## TERPS FACE HARVARD & POS-SIBLE REMATCH IN THE 2ND ROUND

- The second seed in the Dayton Regional, sixthranked Maryland faces 15th-seeded Harvard to open the 2007 NCAA Tournament. The Terps travel to Hartford, Conn., for its first-round matchup at the Hartford Civic Center on March 18.
- The Maryland-Harvard game follows the firstround clash between No. 7-seed Mississippi and No. 10 TCU, which tips off at 12 p.m. The Terps' game begins 30 minutes after the conclusion of the first game.
- If the Terps move on to the second round, they will face a regular-season rematch. Maryland played both Ole Miss and the Lady Frogs in November, both falling by a combined margin of victory 24.5 points per game.
- Maryland is making its fourth-straight trip to the NCAA Tournament under head coach Brenda Frese. It is also looking to advance to the second round for the fourth-consecutive year.
- It is Maryland's second trip to the state of Connecticut for a postseason game and its first since 2001.
- Maryland puts a 30-game win streak against non-conference teams on the line in when its takes on Harvard, the third-longest streak in the nation. The Terps have already faced teams from 14 different conference this season.
- Every game of the NCAA Tournament will be televised on ESPN or ESPN2 and ESPNU. The Terrapins'
  first-round game will be on ESPN. The second-round game times and broadcasts will be announced at the
  conclusion of the first round games.
- Calling all the action in Hartford will be Nancy Lieberman (analyst), Dave Revsine (play-by-play) and Rebecca Lobo will be on the sidelines.

## **POSTS VS. GUARDS**

With its inside-outside attack that averages 82.6 and an +14.3 average rebounding edge has made Maryland unstoppable, running out to an 27-5 record. How do opponents shut down the Terps? Below is a statistical breakdown of the posts and guards.

#### **LAST TIME OUT**

- Maryland advanced to the ACC Tournament semifinals for the fourth-straight year, falling to #4/4 North Carolina, 78-72. UNC went on to win the conference
- The Terps was behind by no more than 10 points in the game vs. the Tar Heels. In the second half, traling 66-57, Maryland went on a 10-3 run to tie the game at 67-67 with just over two minutes left in the game. But UNC hit back-to-back layups and knocked down seven rebounds to take control of the game and advanced to the finals.
- The Terps avenged their regular-season loss to Georgia Tech in the quarterfinals, 75-59. Marissa Coleman posted a double-double in the victory, netting 16 points to go with 11 boards. Crystal Langhorne missed out on a fifth-straight double-double, grabbing nine rebounds, while scoring 18 points.
- Maryland limited the Yellow Jackets to just 32.8 percent shooting and smothered them on the boards, outrebounding GT, 46-21.
- Langhorne and Coleman who each scored 34 points in the two games each and grabbed 14 and 19 rebounds, respectively, each earned second team All-ACC Tournament honors.



- Maryland has been in the top 10 in the final AP poll 11 times, including this year's sixth national ranking. Last year's No. 3 final rating tied for the highest final ranking in school history.
- The Terps earned its first No. 1 preseason ranking in school history this season in the AP poll. They remained at No. 1 for 10-straight weeks, before slipping to No. 3 on Jan. 15. Maryland fell out of the top five on Feb. 5, earning its lowest rating of the season at No. 7 on March 6

#### SCHEDULE:

Wednesdays CSN 11 p.m. Thursdays CSTV 11 a.m.  The Terps garnered the No. 1 spot in the preseason poll, the first time in the history of the program they opened the season as the top team in the nation.

#### **TOUGH SCHEDULE**

- Six of Maryland's opponents are ranked in the top 25 this week and three more are receiving votes, two of those
  opponents are among the top three in the nation.
- Duke and North Carolina are at No. 1 and 2, respectively, in both polls. George Washington, who the Terps defeated
  in November, are 14th in the writers' poll and 13th in coaches. Middle Tennessee State is ranked 17th (AP) and 16th
  (ESPN), while NC State moved up to No. 18 and No. 20 after making its run to the championship game of the NCAA
  Tournament. Michigan State is 23rd in both polls.
- Temple, Mississippi and Marist, all teams Maryland has defeated this season, are receiving votes in one or both polls.

# LANGHORNE EARNS ANOTHER NATIONAL HONOR; FINALIST FOR WADE TROPHY

- Crystal Langhorne continues to be recognized for her talents on the court. She was recently named one of the 12 top finalists in contention for the WBCA's State Farm Wade Trophy, presented to the nation's top collegiate women's basketball players. Langhorne makes the Wade Trophy final cut for the first time in her career.
- Langhorne is one of four players in the ACC on the list. Also joining her on the list are Duke's Lindsey Harding and Alison Bales, and North Carolina's Ivory Latta. She is also one of three juniors on the list. LSU's Sylvia Fowles and Stanford's Candice Wiggins are also junior on the ballot.
- Langhorne is also a finalist for the 10-member Kodak/WBCA All-America team, which will be announced on March 31. The winner of the State Farm Wade Trophy will be selected among the 10 All-Americans.

#### LANGHORNE HEADED FOR ANOTHER SCHOOL RECORD

- Crystal Langhorne needs just 18 points for 500 on the season, which would make her the first player in school history with three-straight 500-point seasons.
- Langhorne is already one of two players in the history of the program with two-500 point seasons. Only Shay Doron
  and former Terrapin Vicky Bullett have accomplished such a feat.

