TERPS WIN FIRST NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

Making their first trip to the Final Four since 1989 and the first-ever under head coach Brenda Frese, the Maryland women's basketball team won its first-ever national championship with a 78-75 overtime win. The Terrapins won the title with one junior, two sophomores and two freshmen in the starting lineup.

The overtime game was just the second in NCAA history and first since 1991. Frese became the third-youngest coach in the history of the sport to win a national title and the ninth coach to win it all in her first trip to the Final Four, and the second coach in as many years to walk away with the title in her first Final Four appearance.

The Terps were the third-straight No. 2 seed to capture the title and the sixth overall.

Maryland is the fourth school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's national titles. The Terrapin men captured the crown in 2001. The other double winners are Connecticut, North Carolina and Stanford.

HISTORIC COMEBACK!

Despite trailing 13 points with just under 15 minutes remaining in the second half, the Terps rallied back to win the program's first-ever NCAA crown, tying the second-largest comeback in NCAA Tournament history.

Louisiana Tech set the record of overcoming a 14-point deficit during the 1988 championship, defeating Auburn, and Southern California came back from being down 13 points in 1983 to defeat La. Tech in 1983.

HARPER NAMED FINAL FOUR MOP

After playing just nine games of her freshman season and being forced to sit out the majority of the 2004-05 campaign because of an Achilles' tendon tear, sophomore Laura Harper was named the 2006 NCAA Final Four Most Outstanding Player. Harper averaged 20.0 points and 8.0 rebounds per game in Boston, leading the Terps to their biggest two victories in school history.

Freshman Kristi Toliver was also selected to the all-tournament team. Toliver averaged 15.0 points per game in the semifinal and championship games, hitting a three-pointer over Duke's 6-7 Alison Bales, one of the most memorable shots in the history of the tournament, sending the title game into overtime.

MUST SEE TV

Maryland's 78-75 overtime victory over Duke drew a 3.1 overnight television rating, up 19 percent from the previous year. Nearly 2.8 million households tuned in to watch the Terrapins capture their first-ever national title.

MARYLAND RANKED NO. 1

After winning the 2006 national championship, Maryland was ranked No. 1 atop the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll, the first time in the school history the Terps ended the season ranked No. 1. It was also only the second time in the history

of the program the Terps had finished the campaign in the top five in the poll.

Maryland's No. 3 final ranking by the Associated Press was the first time since 1992-93 it has appeared in the final AP ranking and is the highest final rating since 1981-82, when it was also rated No. 3. The Terps have appeared in the AP's final poll 13 times since 1977 and has been among the top five three times including 2006. The Terps were also among the top five to finish the 1988-89 season, ranking No. 5.

The final AP poll is released every year prior to the start of the NCAA Tournament, while the final coaches poll is released the day after the national championship game.

LANGHORNE FIRST ALL-AMERICAN IN 17 YEARS

The United States Basketball Writers Association (USBWA) and the Associated Press both selected sophomore Crystal Langhorne to its All-American squad, the program's first All-American since 1989. Langhorne led the nation in field goal percentage (67.0 percent) and the team with 17.2 points and 8.6 rebounds per game, while leading the Terps to their first trip to the Final Four in 17 years and the program's first national championship title. The AP named Langhorne to its second team.

Only four other players in the history of the program have earned All-American status. Former greats Vicky Bullett (1989), Jasmina Perazic (1983) and Deanna Tate (1989) were selected Kodak All-American, while Debbie Lytle was an AWSI All-American in 1982.

TERPS LEAD THE NATION

At the end of the season, Maryland led the nation in two statistical categories. Its 40.0 shooting percentage from three-point range, three percentage points under the school record, and its 11.9 rebounding margin were both the best in the country.

The Terps also ranked among the top five in the nation in four other categories. Its 83.3 points per game were second in the nation, while also posting the fifth-best scoring margin (+18.3 ppg) and field goal shooting percentage (47.8 percent). Maryland's 89.5 percent winning percentage was also the fourth-best in the nation.

Maryland dished out 17.2 assists per game which ranked ninth in the nation.

25 YEARS: THEN AND NOW

The NCAA celebrated 25 years of women's championships during the 2005-06 campaign and Maryland was the only team to reach the 2006 Final Four to have also played in the inaugural Final Four in 1982.

Under the guidance of legendary coach Chris Weller, the Terrapins reached the first-ever NCAA Tournament Final Four, along with Tennessee, Louisiana Tech and Cheyney. Current Terrapins head coach Brenda Frese was about to celebrate her 12th birthday the year the first-ever NCAA women's championship took place.

LANGHORNE VOTED ALBUQUERQUE REGION MOP

After leading the Terps past defending NCAA Champion Baylor in the Sweet Sixteen and squeaking by Utah in the Elite Eight, Crystal Langhorne was selected the regional's Most Outstanding Player, after posting double-doubles in both games.

Freshman Kristi Toliver was selected to the all-region tournament team after delivering an inspirational performance in the Elite Eight, scoring a career-high 28 points on 6-of-9 three pointers, also career bests, despite a stomach virus. She also had six assists and just one turnover in the contest.

OVERTIME IS OUR TIME

The most intriguing statistic of the 2005-06 campaign were the six overtime games the Terrapins played in during the course of the 38-game season. Even more intriguing was that Maryland, who had previously only played two overtime games in a season and never won more than one, won all six of those contests, all of them coming on the road or at a neutral site. Among the most memorable overtime victories of the season were the 98-95 win at Carmichael Auditorium over then-No. 1 North Carolina; the 75-65 victory over Utah in the Elite Eight; and the 78-75 win over ACC-rival Duke in the final game of the season to claim the NCAA crown.

COLEMAN NABS ACC ROOKIE OF THE YEAR HONORS

Earning 61 of 70 votes, Marissa Coleman was named the ACC's Rookie of the Year, the second-straight year a Terrapin has earned the award. Coleman was a five-time Rookie of the Week, tying the school record set the season before by Crystal Langhorne. She was the second-highest scoring rookie in the league, while leading all freshmen in rebounding and blocks. She was also ranked in seven different statistical categories among all players in the ACC.

Coleman was the fifth player in school history to earn ACC Rookie of the Year nods. Following in the footsteps of 2005 Rookie of the Year Crystal Langhorne, it was the first time since 1987 and 1988 that a pair of Terps garnered the award in back-to-back years.

THREE TERPS NAMED TO ALL-ACC SQUAD

For the first time in 17 years, three Terrapins were selected to the All-ACC squad, led by sophomore Crystal Langhorne's first team selection. Junior Shay Doron and freshman Marissa Coleman were both named to the second team. Coleman was the only freshman to be named All-ACC.

Langhorne garnered all-conference nods for the second-straight year, while Doron became the second player in school history to earn All-ACC honors three times. Coleman is only the third freshman in the program to be awarded all-conference distinction, following Doron and Langhorne's appointment during their freshmen campaigns.

Coleman was also selected to the ACC All-Freshman team, along with teammate Kristi Toliver, making it the fourth-consecutive year at least one Terrapin has been named to the team.

TERPS SET RECORD FOR WINS; BREAK OTHER MARKS

With its second-round NCAA Tournament victory, the Terps won their school-record 30th win of the season, en route to setting the mark at 34 wins. The 34 victories are the most by a Maryland basketball team, men's or women's.

Maryland also set numerous marks during its record-breaking season. The 38 games played were the most ever, while its 15 home victories also topped the previous record of 13 set in 1987-88. The Terps broke the school's free throw mark (690), free throws attempted (924) and free throw percentage (.747), topping marks set more than a decade ago. Its 540 three-point attempts are the most ever in a season, so were its 216 three-pointers made. Its 195

rejections in 2005-06 crushed the old record of 155 set 26 years ago.

The oldest record the team broke was the school's scoring record. The Terrapins netted over 3,000 points for the first time in school history (3,166), breaking a 28-year old mark.

LANGHORNE A WOODEN AWARD FINALIST

Sophomore Crystal Langhorne was one of 18 student-athletes who were placed on the final voting ballot for the John R. Wooden Award, presented to the nation's top women's collegiate player, and the Wooden All-American team.

Langhorne was a preseason and midseason candidate before being placed on the final ballot. Junior Shay Doron was also a preseason candidate for the award. Both were also selected candidates for the Wade Trophy Award, the Women's Basketball Coaches Association national player of the year.

MILLENNIUM MOMENTS

Two Terrapins reached the 1,000-point plateau this season, each breaking records. Junior Shay Doron was the fastest Terp to score 1,000 points, reaching the mark in her 64th-career game (vs. Xavier) and breaking the previous mark of 68 games set by Deanna Tate in 1988. Doron was also the 21st player to reach the milestone, the first Terp since 2003 to join the exclusive club.

The 22nd member came just 26 games later when teammate sophomore Crystal Langhorne netted her 1,000th-career point. Langhorne also broke Doron's record of fastest Terp to reach the milestone, needing only 60 games herself.

Doron and Langhorne are two of only three players in school history to register two 500-point seasons in their careers. Only Vicky Bullett was the only other Terrapin to accomplish that feat.

LOUNDONVILLE, N.Y. - Six players scored in double figures as the 14th-ranked Maryland women's basketball team opened the 2005-06 season with a 107-66 win at Siena Loudonville, N.Y. The Terps' national player of the year candidate Shay Doron led a high-powered offense, which shot 65 percent from the field, with 23 points.

Maryland (1-0) had two decisive runs in the first half to put the game away early. Ahead 30-16, the Terps scored the next 12 points, capped by a three-point play by sophomore Laura Harper, to jump ahead, 42-16, with 7:35 remaining in the half. A 9-2 run a minute later gave Maryland its biggest lead of the half, 54-22.

Siena (0-1), who was hosting its first ACC team in program history, tried to put together a run of its own before the end of the half, scoring nine of the next 11 points beginning with a couple of free throws from Naimah Abdullah with 2:49 remaining. However, freshman Kristi Toliver silenced the crowd, knocking down her second three-pointer with just six seconds left on the clock, to make the halftime score, 59-31.

