## Five-Straight NCAA Tournament Appearances • Four-Straight 20-Win Seasons

### QUICK HITS

- Maryland is ranked fifth in the final *Associated Press* poll, appearing in the top five every week.
- The Terps' No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament is the second time in the history of the program they have earned a top seed.
- The Terrapins are making their second NCAA Sweet 16 appearance in three years and third in 16 years. It will be their seventh Sweet 16 showing all-time.
- Maryland ended the home season with a 21-0 record, which is believed to be an NCAA record, also tying a mark set by UNLV in 1978-79.
- Crystal Langhorne became only the fourth player in ACC history to score 2,200 points and grab 1,200 career rebounds.
- Crystal Langhorne has had double-doubles in both games of the NCAA Tournament.
- Junior Marissa Coleman eclipsed the 1,500-point mark for her career, also breaking the school's single-season free throws record vs. Nebraska.
- Junior Laura Harper needs just one block to break the senior class school record.
- Maryland surpassed its win total from a year ago. Last year's team went 28-6 overall and 10-4 in ACC play.
- Maryland has recorded four-straight 20-win seasons for the first time in school history.
- For the first time in the history of the program, Maryland has won 10 ACC games in three-consecutive seasons. Its 13 league wins and 92.9 winning percentage both tie school records.
- The Terps' four All-ACC selections are a school record. Crystal Langhorne is Maryland's first four-time All-ACC honoree and one of just 10 in the history of the ACC to be named to the first team three times.
- Marissa Coleman's three-straight All-ACC selections makes her one of four Terrapins all-time to be named all-conference at least three times.
- The Terps are one of two teams in NCAA history to have four players with 1,300 career points on the roster (along with 01-02 Connecticut). They are one of 12 known teams with four 1,000-point scorers.
- The Terps have had at least one player with a double-double in 29 of their 34 games and lead the country with 46 team double-doubles.
- Crystal Langhorne and Kristi Toliver are finalists for the Naismith and Wooden Awards.
- Crystal Langhorne and Kristi Toliver were selected WBCA Region II All-Americans.
- Kristi Toliver is a finalist for the Nancy Lieberman Award, presented to the nation's top point guard.

### TOP-SEEDED MARYLAND TRAVELS TO SPOKANE FOR SWEET SIXTEEN

- The No. 1 seed in the region, Maryland heads to Spokane for the Sweet Sixteen. It will face fourth-seeded Vanderbilt on Saturday, March 29 at 6 p.m. PT/9 p.m. ET. The Terrapins advance to the Sweet Sixteen for the second time in three years.
- Also surviving through to the Sweet Sixteen were sixth-seeded Pittsburgh, who the Terps beat earlier in the season at Comcast Center, and second-seeded Stanford, the Pac-10 champion. The winners of Saturday's games move on to the Elite Eight on Monday, March 31.
- Both rounds of the tournament in Spokane will be televised nationally. Maryland's first matchup against Vanderbilt will be broadcast on ESPN with Debbie Antonelli and Dave Patsch calling the action. Heather Cox will be on the sidelines.

### TERPS RECEIVE TOP FIVE FINAL RANKING

- The Terrapins end the 2007-08 campaign ranked fifth in the *Associated Press* poll. It is the second time in three years Maryland finishes with a top-five national ranking.
- The Terps have been ranked in the top five in the writers' poll every week this season, reaching as high as No. 3 and never falling below No. 5. Their only three losses have come to No. 2 North Carolina and No. 7 Rutgers on the road, and a neutral-site setback to No. 10 Duke.

- Seven Maryland opponents appear in the final top 25 poll. This season's schedule featured games against Rutgers (#7), LSU (#4), Oklahoma (#11) and Notre Dame (#19). Conference rivals North Carolina (#2), Duke (#10) and Virginia (#23) also finish the campaign in the rankings.
- Four more opponents are receiving votes in the AP poll: Ohio State, Pittsburgh, Temple and Middle Tennessee State.

**MARYLAND SIXTH IN COACHES POLL**

- The Terrapins slipped to No. 6 in the *USA Today*/ESPN Coaches Poll after falling in the ACC Tournament semifinals and remains there for the second week in a row.
- The Terps have been ranked every week and have appeared in the top five of the coaches poll for all but three weeks of the season. The final poll will be released following the national championship game.
- The seven Maryland opponents appearing in the top 25 coaches poll this week are ACC foe North Carolina (#2), LSU (#5), Rutgers (#7), Duke (#10), Oklahoma (#13), Notre Dame (#19) and Virginia (#23).
- Four more opponents are receiving votes: Ohio State, Pittsburgh, Temple and Middle Tennessee State.

**LAST TIME OUT**

- Maryland went on an 11-3 run in the last five minutes to hold off eighth-seeded Nebraska, 76-64, in the second round of the NCAA Tournament at Comcast Center. The game marked the final contest for the 2008 Terrapin seniors on their home court.
- Senior Crystal Langhorne had her second-straight double-double with 18 points and 12 rebounds. Juniors Kristi Toliver and Marissa Coleman each added 19 points and six rebounds.
- The Terps ran out to an early 15-point lead, going ahead 32-17 with just over five minutes remaining in the first half. But the Huskers used an 18-2 run to close to within 34-33 at the break. After trading baskets and the game tied at 45-45 with under 15 minutes to play, the Terps seems to take control, although Nebraska did not give up easily.
- Maryland overcame a 33.3 percent shooting performance in the first half, shooting 51.5 percent in the second half and 42.9 percent for the game. It also outrebounded Nebraska, 47-34. Yvonne Turner had 23 points for NU, but no other player cracked double digits.

**TWO NAMED TO WBCA REGION TEAM**

- Crystal Langhorne and Kristi Toliver were voted to the WBCA Region II All-America team. Langhorne becomes the first Terrapin to earn all-region nods three times.
- The duo were also selected two of 40 finalists for the State Farm/WBCA All-America team, an honor which Langhorne earned last season.

**LANGHORNE IS ACC PLAYER OF THE YEAR**

- In her final season with the Terrapins, Crystal Langhorne, who has marked her career as a consistent force down low, was voted the 2008 ACC Player of the Year, becoming only the second Terrapin and the first since 1989 to earn the honor. Langhorne received 23 of 49 votes, ahead of North Carolina's Erlana Larkins (12), teammate Kristi Toliver (8), NC State's Khadijah Whittington (5) and UNC's Rashanda McCants (1).
- Langhorne is the one of only four players in the history of the ACC to receive the ACC's Rookie of the Year honor, which she received in 2005, and Player of the Year nod in their careers.
- A two-time All-American, Langhorne is a four-time All-ACC performer, a first in the history of the program. She is the one of only 10 players in league history to be named to the first team three times.