## LANGHORNE AMONG TOP PLAYERS IN THE REGION

- For the second-consecutive year, Crystal Langhorne was named a Kodak/WBCA Region II All-America. She was placed on an initial list of 52 finalists for the 10-member Kodak/WBCA All-America team, which will be announced during the NCAA Final Four, April 1-3. Langhorne was one of just six players in the region to earn regional nods. She was recently placed among the top 12 finalists for the State Farm Wade Trophy.
- Earning her third-career All-ACC citation, including second-straight first-team recognition, Langhorne leads the country
  in field goal shooting for the second-straight year. Last year, she became Maryland's first All-American since 1989
  when she was selected by the Associated Press and the United State Basketball Writers Association (USBWA).

#### TERPS UNVEIL CHAMPIONSHIP BANNER

- In its home opener vs. George Mason on Nov. 12, Maryland unveiled its national championship banner. The banner commemorates the Terrapins' 2006 championship run when they won the program's first-ever NCAA title.
- The championship banner will be permanently displayed in the rafters opposite the men's 2002 national championship banner.





## **OUT OF CONFERENCE DOMINATION**

- Maryland has won 30-straight games against non-conference opponents, the third-longest non-conference streak in the nation.
- Both North Carolina and Duke claim the longest non-conference win streak at 32 games.
- The Terps' last loss to a non-conference team was an 80-75 decision to then-No. 1 ranked Tennessee, 80-75, on Nov. 26, 2005 in the championship game of the Paradise Jam in the Virgin Islands.

## COLEMAN, LANGHORNE TABBED ACC TOURNA-MENT ALL-STARS

- Sophomore Marissa Coleman and junior Crystal Langhorne were named to the All-ACC Tournament team after leading the Terps to their fourth-straight semifinal appearance. Both were voted to the second team.
- The all-tournament honor is the third for Langhorne, who was selected to the first team as a freshman and sophomore. Langhorne was the Aeropostale Player of the Game in the Terps' quarterfinal win over Georgia Tech where she nearly had a double-double, netting 18 points and nine rebounds. In the semifinals, she had 16 points and five rebounds, averaging 17.0 points and 7.0 rebounds per game, while shooting 68.2 percent.
- Coleman also had a big weekend at the tournament. She averaged 17.0 ppg and 9.5 rpg, while shooting better than 58 percent. She posted a double-double against the Yellow Jackets, tallying 16 points and 11 rebounds, while adding three assists and two blocks in that game. She followed up with a 18-point, eight-rebound performance in the semifinals vs. North Carolina.

#### THREE TERPS EARN ACC HONORS

- Maryland's Crystal Langhorne, Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver were all named to the All-ACC women's basketball team, which was voted on by the Atlantic Sports Media Association (ACSMA). Langhorne becomes only the third Terrapin to be selected to the first team twice a career, while Coleman makes a repeat on the second team. Toliver was voted to the third team.
- · It is the third-straight year the Terps have had multiple honorees and the sev-

- enth-straight with at least one Terp on the All-ACC team. There has also been a Terrapin on the first team for three-consecutive years, a first since 1992-94.
- The 2005 ACC Rookie of the Year, Langhorne earns All-ACC honors for the third-straight year. She was named to the second team as a freshman. She joins an elite company at Maryland, also becoming just the third player in school history with three All-ACC citations, along with other Terrapin greats Vicky Bullett (1987-89) and current teammate Shay Doron (2004-06).
- Coleman was the 2006 ACC Rookie of the Year. She posted the program's firstever triple double in December against UCSB. It was also the 11th triple-double in ACC history. She ranks in the top 20 in the ACC in scoring, and is in the top 15 in rebounding, field goal percentage, assists per game, free throw percentage, 3-point shooting and assist-to-turnover ratio.
- Toliver boasts the third-best three-point shooting percentage in the country and the best in the ACC. One of 11 finalists for the Nancy Lieberman Award, she is ranked in the conference in scoring, shooting percentage, third in assists per game, three-pointers made per game and assist-to-turnover ratio.

## FIVE AMONG FINALISTS FOR NAISMITH, FIRST TIME EVER

- For the first time ever, five players from the same team were named preseason candidates for the Naismith Award in early December. Maryland's five starters were those players and each has moved on to the 30-member finalists list for the award, presented to the national player of the year, which was announced in early December.
- Maryland continues to make history. Four Terrapins were selected preseason candidates for the Wade Trophy, making it a first in the history of the award that four players from the same team were placed on the Wade Watch list.
- Senior Shay Doron, junior Crystal Langhorne and sophomore Marissa Coleman have been named to three national player of the year lists to date, while sophomore Kristi Toliver was also placed on the Wade Watch. This marks the first time junior Laura Harper, last year's Final Four Most Outstanding Player, has been placed on a national player of the year candidate list.
- Maryland's five starters are averaging double figures this season.

In her final semester at Maryland, she has made three appearances on the all-district team, earning a spot on the second team as a sophomore. She is a Criminology & Criminal Justive major with a 3.67 GPA. Last year, she was named to the Academic All-ACC team.
- Langhorne was voted to the all-district squad for the second year in a row. Last season, she was voted to the second team. Also an Academic All-ACC honoree last season, she is a communications major with a 3.4 GPA.

## LANGHORNE SHOOTING FOR NCAA RECORD

- Junior Crystal Langhorne is within reach of the NCAA's single-season field goal shooting record. The All-American and national player of the year candidate is shooting 72.1 percent from the field, just three tenths of a percentage point away from the NCAA record of 72.4 percent, set by Myndee Larsen of Southern Utah in 1998.
- Langhorne leads the nation in the category for the secondstraight year. She has shot better than 70 percent from the floor 23 times this season, including two perfect outings (vs. George Mason; at Lovola).
- Last year, Langhorne's 67 percent shooting from the floor was the best in the nation. She currently holds the school career re-

cord at 65.6 percent, which currently ranks among the top five best shooting percentages in NCAA history.