In the second half, the Terps continued to dominate the game, on offense and on the boards. Maryland outrebounded the Saints, 42-20, on the evening. The Saints also cooled off in the second half. After shooting 45.8 percent from the floor in the first 20 minutes, they shot just 32 percent in the second.

The Terrapin lead never dipped below 24 points after the first half and remained above 31 after a freshman Marissa Coleman layup with 9:22 left in the game, 80-49. Maryland broke 100 points on the first of two free throws by senior Charmaine Carr with just over two minutes to go in the contest.

The Terps, who shot just 32 percent from behind the three-point arc last season, were 6-for-10 on three pointers in the first half, finishing the game shooting 58.3 percent on 7-for-12 shooting.

Doron was 9-for-14 from the field, including 2-for-4 on three pointers. She also had a team-leading seven assists and four steals. Doron needs just 10 points to reach 1,000 for her career. Toliver had six assists to go with her 16 points. Coleman netted 13 of her 16 points in the second period and had a game-high three blocks in the game.

National player of the year candidate sophomore Crystal Langhorne had just four points up until the final five minutes of the game, and got hot down the stretch, tallying nine more to finish with 13 points to go with 10 rebounds.

Sophomore Ashleigh Newman, who was making her first-career start, and Harper each added 11 to round out the double-digit scorers. Newman connected on both her three-point attempts.

Every dressed Terrapin scored in the game. The 107 points scored is the most since a 107-51 win over Towson on Nov. 30, 1991.

The 3,780 fans at the Alumni Recreation Center was a Siena record.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Shay Doron scored 23 points to lead No. 14 Maryland to a 93-68 victory over Xavier in its home opener at Comcast Center.

A national player of the year candidate, Doron scored her 1,000th point for the Terrapins (2-0), reaching the milestone faster than any player in school history. She needed only 64 games to reach the milestone, becoming the 21st player in school history to surpass the mark.

After missing five of their first seven shots, Xavier (1-1) took a 10-6 lead. A 19-0 run erased the Musketeers' lead as they went more than six minutes without a field goal, shooting just 39 percent from the floor in the first half.

With eight minutes remaining in the first half, Doron hit a three-pointer to record her 1,000th point, making the score 30-14. Freshman Marissa Coleman's jumper with 3:20 left in the period, pushed the lead to 20 points for the first time, 41-21. The teams traded baskets in the final minutes of the half and the Terps led, 48-29, at the break.

Maryland was even more dominant in the second half, improving its shooting to 57 percent. A 13-5 run to open the period gave the Terps their biggest lead of the game, 63-34. The Musketeers could not get within 20 points thereafter.

For the second-straight game, every Terrapin in uniform netted at least a bucket, with four players reaching double-digits.

Doron finished 8-of-15 from the floor, including 3-of-5 from 3-point range. She also had a team-high of seven boards, tying with sophomore Laura Harper. Kristi Toliver added 16 points, freshman Marissa Coleman had 14, and sophomore Crystal Langhorne, also a national player of the year candidate, added 13.

Suntana Granderson had 20 points and Tara Boothe added 16 for Xavier (1-1).

The Terrapins outrebounded the Musketeers, 48-28, and shot 51 percent from the floor.

Doron needed only 64 games for 1,000 points, becoming the 21st player to surpass the mark at Maryland. Dena Tate scored 1,000 points in her 68th game.

Doron made three 3-pointers and sparked a balanced attack for Maryland that saw five Terrapins score in double figures. Sophomore Ashleigh Newman scored 14 points, freshman Marissa Coleman had 13, while sophomores Laura Harper and Crystal Langhorne added 10 each. Langhorne also grabbed a game-high 12 boards.

In the first meeting between the teams, 2005 NCAA Finalist Michigan State (2-2) took control early on. After the Terps scored the first point of the game, the Spartans scored the next eight-straight to take an 8-1 lead, forcing Terrapin head coach Brenda Frese to call a timeout at 18:36.

Coming out of the timeout, Doron knocked down a three-pointer to cut the lead in half. But MSU answered with a 10-3 run, going in front, 18-7, with 10:17 remaining in the half. Despite shooting 13 percent in the first 10 minutes, connecting on 2-of-15 shots from the floor, the Terps stuck with their shots and eventually they began to fall.

For the rest of the half, Maryland went 6-for-12 from the field, outscoring the Spartans 22-15, cutting the deficit to 33-29 at the break. In the final seconds, Doron drove down the lane and dished off to sophomore Jade Perry on the baseline and Perry hit a layup to cap the scoring heading into the locker room.

Maryland scored the first four points of the second half to take its first lead, 34-33, since leading, 1-0, to start the game. However,

MSU had a 5-0 run to take a 40-34 lead. After a Newman fastbreak layup to cut the deficit to two, Coleman scored Maryland's next 11 points to tie the game at 49-49.

Freshman Kristi Toliver traded jumpers with All-Big Ten performer Lindsay Bowen before Doron's trey at 8:19 put Maryland ahead for good at 54-51.

Michigan State came to within one point twice, at 54-53 and then again at 56-55, but a 9-0 run over two minutes gave Maryland its first double-digit cushion, 65-55, with 4:14 remaining in the game. Maryland's final bucket of the game was a sophomore Crystal Langhorne layup at 4:14. But the Terps went 10-for-10 from the charity stripe down the stretch to seal the victory.

The Terps shot 55.6 percent from the field in the second half and 42.6 percent for the game. Harper also had four blocks.

MSU's Bowen led all scorers with 21 points, while Liz Shimek was the only other Spartan in double figures, adding 10.

Maryland improved to 4-0, its best start since 2002-03 and only the third time since 1992-93 the Terps have started the season winning their first four games of the season.

As a result, No. 9 Maryland shot 62 percent and cruised to its fourth straight victory, 92-67.

Marissa Coleman scored 20 points and Crystal Langhorne had 15 points and 11 rebounds for the Terrapins (8-1). Maryland went 8-for-9 from 3-point range in building a 46-27 halftime lead, then scored 30 of its 46 second-half points in the paint.

"That's just a very good basketball team," Arizona coach Joan Bonvicini said. "They've got a lot of different weapons inside and out, and they play good defense, too. They really don't have a lot of weaknesses."

Shay Doron had 12 points and 13 assists for the Terrapins, who had six players score in double figures. Coleman, a freshman forward, went 8-for-11 from floor and 4-for-5 from 3-point range.

Maryland closed the first half with a 17-0 run to take control, then increased the margin to 26 points with 12 minutes left.

Natalie Jones scored a career-high 29 points for Arizona (4-3).

The Wildcats played in the NCAA tournament in each of the last three seasons, but they're still trying to recover from the unexpected loss of senior center Shawntinice Polk, who died in September of a pulmonary blood clot.

Arizona has dedicated its season to the three-time All-Pac 10 star, who averaged 16 points and 10 rebounds as a three-year starter. She was remembered during a moment of silence at halftime.

The Terrapins led 29-27 before Langhorne sank four straight free throws, Kristi Toliver, who played just three minutes, hit a 3-pointer (her only basket of the game) and Laura Harper scored on a putback. Coleman and Ashleigh Newman followed with successive baskets from beyond the arc, and Harper concluded the spree with a layup.

Maryland limited the Wildcats to 31 percent shooting (11-for-35) in the first half and seemingly couldn't miss from outside the arc.

"Shooting 89 percent on 3-pointers, that's crazy," Frese said. "They were doubling down low, and that led to a lot of kickouts and open shots."

The Terrapins were 10-for-14 over the first 12 minutes, but Arizona stayed close by forcing eight turnovers and getting 14 points from Jones.

Maryland led 27-20 before Jones hit a 3-pointer and Che Oh added four points in a 7-2 spurt that cut the margin to two points. But the Wildcats went scoreless over the final six minutes of the half.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Marissa Coleman scored 13 points and Laura Harper and Shay Doron each had 12 to lead Maryland past Coppin State 69-38.

The Terrapins (9-1) outscored their in-state foes 23-4 at the free throw line and finished with a 40-19 rebounding advantage, but coach Brenda Frese was more concerned about Maryland's 21 turnovers and a lackluster opening 20 minutes during which her team gave the ball away 12 times.

"I was disappointed in our first half," Frese said. "I thought we could have come out and played more inspired, a lot harder. I think their minds were on final exams versus getting prepared for this game. We have to do a much better job taking care of the basketball."

Unwilling to run with the more athletic Terps, Coppin State (1-4) reduced the pace to a crawl. The strategy worked for 17 minutes - it was 24-16 late in the first half - but Maryland ended with an 11-0 run to go up by 19 at the break.

At halftime, the Terrapins resolved to lift their play.

The Eagles closed to 38-22 early in the second half before Maryland scored 13 straight points to go up 51-22 with 11:32 left. Five players scored in the run, led by Harper with four points.

That assured Maryland of improving to 11-0 against Coppin State in the one-sided rivalry that began in 1991.

Rashida Suber scored 16 points and Sherrie Tucker had 10 for the Eagles, off to their worst start in seven seasons under coach Derek Brown. Coppin State lost seven seniors from a team that reached the NCAA tournament last season.

The Terrapins limited Coppin State to 29 percent shooting in the first half and compiled a 24-6 rebounding edge, but couldn't pull away.

Maryland scored the game's first five points, then followed two baskets by Suber with a 12-0 run for a 17-4 lead. Coleman scored five points in the spree and Jade Perry had two field goals.

The Terps made only two baskets over the next nine minutes, but the Eagles could only get within eight points. Maryland then got a 3-pointer from Coleman, four foul shots by Doron and baskets by Harper and Charmaine Carr to go up 35-16 at halftime.

FAIRFAX, Va. (AP) - Maryland's defense forced 18 straight misses. That was more than enough to decide a scrappy, physical game.

