QUICK HITS

- This is Maryland's 20th appearance in the NCAA Tournament and eighth in head coach Brenda Frese's 10 years. Frese has led the Terrapins to four Sweet Sixteens, three Elite Eights and the 2006 National Championship. Her all-time NCAA Tournament record is 19-7 (.731) and 18-6 at Maryland (.750). The Terrapins have earned a top-two seed five times under Frese.
- Maryland is 30-18 (.625) all-time in NCAA Tournament games and 14-3 (.824) in NCAA Tournament games in College Park.
- This will be the first-ever meeting between Maryland and Texas A&M.
- · Most recently, the Terps beat seventh-seeded Louisville, 72-68, in College Park Monday in the Second Round. Laurin Mincy led with 24 points, while Tianna Hawkins added 15 points and 14 rebounds.
- · Alyssa Thomas was named ACC Player of the Year March 1. She led Maryland to its 10th ACC title with her career-high 29 points vs. Georgia Tech in the championship game.
- The Terrapins have racked up numerous postseason honors:
- Alyssa Thomas ACC Player of the Year, First Team All-ACC, ACC Tournament MVP; Tianna Hawkins - Second Team All-ACC, ACC All-Tournament Team; Lynetta Kizer - All-ACC Honorable Mention, ACC Sixth Player of the Year, ACC All-Tournament Team; Brene Moseley - ACC All-Freshman Team, All-ACC Academic Team; Alicia DeVaughn - ACC All-Defensive Team. Kim Rodgers - All-ACC Academic Team.
- Based off of Wednesday's NCAA statistics, the Terrapins' rebounding margin of +13.9 is second in the country to Liberty's +15.6. They are also in the top 10 in the country in scoring offense (4), FG percentage (5), scoring margin (10) and assists (10).

► TERRAPINS' SEASON OUTLOOK

COLLEGE PARK, Md. – One of the things head coach Brenda Frese is looking forward to the most this year? The continued growth of her young 2010-11 team. Last year's youthful Terrapins posted a 24-8 overall record and a 9-5 mark in the Atlantic Coast Conference - which was good enough for fourth-best in the league and a first round bye in the ACC Tournament. Early on, they proved to be one of the nation's strongest rebounding teams and their inside game was one of their marks.

"I thought we really saw some players grow last year and I want to see that continue because it translates into team success," Frese said.

A challenge of a young team is always consistency - who will step up and how often. ACC Rookie of the Year Alyssa Thomas and Second Team All-ACC player Lynetta Kizer were omnipresent factors for the Terrapins, while the other Terps stepped up at different points throughout the season.

"Another challenge is to see that new level that some of our players reached become consistent. If we can be consistent, we can be pretty good," Frese said. "I want to see how we respond when we're in tough situations and I want to see who steps up in those moments. I want to see who steps up and becomes our third consistent scorer along with Lynetta and Alyssa."

After another summer of hard work with strength coach Kyle Tarp, Frese knows some Terrapins are ready to be big-time players for the team. With needs at the power forward position and in the backcourt, Frese has high hopes and believes in all of her players, but a few in particular look poised to make their mark.

"We have a need for someone to step up at the 4 spot and I think we have some players that are capable of bringing different dimensions to that position, Frese saif. "One of the players I'm very excited about is Laurin Mincy. You saw at the end of last season her start to get that feel back to her game. I think she did some good things this summer and if she hits her stride, she really gives us a big punch from the perimeter. I recruited her here to be one of the most lethal guards in the ACC and that's what we're going to try to help her achieve."

POINT GUARD

The Terrapins return their starting point guard from last year, fifth-year senior Anjale Barrett. After leading the league in assists and assist-to-turnover ratio in ACC play, she's one of the keys to the Terrapins' success.

"Anjale did a very solid job with her assist to turnover ratio in ACC play last season," Frese said. "I thought she played maybe the best game of her Maryland career in our win on the road at Boston College (15 points, 4 assists). If she can play like that, we're a much harder team to beat. I think how she plays each game has a huge effect on how our team performs. Anj is a senior now and I want her to feel that sense of urgency."

Incoming freshman Brene "Bones" Moseley is coming off of an ACL injury suffered in her senior season at Paint Branch High School. A healthy Moseley is expected to contribute.

"We'll assess where Brene Moseley is with coming off her ACL," Frese said. "When she's in form, she can really be a dynamic point guard that can score the ball and she wants that responsibility."

"We may even experiment in situations with a few other players playing point, but I can't talk about that because it's 'Top Secret'," Frese said. "Overall, our point guards have to value the basketball. We can't have empty possessions where we just throw the ball away, because that just kills you."

WINGS

Fifth-year senior Kim Rodgers and Mincy will enter the season as the Terrapins' strongest shooters. Both have hit big-time shots when needed and have proven they can make them when it counts. Rodgers' buzzer-beater at Georgia Tech last season is one highlight fans and teammates won't forget for years to come.

"We have our veteran Kim Rodgers, who has literally and figuratively sacrificed her body for our team in her four years here at Maryland. I think our fans will remember some of the memorable shots Kim has hit to propel us to victories," Frese said.

Mincy averaged 8.3 points per game and shot .440 from the field in

the Terps' three postseason games last year.

"We have Laurin who really has a chance to emerge as a force for our team," Frese said. "Laurin can be a dynamic scorer, because she has the ability to shoot the three and she can attack off the dribble. She's also our best free throw shooter, so I really want to see her punish people and get to the line."

Another option is fan-favorite, sophomore Sequoia Austin. She saw action in 14 games last year and her hard work earned her a scholarship from Frese for the 2011 spring semester.

