin senior to reach the 50-point plateau since Michael Phipps had 50 in 2007. Junior **Owen Blye** was the team leader in assists with 20. Sophomore goalie **Niko Amato** was solid in his second season as a stater with a .540 save percentage and a goals-against average of 7.50. Junior long pole **Jesse Bernhardt** earned second team All-America honors after leading the team with 33 caused turnovers and was second on the squad with 60 groundballs.
- The Terps say goodbye to seven seniors: **Joe Cummings, MJ Leonard, David Miller, Pat Morrison, Tim Shaeffer, Michael Shakespeare** and **Drew Snider**. In addition to playing key roles in the Terps' two NCAA Final Four runs, the 2012 senior class compiled a 47-22 (.681) record during its time in College Park, helped the Terps win the 2011 ACC Championship and made four trips to the NCAA tournament.

POSTSEASON NOTES

TILLMAN FINISHES SECOND SEASON AT HELM OF TERRAPIN PROGRAM

- John Tillman** is in his fifth season as a head coach, and second with the Terps, with a 45-30 career record for a 60.0 winning percentage. Tillman is 25-11 (.694) as Maryland's head coach. He had a 20-19 record in three seasons as the head coach at Harvard.

TILLMAN IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

- John Tillman** has led the Terps to eight NCAA tournament game as their head coach.
- Maryland's 10-9 victory at No. 7 seed Lehigh on May 13 made Tillman 2-0 in first round games. He improved to 2-0 in quarterfinals as well with an 11-5 win over No. 2 seed Johns Hopkins on May 19. He then improved to 2-0 in semifinals with the 16-10 win over No. 3 Duke on May 26. Overall, Tillman is 6-2 in NCAA tournament games.
- The win over Hopkins in the quarters made Tillman the only coach in NCAA history to guide two unseeded teams to back-to-back appearances in the Final Four.
- Maryland's run to the 2011 NCAA title game gave Tillman his first four NCAA tournament games as a head coach. He had a 3-1 record after the Terps defeated No. 8 seed UNC in the first round on May 15, No. 1 seed Syracuse on May 22 and No. 5 seed Duke on May 28 before losing to No. 7 seed Virginia.
- As an assistant coach, Tillman helped guide Navy to four consecutive NCAA tournaments from 2004-07, including a run to the 2004 championship game.

MARYLAND'S 35TH TIME AT NCAA'S

- Maryland made its 35th overall NCAA Tournament appearance in 2012. The Terps have played in the second-most tournaments since the event began in 1971. Only Hopkins has played in more, making its 41st appearance this season. Virginia is also making its 35th NCAA appearance. The Terps have captured two NCAA championships, 1973 and 1975.

MARYLAND'S RECORD IN NCAA'S

- The Terps have won the fourth-most Division I NCAA Tournament games, compiling a 48-33 overall record in 81 games. Only Johns Hopkins (67-32) and Syracuse (59-21) have won more Division I tournament games. Virginia (48-30) is tied with the Terps.
- Maryland is seventh by percentage (.593) among all teams ever to play in the tournament. Only Syracuse (59-21, .738), Princeton (30-14, .682), Johns Hopkins (67-32, .677), Duke (24-15, .615) and Virginia (48-30, .615) are ahead of the Terps.
- The Terps have captured two titles. Only eight other schools have ever won the NCAA Championship: Syracuse (10), Johns Hopkins (9), Princeton (6), North Carolina (4), Virginia (5), Cornell (3), Duke (1) and Loyola (1).

MARYLAND UNSEEDDED IN THE TOURNAMENT

- This season marked the sixth time that Maryland has been unseeded since the tournament began in 1972. The Terps were previously unseeded in 1993, 1994, 1997, 2009 and 2011. Maryland is 10-6 (.625) all-time as an unseeded team.
- In those first two unseeded-years Maryland lost its first round game to the No. 8-seeded team, which were Army and Duke, respectively.
- The Terrapins were much more successful in 1997, advancing to the NCAA championship game. Maryland defeated No. 7-seed Georgetown in the first round before knocking off No. 2 Virginia in the quarters. In the 1997 Final Four Maryland upset No. 3 Syracuse, but couldn't topple No. 1-seed Princeton in the finals.
- The 2009 Terps were the lone unseeded team to win a first round game, knocking off previously unbeaten Notre Dame, 7-3. The Terps lost to eventual national champion Syracuse in the quarterfinals.
- Last season saw the Terps head into the tournament unseeded, but Maryland advanced to the NCAA title game, knocking off No. 8 seed North Carolina in the first round, No. 1 seed Syracuse in the quarterfinals and No. 5 seed Duke in the semifinals. The Terrapins' run ended with a 9-7 loss to No. 7 seed Virginia in the championship game.

GET TO 10 AND WIN

- One axiom of lacrosse is that if you score 10 goals or more your chances of winning are pretty good. Well, a look at the results since 2002 shows that when Maryland scores 10 or more goals there's not just a pretty good chance the Terrapins will win; it's an almost certainty. Since 2002 Maryland has won 93 of the 102 games in which the Terps have scored 10 or more goals for a .912 winning percentage.
- Maryland scored 10, but fell at North Carolina, 11-10, on March 24, 2012 and again came out on the losing end, despite scoring 11 in a 13-11 loss at Colgate on May 5, 2012. The Terps scored 11 vs. Johns Hopkins on April 16, 2011, but the Blue Jays won the game in overtime, 12-11. On April 3 of last season the Terps lost to No. 1 Virginia by a final of 11-10, giving Maryland its only loss when scoring 10 or more goals in 2010. In 2009 the Terps lost to Georgetown, 13-10 on Feb. 21 and lost again when scoring 10 in the ACC Semifinals in a 16-10 defeat at North Carolina. Prior to that, Maryland had not lost when scoring 10 or more goals since dropping an 11-10 decision to Virginia in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament in Durham, N.C. The Terrapins got to 10 goals in the 100th game against Johns Hopkins, but the Blue Jays took the game 14-10. Virginia is the only team to beat the Terps twice when allowing 10 or more goals. The Wahoos did it first in 2002 with another 11-10 decision.