Beginning late in the first half, the Terrapins' tenacious man-to-man held George Mason without a field goal for more than 10 minutes. The Patriots shot just 20 percent for the game in sixth-ranked Maryland's 70-33 victory.

"It wasn't the prettiest game that I've ever seen," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "They were very scrappy, very aggressive. Our defense held us in there."

Ashleigh Newman matched a career-high with 21 points, and Marissa Coleman added 20 points and 10 rebounds for the Terrapins (10-1), who have won six straight and are outscoring opponents by an average of 32 points.

George Mason (4-5) has a victory over another Atlantic Coast Conference school, Miami, this season, but the Patriots could only stay with the Terrapins for about 14 minutes.

Jessica Smith's layup cut Maryland's lead to 22-17 with 6:45 remaining, but Newman scored seven points in a 13-2 half-ending run in which the Terrapins' defense repeatedly kept George Mason from getting decent looks at the basket.

Newman had 16 points on 6-for-9 shooting at the half, doubling the output of any George Mason player. The Patriots shot 28 percent in the first half, with Jen Daniels, their only starting senior, missing all four of her attempts.

George Mason missed its first 10 shots of the second half, and Maryland quickly pushed the lead to 20.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - With so many scoring options, it's difficult to stop No. 6 Maryland when five of those options score in double figures as they did on the first night of the Terrapin Classic.

Shay Doron scored 26 points and Crystal Langhorne added 22 points and 10 rebounds to lead the Terrapins past Central Connecticut State 94-57 in front of 3,085 at Comcast Center.

Langhorne shot 9 for 9 from the field, tying the school's single-game record for field goal percentage (minimum eight shots). Marissa Coleman added 15 points and six assists for Maryland (11-1) while Ashleigh Newman and Laura Harper scored 10 apiece.

"I was getting some open looks," said Doron. "With the way our team is this year, you really can't key on any one individual, so it was my night to step up."

The Terps, who won their seventh straight, will face Furman in the championship game of the Terrapin Classic. Furman advanced with an 86-81 overtime win over Maryland-Eastern Shore earlier in the evening.

Gabriella Guebelet had 24 points and seven rebounds, and Kim Boone added 17 points for the Blue Devils (2-7), who lost their sixth straight.

"We really challenged them in terms of our communication and our focus," said Maryland coach Brenda Frese. "We reduced our turnovers in this game, but I think we still need to be a little bit more efficient in what we're doing."

The Terps put Central Connecticut State away almost as soon as the game started. After trailing 2-0, Maryland went on a 23-0 run over the next five minutes, 48 seconds to assume control.

The Terps played strong defensively, especially during the deciding opening minutes when CCSU went 9:13 between its first and second field goals. During that time, Maryland built a 28-4 advantage en route to a 51-16 lead at the half, which was more than enough for the win.

"I think we came out really well," Langhorne said. "We were intense, played great defense and I think we did a good job offensively, too." Langhorne had her second perfect shooting night of the season. She went 6 for 6 against Appalachian State on Dec. 1 and has converted 68.6 percent of her field goals this season.

The sophomore forward said she wasn't that impressed with her 9 for 9 performance because she was called for traveling several times.

"I consider those kind of like misses," said Langhorne. "I wasn't really paying attention."

The Maryland defense limited the Blue Devils to 39.3 percent from the field and scored 27 points off 17 turnovers.

The Lady Paladins closed to 51-31 early in the second half before Doron scored five points in an 11-0 spree that assured the Terrapins another title in their own holiday tournament. Maryland has won the Terrapin Classic seven times in eight tries.

Furman had three shot-clock violations, seven turnovers and was outrebounded 33-17 in the first half.

Perry had 17 points and 10 rebounds, and the Terrapins routed Manhattan 82-49 for their ninth straight victory.

Shay Doron scored 16 points for the Terrapins (12-1), Ashleigh Newman had 14, and Marissa Coleman and Laura Harper added 12 apiece.

Maryland won easily despite shooting a season-low 36.2 percent, including 25 percent in the first half.

Kymesha Alston scored 13 points for the Jaspers (4-7), who lost their third straight.

Manhattan's Gabrielle Cottrell hit a 3-pointer to open the second half, pulling the Jaspers within six, but the Terps outscored Manhattan 49-25 in the last 20 minutes for their 12th win by 20-plus points.

The Jaspers trailed 33-24 at halftime, largely because they effectively double-teamed Maryland's post players in the first half.

"That was going to be our best chance at not really letting Crystal Langhorne and Jade go off on the post," said Manhattan coach Myndi Hill. "I thought we did a tremendous job in the first half with it."

But the second half was the problem.

Perry, who played with a cold, netted 10 of her 17 points during the second half, helping the Terps pull away.

"I felt that my shot was coming back," Perry said. "I was very confident with my game because in the past couple games, I struggled a lot."

BOSTON (AP) - Maryland coach Brenda Frese didn't hesitate to draw up a play for Shay Doron despite the guard's poor shooting night.

Doron nailed a 3-pointer and a pair of free throws in the final minute of overtime and Crystal Langhorne scored 24 points to lift No. 6 Maryland to a 67-64 win over Boston College, spoiling the Eagles' inaugural Atlantic Coast Conference game.

Doron was just 1-for-7 from the floor in the second half when she tried to work a pick-and-roll with Langhorne before stepping back and hitting a clutch three from the top of the key with 59 seconds to play.

"Shay wants to take the big shot and always has for us," Frese said. "We called the timeout. We just felt like we had to go to Shay or Crystal."

Laura Harper added 15 points, Doron finished with 13 points and eight assists and Langhorne had 13 rebounds for the Terrapins (14-1, 1-0), who have won 10 straight games.

Doron finished 4-for-13 from the floor, but was 2-for-4 on 3-pointers.

Kindyl Dorsey paced the Eagles (12-3, 0-1) with 18 points, Brooke Queenan had 17 and Aja Parham 11. It snapped BC's six-game winning streak and was its first loss since a 66-61 overtime defeat against then-No. 4 Ohio State on Dec. 3.

Dorsey's 3-pointer gave BC a 60-59 lead 30 seconds into overtime, but Langhorne hit a short jumper and nailed one of two free throws to put Maryland ahead for good, 62-60, with 2:57 left.

Doron and Dorsey traded 3s just 13 seconds apart before Doron nailed two free throws to make it 67-64 with 14 seconds left.

"Maryland is very, very good," BC coach Cathy Inglesse said. "They have a lot of weapons. They're good from the inside, but they can make the outside shots."

Eagles guard Sarah Marshall, who covered Doron most of the night, was right on her when she hit the key shot.

The Eagles committed 15 turnovers in the first half, but didn't have any in the second half or OT.

Queenan fired a long 3-point attempt over the basket and the teams scrambled for the rebound as the horn sounded.

The game was tied five times early in the second half before Maryland grabbed a 51-48 edge on Doron's three with 7:10 to play. The Terrapins held off the Eagles until Queenan nailed a foul-line jumper to give BC a 56-55 lead with 2:18 remaining.

Harper's basket inside gave the Terrapins a 57-56 lead with 1:58 to go, but Queenan hit the first of two free throws to tie it with 1:07 left.

Maryland had three shots on one possession in the final 36 seconds, but failed to get a basket after grabbing two offense rebounds. Marissa Coleman missed a jumper and a drive and Doron missed a jumper from the foul line. Queenan's desperate attempt from about five feet behind the 3-point line missed badly as the horn sounded, sending it to overtime.

Maryland held BC to 29 percent shooting in the first half (8-for-28) and led 29-23 at the break

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - In a matchup between the two highest-scoring teams in NCAA women's basketball, the difference was the defense of No. 2 Duke.

Lindsey Harding and Chante Black each scored 19 points, and the unbeaten Blue Devils forced 24 turnovers in rolling past No. 6 Maryland 86-68 Sunday.

Duke (14-0, 3-0 Atlantic Coast Conference) built a 17-point halftime lead and cruised to its 13th straight win over the Terrapins. Monique Currie scored 18 for the Blue Devils, off to the second-best start in school history.

Maryland (14-2, 1-1) never got closer than nine points in the second half. It was 68-58 before Duke used a 10-0 run to erase any doubt.

Kristi Toliver and Shay Doron had 12 points apiece for the Terrapins, who fell well below their season average of 87.5 points. Maryland had won 10 straight since its only other loss, 80-75 against top-ranked Tennessee in November.

The game drew 16,097 fans, the second-largest crowd to watch an ACC women's game behind the 17,243 at last year's Duke-Maryland matchup. The Terrapins have hosted the four biggest crowds in conference history, three of them against Duke.

The Blue Devils played the spoiler's role. The nation's top-scoring team shot 58 percent, going 19-for-31 in the decisive first half.

Alison Bales, Duke's leading rebounder, picked up her third foul with just more than eight minutes elapsed. The 6-foot-7 center did not return until the second half and finished with seven points and four rebounds.

Even though Bales played only three minutes in the first half, the Blue Devils forced 14 turnovers and got 15 points from Harding in taking a 48-31 lead. Maryland made its first five shots, then went 6-for-19 in falling behind by double-digits for only the second time this season.

Despite committing five turnovers in the opening five minutes, Maryland led 11-10 before Duke went on an 8-0 run to take the lead for good.

After Bales left, the Terrapins closed to 22-20. But Harding scored nine points on 4-for-4 shooting during a 14-3 spurt that made it 36-23.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Crystal Langhorne waited eight days for the opportunity to redeem herself for an uncharacteristic performance underneath the basket.

When Maryland's sophomore forward finally got back on the court against Florida State, she rarely let a missed shot elude her grasp.

Langhorne had 19 rebounds and 12 points, Kristi Toliver scored 16, and the sixth-ranked Terrapins breezed to a 75-57 victory over the Seminoles.

Held without a rebound in a loss to No. 2 Duke, Langhorne recorded her 26th career double-double, the most of any active player in the ACC.

