TERPS HEADED TO BATON ROUGE FOR NCAA FIRST ROUND ACTION

- Maryland earned its 13th NCAA Tournament bid when the 64-team bracket was announced on Selection Sunday and are headed to Baton Rouge, La., to face the Big East's Miami (Fla.) on Sunday, March 21 at 6 p.m. CT. The Terps are making their first NCAA Tournament appearance since 2001, but played the Hurricanes last season the Miami's Holiday Classic.
- The fifth-seed in the West Region, the Hurricanes have the advantage of being tournament tested, having played in the first round last year. While seniors Crystal Washington and Vicki Brick were members of the 2001 Terp squad that played in the NCAA Tournament, neither saw action. Both will also be leading a young squad, however, the No. 12-seeded Terps are playing with a lot of confidence after almost pulling off an upset against Duke in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament.
- Also playing in the first round in Baton Rouge, La., is fourth-seeded LSU who faces No. 13-seed Austin Peay. That game will be played 30 minutes following the conclusion of the Terps-Canes matchup. The winners of both first-round matchups move on to the second round on Tuesday, March 23.

TERPS MAKE IMPRESSIVE TURNAROUND

- Second year head coach and 2002 Associated Press Coach of the Year Brenda Frese has stamped her calling card on a Maryland women's basketball program on the rise. Known for her amazing turnarounds, Frese has guided the Terps to a 17-12 record so far this season, guaranteeing a winning record after posting just 10 wins all of last year. The Terps evened their conference record at 8-8 when they defeated Clemson on Feb. 29, doubling their ACC win total from each of the last two seasons and equaling or surpassing their conference win total from nine of the last 10 years. After being picked to finish eighth in a preseason poll and instead tying for third, Frese also guided Maryland to its first ACC Tournament semifinal appearance since 1998.
- Maryland opened ACC play 4-1, equaling its conference win total from last year. With its home win over Clemson on Jan. 29, the Terps surpassed their ACC win total from each of their last two seasons and equaled

or surpassed their ACC wins from five of the last nine years.

- The Terps' 17-point win over the Demon Deacons in Winston-Salem is their biggest over an ACC team since a 75-54 win over NC State on Feb. 25, 2001. The Terps matched that when they swept Wake Forest, 73-56, in Comcast. Maryland's 91-point scoring day vs. Georgia Tech is the most the Terps have scored in a conference game since a 92-79 win over the Yellow Jackets on Feb. 21, 1999. In its seven conference wins, Maryland is averaging a 12.3-point margin of victory.
- Maryland's sweep of Wake Forest is its first regular-season sweep of an ACC squad since the 2000-01 season. The Terps topped the Demon Deacons by 17 points in both games. The Terps picked up their second sweep of the season when they ended the regular season with a victory at Clemson, 80-69. The last time UM won two regular-season series was also during the 2000-01 campaign.
- This season, the Terps are scoring more (68.0 vs. 67.4), shooting better from three-point land (.371 vs. .316) and from the charity stripe (.707 vs. .616). Maryland leads the ACC in three-point shooting and is nationally ranked in that category.

LAST TIME OUT: TERPS EDGED OUT BY DUKE IN ACC SEMIS

- Freshman Shay Doron netted a team-leading 19 points, but Maryland was edged by top-seeded Duke, 70-63, in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament in front of a nationally televised audience. Maryland led by as many as eight points in the second half and was ahead, 48-41, with 11:10 remaining in the game, but could not pull off the upset as the Blue Devils came from behind for the win.
- Senior Delvona Oliver was also in double figures, tallying 15 points to go with eight boards. The Terps outrebounded the Blue Devils, 38-37. It was only the third time this season Maryland had lost when outrebounding its opponent.
- The Terps were making their first ACC Tournament semifinal appearance since 1998. A fourth

seed, Maryland advanced to the semifinals with a 62-47 victory over fifth-seeded Florida State.

ABOUT THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

- The 64-team bracket was announced on Selection Sunday on ESPN. Of the 64 teams, 31 were granted automatic bids by winning their respective conference championship. Thirty-three squads, including Maryland, earned at-large bids to fill out the bracket. Duke, Penn State, Tennessee and Texas garnered the top seeds in each of the four regionals (East, Mideast, Midwest and West). The winners of each regional move on to the Final Four in New Orleans Area on April 4. The winners play for the national championship on April 6.
- First round NCAA Tournament action begins March 20 or March 21 at 16 sites. Winners of the first round go on to the second round which is played on March 22 or 23. The Sweet 16 and Elite Eight are on March 27 and 29 or 28 & 30. The East Regional in Hartford, Conn., and West Regional in Seattle, Wash., will be played on March 27 & 29, while the Mideast Regional in Norfolk, Va., and Midwest Regional in Norman, Okla., will both be played on March 28 & 30.

ACC IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

- Four ACC squads earned NCAA Tournament bids. The top seed in the Mideast Regional, ACC Champion Duke opens its championship action at home in Durham, N.C., vs. 16th-seeded Northwestern State.
- Maryland, North Carolina and NC State earned at-large berths. The fourth seed in the East Regional, UNC travels to South Bend, Ind., for its first round matchup against #13 Middle Tennessee State. If the Heels prevail, they face the winner of the #5 Notre Dame/#12 SW Missouri State game in the second round. The 10th-seeded Wolfpack is also competing in the East Region, taking on #7-seed Auburn in Bridgeport, Conn. They could play No. 2 Connecticut or No. 15 Pennsylvania if they move onto the second round.
- Maryland is the only ACC team on the right side of the bracket as it competes in the West Regional.
- The ACC has garnered just one NCAA Champion in the history of the league, with North Carolina winning the 1994 title. At least four ACC teams have participated in the NCAA Tournament in each of the last 10 years, including this season. A conference-best six squads were invited in 1997 and 2001.

TERPS IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

- Maryland is making its 13th trip to the NCAA Tournament, with its last appearance coming in 2001, and owns a 12-12 record all-time. The Terps have a storied history in the NCAA Tournament, making its first appearance in 1982. That year, UM reached the Final Four. Since then, the Terps have reached the Final Four one other time, the Elite Eight four times and the Sweet Sixteen six times, as well.
- The Terps have earned a top-four seeding seven times, garnering a No. 1 seeding in 1989. Maryland was tabbed a No. 2 seed four times and a No. 3 seed twice. Maryland's No. 12 seeding this season is the first for the program. Prior to this season, the Terps had never been seeded lower than No. 9.
- While the Terps have made 12 trips to the NCAA Tournament, they have not one a game since 1992, losing their opening round game three times.
- Maryland is one of 15 schools to have both its men's and women's basketball teams participating in the NCAA Championship. The Terrapin men are a No. 4 seed in the Phoenix Region.

TERPS VS. THE FIELD OF 64

- The Terps have faced six teams in this year's NCAA Championship, including two No. 1 seeds and three ACC squads. Of Maryland's 12 losses on the season, nine have come against those NCAA squads, going 1-9. The Terps fell to No. 1 Penn State once and No. 1 Duke three times. The Terps' only win over an NCAA Tournament team came against NC State, but the Wolfpack returned the favor in the second matchup between the teams to split the season series.

IN THE ACC STATS

- As of March 18, other than Duke and North Carolina, only Maryland leads the ACC in any statistical category. Maryland is the conference's three-point field goal percentage (.371) leader as several Terps rank among the top 10 in a number of key statistics. A full list is on page five.
- Freshman Shay Doron is ninth in scoring (13.0) and is eighth with a .771 free throw percentage. Classmate Kalika France is among the top 10 in rebounding (8th, 6.0), while also ranking 12th in scoring at 11.7 ppg. Having the best season of her career, senior Crystal Washington is fourth in blocked shots, swatting away 1.31 shots per game and sophomore Chrissy Fisher is knocking down threes at a rate of .356 which is sixth in the league. Her 1.28 three-pointers made per game is 10th. Junior Anesia Smith is second in the ACC with a 1.91 assist-to-turnover ratio.

IN THE NATIONAL STATS

- As of March 15, Maryland's .371 three-point shooting rate ranks 18th in the nation. A list of where the Terps rank in several categories in the nation (out of 324 teams) is on page five.

DORON, OLIVER EARN ALL-TOURNEY NODS

- Maryland's freshman Shay Doron and senior Delvona Oliver were named to the ACC All-Tournament team after their performances in two games at the conference championship. Doron was voted to the first team and Oliver earned a spot on the second team. The all-tourney honors are the first for Maryland since Deedee Warley garnered second-team recognition in 2001. Doron is also the first Terp to be selected to the first team since Jessie Hicks in 1993.
- Doron averaged 17.5 points and 5.0 rebounds per game at the ACC Tournament, leading Maryland in scoring in both games. She dropped 16 points in the decisive win over Florida State, then scored 14 of her 19 points in the first half in the heart-breaking loss to eventual ACC Champion Duke. The team's best free throw shooter, she was also 11-of-14 from the charity stripe.
- Oliver scored in double figures in both games, notching 12 and 15 points against the Seminoles and the Blue Devils, respectively. She also contributed eight boards in each game en route to all-tournament team honors.

THREE TERPS GARNER ACC HONORS

- Freshman Shay Doron became the first Terrapin in school history to be named to the All-ACC squad as a freshman when she was named to the third team. Doron, who also garnered a first-team vote, is the team's leading scorer and in her first season tied the NCAA mark and broke the ACC record for free throws made in a game. She also tied Maryland's freshman class record when she netted 32 points at Wake Forest, which is also the seventh-most by a Terp in school history.
- Senior Delvona Oliver and freshman Kalika France also garnered Honorable Mention All-ACC honors. France leads the team in rebounding and ranks in the top 15 in the ACC in both scoring and rebounds. She was also named ACC Rookie of the Week three times. Oliver, who received a first-team vote, ranks in the top 20 in the conference in scoring, rebounding and field goal percentage. It is the first ACC honor of her career.
- Doron and France were also named to the All-Freshman squad. They were both among the top four freshmen scorers, while also ranking in the top five among rookies in assists and steals, and in the top six in rebounding.

TOURNAMENT TESTED

- While Miami comes into the NCAA Tournament first-round matchup vs. the Terps with 10 players with tournament experience after the Canes earned an at-large bid last year, Maryland does not have a player on the roster with NCAA Championship experience. While seniors Vicki Brick and Crystal Washington were members of the 2001 Terrapin squad which reached the tourney, neither saw playing time in the contest vs. Colorado State. Brick was out for the season because of an ACL tear.