HOLDING OPPONENTS TO SINGLE-DIGITS

- The Terps have been extremely impressive (winning 91.2 percent of its games since 2002) when it scores 10 or more goals, they have been nearly as impressive when holding opponents to less than 10 goals during that span.
- Since 2002 Maryland is 110-25 in games, for a .815 winning percentage, when it has held opponents under 10 goals. The Terps have played 177 total games since 2002. Maryland has held opponents to nine goals or less 76.2 percent of the time.

ELITE COMPANY

- With four points in the Terps' 12-8 win at Mount St. Mary's on April 25, senior attackman **Joe Cummings** became a member of an elite club at Maryland - The 100-Point Club. Cummings became just the 38th player in the program's 87-year history to reach the 100 point plateau. He is now 30th on the all-time points list with 116 after having one assist vs. Loyola in the finals of the NCAA tournament.
- Since men's lacrosse became a fully-recognized championship sport by the NCAA in 1971 only 25 Maryland players have reached 100 career points. (Players who played their entire careers in the championship era).
- Cummings also joined another elite club with his 11th career hat trick at The Mount, becoming one of just 20 Terrapins players to have scored at least 75 career goals. He finished his career 18th on the career goals list at Maryland with 86.

CONSECUTIVE 10-WIN SEASONS

- Maryland's 10-9 win over the Mountain Hawks extended the Terps' streak of double-digit win seasons to 10. (Special thanks to Patrick Stevens of the *Washington Times*).

- The difference between winning and losing for Maryland this season is simple - when the Terps shoot well they win. As it turns out 30% is the magic number for the Terps this season. Maryland is 12-6 on the year and has shot 30% or better in 10 of its 12 victories. In five of the Terps' six losses Maryland failed to shoot 30%.

- Since 2005 the Terps are a remarkable 55-4 (.932) when shooting 30% or better in a game. The only four losses were: 13-10 to Georgetown in 2009 (the Terps shot 10 of 30 for 33.3% vs. the Hoyas), 11-10 to No. 1 Virginia on April 3, 2010 (10 of 33 for 30.3%), 12-11 in overtime on April 16, 2011 to No. 3 Johns Hopkins (11 of 28 for 39.3%) and 13-11 at Colgate on May 5, 2012 (11 of 31 for 35.5%).

TERPS IN PRO STADIUMS

- Maryland has played 17 games in an NFL stadium. All-time the Terps are 10-7 (.588) in professional stadiums.
- In 2012, The Terps were 1-1 with both games taking place at Gillette Stadium in Foxborough, Mass., in the Final Four. Maryland defeated No. 3 seed Duke, 16-10, in the semis before falling to No. 1 seed Loyola, 9-3, in the title game.
- Last year Maryland played No. 1 seed Syracuse in the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament in Gillette Stadium in Foxborough, Mass., and the Terps pulled out a 6-5 victory in overtime. Maryland then defeated Duke, 9-5, and lost to Virginia, 9-7, in M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore in the Final Four.
- The Terps played two games in 2010 in NFL Stadiums in the regular season. Maryland defeated Duke 11-10 in overtime in the Face-Off Classic. Maryland returned to M&T Bank Stadium in April for the Day of Rivals and bested Johns Hopkins, 10-9.
- In 2009, Maryland topped Duke, 11-8, at the Face-Off Classic at M&T Bank Stadium and lost a 10-9 decision to Johns Hopkins in the inaugural Day of Rivals.
- In 2006, the Terps were 1-1 at M&T Bank Stadium, defeating North Carolina, 10-9, in the ACC semis at M&T Bank Stadium before dropping an 11-5 decision to Virginia in the finals. Maryland then lost to UMass, 8-5, at Lincoln Financial Field in the NCAA Semifinals.
- In 2005, Maryland was 3-1 in NFL stadiums - 1-1 at Lincoln Financial Field and 2-0 at M&T Bank Stadium.
- Maryland lost to Virginia in the 2003 NCAA Semifinals in M&T Bank Stadium.

THE 700 CLUB

- Maryland's 15-6 victory over Penn on April 14, 2009 was the program's 700th victory in 84 seasons of varsity men's lacrosse. The Terps join Johns Hopkins, Syracuse, Navy and Army as the only programs with 700 or more Division I wins.
- Two things that make Maryland's accomplishment all the more impressive is that the Terps reached the 700-win plateau in just their 84th season. Only Syracuse reached win No. 700 in as few seasons, but it took the Orange 53 more games than Maryland. In fact, Maryland needed only 940 games to reach 700 wins and only Johns Hopkins needed fewer games (932) to hit the historic number, but the Blue Jays did so in their 105th season.