**SCHOOL-RECORD 4 TERPS EARN ACC HONORS**

- Four Terrapins were voted to the All-ACC team, a record for the program. Crystal Langhorne and Kristi Toliver earned the most number of points (144) and first-team votes (46 out of 49). Marissa Coleman was named to the second team, receiving five first-team votes and 83 points, while Laura Harper was on the third team with 48 points.
- Langhorne became Maryland's first four-time All-ACC honoree and first three-time first team selection. She was a third team pick as a freshman and was selected to the first team her last three seasons.
- Toliver was a third team pick last year. Her selection along with Langhorne's makes it the first time since 1989 and the third time overall that Maryland had two players named to the first team the same year.
- Coleman was voted to the second team for the third-straight year, making her only the fourth player in Maryland women's basketball history, along with Langhorne, Shay Doron (2004-06) and Vicky Bullett (1987-89), to earn all-conference nods at least three times.
- Harper received her first All-ACC honor and was named to the third team.

## LANGHORNE EARNS SCHOLAR-ATHLETE HONOR

- Maryland's Crystal Langhorne's talents on the court have overshadowed her abilities in the classroom. Earning a cumulative grade point average of 3.43 in communications, Langhorne was named the ACC Scholar-Athlete for women's basketball, becoming the first-ever player to receive the award. The honor was established in September to be awarded to the top junior or senior in their respective sport.
- A candidate must have maintained a 3.0 GPA over their career and a 3.0 during the last two semesters to qualify for the honor.
- Langhorne is a two-time Academic All-American and a three-time Academic All-ACC honoree. She has also been named to the ACC Honor Roll three times.

## FRESE CLAIMS 200TH VICTORY

- Maryland head coach Brenda Frese won her 200th game, claiming an 80-66 victory over Coppin State in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. Frese is in her ninth season as a head coach, making stops at Ball State and Minnesota, before landing in College Park in 2002-03.
- Frese boasts a 201-83 mark making amazing turnarounds at all three programs. The 2002 *Associated Press* Coach of the Year, she has been at College Park for six seasons, recording a 144-54 mark on the Terrapin sideline.

## LANGHORNE'S REACHES ANOTHER MILESTONE

- Crystal Langhorne has scored over 2,200 points and grabbed over 1,200 rebounds in her career. She is only the fourth player in ACC history to achieve the feat.

## HOME SWEET HOME

- Maryland has won a school-record 21 home games, breaking the program mark set during the 2005-06 campaign, the third-longest active streak in the NCAA. Old Dominion has the longest active win streak at 27.
- Maryland finished the home season undefeated, winning 19 home victories. The 20th and 21st home victories came in the NCAA Tournament. It is believed to be an NCAA record. UNLV posted 21 wins at home in 1978-79, before the NCAA.

## UNGRACIOUS HOSTS

- Completing the non-conference schedule capturing the Terrapin Classic, Maryland has a 21-game home win streak against non-conference opponents.
- The Terps' last non-conference loss at Comcast Center was to Ohio State in the second round of the 2005 NCAA Tournament.
- Since moving to Comcast Center in 2002-03, the Terps have gone 50-4 in non-conference games. The four losses were to teams ranked in the top 25 at the time of the meeting.

## CRAMMING COMCAST

- For the second-straight year, Maryland is among the top 10 in the nation in attendance. The Terps end the home season ranked eighth in the country with a 7,947 average attendance, according to the unofficial figures compiled by the University of Wisconsin. Maryland surpasses the 150,000 mark for the second-straight year.

- In 2006-07, the Terrapins had a school-record 152,523 fans come to Comcast Center for 16 home games. Its 9,533 fans per game was the best single-season jump in average attendance, more than double the previous year's average attendance. Maryland finished sixth in average attendance

- Maryland has recorded three of the top 10 attendances in ACC history this season (vs. Duke, vs. Virginia and vs. Florida State), also three of the top 30 attendance marks in the nation. Its attendances vs. Duke and Florida State, both of which drew more than 15,000 fans each, are among the top 10 attendances in the nation this season.
- Maryland also owns nine of the top 10 attendance marks in league history.

## TWO TERRAPINS SELECTED WOODEN FINALISTS

- ACC Player of the Year Crystal Langhorne and junior Kristi Toliver were named one of 17 finalists for the John R. Wooden Award, presented to the nation's top collegiate player. The winner of the award will be announced on April 12 at the Los Angeles Athletic Club.
- Maryland and Connecticut were the only teams with two balloted players, while the ACC had three total.

## TERPS RECEIVE HONORS BY NATIONAL PUBLICATIONS

- While Maryland took a break from basketball after the ACC Tournament, three national publications handed out its postseason honors.
- Sports Illustrated* announced its All-American team with junior Kristi Toliver earning a spot on the first team. Senior Crystal Langhorne and junior Marissa Coleman were named to the second team.
- Langhorne was a first-team selection by cbssportsline.com, while Toliver was listed on the second team.
- ESPN.com selected Toliver and Langhorne to its second team All-American squad.
- Maryland was the only team to have more than one player selected in any of the publications' honors.

## STRICKLAND AMONG TOP ACC ROOKIES

- Maryland freshman Marah Strickland was voted an Honorable Mention ACC All-Freshman, the league announced on Tuesday. She received 16 points, missing the top five cut.
- Strickland, the younger sister of former Terp Marché (1999-02), started all but one game this season. She led the league in three-point shooting for most of the season, and currently ranks second in the category.

## LUCKY 13

- Maryland's 13-1 ACC record ties the school mark. The wins are the most since 1992 when the Terps went 13-3. The Terps first won 13 ACC games in 1989 to set the standard.
- The 92.9 winning percentage this season also matches the winning percentage set in 1989, when the team also went 13-1.

## 10 CUBED

- For the first time in the history of the program, Maryland has won at least 10 ACC games in three-consecutive seasons.
- Under head coach Brenda Frese, the Terps have posted at least a .500 league record in five of her last six years at the Maryland helm. It is the first time the Terps have had five-straight .500 or better campaigns in ACC play since the 1993-94 season.