## **SUCCESS AT HOME AND ON THE ROAD**

- Maryland captured 14 home games victories this season, and, with its win at Boston College, picked up its 10th road victory, the first time since in 15 years the Terrapins have posted double-figure wins both at home and on the road
- The 10 road wins are also the most since the Terps won 13 in 1991-92, when they finished the season with a 13-3 road record and a 25-6 overall record.

Maryland clinched back-to-back winning seasons in the ACC for the first time since the 1992-93 campaign with its win at Virginia. The Terps' ninth conference victory at Florida State is only the 10th time they have won at least nine ACC games in a season.

Toliver is the second point quard in the Brenda Frese era to be named a finalist. Former Terrapin Anesia Smith was selected among the top 11 in 2005 after averaging 6.7 assists per game.

#### WINNINGEST SENIOR CLASS

- With the ends of the careers of seniors Shay Doron and Aurelie Noirez drawing near, the duo, who are head coach Brenda Frese's first recruiting class, won their 100th-career game at Boston College, making them the winningest senior class in school history.
- The 2007 seniors also rank fourth all-time at Maryland in winning percentage at 75.9 percent. The 1979 seniors hold the school record for four-year winning percentage, winning 80.4 percent of their games (86-21). The 1978 class went 75-20 for a 78.9 win percentage, while the 1980 class posted a 77.0 winning percentage (87-26).
- Among this year's senior classes in the ACC, the Terps are third in wins and winning percentage. Only Duke and North Carolina's seniors have won more games and have a better win percentage. However, the Terps' seniors are the only ones in the ACC to have won a national championship.

## **LANGHORNE & COLEMAN HEAT UP**

- All-ACC performers Crystal Langhorne and Marissa Coleman have been on a tear lately, recording four doubledoubles over the last six games.
- Langhorne had four-straight double-doubles to end the regular season. Three of those games were on the road and the other was against No. 1/1 Duke. She has been averaging 17.2 ppg and 10.5 rpg in Maryland's last six games. She nearly had her fifth-straight double-double in the quarterfinal of the ACC Tournament, falling a rebound short of the feat.
- Coleman also had a double-double in the regular-season loss to Duke two on the road before the Terps headed into the ACC Tournament. She had her third-straight in the quarterfinals vs. Georgia Tech and nearly had another in the semifinals, but was two rebounds shy. She is also averaging a double-double in the last six games with 15 ppg and 10.0 rpg.
- A three-time All-ACC honoree, Langhorne is the conference's active double-doubles leader with 44 in her career. This season, Langhorne ranks second in the ACC with 11. Coleman has been named to the All-ACC team both years of her collegiate career and has 17 double-doubles in her career, eight have come this year.

#### **GAME AFTER GAME**

- At Georgia Tech, senior Shay Doron put on her uniform for the 125th time in her career, the most of any Terrapin in school history. Doron broke Christy Winters' record for most games played, who appeared in 123 games from 1987-89. Doron has now played in 132 career games at Maryland.
- Of the 132 game played, Doron has been etched in the starting lineup 117 times, tying the school record set by former Terrapin Marché Strickland (1999-2002).
- Four other Terrapins are also becoming familiar faces on the hardwood. Senior Aurelie Noirez has played in 107 career games which ranks fourth all-time. Juniors Crystal Langhorne, Jade Perry and Ashleigh Newman, who have played in every game of their careers, have appeared in 102 career games, the seventh-most in school history.

## **GOOD FOR AT LEAST 10**

- National Player of the Year candidate Crystal Langhorne has reached doublefigure scoring in 30 of the Terps' 32 games this season. She had a streak of 44-straight double-figure scoring games dating back to last season until the Wake Forest win.
- In 102 career games, Langhorne has scored in double figures in all but eight games.

#### **GREAT START!**

- The Terps opened the season on an 18-0 run, the best start in school history, topping the 16-0 start during the 1982-83 season. This season's streak ended at Duke
- Maryland's 21-1 record was the best record in school history through 22 games.

## **NO. 1 HURDLE**

- In the last two seasons, Maryland has lost just nine times in 70 games with eight of those losses coming against teams who were ranked No. 1 in the nation at some point over the last two years.
- Eight of Maryland's nine losses in the last two years came at the hands of

The Terps' loss at Georgia Tech is the first to an unranked team since Feb. 24, 2005 when they lost to Virginia Tech, 87-79.

## **COLEMAN, LANGHORNE MAKE WOODEN CUT**

- Maryland's Crystal Langhorne and Marissa Coleman were named to the Midseason Wooden All-American team and are among the top 20 candidates for the John R. Wooden Award, presented to the nation's top women's basketball player. The list is based on individual player performances and team records through the first half of the season.
- Langhorne and Coleman have helped the Terrapins to a top five national ranking for most of the season and the team's second-straight 20-win season.
- Langhorne makes the midseason cut for the second-straight year. She leads the nation in field goal percentage and leads the team in scoring and rebounding. Coleman is second on the team in scoring and rebounding. She was the first player in school history to post a triple-double on Dec. 2 against UC Santa Barbara.

#### **20-WIN SEASONS**

- With their win over Wake Forest, Maryland posted its third-straight season with at least 20 wins, the first time it has accomplished that feat since 1980.
- Maryland has posted at least 25 wins in a season only nine times in the 36-year history of the program, with two of those seasons coming under head coach Brenda Frese. It is also only the third time it has had back-to-back seasons with at least 25 wins.
- Fifth-year head coach Brenda Frese has guided the Terps to at least 18 wins in four of her five seasons at the helm.