TERPS' 87TH SEASON OF LACROSSE

- The Terps boast an all-time record of 740-253-4 (.744), dating back to the first varsity team in 1924 (a team was not fielded in 1944 and 1945 due to World War II). Maryland has finished every one of its previous 85 seasons with a .500 or better record, including last season when the Terps went 10-6. The program reached the 700-win milestone with a 15-6 victory over Penn on April 14, 2009 at Ludwig Field.
- During the decade of the 2000s, Maryland went 111-49 for a .694 win percentage, making it the winningest decade in Terrapin lacrosse history. In the decade of the 1990s, Maryland posted a 95-47 record. The .669 winning percentage matched Maryland's win percentage of the 1980s when the Terps went 83-41 and also compiled a .669 win percentage. So far, Maryland is 25-9 in the 2010's for a .735 winning percentage.

CUMMINGS NAMED MALE ATHLETE OF THE YEAR AT INAUGURAL TERP AWARDS

- Senior **Joe Cummings** took home the top honor at the inaugural Terp Awards celebration on Tuesday, May 8, being selected as the 2012 Male Athlete of the Year. The Towson, Md., native was also recognized by the ACC for his community service efforts.
- Junior **Owen Blye** was the recipient of the men's lacrosse Academic Achievement Award, which is presented to the junior or senior from each team with the highest cumulative GPA.
- Senior **Jake Bernhardt** may have been sidelined from the field this season due to injury, but that didn't stop him from contributing in the community and he was honored with the men's lacrosse Community Service Award.

BERNHARDT, MURRAY EARN ANNUAL ACC AWARDS

- Junior long pole Jesse Bernhardt and freshman defender Goran Murray were among the five student-athletes recognized as recipients of the annual ACC men's lacrosse individual awards.
- Bernhardt, a native of Longwood, Fla., shares the inaugural ACC Defensive Player of the Year award with Duke's CJ Costabile.
- Murray, a native of Merion Station, Pa., becomes the seventh Terp to be named the ACC Freshman of the Year. He is the first since 2007 when Brian Phipps earned the honor and the first Maryland defender since Michael Howley won the honor. Murray has started all 11 games for the Terps and became the first freshman close defender to start a season opener since 2008.

LEAGUE-BEST FOUR TERPS NAMED TO ALL-ACC TEAM

- Maryland placed a league-high four players on the 2012 All-ACC Men's Lacrosse Team, which was announced today by the Atlantic Coast Conference. Senior attackman Joe Cummings and sophomore goalie Niko Amato made the team for the second-straight season, while junior long pole Jesse Bernhardt and junior midfielder John Haus are first-time selections.
- All four ACC men's programs are represented on the annual All-ACC team, which was determined by a vote of the four head coaches. Maryland's four honorees were the most by any school. Duke and Virginia each had three selections, while North Carolina had one player make the team.

GOING PURPLE

- Once again this season, the Terps will be wearing purple "MY" stickers, to show their support for the fight against pancreatic cancer, which touched everyone in the Maryland lacrosse family last season with the passing of Maria Young on April 17.
- This past fall the Terps, Maryland alums and family and friends came together for the inaugural Forever Young Walk/Run for Pancreatic Cancer Awareness.
- Here are some facts about pancreatic cancer from the American Cancer Society:
 - More than 43,000 new cases of pancreatic cancer present each year
 - There are more than 36,000 deaths from pancreatic cancer each year
 - The lifetime risk of having pancreatic cancer is about 1 in 71.
 - The risk is about the same for both men and women.

GOING GRAY

- Maryland players will also be wearing gray stickers with the number 42 in honor of Zack Wholley's father, John, who passed away from brain cancer on August 28, 2011.
- Here are some facts about brain and spinal cord tumors from the American Cancer Society:
 - About 22,910 malignant tumors of the brain or spinal cord (12,630 in males and 10,280 in females) will be diagnosed. These numbers would likely be much higher if benign tumors were also included.
 - About 13,700 people (7,720 males and 5,980 females) will die from these tumors.
 - Overall, the chance that a person will develop a malignant tumor of the brain or spinal cord in his or her lifetime is about one in 150 for a man and one in 185 for a woman.

YOUTH IS SERVED

- Maryland started two sophomores (**Michael Ehrhardt** and **Brian Cooper**) and a freshman (**Goran Murray**) at close defense in the 2012 season-opening win over Hartford. The last time Maryland's defense had two sophomore and one freshman starting was 2005 when sophomores Steve Whittenberg and Ray Megill started alongside freshman Joe Cinosky. The first game that group started together was April 23, 2005 at Fairfield (a 9-6 Terrapin win).
- **Goran Murray** became the first Maryland freshman to start at close defense in a season opener since 2008 when Max Schmidt started in an 11-6 win at Georgetown.

FACEOFF FIRSTS

- Junior **Curtis Holmes'** 19-of-20 (.950) performance facing-off vs. Hartford in the 2012 season opener is just the fifth time since 2000 that a Maryland faceoff man has won at least 90% of his draws with at least 10 attempts.
- Holmes joins Andy Claxton and Brian Haggerty as the only Terps with multiple games of 19 or more faceoff wins. Claxton did it three times (27 at Towson in 1991, 21 vs. Duke in 1991 and 19 at Brown in 1991), while Haggerty did it twice (20 vs. Butler in 1998 and 19 vs. Virginia in 1998). Holmes had 20 wins vs. Georgetown last season to go along with his 19 vs. the Hawks, which makes him the only Terp to win 19 or more face-offs in different seasons.
- The last 90% performance was in 2008 when Bryn Holmes, Curtis' older brother, won 9-of-10 face-offs at Mount St. Mary's.
- The last time a Terp faced-off with a winning percentage above 90% was on March 21, 2006 when David Tamberrino won 12-of-13 in a 14-2 win over Dartmouth.

