TERPS SALUTE SENIORS IN 2002 HOME FINALE VS. YALE

- The Maryland men's lacrosse team closes out its 2002 regular-season home schedule with a Friday night game against No. 13 Yale at Byrd Stadium. The No. 10 Terps will salute their senior class this Friday prior to the 7 p.m. face-off. The No. 10 Maryland Terps come into the Yale game with a 7-4 record, sporting the nation's best defense, allowing just 6.73 goals per game. The Terps have lost all four of their games this season by just one goal and have outscored their opponents, 124-74, for an average margin of victory of 4.55 -- which is fourth best in the nation. Junior goalie **Danny McCormick** (McLean, Va.) leads the nation in goals against average (.640) and is 11th in save percentage (.604). Junior midfielder/attacker **Mike Mollot** (Holbrook, N.Y.), leads the team in scoring with 36 points with a team-high 19 goals and 17 assists. Sophomore attacker **Dan LaMonica** (Parkton, Md.) is second in points with 34 on 12 goals and a team-high 22 assists -- which is tied for the 10th most in the nation.
- Yale comes into the game with an 9-3 record and is riding a five-game winning streak after a 17-8 victory over Quinnipiac last Tuesday in New Haven, Conn. The Bulldogs have also reeled off wins over Albany (13-7), Massachusetts (11-9), Dartmouth (12-5) and Harvard (6-5) in that stretch. Yale posted its biggest win of the year with a 15-13 upset win at Princeton on March 30. That win ended the Tigers' 37-game Ivy League winning streak. The Elis are led by junior attacker Mike Scaglione, who has a team-high 27 goals and 46 points through 12 games. In the nets, junior Eric Wenzel has been strong all year with a 8.27 goals against average.

A LOOK AT THE 2002 SENIOR CLASS

- The Maryland senior class features nine players who was have played four seasons for the Terps, recording a 40-17 record over that time. The class includes senior captains **Andy Burman** (Kensington, Md.), **Mike LaMonica** (Parkton, Md.), **Mike Morsell** (Huntingdon Valley, Pa.) and **Nate Watkins** (Elmira, N.Y.). Joining the captains are fellow seniors **Brian Carroll** (East Rockaway, N.Y.), **Craig Hochstadt** (Columbia, Md.), **Rob Hoffman** (Severna Park, Md.), **Carrington King** (Crozet, Va.) and **Alex Poole** (Hunt Valley, Md.).
- Defenseman **Andy Burman** has served as senior captain in 2002. He has been a stalwart on man-down defense for the past two seasons. In 2001, he helped the Terps to the nation's third-best man-down defense, keeping opponents scoreless on 72 percent of man-down situations. Overall, he has played in 33 games at Maryland including all 11 this season and all 16 last year.
- Brian Carroll** has been a face-off specialist for the past three seasons. This season, he ranks among the ACC and national leaders in win percentage, taking 59 percent of his draws. Overall, Carroll has played in 52 games, making 25 starts, including all 11 games this season. He was named to the ACC All-Tournament team last weekend after a stellar performance winning 13-of-19 face-offs against the ACC's top specialist.
- Midfielder **Craig Hochstadt** has played both attack and midfield during his four years with the Terps. He has recorded 17 goals and five assists for 22 points in his career, seeing action in 48 games. This season, he has equalled his career high with six goals, including one goal in each of the first five games this season. He has five man-up goals in his career.
- Defenseman **Rob Hoffman** has teamed with fellow senior Andy Burman on the Terps' man-down unit this season. Hoffman has seen his most playing time as a senior, drawing action in all 11 games. Overall, he has played in 23 games in his Terp career all on close defense.
- Defensive midfielder **Carrington King** has been one of the Terps' ultimate warriors over the past four seasons. King has played in nine games this season, most with a broken wrist and cracked rib. He was named to Inside Lacrosse's list of "Nutcrackers" earlier this season as one of the sport's hardest hitters. Overall, King has played in 48 games, scooping up 37 groundballs while defending some of the nation's top offensive players. He is one of the team's top students and was honored as the WMAR Scholar-Athlete during the Terps' win over Towson on March 9.
- Mike LaMonica** has split time at midfield and attack during his career at Maryland. Overall, he has scored 60 goals and totaled 72 points in 56 games. He was a preseason honorable mention All-American in 2002 by *Inside Lacrosse* and *360lacrosse.com*. He has scored in 16 consecutive games and has five multi-point games this season giving him 19 in his career. LaMonica is currently fourth in the team in scoring as a senior with 16 goals and 18 points. He has tallied eight man-up goals and four game-winning goals during his career.