## FRESE DELIVERS TWIN BOYS

- Head coach Brenda Frese gave birth to twin boys on Sunday, Feb. 17, welcoming Markus William (5 lbs, 5 oz; 18.5 in.) and Tyler Joseph (6 lbs, 12 oz; 19.25 in.) into the world. The boys are the first children for Frese, 37, and her husband, Mark Thomas. The team was given the good news at the end of shootaround on the morning of their win at Duke.
- When the team gathered for the first time this school year, Frese ended the team meeting with a surprise announcement. Frese broke the news that she and Thomas were expecting twins this year.

## SHE'S BACK

- During her pregnancy, Maryland head coach Brenda Frese had been restricted by her doctors from traveling to road games since December.

In her sixth season at the Maryland helm, Frese missed the first six road games of the ACC season, she also missed the team's trips to UC Santa Barbara, UCLA and James Madison. However, the coach made a surprise showing at the team's game at NC State, flying in the morning of the game to coach the Terps.

- Frese has been at every home game this season but one. She was not on the sideline for the Terps' contest vs. Middle Tennessee State because of illness. She returned to the Comcast Center sidelines one week after delivering twins for the Senior Day festivities. She was on the bench for the second half of the Terps' win over Florida State.
- Coach Frese was back on the court coaching at practice prior to the ACC Tournament and traveled to Greensboro with the team.

## TERPS LEAD THE NATION IN DOUBLE-DOUBLES

- Maryland's 47 team double-doubles are the most for any team in the nation this season. At least one Terp has achieved the feat in 30 of the team's 35 games. Five different Terrapins have recorded a double-double this season.

## DOUBLE-TROUBLE

- In 35 games this season, the Terps have recorded 47 double-doubles and at least one double-double has been posted in all but five games.
- National Player of the Year candidate Crystal Langhorne has recorded a team-leading 15 double-doubles this season. She recorded her 50th-career double-double in the win at Boston College. Thirteen of those double-doubles have come in the last 20 games, including double-doubles in both games of the NCAA Tournament. Harper has 12, her latest coming against Duke in the ACC semifinals.
- Junior Marissa Coleman is third on the team with 10 double-doubles so far, most recently achieving the feat at NC State, Junior Kristi Toliver has accounted for seven double-doubles. She has achieved the feat achieving double figures in points and assists.
- Senior Jade Perry recorded double-doubles three times, as well, reaching double digits in points and rebounds.

## LEAVING LAST YEAR BEHIND

- With its final regular-season win at NC State, Maryland picked up its 29th victory of the season, surpassing its win total from a year ago. The Terps also surpassed their ACC win total from last year. The 2006-07 Terrapins went 28-6 overall and 10-4 in the league.

## GOOD FOR AT LEAST 10

- National Player of the Year candidate Crystal Langhorne can be counted on for at least 10 points a game, reaching double figures in 27 of 29 games this season.
- In her career, Langhorne has reached double figures in 123 career games (out of 132), which ranks seventh all-time in NCAA history.

## LANGHORNE'S JERSEY HONORED

- Crystal Langhorne had her jersey honored at Maryland's final regular-season home game vs. Florida State. Langhorne's jersey is the fifth women's basketball jersey to hang in the Comcast Center rafters.
- Langhorne owns numerous records at Maryland. The only multiple All-American at Maryland, she is the program's all-time scoring and rebounding leader. She is the only men's or women's player at Maryland to score 2,000 points and collect 1,000 rebounds. A three-time All-ACC honoree and 2005 ACC Rookie of the Year, she also owns the school and ACC records for field goal percentage.
- Langhorne's jersey will hang alongside all-time legends Vicky Bullett, Shay Doron, Tara Heiss and Jasmina Perazic.

## HEAD OF THE CLASS

- The 2007-08 senior class was recognized for Senior Day prior to the start of the contest vs. Florida State.
- This year's senior class will leave Maryland as the winningest class in the history of the program. Crystal Langhorne, Laura Harper, Ashleigh Newman and Jade Perry have won 116 games, one of only two classes to claim 100 victories during their careers. It is the only class to have 20-win seasons every year.
- A senior in academic standings, Christie Marrone was also honored on Senior Day. She announced earlier this season she would be graduating from Maryland this summer.
- This senior class has also won 84.1 percent of its games played, shattering the previous record of 80.4 percent which was set by the 1978-79 senior class.

## CHARITY POINTS

- Maryland has been an offensive machine over the last few years, but it does not just come from layups, jump shots or three pointers. The Terps are also getting some freebees from the free throw stripe, averaging 10.7 more points per game than their opponents from the line (19.0 ppg vs. 8.3 ppg).
- Maryland is shooting a league-best 74.9 percent from the free throw line.

## TOLIVER BREAKS ANOTHER 3-POINT MARK

- Junior Kristi Toliver has already broken the Maryland career three-point shooting record and owns the ACC's single-game three-point shooting mark. In the ACC Tournament semifinal against Duke, she claimed three-point mark, breaking the program's single-season record for makes.
- Toliver has knocked down 75 threes this season, breaking her own mark of 72 which she set last season.

## BACKED BY BARACK

- When democratic primary candidate Barack Obama visited the University of Maryland campus on Feb. 11, he did not fail to mention the Maryland women's basketball team's 2006 National Championship banner. Speaking in front of a near capacity crowd at Comcast Center, Obama recognized the Terps and singled them out to the crowd. After a loud cheer from the audience, the candidate called out to them, "if I had brought my sneakers, I'd suit up and play against you. I've still got game ... I do." According to newspaper reports, Obama has a superstition of playing basketball on the morning of primary caucuses.

## TERPS ARE TOP SHOOTING TEAM IN THE NATION

- With the latest NCAA rankings released on March 16, the Terrapins were the top shooting team in the country, ranking first in field goal shooting, knocking down almost 50 percent of their shot attempts.
- Maryland is ranked in the top 10 in five more categories. It boasts the second-best scoring average in the nation, ranked fourth in rebounding margin, sixth in scoring margin and 10th in three-point field goal percentage. The Terps' 90.9 percent winning percentage (reflecting a 30-3 record) is ranked fifth in the country.
- In the individual rankings, senior Crystal Langhorne is second in the nation in field goal shooting. She led the country in the category the last two years. Junior Kristi Toliver is fourth in the nation in assists per game. Both are also ranked in the top 100 in several different categories.
- Senior Laura Harper boasts the third-best shooting percentage in the nation, while Marissa Coleman is in the top 65 in free throw percentage.