JOHN TILLMAN

HEAD COACH • SECOND SEASON AT MARYLAND • CORNELL '91

John Tillman was hired as the University of Maryland's head men's lacrosse coach on June 16, 2010, becoming the ninth coach in the 85-year history of the program. Tillman came to College Park after three years returning Harvard lacrosse to national prominence and twelve seasons as the top assistant at Navy, during which the Midshipmen experienced some of the best years in their storied history.

In his first season in College Park Tillman guided the Terps to a 13-5 record, the 2011 ACC championship (the program's first since 2005) and a berth in the NCAA championship game (the first for the Terps since 1998). Eight Terrapins earned All-America honors in Tillman's first season, which is the most Maryland players selected in a single-season since 2004.

Widely considered one of the top young coaches in the country and a dynamic recruiter, Tillman was the head men's lacrosse coach at Harvard for three seasons prior to his arrival in College Park. His last recruiting class for the Crimson was rated No. 3 in the nation, according to Inside Lacrosse.

During his three seasons at Harvard, Tillman compiled an overall record of 20-19, including an 8-5 mark in 2009, which was the Crimson's highest win total since 1999.

Tillman's time at Harvard produced a number of the most memorable wins in the program's history. This past season, during which Harvard climbed as high as No. 11 in the national polls, Tillman guided the Crimson to an 11-8 victory over No. 6 Princeton, which was the first time Harvard had defeated the Tigers in 20 years. In 2009, Tillman led the Crimson to a season-opening 9-6 upset victory at No. 5 Duke.

Tillman improved his teams in every aspect over the past three seasons. Prior to his arrival in Cambridge, Mass., the Crimson ranked 40th and 42nd, respectively, in total offense and defense. Tillman's defense ranked as high as No. 3 in the nation, while his offense rose to No. 15 in the country. He also dramatically improved Harvard's extra-man offense, from the 51st-ranked unit before he arrived, to a perennial top 15 unit.

Prior to Harvard, Tillman spent 12 seasons at the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md. After six seasons as an assistant coach, he was promoted to head assistant coach and offensive coordinator prior to the 2002 season. From 2004 through 2007, Tillman helped lead the Midshipmen to the some of the most successful seasons

in program history, including four straight NCAA tournament berths, four consecutive Patriot League tournament titles and four straight Patriot League regular season championships.

In 2004, with Tillman at the helm of the Navy offense, the Mids made a remarkable run through the NCAA tournament, defeating three Ivy League teams (Penn. Cornell and Princeton) en route to a spot in the national championship game. Tillman's offense was a key component of Navy's success that season, ranking third in the nation in scoring offense. Following the Mids' tremendous 2004 season, Tillman was awarded the first of his two Collegiate Lacrosse Assistant Coach of the Year Awards by the Maryland State Lacrosse Coaches Association.

During his 12 season at the Naval Academy, Tillman was responsible for helping develop first team All-America midfielders Graham Gill and Billy Looney and second team All-America attackman Jon Birsner. In his 12 seasons in Annapolis, the Mids compiled an overall record of 104-63.

Tillman started his coaching career as an assistant coach at Ithaca College. He spent four seasons (1992-95) with the Bombers, helping lead them to the Division III national semifinals in 1992.

In addition to his extensive coaching experience, Tillman also serves as a member of the Tewaaron Award Men's Selection Committee.

A 1991 graduate of Cornell University's School of Hotel Administration, Tillman was a three-year member of the school's Dean's list. He had the opportunity to play for legendary coach Richie Moran and was a member of the 1989 squad that earned a berth in the NCAA tournament. Tillman was a goalie when he entered college, but played a number of positions for the Big Red, giving him a great appreciation and understanding for the overall game of lacrosse.

Tillman played professionally for the Baltimore Thunder and the Washington Power of the National Lacrosse League. During his final two seasons in Baltimore, he helped the Thunder reach the NLL Championship and Semifinals. Tillman also played for the Toyota Lacrosse Club, who won five-consecutive Southern Division Championships, including a world championship in 2000.

A native of Corning, N.Y., Tillman was previously commissioned into the U.S. Navy as a fleet support officer and was awarded the Navy Achievement Medal.

2012 GAME RECAPS

GAME 1 # 8 MARYLAND 12 HARTFORD 6 FEBRUARY 18, 2012 CAPITAL ONE FIELD AT BYRD STADIUM

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Junior All-American Curtis Holmes dominated face-offs, winning 19-of-20 with a career-best nine groundballs to lead the No. 8 University of Maryland men's lacrosse team to a 12-6 victory over Hartford in the 2012 season opener at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium.

The scoring was evenly distributed for Maryland (1-0) with nine Terps tallying goals. Junior All-American John Haus led the offensive attack, tying his career high with four points on two goals and two assists.

Hartford (0-1) held a 2-0 lead after the first quarter on goals by Aidan Genik and Martin Bowes. Maryland broke a 16:03 scoring drought when senior Drew Snider finished a pass from redshirt sophomore Mike Channechuk with 13:57 remaining in the second quarter.

Junior Billy Gribbin scored his first goal as a Terp to tie the game at 2-2 on a transition goal with the assist coming from senior Michael Shakespeare with 5:57 left in the second.