Attacker **Mike Morsell** has had a breakout season as a senior captain. He is currently tied with Mike LaMonica for fourth in the team in points with 18. This season, Morsell has posted two hat tricks including three clutch goals in the Terps' 6-5 win over Navy. Overall, Morsell has played in 48 games with Maryland, scoring 22 goals and adding 11 assists for 33 career points.

Midfielder **Alex Poole** has been running on the Terps' first midfield for the past two seasons. Overall, he has played in 51 games with 17 goals and 13 assists for 30 points. Poole tied his career high with two goals and three points in the Terps' 7-5 win at North Carolina earlier this season. Poole has been a stabilizing force on the midfield through his four years with the Terps.

Midfielder **Nate Watkins** has enjoyed his most prolific season as a senior captain. He has set career highs with 16 goals and 21 points running on the first midfield to rank third on the team in points. Watkins has played in all 57 games during his four years in College Park. He scored 29 goals and added 10 assists for 39 points. He has posted his career high of three points on four occasions this season including a career high three goals vs. Virginia on March 30.

FOUR TERPS EARN ALL-ACC HONORS

Four Maryland men's lacrosse players were named to the 2002 All-ACC team at the league's banquet held at the Durham Hilton on Thursday April 18. Junior **Michael Howley** (Wantagh, N.Y.) was named to the team for the second straight year. He was joined by sophomore **Dan LaMonica** (Parkton, Md.), **Mike Mollot** (Holbrook, N.Y.) and **Chris Passavia** (Stony Brook, N.Y.) as members of the All-ACC team. The four honorees mark the most for the Terps since 1998, when they had five members on the team.

A 2001 second team All-American Howley has been a cornerstone of the Terps' defense which has allowed just 6.73 goals per game -- ranking first in the nation and first in the ACC. Howley is a 2002 candidate for the Tewaaraton Trophy as the sport's top player. He has 34 groundballs to go with a goal and assist this season.

LaMonica has ranked among the national leaders in assists all season and points for the first five weeks. He is currently second on the Terps in scoring with 34 points. He leads the club in assists with 22 -- tied for 10th best in the nation and second in the ACC. He has recorded points in 25 of his 26 career games.

Mollot leads Maryland in scoring with 36 points on 19 goals and 17 assists. He has five multi-goal games this season including a career high five goals and seven points vs. Towson on March 9. He was named National and ACC Player of the Week after that game. Mollot, who ranks 23rd all-time in career scoring at Maryland, was an honorable mention All-American last season and an ACC All-Tournament pick.

Passavia has teamed with Howley to form the most dynamic duo on close defense in the nation. He has been lauded for his outstanding checking and been honored with the Ginsu Award by Inside Lacrosse. Passavia is an outstanding takeaway defenseman and has 31 groundballs this season. He scored his first career goal at Bucknell on March 12.

MARYLAND-YALE SERIES HISTORY

Friday's game between the Terps and Bulldogs will be the seventh in a series that began in 1925. Maryland has won the last five games in the series.

The series was dormant from 1959 until three years ago when the Terps traveled to New Haven and defeated the Bulldogs, 9-4 on May 1, 1999.

In 2000, Yale returned the trip, coming to Byrd Stadium, where Maryland defeated the Bulldogs, 12-9.

Last season, Maryland returned to New Haven and handed the Bulldogs a 10-5 loss to continue its five-game win streak in the series.

Back in 1925, Yale defeated Maryland in the first game, 5-3. The Terps came back to win each of the next two meetings. Maryland shutout Yale, 12-0 in 1934 and won that battle played at Maryland, 16-4, 40 years ago.

MARYLAND VS. IVY LEAGUE TEAMS

In games against teams from the Ivy League, Maryland holds a 98-13-1 advantage, a .879 win percentage.

INDIVIDUAL TERPS VS. YALE

Mike Mollot has posted back-to-back six-point games against Yale with two goals and four assists in each of the meetings with the Bulldogs in 2000 and 2001. His 12 points in two games are the highest average any Terp has against a team.

MEN'S LACROSSE NOTES • YALE AT MARYLAND • APRIL 26, 2002

- **Mike LaMonica** posted a hat trick in last year's game and has four goals in his career vs. Yale.
- **Dan LaMonica**, **Mike Morsell**, **Alex Poole** and **Matt Urlock** have also scored once against Yale in their careers.
- Goalie **Danny McCormick** played the final 8:32 at Yale last season and made four saves, allowing just one goal.
- Head coach **Dave Cottle** has defeated Yale in his only meeting with the Bulldogs and it was a memorable game. He led his Loyola team to a 14-13 overtime victory over Yale in the 1990 NCAA Semifinals to reach his first NCAA final.