## HARPER BLOCKS HER WAY INTO RECORD BOOK

- Senior Laura Harper's block in the win over Boston College on Valentine's Day broke the Maryland career record, which had stood for 28 seasons. Harper has had 196 blocks in her career, breaking Kris Kirchner's mark of 186 set from 1978-80.
- Harper currently ranks 10th all-time in ACC history in career blocks, while her 1.7 career blocks average is in the top 15.

## TOLIVER SELECTED FINALIST FOR TOP POINT GUARD HONOR

- Junior Kristi Toliver was selected a finalist for the Nancy Lieberman Award, presented to the nation's top Division I women's basketball player. Toliver is joined on the list by eight other point guards.
- Toliver is the only point guard in the ACC on the list of final nominees.
- Toliver is fourth in the nation in assists per game (7.5), threatening the ACC's single-season record. She is also averaging a career-best 16.8 ppg.
- Toliver was a finalist for the honor last year, as well.

**NEWMAN SELECTED FOR COACHING WORKSHOP**

- Senior Ashleigh Newman was selected one of 53 participants for the 2008 class of Nike's "So You Want to Be A Coach" workshop. In its sixth year, the WBCA will host the two-and-a-half day workshop in Tampa, Fla., April 4-6.

**COLEMAN JOINS ELITE COMPANY**

- In the win at Virginia Tech, junior Marissa Coleman joined very elite company, becoming the first Maryland women's basketball player with 1,000 points, 700 rebounds, 300 assists and 100 blocks. Only two other players in ACC history have achieved that feat. Former All-Americans Alana Beard (2687 points, 789 rebounds, 509 assists, 149 blocks) and Iciss Tillis (1712 points, 946 rebounds, 301 assists, 151 blocks) have reached those milestones in league history.

**DRAINING THREES**

- Maryland has made at least a three pointer in 121-consecutive games. The streak dates back to Jan. 29, 2005 at Arizona.

**IRON TERP**

- With her appearance in the game at Boston College on Thursday, Jan. 10, Ashleigh Newman broke the school record for most-consecutive games played, making her 124th career showing.
- Newman has played every game of her career (139 total) and broke former Terrapin Christy Winters' mark, who played every game of her career from 1987-90.

**LANGHORNE IS RIGHT ON**

- Two-time All-American Crystal Langhorne is having another solid season from the floor, currently ranked second in the nation in field goal percentage (as of March 16).
- Langhorne has been in the top five in field goal shooting since qualifying for the statistical minimums after the North Carolina game on Jan. 26 and has made 64.6 percent of her shots from the floor.
- Langhorne boasts a 65.2 percent career shooting percentage, which is an ACC record and ranks among the top 15 all-time in NCAA history across all divisions and is in the top five in NCAA Division I history.

**BOARDING SCHOOL**

- Maryland, the leading rebounding team in the nation the last two years, has shown that controlling the glass can affect the outcomes of games. The Terps are 112-9 when outrebounding opponents since 2004-05 and 6-14 when they collect the same or fewer caroms than their opponents.
- The Terps have outrebounded their opponents in 30 games this season, coming out even against Ohio State and Rutgers. Maryland was outrebounded for the first time since last year's ACC Tournament semifinals in the win over Middle Tennessee State and then again at North Carolina.

**TOLIVER BREAKS ACC ASSIST RECORD**

- First team All-ACC performer Kristi Toliver broke the ACC's single-season assist record, a mark which had stood for 30 years. The record was perviously held by former Terrapin and Hall of Famer Tara Heiss. She had dished 249 assists during the 1977-78 campaign.
- Toliver has handed out 262 assists so far this season.

**IT'S ALL ACADEMIC, TOO**

- Senior Crystal Langhorne is an All-American on the court and in the classroom. For the second-straight year, she was voted to the ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America team, earning a spot on the second team.
- Langhorne was an ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-District 2 team for the third-straight year. She is a communications major and boasts a 3.43 grade point average. She was a third-team Academic All-American last season.

**WHAT A COMEBACK!**

- Maryland's 21-point comeback at Virginia Tech on Feb. 4, 2008 tied the third-largest deficit overcome by a team to win in NCAA history. The Terrapins trailed 31-10 in the first half with 10:13 remaining in the first half, before winning the game in overtime, 74-71.
- The largest comeback overcome was a 32-point deficit by Texas State vs. UT San Antonio on Feb. 18, 2006. Texas State won the game, 73-71. Oregon came back from a 22-point

deficit against Arizona to win, 75-71, on March 4, 2000, while Louisiana Tech posted a 21-point comeback on Feb. 9, 1989 over Old Dominion to win 72-71.

### LANGHORNE FIRST TO 2,000

- Already first in career scoring and rebounding all-time at Maryland, Crystal Langhorne had not finished achieving new heights. On Jan. 31 against Miami, she became the first 2,000-point scorer in program history, needing just two points to reach the feat.
- Langhorne is the 16th player all-time in ACC history to reach the mark.

### LANGHORNE BREAKS MARYLAND SCORING & REBOUNDING RECORD

- Two-time All-American Crystal Langhorne has broken numerous records in her career at Maryland, this season, rewriting the scoring and rebounding marks.
- With her third basket in the win at Virginia on Jan. 18, Langhorne became Maryland's all-time scoring leader, breaking Vicky Bullett's mark of 1,928 set from 1986-89.
- Langhorne became the only Terrapin woman to score 2,000 points, doing so against Miami on Jan. 31. She also ranks among the all-time ACC scoring leaders, ranking sixth having scored 2,206 points in her career.
- Langhorne broke the all-time women's rebounding record on Dec. 3, 2007 at Rutgers, surpassing Vicky Bullett's (1986-89) mark of 968. She became the first-ever Terrapin women's basketball player to grab 1,000 rebounds in Maryland's win at James Madison on Dec. 20, 2007 and also became only the 15th woman in the history of the ACC to do so. Langhorne has grabbed 1,212 boards in her career, ranked sixth all-time in the ACC.

### LANGHORNE JOINS 2,000-POINT, 1,000-REBOUND CLUB

- The first Maryland women's basketball player to score 2,000 points, senior Crystal Langhorne became the first Maryland basketball player, men's or women's, to record 2,000 points and 1,000 rebounds.
- Langhorne also became the 106th player in NCAA history (since 1982) to join the 2,000-point, 1,000-rebound club. There are two other active players in the NCAA to reach the milestone (Courtney Paris, Oklahoma and Natalie Dorma, Idaho State), making it 108 players in the history of the NCAA to join the 2,000-point, 1,000-rebound club.
- Five players in ACC history (including the pre-NCAA era), including Langhorne, have achieved the feat.

