

HEAD COACH KERRY MCCOY

FIRST SEASON AT MARYLAND • PENN STATE, 1997



Director of athletics Deborah A. Yow announced May 12, 2008 that Kerry McCoy has been named the head coach for the University of Maryland wrestling program. In three seasons as head coach at Stanford, McCoy transformed the Cardinal into a national contender after inheriting a team that went 6-8-1 in 2004-05.

McCoy led the Cardinal to a 19th-place finish at the NCAA Championships this past season which was the second-best finish in program history. Stanford went 13-4 with a 6-3 mark in the Pac-10 while finishing second in the conference championships, its best showing ever. Stanford sent five wrestlers to nationals in St. Louis for the second straight season, which was also the most in team history.

McCoy made an immediate impact in his first season as Stanford went 8-7 in 2005-06 and improved its showing at the Pac-10 Championships by two places. He guided two wrestlers to the NCAA Championships that season and mentored Tanner Gardner to All-America accolades.

In 2006-07, McCoy continued to steadily improve the program, as the Cardinal went 8-8 during the season and performed even better than the year before in the conference championships, finishing sixth. Five wrestlers qualified for

the NCAA Championships which was a program record, and two wrestlers, Gardner and Josh Zupancic, became the first Stanford duo to earn All-America honors in the same season since 1967.

In addition, Zack Giesen was tabbed the Pac-10 Newcomer of the Year.

Prior to his time at Stanford, McCoy spent five seasons as an assistant coach at Lehigh where he mentored 14 All-Americans and a pair of NCAA Champions. He helped the Mountain Hawks to four Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association titles and led Jon Trence to a school-record 133 wins in his career at 197 pounds. Trence was a three-time All-American.

During his time at Lehigh, McCoy shared the sidelines with former Maryland head coach Pat Santoro, who was also on the staff at Penn State when McCoy was a wrestler.

While at Lehigh, McCoy also served as the director of wrestling and head coach of the Lehigh Valley Athletic Club where he was responsible for conducting clinics in the local area, promoting the sport of wrestling, and fundraising. McCoy serves on the USA Wrestling Athlete Advisory Committee as well as the USAW Executive Committee, the United States Olympic Committee, and has been a U.S. Freestyle World Team coach for two seasons.

McCoy also had a stint as an assistant coach at Penn State for three seasons, where he helped the Nittany Lions to a pair of fourth-place finishes at the NCAA Championships and guided 10 All-Americans and two national champions.



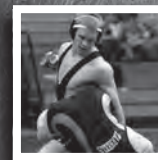
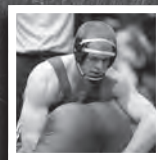
McCoy spent his collegiate wrestling career with the Nittany Lions and posted a record of 150-18 in his four seasons. He captured a pair of NCAA Championships in 1994 and 1997 and won three Big Ten titles. After going 19-17 in his first 36 matches at Penn State, McCoy lost just once in his final 132 with an 88-match winning streak.

A three-time All-American, McCoy was named the Penn State Athlete of the Year and the Nittany Lions' Wrestler of the Year in 1994 and 1997 while being tabbed the 1997 Hodge Award winner as W.I.N. Magazine's Wrestler of the Year. He earned his bachelor's degree in marketing in 1997.

McCoy was also a two-time Olympian for the United States and took fifth place at the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, Australia, and seventh in 2004 in Athens. McCoy also won five straight U.S. National Freestyle Wrestling Championships from 2000 to 2004.

McCoy has been a member of the United States National Team nine times and earned a silver medal in 2003 at the World Championships. In August 2003, McCoy won a gold medal at the Pan-Am Games and was named the Most Outstanding Wrestler of the tournament. McCoy furthered his international wrestling experience this summer, serving as a coach with the U.S. National Team at the 2008 Summer Olympic Games in Beijing.

McCoy and his wife, Abbie, gave birth to their first son, Gabriel, in May.

Fourth Season at Maryland

Former Nebraska All-American Todd Beckerman is in his fourth season on the Maryland Terrapin staff. A native of Crofton, Md., Beckerman was added to the staff in September of 2005.