NOT LIKE THEY PREDICTED

- Maryland, who went 10-18 last season and 4-12 in conference for an eighth place finish, was picked to place eighth this season by the media in the ACC Preseason Poll. However, the Terps proved them wrong. Maryland, with an 8-8 conference mark, ended the regular season tied for third. Below is the complete preseason poll.

BRING OUT THE BROOMS

- The Terps recorded their first regular-season sweep of an ACC squad since the 2000-01 season when they claimed two 17-point victories over Wake Forest. Maryland completed its second series sweep of the season, when it topped Clemson, 80-69, in the regular-season finale on Feb. 29. UM defeated the Tigers earlier in the season, 68-55. That same 2000-01 season was also the last time the Terps had swept two ACC teams.

GREAT EIGHT!

- With its win over Clemson on Feb. 29, 80-69, Maryland evened its ACC record to 8-8, doubling its conference win total from each of the last two seasons. The eight wins also equals or surpasses the Terps' conference win totals from nine of the last 10 years. The Terps won just four conference games in each of the last two seasons, going 4-12 both years.

SPENCE WILL NOT FINISH 2003-04 CAMPAIGN

- Junior transfer Alli Spence will not be playing out the rest of the 2003-04 season due to personal reasons. Spence led the team and the ACC in three-point field goal percentage (.500), while leading the squad with 75 assists. Playing in 21 games this season, she ranks 10th in the conference with 3.57 assists per game and is eighth with a 1.21 assist-to-turnover ratio. She was the first player this season to hand out double-digit helpers, collecting a career-high 10 assists vs. Niagara.

DORON REGISTERS 30-POINT OUTING

- Shay Doron scored 23 second-half points en route to a career-high 32, leading Maryland to a 75-58 win at Wake Forest on Jan. 9, 2004. Her 32 points tied the freshman class record and is the seventh-highest point total in school history. Deanna Tate set the freshman class mark in 1986 vs. North Carolina.

- Prior to Doron's 32-point performance, the last Terp

to score 30+ points was Marche Strickland, who netted 32 on Jan. 23, 2000.

FAB FRESHMEN

- Two freshmen who were expected to make an immediate impact, Shay Doron and Kalika France are No. 1 and No. 2 on the team in scoring, averaging 13.0 and 11.7 ppg, respectively. In the history of the program, only four times has a freshman led the team in scoring and never have two freshmen been ranked No. 1 and No. 2 in scoring on the team. Below is a list of players who have led Maryland in scoring as a freshman.

- Shay Doron and Kalika France are among the top four in freshmen scoring in the ACC, behind UNC's Ivory Latta (14.3) and Camille Little (14.1).

DORON SHOOTS INTO RECORD BOOK

- Freshman Shay Doron's 118 free throws is the third-most single-season total in school history. She is one free throw from tying Jessie Hicks' (1992-93) total of 119, which is second in the Maryland record books. Kris Kirchner (1979-80) holds the record with 135.

- Doron has also attempted 153 free throws which is the sixth-most all-time. Hicks' 1993 total of 193 is the school record.

FRANCE, DORON COMBINE FOR FIVE ROOKIE OF THE WEEK HONORS

- Two highly touted recruits, freshman Shay Doron and Kalika France, have already made themselves known to the ACC in just their first season and both have reaped the benefits. France and Doron have combined to earn five ACC Rookie of the Week honors.

- On March 1, France garnered her third Rookie of the Week accolade, and Maryland's fifth, after leading the Terps to their eighth ACC win of the season. She tallied 21 points, nine rebounds and six assists in 37 minutes. She also went 11-for-13 from the free throw line, including netting seven in the final two minutes of the game to ice the win. The win clinched the fourth seed in the ACC Tournament for Maryland.

- On Jan. 19, France earned Rookie of the Week honors for the second time this season after leading all players with a career-high 26 points and seven rebounds in the Terps' loss to Florida State. She scored 22 points in the second half in Maryland's attempt to rally back for the win. She then followed up with a 16-point, six-rebound outing to help the Terps to their fourth ACC win of the season vs. Georgia Tech, tying its conference win total of a year ago.

- On Jan. 12, Shay Doron's record-tying 32-point outing at Wake Forest led to ACC Co-Rookie of the Week honors for the second time. Her 32 points ties for the most by an ACC player this

season. It is also the seventh-highest total scored by a Terp in school history and ties the freshman school record. Doron was also 11-for-12 from the charity stripe vs. the Deacons and led the team with five assists.

- On Dec. 29, Kalika France garnered the weekly award for the first time when she scored a then-career high 18 points in the Terps' loss to No. 3/3 Texas Tech at the Surf-N-Slam Tournament. She was 8-for-15 from the field and also connected on her only two attempts from beyond the three-point line. She was instrumental in Maryland's defensive effort which limited the Lady Raiders to a season-low 32.8 percent shooting.
- On Dec. 1, Shay Doron became the first Terrapin this season to earn an ACC weekly conference nod. After shooting a scorching 62.5 percent from the field in the Terrapin Classic, Doron was named ACC Rookie of the Week. Doron scored in double figures in back-to-back games of the Terrapin Classic. She led all scorers with 22 points in the 90-49 win over Sacred Heart, going 9-for-12 from the field. She followed up with a 15-point outing on 6-for-12 shooting, dishing out a career-high six assists, helping the Terps to a 97-65 win over UMES and to the Terrapin Classic title. Doron, who led all players in the tournament in points, field goals made and three-point field goals made, was 4-for-4 from three-point land, sinking a pair in each game.

MORE FAB FACTS

- Expected to make an immediate impact this season, freshmen Shay Doron and Kalika France have accounted for 35.6 percent of the team's points. Doron has reached double-digit scoring 18 times, reaching the 20-point plateau four times, including a 32-point effort at Wake Forest. France has scored in double-figures 17 times, including three 20-point efforts, both coming against ACC teams. Both lead the team in scoring (Doron - 13.0 ppg; France - 11.7 ppg).

OLIVER'S TWIST

- Senior Delvona Oliver stepped up her play for the conference slate, averaging 12.4 points per game in ACC games, which ranks 12th in the conference, compared to her season average of 10.6 ppg. She was even more comfortable playing on the Comcast Center hardwood, averaging a team-leading 15.0 ppg in conference games played in College Park, netting at least 14 points in four of those games, including a 20-point outing against Wake Forest. She is also hauling down 6.8 rebounds per game in seven ACC games played at home, tearing down at least five in six of those matchups, including 10 vs. Florida State.

CRYSTAL SHINES ON COURT IN FINAL SEASON

- In her first three seasons at Maryland, senior Crystal Washington spent much of her time as a role player, averaging a then-career high of 10.5 minutes per game in her sophomore season where she also averaged a then-career high 6.1 points per game and 16 blocks. In her final season and after not starting a game in her career entering the year, Washington has stepped in to become a starter in every game, averaging career-highs of 8.0 ppg and 5.2 rebounds per game. She has also recorded 38 blocks on the season, more than double her previous high, blocking a career-best four shots at NC State.
- This season, Washington has recorded five double-doubles, most recently notching 11 points and 10 boards in the vs. Florida State in the ACC Tournament. Her first-career double-double came this season vs. Niagara.
- Washington's two blocks against No. 3/3 Texas Tech tied a then-career-high with 16 blocks on the season which she set during the 2000-01 season. She leads the team with 38, 31 more than she had last season. Entering the ACC Tournament, she was tied for fifth in the ACC at 1.33 and ranked 15th in the league with a .471 field goal percentage.

RECORD CROWD ON HAND FOR TERPS' FINAL HOME GAME

- A Comcast Center record 13,446 fans came out for the Terps' regular-season home finale when they hosted No. 4/4 Duke on Feb. 22. The women's basketball attendance record at Comcast is also the second-largest ACC women's basketball crowd. Maryland set the record with 14,500 on Feb. 12, 1992.

LEAPIN' LIZARDS!

- Maryland is 4-0 all-time in games played on Feb. 29 after topping Clemson, 80-69, in its regular-season finale in Littlejohn Arena. The program's first season of women's basketball was a Leap Year. The Terps defeated Towson State, 53-49, in 1972, extending an 8-0 win streak. In 1980, the Terps topped Seton Hall in the

EIAW Regional Tournament, 80-59, on Feb. 29. Twelve years later, Maryland traveled to Winston-Salem, N.C., for Leap Day. UM handled the Demon Deacons, 66-47.

MARYLAND HONORS SENIORS

- Seniors Vicki Brick, Delvona Oliver and Crystal Washington played in their final regular-season home game on Feb. 22 vs. No. 4/4 Duke. Maryland honored the three seniors in a pre-game ceremony. Oliver has been tearing it up in conference play, averaging 12.5 points and 6.1 rebounds per game. On a recent ACC game broadcast, she was one of five conference players named Most Improved. Washington is averaging career numbers in every statistical category, starting in every game this season after not starting one coming into the season. She leads the team with 36 blocks. Brick will leave College Park ranked in the top 10 in career steals and assists in the Maryland record books. In the Duke-Clemson broadcast, she was named to the ACC's All-Inspirational team for overcoming a knee injury she suffered during her sophomore year.

TERPS IN ACC OPENERS

- Maryland is 19-8 all-time in ACC openers. The Terps have won their last two conference openers at home, defeating Clemson, 70-59, on December 5, 2001 and NC State, 68-56, on Jan. 2, 2004.
- As the Terps continue through conference play, they continue to pile on accomplishments. Its 2-0 start this season was the first time Maryland opened the ACC slate with two wins in 10 years (1993-94). Their 3-0 start was their best since the 1991-92 season when the Terps went 10-0 before suffering their first conference loss. When Maryland was 4-2 in league action, that was its best showing through six games since the 1992-93 season. With its eighth ACC triumph, the Terps equal or surpass its conference victory total from nine of the last 10 years.

TERRAPIN TURF

- The Terps posted a 12-3 at Comcast Center this season, the most wins on their home court since the 1992-93 season. Their only three losses at home have come to teams ranked in the national top 10.
- Maryland's all-time record at home is 374-109 (.774) for one of the best all-time home records in the country. Entering the 2003-04 season, College Park was ranked 27th all-time for the best city record. Cole Field House, the home of the Terps from 1974-2002, ranks as the 46th-best home venue all-time at 288-95 (75.2 percent). In the history of the program, the Terps have called Ritchie Coliseum, Cole Field House and Comcast Center home.
- Enjoying success this season in College Park, the Terps are outscoring their ACC opponents 70.4-65.0 in Comcast Center. They have also limited those opponents to 38.0 percent shooting en route to a 6-2 home record in ACC play.

