TERPS EARN HIGHEST SEED IN 13 YEARS

- Fourth-year head coach Brenda Frese has guided her thirdranked Terrapins to its third-straight NCAA Tournament bid, earning a No. 2 seed in the Albuquerque Regional, the highest seed for Maryland since 1993.
- Maryland faces 15th-seeded and Northeast Conference Champion Sacred Heart on Sunday, March 19, following the #7 St. John's and #10 California matchup which tips off at noon. The Terps and the Pioneers will tip off 30 minutes after the conclusion of game one and will air on ESPN.
- Talk about a guick turnaround. The Terrapins are the only No. 1 or No. 2 seed not in the tournament bracket four years ago.
- The Terps are looking to post their 29th win of the season, which would tie the school record. Kodak/WBCAAll-American finalist Crystal Langhorne is looking for her school-record 33rd start of the season.

LAST TIME OUT

- Maryland reached the ACC Tournament championship game for the first time in 13 years, but fell to No. 1 North Carolina, 91-80. After making two-consecutive trips to the tournament's semifinal round, the Terps defeated then-No. 2 Duke, 78-70, to advance to the title game, also snapping a 14-game losing streak to the Blue Devils.
- It was the third-consecutive year the Terps had met Duke in the semifinals. Maryland, Duke and North

Carolina are the only three teams in the ACC to reach the conference semifinals the last three season.

- Maryland defeated Georgia Tech in the first round, 71-66.
- Three Terps earned All-ACC Tournament honors. Sophomore Crystal Langhorne was named to the first team for the second-straight year. Marissa Coleman was the only freshman to garner all-tournament honors, earning a spot on the first team. Sophomore Jade Perry was selected to the second team for her first-career conference honor.

MARYLAND RANKED THIRD IN FINAL AP POLL

- When the Associated Press released its final top 25 on March 13, the Terps were tabbed the third-best team in the nation for the 2005-06 season. It is the first time since 1992-93 Maryland has appeared in the final AP poll and is the highest final rating since 1981-82.
- Maryland has appeared in the AP's final poll 13 times since 1977. In 1981-82, the Terps ended the year ranked No. 3, as well. They have finished among the top five in the nation only three times in the history of the program, including this season, finishing fifth in the 1988-89 ranking.

TERPS RATED AMONG TOP THREE IN THE NATION

- After reaching the championship game of the ACC Tournament, the Terps were rated No. 3 in both national polls. It is the highest ranking for Maryland since being ranked third on Jan. 12, 1993, which is also the last time it was ranked in the top 10.
- The Terps have earned a top five rating for five weeks in a row. Their 17 weeks in the top 10 ties a school record. Maryland has been ranked 19 weeks, overall.
- The Terps spent a school-record 17-consecutive

weeks ranked in the AP's top 10 twice - the first time in 1978-79 and the second time in 1982-83. In both seasons. Maryland was rated among the top 10 every week of the season. The Terps also spent 17 weeks in the top 10 in the coaches poll in 1991-92.

Maryland began the 2005-06 season ranked 14th in the preseason polls, the second-straight year the Terps were ranked in the preseason ratings. They made their first top-10 appearance since 1992-93 when they were rated 10th on Nov. 10, then moved up to sixth over the following three weeks. The Terps earned a top five rating after defeating then-No. 1 North Carolina on Feb. 9 in Chapel Hill. N.C. in overtime.

TOUGH SCHEDULE

- Four Maryland opponents are ranked in both the Associated Press Poll and ESPN/USA Today Coaches top 25 polls this week. Among the ranked teams are two ACC foes, while three opponents are among the top 10.
- The Terps are 3-4 against teams ranked in this week's top 25, including the team's stunning upset over No. 1/1 North Carolina. Overall, Maryland is 6-4 against teams ranked at the time of the meeting, the most wins against ranked opponents since 1992-93.
- The Terps picked up wins over No. 16/17 Michigan State and UNC, and also snapped a 14-game losing streak

to No. 4/4 Duke at the ACC Tournament. Maryland's only four losses of the season have come to UNC at the ACC Tournament, the Blue Devils and No. 8/8 Tennessee, all teams ranked No. 1 at some point during the

- ACC opponents Florida State and Virginia Tech are both receiving votes in both rankings, while NC State and Boston College are getting votes in the AP poll.
- When Maryland earned its top-five ranking on Feb. 13, it was the first time in league history three ACC teams were among the top five in the polls.
- When the AP released its weekly ranking on Jan. 9, six ACC teams were featured in the top 25, the first time in the history of the league that six teams were ranked among the AP's top 25 (DU, NC, MD, BC, VT, NCS).
- When the rankings were released on Nov. 21, it was the first time since January 3, 2000 that three ACC squads were ranked among the top 10. That week, NC State (#3), UNC (#9) and Duke (#10) were the three squads rated among the top 10 in the Coaches Poll. Not since the final 1998 poll have three teams been ranked in the top 10 in the AP (#7 UNC, #8 Duke, #10 NC State).

TERPS IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

- Maryland will make its 15th tournament appearance and its third straight. It will be the first time since 1991-93 the Terps will be making three-consecutive trips to the Big Dance.
- In its 14 previous appearances, the Terps have posted a 14-14 record all-time. Maryland reached the Final Four twice (1982 and 1989), while making four Elite Eight and five Sweet Sixteen appearances.
- In 1989, the Terps earned their only No. 1 seed in program history.
 They have been a two seed four times, the last time coming in 1993. Maryland was also a No. 3 seed in 1983. The Terps have never been tabbed a four, five, 10 or 11 seed.
- In its two NCAA Tournament appearances under head coach Brenda Frese, the Terps improved from a 12 seed in 2003-04 to a No. 7 seed in 2004-05.
- A QUICK LOOK BACK: Maryland reach the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the second-straight year, falling to

No. 2-seed Ohio State, 75-65. A No. 7 seed, the Terps opened the tournament with a 65-55 victory over 10thseeded Wisconsin-Green Bay. Maryland was hosting an NCAA Tournament game at home for the first time since 1993

TERPS VS. NCAA TOURNEY TEAMS

- Maryland is 9-4 versus teams in this year's NCAA Tournament, with its only four losses coming to two No. 1 seeds and a No. 2 seed.
- Maryland has faced nine teams in the ACC Tournament, claiming wins over eight of those teams. Boston College fell victim to the Terps twice, while Michigan State, Virginia Tech, Coppin State, NC State and Florida State have each lost to Maryland once. Duke is the only team to win twice against Maryland, but the Terps snapped a 14-game losing streak to the Blue Devils in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament. Maryland handed North Carolina its only loss of the season, but the Tar Heels avenged that loss in the conference title game. Tennessee claimed the Paradise Jam title over the Terps back in November.

TERPS IN STATE COLLEGE

Maryland makes travels to the State College for the first time since 2002. It will be the second time in school
history the Terps will be playing an NCAA Tournament contest in State College, Pa. In 1983, third-seeded
Maryland fell to second-seeded Old Dominion, 74-57.