Hartford regained the lead with sophomore Tate Klidonas finishing a pass from Carter Bender at the 3:21 mark.

The Terps scored the next two to take a 4-3 lead into the half. First, Channechuk connected on a low to high shot from the left wing with 1:03 remaining in the first half. Junior Curtis Holmes won the ensuing face-off and laced a shot from the right alley to give the Maryland its first lead of the game with 57 seconds remaining in the half.

The Hawks regained the lead on back-to-back goals by Kevin O'Shea, making it a 5-4 game at the 10:51 mark of the third.

From there the Terps went on a four-goal run to close out the third and take an 8-5 lead into the fourth quarter. Haus got things rolling, stepping-into a shot and finishing from 10 yards out of an assist from Snider with 6:19 remaining in the third.

Senior All-American Joe Cummings scored his first goal of the 2012 campaign to put the Terps up 6-5 with 4:09 remaining in the third. The play started with a save by sophomore Niko Amato that led to Cummings' transition goal off an assist by sophomore defender Michael Ehrhardt.

The Terps extra-man unit upped their lead to two goals 17 seconds later when Haus added his second goal of the day. Snider dumped the ball to Haus on the crease for the goal.

Maryland finished off the scoring in the third with freshman Jay Carlson scoring his first career goal. Carlson one-timed a cross-crease pass from Haus with 3:01 remaining to make it an 8-5 Terrapin lead going into the fourth.

The Hawks started off the fourth fast by scoring nine seconds into the quarter. O'Shea added his third of the day when he put-back a rebound of an Amato save. That was the last Hawk goal of the game as the Maryland defense held them scoreless for the final 14:51.

The Terrapins ended the game with a four-goal run, the first coming with 12:01 left in the game. Gribbin scored his second of the day by wrapping around the right side and finishing the shot inside the near post.

Freshman Kevin Forster got in on the scoring action when he scored his first goal as a Terp at the 10:52 mark. Forster finished from the right alley on a low-to-high shot off a Cummings assist.

Sophomore attackman Rustin Bryant also added his first career goal in the fourth quarter with 7:41 left, finishing from eight yards out on another feed from Haus.

The last goal of the game came in transition at 5:02 with Carlson adding his second goal of the game. Junior Jesse Bernhardt started the play by stripping Hartford's Carter Bender. Amato scooped up the groundball and hit junior Landon Carr in stride triggering the fast break. Carr quickly moved the ball to sophomore Sean McGwire who found Carlson on the crease for the goal.

Amato came up big for the Terps all afternoon, stopping 12 Hawk shots. His biggest save came late in the first quarter with Maryland trailing 2-0. Genik looked to have an open net after a nice cross-crease pass, but Amato stuffed the shot to keep the Terps in the game. Amato also has another brilliant save in a scramble situation early in the fourth to quell and comeback attempt by Hartford.

The defense in front of Amato was solid with Ehrhardt, sophomore Brian Cooper and freshman Goran Murray all making their first career starts. In addition to his assist, Ehrhardt finished with four groundballs and a caused turnover, while Cooper and Murray each had three groundballs and two caused turnovers.

Maryland dominated groundballs 53-21. In addition to Holmes tying his career high with nine groundballs, Bernhardt and Snider set career highs with eight and seven groundballs, respectively. Bernhardt also caused three Hawk turnovers.

Game Notes:

- With today's 12-6 win Maryland is now 1-0 all-time vs. Hartford.
- Maryland has won 19 straight season openers and is 83-3-1 all-time to start the season.
- With four points on two goals and two assists, junior John Haus now has 12 multi-point, six multi-goal and four multi-assist games for his career.
- With three points on a goal and two assists, senior Drew Snider now has nine multi-point and three multi-assist games for his career.
- With two points on a goal and an assist, senior Joe Cummings now has 21 multi-point games for his career.
- Jay Carlson, Mike Channechuk and Billy Gribbin each had their first multi-point games as Terps.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. - Junior Billy Gribbin had a hat trick to lead the No. 7 Maryland men's lacrosse team, but the Terps dropped an 11-10 decision at No. 14 North Carolina Saturday afternoon at Fetzer Field.

The loss puts the Terrapins at 5-2 on the year and evens their conference mark at 1-1. UNC improves to 6-3 overall and are now 1-0 in ACC play.

A sloppy field led to some sloppy play at the start and that allowed the Tar Heels to take advantage of some Terrapin turnovers to open a 3-0 lead in the first quarter off of goals by Marcus Holman, Will Campbell and Joey Sankey.

Carolina looked to up its lead when freshman Goran Murray was called for an illegal body check, giving the Tar Heels an extra-man opportunity. But sophomore goalie Niko Amato made a big save on the first UNC shot, which allowed the Terps to kill off the penalty.

The Terps used that possession to score its first goal of the game as senior Joe Cummings found Gribbin on the right wing and Gribbin got a shot past UNC goalie Steven Rastivo to make it 3-1 with 2:56 left in the first.

Maryland opened the scoring in the second quarter when junior Owen Blye found Gribbin open at right goal line extended and Gribbin made the Tar Heels pay, making it a 3-2 game at the 12:26 mark.

The Terps appeared to have tied the game with 10:05 to go in the second when Cummings' shot slipped past Rastivo, but the goals was taken off the board due to an interference call on UNC's Tyler Morton. Maryland couldn't convert on the extra-man opportunity keeping the game 3-2 in favor of the Tar Heels.

The game stayed that way until 16 second left in the second when Sankey scored from the left wing top put UNC up by a pair.