TERP DEFENSE CONTINUES TO BE ROCK SOLID

- Maryland has made defense a staple of its success over the past few seasons and 2002 is no different. With All-American candidates and All-ACC selections **Michael Howley** (Wantagh, N.Y.) and **Chris Passavia** (Stony Brook, N.Y.) leading the way, the Terps have allowed just 6.73 goals per game to rank No. 1 in the nation.
- The Terps' goalie **Danny McCormick** (McLean, Va.) is the nation's best when it comes to allowing the fewest goals. He leads the country in goals against average (.640) and is 11th in save percentage (.604). He has followed in the footsteps of his predecessor, 2001 first team All-American **Pat McGinnis**, who was ranked in the top two in both categories all of last season.
- Playing key roles on the defense are defensive midfielders **Paul Gillette** (Severna Park, Md.), **Brett Harper** (Columbus, Ohio) and **Carrington King** (Crozet, Va.) along with close defenders **Lee Zink** (Rowayton, Conn.) and **Dave Wagner** (Severna Park, Md.).
- Gillette leads the defensive crew with 49 groundballs. Three other defenders also have more than 25 groundballs after 10 games (Howley-34, Passavia-31, Harper-29). McCormick also has 28 groundballs.
- Last season, the Terps were No. 2 in the nation in team defense giving up just 6.31 goals per game.
- Maryland has kept its opponents to less than 10 goals in seven of nine games this season including the Terps' 18-0 shutout of Mount St. Mary's on Feb. 26, which was the program's first in 32 years since Maryland blanked Duke 19-0 on April 20, 1970.
- Last season, in all of Division I lacrosse there was only **one** shutout as Dartmouth blanked Boston College 12-0 on April 24, 2001.
- The 18-goal margin of victory against the Mount was the largest since a 21-2 shelling of Radford on April 1, 1997.

CARROLL EARNS ACC ALL-TOURNEY HONORS, CONTINUES SOLID PLAY

- Senior face-off specialist **Brian Carroll** has had his best season at Maryland as the Terps' primary face-off man. He has taken 205 of the team's 234 draws. He has won 121 of them to give him a 59.0 win percentage, which ranks second in the ACC and 15th nationally. Carroll was named to the ACC All-Tournament team after a sensational effort against Duke, winning 13-of-19 face-offs, mostly against Kevin Cassese, the ACC's top face-off man, who ranks fourth in the nation with a 64.0 win percentage.

TERPS OFFENSE ON THE ATTACK

- With a new offensive system in place under new coach **Dave Cottle**, the Maryland attack is scoring at a faster pace and taking more shots than in recent years. The Terps have been ranked among the nation's top scoring teams all season, ranking in the top two for the first five weeks of the season. Maryland is currently 15th in goals per game (11.27).
- With its offense scoring 11.27 per game and the defense allowing just 6.73 per game, Maryland is fourth in the nation in scoring margin, winning games by an average of 4.55 goals per game.
- Maryland is averaging 42.5 shots per game after averaging 32.6 last season.
- Maryland has scored 13 or more goals in five of seven victories this season with a season-high 18 coming vs. Mount St. Mary's on Feb. 26.
- The Terps scored 15 or more goals in three straight games and four overall this season. The last time the Terps scored 15 or more in consecutive games came in the first three games of the 1998 season, when they beat Villanova (18-5), Duke (15-9) and Towson (17-6).
- The Terps had back-to-back double-digit victories for the first time since 1994 with a 16-6 win at Bucknell on March 12 and a 16-5 victory over Delaware on March 16. The last time the Terps won consecutive games by 10 or more goals came on March 19 and 22, 1994, when they beat Cornell (19-9) and Ohio State (16-2), respectively. Also, the last time the Terps scored 16 or more goals in consecutive games came during the team's NCAA Tournament run in 1995, when they did it three games in a row: UMBC (16-14), Notre Dame (19-11) and Johns Hopkins (16-8).
- With 15 goals against Towson on March 9, the Terps produced their highest goal total against a top-10 team in four seasons. The last time Maryland scored at least 15 goals against a highly-ranked team came on May 23, 1998, when the Terps piled up a 19-8 victory over No. 1 Loyola in the NCAA Quarterfinals.



Head Coach

Dave COTTLE

Dave Cottle, the third winningest active coach in lacrosse, begins his first season at the helm of the Maryland lacrosse program in 2002. He was named the eighth coach in the storied history of Maryland lacrosse on Sept. 26, 2001 after a sensational 19-year stint as the head coach at Loyola College in Baltimore.