ACC IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

- The No. 1 conference in the nation, the ACC claims seven NCAA Tournament teams, tying for the most this season. The Big East also had seven of its teams earn tournament bids.
- Duke and North Carolina claimed two of the four No. 1 seeds in the tournament. The Tar Heels are the top seed in the Cleveland Regional, while the Blue Devils are the top team in the Bridgeport Regional. The Terps are the No. 2 seed in the Albuquerque Regional, with Boston College garnering the eighth seed in the bracket. Virginia Tech is the seventh seed in the Bridgeport Regional, while fifth-seeded NC State and sixth-seeded Florida State are in the San Antonio Regional.
- The ACC, who has posted a 133-28 mark (82.6 percent) against non-conference opponents during the regular season, is 23-7 (.767) against non-conference NCAA Tournament teams.

LANGHORNE A KODAK/WBCA ALL-AMERICAN FINALIST

- Sophomore Crystal Langhorne is one of 48 finalists for the 10-member Kodak/WBCA All-American Team, which was announced today by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA). The top six players from eight regions were voted on by WBCA member coaches.
- The top six players in Region II are all ACC players, including Monique Currie and Lindsay Harding from Duke, Tamara James from Miami, and Erlana Larkins and Ivory Latta from North Carolina.
- · Langhorne is also a finalist for the Wooden Award, presented to the nation's top women's basketball player.

LANGHORNE A WOODEN AWARD FINALIST

- Sophomore Crystal Langhorne was one of 18 student-athletes who have been placed on the final voting ballot for the John R. Wooden Award, presented to the nation's top collegiate player, and the Wooden All-American team. The winner will be announced on Saturday, April 8 on CBS.
- Langhorne leads the nation in field goal shooting (65.9 percent) and was recently named first team All-ACC and was a first team All-ACC Tournament pick for the second-straight year. She helped the Terps reach the finals of the conference tournament, which included a 78-70 victory over then-No. 2 Duke in the semifinals, also snapping a 14-game losing streak to the Blue Devils.
- Langhorne is one of three ACC players on the ballot. She is joined by Duke's Monique Currie and North Carolina's Ivory Latta.

THREE TERPS GARNER ALL-TOURNAMENT NODS

- After its run to the championship game, three Terrapins were voted All-ACC Tournament, the most since 1993, with two being selected to the first team.
- Sophomore Crystal Langhorne and freshman Marissa Coleman were honored as first team performers while sophomore Jade Perry received a second team nod.
- Langhorne earned first team all-tournament honors for the second time. In helping Maryland to its first ACC finals in 13 years, she averaged 15.0 points and 8.0 rebounds per game, while shooting 62.5 percent from the floor. She also had a double-double in the upset of then-No.2 Duke and a 20-point outing vs. Georgia Tech.
- Coleman was the only freshman to earn all-tournament honors, averaging 14.3 points and 9.0 rebounds over the three games. She reached double figures in every game, she also had a double-double in the upset of the Blue Devils.
- Perry garnered ACC honors for the first time in her career. Going 10-for-16 over the three games, she led the Terps in scoring with 18 points vs. No. 1 North Carolina, 14 of those coming in the first half.

COLEMAN TABBED ROOKIE OF THE YEAR

- Earning 61 of 70 votes, Maryland's Marissa Coleman was named the ACC's Rookie of the Year, the second-straight year a Terp has earned the award.
- Coleman is a five-time Rookie of the Week, tying a school record set by teammate Crystal Langhorne and the most of any league freshman. She is the ACC's second-highest scoring rookie (14.6), while leading all rookies in rebounding (7.7) and blocks (1.52), and is third in assists (3.06). Coleman ranks in the top 15 in the ACC in seven different statistical categories overall.
- Coleman has posted eight 20-point games, including scoring a career-high 23 in the upset of then-No.
 North Carolina. She has also had seven doubledoubles on the season, tallying nine double-figure rebounding efforts.

Coleman is the fifth player in school history to earn ACC Rookie of the Year honors. It is the first time since 1987 and 1988 that a pair of Terps have garnered the award in back-to-back years.

THREE TERPS NAMED TO ALL-ACC SQUAD

- For the first time in 17 years, three Terrapins were selected to the All-ACC squad, led by sophomore Crystal Langhorne's first-team selection. Junior Shay Doron and freshman Marissa Coleman were both named to the second team. Coleman was the only freshman to be named All-ACC.
- Langhorne garners All-ACC honors for the second straight year. The nation's leading shooter (65.9 percent), she is tied for third in the ACC in scoring and second in rebounding. She also leads the conference with 13 double-doubles, picking up the 30th of her career in the conference finale vs. Clemson and posting 31 overall, the most of any active conference player. Langhorne is a two-time conference player of the week honoree. She scored a career-high 34 points in the overtime victory at Wake Forest and grabbed a season-high 19 boards against Florida State.
- Doron is the second player in school history to earn All-ACC nods three times. She
 is second on the team in scoring and 10th in the ACC. She also ranks seventh in
 the league in three-point shooting (41.1 percent), better than a 100-percentage
 point improvement from last season (nearly 29 percent). Doron is also fourth
 in the ACC in free throw shooting (.830), seventh in assists (4.19) and 14th in
 three-point field goals made (1.59).
- Coleman is only the third freshman in school history to earn All-ACC nods, following in the footsteps of teammates Shay Doron and Crystal Langhorne. An all-around player, Coleman is ranked in seven different statistical categories in the ACC, leading the conference with 50.5 percent three-point shooting percentage. Ranked third on the team in scoring, she has recorded eight 20-point games, including a career-high 23 points in the upset of then-No. 1 North Carolina.

COLEMAN, TOLIVER RECEIVE ALL-ROOKIE NODS

 Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver were selected as two of the top five freshmen in the league, earning a spot on the ACC All-Freshman team.

- The 2006 ACC Rookie of the Year, Coleman was named ACC Rookie of the Week a league-best five times, which also ties a school record. Toliver earned the weekly nod twice, giving Maryland seven Rookie of the Week selections this season, also a school record.
- It marks the fourth-straight season the Terps have had at least one player on the all-freshman team and two player in two of the last three seasons.

TERPS LEAD THE NATION IN TWO CATEGORIES

- According to the NCAA's statistical rankings (as of March 12), Maryland has the best rebounding margin in the country at +11.7 rpg and boasts the best three-point shooting percentage at 41.1 percent, while ranking in the top five in five different categories
 - overall.
- The Terps have led the nation in rebounding margin for most of the season, also posting the best rebounding margin since the first year of the program (+16.3). Their accuracy from behind the threepoint line is a school record.
- Maryland is also second in the nation in scoring (83.6 ppg) and boasts a 48.1 percent shooting from the floor which ranks fourth. The Terps' 18.9 scoring margin is fifth.
- Maryland is also in the top 15 in the country in assists per game (10th - 17.4) and blocks per





- Sophomore Crystal Langhorne and Laura Harper are also ranked nationally in two statistical categories. Langhorne's 65.9 shooting percentage is the tops in the country. Harper was averaging 2.2 blocks per game which was ranked 27th.
- Also according to Stats, Inc. (as of Mar. 12), freshman Marissa Coleman's 50.5 percent shooting from three is second-best in the nation. Coleman's percent three-point shooting is not ranked among the NCAA's stats because it does not meeting the minimum of 2.00 three-point field goals made per game.
- A full listing of the team's statistical rankings are listed in the box on the right.