It looked like that's the way it would be going into halftime, but junior Curtis Holmes won the ensuing faceoff when junior Landon Carr scooped up the groundball. Carr patiently brought the ball down the right alley, set his feet and unleashed a huge shot that got past Rastivo with just one tick left on the clock.

A violation by UNC's R.G. Keenan on the opening faceoff of the third gave Maryland the ball on a mini-break. Good ball movement from Holmes to junior Jesse Bernhardt to Carr to Cummings on the left wing created a clear look at the goal for Cummings. Rastivo got a piece of the shot, but the ball trickled over the goal line, tying the score at 4-4 just nine seconds into the third.

Amato make a big save on a shot by Jimmy Dunster and made a great outlet pass to Bernhardt. He brought the ball into the box, but was never really picked up by a Tar Heel defender. A couple of pumps by Bernhardt preceded a long low-to-low shot that got past Rastivo, giving Maryland its first lead of the day, 5-4, at 13:13 of the third.

Carolina looked to tie the game on a goal by Chad Tutton at the 11:59 mark, but the officials ruled he was in the crease before getting the shot off.

Two Maryland penalties gave UNC a 6-on-4 advantage and the Tar Heels tied the game at 5-5 with 11:42 left on a goal by Davey Emala.

Carolina retook the lead when Chad Tutton tipped a shot by Holman past Amato at the 10:34 mark.

The Terps tied the game at 6-6 with 6:33 to go in the third. Cummings was swarmed by the UNC defense, but junior Kevin Cooper picked up the tough groundball and moved it to Blye behind the cage. Blye skipped the ball over to the right alley where senior Michael Shakespeare's bouncer found the back of the net.

An unsportsmanlike penalty on Greg McBride gave Maryland an extra-man opportunity and Cummings converted off a feed from Blye to put the Terps back up 7-6 with 5:38 to go.

Two penalties on UNC's Ryan Creighton, including a non-releasable unsportsmanlike conduct foul, near the end of the third gave the Terps the ball and a 1:42 EMO to start the fourth quarter.

However, Maryland couldn't capitalize on the chance for the first 1:41, but as the penalties expired redshirt sophomore Mike Chanenchuk found Gribbin on the right wing where he ripped a shot inside the near pipe to give Maryland an 8-6 lead at the 13:14 mark of the fourth.

Sankey continued to score tough goals, when he split two crashing Terp defenders and slipped a shot past Amato to make it an 8-7 Terp lead with 11:39 left in the fourth.

A slashing call on Murray gave UNC an extra-man opportunity and Keenan won the faceoff giving the Tar Heels a chance to tie the game. Sophomore Michael Ehrhardt blocked a shot by Emala, but Emala picked up the groundball and moved it to Holman, who found Nicky Glasso on the right side of the crease, tying the game at 8-8 at the 10:37 mark.

A slip by junior John Haus created a huge scramble for the ball that ended with Cooper picking up his second tough groundball of the game. He moved it to senior Drew Snider, who had time and room to unleash a big shot from 15 yards out into the upper right corner, tying the game at 9-9 with 7:54 to go.

Campbell scored his second of the day just over a minute later to give UNC a 10-9 lead.

A Maryland turnover turned into a transition opportunity for the Tar Heels and Wood scored his second of the quarter to give UNC a two-goal lead at 11-9 with 2:23 to go.

The Terps had the ball, but turned the ball over. An ugly incident led to ejections for both teams, but Maryland made it a one-goal game with 20 second left.

Murray caused a Jimmy Dunster turnover and then scored his first goal of his career off an assist from Cummings to make it an 11-10 game.

Freshman Charlie Raffa won the final faceoff, giving the Terps a chance. Blye's feed to Cummings on the crease missed him, but got through to Rastivo, but didn't make it past him, preserving the 11-10 win for the Tar Heels.

Amato finished the game with 10 saves, while Rastivo had six. Murray led the Terrapin defense with three groundballs and four caused turnovers. Ehrhardt finished the game with five groundballs.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. - Joe Cummings and Mike Chanenchuk each scored two goals, but Maryland's comeback effort fell short as the No. 8 Terps lost to No. 5 Duke, 6-5, in the ACC tournament semifinals Friday evening at Klockner Stadium.

The loss drops the Terrapins to 7-4 on the season, while the Blue Devils improve to 12-3.

Things went Duke's way right from the start as a faceoff violation on the opening whistle gave the Blue Devils' CJ Costabile a break and he connected, giving Duke a 1-0 lead just six seconds into the game.

A pushing call with 14:05 on Maryland junior Landon Carr gave the Blue Devils a chance to up the lead to two, but the Terps killed the penalty and junior John Haus caused a turnover as soon as the penalty was released and picked up the tough groundball.

Maryland didn't squander the possession. Cummings took matters into his own hands, dodging from right goal-line extended to the wing, where he beat Duke goalie Dan Wigrizer inside far pipe to tie things at 1-1 at the 11:45 mark.

The game remained at 1-1 until 2:17 left in the first. Haus took the ball at the top of the box and used a good face dodge to free himself from Duke's Luke Duprey and have a clear path down the left alley. From there Haus found the net with a low shot to give Maryland its first lead.

The Blue Devils tied the game at two goals apiece with 39 seconds left in the first on a goal by Christian Walsh from the right alley.

Duke had the ball as the third quarter came to a close and Dionne looked to repeat his second quarter heroics with another last-second goal, but this time Amato was up to the challenge and made the huge point-blank save to keep it a 5-4 game going into the fourth.