### **BALANCING ACT**

- For the second-consecutive year, Maryland boasts a balanced attack and a highpowered offense with numerous options as five Terps are averaging double-digit scoring
- The Terps have had at least four players score in double figures in all but six games. Five times the team has had six players reach double digits, most recently in the blowout victory at Miami. The offense is, once again, one of the best in the nation ranking second overall and second in the ACC, as well.
- All five starters have scored in double figures in five games this season, most recently in the win at Boston College.
- During last year's championship run, five players averaged double figures, the

only team from a major conference to accomplish that feat. The Terps' offense was second in the nation with an average of 83.3 ppg, the highest in the program since 1988-89 (85.3 ppg).

## YOU CAN'T SPELL MARYLAND WITHOUT A "D"

- Known for primarily for their offense, the Terps have also shown they can play on the other end of the court, as well. The team is limiting opponents to 60.3 points per game. In 17 of the Terrapins' 32 games, over half the team's games, they have allowed 60 points per less.
- The Terps have held seven opponents to under 50 points, the most since 1996-97 when they held 10 teams under that threshold, setting the team record during the shot clock era. The overall school record was set in the inaugural year of 1971-72 when 11-of-14 opponents were held to under 50.
- Most recently, the Terps held Boston College to less than 40 points. The 39 points the Eagles scored were the fewest Maryland has allowed in an ACC game since Jan. 28, 1994, when it defeated Florida State, 81-39.
- Maryland is third in the ACC in field goal percentage defense (36.4 percent) and in 3-point field goal percentage defense (26.0 percent).
- Last season, Maryland allowed 65.0 points per game, 4.7 ppg more than this

#### **HAILING THREES**

- Maryland has had a three-pointer in 84-consecutive games, dating back to Jan. 29, 2005 when the Terps made three treys at Arizona to win in overtime. The Terps are ranked ninth in the nation in three-point shooting.
- The Terps led the country in three-point shooting last year (40.0 percent).

## **TOLIVER BREAKS NEWMAN'S 3-POINT** SHOOTING RECORD

- In the Terrapins' victory at Clemson, sophomore Kristi Toliver seemed to be in a "zone." The point guard from Harrisonburg, Va., was a perfect 6-for-6 from three-point range, breaking the school record for the best shooting percentage in a game from that range. It also tied the ACC single-game record, as well.
- Toliver broke teammate Ashleigh Newman's record of 85.7 percent shooting, a mark she set four games ago at Miami. Newman was 6-for-7 on the evening from that distance, shattering the old record of 66.7 percent which had stood since 1989 (by Carla Holmes and matched four more times).
- Both Newman and Toliver's shooting abilities are evident. Both their names are peppered all over the three-point shooting records. Both also helped Maryland break the single-game record for most threes (12) vs. UNC Greensboro in the

## **TERPS' HOUSE**

- Maryland is 14-2 this season in the friendly confines of Comcast Center, both losses coming to the No. 1 and No. 2 teams in the nation (ranking at the time of meeting). The Terps had a 19-game home winning streak, which dated back to their defeat of Florida State on Jan. 16, 2006, snapped by North Carolina on Jan. 28
- Maryland has lost just three home games over the last two seasons, posting a record of 29-3. Last year, the Terps won a school-record 15 home games. Maryland is 60-17 all-time at Comcast Center (since 2002-03).

## LANGHORNE NAMED ACC PLAYER OF THE WEEK

- For the third time in her career and the first time this season, junior Crystal Langhorne was named ACC Player of the Week, which was announced on Jan.
   Langhorne earned the conference weekly honor after averaging nearly 22 points and 6.5 rebounds per game over two games.
- Langhorne closed out a 2-0 week going 13-for-14, dominating the inside against No. 19/18 Michigan State, scoring a season-high 28 points in 28 minutes of action. She was also one rebound shy of a double-double.
- She dropped 15 points, going 5-for-8 from the floor in the decisive victory in the ACC opener against NC State. Langhorne leads the nation in shooting percentage.

## **DORON 2ND AMONG ALL-TIME TERP SCORERS**

- Senior Shay Doron's impact on the Maryland women's basketball program is stamped all over the record books. Another achievement on her resume was added when she became the second-most prolific scorer in school history against NC State on Jan. 3. In her career at Maryland, Doron has scored 1,848 points in 132 games.
- Doron's 10 points against the Wolfpack moved her into second place in scoring at Maryland all-time, trailing only Terrapin great Vicky Bullett who set the school's scoring record, netting 1,928 point from 1986-89.
- As she move up the charts, she passed some great Terrapins, including Christy Winters (1985-90, 1,679), Marcia Richardson (1979-84, 1,630), Jessie Hicks (1990-93, 1,601) and Deanna Tate (1986-89, 1,541), to name a few, and all ranked in the top five on the Maryland scoring list.
- Doron is also among the all-time top scorers in ACC history, ranking 23rd overall.

#### **GETTING IT DONE EARLY**

- The Terps have rarely allowed a suspenseful game this season, generally deciding the outcome in the first half. Averaging a 22.3 margin of victory on the season, in their 27 wins, they have averaged an +14.3 lead in the first 20 minutes of the game.
- Maryland opponents have been within 10 points of the Terps at halftime only four times in its 26 wins (at Middle Tennessee State, 5; at Temple, 2; at Florida

State, -1; at Boston College, 7) and have only lost four times this season.

 Maryland's 39-point halftime lead at Miami was the largest of the season. The Terps were ahead, 59-20, en route to a 111-53 win.

#### **TERPS AS NO. 1**

- After spending the first 10 weeks of the season as the No. 1 team in the country in the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll, the Terrapins have spent 14 weeks all-time in both polls ranked No. 1 team in the nation in the history of the program.
- Maryland's all-time record when ranked No. 1 in both polls is 24-3 over the 14-week period. The Terps were the AP's No. 1 team from Jan. 19-Feb. 15, 1992, and the coaches' top team from Jan. 21-Feb. 17, 1992, and have been ranked No. 1 in both polls every week this season.