Cottle, 46, takes the reins from the ACC's all-time winningest coach, Dick Edell, who retired on Sept. 3, 2001 after 18 years with the Terps.

"Coach Cottle's 19 years of Division I head coaching success was an important consideration for the selection committee," said Maryland athletics director Deborah A. Yow. "We believe that he will lead Maryland to its next national championship in men's lacrosse. We appreciated hearing from a number of the former players who spoke highly about their experience of playing under Coach Cottle. In addition, coaches of stature such as Bill Tierney of Princeton spoke glowingly of Coach Cottle's leadership and coaching skills. We look forward to the future of our program under his direction."

Cottle, who said the Maryland position was his "dream job," is also thrilled to join the Terrapins. "I'm excited to come into a program with such a rich history as Maryland's."

Cottle led the Greyhounds to two national semifinal appearances including an appearance in the 1990 championship game. He entered the 2002 season as the third winningest active coach in the sport of lacrosse, winning 72.1 percent of his games for a 181-70 record.

He has led his teams to top-10 finishes in each of the past 14 seasons. The Greyhounds have finished with a winning record for the past 18 years dating to 1984. Loyola has also played in the last 14 NCAA Tournaments, entering the 1998 and 1999 tournaments as the No. 1 seed.

One of the finest players in Salisbury State history, Cottle was enshrined into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1989. During his career he rewrote the NCAA record book, while earning All-America honors three times. He still holds many places in the Salisbury State record book, and was just the second player in collegiate lacrosse history to score over 100 points in a single season. The nation's leading scorer in 1975, he served as captain of the South team in the North-South All-Star Game.

Cottle received his bachelor of science degree in physical education in 1978 from Salisbury.

He was an assistant coach for Team USA 1994, which won the world championship in Manchester, England. Cottle has addressed many lacrosse gatherings across the country, including the USILA Coaches' Convention, and he serves as a member of the All-America Selection Committee. In February of 1998 he was inducted into the Baltimore Chapter of the Lacrosse Foundation's Hall of Fame.

A graduate of Baltimore's Northern High School, Cottle lives with his wife, Lynn, daughters, Taylor and Tory, and son, Sean, in Fallston, Md.

WHAT A DIFFERENCE A YEAR MAKES!

- As Maryland continues to develop its offense, coach **Dave Cottle** has set a goal for seven players to score at least 10 goals this season (six already have 10 or more: **Mike Mollot**-19, **Nate Watkins**-16, **Mike LaMonica**-16, **Dan LaMonica**-12, **Ryan Moran**-12 and **Mike Morsell**-10). The Terps are well on their way to that goal as many players have surpassed their entire goal totals for all of 2001. Maryland had five players scored 10 goals all of last season in 16 games.
- Through 11 games, 11 Terps have more goals in 2002 than they had in 16 games last season. Seven players have scored goals after not scoring all of last season
- Senior captain **Nate Watkins** (Elmira, N.Y.) has a career-best 16 goals in 2002 after just five last season. Watkins came into the season with 13 career goals -- he matched that with his first career hat trick vs. Virginia on March 30.
- Senior captain **Mike Morsell** (Huntingdon Valley, Pa.) has 10 goals after not scoring all of last season. He netted his third career hat trick against Navy on April 5. The 10 goals also equals his single-season best which he accomplished as a sophomore in 2000.

- The Tewaaraton Trophy is presented annually following the collegiate season to the top female and male varsity collegiate lacrosse players in the United States. Scholarship money is given to the award recipient's college or university general scholarship fund. The Foundation committee honors Native American heritage with the name "Tewaaraton," the name the Mohawk nation gave to its game and the progenitor of present day lacrosse and has received approval from the Mohawk Council of Elders.
- Every eligible male and female college varsity player in Divisions I, II and III is considered a nominee. Nominations are requested from all varsity coaches. A selection committee comprised of coaches for both male and female candidates oversees the voting process. There are five wild-card spots left open for a new

- The Tewaaraton Trophy Awards Dinner will be presented at the University Club of Washington, DC on June 5, 2002 at a banquet honoring the finalists and winners. Hofstra's Doug Shanahan won last year's trophy.

