

HEAD COACH PAT SANTORO

FIFTH SEASON AT MARYLAND • PITTSBURGH, 1992 2003 NATIONAL ASSISTANT COACH OF THE YEAR

Pat Santoro, a two-time NCAA national champion and four-time All-American, returns for his fifth season at the helm of the Maryland program. In just four years, Santoro has brought the Terrapin program back to the forefront of the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Under Santoro's tutelage, the Terps have steadily improved year after year. After building a squad that could compete in his first two seasons, Santoro's efforts became noticeable in 2006 as Maryland went 4-1 in the ACC regular season and won a share of the conference dual meet championship. In 2007, however, the program reached new heights and returned to prominence as it went undefeated in the ACC and won its first outright dual championship since 1974.

In 2007, Santoro guided the Terps to its best season in school history as they went 17-5, tying the program record for wins in a season. Maryland finished second at the ACC Tournament as well, its best showing since 1990.

In addition to the team's performance, a number of wrestlers reached new heights under Santoro. Graduated senior Jason Kiessling and freshman Mike Letts won the ACC title at 165 and 174 pounds, respectively, while sophomore James Knox and redshirt freshman Hudston Taylor were All-ACC honorees as they reached their respective finals. Letts, Kiessling, and Taylor, who earned one of the conference's four wild card bids, advanced to the NCAA Tournament.

Taylor, who went 29-9, barely missed becoming the first Terp All-American since 1997 as he lost 4-3 in the round of 12. He ranked fourth in the nation in pins last season. Kiessling and Letts both led the Terps with 30 wins apiece.

In 2005, Maryland finished first in the ACC at 4-1 as Andrew Schläffer captured the ACC title at 149 pounds and Brendan Byrne (133) and Adam James (157) both advanced to the finals of their respective weight classes.

In addition to their recent success on the mat, the Terps have flourished in other areas under Santoro. In two of the last three seasons, Maryland earned the ACC Sportsmanship Award and a pair of student-athletes were recognized for their efforts in the classroom. Josh Haines and Andrew Schläffer were placed on the All-ACC Academic Wrestling Team last season bringing Santoro's total up to six in the two years the Academic Team has been in existence.

Santoro has also proven he can bring some of the most talented wrestlers to College Park. This year's incoming class was ranked 21st in the nation by Wrestling International Newsmagazine. Top-notch recruits are attracted to the program because of Santoro's proven track record of success. In his nine seasons as an assistant coach at Lehigh University in Bethlehem, Pa., he helped the Mountain Hawks ascend on the national scene. In 2003, Santoro's last season with the program, Lehigh finished fourth in the team standings at the 2003 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships and Santoro was named the national Assistant Coach of the Year by the National Wrestling Coaches Association. Lehigh had national top-10 finishes in three of his last four seasons and has finished either first or second in the Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association seven times in the last eight years, including four team championships. Santoro

has also served as an assistant coach at Duquesne (1993-94) and Penn State (1991-93).

In his first season in College Park, the Terps were 4-9 in dual meet action. At the ACC Tournament, though, Maryland's Jason Kiessling (157) and Barry Stein (HWT) advanced to the finals and were named to the ACC All-Tournament team. In his next season he helped mentor Charlie Pinto to the ACC title at 141 pounds and a berth in the NCAA Tournament.

Santoro brings to Maryland credentials that include national success as both a coach and as a student-athlete. Santoro was an All-American wrestler at the University of Pittsburgh, earning that status each season from 1986 through 1989. He won NCAA Division I individual national championships at 142 pounds in 1988 and 1989, and was a three-time individual champion in the Eastern Wrestling League. He was the recipient of Pittsburgh's Golden Panther Award in 1989, recognizing the outstanding athlete of the year.

Following his success as a collegiate wrestler, Santoro went on to a stellar international career, being ranked among the nation's top wrestlers for more than a decade. He was a member of the U.S. National Team in 1995, 1996, 1998 and 1999, serving as an alternate for the 1996 Olympic Team and the 1999 World Team. He placed fourth at the 2000 U.S. Olympic Trials, third at the 1992 Trials and was runner-up at the U.S. Open Freestyle competition in 1992.