## **COACHING MILESTONE**

- Fifth-year head coach Brenda Frese recorded her 100th career-victory at Maryland when the Terrapins defeated NC State, 80-61, in their ACC opener.
- In her five years at Maryland, Frese has amassed 111 victories and 50 losses for a 68.9 winning percentage. She is the second Maryland women's basketball coach to win 100 games in College Park. Former legendary mentor Chris Weller won her 100th Maryland game in her fifth season and in her 136th game at the helm. When she retired after the 2001-02 campaign, she had won 499 contests in 27 years.
- Frese's first win in Colllege Park was an 80-72 win over Loyola on Nov. 22, 2002.
   Since then, she has guided the Terps to four-straight winning seasons, three-consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances, three-straight 20-win seasons, a No. 1 ranking and the program's first-ever national championship crown. Frese has compiled a 168-80 (.677) career record in eight years of coaching.

## **LANGHORNE AMONG TOP 10 SCORERS**

- Making her way up the scoring charts, junior Crystal Langhorne is among the top 10 scorers in school history. The 22nd player in the program to have scored 1,000 points and the fastest player to reach that plateau, she has scored 1,685 in 100-career games, which ranks third all-time at Maryland. She is now chasing current teammate Shay Doron for second place.
- Langhorne tallied her 1,300th career point this season at the Junkanoo Jam, then scored her 1,400th point against UNC Greensboro in the first game of the Terrapin Classic. Her 1,500th and 1,600th points both came against Virginia this season.

## **LANGHORNE AMONG BEST TERP REBOUNDERS**

- In just three seasons as a Terrapin, junior Crystal Langhorne has grabbed more than 900 rebounds in her 100-game career, collecting 922 boards. She grabbed her 900th rebound in her 100th game in the regular-season finale at Boston College.
- Langhorne entered the top 10 at Maryland in career rebounding in just the second game of the season against George Mason.
- Langhorne is one of only three players at Maryland to have 900 rebounds and ranks third all-time, passing former Terp Myra Waters (1979-82) against Michigan State.
- Langhorne grabbed her 800th rebound in the loss at Duke.
- A three-time All-ACC honoree, Langhorne is also among the top rebounders in ACC history, entering the top 25 in total rebounds in the ACC Tournament semifinal loss to North Carolina. She is also ranked in career rebounds per game average (9.1).

#### **SEEING DOUBLE**

- Preseason AP All-American Crystal Langhorne is the ACC's active career double-doubles leader. She has recorded double-doubles in 11 games this season, tied for the second-most in the ACC, and has done so 44 times in 100 career games. Langhorne entered the ACC Tournament on a four-game streak with double-doubles.
- Sophomore Marissa Coleman started off the season where she left off. She
  ended the 2006-07 campaign with double-doubles in both NCAA Final Four
  games and, at Middle Tennessee in the season opener, she posted 19 points and
  a career-high tying 15 rebounds. She has eight double-doubles on the season,
  with four coming in the last six games. She recorded the program's first-ever
  triple-double.

 Laura Harper became the third player this season with a double-double (Dec. 21 at Loyola). She had her second this season in the win at Florida State. Classmate Jade Perry did so in back-to-back games against No. 19/18 Michigan State and at Miami.

## TERPS BREAK 3-POINT SHOOTING RECORD

- Maryland put on a three-point shooting clinic in its victory over UNC Greensboro
  on the first day of the Terrapin Classic. The Terps made 12 three pointers, breaking the single-game team record.
- The previous record of 11 was set in 1999 against Fairleigh Dickinson and was tied on Feb. 5, 2005 at Clemson when then-freshman Ashleigh Newman made seven treys a Clemson, nearly breaking the individual school mark.
- The Terrapins are long removed from the days when they were not a three-point shooting team. In 2004-05, Maryland was last in the ACC in three-pointers made (3.16) and were sixth with a 32.0 three-point shooting percentage. Last year, Maryland led the nation with a 40 percent team shooting percentage from that range and, this season, lead the ACC in three-point shooting and are 11th in the nation in the category.

#### A LITTLE HELP FROM FRIENDS

The Terrapins are averaging 82.6 points per game, the second-most in the nation, but are not scoring without some help. Of the 31.0 field goals made per game, 18.3 of those are coming by an assist. Maryland is 3rd in the nation in assists per game.

#### **CENTURY CLUB**

- The Terrapins have scored over 100 points eight times since head coach Brenda Frese arrived in College Park. Seven of those 100-point games have come in the last two seasons.
- The Terps have reached the 100-point mark three times last year and have already scored 100 points four times this season, as well.
- Maryland was second in the nation in scoring last season and have another potent offense this year, ranking second in the country entering the week.
- Maryland's 111 points at Miami were the most it has scored in an ACC game in 27 years. The Terps scored 117 points in a victory over Wake Forest on Jan. 23, 1980.

## **COLEMAN SELECTED ACC PLAYER OF THE WEEK**

- After registering the program's first-ever triple-double and the 11th in ACC history, sophomore Marissa Coleman was voted the conference's Player of the Week on Dec. 4. She is the first Terp to earn the honor this season.
- Coleman had 15 points, 14 rebounds and a then career-high 10 assists to
  post the triple-double against UC Santa Barbara. She nearly outrebounded the
  Gauchos on her own, as they had only 17 team boards. Earlier in the week,
  she nearly had a double-double, netting 13 points and grabbed nine rebounds
  in the win at Marshall.
- She was the first of two Terrapins so far this season to earn the weekly honor.

## **COLEMAN MAKES HISTORY**

- Sophomore Marissa Coleman was the first player in school history to record a triple-double, doing so in the win over UCSB on Dec. 2. She netted 15 points, grabbed 14 rebounds and had a then career-high 10 assists to mark the achievement.
- Coleman became the 11th player in ACC history to record a triple-double. She
  is the only player in the conference this season to put up a triple-double.