RETURN TO WINNING WAYS

- Closing out the month of January with a win over Clemson, the Terps have posted a winning record the first three months of the season, a feat they have not accomplished since the 2000-01 season when the team went 5-0, 4-3 and 5-3 in the first three months. With the loss to No. 4/4 Duke in February, the Terps post a losing record in any month for the first time this year.
- Including this year, only four times in the last 10 seasons has Maryland posted winning records in the first three months of the season.
- Maryland was perfect in November, winning all four games scheduled. The last time the Terps went undefeated in that month was when they went 5-0 in 2000 for their best November all-time record. Maryland's all-time record in November is 55-19.

BRICK REACHES MILESTONE

- When fifth-year senior Vicki Brick entered the Georgia Tech game, it was the 100th game she had played in a Maryland uniform. Brick has been with the Terrapin program since the 1999-2000 season when the Terps reached the quarterfinals of the WNIT Tournament.
- Christy Winters holds the school record for most games played in a Terrapin uniform with 123 games, a record she set from 1987-90.

HOW LOW CAN YOU GO?

- In the 69-55 win over Virginia, the Terps' stifling defense limited the Cavaliers to just 12 points and 16.7 percent shooting in the first half and claimed a 34-12 edge heading into the locker room en route to the dominating win.

CHARGE IT!

- Maryland has drawn at least one charge in every game but one, the loss to North Carolina. Freshman Shay Doron has been the main culprit of the Terps' streak. She has taken at least one charge in 24 of the 27 games she has played in, including the first 11-straight games to open the season. In the Terps' win over Clemson, she drew three offensive fouls, all coming in the second half of the contest. She drew another three offensive charge calls in the win at Clemson, as well.
- Prior to Doron's arrival in College Park and playing as a member of the Israeli National Team, she drew a single-game record of six charges against the Croatian National Team.

OLIVER LOOKING PERFECT

- In her first 17 trips to the free throw line, senior Delvona Oliver converted on all 17 opportunities before missing her first free throw of the season at Florida State. She is 39-for-57 from the line and has a .684 percentage.
- After leading the league in free-throw shooting for most of the season, Maryland slipped to third in the league in team free throw percentage at .707 (391-553). The Terps have made a huge improvement at the charity stripe. Last year, they were eighth in the ACC with a .616 free throw percentage.

MOVING UP

- Two Terps are ascending up the Maryland record books. Fifth-year senior Vicki Brick broke into the top 10 in career steals and assists. She stands alone in seventh place all-time with 225 steals and moved into the top 10 in career assists with 355.
- In just one season, sophomore Chrissy Fisher has already made her mark in the Maryland record books. One of the best three-point sharp shooters in school history, she is in the top five in three pointers made and three-point field goal attempts. Fisher is fourth all-time with 79 threes netted and has attempted 214 shot behind the arc, ranking fifth. Entering the season with a .382 field goal percentage behind the arc, she ranked fourth-best all-time.

WASHINGTON AMONG ALL-TIME BLOCKS LEADERS

- Saving the best for last, senior Crystal Washington has recorded career bests in every statistical category, including blocks. Having shattered her previous high and leading the team, her 38 blocks is the ninth-most single-season total in school history. Washington has made 69 blocks over her four seasons which is ninth on Maryland's all-time career list.

WINS VS. RANKED OPPONENTS

- Maryland has posted 89 all-time wins over ranked opponents (since 1976-77) and 21 of those victories have been against teams ranked in the top 10. In the history of the program, the Terps have also claimed wins against top five teams 12 times. The Terps' last win over a top-five squad was when they beat Virginia, the No. 1 team in the nation, during the 1991-92 season, 67-65. Maryland was ranked No. 3 in that game.
- In 89 of the Terps' all-time wins over ranked teams, the Terps were unranked in 24 of those games. Maryland's only win over a top-five team while unranked was an 81-80 upset over No. 3 NC State on Jan. 26, 1991.
- The Terps have not defeated a ranked foe since defeating four ranked teams during the 2000-01 season, but nearly defeated No. 8/7 North Carolina last year, falling on a buzzer-beating shot in College Park, 83-82. This season, Maryland's eight of 12 losses have come at the hands of ranked teams. Although they haven't beaten a ranked opponent this season, the Terps have been within 10 points in the final 10 minutes of the game in six of those contests. In the ACC Tournament semifinal against top-seeded Duke, the Terps were leading the Blue Devils, 48-43, with 10 minutes left and led by one in the final six minutes, before falling by just seven points.

TERPS RECEIVE VOTES IN NATIONAL POLL

- Maryland earned votes in the Associated Press Top 25 four times this season. The Terps received 29 votes in the Jan. 12 poll, the most this season, and were five spots out of the top 25. They also garnered votes in the Jan. 19 poll. Maryland also received votes in the Nov. 24 and, most recently, the March 8 AP Top 25 Poll.

FRANCE ALL-TOURNEY IN SAN DEIGO

- Freshman Kalika France was named to the Surf-N-Slam All-Tournament team in San Diego, Calif. While in California, France averaged 16 points per game and 6.5 rebounds, while shooting .467 from the field, including .500 from three-point land. Helping the team to a 1-1 mark in the tournament, she scored a then-career high 18 points against No. 3/3 Texas Tech. She was one rebound shy of a double-double in the overtime win over Georgetown, tallying 14 points and nine rebounds.

TERPS DOUBLE UP

- Four different Terps have posted double-doubles this season and in each case, the players have accomplished that feat for the first time in their careers.
- Senior Crystal Washington's 18 points and 10 rebounds against Niagara were career highs. She has gone on to post a double-double four more times, most recently in the Terps' win over Florida State at the ACC Tournament, grabbing 10 boards to go along with 11 points.
- ACC Rookie of the Week Kalika France notched a career high vs. the Wolfpack, netting 19 points and tied her career high with 10 rebounds to help Maryland to its first ACC win of the season.
- Senior Delvona Oliver netted 18 points and grabbed

- Sophomore Chrissy Fisher needed just 20 minutes for her first-career double-double. She had 11 points and 11 rebounds in the first half against UMES and ended the game 18 points and a career-high 13 rebounds.
- Sophomores Charmaine Carr and Angel Ross and senior Vicki Brick are the only other current Terps to ever post double-doubles. Carr had 14 points and 11 rebounds against Rider on Nov. 29, 2002. Ross accomplished that feat three times last season.

NOIREZ JOINS TERPS FOR FINAL NON-CONFERENCE HOME MATCHUP

- Freshman center Aurelie Noirez has added depth to the post position after she was forced to sit out the first eight games of the season because of international eligibility status. Since taking to the hardwood vs. UMBC, she has played in every game scoring a career-high 10 points in her first-collegiate appearance and grabbing a career-best seven boards in the win over Virginia.

TERPS CAPTURE CLASSIC CROWN

- With wins over Sacred Heart and Maryland-Eastern Shore, Maryland captured its home tournament title, winning the Terrapin Classic. The Terps win the title for the fourth time in the five-year existence of the tournament and improve their all-time record in the Terrapin Classic to 9-1.
- The Pioneers fell victim to the Terps on the first day of the tournament, 90-49. The next day, Maryland eclipsed the 90-point mark for the second time, downing UMES, 97-65. It was the first time since 1992 the Terps posted back-to-back 90-point outings.

FISHER SHINES AT TERP CLASSIC; THREE OTHER TERPS EARN ALL-TOURNEY

- Sophomore Chrissy Fisher was named Most Valuable Player of the Terrapin Classic, helping the Terps to the tournament title. Fisher had 13 points and five rebounds against the Pioneers and was even better against UMES, posting her first-career double-double in the first half, en route to 18 points and a career-high 13 rebounds. She also shot .500 from the field, going 12-for-24.
- Three other Terps earned tournament honors, as well. Seniors Delvona Oliver and Crystal Washington and freshman Shay Doron were named All-Terrapin Classic. Doron led the tournament in points (37), field goals made (15) and three-pointers made (4). She also shot an outstanding .625 from the field.
- Washington averaged 15.5 points per game and 6.5 rebounds over the two games. She also had a career-high three blocks in the win over UMES.
- Oliver shot .647 (11-for-17) from the field over the two games, leading all players in the tournament. She posted her first-career double-double as a Terp in the win over Sacred Heart with 18 points and 10 rebounds.

DORON SETS RECORD, TIES NCAA MARK

- In her first-collegiate game, freshman Shay Doron made 23 free throws in the 79-64 win over Coppin State, tying the NCAA record for makes while breaking the ACC and Maryland records. Her 27 attempts were also a conference and school records.

WASHINGTON'S CAREER NIGHT HELPS TERPS TO EARLY WIN

- Senior Crystal Washington scored Maryland's first eight points in the game against Niagara, en route to a career-high 18 points. She also grabbed a then-career best 10 boards, posting her first-career double-double, to lead the Terps to an 82-74 win over the Purple Eagles. Washington has gone on to post two more double-doubles this season.

TURTLE TRACKS...

- With its 62-47 win over Florida State in the ACC Tournament, the 15-point margin of victory is Maryland's largest in the conference tournament since a 72-56 triumph over the Seminoles in 1995. The Terps advance to the semifinals for the first time since 1998.
- Maryland dropped its first game of the season when outrebounding an opponent. The Terps were 14-0 when hauling down more boards than the opposing team until a 58-57 setback at Georgia Tech. Despite a 46-39 advantage on the boards, the Yellow Jackets were able to steal the win in the final minute. The Terps also outrebounded the Tar Heels by eight, but were unable to grab the win at Carmichael Auditorium, and Duke by one in the ACC Tournament semifinals but fell by seven.
- With the Terps' win over Florida State at Comcast Center, they clinched a winning record this season. Maryland is currently 17-12 with at least one more game left in the season. Maryland last posted a winning record during the 2000-01 campaign, going 17-12. It was the last year the Terps made a trip to the NCAA Tournament.
- Maryland's 91 points in the win over Georgia Tech is its biggest scoring output in an ACC game since defeating the Jackets on Feb. 21, 1999, 92-79.
- The Terps recorded their biggest ACC win since a 75-54 triumph vs. NC State State on Feb. 25, 2001 when they bested Wake Forest, 75-58. Maryland matched that in the home game vs. the Deacs, 73-56. In its nine victories over ACC foes, Maryland is averaging a 12.4-point margin of victory in those game.
- Bishop McNamara High School alums Kalika France and Crystal Washington each posted double-doubles in the win over the Wolfpack. France's 19 points were a then-career high and her 10 rebounds tied a career best. Washington grabbed a career-high 13 boards to go along with 10 points. The last time the Terps had two players post double-doubles was in the 104-66 win over Rider last season on Nov. 29. Angel Ross (19 pts, 13 reb) and Charmaine Carr (14 pts, 11 reb) both recorded their first-career double-doubles.
- For the third time this season and the first time in ACC play, five Terps scored in double figures when they topped Georgia Tech, 91-87. Five Terps also reached double-digit outings vs. UMES and Loyola.