Santoro graduated with a bachelor's degree in psychology from Pittsburgh in 1992. While there he was a two-time team captain and a member of Athletes in Action and the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. He is a member of the EWL and District XI Wrestling halls of fame.

Santoro resides in Columbia with his wife, Julie, his daughter Leah, and their guard dog Cooper.

Third Season at Maryland

Former Nebraska All-American Todd Beckerman is in his third season on the Maryland Terrapin staff. A native of Crofton, Md., Beckerman was added to the staff in September of 2005.

Beckerman spent two seasons as an assistant coach at the Naval Academy before coming to College Park. In 2004, the team posted its best dual record since 1993 and had a school-record eight wrestlers post 25-win seasons.

A four-year letterwinner and two-time All-America at Nebraska, Beckerman came to Navy from Lincoln, Neb., where he spent the 2002-03 season as a volunteer assistant coach for the Huskers. Beckerman primarily coached the lower weight classes and helped coordinate and assist in the Husker recruiting efforts.


Prior to returning to his alma mater, Beckerman worked during the 2001-02 season as an administrative assistant in the Penn State wrestling office, where he worked one-on-one with student-athletes and played a large role in directing summer camps. Beckerman also implemented the Todd Beckerman All-American Wrestling Camp, which was held for six-straight summers at Nebraska beginning in 1997.

At the 2000 and 2001 NCAA Championships, Beckerman wrestled to All-America status as well as Academic All-Big 12 honors in both seasons. He was the 2000-01 Nebraska Male Athlete of the Year, as well as the Husker Power Lifter of the Year. The 2000-01 team captain also competed internationally in 1999 and 2000 as a member of the Big 12 All-Star Wrestling Team.

Beckerman graduated in 2001 with a degree in human resources and family sciences. He received his master's in education from Nebraska with an emphasis in post secondary athletics in 2007.

Fourth Season at Maryland

Brad Dillon, an All-American on the mat and in the classroom at Lehigh, begins his fourth season as an assistant coach at the University of Maryland. Dillon wrestled and flourished under head coach Pat Santoro's direction while at Lehigh.

In his first season with the Terps, Dillon was involved in helping land a nationally ranked recruiting class and helping Charlie Pinto to the ACC title at 141 pounds.

A four-year starter for the Mountain Hawks, Dillon finished fourth at the NCAA Tournament as a senior and fifth as a junior at 174 pounds to earn All-America honors. In addition, he was a two-time team captain and captured a pair of Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association (EIWA) titles. He finished his career with over 100 victories and set school records for career dual meet victories (67), season dual meet victories (24) and most takedowns in a season (145).

Off the mat, Dillon was named an Academic All-American and was a recipient of the Lehigh University Scholar Athlete Award as a senior.

"I am excited for the opportunity to work with Pat," Dillon commented when he was hired. "He was instrumental in my accomplishments and I am familiar with his coaching system and philosophies. I am very confident in my ability to help the student-athletes at Maryland become better wrestlers and well-balanced individuals."

"Brad brings a lot to our program," Santoro said. "He has always been an excellent technician and a very hard worker. He also relates very well to the guys. He's very versatile because he can work with anyone on the team. He spends a lot of the morning in the wrestling room working with anyone from 125 to 197. He has been a great asset."

Fourth Season at Maryland


Jason Nagle enters his fourth year at the University of Maryland as a volunteer assistant coach.

A native Marylander, Nagle attended Centennial High School in Ellicott City where he was a state finalist. In college, Nagle was a four-year starter, wrestling at Penn State University before transferring to the University of Pennsylvania. At Penn, he advanced to the finals of the EIWA tournament two times, winning the tournament once.

After graduating in 2000 with a degree in biology, Nagle worked as an equity and index options trader before returning to the classroom in the fall of 2004. He is currently a fourth year student at the University of Maryland School of Pharmacy.

31st Season

Former Terrapin letterwinner Kevin Kearns enters his 31st season on the Maryland staff, his fourth as an administrative assistant after spending 27 years as an assistant coach. In 1970, while a captain of the wrestling team, Kearns was drafted into the United States Army. He served with the 101st Airborne Division in a Recon Team in Vietnam in 1971 and 1972.