## **SCHOOL RECORD-BREAKING WIN STREAK**

- Maryland's 24-game win tstreak heading into the game at Duke in January was a school record. It had also been the longest win streak in the nation (men's or women's) at the time. The streak dated back to the Terps' NCAA Tournament first-round victory over Sacred Heart on March 19, 2006. The 24-straight wins also set a school record.
- The Terps' win over NC State on Jan. 3 was their 22nd in a row, breaking the previous school record of 21-straight wins, which spanned Jan. 10, 1989, through March 31, 1989.

#### **TAKING THE LEAD**

- Eight different players have led the team in scoring in games this season. Junior Crystal Langhorne has been the team's high scorer nine times, the most of anyone on the team. Sophomore Marissa Coleman is just behind, leading the team in the cateory eight times.
- On the boards, five different Terps have lead the team in rebounding. Langhorne
  has led the team in rebounding in nearly half the games, posting the team high
  12 times. Coleman has also led the team in rebounding nine times, the secondmost on the team.

## **BOARDING SCHOOL**

- The Terps have been dominant on the boards, averaging a +14.3 rebounding margin, the best margin in the nation.
- Maryland has hardly allowed opponents to get their fair share, including top teams such as #2/2 North Carolina, who was ourebounded by the Terps by 12.
   Opponents are averaging just 30.9 rebounds per game against the Terps. UC Santa Barbara had just 17 rebounds in the game on Dec. 2, the fewest in the Brenda Frese era, until the following game when Siena had just 16 on Dec. 4.
- A big part of the formula in last year's NCAA title run was rebounding, as well.
   The Terps led the nation in rebounding margin at +11.9 rpg in 2005-06.
- The +15.9 rebounding margin is the highest since the first year of the program in 1974-75 when the Terps avareged a +16.3 margin on the boards.

#### WINNING BIG

- Maryland's 61-point win over UCSB was tied for the second-largest margin of victory in the history of the program. It was also the largest win margin since the Terps defeated UMES, 102-31, on Dec. 28, 1993, a 71-point margin setting the school record.
- The Terps are averaging a +22.3 margin of victory this season. Maryland ranks third in the ACC and in the country in scoring margin (behind North Carolina +31.2 and Duke +25.0).
- Maryland's highest average margin of victory was +22.7 ppg during the 1975-76 campaign.

#### **CONFERENCE MEDLEY**

- With is win over the Big Ten's Michigan State, Maryland closed out the nonconference portion of the 2006-07 schedule with a spotless record, winning 16 out-of-conference clashes coming against teams from 14 different leagues.
- Maryland's first 11 games of the season were against teams from 11 different conferences, before facing another team from the same league.
- The Terps opened the season against the Sun Belt's Middle Tennessee State and unveiled the championship banner before playing the Colonial Athletic Association's George Mason. The BTI Classic included the Mountain West's TCU, the Pac-10's Arizona and the Atlantic 10's George Washington. In the Bahamas, Maryland defeated the Atlantic Sun's Gardner-Webb before cruising to victory over Mississippi of the SEC. The Terps picked up a road victory at Marshall from Conference USA and then crushed UC Santa Barbara from the Big West. Maryland defeated the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference's Siena when it visited College Park before the Terps beat the Missouri Valley's Northern Iowa. The Terps' meeting at Temple was their second against an A-10 squad.
- Maryland also faced UNC Greensboro from the Southern Conference and the MAAC's Marist at the Terrapin Classic.

## TERPS WIN TERRAPIN CLASSIC

- Maryland won its third regular-season tournament of the season, capturing its fourth-straight Terrapin Classic. National player of the year candidate sophomore Marissa Coleman was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player.
- Sophomore Kristi Toliver was named to the all-tournament team, while junior Sa'de Wiley-Gatewood, who was playing in only her third game as a Terrapin, was also named to the all-star team.
- The Terps extended their win streak to a school-record tying 21 games, defeating UNC Greensboro, 92-57, on the first day, then topped Marist, 86-60, in the championship game.
- The Terrapin guards dominated play, shooting 53.7 percent from three-point range. Both Coleman and Wiley-Gatewood were 5-7 from three over the two



games (.714), while Toliver was 50 percent from long-range, going 6-for-12. Maryland's 12 three pointers vs. the Spartans on the opening day of the tournament was a school record.

- Maryland also made over half their field goals overall, shooting 54.5 percent as a team. On the free throw line, the Terps were just as impressive, missing just six freebees in 52 attempts for an 88.5 shooting percentage.
- On the glass, Maryland was just as dominant, outrebounding UNCG and the Red Foxes by an average margin of 22.0 rebounds per game.

#### **TERPS CLAIM JUNKANOO JAM TITLE**

- Maryland won its second regular-season tournament crown, claiming the Junkanoo Jam in the Bahamas over the Thanksgiving break. Senior Shay Doron was named Most Valuable Player, while juniors Crystal Langhorne and Laura Harper were selected to the all-tournament team.
- The Terrapins broke the tournament single-game scoring record, netting 110 points in the win over Mississippi in the championship game. Ole Miss, on the other hand, scored 79 points. Maryland defeated Gardner-Webb, 83-41, on the first day to reach the title matchup.
- Four Terps averaged double figures in the tournament, as Maryland displayed its balanced scoring. Langhorne, Doron and Harper each averaged 16.5 points per game over the two games, while sophomore Marissa Coleman tallied 15.5 ppg.