"There's no question the hardest worker on this team this offseason was Sequoia Austin. I think her goal is to make it very difficult for me to not notice her and she's accomplished that," Frese said. "She won a lot of our offseason competitions. She's a good shooter. I think she's going to push some people."

Listed as a forward, Thomas will look to expand her game to the wings.

"Obviously Alyssa Thomas is going to feature prominently in everything we do. She really responds to being challenged and part of my job will be to tell her she can't be satisfied with a good freshman year," Frese said.

FRONTCOURT

The Terps' biggest strength last year was dominating inside - on the glass and scoring in the paint. They were outrebounded just four times in 32 games and led the league in boards throughout the year.

"It's Lynetta's senior year. She's shown what she can do in stretches and I want to see her achieve consistency," Frese said. "Credit to her for the great shape she's gotten herself into for her junior and senior years. It's easy to talk about it, but Lynetta actually did the work. Not many people can do that. I want her to have a great senior season."

At 6-7, junior Essence Townsend is one of the tallest players in the country. She's worked hard on the court and in the classroom over the last few years to put herself in a position to be successful. Raised by different family members, she's grown up before the staff's eyes.

"Essence Townsend is a young lady who has really matured in her time here at Maryland," Frese said. "Her attitude has been so positive and she really has gotten better as a player. I'm most proud of who she is as a person, because Essence comes from a background that would've crushed most of us long ago."

"Tianna Hawkins has worked herself into tip-top shape and she now has two years to show what she can do. She's really a player who doesn't mind the contact." Frese said.

"Alicia DeVaughn has all the tools to be terrific, I think her biggest competition is with herself and developing the confidence in every situation to be successful. I really believe she can do that."

The Terps will welcome redshirt freshman Whitney Bays into the rotation. After suffering a knee injury in high school, she spent the 2010-11 season regaining her strength.

"We're really excited to have Whitney Bays in the mix. She can do a lot of different things and you might see her all over the place on the court. Whitney had a year to practice and now rehearsal is over. I think as she gets some games under her belt, we're going to see her emerge," Frese said."

STAFF

Frese welcomes three new staff members into the mix this season, each with enthusiasm and youth that keeps a program fresh.

"We met coordinator of recruiting operations Stephanie Stevens through our relationship with Gallaudet," Frese said. "Their head coach Kevin Cook raved about Stephanie and her future as a coach. She has a tremendous work ethic, which is an absolute essential if you're going to work around here."

"Michael Bowden will be handling our video department this year. Michael has a lot of great ideas and has worked under some really sharp coaches like Billy Donovan of Florida and Jose Fernandez of South Florida," Frese said. "Michael has a basketball background, which will help him tailor the video to what our staff and players need."

"Zach Kancher, our director of player development, is someone that I interviewed for a previous position," Frese said. "I was really impressed with him and knew I'd want to find a slot for him if possible. Zach is going to do a variety of things for us, but he will work directly with Coach Adkins and Coach Kyle with anything related to the personal development of our players. Zach has had experience at a variety of Division II and III levels and will provide a depth of knowledge in many areas."

SCHEDULE

The Terrapins will play one of the toughest conference slates out of any of the 12 teams in the league. With home-and-home matchups with Duke, Miami, Georgia Tech, North Carolina and Virginia, they face four of last year's top six teams twice (The Terrapins were No. 4). All five of the aforementioned teams were selected to compete in the postseason in 2011.

"Every year the ACC schedule features all sorts of challenges and different styles of opponents. You really learn a lot about your team and grow in those tight moments. What you hope is all those lessons benefit you come March Madness. As a coach, I've been through them, but every season the team is a bit different and some players experience it all for the first time. As a coach, I get a good feel for how our team handles different things," Frese said.

In addition to a tough ACC slate, the Terrapins will play at least 17 games against opponents that competed in either the NCAA or WNIT postseason tournaments in 2011. Ten of those games will be played in College Park.

"Youth was served in College Park in 2011. The Terps earned a fourth-place ACC finish and a No. 4 seed without a senior and only three juniors on the roster. Alyssa Thomas was the ACC Rookie of the Year and led the team in scoring. Seniors-to-be Lynetta Kizer in the post and Anjale Barrett at the point still form the backbone of a team that should be right there in a very competitive ACC."

"The Terps had their adjustment season in 2011 and still reached the NCAA tournament as a No. 4 seed. With a core that includes a potential big-time scorer (Alyssa Thomas), a physical presence in the middle (Lynetta Kizer) and an experienced, unselfish point guard, the elements present for bigger gains in 2011-12."

"Last year Maryland had no seniors but did have admirable defensive tenacity and size: with nine players over 6 feet or taller, the team outrebounded opponents by 12.1 boards a game, the fifth-largest margin in the country. The Terps weren't much of a threat from the perimeter, however, shooting what coach Brenda Frese calls a 'horrendous' 27.6% per game. Frese hopes sophomore Laurin Mincy will provide an inside threat to complement the inside force of 6'4" center Lynetta Kizer as well as 6'2' sophomore forward and ACC Rookie of the Year Alyssa Thomas."

"Best weekend individual play: Alyssa Thomas, Maryland. With 4.1 seconds left and Maryland leading Duke by two points in Sunday's ACC showdown, the Terrapins star had Blue Devils star Elizabeth Williams' left arm in her face as the two fought for position on the right block. That stalemate down low forced Duke's Chelsea Gray, after a drive to the baseline on that side of the court, to throw the ball back out to Shay Selby at the top of the key. When Selby released a pass to Haley Peters in the left corner with 2.9 seconds left, no Maryland player was even on the same side of the court as Peters. But by the time Peters released a jumper with 1.3 seconds left, an airborne Thomas was close enough to deflect the shot out of bounds for a block as time expired. Two stops on opposite sides of the court in the span of three seconds at the end of the game. That's how a star who suffered through a 2-for-11 shooting day with five turnovers still plays like an All-American.