RECORD-SETTING SEASON

- Aside from the individual records that have been broken and will be broken this season, the Terps have also reset a number of team benchmarks and are on track to break others.
- The Terps are one win shy of the school record of 29 set in 1988-89
- Maryland's NCAA Tournament first-round game will be its school-record 33rd of the season.
- With its win over Clemson, Maryland captured its 14th home victory of the season, breaking the previous mark of 13 set in 1987-88, and ended the regular season with 15 home wins.
- The Terps also broke the school's free throw record against Clemson, making 581, to date, breaking the mark set in 1991-92. In its ACC Tournament guarterfinal win, Maryland topped its team record for three-point attempts.
- Maryland already broke the team's blocks record (155, set in 1979-80) and has 177 so far this season. Its 187 three-point field goals are the most ever made in school history, breaking the mark set two seasons ago (156 in 2003-04).
- The team's 90 percent road winning percentage is the best in school history. Maryland is also on pace to break the all-time three-point shooting record and free throw percentage mark.

TWO TERPS REACH 1000

- Sophomore Crystal Langhorne and junior Shay Doron both scored their 1,000th career-point this season and both were the fastest in school history to get there.
- Langhorne reached the 1,000 point mark in her 60th-career contest against Clemson, needing the fewest number of games of any player in school history to get to that mileston. She broke Doron's record set earlier this season. Doron reached 1,000 points in her 64th-career game against Xavier, breaking the previous mark of 68 games set by Deanna Tate set in 1988.
- Doron became the 21st player in school history to get to 1,000. With her 26-point outing vs. Miami, she cracked the top 15 all-time and is 10th all-time with 1,418 points.
- Langhorne currently stands at 1,071 career-points and was the 22nd player in school history to score 1,000

points, the first sophomore in school history to reach the milestone. She also become only the 14th player in school history to score 1,000 points and collect 500

rebounds.

LANGHORNE JOINS 1000-500

- Sophomore Crystal Langhorne is only the 14th player in school history to have 1,000 points and collect 500 rebounds, joining the 1000 point-500 rebound club when she tallied her 1,000 point against Clemson.
- With her first rebound at Virginia Tech, Langhorne became the 21st person in school history to grab 500 career boards. She now has 616 rebounds to her name, ranking 12th on Maryland's all-time career rebounds list.

500 BACK-TO-BACK

- Sophomore Crystal Langhorne has scored over 500 points for the second year in a row, making her only the second player in school history to do so and the first since 1989.
- The only other Terrapin to post back-to-back 500-point

seasons is Vicky Bullett. An All-American, Bullett tallied 581 points as a junior in 1988 and then netted a school-record 686 points during her senior campain in 1989.

20-POINT SCORERS

- There is no doubt Maryland has had balanced scoring all season, with over 75
 percent of its games featuring at least four double-figure scorers. The Terps
 have also had six different players score at least 20 points in a game, the most
 of any team in the ACC.
- North Carolina, Virginia and NC State have had five different players score at least 20 points, while Duke, the highest scoring team in the nation, has only had two different players tally 20. Clemson only had one player score 20 points this season.

DORON AMONG ACC ALL-TIME TOP FT SHOOTERS

 Having broken the school record for career free throws, making the 393rd of her career, Shay Doron also ranks 15th in the ACC's career record books. Doron is one of two active players on the career list. Duke's Monique Currie is currently third with 507 makes from the charity stripe.

COLEMAN FEATURED IN ACC FRESHMAN RECORDS

- Maryland's Marissa Coleman has made her way into the ACC's all-time freshman record books. Her 10 double-figure rebounding games are tied for the fourthmost by an ACC freshman all-time, while her 25 double-figure scoring games are tied for fifth. Coleman has posted 47 blocks this season, which ranks in a tie for seventh among all-time conference rookies.
- Coleman is also on the verge of entering the top 10 in the freshman class records in points and three-point field goals made.

TERP WINS OVER NO. 1'S

- With their upset over No. 1 North Carolina, it was the fourth time in school history the Terps had taken down a No. 1 team.
- Maryland's first win over a No. 1 team was in 1977-78 when it topped Tennessee, 75-69, in the AIAW Regionals in Cleveland, Miss. Fourteen years later, Maryland traveled to Charlottesville, Va., and upset ACC foe Virginia, 67-65, on Jan. 15, 1992. The following season, the Terps took down the No. 1 Lady Vols, again, 77-72, on Dec. 30, 1992, in Cole Field House.
- The Terps' victories over No. 1 Tennessee and No. 1 Virginia both happened in the same calendar year.

TAKING ON NO. 1... ALL OF THEM

- Maryland has faced the No. 1 ranked team in the nation four times this season.
 The Terps are 1-3 against those teams who were No. 1 at the time of the meeting in either or both polls.
- The Terps faced their first No. 1 challenger at the Paradise Jam, when Tennessee, who was tabbed No. 1 in the coaches poll, battled Maryland for the Paradise Jam title. The Terps' second shot at No. 1 came two months later and they were more successful the next time. Maryland took down North Carolina, who was No. 1 in both polls, on Feb. 9, handing the Tar Heels their only loss of the season. After that win, Duke was bumped up to No. 1 in the Associated Press poll just days later... which turned out to be the Terps' next opponent. Maryland fell to the No. 1 Blue Devils, and did not get another chance to dethrone a No. 1 until the ACC Tournament Championship game. In a rematch of the Terps-Heels regular season game, UNC, tabbed No. 1 again, claimed the conference title over the Terps on March 5.
- Maryland is one of just two teams in the country to face the only three teams in the nation to be ranked No. 1 this season. Old Dominion is the only other team to have player the Tar Heels, Blue Devils and Lady Vols this season.

TERPS AGAINST RANKED OPPONENTS

- Maryland is 6-4 against teams ranked in the top 25 in the polls at the time of the meeting, the most wins over ranked teams since 1992-93. Seven of those 10 games came against teams ranked in the top 10.
- All four of Maryland's losses were to teams ranked No. 1 or No. 2 at the time of the meeting.

TERPS TAKE DOWN LAST UNDEFEATED TEAM AND NO. 1 UNC

- On Feb. 9, Maryland took down the last undefeated team in college basketball

 men's and women's upsetting No. 1 North Carolina, 98-95, in overtime in

 Carmichael Auditorium, ending UNC's 30-game home win streak.
 - The Terps used a 16-5 run in the second half to get to 78-75 after trailing 70-56. In the final seconds and down just three points, sophomore Ashleigh Newman picked up a rebound and nailed a three-pointer from five feet behind the line, tying the contest and forcing an overtime. Heading into the game, Newman was just 1-for-13 from three-point range over her last three games. Freshman Marissa Coleman scored the first five points of the overtime, including an off-balanced three pointer, then stayed in front down the stretch. UNC's Ivory Latta had a chance to tie the game with just seconds left in the extra period and down 98-95. However, junior Shay Doron blocked the shot, which fell way short, and sealed the upset for the Terps.
- Five players reached double figures led by sophomore Crystal Langhorne's 25 points and eight rebounds. Coleman contributed 23 points and was one rebound shy of a double-double.
- The win over the No. 1/1 Tar Heels was the first time since Dec. 30, 1992-93 the Terps had knocked off a No. 1-ranked opponent. On that day, Maryland topped No. Tennessee, 77-72.