### LANGHORNE ECLIPSES ELMORE'S REBOUNDING RECORD

- In Maryland's 88-61 win at Boston College on Jan. 10, Crystal Langhorne broke Maryland's overall (men's or women's) rebounding record, previously held by Terrapin men's legend Len Elmore (1972-74) for 34 years. Elmore and Langhorne hold the distinction of being the only two players at Maryland to eclipse the 1,000 rebound mark.
- Elmore was a 1974 All-American and a three-time all-conference selection under Coach Lefty Driesell. A 1,000-point scorer as well, he also still holds the school record for career rebounding average (12.2) and single-season average (14.7 in 1974). He is the only player at Maryland, men's or women's, to grab over 400 rebounds in a season (412, 1974).
- Langhorne grabbed 18 boards in the rout over BC to surpass Elmore's mark and now has 1,212 rebounds in her career. She ranks sixth in the ACC all-time in total rebounds.

### LANGHORNE FINALIST FOR CLASS AWARD

- Crystal Langhorne was selected as one of 10 finalists for the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award. The list was pared down from the preseason candidates list of 30.
- The award is presented annually to the NCAA Division I senior Student-Athlete of the Year who exemplifies excellence in the classroom, in character and competition. CLASS is an acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School. The award was launched during the 2001-02 season has developed into the nation's premier tribute for college seniors.
- The 10 names will be placed on the official ballot for a nationwide vote during the NCAA Tournament in March. Fan balloting will be coupled with votes from coaches and media to determine the recipient. The award was conceived by sportcaster Dick Enberg, who continues to serve as Honorary Chairman. Previous winners on the men's side include Maryland's Juan Dixon, who won it in 2002.

### TOLIVER MOVES INTO 2ND ON MD'S ASSIST LIST

- A finalist for the Nancy Lieberman Award, presented to the nation's top point guard, junior Kristi Toliver has become an even stronger floor general.
- Spending part of her summer at Point Guard College refining her skills, Toliver dished out 10 assists against Miami, moving into second all-time at Maryland. She became only the fourth player in the history of the program and 26th in the history of the ACC to dish 500 helpers. Her 568 helpers rank in the top 10 in the league all-time.

### SPEAKING OF MILESTONES...

- Senior Jade Perry has played all kinds of roles since joining the Terps as a freshman. A scorer and a rebounder, she has netted 746 points in her career and is nearing the 600-rebound mark, hauling down 605 boards to date.
- Perry has also played in 137 career games, the second-most game appearance in school history. She is chasing classmate Ashleigh Newman, who has played 139 career games in a Maryland uniform, breaking the record formerly held by former teammate Shay Doron (134).

### TOLIVER BECOMES ALL-TIME FREE THROW SHOOTING LEADER

- With her first trip to the free throw line against Duke on Jan. 14, junior Kristi Toliver moved right into first place on Maryland's all-time free throw shooting list, bumping classmate Marissa Coleman for the top spot on the chart.

- Toliver boasts an 87.1 free throw shooting mark in 278 attempts, which also ranks second all-time in the ACC. She entered the game vs. the Blue Devils needing just one free throw attempt to qualify for the minimums.
- Coleman needed just one free throw attempt to qualify for the record entering the first game of the season. She held the top spot until Toliver made her 200th trip to the line. Coleman boasts an 81.7 career free throw shooting percentage, which is also in the top 15 in the history of the ACC.
- The duo bested former Terrapin Marché Strickland who held the record of 80.2 percent since 2002 heading into the 2007-08 campaign.

**TERPS IN THE HISTORY BOOKS AGAIN**

- With three players reaching the 1,000-point plateau this season, this year's Maryland squad becomes the 11th known team in NCAA history with four 1,000 point scorers and the first-ever ACC team to do so.
- Full list of 12 teams can be found on page 9. West Virginia recently achieved the feat this season. Research compiled by Kansas State Sports Information office.

**GIVE ME 20**

- Maryland was the first team in the nation to win 20 games with its Jan. 14 win over No. 10/13 Duke. With the win, head coach Brenda Frese has led the Terps to four-straight 20-win seasons, the first time in the history of the program they have accomplished the feat.
- The Terrapins were also the first team to win 10 games, playing 14 games in the first 31 days of the season.

**TERPS GARNER RECORD NUMBER OF ACC NODS**

- With senior Laura Harper's selection on Dec. 24, Maryland broke the program's record for most ACC Player of the Week nods in a season. To date, the Terrapins have garnered eight weekly picks in 16 weeks of the season.
- Four different Terrapins have received ACC Player of the Week honors, with senior Crystal Langhorne earning the honor three times. Junior Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver garnered the recognition twice. No other conference team has as many honorees.
- The Terps broke the previous record of three weekly honors, which was set during the 1988-89 campaign then tied in 2005-06.
- Crystal Langhorne's six-career ACC Player of the Week selections is an individual school record. The old record of four was held by former Terrapin Jessie Hicks who garnered four nods from 1991-93.

**THE BIG 3-0**

- Maryland's had three 30-point individual performances this season. One of the most versatile players in the country, Marissa Coleman has netted a career-high 30 twice this season, while senior Crystal Langhorne recorded the sixth 30-point outing of her career.
- Coleman became one of only 16 players in school history to score at least 30 points in a game. She dropped 30 on UC Santa Barbara on Nov. 23, 2007. It was the 40th time in school history a player had netted at least 30 points. She matched that performance performance against 10th-ranked Duke, going 9-for-13 from the floor, 4-of-5 coming from downtown. She also became one of only 12 players in school history to record multiple 30-point games.
- Langhorne dropped 31 points, three short of her career high, in the double-overtime thriller against Georgia Tech. In 2005-06, she had four 30-point performances, the most by a Terrapin all-time in one season.

**TOLIVER BREAKS MARYLAND'S 3-POINT RECORD**

- Junior Kristi Toliver became the first Terrapin in school history to make 200 three pointers, knocking down the milestone bucket in the overtime win over Florida State. At Wake Forest in the ACC opener, Toliver broke the Maryland record for three-point makes in a career.
- Toliver has made 206 threes since arriving in College Park. Her most memorable three-pointer, however, is the one she nailed in the 2006 National Championship game with six seconds remaining in regulation over Duke's 6-foot-7 Alison Bales, sending the game into overtime. The Terps would eventually win the national title.
- Toliver broke the record previously held by Tiffany Brown, who made 172 threes from 1997-2000.