"I was really trying to rebound a lot more," Langhorne. "I really thought about it because I never had zero rebounds in my life. That was kind of a low for me."

Langhorne had nine rebounds in the first half, a big reason why Maryland was able to build a 16-point cushion at the break.

"Whew, Maryland rebounded today. I know Crystal didn't have a rebound against Duke, and I thought she came out and tried to prove she's a rebounder," Florida State coach Sue Semrau said. "I thought we did a great job defensively, holding her to four shots, but she just helped the team in other ways. I'm very impressed with that."

Jade Perry and Laura Harper each scored 11 for the Terrapins (15-2, 2-1), who have won 11 of 12. Led by Langhorne, Maryland finished with a 47-26 rebounding advantage.

"I was really happy about our play today," Terrapins coach Brenda Frese said. "I thought we really took some ownership on the boards."

Britany Miller led Florida State (10-6, 1-2) with 16 points. The Seminoles, who have lost three of four, shot 38 percent from the floor and were 1-for-11 from 3-point range.

FSU closed to 50-36 early in the second half before baskets by Ashleigh Newman, Harper and Shay Doron upped the margin to 20. After the Seminoles cut the gap to 14, Toliver made a 3-pointer and Langhorne sank three foul shots in a 7-0 spurt that made it 63-42 with just over eight minutes left.

Miller had 12 points before halftime on 6-for-8 shooting, but the Terrapins outrebounded the Seminoles 26-11 and shot 50 percent in taking a 44-28 lead.

Maryland's Marissa Coleman scored five of her 22 points in overtime and Crystal Langhorne had four in the extra session.

Coleman was 6-for-9 from the field, including 3-for-3 on 3-pointers, had eight rebounds, three assists and two steals. Langhorne, who scored 17, shot 7-for-9.

The Terrapins (16-2, 3-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) also got 15 points from Ashleigh Newman, while Kristi Toliver, a two-time Group AAAP state player of the year from Harrisonburg, had 12 points and 10 assists.

Virginia (12-4, 1-3) didn't score for the first 3:12 of the 5-minute overtime. When Takisha Granberry broke the drought with the first of two free throws, it was too little too late.

Siedah Williams added 16 points and Lyndra Littles had 13 for Virginia, which shot 53 percent in the second half, but was just 1-for-8 in overtime.

Maryland shot 53.7 percent from the field, including 9-for-16 from three-point range. Virginia made four of 10 3-pointers and shot 44.6 percent overall.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Maryland stumbled through a lackluster first half against Georgia Tech, shooting 35 percent and getting beaten on the boards before heading to the locker room with a precarious lead.

Crystal Langhorne and Shay Doron weren't about to let the same thing happen after halftime.

Langhorne scored 19 of her 23 points in the second half, teaming with Doron to help the No. 6 Terrapins pull away to a 79-71 victory.

Doron scored 18 points, including 16 after halftime, and Marissa Coleman had 18 points and 10 rebounds for Maryland (18-2, 5-1 Atlantic Coast Conference).

Langhorne and Doron combined for eight points in a 10-0 run that put Maryland up by 14 with 7:45 remaining. The margin reached 16 points before the Yellow Jackets fought back, but they couldn't complete the comeback.

Stephanie Higgs led Georgia Tech with 19 points, Chioma Nnamaka had 15 and Kasha Terry 14. It was the sixth loss in seven games for the Yellow Jackets (12-7, 1-5), who took consolation in making this one close.

Nnamaka, the team's second-leading scorer, picked up three fouls in the opening 12 minutes and got her fourth with 13:44 left. The sophomore guard was held scoreless in the first half and played only 13 minutes.

A 3-pointer by Nnamaka got Georgia Tech to 69-67, but Langhorne answered with two free throws and a layup to put the Terps up by six with 2:22 left.

"Crystal did a great job of stepping up in the second half," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said.

The Terrapins forced the Yellow Jackets to miss their first four shots of the second half and used six straight free throws by

Langhorne to go up 40-30. After April Phillips scored on a drive for Georgia Tech, Doron sank a 3-pointer to boost the margin to 12 points.

But the Yellow Jackets weren't done. A three-point play by Higgs started a 7-0 run that made it 43-39, and a putback by Terry minutes later got Georgia Tech to 49-45.

Doron then made a free throw and missed the second, but Langhorne got the rebound and scored for a seven-point lead. Doron followed with a 3-pointer and a short jumper off the glass, and Coleman finished the 10-point run with two foul shots.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP) - Winning games in overtime has become common for No. 6 Maryland.

The Terrapins got a career-high 34 points from Crystal Langhorne, including 10 in the extra period, to beat pesky Wake Forest, 79-70.

Maryland (19-2, 6-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) improved to 3-0 in overtime games this season, with all three victories coming on the road during the month of January.

"It was a heck of a game on both ends," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "Not that they need to keep putting our coaches through this, but we really believe in ourselves. Obviously, both teams hate to lose, but we were able to stay focused and remain inspired."

A lot of that was thanks to Langhorne, who also pulled down 14 rebounds to help the Terrapins win their fifth straight league game, equaling a team record set during the 2000-2001 season.

The sophomore led 14-of-22 from the field, including 4-of-7 in overtime. She also went 6-of-8 from the free-throw line.

"My teammates were just getting me the ball in the right places," Langhorne said. "Sometimes they were doubling up on me, but we worked on that in practice. We were really spread out, so that gave me a lot of room to work."

Maryland needed its inside game as it struggled to put away the Demon Deacons (10-9, 2-5), who suffered their third straight loss and second against a ranked team in the last three days. No. 3 North Carolina beat them 91-57 on Friday night.

The Terrapins, who lead the ACC in 3-point percentage at 45.5 percent, hit just 1-of-9 (11.1 percent) against Wake Forest. They made up for that with a 52-34 rebounding advantage, including a 20-11 margin in offensive rebounds and a 46-24 edge in scoring in the paint.

"You can't get outrebounded like that and win a college basketball game," Demon Deacons coach Mike Petersen said.

Wake Forest made up for its lack of inside play with its outside shooting. Cotelia Bond-Young scored 29 points, hitting six 3-pointers as the Demon Deacons went 9-of-23 from beyond the arc.

The Terrapins led 30-27 at the half and were up by nine points with less than 8 minutes to play, but Wake Forest rallied to lead twice in the closing minutes of regulation. The Demon Deacons' last lead came when Groves made a pair of free throws to make it 64-62 with 1:08 left.

But Langhorne followed with a layup with 54 seconds left to tie the score and send the game into overtime.

In the extra period, the two sides swapped the lead three times and tied the game three more times before Langhorne converted a pair of 3-point plays over a 40-second span late in the period to put Maryland in the lead to stay.

Maryland (20-2, 7-1) finished with a 54-34 rebounding advantage and forced the Hurricanes to miss 51 shots, but Doron was even more of a factor, according to Miami coach Katie Meier.

"Shay's the one who killed us," Meier said. "She did such a nice job moving around on the court. You look at her shot chart, and she was just scoring from all different spots on the floor. That was hard for us to handle."

Undaunted by a 2-for-12 shooting performance in the Terrapins' last game at Wake Forest, a 2-for-9 effort at Virginia Tech on Jan. 23 and a 1-for-7 outing at Virginia on Jan. 20, Doron went 8-for-14 against Miami in matching her season high in points.

"It feels good, but the win feels better," said Doron, a 5-foot-9 junior guard. "I haven't been playing well but we've been winning. It would have felt a lot worse if we had been losing. I'm going to keep shooting, regardless of how bad I shot in the past. I'm going to stay confident."

Marissa Coleman had 10 points and 12 rebounds for Maryland, which overcame 22 turnovers by limiting the Hurricanes to 39 percent shooting (31-for-82).

The Terrapins led 67-66 before Coleman made two free throws to spark an 8-0 run that made it 75-66 with 3:58 left. Doron ended the spree with a 3-pointer from the corner.

Renee Taylor scored 21 points on 8-for-27 shooting, and Tamara James had 16 for the Hurricanes (14-7, 4-4). But she missed 10 of 16 shots, was in foul trouble for much of the game and played only 21 minutes.

Held to four points before halftime, James scored five in the opening two minutes of the second half during a 16-3 run that lifted the Hurricanes into a tie at 44. COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Maryland played near-perfect basketball during a 21-1 run in which the Terrapins turned a close game against Virginia into a potential rout.

"Everyone was hitting 3s, playing defense, getting shots. It was so exciting," forward Laura Harper said. "That's the kind of basketball you want to play the entire game."

Unfortunately for the No. 6 Terrapins, they couldn't sustain the pace. After building a 21-point lead in the first half, Maryland weathered a spirited Virginia comeback before managing an 85-71 victory.

The Cavaliers (13-8, 2-7) used a 12-6 spurt to close to 72-66 before the Terrapins made nine free throws in the final four minutes to pull away. Maryland went 27-for-34 at the line compared to 11-for-15 for the Cavaliers.

Shay Doron scored 23 points, Harper had 17 points and 10 rebounds, and Kristi Toliver scored 16 for the Terrapins (21-2, 8-1 Atlantic Coast Conference). The victory assured Maryland a winning record in the ACC for the first time since 1996-97.

The 21-1 run made it 38-17, but it took a late surge to ensure the Terrapins their first regular-season sweep of the Cavaliers since 1989.

"Against ranked opponents you can't let a lead slip like that," Harper said. "I think it's something we need to focus on, but overall I'm not concerned."

Down 43-28 at halftime, the Cavaliers got three baskets from Sardin and a 3-pointer from Zoll in an 11-4 run that made it 47-39. Minutes later, Takisha Granberry scored four straight points to make it 54-47 with 12:20 left.

Then, after Maryland went up 63-51, the Cavaliers mounted one final comeback bid.

There were five ties in the opening seven minutes before Toliver hit a 3-pointer to put Maryland up for good at 15-12.