AMERICA'S TEAM

- Of course the sport of lacrosse is a regional one, being played mostly in the Northeast, but Maryland's coaching staff has combed the nation far and wide to compose the 2002 Terp roster which features players from a school-record 11 states. Never before has Maryland had more than eight states represented on its roster. However, the 2002 team includes the first-ever recruits from California and Colorado, giving the team its first Western natives since the start of the program in 1924.
- Coming from California are **Peter Ellis** and **Drew Virk**, both of whom are from Ross, Calif., and played at St. Ignatius College Prep in San Francisco. From Colorado is freshman **Mark Foster**, who prepped at Kent Denver.
- Add to that freshman **Dave Matz**, who is the first player from Vermont to play for the Terps, and 11 states are represented in total. Of the 11 newcomers on the roster for 2002, nine different states are represented.
- Two other players on the roster previously were the first recruits from their states, as junior **Brett Harper** came from Upper Arlington High School in Ohio and junior **Sean Leary** came to College Park from Detroit Country Day School in Michigan in 1999.

TERPS' 77TH SEASON OF LACROSSE

- The Terps begin the third season of the new century with an all-time record of 623-201-4 (.756), dating back to the first varsity team in 1924 (a team was not fielded in 1944 and 1945 due to World War II). Maryland has finished every one of its previous 76 seasons with a .500 or better record, including last season when the Terps went 13-3. The program's 600th win came against Duke on April 21, 2000, 7-6 in the ACC Semifinals at Byrd Stadium.
- In the decade of the 1990s, Maryland recorded its most wins in any decade with a 95-47 record. The .669 winning percentage matched Maryland's win percentage of the 1980s when the Terps went 83-41 and also compiled a .669 win percentage.

No. 6 Maryland 13 No. 23 Hobart 6

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The Maryland lacrosse team opened the **Dave Cottle** era with what has been the staple of the program for the last few years -- defense. The No. 6 Terps shut out visiting No. 23 Hobart for the first three quarters, building a 9-0 lead, on the way to a 13-6 victory at the Artificial Turf Facility.

Sophomore **Dan LaMonica** led the Terps with five points on two goals and three assists, junior **Mike Mollot** added three goals and an assist.

"I thought we played very well in the first three quarters. Our defense was strong," said Cottle, who joins all previous seven Maryland lacrosse coaches with victorious debuts with the Terps. "I thought our young midfielders did a great job and Brian Carroll really set the tone with his face-offs."

On face-offs, senior **Brian Carroll** won 12 of his 18 draws, including eight of 11 in the first three periods. Junior goalie **Danny McCormick**, making his first start as a Terp, tallied 14 saves and allowed just three goals before giving way to freshman **T.C. Behm** with four minutes left in regulation.

The win improved Maryland's record to an amazing 73-3-1 all-time in season openers, dating back to the start of the program in 1924. The Terps have won nine straight openers now.

In building the 9-0 lead, **Nate Watkins** and **Dan LaMonica** each scored two goals. LaMonica also assisted on three consecutive goals after the Terps went up 1-0 on Watkins first score, just 1:51 into the game. LaMonica fed **J.R. Bordley**, **Matt Brock** and Watkins -- for his second -- to make it 4-0 2:05 into the second quarter.

After **Alex Poole** made it 5-0, LaMonica scored consecutive goals bridging the second and third quarters to make it 7-0. **Craig Hochstadt** and **Willy Passavia** scored to close the third with a 9-0 Terp advantage.

Hobart finally got on the board after taking 15 shots with no success through three quarters as Scott Harvey scored the first of his four goals at the beginning of the fourth period.

The Statesmen offense went to work in the fourth, outscoring the Terps, 6-4. But it was too late as Maryland had built an insurmountable lead. In that quarter, Mollot recorded a hat trick with three goals over a span of 7:29. **Mike LaMonica** also got on the board with a pretty behind-the-head shot to beat Hobart goalie Mike Borsz.

No. 6 Maryland 18 Mount St. Mary's 0

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Maryland men's lacrosse posted its first shutout in 32 years as the Terps blanked Mount St. Mary's, 18-0 at Byrd Stadium. The Terps' last shutout came in a 19-0 whitewash of Duke on April 20, 1970. Maryland moved to 2-0, the Mount goes to 0-3.

The shutout was the first in all of Division I men's lacrosse since April 24, 2001 as Dartmouth blanked Boston College 12-0, for the only shutout in lacrosse last season.

It was a career day for several Terps, led by senior captain **Mike Morsell**, who posted his first career four-goal game and added three assists for seven points. Morsell's only other career hat trick also came against the Mount in the 2000 meeting.

Junior **Matt Urlock** equaled his career-best with three goals. Sophomore **J.R. Bordley** posted his first-career multi-goal game with a pair as did freshman **Andrew Schwartzman**. Junior **Mike Mollot** also tallied twice to give the Terps five players with two or more goals.