SENIORS HONORED

- Seniors Charmaine Carr and Angel Ross were both honored on Sunday during the annual Senior Day ceremony. Both played in their final regular-season contest in a Maryland uniform vs. Northern Colorado.
- Carr and Ross are the first four-year class under head coach Brenda Frese. The
 three arrived at Maryland during the 2002-03 campaign. Carr and Ross have
 been first-hand witnesses to the Terps' amazing turnaround. During their first
 season, Maryland won just 10 games, including just four ACC games. They'll
 end their careers as members of a top-three nationally ranked squad who will
 contend for an ACC and an NCAA title.

PLAY LIKE ITS OVERTIME

 Maryland has won four overtime games this season, all on the road. Each time, the Terps have stepped up in the extra five minutes to put its opponent away to go home with the

In the overtime period, Maryland has shot 58.6 percent from the field and 50 percent from threepoint range. It has also hauled down double the rebounds as its opponents and dished out three times the assists. The Terps have also made 15 more trips to the charity stripe in its four OT periods, knocking down 76 percent of their attempts.

Maryland has only trailed once in the overtime against Boston College.

EXTRA TIME

- In the 35-year history of the Maryland women's basketball program, the Terps have played in just 22 overtime games, going 14-8 in those games, including four overtime victories this season at Boston College, at Virginia, at Wake Forest and North Carolina.
- It is the first time in the history of the program the team has played in four extra period games in one season. Prior to this season, the Terps had only ever won one overtime game in a season.

 Under head coach Brenda Frese, Maryland is 7-1 in overtime games in her four seasons at the helm.

20-WIN SEASONS

- Maryland posted its 20th win of the season against Miami on Feb. 1, the first time since 1991-92 and 1992-93 that it has had back-to-back 20-win seasons. The Terps victory over No. 1 North Carolina was their 22nd of the season, matching their win total from last season. Their 26 regular-season victories are the most in school history and its 28 overall wins are one short of tying the school record.
- It is the 12th time in the history of the program Maryland has notched 20-win campaigns and the second under head coach Brenda Frese.

LANGHORNE A MIDSEASON CANDIDATE FOR WOODEN AWARD

- Sophomore Crystal Langhorne was one of 20 midseason candidates for the John R. Wooden Award. Named to the preseason top 30 list, she is one of four sophomores on the list and one of three ACC players.
- Langhorne leads the 28-4 Terrapins with 16.3 points and 8.6 rebounds per game, ranking in the top five in the ACC in both those categories. She is shooting a nation's best .659 percent from the floor and also leads the ACC with 13 double-doubles on the season. A second team all-conference selection, she has helped the Terps post a 12-2 conference mark, the most ACC wins since 1992-93. Langhorne has been named ACC Player of the Week twice this season. Langhorne was also named 2005 ACC Rookie of the Year.

TOP TERPS

- Maryland leads the ACC in four statistical categories, leading the league in three-point shooting team (41.4 percent). Its 44.8 rebounds per game are the most, while their +11.7 rebounding margin is also tops. The Terps have limited its opponents to a conference-best 29.57 defensive boards per game.
- The Terps are also second in three other statistical categories: scoring (83.6 ppg), field goal percentage (.481) and blocks (5.53); while ranking no lower than third in the ACC in three more categories (scoring margin, +18.8; free throw percentage, 74.3; assists, 17.38; assist-to-turnover ratio, 0.95; offensive rebounding, 14.88).

STARTING YOUNG

- Maryland had already boasted one of the youngest lineups in the ACC, but in the ACC Tournament, head coach Brenda Frese went even younger.
- After missing a couple of practices because of a deep thigh bruise, junior Shay
 Doron was moved to the bench for the ACC Tournament, leaving the door open
 for an underclassmen to start. In all three games of the conference tournament,
 the Terps fielded three sophomores and two freshmen, leading the Terps to the
 ACC Title game.
- The Terps' underclassmen have made 128 starts are the most for any conference team. The next youngest lineup in the conference are Georgia Tech's 74 underclassmen starts.
- The Terps have started the most freshmen in the ACC with 40, followed by Florida State's 33. Maryland also leads the league with the most sophomores in the lineup with 88, followed by GT's 73.
- Head coach Brenda Frese has had three sophomores in the lineup in all but three games and at least one freshman in all but two games. Sophomore Crystal Langhorne is the only underclassman to start every game, while junior Shay Doron has made the most starts of all the upperclassmen, starting in all but four game.

DOUBLING UP

- Sophomore Crystal Langhorne put up big numbers last season in points and rebounding, ending the season as the only player in the ACC to average a double-double (17.2 ppg, 10.6 rpg). She continues to put up big numbers this season, nearly averaging a double-double with 16.3 ppg and 8.6 rpg.
- Last year, Langhorne led the ACC with 18 double-double and this season, she leads the conference again in that category with 13, notching 31 career doubledoubles, the most of any current player in the ACC.

- Six different Terrapins have recorded double-doubles this year. Aside from Langhorne, freshman Marissa Coleman is second on the team with seven this season. Sophomore Laura Harper has posted four, while classmate Jade Perry has posted three. Junior Shay Doron and freshman Kristi Toliver have each had two
- Toliver and Doron have posted double-doubles in the points and assists categories, while Coleman, Langhorne, Harper and Perry accomplished the feat with points and rebounds.

SPREADING THE WEALTH

- Heading into the 2005-06 season, head coach Brenda Frese knew she had many
 offensive weapons and it has been apparent in the box score every night.
- At least four Terrapins have reached doubledigit scoring in all but seven games (78.1 percent of games), including three when six scored in double figures and eight times when five did so. Most recently, all five starters reached double figures in the upset win over No. 1 North Carolina.
- Five Terrapins are averaging in double figures, led by sophomore Crystal Langhorne's 16.3 points per game. The Terps' 83.6 ppg is the second-highest scoring average in the nation.

BLOCK PARTY

The return of sophomore Laura Harper to the lineup this season has also marked the return of the Terps' top shot blocker. In the nine games she played last year before suffering a season-ending injury, Harper had 15 blocks, second most on the squad by season's end. In her first nine games this season, she had 26 blocks and now has 65 overall in the 30 games she has played, the

second-most single-season total in school history.





- So far this season, Maryland has logged 176 rejections, breaking the school record set in 1979-80. The Terps surpassed last year's season total against Manhattan. Freshman Marissa Coleman has notched 47, tied for the fifth-most single-season total in school history.
- Sophomore Jade Perry has also reached double-figure blocks, notching 15 rejections, as have sophomore Crystal Langhorne and junior Shay Doron who have each made 11 blocks. Senior Charmaine Carr has registered 10 blocks this season.
- Maryland is tied for 11th in the nation with 5.5 blocks per game, while Harper's 2.2 blocks per game are ranked among the top 30 in the NCAA.