Upon his completion of military duty, Kearns returned to the Maryland wrestling program in 1972-73 and assisted Coach McHugh and the team. Wrestling during this time for the Baltimore Central YMCA, Kearns won the national YMCA Greco championship, the prestigious New York Athletic Club Greco championship and two South Atlantic AAU freestyle championships.

After receiving his degree, he moved to Minnesota to train and wrestle for the United States Greco Roman team. Returning to Maryland in 1976, Kearns was named head coach at Dulaney High School in Timonium, Md. In 1977, he was selected to take the head coaching position at Johns Hopkins University, but returned to Maryland in 1980, where he has served as an assistant coach for 27 years before moving to an administrative position in 2004.



2007-08 SEASON OUTLOOK

On the heels of one of the best dual meet seasons in Maryland history, the Terps are looking to build on that success and take it even further. With two NCAA qualifiers from last year returning to the starting line-up, head coach Pat Santoro is looking for great things this season.

"We are expecting continual improvement," Santoro said. "We haven't had an All-American in 11 years and we're looking to have our first All-American and hopefully it will be more than one."

There is potential all over the Maryland line up to achieve that level of success. Sophomore Hudson Taylor was a point away last year as he lost in the round of 12 of the NCAA Tournament while Mike Letts qualified for NCAAs after capturing the 174 pound ACC Championship.

Other wrestlers such as Charlie Pinto, who has NCAA experience, and James Knox who was an All-ACC member last season have a chance to improve their skills on the mat and advance far in the postseason. Brendan Byrne was also an All-ACC honoree in 2006.

As a result, Santoro has set up a dual schedule that will challenge his team to better prepare them for the postseason. The Terps will face seven teams that finished in the top 25 last year while competing in such prestigious tournament as the Southern Scuffle and the Body Bar Systems Invitational.

"We have given the guys a very competitive schedule," Santoro said. "They are going to be better prepared at the end of the year. We're going to face nine or 10 teams ranked in the top 25 in the country and couple of top 10 teams. We're not focused on the dual meet season, though, we're focused on nationals. The dual meet schedule is going to prepare us for the postseason and ultimately that is what we are looking for."


And what Maryland is looking for is an ACC Championship and improvement at the NCAA level. Santoro has built the Terps to do just that.

"We should be solid at every weight class, but we just need to bring it to another level and they know that," Santoro said. "That's what we have been training for."



This could be a heavily contested weight class for Santoro as junior James Knox is a two-year starter returning for the Terps. Last year, Knox had an impressive season in 2006-07 as he went 15-13 with 11 of those victories coming in dual action. At the ACC Championship, Knox earned a second-place finish and All-ACC honors.


Knox will be challenged by a few wrestlers, though, as Brendan Byrne recently dropped down to that class from 133 where he was an ACC finalist in 2006 and Mookie Golden has been stellar on the practice mat in the off season, according to Santoro.

Steven Bell spent last year on the shelf with an injury but will return and is the favorite to start at 133 pounds. As a freshman in 2005-06, Bell went 12-9 in tournament action and took second place in the West Virginia, Wilkes Barre, and Buffalo Open.

Bell was highly touted coming out of high school as he was the 10th-best recruit in the 125 pound weight class and had top 10 finishes twice at the national freestyle championships while at Connellsville High School in Pennsylvania.

141

Senior Charlie Pinto is expecting to start at 141 pounds after splitting time with Alex Krom in 2006-07. Pinto went 16-4 last year with a solid 9-2 mark in dual competition. Pinto not only brings his skills to the mat, but his experience is also invaluable as he was a 2005 ACC Champion and has competed at NCAAs.

Jon Kohler will be challenging Pinto for the 141 spot after spending last season at the 133 class. He went 10-20 as the Terps' starter at 133.

Alex Krom, who spent most of last year as the Terps' starter at 141, will redshirt this season.

Three freshman come to Maryland to compete at 141 this year including Cory Biscaha, Matt Bogusz, and Dex Lederer. Biscaha was a District 21 and Region 6 Champion and a 2006 New Jersey state placer.

Bogusz was a 2007 District 11 Champion as well as three-time District 11 finalist while winning the 2007 Northeast Regional. Lederer also has an impressive resume coming in, as he was a three-time Pennsylvania Freestyle State Champion, a two-time Greco Roman State Champion, and a 2005 Cadet Freestyle All-American.