Last Time Out

Most recently, the Terps beat seventh-seeded Louisville, 72-68, in College Park Monday in the NCAA Second Round.

- · Laurin Mincy scored 24 points off 6-for-10 shooting from the field and 10-for-13 shooting from the foul line. She added seven boards.
- Tianna Hawkins notched her 12th double-double of the season with 15 points, 14 rebounds, including eight offensive rebounds. She scored 13 of her points in the second half and also added a career-high six steals.
- · Both teams committed 16 turnovers, but Maryland scored 22 points off the Cardinals', while Louisville got just 13 points off the Terps'.
- The Terps won the battle on the boards, 41-35.

ACC-olades

The Terrapins racked up the postseason honors this season with numerous awards from the ACC and from around the country.

- Sophomore Alyssa Thomas was named the ACC's Player of the Year.
- Thomas is the second sophomore ever to win, after Duke's Alana Beard did in 2002. Thomas is the fourth Terrapin and third in five years - Vicky Bullett won in 1989, Crystal Langhorne earned it in 2008 and Kristi Toliver was honored in 2009.
- Thomas was also named a Finalist for the Wooden Award and a WBCA All-Region Nominee for the All-American Teams.
- In her 10-year tenure, head coach Brenda Frese's players have earned 26 All-ACC honors, including eight First Team awards. She's coached 11 All-Freshman Team members, three Players of the Year and four Rookies of the Year.
- Junior **Tianna Hawkins** was named to the All-ACC Second Team for her first postseason honor.
- · Senior Lynetta Kizer earned All-ACC Honorable Mention honors and was named the league's Sixth Player of the Year. She was the 2009 ACC Rookie of the Year and was named to the All-ACC Second Team last season.
- Sophomore Laurin Mincy was named All-ACC Honorable Mention as well.
- Sophomore Alicia DeVaughn was named to the ACC All-Defensive Team. She is the second Maryland player to earn the defensive honor. Renneika Razor was honored in 2002 and 2003.
- Freshman Brene Moseley was voted to the All-Freshman Team and earned a spot on the ACC All-Academic Team.
- Senior Kim Rodgers was named to the ACC's All-Academic Team for the second straight year.

Home Sweet Home

Maryland has been a dominant home team, especially over the last decade.

- The Terps are 434-124 (.778) all time in College Park, dating back to the inaugural 1971-72
- Maryland is 140-28 (.833) all time in Comcast Center.
- The Terps are also 140-28 (.833) at home under Brenda Frese, whose first season in College Park was the inaugural season of Comcast Center.
- The Terrapins are 91-5 (.948) all-time in non-conference games in Comcast Center.
- The Terps own one of the longest home win streaks in ACC history. They won 48 straight home games starting Nov. 9, 2007 with a 76-52 season-opening win over Princeton. The streak ended on Jan. 21, 2010 with an 80-77 loss to Miami.
- In the 2007-08 season, the Terrapins went 21-0 at home, taking ahold of the school's season home wins record.

Milestones, Streaks, etc.

- The Terrapins have won outrebounded their opponents in 60 of 66 games, dating back to last season, and 32 of 34 games this season. In the two games they lost the battle on the boards this year, at Miami and at Duke, the Terrapins won the battle the second time around at home.
- The Terps have won 91 of 96 non-conference games since moving into Comcast Center.
- Maryland has won at least 20 games in eight straight seasons.
- The Terps have made nine consecutive postseason appearances.
- Sophomore Alyssa Thomas has scored in double digits in 57 of 64 games in her career.

Stiff Competition

Maryland has once again played one of the toughest schedules in the country.

- The Terps played 18 games against teams that made the 2011 postseason.
- · Maryland played two games against Duke, Miami, North Carolina, Virginia and Georgia Tech. All five of those teams played in the 2010 postseason and four made the 2010 NCAA Tournament. All five finished in the top half of the conference this year.
- The Terrapins played five teams (Miami, Duke, Georgetown, Florida State, North Carolina) in the preseason polls in eight meetings - four at home in Comcast Center. The Terps went 5-3 vs. those teams and 3-1 vs. them at home.

Glass Cleaners

- Maryland has outrebounded opponents 1562-1091 in its 34 games this season for a rebounding margin of +13.9, which is second in the country to Liberty's +15.6.
- The Terps have grabbed 20 or more offensive boards in 11 games this season.
- Of their 1121 missed shots this season, the Terps have grabbed 584 offensive rebounds for an astounding 52.1 percent.
- The Terrapins ended the 2010-11 season No. 5 in the NCAA in rebounding margin (+12.1)
- The Terps won the battle of the boards in 28 of 32 games last year. They pulled down 1461 rebounds to their opponents' 1073.

Owning the Paint

- The Terps have beaten their opponents in the paint this year, 1262-757. That's 37.1 points in the paint per game for the Terrapins to their opponents' 22.3.
- Maryland has held its opponents to 20 points in the paint or less in 17 of 34 games this season.

Maryland vs. Ranked Teams Under Brenda Frese

Since **Brenda Frese** took over in 2002-03, Maryland has 42 wins over Top 25 teams, including seven this year alone.