THREE-POINT TURN-AROUND

- Maryland has made a dramatic turnaround from behind the threepoint arc this season, boasting the best 3-point shooting percentage in the nation.
- The Terps boast a 41.4 three-point shooting percent, making nearly a 100-percentage point improvement from last season. Last year, they ranked sixth in the ACC from three-point land, shooting 32 percent.
- One of the reasons for the team's improvement in three-point shooting is the improvement of junior Shay Doron. Doron is shooting a





career-best 41.1 percent from behind the arc, which ranks in the top 10 in the ACC. Last season, she shot nearly 29 percent.

- The addition of freshmen Marissa Coleman has also impacted the team's three-point shooting percentage. Coleman is the team's best sharp shooter and boasts the second-best three-point shooting percentage in the nation (according to Stats, Inc., minimum 1.5 3FGM/G) while leading the ACC, knocking down 50.5 percent of her three-point attempts.
- Freshman Kristi Toliver's also gives the Terps another big boost in three-point shooting. She is second in the ACC with a 49.1 percent shooting from three-point land in conference-only games and is shooting 41.3 percent overall, which ranks in the top 10 in the conference.
- Maryland eclipsed the number of three-point buckets made all of last season (101 in 32 games) just 17 games into the season and now have 187 makes overall (through 32 games). The Terps are averaging 5.8 threes per game, compared to last year's average of 3.2 three-pointers made.

CHARITY WORK

- Last season, Crystal Langhorne averaged 17.2 points per game, despite shooting
 just 56.7 percent from the free throw line in over 200 trips to the line (the only
 Terrapin in school history to attempt over 200 free throws). Over the summer
 and during her stint with the U19 USA Basketball team, she was able to turn
 that around and has been a dependable shooter from the charity stripe.
- So far this season, Langhorne is shooting 69.8 percent (132-for-189) from the free throw line. She has been better than 75 percent 18 times this season, most recently going a perfect 6-for-6 in the ACC Tournament title game vs. North Carolina.
- Langhorne struggled from the free throw line from Dec. 13-Jan. 8, shooting just 60 percent. But over a six-game stretch from 1/16-2/1, she shot 77.1 percent, going 37-for-48 from the line. Against Georgia Tech on Jan. 26, she knocked down a career-high 11 free throws in 14 trips to the line.

IT'S ALL ACADEMIC

- Junior Shay Doron was voted to the ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America team, earning a spot on the second team. A two-time all-district team honoree, she has earned a spot on the Dean's List the last four semesters, while also being named to the Academic All-ACC squad twice. Doron is a criminal justice and criminology major, boasting a 3.708 grade point average.
- Doron became the first Terrapin in school history to be named to the All-ACC squad three times. She is second on the team in scoring, while leading the team in assists. She has made a dramatic improvement in three-point shooting, shooting 42.7 percent, compared to nearly 29 percent shooting from a year ago.

DORON, LANGHORNE EARN ACADEMIC HONORS

- Maryland's Shay Doron and Crystal Langhorne have been voted to the ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-District 2 team. The two selections are the most for any ACC team.
- Doron, who was named to the first team, was a second team selection last year. A
 crimonology and criminal justice major, she carries a 3.708 grade point average.
 She is a two-time member of the Academic All-ACC team and has been named
 to the Dean's List four-consecutive semesters.
- Langhorne has not decided on a major, but boasts a 3.295 GPA. She was recently named a midseason candidate for the John R. Wooden Award.

WILEY-GATEWOOD TRANSFERS TO MARYLAND

- 2004 Parade National Player of the Year Sa'de Wiley-Gatewood has joined the sixth-ranked Terrapins this spring. Due to NCAA transfer rules, she will be eligible to play in December of 2006 and has one and a half years of eligibility remaining.
- Wiley-Gatewood is the first-ever high school girls player of the year to play for Maryland. She spent the last year and a half at the University of Tennessee where she earned the starting point guard position this season, while helping the Lady Vols attain a No. 1 national ranking.
- A native of Pomona, Calif., Wiley-Gatewood was one of the most heralded high school players in 2004. A McDonald's and WBCA All-American, she won the McDonald's All-American three-point shooting contest. A four year starter at Lynwood High School, she helped her team to a 119-7 record, including a

33-0 mark as a sophomore en route to being named the USA Today's National Champions.

FABULOUS FRESHMEN

- With Kristi Toliver's selection as ACC Rookie of the Week on Jan. 20, two different Terrapins have earned the conference weekly honor for the third-straight year.
- In 2003-04, Kalika France was selected Rookie of the Week three times, one more than classmate Shay Doron. Last season, Crystal Langhorne was selected Rookie of the Week a school-record five times. Prior to being sidelined for most of the season, Laura Harper also earned the weekly honor once. This season, Toliver's classmate, Marissa Coleman, leads the league with four conference rookie of the week selections.

ROAD WARRIORS

Maryland has posted nine road wins this season, the most since winning 13

during the 1991-92 campaign. Of those wins, six came against ACC te4ams, tying the most ACC road triumphs since that same season, also the last time the Terps had a winning road record in ACC play prior to this year.

- Winning on the road in the ACC is a tough task. Prior to this season, Maryland had won no more than four ACC road games in the last 13 years.
- Maryland posted a .500 record in league road games in 200-01 and went winless in 2001-02, going 0-8.
- The win over the Tar Heels on Feb. 9 also guaranteed Maryland its first winning road record in conference in 14 years.

This season, Maryland posted the best road winning percentage in school history, winning 90 percent of its games.

LANGHORNE TIES SCHOOL RECORD

- In the first game of the Terrapin Classic against Central Connecticut State, sophomore Crystal Langhorne was perfect from the floor, going 9-for-9 en route to 22 points and tying a single-game school record (minimum eight attempts).
- Four other players in school history have shot 1.000 percent from the floor in a game (minimum eight attempts). Chequita Wood set the benchmark, going 10-for-10 against Georgia Tech in 1986. Langhorne became the first player since 1981 to hit on all her attempts with the minimum eight attempts.
- Langhorne was also perfect from the field earlier in the season, going 6-for-6 against Appalachian State, and at Duke on Feb. 13, going 7-for-7.

TERPS DRAW BIG ATTENDANCE

- For the third-consecutive year, the Terps drew one of the top three record crowds in ACC history. On Sunday, Jan. 8, 16,097 fans came to Comcast Center to support the Terps against Duke. It is the second-largest crowd in conference history.
- Last year, Maryland set the all-time attendance mark in their game against Duke on Feb. 13, 2005, drawing 17,243 fans, breaking the all-time mark of 14,500 set on Feb. 12, 1992, when the Terps hosted Virginia in Cole Field House.
- Two years ago, 13,446 fans came to Comcast Center to watch the Terps take on Duke, once again, on Feb. 22, 2004. At that time, it was the second-largest crowd in ACC history and is now ranked fourth all-time.
- Top five ACC attendance marks are listed on the right-hand column of page 5.

DOMINANT DECEMBER

For the second-straight season, Maryland posted an undefeated record in the month of December, going 8-0.



- The Terps have had seven years where they went undefeated during the month of December. Last year, when Maryland went 6-0, it was the first time since 1996-97 the team had not lost any games during the last month of the calendar year.
- Maryland is 140-50 all-time during the month of December.