**OVERTIME IS STILL OUR TIME**

- Despite its double-overtime loss at North Carolina, overtime is still the Terps' time. Maryland is 12-2 under head coach Brenda Frese, including 3-1 this season. Two of the overtime games were at home and two were on the road.
- Maryland's double-overtime game against Georgia Tech was its first overtime game since the Terps' win in the NCAA Championship victory over Duke in 2006. After going to overtime six times that season, Maryland went 57 games without going to OT until the overtime game vs. the Yellow Jackets.
- In the very next game, Maryland went to double overtime again, losing to UNC. It was the Terps' first loss in overtime since Jan. 16, 2005 at Florida State, a one overtime game.
- The overtime game against GT was the first at Comcast Center since Feb. 1, 2003 and the first double overtime game since Feb. 23, 1994 at Cole Field House.
- The back-to-back double-overtime games was the first time Maryland has played back-to-back overtime games in the history of the program.

**BALANCING ACT**

- Once again, Maryland is getting all the players involved when it comes to offense. With four players averaging double figures, the scoring is coming from all positions on the court.

- While six different players have led the team in scoring, to date, the Terps have had at least four players score in double figures in 23 games. At least three have reached double figures in every game.
- In the blowout win over Loyola, six Terps scored in double figures that evening. All five scorers reached double digits in the win over UMBC and five players reached double digits in the win over Florida State on Senior Day.

### FEBRUARY FRENZY

- Maryland went 5-0 in the month of February. It was the fewest number of games played in the month in the history of the program.
- The Terps opened the 2007-08 campaign going 10-0 in the month of November. It was the most games played in the month in the history of the program.

### HARPER HAS 20-20 VISION

- Senior Laura Harper had a career night in the double-overtime win against Georgia Tech on Jan. 20. She accounted for 24 points and a career-best 20 rebounds in the victory, becoming only the fourth player in school history to record a 20 point-20 rebound game.
- Her 20-rebound performance was also only the ninth time a Terrapin had grabbed at least 20 boards. She was three short of tying the school record held by Debbie Jones (12/11/76) and Angie Scott (3/1/75).
- Teammate Crystal Langhorne is one of the three other players in school history to get 20 and 20. She scored 29 points and grabbed 22 rebounds in the win at Miami on Feb. 17, 2005 during her freshman season.

### LANGHORNE FIRST TERP WITH 1,000 PTS. & 1,000 REBOUNDS

- The program's leading scorer and rebounder, senior Crystal Langhorne is the first Terrapin women's basketball player to grab 1,000 rebounds.
- Langhorne was the fastest player in school history to score 1,000 points and the only player in the program to do so as a sophomore. She needed 60 games to reach the milestone. She went on to break the all-time scoring record at Virginia.
- Langhorne is one of only two Terrapins, male or female, to reach the 1,000-rebound milestone. Len Elmore (1972-74) had 1,136 boards in his career playing at Maryland.
- Langhorne also became the 15th player in ACC history to to achieve the feat. Seventeen players in the ACC have reached the feat after North Carolina's Erlana Larkins and NC State's Khadijah Whittington joined the club.

### SNAPPED

- Maryland's 85-70 win over No. 10/13 Duke on Jan. 14 at Comcast Center snapped a nine-game home losing streak to the Blue Devils. Prior to the win, the Terrapins had not defeated Duke on their home court since 1998.
- It was also Maryland's first regular-season win over the Blue Devils on 2000. That game was won at Cameron Indoor Stadium on Feb. 3, 2000.

### TERPS BREAK ACC THREES RECORD

- In the 98-56 win over UMBC in the Terrapin Classic, Maryland made an ACC-record 17 threes.
- Five different Terrapins knocked down threes in the game to contribute to the record. Junior Marissa Coleman made six treys, while Kristi Toliver made five. Freshman Kat Lyons made a career-high three 3-pointers, while Marah Strickland netted a pair, as well. Freshman Drey Mingo connected on her only three-point attempt of the afternoon.
- The 17 threes against the Retrievers shattered the previous school record of 12, which was tied earlier twice earlier this season. The Terps made 12 against Notre Dame and Loyola, tying the former record which was set last year against UNC Greensboro.
- The previous ACC record was held by Wake Forest. The Demon Deacons made 16 threes against Clemson on Feb. 12, 2006.

### DORON'S JERSEY HONORED

- Former Terrapin great Shay Doron was honored on during halftime of Maryland's game vs. Virginia Feb. 8. Doron is the third all-time leading scorer in the history of the program (1,878) and holds the school records for career free throws made (492) and games played (134).
- Doron was a three-time All-ACC honoree, one of only three Terrapins to ever be selected all-conference three times. In her first-collegiate appearance, she made an NCAA-record tying 23 free throws. She once scored 39 points in a game to tie the school record, as well. She holds class record for free throws made by a freshman (136) and junior (135), and boasts the best scoring averaging among sophomores (17.6).
- Doron was an Honorable Mention All-American by the WBCA in 2004 and by the Associated Press in 2007. She was twice selected a preseason candidate for the Wade

Trophy and John R. Wooden Award. A two-time ESPN/CoSIDA Academic All-American, she was inducted into the Greater Washington Jewish Community Center Sports Hall of Fame in 2006 and was a the National Jewish Sports Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete that year. Doron was drafted in the second round of the 2007 WNBA draft by the New York Liberty and plays for Team Ramla in Israel.

### MARYLAND CAPTURES TERRAPIN CLASSIC TITLE

- Maryland captured the Terrapin Classic title on Dec. 30 with wins over Richmond (89-59) and UMBC (98-56). The Terps win the tournament for the eighth time in nine tries. The three-team round-robin tournament saw Richmond defeat UMBC on the first day, 64-51, followed by wins for the Terps over the Spiders
- The Terps were no match for its local foes, as four players reached double figures in the win over the Spiders, shooting 54 percent from the floor and outrebounding Richmond, 46-33. UR was also limited to just under 33 percent shooting.
- The Terps made an ACC-record 17 threes en route to the rout over the Retrievers. Maryland also dominated the boards, outrebounding UMBC, 44-11. Five Maryland starters also reached double figures in the game.