- The Terps won 10 games over ranked teams in the 2005-06 season, including six over top 10 opponents and four over top five teams.
- Under Frese, Maryland has beaten 16 top ten teams, most recently No. 5 Duke on Feb. 19, and has eight wins over top five teams.
- Maryland has five wins over No. 1 teams in its history, including two in Frese's time. The Terrapins beat No. 1 North Carolina twice in the 2005-06 season.

All Hands on Deck

- Nine Terrapins are averaging 10.0 or more minutes per game.
- Maryland's bench is averaging 23.2 points per game to its opponents' 14.6 (789-496).
- The Terps have had five different leading scorers (Thomas, Hawkins, Mincy, Kizer, Moseley).
- The Terps have had four or more players score in double figures in 17 of 34 games this year.

Maryland in the ACC

Maryland is in its 34th season as a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference. The Terps became a member of the conference in 1977-78 - the first year the ACC had women's basketball. They won the first ACC Tournament in 1978.

- The Terps are 267-208 (.562) all-time in ACC games.
- Under **Brenda Frese**, Maryland is 92-54 in ACC games (.630), including 73-27 (.730) in the last seven years.
- In the last five years, the Terps are 51-21 (.708) in league games.
- Maryland is 51-23 (.689) in ACC games at home in Comcast Center. All are under Frese.

Double-Doubles

In 34 games this season, four Terrapins have notched 26 double-doubles.

• Sophomore **Alyssa Thomas** has 10 so far this season, and five in her last nine games. Most recently, she scored 17 points and grabbed 10 boards in

- the NCAA First Round vs. Navy.
 Tianna Hawkins has 12 this season. She had five in ACC play. Most recently she had 15 points, 14 rebounds vs. Louisville in the Second Round.
- Sophomore **Alicia DeVaughn** got her first of the season and second in her career with 11 points and 11 rebounds in the Terps' come from behind win vs. Georgia Tech on Jan. 6.
- Senior **Lynetta Kizer** has three this year. Most recently, she notched 16 points and pulled down 12 rebounds vs. No. 6 Miami.

Thomas Shines

2011 ACC Rookie of the Year **Alyssa Thomas** had a phenomenal freshman season, leading the team and the ACC in many statistical categories. This year, she's picked up right where she left off en route to being named 2012 ACC Player of the Year.

- Thomas is the second sophomore ever to win ACC Player of the Year, after Duke's Alana Beard did in 2002. Thomas is the fourth Terrapin and third in five years Vicky Bullett won in 1989, Crystal Langhorne earned it in 2008 and Kristi Toliver was honored in 2009.
- She has scored in double figures in 30 of 34 games and has 10 double-doubles this year.
- Thomas was named ACC Tournament MVP. She is just the seventh player and first underclassman ever to be named Player of the Year and MVP in the same season.
- She picked up four ACC Player of the Week honors as a sophomore more than any other player this year. She was named to the All-ACC First Team.
- Last year, Thomas led all ACC rookies in scoring (14.5), rebounding (7.3) and steals (2.1).
- She led the team in scoring (450) and steals (66) in 2010-11.
- As a rookie last season, her numbers put her at No. 8 in the league in steals, No. 9 in scoring, No. 10 in field goal percentage and offensive rebounds and No. 11 in total rebounding.
- She started off her career in the ACC with five double-doubles in her first six conference games.
- She earned a new Maryland record for Rookie of the Week awards with seven last season. Previously, **Crystal Langhorne** and **Marissa Coleman** were tied with five each.
- She was named to the All-ACC Second Team. She was the first freshman to make the Second Team or better since Coleman made the Second Team in 2005.

Mincy Makes Improvements

After recovering from an ACL tear in her left knee, **Laurin Mincy** has made huge strides in her game this season to become an All-ACC Honorable Mention honoree.

- Mincy missed her senior season at University High School in Newark, N.J. due to her injury.
- She saw action in 31 of 32 games and made one start as a freshman. She averaged 16.4 minutes per game and 4.9 points per contest.
- This year, she's averaging 13.2 points per game an 8.3 improvement. She has upped her field goal percentage from .382 last year to .430 this year, and her three-point field goal percentage from .274 to .394.
- · Mincy was named to the All-ACC Honorable Mention team.

Efficient Hawkins

Coming out of high school, junior **Tianna Hawkins** was not considered a highly-touted recruit. She's worked to get in the best shape of her life and is now one of the most efficient post players in the country. She was named to the All-ACC Second Team and All-ACC Tournament Team.

- Hawkins is 178-283 from the field this year for the nation's best field goal percentage of 62.9 percent. At No. 22 Georgia Tech, she went 11-13 from the field and at Virginia a week later, she went 12-13.
- She is one of the best in the ACC in rebounding with 9.3 boards per game. She also leads in offensive rebounds with 4.5 per contest.
- She averaged 5.4 rebounds per contest as a sophomore and has upped that by more than four rebounds per game.
- On Feb. 13, Hawkins was named ACC Player of the Week as she shot 72 percent from the field, averaged 18.3 points per game and 8.3 rebounds per game in the Terps' three games. The next day, the USBWA named her it's National Player of the Week.
- Hawkins was named ACC Player of the Week for the second straight week on Feb. 20. She shot over 77 percent from the field, averaged 22.5 points per game and 11.5 boards per game.

Overtime is Our Time

The phrase, "Overtime is our time!" became one of the catch phrases from the Terps' 2006 title run. That 2005-06 team went 6-0 in overtime games that year and won the national title in extra time vs. Duke.

