- Shay Doron was named to the six-member Kodak/WBCA Region II All-America team, the first Terp in 12 years to earn the honor and is the ninth player in school history to garner the award.
- Shay Doron broke the single-season free throw record, a record she owned. She has made 144 freebies this season. Her 553 points this year are the fifth-most all-time at Maryland and is the sophomore-class record.
- Senior Anesia Smith's 210 assists are third-most in school history and is more than her three-year total (202) coming into the 2004-05 campaign.
- Freshman Crystal Langhorne's 324 boards are the second-most single-season total in school history and are a Maryland freshman class record. Her 527 points are a Maryland freshman class record and are among the top-10 single-season point totals.
- Crystal Langhorne was named ACC Rookie of the Year, the fourth Terp in school history to earn the honor. She was a unanimous selection to the ACC All-Freshman team. It is the third-straight season at least one Terp has been voted to the all-rookie squad.
- Sophomore Shay Doron (first team) and Crystal Langhorne (second team) were named to the All-ACC team. It is the most selections for Maryland since 1999-2000.
- Maryland's 73.0 points per game is the team's highest scoring average since 1992-93. The Terps rank in the top 15 in the nation in scoring and are third in the ACC. Sophomore Shay Doron's 17.8 ppg is currently tied for the sixth-highest single-season average in school history. Crystal Langhorne's 17.0 ppg is among the top 10 all-time.
- Freshman Crystal Langhorne's 10.5 rebounding average is currently the third-best single-season average in school history. The Terps' 42.6 rebounding average is the most since 1979-80.
- ► The Terps have had at least three double-digit scorers in all but six games and a 10+ rebounder 24 times.

### TERPS MOVE ON TO SECOND ROUND AT COMCAST

- Seventh-seeded Maryland moved onto the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the second-straight year after a win over No. 24/21 UW-Green Bay at Comcast Center on Sunday. The Terps face secondseeded and 8/7-ranked Ohio State on Tuesday, March 22 at approximately 9:30 p.m., following the DePaul-Libertygame which tips at 7 p.m. Both games will air on ESPN2.
- Tuesday's game pits to of the top underclassmen post players in the nation in Terrapin freshman Crystal Langhorne and Bukeye sophomore Jessica Davenport. The ACC's Rookie of the Year, Langhorne is averaging a double-double with 17.0 ppg and 10.5 rpg. Davenport is OSU's leading scorer and rebounder with 19.4 ppg and 9.8 rpg.
- The Terps recorded NCAA Tournament wins in back-to-back years for the first time since 1989 and 1990 and are looking for their first Sweet Sixteen appearance since 1992. Posting its 22nd win of the season, it is the most games Maryland has won in a season since winning 22 in 1992-93.

#### **LAST TIME OUT**

 Seventh-seeded Maryland topped 10th-seeded and 21st-ranked UW-Green Bay, 65-55, in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. Sophomore Shay Doron scored an NCAA Tournament career high 26 points, going 9-for-18 from the field. Playing in her first NCAA Tournament game, freshman Crystal Langhorne posted her 17th double-double of the season, tallying 16 points and 10 boards.

- With the victory, the Terps advance to the second round for the second-straight year. Not since 1989 and 1990 has Maryland posted NCAA Tournament wins in back-to-back years.
- The victory was also head coach Brenda Frese's 50th at Maryland. Freshman Crystal Langhorne broke the freshman class rebounding record (she already owns the class scoring record), grabbing 326 on the year, which is also the second-highest rebounding total in school history. Sophomore Shay Doron moved into the top five on the single-season points chart (553).

#### **TERPS IN THE POLLS**

- Maryland was ranked in the Associated Press top 25 for 17-consecutive weeks before falling out of the poll last week. It is the longest the Terps have appeared among the nation's top 25 since going 34-straight weeks from 1991-92 through the 1992-93 campaigns. The Terps spent 16 weeks in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll, the longest stretch since spending two-consecutive seasons in the poll from 1991-92 to 1992-93. This week, Maryland is receiving votes in both rankings.
- Seven Maryland opponents are featured in this week's polls. LSU is the second-ranked team in the nation in the Associated Press Poll and ACC Champion North Carolina is ranked second in the Coaches Poll. ACC-foe Duke is among the top 10 while NC State is in the top 20 in the AP poll and ranked 22nd in the Coaches Poll. ACC opponents Florida State and

Virginia, and Pac-10 opponent Arizona are receiving votes in both polls.