## **TERPS WIN BTI CLASSIC**

- The Terps won the first-ever BTI Classic which was hosted at Comcast Center, sweeping 2006 NCAA Tournament participant TCU (82-64), the Pac-10's Arizona (75-61) and then-25th ranked George Washington (73-48).
- Junior All-American Crystal Langhorne was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player after averaging 14.0 points and 9.3 rebounds per game, while shooting 75 percent from the floor. Senior Shay Doron had three-straight doubledigit games, opening with a 22-point and seven-rebound performance against TCU. She also had seven boards against George Washington.
- Junior Laura Harper also had a standout performance in the BTI Classic. She netted a career-high 27 points vs. the Lady Frogs, tallying 14 points in the final

## **BULLETT SELECTED ACC LEGEND**

Former Terrapin great Vicky Bullett was selected to this year's class of ACC Women's Basketball Legends, the Atlantic Coast Conference recently announced. She, along with the 11 other members of the class, will be honored at the 2007 ACC Women's Basketball Championship in Greensboro, N.C., March 1-4.

In its third year, the ACC Women's Basketball Legends program honors past players from each of the ACC's 12 schools who have contributed to the league's rich tradition. This year's class represents four decades of ACC women's basketball.

Vicky Bullett played at Maryland from 1986-89. She was named a Kodak All-American after leading the Terps to an ACC title, the NCAA Final Four



and a team record of 29-3 in 1989. She was also a member of the 1987 ACC Championship team that advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight.

Bullett is the Terrapins' all-time leading scorer (1,928) and rebounder (968). She also holds a number of school records, including points in a single season (686). Bullett was the Most Valuable Player of the 1989 ACC Tournament and was named to two NCAA all-region teams in 1988 and 1989.

Bullett is a two-time Olympian, helping the U.S. women win a gold medal in 1988. She was also named to the ACC's 50th Anniversary team.

The BTI Classic was the first of three in-season tournaments for the Terrapins.

## **FIRST-EVER NO. 1 PRESEASON RANKING**

- For the first time in the history of the program, Maryland was ranked No. 1 in both the Associated Pres and ESPN/USA Today Coaches Preseason poll. It was the first time in 10 years a team other than Connecticut, Duke or Tennessee had been preseason ranked No. 1.
- The Terps' No. 1 ranking in both polls comes after they won the 2006 NCAA title
  in April and return the top eight scorers and rebounders from that championship
  team. Among the returnees is also all five starters. The Terrapins ended the
  2005-06 campaign ranked No. 1 by the coaches after capturing the NCAA title
  with a 78-75 overtime victory against Duke in April.
- The only other time Maryland was ranked No. 1 (AP) in the history of the program was from Jan. 19-Feb. 15, 1992. The Terps were previously No. 1 in the coaches poll from Jan. 11-Feb. 17, 1992.
- Maryland was ranked No. 1 in the preseason in numerous polls published by several collegiate basketball publications. The Terps were tabbed the top team in the nation by Street & Smith's, Lindy's, ESPN.com, CBSSportsline.com and GBallmag.com. Athlon's picked Maryland No. 2.

#### **FOUR TERPS NAMED WADE TROPHY CANDIDATES**

- For the first time in the history of the award, four players from the same team were named Wade Trophy preseason candidates as Shay Doron, Marissa Coleman, Crystal Langhorne and Kristi Toliver were each selected to the 25-player list.
- Doron and Langhorne are making repeat appearances on the Wade Watch List. Doron is a three-year starter for the Terps and the second player in school history to be named All-ACC three times. Langhorne was an All-American at the end of last year, Maryland's first since 1989, and a first team All-ACC honoree. She led the nation in shooting percentage (67.0).
- Rookies last season, Coleman and Toliver made immediate impacts last year.
   Coleman was a second team All-ACC selection and was named the conference's Rookie of the Year. Toliver hit one of the most memorable shot in NCAA Tournament history, knocking down a three-pointer with six second remaining to force overtime in the championship game. She was selected All-Tournament at the Albuquerque Regional and the Final Four.
- The Wade Trophy is presented by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association and is given annually to the collegiate women's basketball's top player in the country. The criteria is based on game and season statistics, leadership, character, effect on their team and overall playing ability.

## THREE NAMED WOODEN AWARD CANDIDATES

- For the second time this preseason, Shay Doron, Marissa Coleman and Crystal Langhorne were named candidates for a national player of the year award, as each were among the 30 names announced for the preseason candidates John R. Wooden Award, presented to the top women's collegiate basketball player in the nation.
- Both Doron and Langhorne were named preseason candidates a year ago.
   Langhorne was a finalist for the prestigious honor last season, as well.
- Maryland's three candidates are tied for the most selections by one school. North Carolina also had three candidates on the 30-player list. In October, the trio were also named to the Wade Trophy Watch List, along with sophomore Kristi Toliver.

## **IN OPENERS**

- The Terrapins are 21-8 all-time in ACC openers, after defeating NC State on Jan. 3. Maryland also won its ACC road opener at Miami, the third time in four years the Terps have won their opening road conference game.
- Maryland improved to 30-6 in season openers and beat George Mason in their home opener this year. The Terps are 33-4 all-time in home openers, winning the last eight in a row.
- The Terps also opened the home slate against George Mason on Nov. 29, 1989, winning 75-63, the season after the Maryland reached the Final Four.