Beckerman spent two seasons as an assistant coach at the Naval Academy before coming to College Park. In 2004, the team posted its best dual record since 1993 and had a school-record eight wrestlers post 25-win seasons. A four-year letterwinner and two-time All-America at Nebraska, Beckerman came to Navy from Lincoln, Neb., where he spent the 2002-03 season as a volunteer assistant coach for the Huskers. Beckerman primarily coached the lower weight classes and helped coordinate and assist in the Husker recruiting efforts.

Prior to returning to his alma mater, Beckerman worked during the 2001-02 season as an administrative assistant in the Penn State wrestling office, where he worked one-on-one with student-athletes and played a large role in directing summer camps. Beckerman also implemented the Todd Beckerman All-American Wrestling Camp, which was held for six-straight summers at Nebraska beginning in 1997.

At the 2000 and 2001 NCAA Championships, Beckerman wrestled to All-America status as well as Academic All-Big 12 honors in both seasons. He was the 2000-01 Nebraska Male Athlete of the Year, as well as the Husker Power Lifter of the Year. The 2000-01 team captain also competed internationally in 1999 and 2000 as a member of the Big 12 All-Star Wrestling Team.

Beckerman graduated in 2001 with a degree in human resources and family sciences. He received his master's in education from Nebraska with an emphasis in post secondary athletics in 2007.

Jason Powell joined the University of Maryland staff in August 2008 after two seasons as an assistant coach at the University of Oregon.

Prior to Oregon, Powell assisted with the wrestlers' daily workouts and recruiting for a year as a volunteer assistant coach at the University of Nebraska, his alma mater.

Powell was a three-time All-American at Nebraska, winning the 2004 national championship in the 125-pound division.

Powell lettered all four seasons at Nebraska and was a team captain his junior and senior years.

In his recruiting duties, Powell helped haul in a top-10 recruiting class for the Cornhuskers.

An Oklahoma native, Powell graduated from Choctaw High School in Choctaw, Okla.

First Season at Maryland

James Yonushonis joined the Maryland coaching staff in August 2008 after a storied career at Penn State University.

Yonushonis was an All-American in the 174-pound division for the Nittany Lions and spent the last season as a coach on the club team, working with the upper weights.

Yonushonis received numerous accolades at Penn State. He was an NCAA All-American in 2006 and won the Big Ten Sportsmanship Award in 2006 and 2007. Yonushonis was an exemplary student, as well, making the Big Ten All-Academic Team all four years in State College, Pa. Yonushonis was a member of the Penn State Student-Athlete Honor Society in 2006.

In addition to his coaching duties, Yonushonis organized and directed summer wrestling camps. Yonushonis also received prior coaching experience in Ashood, Israel in the Eleven Victims of Munich Memorial Games and as an assistant at Philipsburg-Osceola High School in Philipsburg, Pa.

Yonushonis is currently training for the 2012 Summer Olympics in London.

32nd Season

Former Terrapin letterwinner Kevin Kearns enters his 32nd season on the Maryland staff, his fourth as an administrative assistant after spending 27 years as an assistant coach. In 1970, while a captain of the wrestling team, Kearns was drafted into the United States Army. He served with the 101st Airborne Division in a Recon Team in Vietnam in 1971 and 1972.

Upon his completion of military duty, Kearns returned to the Maryland wrestling program in 1972-73 and assisted Coach McHugh and the team. Wrestling during this time for the Baltimore Central YMCA, Kearns won the national YMCA Greco championship, the prestigious New York Athletic Club Greco championship and two South Atlantic AAU freestyle championships.

After receiving his degree, he moved to Minnesota to train and wrestle for the United States Greco Roman team. Returning to Maryland in 1976, Kearns was named head coach at Dulaney High School in Timonium, Md. In 1977, he was selected to take the head coaching position at Johns Hopkins University, but returned to Maryland in 1980, where he has served as an assistant coach for 27 years before moving to an administrative position in 2004.

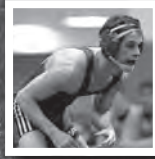
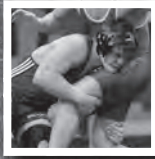

2008-09 SEASON OUTLOOK

The University of Maryland wrestling program had a breakout season last year, winning its first Atlantic Coast Conference championship in 35 years with a perfect league record and dominating dual action with a 16-4 record.