- Maryland is 14-2 (.875) in overtime games in head coach Brenda Frese's 10 years.
- In the 2007-08 season, Frese was not on the sidelines for two of the Terps' overtime games. She missed a 97-86 double overtime loss at North Carolina on Jan. 26, 2008 and a 74-71 win at Virginia Tech on Feb. 4, 2008, due to her pregnancy with her sons.
- The Terps' only overtime loss with Frese on the sidelines was a 95-91 loss at Florida State on Jan. 16, 2005.

Senior center **Lynetta Kizer** competed on USA Basketball's Women's World University Games Team this summer. She and the team traveled to Shenzhen, China for almost two weeks in August.

The Terps won 30 games in 2007-08 when they went 33-4 and in 2008-09 when they went 31-5. This year, the Terps notched the program's fourth 30-win season with their record of 30-4.

"Coach Frese has been the driving force in putting Maryland women's basketball in a position of national prominence during her time here in College Park," director of athletics Kevin Anderson said. "Her 2006 national title and consistent top recruiting classes have positioned Maryland women's basketball for continued success in the future."

Alyssa Thomas scored 20 points, freshman Brene Moseley added 17, and No. 10 Maryland never trailed in a season-opening 84-46 victory over in-state foe Loyola on Friday night.

Thomas, a 6-foot-2 sophomore forward, had 14 points in 14 minutes in the first half to take the Terrapins to a 40-25 lead. The gap widened to 21 points with 17:43 left, and it was 66-36 with 9:41 to go.

"Our intensity was there. It started with our defense, which led to our offense, and I thought we were able to see a lot of great things, specifically in the second half, with this team," head coach Brenda Frese said.

Thomas also contributed seven rebounds and three assists in her 23 minutes on the floor.

Moseley went 5-6 from the field, including 2-for-2 from outside the arc, and 5-for-6 from the line with four assists and a steal in her Maryland debut.

"With Brene coming off an ACL, missing her senior season, to be able to come in and have this kind of performance tonight speaks volumes in terms of just how she has prepared herself to come back for this moment," head coach

Laurin Mincy scored 11 for the Terrapins, who have won 12 straight over Loyola and lead the series 18-3. Maryland next faces No. 11 Georgetown on Sunday.

Katie Sheahin led the Greyhounds with 13 points. Loyola went 21-13 last season and won a game in the WNIT, the first postseason victory in the history of the program. But the Greyhounds don't have the height or depth of the Terrapins.

Thomas scored the game's first six points, and Maryland raced to an 8-0 lead as the Greyhounds committed turnovers on their first four possessions. Loyola answered with seven straight points before Mincy hit a baseline jumper and two foul shots to spark an 11-0 run. That made it 19-7, and the Terrapins never let the margin shrink below double figures the rest of the way.

One of the nation's best rebounding teams a year ago, the Terrapins outrebounded the Greyhounds, 39-28. Redshirt freshman Whitney Bays pulled down a gamehigh eight rebounds, while Thomas and Tianna Hawkins each had seven. Thomas and Hawkins each also had four steals.

The Terrapins are ranked tenth in the USA Today/ESPN Division I Top 25 Preseason Coaches' poll, released Tuesday, and are No. 11 in the Associated Press rankings.

Alyssa Thomas and Tianna Hawkins both had double-doubles, and No. 10 Maryland shut down 11th-ranked Georgetown, 72-53 Sunday.

Thomas had 19 points and 15 rebounds, and Hawkins contributed 17 points and 14 rebounds for the Terrapins (2-0), who never trailed. Alicia DeVaughn added 14 points and Anjale Barrett had 10.

"We're just extremely proud for our team and excited for them," head coach Brenda Frese said. "This work started in our offseason. This is why these girls are so much fun to coach. When you talk about how hungry they stayed in the offseason, to prepare themselves for this season."

"Obviously, this was a terrific team win, the balance that we had, the defense we displayed. We played a very talented team. I think that for Georgetown's quest they're now the seeing the flip side of it, in terms of playing with expectations and how you have to play with a target on your back."

The Terrapins lost to Georgetown twice last year, including 79-57 at home in the second round of the NCAA tournament. Hoyas guard Sugar Rodgers scored 34 points in that one, but she had only four on 1-for-12 shooting Sunday before fouling out with 20.4 seconds left. The junior guard missed her first seven shots and was held scoreless until making her only basket, a layup with 8:08 remaining.

Thomas and Hawkins were the obvious stars, but Laurin Mincy did her part with an outstanding defensive effort on Rodgers. Mincy spent most of the game hounding Rodgers, getting relief only briefly from teammate Kim Rodgers. Maryland opened with a tight man-to-man defense in which Mincy tirelessly shadowed Rodgers from baseline to baseline and helped the Terrapins go up 12-6 early in the

Hawkins scored nine points, Thomas and DeVaughn each had eight, and the Terrapins forced 12 turnovers in taking a 34-26 halftime lead.

Maryland led 46-36 before Hawkins made a free throw, Thomas hit a jumper and Kim Rodgers buried a 3-pointer to make it 52-36. Minutes later, Hawkins hit a jumper and Mincy connected from long range to put the Terps up by 20.

Tia Magee led Georgetown (1-1) with 17 points and Rubylee Wright had 13.

The Terrapins dominated the inside game. They outrebounded the Hoyas, 42-31, and had 32 points in the paint to Georgetown's 20. Maryland capitalized off the Hoyas' 18 turnovers, by scoring 24 points off their give-aways.

Freshman Brene Moseley scored 26 points, Laurin Mincy had 15 and No. 9 Maryland dominated instate foe Towson on both ends of the court in an 82-46 victory Wednesday night.