- After upsetting its first top-five opponent since 1992-93 when it defeated North Carolina, Maryland made the second-largest leap in the Associated Press poll the week of Jan. 10, jumping six spots from No. 21 to No.
- The Terps have posted a 22-9 record this season with all nine of their losses coming to teams who are or have been ranked at some point in the season and earned NCAA Tournament bids.
- The No. 15 national ranking earlier this season was the highest for the Terps since earning a No. 11 final ranking at the end of the 1992-93 season.
- On Dec. 20, Maryland was ranked in the top 20 in both the AP and Coaches poll for the first time since the week of Dec. 27, 1993. That was also the last year the Terps were featured in the top 20 in either poll prior to this season

#### **ACC IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT**

ACC squads are 5-2 in the 2005 NCAA Tournament, with top-seeded North Carolina, No. 2-seed Duke, sixthseeded Virginia, sixth-seeded Florida State and seventh-seeded Maryland each winning its first round games.



Fifth-seeded NC State was upset in the first round by No. 12 seeded Middle Tennessee State, while No. 12 seed Virginia Tech's comeback fell short, 79-78.

The ACC has garnered just one NCAA Champion in the history of the league, with North Carolina capturing
the 1994 crown. At least four ACC teams have participated in the NCAA Tournament in each of the last 11
years, including this season. An ACC team has been awarded 10 No. 1 seeds in the history of the
tournament, including the last five seasons.

#### **TERPS IN THE ACC TOURNAMENT**

- Maryland is making its 14th overall NCAA Tournament appearance and its second-straight, the first time since 1992 and 1993 the Terps will be making back-to-back tournament appearances. Only 18 teams in the this year's tournament have made more appearances.
- In 14 appearances, Maryland has posted a 14-13 record all-time. The Terps have reached the Final Four twice (1982 and 1989), while making four Elite Eight and five Sweet Sixteen appearances.
- The Terps have earned a top-four seed seven times, garnering a No. 1 seed in 1989. Maryland was tabbed a No. 2 seed four times and a No. 3 seed twice. Maryland's No. 7 seed this season is the first for the program.
- The Terps' first-round win over Miami, 86-85, in 2004 was the first NCAA Tournament victory for the program since 1992.

#### TERPS BREAK ATTEN-DANCE RECORD

The Terps broke the all-time ACC women's basketball attendance record, drawing 17,243 fans on Feb. 13, 2005 when Maryland hosted Duke. A near sell-

out, the Terps broke its own record which it set on Feb. 11, 1992.

The attendance mark is also the fourth-largest this season and one of three games in the top 15 that doesn't feature traditional powers Tennessee or Connecticut.

Maryland now holds the top three attendance marks in ACC women's basketball history. A then-Comcast Center record 13,446 fans came out to watch the Terps play the Blue Devils last season on Feb. 22, 2004.

#### **SERIES VS. OHIO STATE**

• The Terps and the Buckeyes have met twice before, each winning a game. Both meetings came in the NCAA Tournament. In 1986, third-seeded Ohio State topped sixth-seeded Maryland, 87-71, in Columbus, Ohio, in the second round of the tournament. The Terps repaid the favor, defeating the Buckeyes, 81-66, in the 1988 Sweet Sixteen in Athens, Ga. Maryland's all-time leading scorer, Vicky Bullett, scored 33 points in the win, going 14-for-18 from the floor.

#### TERPS "D" UP

- The focus has been defense for this young Maryland squad who is advancing to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the second-consecutive season. Turning up their defensive intensity in the postseason, the Terps are limiting opponents to under 56 points in three of its last four games going 3-1 over that span. In those three victories, opponents have shot .352 from the field and a mere .186 from behind the arc, compared to .395 and .314, respectively, in 31 game this season.
- Entering the tournament, the Terps were sixth in the ACC in field goal percentage defense and ninth in 3-pt field goal percentage defense.

#### **LANGHORNE ON A TEAR**

- Something seemed to "click" after freshman Crystal Langhorne posted a 29-point, 22-rebound outing on Feb. 17. After that game, she went on to record five-straight double-doubles, ending that streak in the ACC Tournament semifinals. Averaging 23.2 ppg and 15.5 rpg over those six games, she scored at least 19 points in five times and grabbed at least 16 rebounds four times.
- That stretch of six games also included a record-setting 33-point outing vs. Northern Colorado and back-to-back 20+ point and 16-rebound games at the ACC Tournament.
- In her last eight games, Langhorne has averaged 20.8 ppg and 13.5 rpg.

#### **ON THE OFFENSIVE**

- Maryland's scoring is up. Way up! The Terps are averaging 73.0 points per game this season, currently the highest scoring average since 1992-93. Not only is that fourth-best in the ACC, but it also ranks 14th nationally (as of March 5).
- Sophomore Shay Doron is one of the reasons the team scoring average is up 4.6 points per game from last season. Her 17.8 ppg would rank in a tie for sixth in the Maryland single-season record books, while Crystal Langhorne's 17.0 ppg would among the top 10 all-time.
- Since head coach Brenda Frese has taken over the Maryland helm three years ago, fans have seen the Terps' scoring improve from 63.2 ppg in 2001-02. In her first season, Maryland averaged 67.4 ppg and last year, it was averaging 68.4 ppg.