#### **A LOOK BACK**

- Maryland is coming off the program's first-ever national championship, defeating ACC-rival Duke, 78-75, in overtime. The Terrapins won the title with one junior, two sophomores and two freshmen in the starting linep.
- Maryland, who ended the regular-season ranked third in the Associated Press poll, won a school-record (men's and women's) 34 games in 2005-06. Its only four losses of the season were to teams ranked No. 1 in the country at some point in the season.
- The Terps went 6-0 in overtime games last year, including the national championship game. They also played overtime in the regional finals vs. Utah to get to the Final Four
- Crystal Langhorne became the first player in 17 years to garner All-American honors, earning the national recognition by the Associated Press and the United State Basketball Writers Association. Langhorne led the nation with a 67 percent shooting percentage.
- Maryland had three players on the All-ACC team, with Langhorne earning a spot on the first team. Shay Doron and Marissa Coleman were selected to the second team. Coleman was the lone freshman in the ACC to garner all-conference honors
- The Terrapins had five players averaging double figures as the team ranked second in the nation in scoring offense (83.3 ppg). They also led the nation in three-point percentage (40.0) and rebounding margin (+11.9 rpg).

## **LANGHORNE PRESEASON AP ALL-AMERICAN**

- Junior Crystal Langhorne was among the five named to the Associated Press' Preseason All-American team. She is the first Terrapin to be named to the preseason squad under head coach Brenda Frese.
- Langhorne has already earned a number of preseason recognitions. She had been named to both the Wade Trophy and Wooden Award candidates' lists, while also earning preseason All-ACC nods. She has been singled out in numerous publications as one of the top players in the nation.
- Langhorne, who led the Terps with 17.2 points and 8.6 rebounds per game, was the program's first All-American in 17 years last year, earning a spot on the AP and United State Basketball Writers Association lists.

## **TERPS TOP PICK IN ACC PRESEASON POLL**

- Receiving 25 of 38 first-place votes, Brenda Frese's Terrapins were predicted to
  finish first in the conference in the ACC Preseason Poll, determined by a vote
  of the media, league sports information directors and head coaches. It is just
  the second time in the history of the program the Terps have been picked the
  favorites to win the league.
- Frese returned all five starters from last year's championship team and the top eight scorer's and rebounders. Maryland also returns the program's first All-American in 17 years in Crystal Langhorne, the 2006 ACC Rookie of the Year in Marissa Coleman, the Final Four Most Outstanding Player in Laura Harper, as well as, three All-ACC picks and two Final Four All-Tournament team members

## LANGHORNE, COLEMAN NAMED PRESEASON ALL-ACC

- Junior Crystal Langhorne and sophomore Marissa Coleman were selected to the Preseason All-ACC team, announced when the ACC preseason poll was released.
- Langhorne is a preseason All-ACC honoree for the second-straight year. Last year, she went on to be voted to the first team, almost a unanimous pick, receiving 65 of 70 first team votes. Langhorne, who reached the 1,000 point mark faster than any player in school history, became the program's first All-American in 17 years and was named the NCAA Tournament Albuquerque Region's Most Valuable Player.
- Coleman was last year's ACC Rookie of the Year and was the only freshman in the league to earn All-ACC honors, earning a spot on the second team. Leading the conference in three-point shooting percentage (47.0), she ranked in the top 15 in the ACC in seven different statistical categories.

## **WHAT'S BACK**

- This team is nearly identical to last season's championship squad, with the top eight scorers and rebounders returning. With no seniors in the starting lineup last year, all five starters also return.
- The senior class consisting of Shay Doron and Aurelie Noirez is just two this season. Doron is Brenda Frese's first recruit, committing to College Park before Frese even coached a game at Maryland. Doron is one of only two players to be named All-ACC three times and her name can be spotted all over the record books. Noirez has played in the majority of games in her career as one of the primary post backups. She, along with Doron and Crystal Langhorne, is a team tri-captain.
- The junior class of Crystal Langhorne, Laura Harper, Jade Perry and Ashleigh Newman came to College Park as the No. 2-rated class in the country in 2004. This class boasts an All-American, the Final Four MOP, the 2005 ACC Rookie of the Year and two ACC All-Tournament honorees. New to the mix is Tennessee transfer Sa'de Wiley-Gatewood, a point guard out of Pomona, Calif., who practiced with the team for more than half the season after arriving in College Park in the winter. She was the 2004 Parade National Prep Player of the Year before heading to Knoxville, Tenn. She started playing for the Terps in December.
- Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver did not play as typical freshman last season and now, as sophomores, will be expected to play as veterans again. Coleman was second on the team in scoring and rebounding and was the ACC's 2006 ACC Rookie of the Year, while Toliver hit the dramatic three-point shot in the championship game to force overtime against Duke. She was an Albuquerque Regional and Final Four All-Tournament team selection. Reshirt sophomore Christie Marrone will finally be able to play in a Maryland uniform after sitting out last season after transferring from Virginia Tech.

#### THE WAIT IS OVER

- For two redshirts, the wait is over. Redshirt sophomore Christie Marrone sat out the 2005-06 championship season because of transfer eligibility rules, coming to College Park after one season at Virginia Tech. In her debut as a Terrapin at Middle Tennessee State, she knocked down her only shot attempt of the game, dishing off an assist in eight minutes.
- Redshirt-junior Sa'de Wiley-Gatewood transferred out of Tennessee to Maryland during the season last year and practiced with the Terrapins during the spring semester, while sitting out the rest of the school year because of NCAA transfer eligiblity rules. Because of her mid-season transfer, Wiley-Gatewood finally hit the hardwood on Dec. 21, 2006 at Loyola, dishing out a career-high 8 assists. Wiley-Gatewood has 1.5 years of eligibility remaining.

## **WHAT'S NEW**

- Emery Wallace is the only newcomer on the squad and is the only true freshman on the team. Hailing from Roanoke, Va., she played two seasons at Hidden Valley after transferring from Northside High. She scored 1,497 career points, grabbed 580 points and made 106 three-pointers, en route to earning District Player of the Year honors, despite missing the first 10 games of her senior year while coming back from an ACL injury.
- Wallace, who was a teammate of Kristi Toliver's on the AAU Elkton Elks squad, was sidelined during the preseason with an injury. She is expected to be back



on the court this season.