He quickly found Haus on the left wing and Haus ripped a one-timer for the 8-7 Maryland lead at the 4:25 mark.

The Terrapin midfield continued to have a huge impact as Chanenchuk scored his third of the game for his first hat trick as a Terp. He dodged a shortie from the top of the box and got off a right-handed sidearm shot into the top left corner with 2:08 to play in the third.

BETHLEHEM, Pa. - Senior Joe Cummings scored with six seconds left in the fourth to send the Maryland men's lacrosse team to the NCAA tournament quarterfinals with a 10-9 victory at No. 7 seed Lehigh Sunday night in front of 2,278 at Banko Field at Ulrich Sports Complex.

The Terps (10-5) advance to the quarterfinals and will play No. 2 seed Johns Hopkins game on Sat., May 19 at noon at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium in Annapolis. The Mountain Hawks finish their season with a 14-3 record.

Maryland got off to a quick start with redshirt sophomore Mike Chanenchuk finding senior Drew Snider in the left alley and Snider ripped a shot into the upper right corner with just 1:27 elapsed.

A goal by Lehigh's David DiMaria was waived off at the 10:52 mark, but a pushing call on freshman Goran Murray put the Mountain Hawks up a man and Kyle Stiefel scored off of a feed from DiMaria to tie the game at 1-1 with 10:37 to go in the first.

That's when junior Owen Blye took over the game, figuring into the Terps' next five goals.

The first of those came on the extra-man opportunity following a tripping call on DiMaria. Blye found Cummings on the crease for the easy score with 9:12 to go to make it 2-1 for the Terps.

Blye scored his first goal of the game as the clock wound down in the first quarter, coming around the left side of the cage and scoring from the left wing with just 0:06 left on the clock.

The extra-man unit struck again for the first tally in the second as Blye found junior Billy Gribbin on the right wing and Gribbin ripped a shot past Lehigh goalie Matthew Poillon at the 9:11 mark to up the Terrapin lead to 4-1.

Blye was in the giving mood again less than two minutes later finding freshman Jay Carlson on the crease for his first score since April 6. But, the play wouldn't have been made without Cummings moving the ball to Blye after slipping on the turf behind the cage.

The 5-0 Terrapin run was finished with Blye hitting senior Michael Shakespeare in the left alley and Shakespeare let a laser fly on the step-down shot to make it a 6-1 game with 5:52 to play.

But the Mountain Hawks would not go quietly into the half as DiMaria took advantage of a defensive switch that had him isolated with a short-stick and he scored unassisted from just above left goal line extended.

That goal snapped a scoreless stretch of 21:28 for Lehigh, but the Mountain Hawks turned that into the start of a 3-0 run to close out the second quarter as Stiefel scored twice before the quarter was out to make it a 6-4 game going into halftime.

Lehigh continued its run in the third, holding Maryland scoreless and putting up four of its own to take an 8-6 lead into the final 15:00.

The difference in the third was Poillon, who made six of his xx saves in the quarter to allow Lehigh to build its lead.

Snider ended a scoring skid of 22:26 for the Terps by finishing a feed inside from Chanenchuk with a high bouncer that just got under the crossbar to cut the lead to 8-7 with 13:26 to play in the fourth.

The Mountain Hawks didn't let the Terps build any momentum as Dante Fantoni scored his first of the game to up the lead back to two at 9-7 just 32 seconds later.

Maryland continued to fight and Snider was a big reason why, scoring his third goal of the game on an unassisted goal dodging from the left wing to cut the deficit to one at the 8:03 mark.

The comeback was complete with 6:42 to go in the fourth when Chanenchuk scored unassisted from the right alley with a blistering shot inside the far pipe. That goal pulled the Terps even at 9-9, which was the first time the game was tied since the 13:07 mark of the third when it was 6-6.

Freshman Charlie Raffa, who won 10-of-14 faceoffs for the game, won the ensuing faceoff when a pile up resulted in a conference by the officials, who ended up ruling Terrapin ball on a hold by the Mountain Hawks.

That possession saw junior John Haus lose his defender and get a good look at the goal from close in on the left wing, but Poillon came up with his 15th save of the game.

The Terrapins never gave Lehigh another possession.

Shots by Blye and Kevin Cooper early in the possession were too high, but Blye's second attempt was Poillon's 16th save of the game. However, Poillon couldn't control the rebound and Snider came away with the biggest groundball of the game with just 1:26 remaining.

That set the stage for Cummings' heroics, as he patiently waited as the clock ticked down to under 20 seconds left before making his move, dodging around the right side of the cage and slipping the game-winner past Poillon with just six seconds left.

Raffa finished with a game-high five groundballs, while sophomore goalie Niko Amato was credited with six saves.

ANNAPOLIS, Md. - Senior Drew Snider scored three goals to send the Maryland men's lacrosse team to the Final Four for the second straight season with an 11-5 victory over No. 2 seed Johns Hopkins Saturday afternoon at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium.

The Terps (11-5) will play the No. 5 seed Duke/Colgate game on Sat., May 26 at Gillette Stadium in Foxborough, Mass. The Blue Devils and Raiders are set to play on Sunday at 2:30 p.m. at PPL Park in Philadelphia. The Blue Jays finish their season with a 12-4 record.

The Blue Jays started off the scoring at the 9:13 mark on an unassisted goal by Mark Goodrich, but that would be it for Hopkins in the first quarter.