The Terrapins (3-0) shot 58 percent from the field, limited the Tigers to 27 percent shooting and finished with a 48-30 rebounding advantage. Maryland used a 16-point run to take a 39-15 lead with five minutes left in the first half and coasted to the finish.

Moseley, a 5-foot-7 guard, went 10 for 15 from the floor and made all five of her free throws. Moseley missed her entire senior season in high school after tearing a ligament in her right knee.

"I thought it all came with the flow of the offense," head coach Brenda Frese said. "I thought Brene was extremely patient and moved the ball extremely well. It gives us another dimension when you look at our team and on any given night we're able to put the ball in the basket like we're doing. For a freshman to come in with that kind of poise and confidence it just makes us better as a team and that's what we have to have."

Alyssa Thomas scored 14 points for the Terrapins, who showed no sign of a letdown after Sunday's 72-53 rout of then-No. 10 Georgetown.

Deree Fooks and Nyree Williams each scored eight points for Towson (1-1). The Tigers lost to the Terrapins 74-42 last season and are 0-9 in College Park.

Despite committing turnovers on its first two possessions, Towson kept it close for nearly six minutes. Maryland then used successive 3-pointers by Moseley and Mincy to go up 13-7, and minutes later Kim Rodgers connected from beyond the arc to push the margin to 10.

It was 23-15 before the Terrapins rattled off 16 consecutive points, a burst that included a pair of 3-pointers by Moseley and two baskets by Thomas. At that point, Maryland was 15 for 24 from the floor, including 6 for 8 from long range.

The Terrapins outrebounded the Tigers, 48-30, and beat them in the paint, 26-18. Alicia DeVaughn and Whitney Bays each pulled in 10 boards.

The Terps notched 12 blocks as a team, including four from DeVaughn and three apiece from Essence Townsend and Bays.

Anjale Barrett dished six assists, while Mincy and Moseley each notched four.

The ninth-ranked Maryland women's basketball team held off in-state opponent UMBC's strong fight Saturday night for a 70-59 win in Baltimore. Tianna Hawkins led the Terrapins with 19 points and 18 rebounds before fouling out in the final minute.

Freshman Brene Moseley added 14 points, including three three-pointers, and senior Lynetta Kizer had 12 as the Terps (4-0) moved to 10-0 all-time vs. the Retrievers (2-2).

UMBC, the defending America East regular season champions, got 14 points each from Erin Brown and Michelle Kurowski and 12 from Lauren Chase.

With the game tied 9-9 after Chase scored on a backdoor cut, Maryland reeled off a 17-3 run, taking a 14-point lead on a pair of free throws by Kizer. Moseley had seven points in the burst.

But the Retrievers knocked down three 3-pointers, Brown converted a three-point play and a Kurowski jumper from the right baseline cut the Terrapins' lead to 32-29 with 4:02 remaining in the first half.

Maryland scored eight of the next 10 points, taking a 40-31 halftime lead on Hawkins' right-side bank shot with 28.2 seconds left. Hawkins had 12 points and 10 rebounds in the opening 20 minutes.

Laurin Mincy hit a 3 on Maryland's first possession of the second half, but the Terrapins misfired on their next six possessions. While Maryland struggled, Kurowski was scoring six points in an 9-0 burst, and her left-wing 3-pointer got the Retrievers within 43-40 with 16:05 remaining.

Kizer then muscled in the rebound of a Moseley miss and Alicia DeVaughn scored off a transition layup for a 47-40 Maryland lead.

Chase's three-point play cut the Maryland lead to four points with 12:10 left, but UMBC didn't connect again from the field until Brittany Crowell jumper with 2:55 remaining cut the lead to 64-52.

The Terrapins outrebounded the Retrievers, 47-28, and grabbed 26 offensive boards. They scored 30 points to UMBC's six.

Lynetta Kizer scored a career-high 25 points, Alyssa Thomas added 21, and No. 8 Maryland remained unbeaten with a 94-71 victory over Saint Joseph's on Tuesday night at Comcast Center.

Tianna Hawkins contributed 17 points and 12 rebounds for her second straight double-double, and Laurin Mincy had 14 points and nine rebounds for the Terrapins (5-0), who have won all their games by double figures.

"I thought tonight was a nice, solid overall win. I thought it was extremely balanced from our end," head coach Brenda Frese said. "I thought Saint Joseph's did a great job coming at us especially when we got the chance to get the lead. They had a lot of fight to them. It's good for us to be challenged like that throughout an entire game."

Maryland dominated the inside game, outrebounding Saint Joseph's 58-25, including 20 offensive boards. The Terps outscored the Hawks in the paint, 52-12. The Terrapins also shot 82.4 percent from the foul line their highest total of the season.

"Obviously, I loved the dominance of the glass we were able to display tonight," Frese said. "Being able to get the ball inside and making things difficult for them and being able to convert what we did on the free throw line. I like how we can build upon this game."

Erin Shields led Saint Joseph's (2-3) with 16 points, Ashley Prim had 15 and Katie Kuester 13.

The Hawks went 1 for 8 from the field at the outset, and Maryland took advantage by taking a 12-3 lead. Minutes later, however, successive baskets by Shields capped a 10-4 spurt that got Saint Joseph's to 21-18.

It was 28-23 before Kizer hit a 3-pointer and Thomas added a layup and two foul shots to spark a 14-4 run that expanded the margin to 15. The Hawks got within 11 shortly before halftime, but Thomas scored on a drive and Kizer made a free throw and a follow-shot to give the Terrapins a 49-33 lead at the break.