It was 17-16 before Doron hit a 3-pointer, received an assist on a Crystal Langhorne layup and sank a jumper from the foul line. After a Virginia timeout, Toliver scored from beyond the arc and Doron made two foul shots before a free throw by Granberry interrupted the 13-point run.

Marissa Coleman then hit a long-range jumper to spark a nine-point spurt that made it 38-17. Granberry answered with a runner in the lane to end a Virginia field-goal drought that lasted nearly seven minutes.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) - Maybe the Atlantic Coast Conference is more than just a two-team race after all.

Ashleigh Newman hit a long desperation 3-pointer at the buzzer to force overtime while Marissa Coleman scored five straight points afterward to help sixth-ranked Maryland beat No. 1 North Carolina 98-95, ending the Tar Heels' 30-game home winning streak.

Crystal Langhorne scored 25 points to lead the Terrapins (22-2, 9-1 Atlantic Coast Conference), who rallied from a 14-point deficit in the final 12 minutes of regulation to win here for the first time in a decade.

And for a team hovering in the shadows of the top-ranked Tar Heels (22-1, 9-1) and No. 2 Duke, it was clear just how big this win was for Brenda Frese's club.

"Our program took a step forward tonight," the coach said.

Newman's shot was just a small part of a back-and-forth contest that had a little bit of everything. The Tar Heels appeared they would remain the nation's last unbeaten team in Division I -- men's or women's -- despite a shaky shooting day from leading scorer Ivory Latta, thanks to the play of Camille Little and Erlana Larkins.

Little had 24 points, including 12 on 6-for-6 shooting after Latta picked up her third foul in the first half. Larkins had 17 points, nine rebounds, seven assists, five blocks and three steals in 32 minutes, but didn't play the overtime due to leg cramps.

Latta finished with 21 points on 7-for-20 shooting with five turnovers.

But the Terrapins -- whose only losses came against Tennessee and Duke -- improved to 4-0 in overtime with a balanced effort in the extra period. Langhorne also had five points in the extra period, while Kristi Toliver hit a pair of free throws with 17.2 seconds left to make it a three-point game.

"That's why you play a tough nonconference schedule," Frese said. "The challenge for us is to continue to get better. I love where this team is at and the confidence we're playing with."

For the Tar Heels, there was plenty to dwell on afterward. In a physical game in which the teams combined for 50 fouls and 55 free throws, the Tar Heels shot just 13-for-27 at the line and committed 25 turnovers. That list included a missed free throw by Latta -- an 88-percent free-throw shooter -- with 15.4 seconds left in regulation that allowed Newman, 1-for-9 from the field on the night, to tie it at the horn.

"You have to deal with what's dealt to you," North Carolina coach Sylvia Hatchell said. "If we had made some foul shots, we wouldn't even be talking about (a loss)."

With North Carolina leading 83-80 in the final seconds of regulation, Shay Doron missed a straightaway 3-pointer that Larkins appeared to rebound. But Larkins fell forward along the baseline and the ball went bouncing back inbounds.

Newman raced to the ball several feet beyond the arc on the right side and hauled a shot that swished through the net as the horn sounded, setting off a brief celebration by the Terps. North Carolina players watched in stunned silence.

Coleman put the Terps ahead to stay with a putback on the first play of overtime for an 85-83 lead. She then followed with a desperation 3-pointer that topped Newman's heave, spinning to her right while being closely defended by LaTangela Atkinson and tossing the ball toward the backboard with the shot clock set to expire.

The ball banked in from the right side, giving Maryland an 88-83 lead that ultimately held up.

Still, the Tar Heels closed to within 96-95 on a banked-in 3-pointer from Latta with 27.1 seconds left. Then, after a pair of free throws by Toliver, the Tar Heels missed three 3s in the final seconds to tie it -- the last coming when Latta missed at the horn, setting off an oncourt celebration for the Terrapins and leaving Latta sitting on the court in shock.

"She pump-faked, my hands were up, all ball hit my hand," Doron said. "That was it."

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) - Monique Currie scored a career-high 31 points a game after finishing with only two, Mistie Williams added 14 points and 10 rebounds and the Blue Devils (No. 2 ESPN/USA Today; No. 1 AP) pulled away to beat Maryland (No. 6 ESPN/USA Today; No. 4 AP), 90-80.

The Blue Devils won their 14th in a row in the series and denied the Terrapins a rare Tobacco Road double. In their last game, the Terps handed the Tar Heels their first loss of the season in overtime.

This time, there were no such dramatics for Maryland (22-3, 9-2).

The last of nine ties came at 59 when Marissa Coleman swished a jumper with 6:45 remaining, and Foley pushed the Blue Devils ahead for good with a 3-pointer. The margin still was only two about three minutes later before Duke took over.

Foley drove for another basket to start an 11-0 run, with Currie adding five of the points. That made it 82-69 with about a minute left, and the Terrapins were finally done.

Coleman had 20 points and teammate Kristi Toliver added a season-high 19 for Maryland.

"This is just going to help us," Frese said. "Our kids are disappointed. They believed they could come in here and win this game."

The Blue Devils played the final 13 and a half minutes without point guard Lindsey Harding, who left with a shoulder contusion after she and Doron dove to the floor for a loose ball.

Harding left with the Blue Devils ahead 48-46. Smith, a sophomore who spent her entire first year at point, moved back over to run the offense and defense, and she finished with three assists against only one turnover.

It hardly appeared this would be the outcome during the first half, when the Terrapins moved ahead by 10 points -- Duke's largest deficit of the season. They eventually settled for a 41-33 lead at the break, and the margin still was eight before the Blue Devils rallied.

"At that point, I felt that Maryland was shooting lights out," Goestenors said. "They were playing great basketball. So I felt like -- I was hoping -- they wouldn't be able to shoot that way for the entire game. We just needed to crank our defense up a notch."

Currie worked inside to tie it 46-46, and Williams converted two free throws to put them ahead. Maryland stormed back to take its final lead on Doron's only three of the game, and Coleman had that basket to tie it for the last time.

Shay Doron scored 22 points and Crystal Langhorne added 16 to lead fourth-ranked Maryland to an 86-59 win over Boston College (No. 20 ESPN/USA Today, No. 18 AP).

Laura Harper added 14 points and 10 rebounds, and Marissa Coleman had 15 rebounds for the Terps (23-3, 10-2) in their third straight game against a ranked opponent. Maryland improved to 5-3 against Top 25 teams this season, giving the Terps their most wins over ranked foes in a single year since 1992-93.

"We dominated," Frese said. "Watching film on Boston College, I was worried coming into this game. Boston College is a team that usually doesn't make a lot of mistakes."

Aja Parham scored 15 points for Boston College (19-7, 6-5), which allowed a season-high for points. The Eagles were leading the conference in scoring defense at 55.4 points per game entering the contest.

Kathrin Rens had 10 points and 10 rebounds for the Eagles, who had won seven straight.

Maryland scored the first 11 points of the game and slowly added to their lead on their way to a 42-23 halftime advantage.

The Terps then opened the second half with a 13-0 run to stretch the lead to 55-23. Harper keyed the surge with six points.

"I like where we're at. We're playing with a ton of confidence and just moving the ball, being so unselfish," Frese said. "And as long as we can continue to do that on the offensive end and defend them on the defensive end, great things are going to continue to happen for this team."

Doron responded well after shooting 2-for-12 against No. 1 Duke on Monday. She made nine of 16 shots as Maryland handed BC its worst defeat since March 5, 2002, a 96-54 loss to Connecticut.

Laura Harper led Maryland with a season-high 20 points. Working inside for all her baskets, she went 8-for-10 from the field.

"Shay was showing she had confidence in me," said Harper, who came in averaging less than 11 points a game. "She kept passing me the ball and I just wanted to go up strong and finish."

Crystal Langhorne added 14 and Kristi Toliver 13 for Maryland, which won its second straight since a 90-80 loss Feb. 13 at No. 1 Duke. Marissa Coleman had 10 points and 10 rebounds.

Maryland hit five of its first six shots and never trailed. The Terrapins held NC State to 6-for-27 shooting in the first half -- the Wolfpack's worst half (22.2 percent) against an ACC team -- and 21-of-64 for the game.

The Terrapins broke NC State's back with a 17-4 run midway through the second half and never let the Wolfpack closer than 12 points in the final 10 minutes.

"When we're focused, we can go on runs like that," Frese said. "In the second half, we started making more unselfish passes and made things happen."

The game was named Hoops For Hope at NC State, with part of the proceeds dedicated to breast cancer research in North Carolina.

But Yow, a cancer survivor, wished the Wolfpack could have done more to stop the Terrapins' inside game, especially Coleman.

"She's the one person I wish we had done a little more to stop," Yow said. "She's the one that hurt us the most and that's where we lost the battle."

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Crystal Langhorne had just reached the 1,000-point mark quicker than any player in Maryland history, and she was the last one to find out.

After Langhorne reached the milestone in the first half of fourth-ranked Maryland's 89-63 victory over Clemson, the public address announcer trumpeted the feat and teammate Jade Perry shouted, "Congratulations!"

"What are you talking about?" Langhorne replied.

Langhorne finished with 16 points and 10 rebounds, and Maryland (25-3, 12-2 Atlantic Coast Conference) never trailed in handing Clemson its ninth straight defeat.

Langhorne, a 6-foot-2 sophomore center, has scored 1,010 points in 60 career games. She became the 22nd woman to reach the 1,000-point plateau at Maryland, and she did it four games sooner than the previous record-holder, junior guard Shay Doron.

Coming into the game, Langhorne had no idea how close she was to 1,000. Coach Brenda Frese made certain to keep it that way.

"I never want to tell a player when they're getting close to any record because I think sometimes you press too much and start thinking about it," Frese said. "I wanted it to be a nice surprise. Surprises are good. And it worked out that way."