- All five starters scored in double-figures in the 76-61 win over Loyola. Senior Crystal Washington and freshman Shay Doron paved the way, each scoring game-highs of 14 points.
- Maryland's four freshmen scored in double-figures to lead the Terps to a 72-38 rout of UMBC. Rookie C'Vette Henson tallied a career-high 12 points to lead all scorers.
- A guard, freshman Kalika France has pulled down five or more rebounds 21 times this season. She grabbed a career-high 10 in her first-collegiate game vs. Coppin State and tied that mark in the Terps' ACC opener vs. NC State to complete her first-career double-double. She currently leads the team in rebounding and ranks eighth in the ACC.
- The Terps' 6-1 start this year was their best since going 7-0 in 1991-92. That year, Maryland finished 25-6 overall and 13-1 in the ACC, reaching the NCAA Tournament Mid-East Regional. The Terps also went 6-1 in 1992-93 and 2000-01.

WHO'S BACK

- Maryland returns seven letterwinners from last season's squad, including three starters. Fifth-year senior Vicki Brick comes back as the team's point guard. Starting all 28 games, she averaged 7.8 points per game and 3.3 assists per game. The tallest player on the squad, Delvona Oliver is looking to put in a full season after coming to College Park as a transfer. After taking to the floor in late December, she averaged 10.5 ppg and 5.3 rpg. A starter in 23 games, Angel Ross is the team's top-returning rebounder, averaging 5.5 boards per game.
- Also coming back this season are sophomore Chrissy Fisher, classmate Charmaine Carr, junior Anesia Smith and senior Crystal Washington. Fisher earned ACC All-Freshmen team honors last year. Carr started 19 games and Smith scored 5.3 ppg while appearing in all 28 games. Washington was hampered by injuries for most of last year and looks to be in top health.

WHO'S NOT

- Four letterwinners depart from last season's squad, including two starters. Most significant is the loss of Renneika Razor. A 5-8 guard, she led the team with 16.1 ppg and 5.7 rpg, en route to second team All-ACC honors. She became the 20th player in Maryland history to score 1,000 points, ending her career 1,163 points which ranks 18th all-time.
- Also not returning is 6-0 guard Terri Daniels. Daniels is one of the best three-point shooters in school history, ending her career with 101 treys made which ranks third all-time. Her .352 percentage from behind the three-point arc is seventh all-time.
- The Terps also lose Brie Jackson, who averaged 2.0 ppg and 1.4 rpg in 18 games, and Vanessa Ruffin (2.0 ppg, 1.3 rpg, 7 games).

TERPS WELCOME FIVE NEW FACES

- Maryland welcomes five new faces to the squad - four freshmen and one junior transfer. Freshmen Shay Doron and Kalika France come in with a number of accolades including earning *Parade* All-America honors last year. Both were also named Gatorade Player of the Year for their home state.
- Invited walk-on C'Vette Henson comes from

nearby Annapolis High where she was named all-county and All-Met after leading Anne Arundel County in scoring her senior year. Fellow freshman Aurelie Noirez crossed the Atlantic Ocean to get to College Park. A native of Vandoeuvre, France, she was a member of the French Junior National Team.

ALSO JOINING THE TERPS...

- A new face will also be roaming the Comcast Center sidelines. Assistant coach Joanna Bernabei comes with a wealth of experience as a head coach, assistant coach and a collegiate player. She was an assistant coach for two seasons at West Virginia and also had stints at Eastern Kentucky and West Virginia Wesleyan.
- Bernabei replaced head coach Brenda Frese's sister, Marsha. Marsha Frese was a Terps assistant coach last season and left for an assistant coaching position at Illinois.

MARYLAND ON THE TUBE

- The Terps made seven television appearances this season as part of the ACC women's basketball schedule. The Terps are 2-5 in TV games so far.
- Maryland made its 2003-04 debut when it hosted Virginia on Jan. 4. The Terps also appeared on television vs. North Carolina (1/25) and Wake Forest (2/9). UM traveled to Virginia (2/9) and NC State (1/19) for television appearances, as well. Maryland also played host to then-No. 4 Duke for a nationally televised contest on ESPN2. The Terps made their second nationally televised appearance on Fox Sports Net when they faced the Blue Devils in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament.

Second Season at Maryland

In her fifth season overall as a head coach, 2002 *Associated Press* National Coach of the Year Brenda Frese has already made the quick turnaround she is known for on a young Maryland squad in just her second season at the Terrapin helm.

Looking towards making the next step in the rebuilding process and making the Terps back the national power they once were, this season Frese has led the Terps to a tie for third place in the ACC standings after the team was picked to finish eighth in the ACC Preseason Poll. Maryland's 16 wins this season are more than it had all last year (10), as they ran out to their best start since the 1991-92 season, going 6-1. Its 3-0 ACC start was Maryland's best since that same season and its 4-2 showing in conference action was its best through six games since the 1992-93 campaign. With their win at Clemson in the regular-season finale, the Terps ended the 2003-04 conference regular season at 8-8, doubling their ACC record from each of the last two seasons and equaling or surpassing their conference win total from nine of the last 10 years.

This season under Frese, Maryland posted a 17-point victory over Wake Forest in Winston-Salem, N.C., its biggest over an ACC squad since a Feb. 25, 2001 win over NC State. The Terps matched that margin of victory again in the sweep of Wake Forest, 73-56, in Comcast Center, marking the Terps' first regular-season sweep of an ACC team since the 2000-01 campaign. With its 91-scoring day in the win vs. Georgia Tech, it was Maryland's most prolific scoring day since a 92-79 win over the Yellow Jackets since Feb. 21, 1999.

Many are starting to take notice of Maryland's impressive turnaround under Frese. The Terps played in front of the second-largest crowd in ACC women's basketball history when they hosted No. 4/4 Duke in front of a nationally televised audience. A Comcast Center record crowd of 13,446 turned out for the regular-season home finale.

Maryland ended the 2002-03 season with a 10-18 overall mark, Frese's first season at the Terrapin helm, with eight losses coming by 10 points or less. The Terps also took several steps in the right direction, including breaking 100 points in a game for the first time since 1993, claiming the team's first ACC road win since the 2000-01 season and drawing a crowd of 5,078, the largest since Feb. 24, 1996.

A 1993 Arizona graduate and a native of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Frese has put together an 84-59 (.587) career record in five overall seasons, including a 27-29 mark in College Park, making amazing turnarounds along the way. Starting her career as an assistant coach at Kent State and Iowa State, she took over the head coaching duties at Ball State in 2000. Prior to her arrival, Ball State had gone 66-169. In Frese's two seasons there, she guided the Cardinals to a 16-13 record in her first season then led the team to a school-record 19-9 mark, while receiving votes in the AP poll and climbing as high as No. 28. Her next stop was at Minnesota where she led a Golden Gopher team that went 8-20 to a 22-8 record, advancing to the NCAA Tournament second round and achieving a No. 18 national ranking in the final AP regular season poll, while along the way breaking several school records.

For her successes, Frese has earned conference and national accolades. She was named MAC Coach of the Year in 2000 as mentor of the Cardinals and was then selected Big Ten and AP National Coach of the Year in 2002 after her stint as head coach at Minnesota. In her 10 seasons as a coach, she has helped her teams to four NCAA Tournament appearances and advancing to the NCAA Elite Eight in 1999.

Frese has also hit the recruiting trails hard and the work seems to have paid off. On Nov. 12, 2003, she announced the signing of four of the nation's top recruits. The class was rated No. 2 by the Blue Star Report, giving solidifying Frese's reputation as one of the top recruiting coaches in the nation.

About Miami: Miami has four players averaging double figures, with Tamara James leading the way with 16.6 points per game. Shaquana Wilkins leads the team with 8.5 rebounds per game. The Hurricanes' 73.4 ppg ranks 24th in the nation, as well as their 45.3 percent shooting from the field. They also rank sixth nationally in assists per game (18.4) with James leading the way at 5.5 apg. Her 3.1 steals per game is 22nd in the nation, contributing to the squad's 12.1 spg which is 13th in the nation. The Hurricanes finished the season fourth in the Big East.

Big East in the NCAA Tournament: The Big East was awarded the most bids into this year's NCAA Tournament, garnering eight invitations. Boston College captured the conference's automatic bid and Connecticut earned the highest seed of any Big East squad at No. 2 in the East Regional. UConn is also the defending national champion. Also earning bids are Miami (Fla.), Notre Dame, Rutgers, Villanova, Virginia Tech and West Virginia.

Terps vs. the Big East in 2004: Maryland faced two Big East squads this season, going 1-1 against those teams. The Terps fell to Virginia Tech, an NCAA Tournament squad, but topped local foe Georgetown in overtime, 66-63, at the Surf-N-Slam Tournament in San Diego.

Miami vs. the Field of 64: The Canes have played nine teams in the field of 64, going 5-6 this season. Two of those wins came against non-conference opponents Florida (80-75) and Vanderbilt (79-57). Miami also recorded wins over Boston College, Virginia Tech and West Virginia in Big East play, but fell to Villanova, Notre Dame twice, Rutgers and Connecticut. The Hurricanes also fell to BC in the Big East Tournament.

About Austin Peay: The Lady Govs are making their fourth-consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament after having won the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament title for the fourth-straight year. The only team out of the OVC to play in the NCAA Tournament, APSU is led by two-time OVC Player of the Year Gerlonda Hardin. She leads the team with 18.6 points per game, while also averaging a .613 field goal percentage, the third-best in the nation. An All-OVC selection, Ashley Hanes is hauling down a team-leading 9.2 boards per game, while averaging 12.1 ppg. Kera Bergeron broke the conference record for threes in a season with 99 and her 3.3 treys per game is third in the country.