After Saint Joseph's closed to 58-47, Kizer made two free throws, Whitney Bays scored in the lane and Kizer added a foul shot for a 63-47 lead with 11 minutes left. That was enough to assure the Terrapins their 85th win in 90 non-conference games at Comcast Center.

Mincy dished a game-high six assists, as the Terrapins combined for 18 as a team.

Both teams committed 18 turnovers, but the Terps were able to capitalize for 26 points off the Panthers' giveaways, while FIU scored just 10 off the Terrapins'.

Largest lead - CSUB None, MD by 33 2nd-04:53.

Six players scored in double figures and Laurin Mincy notched a career-high 23 points to lead No. 8 Maryland to a 114-83 victory over CSU Bakersfield in Miami on Saturday.

Mincy went 5-for-7 from outside the arc, while Brene Moseley added three treys for 17 points, all in the second half. Tianna Hawkins notched her third double-double of the year with 19 points, 10 boards and Lynetta Kizer scored 15 for the second straight game. Alyssa Thomas added 14 points and Anjale Barrett had 11.

The Terrapins (7-0) withstood a run by CSU Bakersfield midway through the first half and outscored the Roadrunners 11-2 in the final 3:54. Tianna Hawkins scored six points in a row during the spurt and her layup with 5 seconds remaining gave Maryland a 53-41 halftime lead.

Maryland was never threatened in the second half as the Terrapins increased their lead to 72-52 on Alyssa Thomas' two free throws with 14:41 remaining.

Tyonnna Outland and Lauren Carter scored 15 points apiece for CSU Bakersfield (2-4). Alicia DeVaughn's short jumper with 5:17 remaining gave the Terrapins their first 30-point lead at 99-69. Maryland scored its most points since a 118-59 rout of Appalachian State on Dec. 1, 2005.

The Terps outrebounded the Roadrunners, 54-19. They had 25 offensive rebounds that resulted in a 35-5 advantage in second chance points.

CSU Bakersfield overcame a 14-point first half deficit and got within one after a 20-8 spurt during a 4:32 stretch in the first half. Kristine Herman's jumper with 7:25 remaining capped the run and reduced Maryland's lead to 34-33.

Lynetta Kizer scored six points and Mincy hit two 3-pointers that sparked the Terrapins to a 14-4 lead in the first 4:04. Mincy's third 3-pointer of the half with 13:21 remaining increased Maryland's lead to 23-9.

The Terrapins shot 81.3 percent from the foul line and were 26-for-32 as a team from the free throw line.

Barrett dished 21 assists and committed two turnovers in the Terps' two games in Miami over the weekend.

Maryland got all it could handle from Michigan, and Terrapins coach Brenda Frese couldn't have been happier. Alyssa Thomas scored 24 points, and No. 6 Maryland used a late surge to top the previously unbeaten Wolverines 74-65 Wednesday night in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge.

The Terrapins won their previous seven games with relative ease, so Frese wasn't sure how her players would react in a close game. She got an answer, and although there were a few anxious moments, it was worth it.

"Just a tremendous win," Frese said. "What I liked about this game is from start to finish we had to work. I thought we learned a lot about ourselves. It was a game that we had to compete and go after it for 40 minutes."

The Terrapins (8-0) saved the best for last. Mary-land led 60-59 with six minutes left before Laurin Mincy drilled a 3-pointer, Lynetta Kizer added a three-point play and Anjale Barrett made two free throws for a nine-point cushion with 3:52 remaining.

After Carmen Reynolds sank two free throws for Michigan (7-1), successive baskets by Tianna Hawkins put Maryland up by 11.

"I just loved how we were able to finish the game," Frese said. "We were able to wear them out and finish the game strong."

Hawkins had 10 points and 16 rebounds, and Mincy contributed 11 points and eight rebounds for the Terrapins.

Courtney Boylan scored 17 and Reynolds had 15 for Michigan, which was vying to go 8-0 for the first time in school history. The Wolverines have never defeated a team in the Top 10. Michigan made nine three's, including six of 10 in the first half.

Maryland outrebounded Michigan 51-28 and scored 18 fast-break points, but the Wolverines compensated by committing only seven turnovers and making nine 3-pointers

Michigan went ahead for the first time when Rachel Sheffer opened the second half with a jumper in the lane to make it 38-36. A 3-pointer by Reynolds upped the lead to 43-40, but successive three-point plays by Alicia DeVaughn and Thomas put the Terrapins back in front. DeVaughn then hit a follow-shot for a 48-43 advantage, and after a Michigan timeout, Thomas capped the 10-0 run with a driving layup.

But the Wolverines weren't done. Reynolds hit a 3, and layups by Boylan and Jenny Ryan knotted the score at 50 with 13:18 left. The game was subsequently tied at 52, 54 and 56. On each occasion, Maryland scored first and Michigan answered. The trend was broken when Barrett and Mincy hit successive baskets to make it 60-56 with 6:37 to go.

Thomas scored 19 of her points in the first half and hit her first career three.

Alyssa Thomas led five Terrapins who scored in double figures with her 17 points, as No. 6 Maryland cruised to a 76-42 victory over American on Sunday.

Laurin Mincy added 13 points for the Terrapins (9-0), Lynetta Kizer had 11, and Anjale Barrett and Brene Moseley had 10 apiece.

The Terps gave up a season-low points on defense and continued their best start since beginning the 2007-08 season, when the Terps won their first 10 games.

Gelesia George scored 10 points for American (5-4), which shot just 30 percent (16 of 54) from the floor and 9 percent (2 of 22) from 3-point range.