Langhorne was presented a souvenir basketball to mark the occasion, but she appeared more delighted with the victory.

"That really doesn't matter," she said of her accomplishment. "We're winning games right now, we're fourth in the nation, and we're doing really well. That's what I care about."

The victory was the school-record 14th at home this season for the Terrapins, who completed the league schedule assured of a second-place tie -- their best finish in the ACC since 1993.

Marissa Coleman scored 19 of her 20 points in the first half, when Maryland built a 20-point lead.

Amanda Frist scored 16 points and D'Lesha Lloyd added 12 for Clemson (8-19, 2-11).

Coleman made her first five 3-point tries, and Maryland forced 14 turnovers in taking a 44-29 halftime lead.

"We played like a very unaware basketball team," first-year coach Cristy McKinney said. "We knew Marissa was a threat with her shooting. Look at her stats. She shoots the 3 great. We just weren't aware, and to not be aware of a player that good is scary."

Coleman scored a layup off the opening tip, starting a run of 11 straight points by Maryland. Clemson committed five turnovers and missed three shots before Frist finally got the Tigers on the board.

It was 17-12 before Langhorne made a three-point play. She then topped the 1,000-point mark with a layup with 12:56 left in the half.

"To be able to score 1,000 points says a lot about her, her work ethic and the tremendous teammates she has around her," Frese said. "It couldn't happen to a better, more classy person."

Minutes later, Doron scored on a drive. Langhorne made a layup and Coleman sank a 3-pointer for a 13-point lead. After Clemson closed to 29-22, Coleman connected three times from beyond the arc during a 13-0 run that put the Terps up 42-22.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - The defense was tested, their confidence augmented and their starters rested.

If Maryland coach Brenda Frese wanted the ideal tuneup for the postseason, she couldn't have asked for a better opponent than Northern Colorado.

Kristi Toliver scored 17 points, Crystal Langhorne had 16 and No. 4 Maryland completed the winningest regular season in school history by breezing to an 89-53 victory Sunday.

Laura Harper scored 14 points, Shay Doron added 13 points and Marissa Coleman had 10 rebounds for the Terrapins (26-3), who have won four straight and 12 of 13.

Having already shattered the school record for wins in the regular season (23, in 1988-89), Maryland now has its sights on breaking the single-season mark for total victories (29).

"Like we told them in the locker room, I'm extremely proud of this team and what they've been able to accomplish," Frese said. "Everyone's playing their best, playing with confidence and hoping to build on the momentum that we've got here."

Before playing in the Atlantic Coast Conference tournament as the No. 3 seed behind North Carolina and Duke, the Terrapins first had to get past Northern Colorado, which tested the Maryland defense by firing up 29 3-pointers (making eight).

"I think it's great preparation for the NCAA tournament," Frese said. "It was great for our post players, because they were often defending smaller players that can really shoot it. That's the kind of practice we needed."

The Terrapins built a 21-point halftime lead and increased the margin to 40 with 13 minutes left before Frese went deep into her bench.

"We played with a lot of energy and really worked to try to get better," she said. "It's nice to be able to play everyone, have everyone contribute and get some rest heading into the ACC tournament."

"They're just too big and strong for us, especially inside," Bears coach Ron Vlasin said. "We just tried to pack the inside, keeping Langhorne and company from banging us to death."

It didn't work: Maryland finished with a 50-35 rebounding advantage.

After going up 49-28 at the break, the Terrapins needed less than seven minutes of the second half to double the margin. Toliver, with 11 points, was the main force behind a 26-4 blitz that made it 75-32.

Maryland then coasted to the finish, putting the lid on a remarkable regular season.

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) - Maryland's freshmen stepped up just in time to save the fourth-ranked Terrapins from a shocking exit from the Atlantic Coast Conference tournament.

Marissa Coleman assisted on the go-ahead 3-pointer and scored her team's last six points to help the Terrapins hold off Georgia Tech 71-66 in the quarterfinals, a close call for a team hoping to earn a No. 1 seed in the NCAA tournament.

Coleman finished with 13 points for Maryland (27-3), which advanced to the semifinals to face No. 2 Duke. Crystal Langhorne led the Terrapins with 20 points while freshman Kristi Toliver scored eight and hit that go-ahead 3 with 1:26 left.

Stephanie Higgs scored 17 of her 22 points in the second half for the Yellow Jackets (14-15), the tournament's 11th seed that put quite a scare in the Terrapins.

"We've got a lot of heart," Coleman said. "We were never scared of losing the game, because I know how we are and how we're going to pull together as a team. We came together and won the game."

It hardly seemed like a matchup built for drama as the Terrapins entered the tournament with their highest seed (third) in 13 years. Maryland leads the ACC with eight tournament titles -- though none since 1989 -- while Georgia Tech had lost 26 of 32 tournament games coming.

But none of the past 11 meetings had been decided by fewer than 10 points. That included the teams' only meeting this season, in which Georgia Tech cut a 16-point second-half deficit to two before falling 79-71 on the road.

This time Georgia Tech took a four-point lead with 5 1/2 minutes left before Coleman and the Terrapins rallied.

With the score tied, Coleman -- who was named the ACC's rookie of the year -- found Toliver in the left corner for a 3-pointer and a 65-62 lead.

Then, after Higgs knocked down a pair of free throws, Coleman worked her way into the lane and hit a contested jumper to make it 67-64 with 34.8 seconds to play. The Yellow Jackets got no closer, with Coleman going 4-for-4 at the line to seal it in the final seconds.

It was just part of a clutch late-game performance by the Terrapins. Coleman also hit two free throws to tie the game with 3:32 left, Ashleigh Newman buried a 3 for a 60-59 lead while Langhorne

hit a spinning shot in the lane for a 62-60 lead with 1:57 left.

Langhorne led the Terrapins by going 8-for-9 and pulling down seven rebounds. But she went just 4-for-9 at the foul line, part of Maryland's 17-for-26 day that nearly cost them against the Yellow Jackets.

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) - Crystal Langhorne couldn't contain her excitement. Finally, after losing 14 games in a row to Duke, the fourth-ranked Maryland Terrapins had won.

And Langhorne yelled it to her teammates before they even got to the locker room.

"I think it was like 10 seconds after the game," quipped her coach, Brenda Frese.

No one would blame the Terrapins for savoring this one.

Laura Harper had 17 points, Marissa Coleman added 16 points and 13 rebounds and Maryland beat the second-ranked Blue Devils 78-70 in the semifinals of the Atlantic Coast Conference tournament.

Kristi Toliver also scored 16 points for the Terrapins (28-3), who advanced to the final against No. 1 North Carolina. Earlier this season, they gave the Tar Heels their only loss in a thrilling game that was decided in overtime.

"It definitely gives us confidence, but at the same time, they want revenge," Harper said. "So we're going to have to play an even better game than we did at their place."

Perhaps that matchup can satisfy fans who were hoping to see North Carolina and Duke decide the ACC championship for the fifth consecutive year in the heart of Tobacco Road. This will be Maryland's first chance at a tournament title since losing to Virginia 106-103 in triple overtime 13 years ago.

"I love it when the media continues to hype up the Carolina schools," Frese said. "This team is motivated by any challenge you give them, and they definitely responded."

Monique Currie finished with 18 points but couldn't stop the Blue Devils (26-3) from failing to advance to the final for the first time in seven years. Lindsey Harding had 16 points.

Maryland appeared in command after a 15-4 run early in the second half, and Coleman was the spark. She had a 3-pointer and another jumper before dribbling through a double team for a twirling layup. When Jade Perry worked inside for another basket, the Terrapins led 53-38.

"I was just trying to help my team out," said Coleman, named the ACC's top freshman. "I just wanted to get that win. It was a very exciting environment."

Slowly, Duke came back, with a switch from its man-to-man defense to a zone trap. Toliver, Maryland's freshman point guard, had trouble finding open teammates to start the offense, and five straight possessions ended in turnovers.

The Blue Devils turned almost all of them into points on the other end. Currie made a 3, then converted a steal by Wanisha Smith into a three-point play.

And Duke wasn't finished. Smith got a nifty feed from Harding on an in-bounds play to make it 16 unanswered points, and suddenly, the Terrapins trailed 54-53.

Crystal Langhorne quickly put them back in front, Harper had five points in less than 60 seconds and Langhorne worked free again in the paint to help Maryland resume control. The Blue Devils only got as close as six points down the stretch.

The outcome might have been enough to give the Terrapins a No. 1 seed in the NCAA tournament, while Duke can only hope the committee rewards it for another stellar regular season.

"I think that speaks for itself," Frese said of winning. "It's up to the selection committee. But I said this going into the tournament: the biggest thing we can do is win, and put yourself in the championship game. It speaks volumes for this team."

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) - Top-ranked North Carolina avenged its only loss and won another Atlantic Coast Conference tournament championship.

Erlana Larkins scored a career-high 26 points and had 12 rebounds to lead the Tar Heels past fourth-ranked Maryland 91-80, giving the program its seventh ACC tournament title and likely locking up a No. 1 seed for the NCAA tournament.

Ivory Latta also scored 26 to earn MVP honors for North Carolina (29-1), which has won seven straight games since a 98-95 overtime home loss to the Terrapins last month.

Jade Perry scored 18 points to lead five players in double figures for the Terrapins (28-4), who were seeking an unprecedented ninth title but first since 1989.

Maryland had won the past two meetings, including last month's thriller when the Terps rallied from a 14-point second-half deficit and forced the extra period on a buzzer-beating 3-pointer by Ashleigh Newman.

This time, North Carolina led nearly the entire way and didn't let up. The Tar Heels led by seven at halftime and increased that margin to as many as 13 points. Maryland got as close as three points late, but Larkins and Latta kept the Tar Heels from repeating that first collapse.

Larkins, a first-team all-ACC pick, went 9-for-14 from the field and 8-for-10 from the line. Latta, who was named the ACC's player of the year, also had four assists to go with five steals.