MOVING UP

- Seven different Terrapins have made their way into the career record books.
 Among the seven are junior Shay Doron and sophomore Crystal Langhorne, who both scored their 1,000th career point this season. Doron is among Maryland's top 10 scorers all-time, while Langhorne is just out of the top 20.
- Langhorne has positioned herself to become one of the best rebounders in school history. She is only the 12th player in school history to grab over 600 rebounds
- Doron and Langhorne are featured among the Terps' top 15 in a few other career categories, as are Laura Harper, Ashleigh Newman, Kalika France, Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver.
- A full list of updated Terrapin records are listed on page 17.

WE LOVE THE 90'S

- The Terps topped the 90-point plateau in back-to-back games twice this season. Maryland opened the 2005-06 campaign with a 107-66 victory at Siena then followed up with a 93-68 win over Xavier, marking the first time it had scored 90 or more points in back-to-back games since Nov. 28 and 29, 2003, when it defeated Sacred Heard (90-46) and UMES (97-65) in the Terrapin Classic.
- Maryland captured the Terrapin Classic crown, overwhelming its opponents with a 94-57 victory over Central Connecticut State in the opening round and a 92-58 win over Furman in the championship game.
- Maryland has scored at least 90 points in seven games this season, the most since 1992-93 when the Terps had seven 90-point games, as well. The school record for most 90-point games in a season is 18 set during the 1977-78 campaign.

REACHING THE CENTURY MARK

- With all its offensive weapons, the Terps have reached the 100-point plateau
 three times this season, the first time Maryland has had three 100-point
 games in a season since 1991-92. With back-to-back 100-point games vs.
 Appalachian State and Mount St. Mary's, it is the first time since 1991-92 that
 Maryland has posted at least 100 points in consecutive games. Never in the
 history of the program has it had three-straight 100-point performances.
- The Terps opened the season with a 107-66 victory at Siena, the first 100-point game since the 2002-03 campaign and the most since November of 1991. In its first game back home since the opening weekend, Maryland scored the third-most points in a game in school history, dropping 118 against Appalachian State (118-59), three points from tying the school record, then followed up with a 102-53 win over Mount St. Mary's.
- The Terps have reached the 100-point plateau 42 times in the history of the program. They scored a school-record 121 points in a win over Drexel in 1992. In 1977-78, Maryland had six 100-point games, a school record which still stands today.
- The 118 points vs. the Appalachian State Mountaineers is also a Comcast Center record, breaking the previous mark set on Nov. 29, 2002 vs. Rider when the Terps won, 104-66, on the first day of the Terrapin Classic.

DORON MVP OF TERRAPIN CLASSIC

- Averaging 26.0 ppg and 5.5 apg over two games in the Terrapin Classic, junior Shay Doron was named Terrapin Classic Most Valuable Player while leading the team to the tournament title. Doron shot 70.8 percent from the floor (17-24) and was an incredible 72.7 percent from three-point range. She was also perfect from the charity stripe in 10 trips. It is the first time she has earned the honor.
- Sophomore Crystal Langhorne and freshman Marissa Coleman were also named to the all-tournament squad. It was their second all-tournament recognition of the season, as they earned spots on the Paradise Jam All-

Tournament team.

HAPPY ANNIVERSARY

Sophomore Laura Harper celebrated the one-year anniversary of her surgery
to repair a torn Achilles' tendon she suffered last winter on Dec. 29. On that
night, Harper came off the bench to score 10 points on 5-for-8 shooting vs.
Central Connecticut State in the Terrapin Classic. She also had three rebounds
and three blocks that evening.

LANGHORNE EARNS PRESTIGIOUS HONOR

- Maryland sophomore Crystal Langhorne was recently selected USA Basketball's 2005 Female Athlete of the Year for her role in leading the USA U19 World Championship team to a dominating 8-0 record and the gold medal at the 2005 FIBA U19 World Championship in Tunis, Tunisia.
- Langhorne joins impressive company of previous honorees, including Cheryl Miller, Teresa Edwards, Lisa Leslie, Dawn Staley, Chamique Holdsclaw and Seimone Augustus. Langhorne is eligible for the 2005 U.S. Olympic Committee (USOC) Female Athlete of the Year award which will be announced at a later date.
- Langhorne led the USA U19 squad in scoring. She averaged 16.8 ppg and added 6.4 rpg at the U19 Worlds en route to Most Valuable Player honors. She finished fifth in scoring among all competitiors in the 12-nation tournament, second in field goal percentage (.775), fourth in free throw percentage (.793) and tied for 15th in rebounds. She scored in double figures in all eight games and had one double-double. Langhorne was also named a team tricaptain.

USA U19 SQUAD SELECTED TEAM OF THE YEAR

- The 2005 USA Women's U19 World Championship team, which dominated the 2005 FIBA U19 World Championship this summer, was selected as the 2005 USA Basketball Team of the Year by the USA Basketball Executive Committee. Terrapins Crsytal Langhorne and Marissa Coleman were both members of that team and helped the U.S. to a gold medal and a perfect 8-0 record.
- The U19 squad also captured a gold medal at the International Sports Invitational earlier in the summer, prior to its run at the U19 Worlds in Tunis, Tunisia. The USA dominated its opponents, winning by an average margin of 46.3 points per game.
- The USA U19 team is eligible for the 2005 U.S. Olympic Committee Team of the Year award.

LANGHORNE, COLEMAN SWEEP ACC WEEKLY HONORS TWICE


 Terrapins Crystal Langhorne and Marissa Coleman were selected as the ACC's Player and Rookie of the Week in the same week on Nov. 28 and Jan. 30.

NOVEMBER 28

- The reigning ACC Rookie of the Year, Langhorne averaged a double-double in three games at the Paradise Jam last week, scoring 14.0 points per game to go along with 10.7 rebounds per game. She shot 66.7 percent from the floor, converting on 14-of-21 field goal attempts, while also going 14-of-19 from the free throw line (.737). She recorded double-doubles vs. Michigan State and Tennessee, and nearly had a third against Gonzaga, missing the mark by a rebound. It was the second-straight week a Terrapin had earned the weekly honor.
- Coleman continued to impress in her freshman campaign, as she came off
 the bench to average a team-best 16.7 points per game. She as 19-for-32
 from the field (50.4 percent) and 4-for-8 from three-point range and averaged
 5.0 rpg. She had a game-high 21 points vs. Gonzaga and followed up with 13
 against Michigan State, 11 coming in the second half, bolstering the Terps'
 comeback. She also had 16 points and pulled down four boards, while going
 8-for-9 from the free throw line vs. the Lady Vols.

JANUARY 30

 A sophomore, Langhorne averaged 26.0 points and 13.3 rebounds per game over three games last week, including tallying a career-high 34 points and grabbing 14 rebounds in the overtime win at Wake Forest, recording her league-leading 10th double-double of the season.



 Coleman, who shared the honor with UNC's Christina DeWill, also had a big week, averaging 12.7 points and 10.0 rebounds per game. She pulled down a career-high 11 rebounds in the win at Virginia Tech and posted her fifth doubledouble of the season, netting 18 points to go with 10 boards in the win against Georgia Tech. Her 8-for-8 outing at the free throw line was also a career best. It was a league-best fourth time Coleman had earned the honor.