Five other players scored goals: **Mike LaMonica**, **Nate Watkins**, **Matt Brock**, **Sean Leary** and **Craig Hochstadt**.

Freshman **Dave Matz** recorded his first two collegiate points as he assisted on both of Schwartzman's goals. Junior **Ryan Moran** also posted his first college points with a pair of helpers.

"I think we played unselfishly," said coach Dave Cottle. "We got the offense going, scoring a bunch. Defensively, the coaches have gotten the players to do a great job. As long as we keep getting the goalkeeping, we will be alright."

The 18-goal margin was the largest since a 21-2 shelling of Radford on April 1, 1997.

Between the pipes, junior **Danny McCormick** made four saves before giving way to **Matt Rzepkowski** and **T.C. Behm**, who made six saves.

The Terps piled up 65 shots, the most since they also had 65 against Providence on Feb. 27, 1999. They also had 60 groundballs -- 15 in each quarter-- the most since scooping up 63 against Delaware on March 15, 2000.

Mount St. Mary's goalie Tom Dryer made a career-high 28 saves.

No. 9 Duke 9 No. 6 Maryland 8 (2OT)

DURHAM, N.C. -- Freshman Matt Monfett's first career goal came with two seconds remaining in the second overtime period and lifted ninth-ranked Duke to a 9-8 win over sixth-ranked Maryland in ACC men's lacrosse action at a rain-soaked Koskinen Stadium in Durham, N.C.

The Blue Devils improved to 2-0 overall and 1-0 in the league while the Terrapins fall to 2-1 overall and 0-1 in conference play.

Maryland jumped on top 2-0 early in the first period on goals by **Mike LaMonica** and **Ryan Moran**, but Duke responded with two goals from Kevin Brennan in a 50 second span to tie the game at the 5:02 mark. **Craig Hochstadt** then scored on an assist from **Mike Mollot** to give the Terrapins a 3-2 lead with 4:13 remaining in the quarter before Duke knotted the game with a shorthanded goal with just under three minutes left.

Lieske put Duke ahead with an extra man goal from Kevin Cassese early in the second quarter, but the Terrapins tied the game at 4-4 when **Matt Urlock** found the back of the net on a pass from Mollot. Lieske gave the Blue Devils a one-goal lead going into halftime with an unassisted score at the 1:11 mark.

Moran scored for the Terrapins at the 11:23 mark of the third quarter to tie the game at 5-5 before Brennan pushed Duke back on top less than three minutes later. Maryland responded with three unanswered goals - single scores by Mike LaMonica, Moran and Mollot - to claim an 8-6 advantage on Mollot's goal with 10:39 left in the fourth quarter. Cassese pulled Duke within one on a goal from Brennan, and then tied the game with just eight seconds remaining in the period to force overtime.

Duke goalkeeper A.J. Kincel was credited with 17 saves while Maryland's **Danny McCormick** registered 12 saves.

Brennan paced the Duke attack with three goals and two assists while Lieske added three goals and one assist. Maryland was led by Moran's three goals - the first three of his career - while Mollot added one goal and three assists.

The final 2:02 of the fourth period and both overtime sessions were played without the benefit of a scoreboard due to weather-induced technical problems.

It was Maryland's first overtime game since a double-overtime loss to Virginia, 15-14 on March 29, 1997.

No. 7 Maryland 15 No. 5 Towson 10

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Maryland's trio of **Mike Mollot**, **Mike LaMonica** and **Dan LaMonica** combined for 11 goals as the No. 7 Terps (3-1) opened up the offense and downed No. 5 Towson (2-1), 15-10 on a rainy afternoon at Byrd Stadium and before a live television audience on WMAR-TV Channel 2.

Mollot finished with a career-high five goals and each LaMonica added three tallies as the Maryland offense blitzed Towson, outshooting the Tigers, 61-28. The LaMonica brothers Mike (18) and Dan (12) combined to outshoot the entire Towson team, 30-28.

"I really thought our offense worked well," said head coach **Dave Cottle**. "We had lots of opportunities and were able to spread the ball around and put it in the net a lot."

The total of 15 goals represents the most goals Maryland has scored against a top-10 team since the '98 Terps which notched a 19-8 win over No. 1 Loyola, in the NCAA Semifinals on May 23, 1998.

The win also avenged the Terps' 2001 NCAA quarterfinal loss to the Tigers when Towson knocked the third-seeded Maryland team out of the tournament, 12-11 on May 20, 2001.

Mollot added two more assists to finish with seven points, tying his career-high of seven previously accomplished twice before. Dan LaMonica also posted a career high with six points (three goals, three assists).