Terps vs. the OVC: Maryland has never played a team out of the Ohio Valley Conference and Terps' head coach Brenda Frese has never coached against an opponent out of that league. Assistant coach Joanna Bernabei spent one season as a graduate assistant at Eastern Kentucky, then spent two years as an assistant on the EKV staff from 1999-2001.

APSU vs. the Field of 64: The Lady Govs are 1-1 vs. teams in the NCAA Tournament this season. They fell to the Sun Belt's Middle Tennessee at home, but defeated Lipscomb on its home court in the very next game.

Terps vs. Volunteer State Squads: In the history of the program, Maryland has played just one team from the Volunteer State. The Terps faced the University of Tennessee 13 times, with the Lady Vols holding the series lead at 9-4. The last meeting between the squads during the 1994-95 campaign.

About LSU: Ranked 19th in both national polls, the Tigers are one of the perennial powers out of the SEC. Ranked 16th in offense in the nation, three Tigers average double-figure scoring with Seimone Augustus, a Naismith Player of the Year finalist, leading the way at 18.6 points per game. Just a sophomore, she has already garnered a number of national accolades. She is also the team's leading rebounder at 6.0. Augustus also shoots an outstanding 91 percent from the free throw line in 100 attempts, the third-highest percentage in the country. Another one of the top players in the country, Temeka Johnson is third in the nation with 8.0 assists per game. With the experience from Johnson leading the way, LSU turns the call over just 13.3 times per game, which ranks sixth in the nation. The Tigers opened the season with a 1-2 record, then rattled off 15-straight wins before dropping another game.

SEC in the NCAA Tournament: The SEC has the second-most NCAA berths with seven. Vanderbilt claimed the automatic bid when it won the conference tournament title. Perennial power Tennessee won the regular season and was tabbed the No. 1 seed in the Midwest Regional. Also earning bids are Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU and Ole Miss.

LSU vs. the Field of 64: LSU has faced 11 opponents in the NCAA Tournament, including five in non-conference play. The Tigers are 10-5 in those games.

Common Opponents: Maryland and LSU have both faced Penn State and Florida State this year. The Lady Lions handed the Terps and the Tigers early season losses. The Tigers topped Florida State in the Russell Athletic Shootout in Atlanta. The Terps split the regular-season series with the Seminoles, then picked up a decisive victory in the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament.

SEASON RECAPS

Game 1 Maryland 79, Coppin State 64

November 21, 2003 • Comcast Center

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Maryland freshman Shay Doron's free throw shooting helped Maryland pull away from Coppin State in the closing minutes and lead the Terrapins to a season-opening 79-64 victory over the Eagles.

As a team, Maryland was 36-44 (82%) at the free throw line, while Coppin State managed just 10-16. Doron was 23-27 from the stripe, setting Maryland single-game records for makes and attempts, and tying the NCAA record for makes in a game. She was just 1-8 from the field, but finished with a game-high 25 points in her debut. Washington's Shaunda Greene also made 23 free throws against Northern Illinois in 1991.

Maryland (1-0) got out to the early lead, stretching the Terp advantage to 21-11 after Charmaine Carr's jumper with 11:35 to play in the first half. The Eagles (0-1) took advantage of 14 Maryland turnovers and 12 points off the bench from Antoinette Reese to get back into the game, and eventually took the lead at 25-23 on a pair of Monique Lewis free throws. The Terp defense buckled down at the end of the half, limiting the Eagles to just seven points over the final seven minutes.

Coppin State scored 17 points off of Maryland turnovers in the first half.

The Terrapins looked as if they put the game away in the second half after Chrissy Fisher's three-pointer gave them their largest lead of the night at 60-44 with just over 11 minutes left to play. However, the Eagles went on a 16-4 run to close the gap to 64-60 with just under three minutes remaining. Maryland scored 10 of its last 15 points from the free throw line and got a three pointer from Fisher to put the game out of reach.

Carr and Delvona Oliver came off the bench to score double figures for the Terps, with 13 and 10 points, respectively. Kalika France grabbed 10 rebounds, including four offensive, to go along with eight points and three assists. Alli Spence handed out a game-high seven assists and chipped in eight points.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Senior Crystal Washington recorded career highs with 18 points and 10 rebounds, leading the Maryland women's basketball team to an 82-74 win over Niagara on Sunday afternoon at Comcast Center. The Terps sweep the weekend opener, going 2-0, while the Purple Eagles fell to 0-1.

Washington (Clinton, Md./Bishop McNamara) scored the Terps' first eight points of the game, giving Maryland its biggest lead of the half, 8-4. Niagara took over the lead, 9-8, on an Eva Cunningham three pointer and a Jessica Kemp layup. The Purple Eagles were ahead for most of the half, putting together an 8-0 run to claim their biggest lead of the game, 22-15. But the Terps remained within reach, however, going on a 10-2 run and taking the lead at 25-24 with 6:33 remaining. Another tie and two more lead changes occurred in the final minutes and the Terps went ahead, 33-31, on a Washington jumper with 1:42 remaining. Maryland never looked back, taking a five-point lead at the break, 38-32. Washington led all players with 12 points and six rebounds at the half, while the team shot 53.3 percent. Sophomore Charmaine Carr (Accokeek, Md./Gwynn Park) was perfect from the field in the half, going 3-for-3 and ending the game with eight points.

After the break, the Terps netted the first six points to build the largest margin of the game, 46-33. The Purple Eagles trimmed the deficit to on an Ana Mimm three pointer at the 2:33 mark. A couple of freshman Kalika France (Forestville, Md./Bishop McNamara) free throws pushed the advantage back up to seven, 75-68. Niagara's Eva Cunningham's layup brought the Purple Eagles to within five with 1:35 remaining in the game, sophomore Chrissy Fisher (Rumson, N.J./Rumson-Fair Haven) answered with a layup and the Terps sealed the win, going 5-for-6 from the charity stripe down the stretch.

Terrapin Classic

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Freshman Shay Doron led four double-figure scorers with 22 points and the Maryland women's basketball team limited Sacred Heart to just 14-percent shooting in the second half, as the Terps cruised to a 90-49 victory in the first round of the Terrapin Classic on Friday afternoon at Comcast Center. Maryland has advanced to the championship game in all five years of the tournament's existence.

The game was a close affair for the first eight minutes, with neither team gaining more than a three-point advantage. The lead changed hands three times during those opening minutes before a Doron (Great Neck, N.Y./Christ the King) completed a three-point play, to put the Terps (3-0) ahead by one, 16-15, and never trailed for the rest of the game. Keyed by five points from sophomore Chrissy Fisher (Rumson, N.J./Rumson-Fair Haven), Maryland went ahead, 26-17. The Pioneers (2-1) got within five points, 34-29, with a three pointer from Shannon Quinlivan, but the Terps gradually pushed the lead back up to nine points at 38-29. With the clock winding down and the score at 42-33, senior Crystal Washington (Clinton, Md./Bishop McNamara) put an exclamation point on the half, converting the putback off a missed three-pointer at the buzzer, giving Maryland its largest lead of the half, 44-33.

Maryland took control of the second half from the start, going on a 23-3 run to extend its lead, 67-38, at 12:17. A freshman Kalika France (Forestville, Md./Bishop McNamara) trey at 10:20 put the Terps up by 31 points. The Pioneers scored their last field goal of the game with 6:27 remaining in the game on a Colleen Duggan jumper. Maryland went on a 14-1 tear, for a final margin of 90-49, its largest since an 89-44 win over another Northeast Conference opponent, Wagner, on Nov. 25, 2000, in the first round of the Terrapin Classic.

Four Terps posted double-digit scoring. Doron notched her second 20-point game of the season, while senior Delvona Oliver (Euclid, Ohio/Euclid) netted 18 points and grabbed 10 rebounds for the first double-double of her career as a Terp. Fisher and Washington each added 13 and 15 points, respectively.

Terrapin Classic

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Sophomore Chrissy Fisher scored 18 points and grabbed a career-high 13 rebounds as the Maryland women's basketball team rolled out to a 97-65 win over intrastate-rival Maryland-Eastern Shore in the championship game of the Terrapin Classic on Saturday afternoon. Recording the first double-double of her career, Fisher was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

After defeating Sacred Heart 90-49 on Friday, the Terps post back-to-back 90-point outings for the first time since 1992, when they defeated Drexel, 121-52, on Dec. 1 and American, 93-54, on Dec. 4. Maryland's 4-0 start to the season is its best since starting 6-0 during the 2000-01 season.

The Fighting Hawks (2-2) were within reach in the opening 10 minutes of the game, coming to within 19-17 with 11:08 left on the clock. Over the next six minutes, Maryland (4-0) put together a 19-4 run to take a commanding 38-22 lead with five minutes to play, and ended the half on an 11-2 tear, pushing its lead over 20 points and a 53-28 halftime advantage. Fisher (Rumson, N.J./Rumson-Fair Haven) needed just 20 minutes to post her first-career double-double, pacing the Terps with 11 points and 11 rebounds.

In the second half, Maryland gradually built up its lead to an insurmountable 30-point advantage by the 12:22 mark, 71-41. UMES' six-point run brought the Hawks to within 24, 71-47, with just under 10 minutes left to play, but the Terps pushed their lead back up 78-48 and never saw it dip below 26 for the rest of the game.

The Terps shot an outstanding 60 percent in the second half and were 54.2 percent from the field for the game, as five different players scored in double digits. Freshman Kalika France (Forestville, Md./Bishop McNamara) had career highs of 17 points and eight rebounds, while junior Anesia Smith (Alexandria, Va./Hayfield) tallied 11 points. All-tournament honorees freshman Shay Doron (Great Neck, N.Y./Christ the King) and senior Crystal Washington (Clinton, Md./Bishop McNamara) scored 15 and 12 points, respectively. Doron also dished out a career-high six assists. Senior Delvona Oliver (Euclid, Ohio/Euclid), who averaged 13 points and 6.5 rebounds, was the fourth Maryland player named All-Terrapin Classic.