They got plenty of help from Camille Little, who scored 11 of her 13 points in the second half after getting into early foul trouble, and La'Tangela Atkinson, who finished with 10 points and six rebounds.

North Carolina also helped itself by controlling the glass, taking a 48-37 rebounding advantage and hitting 21 of 27 free throws - both areas that hurt the Tar Heels in the loss. North Carolina shot 13-for-27 at the line and was outrebounded 49-48 in the first meeting.

It was a disappointing end to the tournament for the Terrapins, who beat second-ranked Duke in the semifinals to end a 14-game losing streak in the series. Avenging a pair of losses to the Blue Devils to go with an earlier win against the Tar Heels might have put the Terrapins in position to earn a top seed in the NAAs.

North Carolina led 42-35 at halftime and kept the pressure on by forcing the ball inside throughout the second half. The Tar Heels scored all 32 of their second-half points in the paint.

Maryland got as close as 79-76 on a layup by Newman, who scored all 14 of her points in the second half, with 5:19 left. But Larkins answered with a pair of free throws, followed by another runner from Latta and Larkins' stickback with more than 3 minutes left.

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. (AP) - Maryland led Sacred Heart from the opening tip, dominated the paint and had too much talent for the Pioneers.

Just what you'd expect from a No. 2 seed in the first round of the NCAA tournament.

The Terrapins, bypassed for a top seed when the tournament matchups were announced last week despite a No. 3 national ranking, pulled away in the second half of a 95-54 rout of 15th-seeded Sacred Heart.

"Yeah, they're a national contender. I mean, there's not many weaknesses there," Sacred Heart coach Ed Swanson said. "They play like a hungry team."

Jade Perry led Maryland with 20 points and 10 rebounds and Laura Harper added 16 points and 13 boards. The Terps outrebounded the Pioneers 57-26, and outscored Sacred Heart in the paint 56-14.

"We wanted to come out and bring some energy on the defensive end by coming out in the press," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "We were able to get some turnovers early. We also had the size advantage inside."

Maryland has had an impressive run already this year, defeating top-ranked North Carolina and No. 4 Duke. But the Terps had to settle for a No. 2 seed for the tourney, something that Frese expressed some displeasure about after the brackets were announced last week.

The Terps have stuck with a "happy-to-be-here" attitude while in State College. Against the Pioneers, they let their play do the talking.

The loss ended Sacred Heart's 10-game winning streak. After winning the Northeast Conference to secure the school's first NCAA tournament bid, Swanson knew his team would be decided underdogs against Maryland.

Amanda Pape, the Northeast Conference's player of the year, led Sacred Heart with 16 points but shot just 5-of-16 from the field. Pape hit a one-handed 3-pointer just before the halftime buzzer expired that got the Pioneers to within 47-33, pumping her fist and slapping a low-five with teammate as they headed to the locker room with big grins.

The pesky Pioneers had whittled down a 20-point lead to the 14-point halftime deficit, raising hopes among their vocal contingent of fans who shouted "S-H-U!" during the game.

Toliver ended any thoughts of a second-half comeback after hitting a 3-pointer to start the half. Shay Doron hit an acrobatic layup, falling down as the ball swished through the net with 14:22 left to give the Terps a 66-35 lead.

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. (AP) - With the game on the line, Maryland coach Brenda Frese decided to get the ball inside to star post player Crystal Langhorne. She came through in the clutch.

Langhorne capped a 30-point effort with two late inside baskets and St. John's went cold from the field as the second-seeded Terps held off No. 7 seed St. John's 81-74 in the second round of the NCAA tournament.

"My teammates were getting me the ball in the right places and our coaches just trusted me to get the ball inside because of we had size advantage," Langhorne said.

Langhorne, who also had nine rebounds, helped third-ranked Terps (30-4) advance to a matchup with defending champion Baylor in the Albuquerque Regional semifinals after losing in the second round the previous two seasons.

However, the win didn't come easy.

Dominated in the post, St. John's (22-8) stayed step-for-step with Maryland behind quick guard Kia Wright's great play and outside shooting by Tara Walker and Greeba Barlow. Maryland outrebounded St. John's 46-31.

"I felt we gave all that we had," said Wright, a 5-foot-8 guard who finished with 23 points and nine assists. "They're big, they're strong, but that doesn't speak for what we can do against them."

St. John's also took advantage of sloppy play by the Terps, scoring 24 points off 20 turnovers.

This exchange was typical: Up 65-64 with 6:52 left, Maryland's Marissa Coleman threw away a pass in the paint intended for Langhorne. Wright came down and connected with Tiina Sten for a turnaround jumper to put St. John's ahead.

Wright finished with 23 points and nine assists, while Walker had 17 and Barlow 16.

The teams then traded leads or stayed within a point or two of each other. Kristi Toliver, who struggled from outside for most the game, hit a 16-footer, before Walker followed with a 3-pointer over a defender to give the Red Storm back the lead.

Ashleigh Newman then hit a 3, and Barlow responded by sinking a free throw to tie the score at 72-72 with just over 3 minutes left.

Maryland took over from there. Toliver connected with Langhorne for a layup inside. Langhorne then converted an offensive rebound to give the Terps a 76-72 lead, and Shay Doron hit two free throws.

St. John's couldn't hit another field goal, getting their final points on two foul shots by Wright, and Maryland put the game away with three more free throws over the last 8 seconds.

"We just found a way to win. We continued to rebound with them and stayed together as a team," a relieved Maryland coach Brenda Frese said after the game.

Laura Harper finished with 15 points while Coleman had 11 for the Terps.

Maryland used their size advantage throughout the game with 6-foot-4 Laura Harper and Langhorne connecting on easy baskets inside to give the Terps an early 13-6 lead. St. John's tallest starters were 6-1 Angela Clark and 6-foot Danielle Chambers, and they were often overwhelmed under the basket.

But the Terps were error-prone in the first half, when they had 14 of their turnovers. The team looked disjointed at times with teammates exchanging looks of frustration after failing to connect on plays.

Down 35-34 at halftime, St. John's coach Kim Barnes Arico tried to maintain her team's confidence.

"I told them to just keep doing what you're doing," she said. "We weren't playing perfect, but were still in the game at that point."

Despite the loss, it's been a great year at resurgent St. John's, which was 3-24 three seasons ago. The Red Storm have improved steadily since then, and their first-round win on Sunday over California was the school's first NCAA victory since 1988.

"We had it in our mind that we could come out here and play with them, no matter who their tallest player is or how quick their quickest guard is," Wright said.

The Terps have had just as a dramatic improvement under Frese, who was 10-18 in her first season as coach in 2002-03. Now the Terps have surpassed their best win total since 1988-89, when they went to the Final Four.

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) - Of the 14 baskets Crystal Langhorne made in another All-America performance, none was bigger than the one that ended the first half.

Langhorne matched a career-high with 34 points and added 15 rebounds, leading No. 2 seeded Maryland to a 82-63 win over the third-seeded Lady Bears to eliminate Sophia Young and the defending national champions from the NCAA tournament.

"They executed the game plan to perfection," Terrapins coach Brenda Frese said. "They were hungry. They wanted to win. They defended and rebounded better. It's just amazing to see that we beat the defending national champions."

Langhorne made the play of the night at the halftime horn, getting a layup that put the Terps ahead 35-28. The Terps inbounded from halfcourt with 0.6 seconds on the clock, throwing all the way to Langhorne underneath.

"I wasn't even going to go to the basket," Langhorne said. "One of the coaches told me to get to the block and I'm saying, 'This isn't going to work.'"

It worked, all right.

Langhorne's layup was reviewed by game officials on video monitors, but it stood. And that sucked much of the momentum from Baylor after the Bears had pulled within 29-28 on a free throw by Rachel Allison with 2:28 remaining in the first half.

"Sure, it took some momentum away," Baylor coach Kim Mulkey-Robertson said. "That kind of deflates your bubble a little bit."

The Terps (31-4) advanced to meet Utah with a berth in the Final Four at stake.

In a matchup of two of the country's best post players, Langhorne, a 6-foot-2 sophomore, outplayed Young from the opening tip. With their star at less than her best, the Bears (26-7) couldn't survive one of their worst shooting nights of the season. Baylor made just 33 percent (25-of-74).

"The effort was there. I believe our kids fought hard," Mulkey-Robertson said. "But I believe in complimenting the opponent when they're better, and I thought Maryland was bigger and better than us."

Young scored 26 points on 11-of-25 shooting but the Big 12's career scoring and rebounding leader - and the Most Valuable Player from last year's Final Four - got off to a horrible 1-for-7 start in her final college game.

Langhorne was everywhere, scoring the game's first eight points as Maryland took control from the tipoff. They jumped to leads of 14-2 and 23-13. She had eight rebounds by the break, scoring three times on putbacks.

"We kept pounding it in to her and they couldn't stop her," said Maryland's Marissa Coleman, who scored 15 points. "Our energy was up from the tip and we intimidated our opponent. We kept it going all game."

Kristi Toliver scored 12 points for the Terps, who start a junior, two sophomores and two freshmen.

Anything seems possible now for Maryland under Frese, who in her fourth year is one game from the program's first Final Four appearance since 1989. The Terps were in the round of 16 for the first time since 1992, and they want more.

"We thought we could win the national championship before every one of our games," Langhorne said. "I think this just gives us more confidence."

Langhorne's talent wasn't exactly classified information, but compared to Young, she's been an under-the-radar star. Langhorne was a first-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference selection who scored 30 points and made two key late baskets when Maryland beat St. John's in the second round.

"Langhorne was dominant," Mulkey-Robertson said. "We had nobody to guard her."

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) - Maryland got dragged into the first overtime of the NCAA tournament.

Not that it cared: The Terrapins knew they were headed to the Final Four once it hit the extra session.