With nine of 10 starters returning in 2008-09, including all six NCAA qualifiers, first-year Head Coach Kerry McCoy inherits a talented roster looking to improve on last season's success.

"I am very excited for this season," McCoy said. "We have a great group of guys and high expectations."

The Terrapins return a host of letterwinners, headlined by junior Hudson Taylor at 197 pounds.

Taylor dominated to the tune of a 37-3 record last season, winning the ACC championship and placing third at the NCAA Championship en route to becoming the program's first All-American since 1997. Taylor defeated eight nationally-ranked wrestlers a season ago, including No. 1 ranked, returning national champion Josh Glenn of American.

"Hudson did a great job last season and really raised the bar for the rest of the guys on the team," McCoy said. "He confirmed what many already believed: You can win at the highest level at the University of Maryland."

Taylor is joined by returning NCAA qualifiers, including ACC champions Steven Bell (133), Jon Kohler (141), Brian Letters (157), Mike Letts (174) and ACC Runner up Eric Medina (149).

Based on last year's success, the Terps have a challenging and exciting slate of competition this season. The schedule includes high-profile matches against defending national champion Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Navy and Lehigh, among others.

The difficult schedule should leave the Terps battle tested once ACC competition begins, putting them in good position to repeat as conference champions.

"This season is definitely going to be a challenge," McCoy said. "We will be tested every week, which will ensure that we will be prepared for the postseason."

125

Junior Brendan Byrne looks to be the front runner in the 125-pound weight class. Byrne is coming off a 19-win season that included 13 dual meet wins. Byrne won five matches by major decision, one by technical fall and one via pin in 2007-08.

Other returners with experience at 125 include Pat Strizki, James Knox, Lou Ruland, Will Sharbaugh and Casey Marwine. Newcomer Brian Marcoux will also look to challenge at this weight.

133

The 133-pound division is in great shape this season with junior Steven Bell returning. Bell saw almost all the action at 133 last season, posting an impressive 29 wins, with 16 dual meet wins. Bell was the ACC champion in this weight class and won three matches at the NCAA Championship with wins against two ranked wrestlers.

Mookie Golden saw action here last year and will look to challenge for the starting spot. Other challengers are Mike Hromada and Sean Gunn.

141

The 141-pound division could be one of the more competitive weight classes on the team this season.

Jon Kohler is the returning starter. He won 17 matches and won the ACC championship last season.

Alex Krom is back after redshirting a season ago. Krom won 22 matches two years ago and was ranked as high as 13th in the nation.

Matt Bogusz and Dexter Lederer are returning as well and will look to battle for the starting job. Other challengers are Anthony Patrick.

149

Sophomore Eric Medina is back at 149 pounds and is primed for a big season. Medina made an immediate impact as a freshman last year, winning 21 matches and earning an at-large selection to the NCAA Championship.

Medina had seven wins via pin last year, the second-most pins on the team and also won four matches by major decision. Medina was ranked as highly as 13th in the nation last season. Medina posted three wins against ranked foes a year ago.

Steve Fehnel is the lone fifth-year senior on the squad this year. He will look to make the most of his last season. Other challengers at this weight will be Shawn Mazzarone, Jacob Stout, Cory Biscaha, Boban Dedovic, Danny Bichner and Scooter Golden.

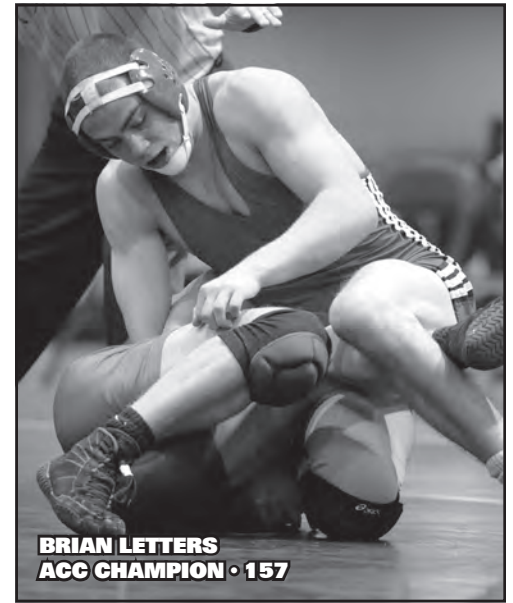
Sophomore Brian Letters is coming off an impressive freshman season and should be the Terps' main guy in the 157-pound division.