The Hawks' Tiffany Winkfield also posted a double-double with 23 points and 13 rebounds, earning all-tournament recognition. Octavia Thompson, who was also named to the Terrapin Classic All-Tournament team, led all scorers with 25 points, which included an 11-for-12 outing from the free throw line.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - All four Maryland freshmen scored in double digits as the women's basketball team shot over 50 percent from the field and cruised to a 72-38 win over UMBC on Saturday afternoon at Comcast Center. Freshman C'Vette Henson netted four three pointers to lead all scorers with a career-high 12 points as every Terrapin on the roster contributed in the win.

Maryland shot 58.3 percent from the field in the first half to take a commanding 36-19 lead over UMBC at the break. With the score tied at two apiece, the Terps went on a 17-3 tear to jump ahead, 19-5, early on. Another 13-2 run on the strength of treys coming from junior Alli Spence (Lafayette, Colo./Chatfield), senior Vicki Brick (Timonium, Md./McDonogh) and Henson (Annapolis, Md./Annapolis) put the Retrievers behind, 32-10, with under seven minutes to play in the first half. Maryland's biggest lead of the half was a 23-point advantage, 36-13, but UMBC scored the final six points of the half to cut into the lead.

The Retrievers could not slow down the Terps as Maryland's hot shooting continued into the second half. Henson tallied nine of her career-high 12 points in the period and classmate Aurelie Noirez (Vandoeuvre, France/Lyce Francais Arago) added eight. UMBC's shooting struggles would not go away, making just five buckets in the final 20 minutes and none in the final eight minutes of playing time.

Maryland's freshmen class scored 42 of the team's points, with freshmen Kalika France (Forestville, Md./Bishop McNamara), Shay Doron (Great Neck, N.Y./Christ the King) and Noirez each netting 10. Junior Anesia Smith (Alexandria, Va./Hayfield) dished out a career-high nine assists to go along with six points.

The Retrievers are winless versus the Maryland in the all-time series, extending their losing streak to seven games. The Terps have also swept the Free State teams this season, going 4-0, improving its all-time record against those teams to 64-8.

SAN DIEGO - Freshman Kalika France's career-high 18 points was not enough as the Maryland women's basketball team fell to No. 3/3 Texas Tech, 65-53, in the first round of the Surf-N-Slam Tournament at Jenny Craig Pavilion on the campus of San Diego University on Sunday night. The Lady Raiders went on an 8-2 run over the final 1:17 to seal the victory.

The Terps drop to 7-3 on the season with all of their losses coming to ranked squads. TTU improved to 12-0 to improve their school record for consecutive wins to start the season.

The Terps stayed within reach trimming the Texas Tech lead to four points on two more occasions. The Lady Raiders slowly pulled away, pushing its lead up to 11 with less than four minutes to play, 57-46.

Maryland would not go away, however. Junior Anesia Smith (Alexandria, Va./Hayfield) scored four of the Terps' next six points, bringing the to deficit to single digits, 57-51, with 1:17 remaining in the game, but Texas Tech scored five of its final eight points from the free throw line to ward off the Terps' bid for an upset.

SAN DIEGO - The Maryland women's basketball team traveled 3,000 miles to face cross-town rival Georgetown for the first time since 2000 and the Terps came out victorious, winning in overtime, 63-60, in the consolation game of the Surf-N-Slam Tournament in San Diego, Calif., on Tuesday night. The Terps had four players in double-figures, led by ACC Rookie of the Week Kalika France who tallied 14 points.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Bishop McNamara alums Kalika France and Crystal Washington posted career highs to lead the Maryland women's basketball team to a 68-56 win over NC State in its ACC opener on Friday night at Comcast Center. ACC Rookie of the Week France netted a career-best 19 points and tied her career high in rebounds with 10 for her first-career double-double. Washington grabbed a career-high 13 boards to go along with 10 points for her third double-double of the season.

With four lead changes and three ties, it was a battle for both teams to keep the lead in the first 12 minutes of the game. Maryland (9-3, 1-0 ACC) led early on, 8-4, but NC State (8-6, 0-1 ACC) scored six-straight points to go ahead, 10-8. Senior Delvona Oliver (Euclid, Ohio/Euclid) remained perfect on the season from the free throw line, completing a three-point play, giving the lead back to the Terps, 11-10. The Wolfpack regained the advantage, 15-13, on an Ashley Key 3-pointer, but Oliver was quick to respond with a trey of her own and Maryland led, 16-15, with 8:16 left in the first half.

The Terps never trailed for the rest of the game but NC State was close behind, tying the game at 22 with 4:01 remaining in the half. With the shot clock winding down and the Terps ahead, 28-26, Junior Alli Spence (Lafayette, Colo./Chatfield) netted a three, giving Maryland a five-point cushion at the break, 31-26.

Back-to-back France (Forestville, Md./Bishop McNamara) layups capped a 7-2 Maryland run to open the second half, 39-28. But NC State would not go away, coming to within 40-35 at 12:51. Maryland regained control, however, going on a 10-0 run keyed by a long-range three by sophomore Chrissy Fisher (Rumson, N.J./Rumson-Fair Haven) to jump ahead, 50-35. A jumper in the lane from freshman Aurelie Noirez (Vandoeuvre, France/Lyce Francois Arago) pushed the Terp's advantage to 52-36, its biggest lead of the contest.

The Wolfpack clawed its way back, thanks to a 14-3 run over five minutes, 55-50. But Maryland, who is the best free-throw shooting team in the ACC, was 10-for-10 from the charity stripe and pulled away for the win.

Maryland hit the boards tonight, outrebounding NC State, 51-37. The Terps had 23 offensive boards, compared to the Pack's 14. Oliver finished the game with 14 points and Spence added 11. Washington (Clinton, Md./Bishop McNamara) also had a career-high tying three blocks.

A second-team All-ACC pick last year, Kaayla Chones was the only player in double figures for NC State, missing a double-double with 13 points and nine boards.

The 12-point margin of victory is the Terps' biggest over an ACC squad since a 62-50 triumph over Florida State in January 2002. The Terps also win their ACC opener for the first time in three years.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The Maryland women's basketball team used a stifling defense and rebounding to top ACC rival Virginia, 69-55, in ACC action on Sunday afternoon at Comcast Center. The Terps limited the Cavaliers to 12 first-half points and led by as many as 28 points to claim the win and move to 2-0 in ACC play for the first time since the 1993-94 season.

A fast break layup from Doron capped the run, forcing UVA (5-7, 0-2 ACC) to take a time out.

The Wahos came out of the timeout on a 6-0 run to cut the lead to 14-8 over the next one and a half minutes, but the Terps came right back and closed out the period on a 20-4 tear to take a commanding 34-12 lead at the break. Virginia had just five buckets in the first half, shooting 16.7 percent from the field. The Terps shot 45.5 percent, led by Oliver who had 10 points at the end of the half on 5-for-6 shooting.

The second half began with Maryland scoring six straight points, pushing its lead to 40-12, its biggest margin of the afternoon. UVA's Brandi Teamer scored 12 of her 14 points in the second half, including a three-pointer just before the final buzzer sounded, but it was not enough as the Terps easily came away with the win.

Maryland dominated the Cavaliers on the boards, as well, grabbing 37 defensive boards and outrebounding Virginia, 53-34, for the game. No other UVA player besides Teamer had more than eight points.

The win snaps a six-game Maryland losing streak to the Cavaliers. It is also the Terps' largest margin of victory since a 75-54 win over NC State on Feb. 25, 2001.

Game 14 Maryland 75, Wake Forest 58

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. - Freshman Shay Doron sparked Maryland's offense in the second half scoring 23 of her career-high 32 points to lead the women's basketball team to a 75-58 victory over Wake Forest on Friday morning in Joel Coliseum. Doron's 32-point effort was the most ever scored by a Maryland freshman and is the seventh-highest point total in school history.

The Terps (11-3, 3-0) blew open a game in the second-half after the teams were deadlocked at 28 at the break. The Terps, who improve to 3-0 in the ACC for the first time since the 1991-92 season, outscored the Deacs, 47-30, after halftime. The 47 points were the most points surrendered by Wake Forest (8-7, 1-3 ACC) in any half this season.

Doron (Great Neck, N.Y./Christ the King) finished the game 9-for-17 from the field, 3-for-7 from 3-point land and 11-of-12 from the free-throw line. Fellow freshman Kalika France (Forestville, Md./Bishop McNamara) was the only other Maryland player in double figures. France scored 15 points, grabbed eight rebounds and dished out three assists.

Maryland scored the game's first four points and pushed its lead to as many as five points in the first-half, 16-11, with 8:38 left. The Deacs answered with a 12-2 run over the next 3:51, capped off by a layup from Liz Strunk to give the Demon Deacons a 23-18 lead. The forward scored eight of her 14 first-half points over the span.

The Terps quickly responded with a 10-1 run of its own. Maryland regained a four-point lead with 1:00 left in the first-half, but the Deacs scored the final four points of the half as the teams entered the halftime lockerroom tied, 28-28.

The Deacs and Terrapins each struggled from the field in the opening 20 minutes. Maryland connected on only 12-for-31 (38.7%) from the field, while Wake Forest went 10-for-30 (33.3%) from the floor. The teams also combined to knock down just a single 3-point field goal on 11 attempts.

The second half saw both teams shoot above 50 percent with the Terps hitting on 56 percent of their shots. After Maryland took the lead on a Doron free throw, 31-30, it never trailed again, converting on nine of 10 free throw attempts to pull away.

The Deac's Liz Strunk scored a career-high 23 points, going 8-for-13 from the field, including a 3-pointer, and 6-of-7 from the free-throw line. Strunk established a new single game career-high for the third time this season.

Cotelia Bond-Young was the lone other Deacon in double figures. Bond-Young, coming off her career-high 27 point effort against NC State last Monday night, scored 14 points and dished out four assists.

Game 15 Florida State 82, Maryland 77

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. - Led by Tasheika Allen's 25 points and Shante Williams 20 points and nine assists, the Florida State handed Maryland its first ACC loss with an 82-77 victory over the Terrapins, at the Tallahassee-Leon County Civic Center. FSU improved to 9-6 overall and evened its league mark at 2-2 while the Terps fell to 11-4 overall and 3-1 in ACC play.