"Overtime is our time. I didn't worry about it," said Kristi Toliver, who made just about everything she put up in second-seeded Maryland's 75-65 overtime victory over No. 5 Utah.

Toliver set career highs with 28 points and six 3-pointers and Crystal Langhorne added 16 points and 10 rebounds, for the Terps, who are returning to the Final Four for the first time since 1989.

"Our confidence in overtime is out of this world," said Laura Harper, who scored six points in OT. "I think everybody on this team knew we'd be flying through the overtime."

The Terrapins (32-4) had a stomach virus circulate around the team during their long weekend in Albuquerque, making things even tougher than they had expected.

"I still feel a little under the weather, since mine just hit me last night," Toliver said. "I think we'll just be extremely happy going to Boston."

Maryland improved to 5-0 in overtime games this season but it was hardly easy, not with the Utes (27-7) putting up a heck of a fight.

Kim Smith had 17 points and 18 rebounds to lead the Mountain West champions, and Shona Thorburn finished with 10 points after missing the last five minutes of the first half to handle an ankle injury.

But Thorburn, a 71 percent free-throw shooter, also missed a golden opportunity. With 7.8 seconds to go in regulation, she made 1-of-2 from the line when she could have sent Utah to its first Final Four ever by making both.

"I had the two biggest free throws of my life," Thorburn said, breaking into tears. "It crossed my mind, that these two free throws could put us in the Final Four."

Instead, it was tied at 63 after 40 minutes and then it was all Maryland in overtime. Harper scored the first two buckets, Shay Doron and Langhorne each added a layup and the Terps raced away.

"It always seems like it's Harper who sparks us in overtime," said Terps coach Brenda Frese, who reached the Final Four in her fourth season at Maryland. "I just felt when we scored the first buckets, we'd be able to open a lead."

The Utes, who rallied from 15-point deficits to win in the first and second rounds and erased a late seven-point margin against Maryland, opened the extra period by missing their first three attempts, and they didn't have enough left to come back again.

"In the end, we did not keep the mass off the glass," Utah coach Elaine Elliott said. "But until the end, we did a very good job."

Langhorne posted her second double-double of the regional, where she was named most outstanding player. She had a career-high 34 points and 15 rebounds in the win over defending NCAA champion Baylor.

Smith couldn't find her range in the first half and missed all six of her attempts. But she finally got going after the break, scoring Utah's first 16 points of the second half.

Toliver, though, was just heating up, too.

She scored 13 of Maryland's first 21 points in the second half, confidently raising her arms after hitting three 3-pointers as the Terps built a 51-44 lead with 11:30 remaining.

"Kristi was hitting. It was back and forth with her and Kim. I thought they both stepped up with a lot of confidence," Frese said.

That's also when Langhorne, held to four first-half points, got involved, and it was Toliver who usually found her underneath for layups. Maryland led 53-44 with 10:25 to go after Langhorne took a feed from Toliver, capping a 9-2 burst.

"K.T. (Toliver) was hitting a lot of shots and that just opened it up for me," Langhorne said.

The Utes pulled to 63-62 after two layups by Morgan Warburton, then had possession with 24.7 seconds to play in regulation. Thorburn drove when the clock reached 10 seconds, drew a foul and, after a Maryland timeout, missed the first but made the second.

BOSTON (AP) - Maryland took it slow, took it inside, and took all the fun out of the Tar Heels.

The Terrapins - the only team to beat No. 1 North Carolina this season - one-upped their own, beating the Tar Heels 81-70 in the NCAA women's national semifinal. Now Maryland will play for the first women's basketball title in school history.

And the Terps did it their way: bumping feisty North Carolina point guard Ivory Latta, outmuscling the energetic, uptempo Tar Heels and forcing a halfcourt game that wiped the smiles right off their faces.

In just four years under coach Brenda Frese, Maryland (33-4) has risen to stand among the nation's elite. The 33 wins are the most for any Maryland basketball team - men or women.

"They have the heart of a lion," Frese said. "They believe in each other... I'm really proud of them. All season long this team has played with a chip on their shoulder. They've got a lot of believers tonight after the performance they put on."

The Terps dominated inside as they have all season. Maryland, which led the nation with an average rebounding margin of more than 12, beat North Carolina on the glass 41-31. The young post players who made that happen - sophomores Crystal Langhorne and Laura Harper - also asserted their strong scoring presence.

Harper had a career-high 24 points and Langhorne scored 23 for the Terps, who had beaten ACC rival North Carolina 98-95 in overtime in the regular season. Carolina avenged that with a 91-80 in the ACC tournament, but the stakes were much higher in this rubber match.

Maryland ran its halfcourt game to near perfection, getting the ball into Langhorne or Harper for basket after basket.

"That's what was working," Frese said. "It was, 'Who could stop who?' We wanted to turn them into a jump-shooting team."

Erlana Larkins led the Tar Heels with 28 points and 10 rebounds. Latta was banged up, knocked down and carried off the court at one point after tweaking her knee while coming down with a pass on the baseline.

She lay in obvious pain for several minutes and was carried to the floor to a standing ovation, then trotted back on the floor 2 minutes later. But she never quite got on track, finishing with 14 points, four assists and made just one of 10 3-pointers.

Maryland was making its first Final Four appearance since 1989 but had the swagger of a team that's been here before. The Terps led by just two at the half, then began to methodically add to the lead.

Kristi Toliver's 3-pointer with eight minutes left gave the Terrapins their largest lead at 63-52. As the ball dropped through, Toliver nodded toward the Maryland fan section and coolly gestured "bring it on."

For a while, it did seem Maryland was ready to run away with it. But Latta and the Heels had one more run left: North Carolina chipped away with an 11-4 run and Latta's two free throws with 1:06 left got the Heels within three at 73-70.

But there was no panic in these Terps. Shay Doron played cat-and-mouse with Latta as she brought the ball upcourt, then dished to a wide-open Coleman for a layup. The Heels would get no closer.

Doron said the game plan was to keep Latta "in front of us all the time, make sure we contested every one of her shots and try to keep the ball out of her hand."

Latta, the junior guard who finished second in The Associated Press player of the year balloting, fouled out with .7 seconds remaining when she wrestled Coleman to the ground. She walked off to an ovation and a hug from coach Sylvia Hatchell and watched quietly as the Terps celebrated on the sidelines.

"From the beginning I just wanted to play confident and have fun out there. That's what I wanted to do, just have fun," Harper said.

The Terps went inside early and often to Langhorne and the big sophomore did not disappoint. She was 7-of-8 from the floor, mostly from inside the paint, and had 16 points in the first half to give the Terps a 36-34 lead at the break.

BOSTON (AP) - Maryland's players celebrated on the court, laughing and hugging and bouncing up and down.

Never mind that they still had overtime to play.

"Overtime is our time," Terrapins forward Marissa Coleman said. "What a better way to win a national championship than in overtime, which was our time all season long?"

Too young to fear the pressure and too experienced to succumb to it, the Terrapins won their first NCAA women's title, coming back from a 13-point deficit to force overtime and beat Duke 78-75.

Freshman Kristi Toliver hit a 3-pointer at the end of regulation, then made two free throws with 35 seconds left in overtime to give Maryland the decisive lead.

Maryland (34-4) is 6-0 in overtime games this season - the first five on the road and the last in the championship to cap the second-largest comeback in a women's final. It was the first time the title was determined in overtime since Tennessee beat Virginia in 1991.

Toliver's 3-pointer at the end of regulation sent the Terrapins into a frenzy and deflated the Duke bench. But the real party came after Blue Devils guard Jessica Foley's desperation, well-covered 3-point attempt nicked the front of the rim at the overtime buzzer.

Piling up on the court, hugging and bumping chests, the Terrapins reveled in the youth that had been the biggest doubt surrounding them coming into the tournament. Even coach Brenda Frese, who was the coach of the year at 32 and a national champion at 35, is on the precocious side.

"Age is just a number," she said. "When you got kids that believe and they believe in each other and they've got that kind of confidence, you can accomplish anything as a team."

Foley made two free throws with 18 seconds left in regulation to give Duke a 70-67 lead, then Frese called timeout to set up a play.

Toliver brought the ball down and veered to the right. With Duke's Alison Bales in her face and 6.1 seconds left, she lofted the three that would spark the first of the Terps' two celebrations.

"And I even felt her fingertips as I was holding my follow through," Toliver said. "So, she did a great job contesting. I just had a lot of confidence. And I knew I wanted to take the big shot so I just took it."

Duke (31-4) opted not to call a timeout; Lindsey Harding brought the ball down the court and put up a desperation leaver from the right baseline that went off the rim.

After that, the usually frenetic Frese just let her players take over.

"I didn't have to say a word," said the coach, who took over a 10-18 team four years ago after winning the 2002 coach of the year award with Minnesota.

Maryland was a charter member of the Final Four 25 years ago but struggled before Frese took over the program in 2002.

"Who would have ever thought in my wildest dreams I would have gotten two rings this year?" Frese said. "One getting married and the other a national championship."

Duke took a 75-74 lead before Toliver sank two free throws to put Maryland ahead for good. Coleman, who finished with 10 points and 14 rebounds, hit the last two free throws for Maryland with 13.4 seconds left before Foley's three barely hit iron.

Toliver had 16 points, four assists and just three turnovers in the title game. Final Four Most Outstanding Player Laura Harper and Shay Doron also scored 16 for the Terrapins.

After scoring just two points in the first half, the 6-foot-1 Coleman battled against the 6-foot-7 Bales to keep Duke from using its inside edge to counter Maryland's speed. And that's when Toliver took over.

Duke coach Gail Goetseniors wasn't surprised to see a pair of freshmen maintain their poise.

"No, I've seen it too many times," she said. "Every time they go to overtime, they've won."

Monique Currie, who came back for a fifth year to try to win a title, scored 22 points for Duke, and Bales had 19 points and 12 rebounds. But Bales made just one of two free throws with 47 seconds left and the game tied 74-all.