Letters won 18 matches a season ago, including a 4-1 record in ACC duals and an ACC title. After a hard-fought berth to the

NCAA Championship, Letters had maybe his most impressive victory of the season once there, knocking off No. 9 Chase Pami of Cal Poly.

Andrew Bradley is another option at 157. Bradley battled injuries through his career, but looks to step in and make an impact this season.

Joining Letters and Bradley at 157 are sophomores Kyle John and Matt MacLean.

Mike McGill saw the majority of the action in this class last season and is back again this year. McGill won 11 matches last season. It is possible Letters could move up from 157 to wrestle in that class. Newcomers Josh Asper and Corey Peltier will also look to challenge here.

Junior Mike Letts is one of the top wrestlers in the nation at 174 pounds and will be the primary option.

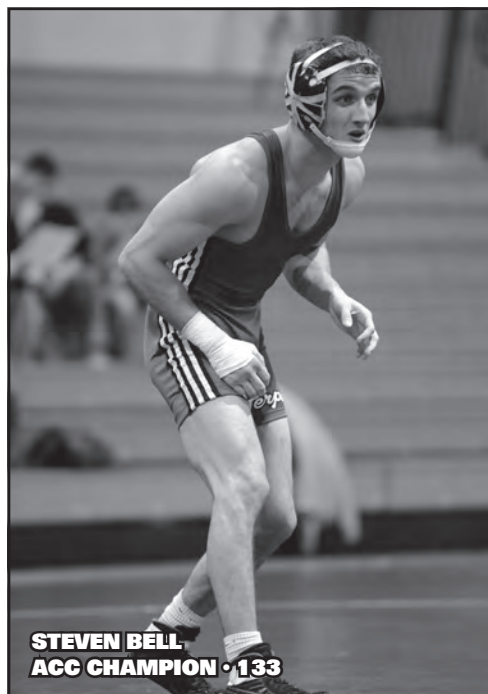

Brad Nielson is the only other returner with experience in this class. Newcomers Patrick Klenkel and Joey Gilpin will add depth to this weight class.

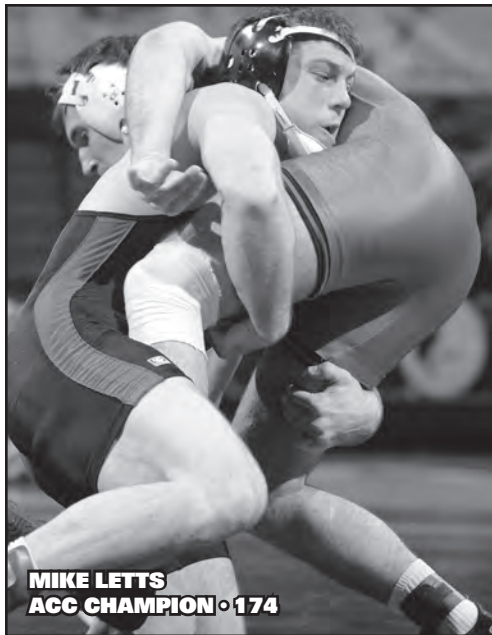
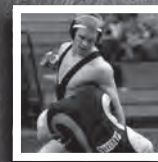
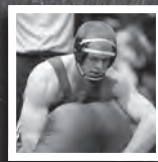

Four guys will compete for this spot, including Rich DiPietro, Ryan Gray, Chris Lloyd and Owen Smith.