The first half was nonstop action from the tip off. Allen was unstoppable in the first couple of minutes. With the score tied at 4-4, Allen launched and made a three-pointer as she scored FSU's next eight points including six straight to give the Tribe a 10-4 lead at the 16:07 mark. Then it was Maryland's turn. The Terps went on a 12-2 run and regained the lead at 27-25 with 6:07 left. The next five minutes of the half saw four ties and two lead changes. FSU's Holly Johnson hit two free throw shots after a Maryland technical foul, giving the Seminoles a 40-33 lead with 23 seconds and that was the halftime score. Maryland shot 32 percent and had three players with six points apiece.

Maryland scored the first seven points of the second half to tie the game at 40-40, but the Seminoles refused to let the Terrapins regain the lead. Leading 59-56 at the 10:57 mark, the Seminoles scored seven unanswered points, five of which were from the free throw line, to take its largest lead of the game at 10 points, 66-56, with 8:34 left in the game. But it was a game of spurts and Maryland was not about to back down. France went to work for the Terps and scored six of Maryland's next 11 points. The Terps' 11-2 run pulled Maryland to within a point at 68-67 with just under five minutes remaining.

Williams then scored eight of FSU's next 10 points as the Seminoles outscored the Terrapins 10-4 and led 78-71 with 27 seconds on the clock. Maryland hit back-to-back three-pointers in the final 21 seconds but the Seminoles hit four free throws to seal the victory.

Florida State shot 55 percent for the game while Maryland shot just 39 percent. Rebounds were knotted at 35-35. France ended the game with a career-high 26 points to lead all scorers.

Maryland 91, Georgia Tech 87

January 15, 2004 • Comcast Center

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The Maryland women's basketball team used a balanced attack and solid free throw shooting to top Georgia Tech in ACC action on Thursday night, 91-87, at Comcast Center. With the win, the Terps improved to 12-4, 4-1 in the ACC, equaling their conference win total from a season ago. The Jackets dropped to 10-6, 1-3 in ACC play.

Five Terps scored in double figures, as sophomore Chrissy Fisher led the team with 17 points. Freshmen Kalika France and Shay Doron chipped in 16 and 15 points, respectively, while senior Delvona Oliver (15 points) and junior Alli Spence (14 points) were in double figures as well.

"It's nice to see us keep our composure down the wire. We got a lot of contributions from a lot of players on the offensive end, and we stepped up and made our free throws," said Maryland head coach Brenda Frese. "I thought Georgia Tech did a tremendous job and really hurt us on the defensive end; they were very aggressive off the dribble penetration."

Maryland jumped ahead 5-1 early on and stayed in front until a Megan Harpring lay up at 12:18, which gave Georgia Tech a 12-11 lead. Although the Terps lost the lead briefly, they quickly reclaimed it on a Doron jumper, 15-14.

The Jackets tied the score twice at 19 and then again at 21, but the Terrapins went on a 21-5 tear to pull away. With just under four minutes left in the half, Fisher drained a three-pointer to give Maryland its biggest lead of the contest, 42-26. Keyed by seven points from Fallon Stokes, Georgia Tech chipped away in the remaining minutes, but the Terps knocked down a couple of jumpers down the stretch and took a nine-point lead into the locker room at halftime, 46-37.

The Terps battled to keep their lead, pushing it up to 13 at 54-41 with 15:15 remaining in the game. But Georgia Tech eventually cut into the Maryland advantage and was down by five points, 68-63, on back-to-back April Johnson layups with just under eight minutes left. After the Yellow Jackets came to within 78-72, from there, Fisher and Spence kept the Terrapins composed by hitting free throws down the stretch.

"I have to give a lot of credit to Maryland. That is a much improved Maryland team," said Georgia Tech head coach MaChelle Joseph. "In my three years in the league, that's the best Maryland team I've seen... I think [Maryland] has two of the best guards [in Kalika France and Shay Doron] - not just freshmen guards - but two of the best guards in the ACC."

Senior Crystal Washington had a game-high eight rebounds and added eight points. Five Yellow Jackets also reached double-digit scoring as the team shot 46.7 percent from the field. The Terps shot at a 49.2 percent clip, including a 45.5 percent outing from behind the three-point line.

The 91 points scored by the Terps is their most in an ACC game since defeating Georgia Tech, 92-79, on Feb. 21, 1999.

Maryland fifth-year senior Vicki Brick also played in her 100th-career game tonight.

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) - Duke forward Iciss Tillis had gone six games without reaching double figures, but broke out with a vengeance with 21 points as top-ranked Duke defeated Maryland 78-48 Thursday night for its 49th straight victory over an Atlantic Coast Conference opponent.

Tillis' average had dipped from 18 points a game to 11.4, and she had averaged just 5.7 against six opponents before Thursday's win for the Blue Devils (15-1, 6-0).

Alana Beard, leading the ACC in scoring with 19.7 points a game, had nine in just 21 minutes for Duke. She strained a groin muscle in practice Tuesday.

Monique Currie added 12 points and Lindsey Harding 10 for the Blue Devils.

Tillis made five of her first eight shots and finished 7-for-12 from the field.

The Blue Devils made 31 of 67 shots (46.3 percent) and outrebounded Maryland 46-30. They held the Terps to 16-for-53 shooting (30.2 percent).

RALEIGH, N.C. - NC State women's basketball picked up its second-straight Atlantic Coast Conference victory with a 61-45 win over visiting Maryland. The Wolfpack improved to 10-10 overall and 2-5 in the ACC, while the Terrapins dropped to 12-7 and 4-4 in the ACC. NC State's Alvine Mendeng led a trio of double figure scorers with her 14 points and 11 rebounds. Delvona Oliver, who recorded a game-high 17 points, led Maryland.

The first saw poor shooting from both sides, neither team managed to put the ball in the basket. Mendeng hit a baseline jumper to put the Pack up for good with just over 12 minutes remaining. She went on to score eight points in the half. She, along with freshman Sasha Reaves took care of the post duties. Reaves went 4-of-6 for the game. The perimeter play of the Wolfpack was sustained by the rebounding and penetration abilities of freshman Marquette Dickens and junior Kendra Bell. Dickens nearly finished with a double double as well with her 13 points and nine boards. Bell added a career-high eight rebounds and nine points.

NC State went to shoot 48 percent in the second half and held Maryland again to just 33 percent. NC State outrebounded Maryland 41-37 for the game.

Maryland 68, Clemson 55

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Led by freshman Shay Doron's 22 points, the Maryland women's basketball team picked up its fifth ACC win of the season, surpassing its conference win total from the last two seasons, surging past Clemson, 68-55, on Thursday night at Comcast Center. The win also snaps a three-game Maryland losing skid while stopping a Tigers' four-game win streak.

After trailing 42-41 late in the second half, Doron scored 14 of her points over the next nine minutes, sparking a 25-9 Terrapin (13-7, 5-4 ACC) run which gave Maryland a commanding 66-51 lead with just 1:13 remaining in the game. Doron hit on her only three three-point attempts of the game during that span, igniting the Maryland offense. Senior Delvona Oliver and junior Alli Spence contributed six and five points in the streak, respectively, helping Maryland put the Tigers (13-7, 5-4 ACC) away.

Maryland held a four-point edge, 30-26, at the break, but Clemson scored the first two buckets of the period to tie the game with 18:25 left to play. The Terps pushed its lead back up to three points, but back-to-back Khalil Sanders' baskets put Maryland behind for the first time in the game, 34-33. The lead changed hands four more times in the next five minutes before the Terps took the lead for good with 10:22 left on the clock, using the dominating run to decide the game.

In the first half, the Terps never trailed, jumping out to an 11-4 lead early on for their biggest lead of the period. A 7-0 run, capped by Amanda White free throws, tied the score at 11 with 13:13 left in the half. The score was tied again at 13-13 before the Maryland defense forced back-to-back turnovers which resulted in a couple of scores to cap a 6-0 run, 19-13.

Maryland equaled its biggest margin of the half at 22-15 with nine minutes left, but Clemson continued to respond with a run of its own to reel the Terps back within reach, tying the game again at 24-24. Spence gave the Terps another boost before the end of the half, knocking down back-to-back threes, putting Maryland ahead, 30-24. Julie Aderhold's layup brought the Tigers to within 30-26, but they could not get any closer, trailing by that margin at the break.

The Terps, who are 13-0 when outrebounding an opponent, had three players with seven rebounds to lead the team. Doron had seven boards to go along with her standout shooting performance. She also matched a career-high with six assists and four steals, while shooting 7-for-13 from the field. Oliver also had seven boards and finished with 14 points. Freshman Kalika France (Forestville, Md./Bishop McNamara) recorded her 13th game of the season with at least five rebounds, tying for the team lead with seven.

Spence added 11 points to the Terps' win, including a 3-for-5 effort from behind the three-point arc.

Maryland snapped a four-game losing streak to Clemson and now leads the series, 30-23. The five ACC wins equals or surpasses the Terps' conference win total from five of the last nine years.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The Maryland women's basketball team (14-8, 6-5 ACC) won a key ACC match up Monday night, defeating Wake Forest, 73-56, in front of over 2,600 fans at Comcast Center. Senior Delvona Oliver came up big for the Terps, scoring 20 points, while sophomore Chrissy Fisher connected on three three-pointers and finished with 15 points. Maryland will now look to extend its win streak Thursday night when it hosts Florida State.

Maryland now stands alone in third place in the ACC, behind only No. 2 Duke and No. 12 North Carolina. Fisher (Rumson, N.J./Rumson-Fair Haven), with her three treys, moved into fifth place all-time in Maryland's career annals with 69. The Terps pick up their 11th win at Comcast Center, the most on a home court since the 1996-97 season.

Oliver (Euclid, Ohio/Euclid) was an outstanding 9-for-13 from the field and had five rebounds, a block and a steal in addition to her 20-point performance. Fisher and freshman Shay Doron (Great Neck, N.Y./Christ the King) were the other Terrapins in double figures, scoring 15 and 11 points, respectively. The duo also led the team in rebounds, grabbing eight.

Maryland scored the first seven points of the game before Porsche Jones' basket at 16:34 put Wake Forest (10-12, 3-8 ACC) on the scoreboard for the first time. Leading 17-10, Maryland went on a 12-4 tear, taking a 29-14 advantage. However, the Deacons responded with a 16-6 run of their own to pull to within four points at halftime, as Maryland took a 35-31 lead into the locker room.

Maryland never trailed the game and gradually pulled away in the second half behind excellent three-point shooting. A 22-6 run, capped off by a three-pointer from Fisher, gave the Terrapins a 23-point advantage and their largest lead of the game, 70-47, with 4:27 left to play in the game. The best three-point shooting team in the ACC, the Terps shot over 40 percent from behind the arc for the game.