#### **YOUNG STUDS**

Shouldering the bulk of the scoring load a year ago (36.2 percent), sophomores Shay Doron and Kalika France are, once again, leading the team's scoring efforts. With the addition of freshman Crystal Langhorne, the Maryland trio is responsible for a large portion of the team's points and rebounding. In the upset of then-No. 5/4 North Carolina. Doron, France and Langhorne combined for 76 of the team's 92 points, one point less than UNC scored.

#### PICKING UP THE SLACK

- With the departure of Laura Harper, the Terrapin post players have had to step up to make up for the 13 points and nearly 10 rebounds per game Harper was contributing. It has been a team effort to make up for the loss, with classmate Crystal Langhorne and sophomore Shay Doron taking on a bulk of the load.
- In Maryland's first four games without Harper, Langhorne posted fourstraight 20-point games, averaging 23 ppg and 9.3 rpg in that span and has been averaging 18.5 ppg and 12.0 rpg since Harper has been out of the lineup (22 games). Langhorne leads

the ACC in rebounding with 10.5 rpg and is among the top five in scoring

Doron has contributed 18.6 ppg and grabbed 4.7 rpg in the last 22 games, reaching the 30-point mark twice and grabbing at least five boards 10 times.

- Sophomore Kalika France has joined with Langhorne to help in the rebounding responsibilities, averaging 5.1 rpg since Harper has been sidelined to go along with 10.1 ppg.
- Another freshman, Jade Perry, has stepped into the starting position in place of the injured Harper. She has averaged 5.5 ppg and 4.0 rpg since stepping into the starting lineup, including an eight-point, nine-rebound outing in her NCAA Tournament debut vs. UW-Green Bay.

### THAT 70s SHOW

The Terps are also 18-2 when netting 80 or more points under Frese and 7-1 when scoring at least 90 points since Frese has been at the helm, dropping its first 90-point game in three years at Florida State on Jan. 16, 2005, 95-91 in overtime.

### WINS VS. RANKED OPPONENTS

- Maryland recorded its 90th win (since 1976-77; based on AP poll) over a ranked opponent when it upset then-No. 5/4 North Carolina on Sunday, 92-77, and has 92 victories all-time after defeating ranked-opponent NC State in the ACC Tournament quarterfinals and UW-Green Bay in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. Of those 92 wins, 22 came against top-10 teams. In the history of the program, the Terps have also claimed wins against top five teams 13 times. Prior to its win over UNC, the Terps had not defeated a top-five foe since topping then-No. 1 Tennessee, 77-72, during the 1992-93 season.
- Of those wins, the Terps were also ranked in 66 of those games. Maryland's only win over a top-five team while unranked was an 81-80 upset over No. 3 NC State on Jan. 26, 1991.

The winners of both second-round NCAA Tournament games move onto the Sweet Sixteen. The winner of the Terps-Buckeyes matchup heads to Philadelphia on March 27 and 29, while the winner of the DePaul-Liberty game travels to Chattanooga for the Sweet Sixteen.

#### LANGHORNE ACC ROOKIE OF THE YEAR

Maryland's Crystal Langhorne was voted the ACC's Women's Basketball Rookie of the Year, the league announced today. Earning 64 of the 74 votes, she is the fourth Terrapin in school history to earn the major award and the first since 1991. The award is voted on by 74 members of the Atlantic Coast Sports Writers Association (ACSWA).

The only player in the ACC to average a double-double, Langhorne (Willingboro, N.J./Willingboro) is fifth in the conference in scoring (16.8) and is the conference's leading rebounder with 10.3 rpg. She is the first freshman in the league to average a double-double since Wake Forest's Tracy Connor in 1993.

Langhorne, who was the first Terrapin to be named Preseason ACC Rookie of the Year has been impressive all season. Sixth in the nation and first in the conference with 14 double-doubles, she has had eight 20+ point games and 15 10+ rebounding games this season. In the win at Miami on Feb. 17, she had 29 points and 22 rebounds to lead the Terps. Langhorne was one rebound shy of the school record and the first Terp in 25 years to grab 20 boards. She also became one of just two players in the nation to post a 20-point, 20-rebound game and is the only freshman.

In just her first season, Langhorne's numbers are among the best in school history. In the Terps' final regular season game on Feb. 28, she scored 33 points, breaking Maryland's freshman class single-game mark. Her 277 rebounds are the sixth-highest single-season total all-time at Maryland, her 10.3 rpg is fourth-best, her 16.8 ppg is among the top 10 best averages in school history and her 453 points is one point away from the top 15.

Langhorne was named ACC Rookie of the Week a school-record five times this season, the most for any ACC freshman this year. Earlier this week, she was voted second team All-ACC, garnering 42 first team votes, the most for any rookie in the league. She was also a unanimous selection to the ACC's All-Freshman squad