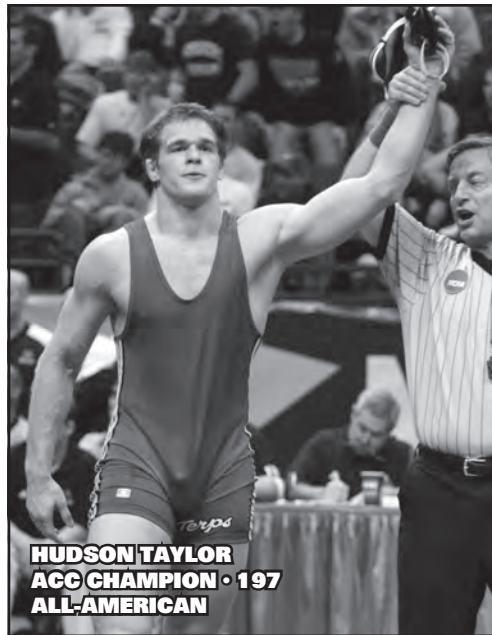
DiPietro, a junior, is the only one with any experience in this class as the others are all incoming freshmen.



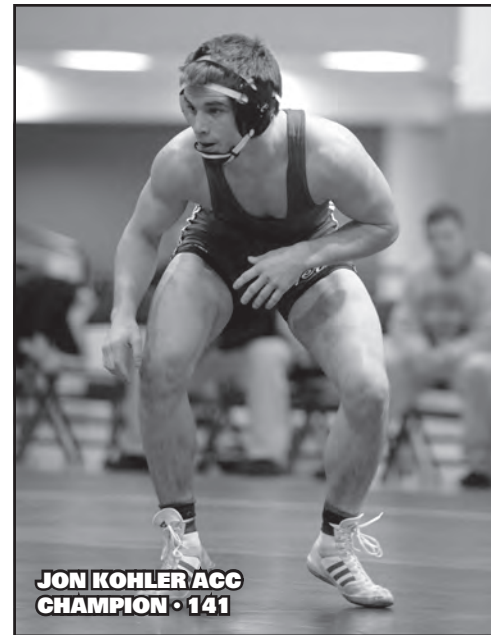

The 197-pound division is clearly the strength of the team as All-American Hudson Taylor is back for his junior season.

Taylor saw all the action in this class a year ago, posting a gaudy 37-3 record and top-five national ranking. Taylor won 18 of his 37 matches by pin in an ACC championship season that saw him finish third at the NCAA Championships and earn ACC Wrestler of the Year honors.

Tommy Sitar will look to push Hudson and add depth at 197.

HEAVYWEIGHT

Sophomore Patrick Gilmore saw all the action in the 285-pound division a season ago.

Gilmore will be pushed by newcomers Owen Duffy and Kyle Hanson at this position with the possibility of Sitar moving up to heavyweight.

SCHEDULE

Coming off one of the best seasons in school history, The Terps face a challenging schedule for the upcoming year.

The season begins with the annual Red & Black Wrestle-Offs exhibition October 24.

Regular-season action starts November 1 at the Fighting Scot Duals in Edinboro, Pa., where the Terps won two of three matches a season ago. Some Terps may participate in the Eastern Michigan Open the next day.

November 9 will be an emotional match as Maryland heads to Lehigh to face the Mountain Hawks, now coached by Pat Santoro, who coached the Terps the last five seasons. McCoy also has plenty of history with Lehigh and Santoro. McCoy and Santoro shared the sidelines as assistants at Lehigh and Santoro was an assistant at Penn State when McCoy was on the wrestling team.

A partial team will be at the East Stroudsburg Open November 15 before participating in the Body Bar Invitational in Ithaca, N.Y. November 22.

Maryland is again in New York November 29 for the Northeast Duals in Guilderland, N.Y. The Terps will face Drexel, defending national champion Iowa and Missouri in the competition.

McCoy returns to his alma mater December 7 for the Penn State Open.

The first home match is scheduled for December 14 against Princeton with trips to Wilkes-Barre, Pa. and Evanston Ill. to follow the next two weekends.

Atlantic Coast Conference competition begins January 11 with a home tilt against the North Carolina Tar Heels.

Following the North Carolina matchup, the Terps have exciting road confrontations at Oklahoma on January 16 and at Nebraska January 18.

ACC competition renews January 24 in Raleigh, N.C., where the Terps will face both NC State and Duke.

In-state rival Navy comes to College Park January 30 for what should be a closely-contested match after the Terps defeated the Midshipmen, 21-18, in Annapolis, Md. last season.

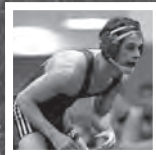
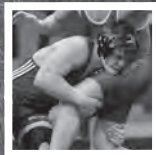
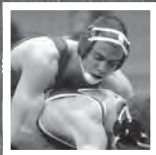
A partial Terps roster will return to Edinboro, Pa. February 7 for the Edinboro Open before more regional competition.