COLEMAN'S FIVE ROOKIE OF THE WEEK NODS TIES SCHOOL RECORD

- Freshman Marissa Coleman continues to bring attention to herself with her outstanding play on the court. She has been named ACC Rookie of the Week five times already this season, tying sophomore Crystal Langhorne's record and the most of any freshman in the conference.
- Coleman averaged nearly a double-double in three games last week, scoring 12.7 ppg and grabbing 9.3 rpg, setting a couple of personal bests along the way. Against No. 1 Duke, she scored a career-high 20 points going 8-for-11 from the floor. She followed up grabbing a career-high 15 rebounds in the rout of No. 18/20 Boston College. At NC State, Coleman recorded her sixth double-double of the season tallving 10 points and 10 rebounds.
- Coleman was selected Co-Rookie of the Week on Jan. 30, helping the Terps to a 3-0 week. She averaged 12.7 points and 10.0 rebounds per game, pulling down a career-high 11 rebounds in the win at Virginia Tech and posting her fifth double-double of the season, netting 18 points to go with 10 boards in the win against Georgia Tech. Her 8-for-8 outing at the free throw line was also a career best
- Coleman was named Rookie of the Week on Jan. 2 after leading the Terps to
 three victories over the holidays, including winning the Terrapin Classic. Over
 the three games, she averaged 17.0 ppg, 8.7 rpg, 5.0 apg, 2.3 spg and 2.0 bpg.
 She was 21-for-34 from the floor (61.8 percent), including 8-for-12 from behind
 the arc (66.7 percent). She also posted double-doubles at George Mason (20
 pts., 10 reb.) and against Furman (16 pts., 10 reb.) during that stretch.
- Freshman Marissa Coleman was named ACC Rookie of the Week for the second time this season, after averaging 21 points per game in the Terps' victories over Monmouth and Arizona. She netted a career-high 22 points vs. the Hawks narrowly missing a double-double, hauling down nine rebounds and blocked a career-best four shots. In the win over the Wildcats, she netted 20 points, including knocking down four treys. She again flirted with a double-double, racking up a personal-best nine assists. On the week, Coleman shot 76.2 percent from the floor and an incredible 85.7 percent from three-point land. She also averaged 7.5 rpg and 6.0 apg.
- She earned her first Rookie of the Week nod after she came off the bench to average a team-best 16.7 points per game at the Paradise Jam. She had a game-high 21 points vs. Gonzaga and followed up with 13 against Michigan State, 11 coming in the second half, bolstering the Terps' comeback. She also had 16 points and pulled down four boards, while going 8-for-9 from the free throw line vs. the Lady Vols.

TOLIVER SELECTED ROOKIE OF THE WEEK TWICE

- Kristi Toliver was voted the ACC's Rookie of the Week by the media this week for the second time. A Maryland freshman has earned the honor seven times this season.
- Earning Co-ACC Rookie of the Week nods on Feb. 6, Toliver helped the Terps clinch a winning ACC record for the firs time since 1997. She averaged 12.5 points and 6.5 assists per game in a pair of Terrapin wins. Making her first start since Dec. 4, Toliver was 4-for-8 from the floor and scored nine points in the Terps' 88-77 win over Miami. Against Virginia on Sunday, Toliver narrowly missed a double-double, scoring 16 points to go along with nine assists in Maryland's 85-71 victory. A guard, Toliver was 6-for-11 from the field (54.5 percent) and 2-for-4 from 3-point range as Maryland picked up its first season sweep of Virginia since the 1989 campaign.
- Toliver earned the honor for the first time on Jan. 20, after averaging 14.0 points, 5.0 rebounds and 5.5 assists per game. She is the second Terp this season to garner the award, as Maryland's freshmen have earned the award four times this year to lead the conference.
- Toliver scored a team-high 16 points and grabbed a career-high six rebounds to help the Terps to a 75-57 victory over Florida State. She was flawless from three-point range, going 4-for-4. Playing in a Terrapin uniform for the first time in her home state, she posted her second double-double, netting 12 points to go with 10 assists in the 84-74 overtime victory at Virginia.

DORON TABBED ACC PLAYER OF THE WEEK

- National Player of the Year candidate Shay Doron was selected this year's first ACC Player of the Week honoree. Doron tallied 23 points in each of Maryland's two victories to open the season. She also became the fastest player in school history to score 1000 career-points and the 21st overall. Doron averaged 23.0 points, 5.5 assists and 5.5 rebounds over the two games, and shot 58.7 percent from the field (17-29) and was 5-for-9 from behind the arc (55.6 percent).
- Doron earns the award for the second time in her career, also garnering the honor last season.

HOME SWEET HOME

- Maryland broke the school for home victories in a season, picking up its 14th victory on its court against Clemson. Since moving to Comcast Center, the Terps have posted a 46-15 (75.4) record at home, going 40-7 since 2003-04 for an 85.1 winning percentage.
- Maryland is 30-5 all-time in home openers, wining the last seven in a row, including the win over Xavier on Nov. 20.

HISTORICALLY SPEAKING

- The Associated Press published its 500th women's basketball poll when it released the 2005-06 preseason ranking. This season also marks the 30th year of the poll. Maryland and Baylor are the only two teams in this year's preseason poll to have appeared in the very first AP poll published in 1976.
- The Terps have appeared in the AP poll 247 times in 20 years, overall. Maryland was ranked for nine-consecutive years fromm 1976-77 until 1984-85. It also recieved a No. 1 rating for four weeks in a row in 1992.

HARPER TAKES TO THE COURT


- For the first time in almost 11 months, sophomore Laura Harper suited up for the Terrapins in an official game at Siena on Nov. 18. Harper ruptured her Achilles' tendon in late December of 2004 and sat out the majority of the season after starting the first nine games. With the help of surgery and almost a full year of rehabilitation, Harper is 100 percent and has been contributing to her team's efforts on the court.
- Harper had 11 points, six rebounds and two blocks in her first night back at Siena.
 She equaled the number of games she played last year at George Mason. So
 far this season, through 30 games, she is averaging 11.0 points, 6.9 rebounds,
 and is second in the ACC with 2.2 blocks and ranks eighth in rebounding, in
 the conference. Harper sat out two games after the Paradise Jam because of
 soreness, but was back on the floor at Monmouth.

TERPS PICKED PRESEASON THIRD IN THE ACC

- For the second-consecutive year, Maryland was voted to finish third in the ACC, which was voted on by the media and the league coaches. The Terps garnered 394 points points to place third in the poll. Maryland ended the 2004-05 campaign sixth in the ACC standnings, but advanced to the conference tournament semifinals for the second-straight year.
- Junior Shay Doron and sophomore Crystal Langhorne were named to the preseason All-ACC team. Last season, Doron was named first team all-conference, while Langhorne was named to the second team and was also voted the ACC's Rookie of the Year, earning 64 of 74 votes.