### WILEY-GATEWOOD, MARRONE ANNOUNCE FUTURE PLANS

- Seniors Sa'de Wiley-Gatewood and junior Christie Marrone have made decisions regarding their future at Maryland. Wiley-Gatewood has decided to sit out the remainder of the 2007-08 campaign, while Marrone will play out the season and graduate at the end of the summer of 2008.
- Wiley-Gatewood has been battling tendonitis in her knees, undergoing surgery in the offseason. She joined the Terrapins midway through the 2005-06 campaign after transferring from Tennessee. She played 22 games last season with the Terps after sitting out because of NCAA transfer eligibility rules, averaging 5.6 points and 2.4 assists per game. Wiley-Gatewood will return for her final campaign in 2008-09.
- Marrone also appeared in a Terrapin uniform for the first time last year, after transferring from Virginia Tech. She sat out the 2005-06 campaign because of NCAA transfer eligibility rules and played in 24 games last season, averaging 2.5 points and 1.3 assists per game, while also shooting nearly 33 percent from three-point range. She has played in one game this season and has been dealing with a foot injury, which has plagued her since the postseason last year.

### LANGHORNE NAMED TERRAPIN CLASSIC MVP AND TWO EARN TOURNAMENT HONORS

- Senior Crystal Langhorne was voted the Terrapin Classic Most Valuable Player after recording double-doubles in both games. She averaged 14.5 points and 12.5 rebounds in the tournament.
- Juniors Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver were also named to the all-tournament team. Coleman averaged 20.5 ppg and also had a double-double in the win over the Spiders. She made 10 threes over the weekend, shooting 83.3 percent from long range.
- Toliver reached double figures in both games, as well, averaging 16.5 ppg. She also totaled 15 assists in the two games and made five threes in the win over the Retrievers.

### TERPS COLLECT OVER 1,000 TOYS FOR CHARITY

- Maryland collected over 1,000 new and unwrapped toys at the "World's Largest Baby Shower," which celebrated head coach Brenda Frese's pregnancy. The toys were donated to the Washington, D.C., area U.S. Marine Toys for Tots program.
- The "World's Largest Baby Shower" was held on Nov. 30 at the game versus Ohio State. U.S. Marine Corps representatives collected 1,200 donations on the Comcast Center concourse from fans, who were encouraged to bring a donation, prior to the start of the game.

### UNWELCOMED GUESTS

- On Maryland's trip to Harrisonburg, Va., hometown of junior Kristi Toliver, the Terps defeated James Madison, 71-65, in a come-from-behind victory. The win snapped JMU's 30-game home win streak, which had been the longest active streak in the nation at the time of the meeting.

### TOUGH START

- Maryland played its first 14 games of the season in 31 days from Nov. 9-Dec. 9, coming out with a 13-1 record during that span. The stretch included games against five ranked opponents and a trip to the West Coast over Thanksgiving.
- The first 10 games were played in the month of November, the most games the Terps have ever played in the month.



### NOVEMBER TO REMEMBER

- November was a record-breaking month for the Terrapins. Maryland's 10 games were the most in the month of November in the history of the program. Its 10 wins are also the most wins Maryland has recorded during the month, as well.

### TAKING ON ALL COMERS

- Maryland boast one of the toughest regular-season schedules in the country. This season, the Terps faced opponents from 12 different conferences, including three from the Big East (Notre Dame, Pittsburgh, Rutgers). They also face teams from other power conferences such as the Big 12 (Oklahoma), Big Ten (Ohio State) and Pac 10 (UCLA).
- Some of the other tough opponents taking on the Terps hail from the Atlantic 10 (Temple, Richmond), Colonial Athletic Association (James Madison, Delaware) Sun Belt (Middle Tennessee State), Big West (UCSB), Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (Loyola), America East (UMBC), Missouri Valley (Northern Iowa) and Ivy League (Princeton).

### LANGHORNE RETURNS TO LINEUP

- Senior Crystal Langhorne missed the first game of her career when she sat out the season opener against Princeton. After starting 104 consecutive-games, the Preseason AP All-American was back on the court in the win over then-No. 6 Oklahoma, but was back on the bench against Delaware. She made a return to the court in the win at UCLA, coming off the bench for the first time in her career. She scored 12 points on 6-for-9 shooting.
- Langhorne missed six of the first seven games of the season before returning to the court for good. She returned to the starting lineup against Pittsburgh and has remained a starter since.

### COLEMAN HANDLES GAUCHOS

- Blue and gold seems to make junior Marissa Coleman's eyes turn red. In her two career games against UC Santa Barbara, Coleman has put up the games of her career. In last year's 105-44 win on Dec. 2, 2006 in Comcast Center, she made history recording the first triple-double in school history, tallying 15 points, 14 rebounds and 10 assists. In the 75-71 victory at the The Thunderdome, she scored a career-high 30 points, going 18-for-20 from the free throw line. It was the 40th 30-point game in school history.

### THREE TERPS REACH 1,000-POINT PLATEAU

- Eleven games into the season and three Terrapins had already achieved major milestones, scoring their 1,000th point of their careers. Four players on the roster have scored 1,000 points in their careers.
- In the win over Delaware in the second round of the Preseason WNIT, junior Marissa Coleman became the 23rd Terrapin in school history to score 1,000 career points. Coleman was the seventh-fastest player in school history to reach the 1,000-point plateau, needing 74 career games to achieve the feat.
- In the win over Pittsburgh, senior Laura Harper became the 24th player in school history to join the 1,000-point club. Harper was the 16th-fastest player in school history to achieve the feat, doing so in her 88th-career game.
- Junior Kristi Toliver was the 25th player at Maryland all-time and the third this season to eclipse the 1,000-point plateau, doing so with 15 points scored in the loss at Rutgers. Her 78 career games to reach the milestone tied for the eighth-fastest by a Terrapin.
- Teammate Crystal Langhorne is currently the only other player on the team with 1,000 career points. Langhorne holds the school record for fastest to reach 1,000, doing so in her sophomore season in just her 60th-career game.

### TERPS WIN PRESEASON WNIT CROWN

- With its 75-62 win over then-No. 4 LSU, Maryland captured its first Preseason WNIT title.
- The Terrapins defeated Princeton (76-52), Delaware (91-43), No. 23/25 Notre Dame (75-59) and the Tigers to clinch the tournament crown. All four games were played at Comcast Center.
- It was Maryland's second-ever appearance in the Preseason WNIT, playing in the inaugural tournament in 1994. That year, the Terrapins lost to Virginia Tech, 68-53, in the first round.