Maryland got on the board less than two minutes later with a goal from junior John Haus. He dodged down the right wing and turned back to fire a shot that beat JHU goalie Pierce Bassett stick-side-high to even things up at 1-1 with 7:46 remaining in the first quarter.

The Terps took their first lead of the day with 13.6 seconds remaining in the quarter when redshirt sophomore Mike Chanenchuk dodged from behind and redirected the ball to junior Owen Blye, who then found Snider cutting on the right alley. FOXBOROUGH, Mass. - Senior Drew Snider scored four goals to lead the Maryland men's lacrosse team to it's second straight NCAA title game with a 16-10 victory over No. 3 seed Duke in the semifinals Saturday evening at Gillette Stadium.

The Terps (12-5) will play No. 1 seed Loyola on Mon., May 28 at 1 p.m. for the NCAA championship. The Greyhounds advanced to the title game with a 7-5 victory over No. 4 seed Notre Dame in the first semifinal. The Blue Devils finish their season with a 15-5 record.

After a rocky start for both teams that saw the first five possessions of the game end in turnovers, Maryland got on the board first when junior Kevin Cooper skipped a cross-crease pass to junior Billy Gribbin and Gribbin one-timed the ball past Duke goalie Dan Wigrizer with 10:28 to play in the first.

Gribbin then gave the Terps a 2-0 lead at the 3:11 to go in the first when senior Joe Cummings found him open on the crease for an easy score.

The lead grew to 3-0 a minute later when freshman Kevin Forster came around the left side of the Duke goal and hit a running jumper with 2:12 to go. It was Forster's first goal since the Terps' season opener on Feb. 18 vs. Hartford.

The Blue Devils wouldn't let the first quarter go without making a run and goals by Josh Dionne and Rob Rotanz in the final 1:30 made it a 3-2 Terrapin lead going into the second.

The Terps' EMO unit took advantage of the opportunity with junior John Haus skipping a pass to redshirt sophomore Mike Chanenchuk in the top right slot and Chanenchuk ripped a laser into the top left corner to give Maryland a 4-2 lead 32 seconds into the second.

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. - After a back and forth battle in the first half that saw two Terrapin leads and three ties, the University of Maryland men's lacrosse team fell to top-seeded Loyola 9-3 Monday in the NCAA title game in front of 30,816 at Gillette Stadium.

Junior Jesse Bernhardt, redshirt sophomore Mike Chanenchuk, and junior Kevin Cooper scored all three of Maryland's goals in the first 20 minutes of the game, but the Greyhounds (18-1) took a two-goal lead before halftime they would not relinquish.

Jesse Bernhardt put the Terrapins on the board first with 9:34 to go in the first quarter. He went coast to coast down the field for the score after sophomore Michael Ehrhardt forced a Greyhound turnover. Bernhardt did the rest, scoring on a low shot in transition from the right alley.

Loyola tied it up just under five minutes later with a shot by Davis Butts from Chris Layne. Eric Lusby gave the Hounds their first lead at 2-1 with an unassisted goal with 1:55 remaining in the first quarter.

Chanenchuk tied the game up with 12:12 left in the second quarter. He came around the cage and shot under the stick of Loyola's Josh Hawkins for the Terps' second goal.

Less than 90 seconds later, senior Joe Cummings found Kevin Cooper in the middle of the box to send a straight shot into the back of the net for a 3-2 Maryland lead.

With 9:22 to go in the first half, Loyola's Pat Byrnes tied the game back up with an unassisted score. Loyola took hold of the lead with just under six minutes to go when Mike Sawyer scored off a pass from Layne to make it 4-3. Two minutes later, the Greyhounds extended their lead to two with an unassisted goal from Phil Dobson.

Loyola led 5-3 at the break, then made it a 6-3 lead with 10:12 to go in the third quarter with an unassisted goal by Justin Ward.

Lusby pushed Loyola's lead to four with 11:12 left in the fourth quarter. Layne picked up his third assist of the day on the play. Lusby scored his third and fourth goals of the game in the final five minutes to make it a 9-3 final score.

The Terps took 19 of their 29 shots in the second half, including 12 in the fourth quarter and six in the final 3:45, but their stretch of unlucky shooting continued.

Sophomore goalkeeper Niko Amato finished with eight saves, while Loyola's Jack Runkel finished with six. Four of Runkel's saves came in the second half to hold the Terps off.

Joe Cummings, Drew Snider and Jesse Bernhardt were named to the NCAA All-Tournament team.

Maryland ends the season with a 12-6 record on the season. The game marked the end of a remarkable run for seven Maryland seniors: Joe Cummings, MJ Leonard, David Miller, Pat Morrison, Tim Shaeffer, Michael Shakespeare and Drew Snider. The 2012 senior class compiled a 47-22 (.712) record during its time in College Park, brought the Terps their first ACC Championship since 2005 and took the team to back-to-back NCAA title games for the first time since 1997 and 1998.

Game Notes:

- With today's 9-3 loss, Maryland is now 19-2 all-time vs. Loyola.
- The Terps are now 1-1 all-time vs. the Greyhounds in the NCAA tournament and 1-1 in the Final Four.
- Maryland is now 2-9 all-time in the finals of the NCAA tournament.
- Second-year head coach John Tillman has led the Terrapins to the NCAA Championship game in both of his first two seasons in College Park. He owns a record of 25-11 (.694) and an NCAA Tournament record of 6-2 at Maryland.