"I scored a lot, but honestly as long as we come away with the win, I'm happy," said Mollot, who posted his sixth career hat trick. "It's about winning and that's what we did today."

With the scored tied 6-6 late in the second quarter, Mollot started an 8-2 run as he scored an unassisted goal with 1:49 left in the first half. He scored four of his five goals in the run which bridged the second, third and fourth quarters. After a **Nate Watkins**' goal 1:50 into the second half, Mollot put the Terps ahead 9-6 off a pass from **Alex Poole** with 9:54 left in the third quarter.

After a pair of Josh Tankersley goals, Maryland reeled off five goals in a row, the first two from Dan LaMonica and Mike LaMonica, then two more from Mollot. The run concluded with **Craig Hochstadt's** fourth goal of the year, which gave the Terps an insurmountable 14-8 lead with 8:45 left in regulation.

Junior goalie **Dan McCormick** came up big with four key saves in the fourth quarter to finish with eight in the game to earn his third win.

Face-off specialist **Brian Carroll** had a strong second half after some halftime adjustments and won eight-of-13 draws after intermission.

Watkins finished with two goals to equal his career high for the third time. **J.R. Bordley** also added a second-quarter goal.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The No. 5 Maryland men's lacrosse team once again used a total team effort on offense and defense to defeat Delaware, 16-5 on an overcast and drizzling afternoon at Byrd Stadium.

Nine different Terps scored goals as junior **Matt Brock** led the way with his first career hat trick, finishing it off with the Terps' 16th and final goal. Five other Terps scored two goals apiece including the nation's second leading scorer **Mike Mollot**, brothers **Mike LaMonica** and **Dan LaMonica**, **Ryan Moran** and **Nate Watkins**.

"We did the things we had to do to get the win," said head coach **Dave Cottle**. "It is a pleasure to work with these players who are picking up the offense and sharing the ball."

Maryland moved to 5-1, Delaware fell to 2-3.

Coupled with the Terps' 16-6 win at Bucknell, Maryland has recorded back-to-back double-digit wins for the first time since 1994 and scored 15 or more goals in three straight games for the first time since the start of the 1998 season.

Dan LaMonica posted his fourth five-point game of the season and third in a row as he added three assists to bring his season point total to 23, second only to Mollot, who now has 25 points.

The flip side, the Terps' nationally renowned defense was stellar once again, limiting the Blue Hens to five goals with two coming in the final two minutes of action.

Junior goalie **Danny McCormick** made 11 saves and was followed by **T.C. Behm**, who made four saves and **Matt Rzepkowski** who made one save.

The Terps defensive unit led by preseason All-American close defenders **Michael Howley** and **Chris Passavia** along with **Lee Zink** and defensive midfielders **Paul Gillette** and **Brett Harper** combined for 16 of the team's 57 groundballs.

In allowing just five goals, the Terps' defense lowered its team goals against average to 6.00 per game, which ranks among the top three in the nation.

Senior face-off specialist **Brian Carroll** won a career-high 15-of-21 face-offs and has now won 80 percent of his draws against Delaware over the last two seasons.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. - Fifth-ranked Maryland used its brilliant defense to dominate the second half and handed the No. 9 North Carolina men's lacrosse team its first loss of the season by a 7-5 score before 2,107 fans at Fetzer Field. Both teams now stand 6-1 overall on the season and 1-1 in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

No. 3 Johns Hopkins 9 No. 6 Maryland 8 (OT)

BALTIMORE, Md. - Freshman attackman Kyle Barrie scored his 12th goal of the season with 1:45 remaining in the first overtime to lift third-ranked Johns Hopkins to a 9-8 victory over sixth-ranked Maryland in front of an overflow crowd of 8,642 at Homewood Field. The win was the fifth straight for the Blue Jays, who improve to 8-1 with the victory, while Maryland fell to 7-3 with its second one-goal loss in the last three games. All three Maryland losses this season have been by one goal and two have come in overtime.

Hopkins trailed for most of the game before outscoring Maryland, 4-1 over the final 27:32, including overtime. With the Terps ahead, 7-5 on an unassisted goal by midfielder **Mike Mollot** with 10:17 remaining in the third quarter, the Blue Jays began their comeback with back-to-back goals in the final 4:19 of the third quarter to make it 7-7 at the end of three. Junior Bobby Benon's fourth goal of the game with 4:19 remaining in the period off an assist from sophomore Conor Ford made it 7-6, while junior attackman Adam Doneger's extra-man goal with 36 seconds remaining in the quarter tied the game. Barrie assisted on Doneger's goal.