Maryland visits Virginia Tech February 8 and makes the short trip to Washington, D.C. February 13 to face American University.

The regular season concludes with a pair of home matches against George Mason and conference rival Virginia February 21 and 22, respectively.

The ACC Championships will be held March 7 in Blacksburg, Va., where the Terps will look to repeat as conference champions. The NCAA Championships are set to take place March 19-21 in St. Louis, where the Terps finished 21st a season ago, highlighted by a third-place national finish in the 197-pound division by Hudson Taylor.

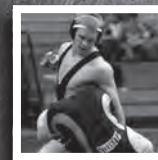
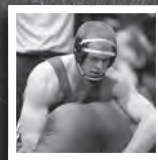

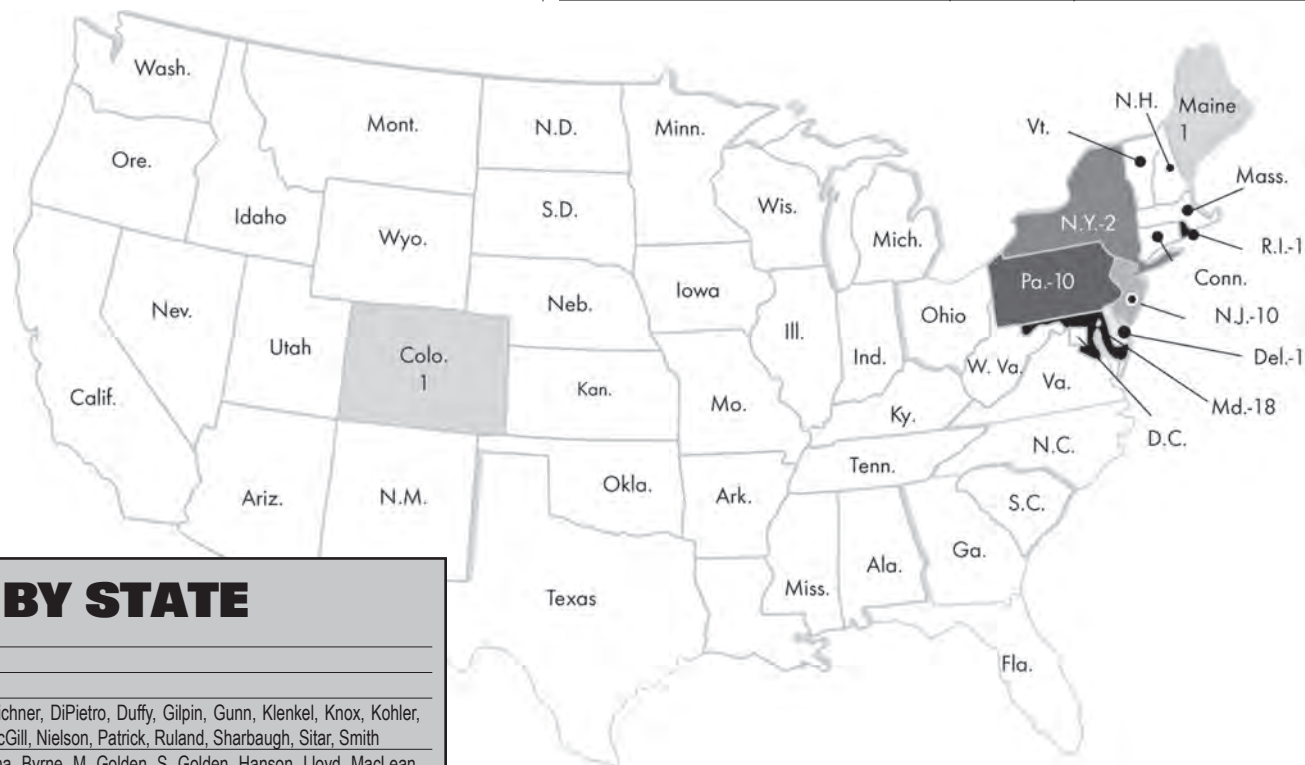