Talented freshman Eric Medina will push for the starting job at 149 pounds and Steve Fehnel will also challenge him for the spot. Medina was a three-time National Prep Champion, a Cadet Freestyle National Champion, two-time Ironman Champion, and the 2005 Beast of the East champion. He was ranked No. 1 in the country at 145 pounds by WIN Magazine and was ranked 10th-best recruit in the country, regardless of weight class, on Internat.

Fehnel, a senior, went 8-5 last season in tournament action and finished sixth at the east Stroudsburg Open.

Three other newcomers will push the two front runners as Dan Hawvermale, Kyle John, and Shawn Steets all join the Terp ranks along with veterans Keith Bernard and Ryan Brown.

157

Newcomers Brian Letters and Jake Fedechko will look to earn the starting spot in their first year on campus at 157. Letters finished third at the 2007 Pennsylvania State Championships and was the 2006 Powerade Champion. He was a four-time WPIAL place winner and finished high school career with 157 wins for Fox Chapel.

Fedechko was a 2005 FILA Cadet Freestyle All-American, two-time district champion and a regional champion in New Jersey.

Santoro also points to Clint Stout who is waiting for a shot at 157. He has been injury-laden but is healthy for the first time in a while and will push for the position.

The 157 class also welcomes freshman Matt MacLean and Navy transfer Ricky Tippett to the lineup.

165

The 165 pound weight class is another wide open position for the Terps this year. Mike McGill moved up a weight class after starting at 157 last year where he went 12-17 overall.

Ryan Kennett and Bradley Nielson will also make their cases for the starting spot prior to the season. Kennett was a three-time prep state champion in high school while Nielson had a stellar career at Walkersville before coming to Maryland.

174

Sophomore Mike Letts returns to the spot where he captured the ACC title at 174 pounds last season. As a freshman, Letts led the team with 31 wins and went 17-3 in dual competition.

He was the first true freshman to compete at the NCAA Championships for the Terps since Jason Shea wrestled at 133 pounds in 1990.

Letts went 2-2 at the NAAs and will look to improve on his performance from last year, possibly gunning to be Maryland's first All-American since 1997.



Rich DiPietro is the other wrestler listed at 184 pounds who provides depth at this weight class. He saw a lot of mat time last season filling in for the injured Haines.




Taylor ranked fourth in the nation in 2006-07 with 18 pins and went a team-best 18-3 in duals while going 29-9 overall.

HEAVYWEIGHT

Bryan Reiss and Patrick Gilmore, who moved up from 197, will battle for the starting position at heavyweight. Both did not see time on the mat in dual competition last year.

Reiss finished second at the Wilkes Open in his only action of the season in 2006-07 as he went 3-1. Gilmore went 9-8 in tournaments with a pair of falls last year and finished fourth at the West Virginia Open.

Tommy Sitar also joins the heavyweight ranks as a freshman and will also look for some time on the mat this season.

SCHEDULE

Santoro has put together one of the toughest schedules in recent memory for the Terps in 2007-08. Maryland will face seven teams that finished last season in the final USA Today/NWCA/Intermat Coaches Poll.

The Terps open up at the always challenging Avalon Duals on November 3 before traveling to Penn State a week later. Maryland will face Edinboro who finished last year with a ranking, as did Penn State.

After the Body Bar Systems Invitational tournament at Cornell on November 17, Maryland will wrestle Michigan, Central Michigan, and Appalachian State. Both the Wolverines and CMU were top 15 teams in 2006-07.

The Terps open their home schedule on December 2 against Lehigh, which finished in the top 25 as well, before hosting Rider and Rutgers on the 8th.

The nation's most prestigious tournament will once again welcome Maryland as the Southern Scuffle will take place on December 29-30.

The Terps will face nationally-ranked Navy on January 10 before opening their ACC schedule on January 13 at North Carolina.

The highlight of the year will come on March 8 when the 2008 ACC Championship makes its way to Comcast Center. It is the first time that the tournament will be held in the facility.

The NCAA Championship begins on March 20 in St. Louis at the Scottrade Center.