Maryland retook the lead an Mollot's third goal of the game, also unassisted, just 1:48 into the period and the lead appeared as though it may hold up as Maryland goalie **Dan McCormick** posted seven saves in the period. However, the Blue Jays would cash in on another extra man opportunity late in the game as sophomore midfielder Kevin Boland tallied his 11th goal of the season with 3:59 remaining to tie the game at 8-8.

Both teams had possession in the final 3:59 with Ford cranking one off the post with 23 seconds left in the fourth quarter and Doneger being stopped by McCormick from 12 yards out as time expired. That set the stage for Barrie's goal, which came on a skip pass from Boland. Barrie came in from the side 12 yards in front of the goal and Boland fed him perfectly. His shot eluded McCormick low to the left side.

Maryland won the faceoff in overtime and had possession for over a minute and a half before Hopkins' Corey Harned intercepted a pass by Mollot. Hopkins called timeout after Harned cleared the ball past midfield and Boland found Barrie after coming up with a loose ball near the top of the box to McCormick's left.

Benson opened the scoring with a goal at the 8:25 mark of the first quarter off a feed from Boland, only to have Maryland answer with a **Jamie Daue** goal less than two minutes later on an assist from **Dan LaMonica**. Benson would score again with 4:13 remaining in the period, setting the stage for a 4-0 run by the Terps.

Mollot, **Ryan Moran**, **Mike LaMonica**, and **Nate Watkins** all scored in a span of just 5:14 from late in the second quarter through early in the second quarter to give Maryland a 5-2 lead. That held until Johns Hopkins' sophomore midfielder Joe McDermott scored an unassisted goal with 6:54 remaining in the second quarter to make it 5-3. Benson's third goal of the game, which was also the 100th point of his career, with 3:27 remaining in the first half made it 5-4, which was the score at halftime.

Hopkins held a 33-29 advantage in shots, while Maryland won the ground ball war, 26-25. The faceoffs were even at 10-10.

Maryland was led by Mollot, who tallied the three goals and one assist, while Watkins added the two goals and Dan LaMonica added two assists. McCormick registered 12 saves in goal.

ACC Semifinals

No. 12 Duke 8 No. 6 Maryland 7 (OT)

Freshman Matt Rewkowski's goal with four seconds remaining in the first overtime lifted second-seeded and 12th-ranked Duke to an 8-7 win over third-seeded and sixth-ranked Maryland in the semifinals of the 2002 ACC Men's Lacrosse Tournament held at Koskinen Stadium in Durham, N.C.

The Blue Devils, who defeated Maryland by a 9-8 count on March 3 in Durham when Matt Monfett scored with two seconds left in the second overtime period, improve to 6-5 on the season. Duke, the defending league tournament champion, advances to meet top-seeded and number one-ranked Virginia in the championship game on Sunday at 3:00 p.m. The Terrapins, losers of four one-goal contests this season, fall to 7-4.

"I thought we played a very good game," said head coach **Dave Cottle**. "We almost doubled them in shots and their goalie played an outstanding game. I think he beat us a little bit. We made a lot of good plays but we just didn't make one more than they did."

Duke was led by senior goalkeeper A.J. Kincel, who was credited with 21 saves on the night. His total fell three saves short of the ACC Tournament record set by Duke's Carter Hertzberg against North Carolina in the 1993 semifinals.

Maryland dominated the game statistically as **Brian Carroll** won 13-of-19 face-offs. The Terrapins finished the night with 21 more ground balls (45-24) and 21 more shots (43-22).

Duke jumped out to a 2-1 lead in the opening quarter as Monfett and Kevin Cassese sandwiched goals around a tally by Maryland's **Ryan Moran**. The Terrapins then went on a 4-1 run with **Mike LaMonica** scoring twice in the spurt as Maryland claimed a 5-3 lead at intermission.

In the second half, Duke received a goal from Alex Lieske while Moran found the back of the net for Maryland before the Blue Devils scored three straight goals to go ahead 7-6 with 10:04 remaining in the fourth quarter on Kevin Brennan's tally. Maryland knotted the contest at 7-7 when **Mike Mollot** scored an extra-man goal with just under two minutes to play.

Maryland won the face-off to begin the overtime session, and Mike LaMonica banged a shot off the pipe with just over two minutes left. Duke received an extra man opportunity with 36 seconds remaining to set up a Monfett feed to a breaking Rewkowski in front of the net for the game-winning goal.

Moran paced the Terrapin attack with three goals -- his second three-goal outing against Duke this season -- while Mike LaMonica had two goals. Lieske and Rewkowski each had two goals for the Blue Devils.