DORON, LANGHORNE PRESEASON PLAYER OF THE YEAR CANDIDATES

- After recording stellar seasons, junior Shay Doron and sophomore Crystal Langhorne were each named preseason candidates for the Women's John R. Wooden Award and the State Farm/WBCA Wade Trophy. Both awards are presented to the nation's top women's basketball player at the conclusion of the season.
- Both Doron and Langhorne are coming off one of the best individual seasons in school history. Doron led the team in scoring for the second-straight year, averaging 17.6 points per game, tying for the seventh-best scoring average in school history. Her 562 points overall is the fifth most by a Terrapin. At season's end, she was named Kodak/WBCA Honorable Mention All-American.
- Langhorne was the only player in the ACC to average a double-double. Her 17.2 ppg is tied for the 10th-best single-season average at Maryland. She also



scored 549 points, a freshman class record and sixth-most by a Terrapin. Her 10.6 rebounds per game not only led the conference, but was the third-best average in school history and ranked 11th in the nation. She was also 13th in the nation with a .592 shooting percentage. Langhorne was selected the ACC's Rookie of the Year by a landslide and was also second team all-conference.

LEGENDARY COACH HONORED

- Before Sunday's win against Virginia, legendary Maryland coach Chris Weller was honored for being the winningest coach in program history. Weller was at the Maryland helm for 27 years before retiring in 2002, one of a handful of college coaches, men's or women's, to coach 25 seasons at the same institution. The third winningest coach in ACC history, she amassed a 499-286 record during her tenure and led the Terps to a No. 1 national ranking during the 1992 season. Under her direction, Maryland won a conference-record eight ACC Tournament titles, including winning the first ever tournament crown in 1978.
- During her tenure, Maryland reached three Final Fours, advanced to eight Elite Eights and nine Sweet Sixteens. In 1992, she was named Naismith National Coach of the year and BWAA Coach of the Year. Weller coached four All-Americans, one ACC Player of the Year, three ACC Rookies of the Year and 19 All-ACC honorees, including nine first team honorees.
- Weller is a 1966 graduate of Maryland, earning four varsity letters in basketball, swimming and lacrosse. She completed her Master's in College Park in 1973 and served as an assistant coach under Dottie McKnight for two seasons before being named head coach in 1975.

TERPS RAISE FUNDS FOR HOOPS FOR HOPE

- The Maryland women's basketball team raised nearly \$4,000 for Hoops for Hope, which takes place on Feb. 19 when the Terps travel to NC State. Head coach Brenda Frese will present Wolfpack head coach Kay Yow with a check for \$3,806.16 to benefit the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation of the triangle area.
- Every member of the team, including the coaching staff, participated in soliciting Maryland fans entering the Feb. 2 men's basketball game vs. North Carolina for donations. Hoops for Hope is a basketball game centered around hope for early detection, hope for increased survival and hope for a cure.
- NC State head coach Kay Yow, the sister of Maryland Athletics Director Deborah
 A. Yow, is a survivor of breast cancer herself.

TERRAPIN FOOTBALL GREAT & NFL STAR MAKES DONATION TO PROGRAM

- Former Maryland football standout and current member of the NFL's Oakland Raiders LaMont Jordan served as Honorary Coach of the Terps in Sunday's win over Virginia. for his contributions to the women's basketball program. Jordan made a generous \$25,000 donation to the program and presented Director of Athletics Deborah A. Yow and Senior Associate Athletic Director Larry Leckonby, who oversees the day-to-day operations of the women's basketball team, with a check at halftime.
- An All-American running back for the Terps from 1997-2000, Jordan has been a supporter of the women's basketball program for many years and can often be seen on the sidelines at games when he is not in season with the Raiders.

WHO'S BACK

- Maryland returns nine starters from last year's 22-10 team, including four starters. Among the returnees are national player of the year candidates Shay Doron and Crystal Langhorne. Doron was an Kodak/WBCA Honorable Mention All-American last season and was also named first team All-ACC. Langhorne is the reigning ACC Rookie of the Year and also earned a spot on the second team all-conference squad.
- Junior Kalika France is among the starters returning. A two-year starter, she has started all but one game since arriving on campus. Sophomore Laura Harper will be making her return from an Achilles' tendon injury which forced her to miss the majority of the 2004-05 campaign. Classmate Jade Perry took over the starting duties after Harper went down with injury. Also back and ready to take the team to new heights are sophomore Ashleigh Newman, junior Aurelie Noirez and seniors Charmaine Carr and Angel Ross. Ross is still working her way back from an off-season injury.

FRESE WELCOMES NO. 4 RECRUITING CLASS

 Head coach Brenda Frese recruited her third-consecutive top 10 recruiting class and the second straight ranked in the top five. This year's incoming class was ranked fourth in the nation. Freshmen Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver are expected to make immediate impacts, with Toliver stepping in to take over the point guard duties. Both have earned a number of honors, including McDonald's, WBCA and Parade All-American nods, and each were selected their home state's Gatorade Player of the Year.

ALSO JOINING THE TERPS

- Also joining the 2005-06 Maryland Terrapin squad is sophomore transfer Christie
 Marrone. A native of Brooklyn, N.Y., Marrone averaged 4.3 points and 1.5 assists
 per game, while shooting .359 from three-point land while at Virginia Tech. She
 helped the Hokies earn an NCAA Tournament bid, drawing their first-round site
 at Comcast Center.
- Marrone will redshirt the 2005-06 season due to NCAA transfer rules. She is allowed to practice with the team, but will not dress for games.

FRESE SIGNS TWO FOR '06-'07

- Maryland head coach Brenda Frese announced the signing of two high school standouts for the 2006-07 season. Demauria Liles and Emery Wallace have signed National Letters of Intent to play for the Terrapins.
- Liles is a 6-foot-1 forward from Riverdale Baptist High School in Upper Marlboro, Md. She helped Riverdale Baptist to a No. 3 national ranking by the USA Today, averaging 17 points, 14 rebounds, three blocks and fourt assists per game as a junior. She was an Honorable Mention Street & Smith's All-American and participated in the 2005 USA Basketball Youth Development Festival.
- Wallace is a 6-foot-2 forward from Roanoake, Va. At Hidden Valley, she has scored 1,256 points over her career, averaging 19.3 ppg to go with 7.0 rpg as a junior. She was named 2005 River Ridge District Player of the Year and was also a Region III first team, second team all-state and a first team All-Timesland selection twice.

UP NEXT

Series vs. Sacred Heart: Maryland leads, 1-0

Last Meeting: W, 90-49, 11/28/03

In the second game of the first day of the Terrapin Classic, freshman Shay Doron led four double-figure scorers with 22 points as the Maryland defense limited Sacred Heart to just 14 percent shooting in the second half. The Terps took control in the second half, opening the period on a 23-3 run to take a commanding 67-38 lead and put the game away. Senior Delvona Oliver added 18 points off the bench.

Series vs. St. John's: First Meeting

Last Meeting: N/A

Maryland has never played St. John's but has historically had success against teams currently in the Big East, going 44-15 all-time against 10 squads. Maryland's 18 victories against Rutgers are the most against a team from that conference. The Terps have also dropped 10 games to the Scarlet Knights. Their only losing record against a Big East foe is against Villanova. Maryland dropped the only meeting between the teams in 1981. Battling local foe Georgetown eight times overall, Maryland has won every meeting against the Hoyas, the second-most victories against a Big East opponent.

Series vs. California: Maryland leads, 1-0 Last Meeting: W, 54-51, 12/29/84

The Red Storm are led in scoring by Kia Wright and Angela Clark, who average 14.1 and 14.0 points per game, respectively, which rank among the top 15 in the Big East. 