### TOLIVER, PERRY EARN PRESEASON WNIT HONORS

- After leading Maryland to win the Preseason WNIT, Terrapins Kristi Toliver and Jade Perry earned tournament honors. Kristi Toliver was selected the tournament Most Valuable Player after averaging 20.8 points and 8.5 assists per game, twice recording a double-double. She shot 59.6 from the floor and was 50 percent from three-point range.
- Perry had double-doubles in two games and averaged 10.0 points and a team-high 11.5 rebounds per game in the tournament. She also shot 56 percent from the floor and had over a block per game.

### BOARDING UP

- Maryland's 57 rebounds against Delaware in the quarterfinal of the Preseason WNIT were the most since grabbing the same amount in the first round of the 2006 NCAA Tournament against Sacred Heart, the same year the Terp won the national championship.

### WOMEN'S BASKETBALL HALL OF FAMERS

- The The State Farm Tip-Off Classic not only featured two big-time games, with four top 20 foes taking the floor, but the 2008 Women's Basketball Hall of Fame class was also reintroduced that evening
- The Terrapins boast one hall of famer. The great Tara Heiss was inducted in 2003. A 1978 graduate of Maryland, she led the Terrapins to the AIAW Finals and an ACC title in her final campaign.

### THREE NAMED WADE WATCH & WOODEN AWARD CANDIDATES

- Three Terrapins were named preseason candidates for the State Farm/WBCA Wade Trophy and, on Wednesday, were placed on the top 30 preseason candidate list for the John R. Wooden Award. Crystal Langhorne, Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver are all repeat honorees, with Langhorne making her third-straight appearance.
- Last year, four Terps were placed on the preseason Wade Watch list, a record for the award. Langhorne was a finalist for the honor, eventually being named to the WBCA All-America team.
- All three were also on the preseason list for the Wooden honor last season. Coleman and Langhorne went on to earn a spot on the Midseason All-American team, while Langhorne was a finalist.

### LANGHORNE NAMED AP PRESEASON ALL-AMERICAN

- Senior Crystal Langhorne was picked one of the top-five players in the nation, earning a spot on the five-player Associated Press Preseason All-American team for the second-consecutive year.
- Langhorne is a two-time AP All-America selection, the only multiple All-America selection in school history, also garnering All-American nods from the USBWA twice and the WBCA last year. Last year, she became only the third player in NCAA history to lead the nation in field goal percentage two years in a row. Last season, she boasted a 70.7 field goal shooting percentage, 1.7 percent shy of tying the NCAA record.

### TERPS TOP PICK IN ACC PRESEASON POLL

- Maryland received 27 of 37 first-place votes and was predicted to finish first in the league in the ACC Preseason Poll, determined by a vote of the media who attended ACC Media Day, conference sports information directors and head coaches. It is the second-straight year the Terrapins were selected first in the poll and the third time since the polling began in 1991.
- The poll also revealed that Crystal Langhorne was selected the ACC's Preseason Player of the Year. A three-time All-ACC honoree and the 2005 ACC Rookie of the Year, she has been named to the first team the last two years.
- Junior Marissa Coleman, a two-time second team All-ACC and the 2006 ACC Rookie of the Year, was named to the Preseason All-ACC squad for the second-straight year.

### TERPS RANKED TOP 5 IN PREVIEW POLLS

- With four starters returning from last year's 28-6 squad and eight letterwinners overall, the Terrapins are ranked in the top five in numerous early preseason polls.
- Maryland's highest ranking is CSTV.com's No. 2 rating. The Sporting News Magazine and SLAM Magazine ranked the team third in the nation, while CBSSportsline.com Magazine, Lindy's College Basketball and Women's Basketball Magazine have the Terps fourth in the nation. Their lowest ranking was Athlon Sports' No. 5 rating.

### OLDER AND WISER TERPS

- With eight returning letterwinners on the 2007-08 roster, Maryland boasts the second-most experienced team in the nation. The Terps entered the season with 351 combined

career starts, second only to West Virginia who entered the year with 364 combined career starts.

- This year's roster is the most experienced squad head coach Brenda Frese has had since arriving in College Park. The senior class, who have all started significant games at some point in their careers, consists of Laura Harper, Crystal Langhorne, Ashleigh Newman, Jade Perry and Sa'de Wiley-Gatewood. Juniors Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver have also been starters since arriving on campus.

#### **GOLDEN SUMMER**

- Terrapins Marissa Coleman, Laura Harper and Crystal Langhorne had a summer to remember playing with the U.S. Basketball program. The trio helped their respective teams win gold medals.
- Langhorne and Harper were teammates on the U.S. 21 National Team, winning gold at the U21 World Championship in Russia. A starter in every game, Langhorne led the team with 15.6 ppg and 8.9 rpg. Harper played in every game, averaging 7.1 ppg and 5.8 rpg.
- Coleman also spent the summer in a USA uniform, helped the Americans capture a gold medal at the Pan American games in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

#### **WHAT'S BACK...**

- Maryland returns four starters from last year's 28-6 team that advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the fourth-straight year. Overall, the Terps welcome back eight letterwinner, the most experienced team in Brenda Frese's tenure and the second-most experience team in the nation.
- Among the returnees are two-time All-American and National Player of the Year candidate Crystal Langhorne, who has played one game and is nursing a sprained ankle. She led the nation with a 70.7 shooting percentage, leading the team in scoring and rebounding for the second-straight year. She continues to nurse a sprained ankle and saw her first action of the season against Oklahoma.
- Coleman and Toliver were both All-ACC performers last year, along with Langhorne. The trio were named to the Wade Watch preseason candidate list. 2006 NCAA Final Four Most Outstanding Player Laura Harper is also back for the Terps.
- Joining the Terrapins this season is the No. 2 recruiting class in the nation, which includes four Parade All-Americans. Freshmen Marah Strickland, who has started every game, and Drey Mingo were also WBCA and McDonald's All-Americans.

#### **ALSO JOINING THE TERPS...**

- The sideline will also have some new faces. Joining head coach Brenda Frese and long-time assistant coach Erica Floyd are Daron Park, who spent three years at the University of Utah, and Diane Richardson, who is well known in the Washington, D.C. area as a successful high school coach.

#### **COMING UP**

- The winners of the four regional sites move on to the NCAA Final Four in Tampa, Fla. The national semifinals is slated for Sunday, April 6, and the national champion is crowned on Tuesday, April 8.
- The games will be televised nationally on ESPN and ESPN2.