Terp freshman Kalika France (Forestville, Md./Bishop McNamara) also helped out offensively, contributing nine points, five rebounds and two steals.

Maryland's defense kept each of the Demon Deacon scorers under 10 points, and limited WFU to 32 percent from the field. The Terps also dominated the boards, outrebounding Wake Forest by a 48-39 margin.

Jones led Wake Forest with nine points, while Erin Ferrell had eight points and five rebounds.

Maryland 76, Florida State 67

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Sophomore Chrissy Fisher made five free throws in the final 29 seconds, sealing the Maryland women's basketball team's 76-67 victory over ACC foe Florida State on Thursday night at Comcast Center. Fisher ended the evening with 15 points and was one rebound shy of a double-double, hauling down nine.

Maryland improved to 15-8 overall and 7-5 in the ACC. With one more win, the Terps clinch a .500 record in conference play for the first time since the 2000-01 season. They currently stand alone in third place in the ACC, a game ahead of NC State who is 6-6 in conference play after defeating Clemson Thursday night, 76-55. The Seminoles drop to 12-11 and 5-7 in conference action.

As it had against Wake Forest on Monday night, Maryland jumped out to a big lead early on, using a 16-4 run to go ahead 25-11.

Freshman Kalika France (Forestville, Md./Bishop McNamara) scored nine of her team-high 16 points during that span. But FSU charged back with a 17-6 run of their own, including scoring the final six points of the half, trailing just 34-31 at the break.

The Seminoles scored the first two points of the second half on free throws from Lauren Bradley, coming to within 34-33. The Terps briefly lost the lead after pushing the advantage back up to a five-point margin as Florida State's Shante Williams assisted on the ensuing two baskets then swished a jumper putting her team ahead for the first time, 39-38. With 15:00 left in the game, Maryland regained the lead on freshman Shay Doron's (Great Neck, N.Y./Christ the King) layup. Doron went on to tally 10 of her team-high 16 points, tying with France, over the next eight minutes.

Clinging to a one-point lead at 54-53 with 5:22 left to play in the game, the Terps outscored FSU 12-2 over the next three and a half minutes, stretching their lead to 66-55. Florida State would not go away, however, using fouls to get to within 69-66 with 34 seconds remaining. Fisher's 5-for-6 shooting from the charity stripe and two free throws from France iced the win in the final 29 ticks.

France also added seven rebounds to her 16 points. Senior Crystal Washington (Clinton, Md./Bishop McNamara) posted the fourth double-double of her career and of the season, netting 12 points and grabbing a career-high tying 11 rebounds. Senior Delvona Oliver (Euclid, Ohio/Euclid) was a bucket away from a double-double, notching eight points and 10 boards.

Led by the dominating performances of Washington and Oliver, the Terps outrebounded FSU, 48-36. Maryland is 14-0 when outrebounding its opponent.

Bradley paced the Seminole attack, recording a double-double with 18 points and 10 rebounds. Williams added 15, while Taskeika Allen had 14 points.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Alana Beard led Duke with 24 points and 10 rebounds and the Blue Devils clinched its fourth straight Atlantic Coast Conference regular-season title, defeating Maryland 72-59.

Monique Currie scored 14 points, Mistie Bass added 12 and Lindsey Harding had seven assists and 10 rebounds for the Blue Devils (22-3, 13-1), who have won five straight. Duke beat Maryland for the eighth straight time and 11th in 12 games.

It was not easy, though.

Maryland used a sagging man-to-man defense and a zone that pushed the ball to the perimeter, forcing Duke into low-percentage outside shots. The Blue Devils made 41.7 percent (28-of-67) from the field, but coach Gail Goetsenkos wanted to see more shots go down.

"We've been shooting it well and we had confidence in our shot," Goetsenkos said. "Today they just weren't falling."

Beard missed nine of 16 shots from the field and three of four 3-point attempts, but Maryland could not slow her down.

"How does anyone stop her?" Terrapins coach Brenda Frese said of Beard. "She does so many things. She obviously hurt us on the glass."

The Terrapins (15-11, 7-8) got 16 points from Delvona Oliver.

Kalika France scored 13 of her 15 points in the second half.

The crowd of 13,446 at Comcast Center was the second-largest in ACC women's basketball history.

Beard scored 12 first-half points and Duke used a 15-0 run midway through the half to take a 38-21 lead at the break. Maryland missed its first five shots from the field and finished the opening half 8-for-28.

Oliver had six points in a 14-7 run that trimmed Duke's lead to 53-41 with 11:45 remaining. France scored nine straight points to get Maryland to 57-50 with 7:36 left.

But Currie hit consecutive field goals for an 11-point lead.

Chrissy Fisher made a 3 get Maryland to 66-59 with 2:16 left, but Vicki Krapohl responded with a 3.

"In the first half, I don't think they played their game," Beard said. "In the second half, they came out and played an awesome game."

Maryland 80, Clemson 69

CLEMSON, S.C. - Maryland freshman Kalika France netted seven free throws in the final two minutes and had 21 for the game as Maryland clinched the fourth seed in the ACC Tournament with an 80-69 victory at Clemson. The Terps even their conference record to 8-8, tying or surpassing their ACC win total from nine of the last 10 years.

France also had nine rebounds and six assists in 37 minutes. She made a career-high 11-13 free throws in the game, many down the stretch when Clemson had reduced an 18-point margin to seven.

Freshman Shay Doron added 13 points, all in the second half. Senior Delvona Oliver made her first five shots of the game, including 2-for-2 from behind the arc for 12 first-half points. She ended the game with 14 points.

Clemson shot 45 percent from the game, better than the 42.6 percent by Maryland. The two teams were tied in terms of rebounding at 40-40. But, Maryland made 8-23 three-point attempts, while Clemson made just 3-10. The Terps entered the game as the top three-point shooting team in the ACC.

Free throw shooting and turnovers were also trouble areas for Clemson, who lost to Maryland for the second time this year. Clemson entered the game as the ACC's top free throw shooting team, but made just 16-31 on Sunday, 51.6 percent. Clemson committed 18 turnovers and forced just 11, as Maryland had 20 assists on 23 made field goals. Maryland entered the game leading the ACC in most turnovers committed per game, but had the +7 margin on Sunday.

Clemson jumped out to a 20-13 lead in the first 7:33 of the game as the Lady Tigers made 6 of their first 12 shots from the field and forced Maryland into four early turnovers.

Maryland then turned a seven-point deficit into an eight-point lead with 4:40 left in the first half. The Terps never trailed thereafter. The 19-4 run was keyed by the play of Oliver, who scored seven points during the run. Maryland led 39-29 at halftime.

Maryland increased its margin to 18 points at 63-45 with seven minutes remaining. But Stokes started to score on drives to the basket. She scored 11-straight points for the Lady Tigers at one point and cut the margin to seven points at 69-62 with 1:45 left. A three-point goal by Whitehurst with 50 seconds left cut the lead to seven again at 74-67, but Clemson could not get any closer. France made 7-8 free throws inside the last two minutes to preserve the victory for Maryland.

GREENSBORO, N.C. - Shay Doron scored 16 points to lead the University of Maryland women's basketball team over Florida State in the opening round of the ACC Tournament, 62-47, Saturday night at the Greensboro Coliseum. The Terrapins advance to the tournament semifinal face top-seeded Duke.

Doron, a third-team All-ACC selection, led the Terrapins (17-11) to their first ACC Tournament quarterfinal victory since 1998. Doron grabbed four rebounds to go with her 16 points, while senior Crystal Washington posted her fifth double-double of the season with 11 points and 10 rebounds.

Doron gave Maryland its first lead of the game at the 16:45 mark, draining a jumper from the free throw line to put the Terps up, 5-4. From there, the Terrapins never trailed again, as they scored the game's next 11 points.

The Terps continued to pull away, as two free throws from senior Delvona Oliver, who finished with 12 points and eight rebounds, at 2:51 gave Maryland its largest lead of the first half, 30-15. A three-pointer by Tashaika Allen and a jumper by Lauren Bradley gave Florida State (14-14) a late first-half spurt, but Maryland took a 33-22 advantage into the locker room at halftime.

Maryland, which outrebounded Florida State, 51-36, continued to dominate in the second half, stretching its lead to 20, 46-26, on a junior Anesia Smith lay up at the 10-minute mark, before Florida State went on a 14-4 run to cut the lead to 10 with just over four minutes to play. Smith also had a game-high nine assists, tying a career best.

Head coach Brenda Frese's squad would regroup, however, and answered with a 10-2 spurt to stretch the lead back to 18 with 1:09 left to play. Doron, who was 7-9 from the free throw line, scored five points from the charity stripe to seal the victory for Maryland.

Florida State's Lauren Bradley was the only Seminole in double digits with 10 points, as Maryland limited Tashaika Allen, a second-team All-ACC performer, to seven points on 3-of-14 shooting.

GREENSBORO, N.C. - In front of a nationally televised audience, the Terps dropped a heartbreaking loss to top-seeded Duke, 70-63, in the semifinal of the ACC Tournament in Greensboro Coliseum. Maryland led by as many as eight points in the second half and was ahead, 48-41, with 11:10 remaining in the game, but could not pull off the upset at the Blue Devils rallied to win the game.

Doron scored 19 points for the fourth-seeded Terrapins (17-12) and senior Delvona Oliver added 15 points and eight rebounds.

Maryland trailed 7-0 to open the game, but Doron scored the Terps' first five points of the game and a jumper from freshman Aurelie Noirez brought the UM to within 9-7.

The Terps never trailed by more than seven points in the half. A close game throughout, Maryland came to within a couple of points on several occasions before finally taking the lead on an Oliver jumper with 53 seconds remaining in the period, 29-27. Duke trailed at the half for only the fifth time all season.

But the Blue Devils' tournament experience soon came through. Trailing by three, Duke scored on nine straight possessions - many on drives to the basket - to take the lead.

The Blue Devils went ahead to stay when Beard found Mistie Bass inside on a pick-and-roll for a 54-53 lead at the 5:40 mark.

Duke also went 6-for-6 from the line during its run.

In the final six minutes, the Terrapins, who were making their first semifinal appearance in six years, missed two key free throws after a 12-for-12 start.

The Terps outrebounded the Blue Devils, 38-37. It is only the third time this season UM has lost a game in which it outrebounded its opponent.