Maryland showed little sign of a hangover after arguably their toughest victory this season, Wednesday's 74-65 home win against Michigan in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge. Maryland trailed American 3-2 after the first media timeout, but shook off the slow start to build a 38-16 lead by halftime.

Thomas, who had a season-high 24 points in the victory over Michigan, jump-started the Terps' offense against AU with eight of its first 12 points. She also scored twice during a 12-0, late-first-half run, capping the stretch with a steal and layup that made it 38-14. She distributed four assists, including a slick give-and-go feed to Brene Moseley that made it 54-23 early in the second half.

Moseley led the Terps with five assists, who had 16 overall vs. their 13 turnovers.

Maryland outrebounded American, 42-29. Alicia DeVaughn led the Terrapins with nine boards. Seven Terps pulled down four or more rebounds. The Terrapins scored 42 points in the paint to American's 18.

The Terrapins continue a month of December that won't take them beyond the Washington, D.C. metro area when they host Delaware State Thursday before traveling to George Mason next Sunday.

If they win both those contests, they will surpass the 2007-08 team that went to the NCAA regional final, the first Maryland squad to reach that stage after coach Brenda Frese's team won the 2006 national title.

Eight players scored in double figures for the fifth-ranked Maryland women's basketball team, as the Terps crushed Delaware State, 108-33. When the final buzzer mercifully sounded, the Terrapins had produced the biggest rout in the history of the women's program.

Laurin Mincy led with 15 points, while Brene Moseley, Tianna Hawkins, Alicia DeVaughn and Anjale Barrett each had 13. Sequoia Austin had a career-high 12. Alyssa Thomas and Essence Townsend added 10 apiece.

"You can just see what makes this team so special," Frese said. "We had a lot of fun tonight. The unselfish play, obviously, when you look at the box and see eight players in double figures. I liked the fact that we competed for 40 minutes, defensively and offensively, not looking at the score."

The Terrapins (10-0) connected on 13 of their first 18 shots and shot 67 percent from the floor in taking a 57-14 halftime lead. Maryland made as many baskets (24) in the first half as the turnover-prone Hornets (2-7) attempted.

The 75-point victory topped the Terrapins' previous high of 71 points, set in 1975 against Frostburg State and matched in 1993 against Maryland-Eastern Shore.

"I realize they're a very good team, but I didn't realize how good they were until the kids got on the floor," Hornets coach Ed Davis said of the Terps. "They executed like a ranked team, and unfortunately we played like an extremely unranked team."

Maryland went 43 of 65 from the floor (66 percent), finished with a 48-20 rebounding advantage, limited the Hornets to 20 percent shooting and forced 23 turnovers -- including six shot-clock violations in the first half alone.

The Terrapins ruled every facet of the game, including the duel between twin sisters Tianna Hawkins and Tierra Hawkins. Tianna had 13 points and nine rebounds for Maryland, and Tierra, who came in as Delaware State's leading scorer and rebounder, was limited to seven points (on 3-for-17 shooting) and six boards.

"It felt really good," Tianna said. "We've both been waiting for this moment since the schedule was released."

Frese said, "Tremendous to see. They've been battling together since they've been in the womb."

After Tasia Bristow hit a 3-pointer to give Delaware State a 3-2 lead, Maryland took over. Mincy scored to spark an 8-0 run, and after the Hornets closed to 12-7, seven different Terrapins scored in a 19-2 run that made it 31-9.

Delaware State went 5 for 24 from the field with 12 turnovers in the first half and made only one field goal during the final 12½ minutes.

Alyssa Thomas had 18 points to lead four players in double figures and the fifth-ranked Maryland women's basketball team beat George Mason 78-50 on Sunday.

Laurin Mincy scored 15 points for her seventh straight game in double figures. Lynetta Kizer had 14 and Anjale Barrett added 13 for the Terrapins (11-0).

"This is a big team win for us, especially defensively," head coach Brenda Frese said. "Any time you can go on the road and hold a really good George Mason team to 24 percent shooting, I thought we did tremendous job just mixing it up defensively."

Taleia Moton led the Patriots (6-3) with 16 points and Janaa Pickard added 12.

Maryland scored the first 10 points of the second half and Barrett's jumper at the 15-minute mark put the Terrapins up by 36. Maryland eventually led by as many as 40 points and George Mason got no closer than 28.

Maryland, now 5-0 all-time against George Mason, shot 46 percent from the field for the game and outrebounded George Mason 59-33. The Patriots made just 17 of 71 field goal attempts.

"Maryland is a good as advertised. No doubt," George Mason coach Jeri Porter said. "While we knew what to expect from them, we were also a bit disappointed. We didn't feel like we put forth our best effort tonight in terms of our offense. We didn't do a really good job of staying patient in the game and putting the ball in the basket. But a lot of credit for that obviously goes to Maryland in terms of their defense scheme and how aggressively they play."

Acknowledging the talent of the George Mason guards, Frese opted to put Maryland into a zone defense for much of the game.

"We haven't played a 40-minute game like tonight," Frese said. "I felt like watching George Mason that was how you could be effective and successful and I wanted to challenge this team early to know that as we get into conference play that if this is what we need to go to, we can. "We felt like it their guard play was very, very strong and we wanted to make it difficult for them to be able to get shots off, so I thought, just collectively as a team, we did a nice job making them take difficult shots," Frese said.

George Mason hit three of its first four shots, including two 3-pointers, and led 8-4. Led by Thomas and Alicia DeVaughn, the Terrapins went on a 12-0 run and outscored the Patriots 40-12 over the remainder of the period to take a 44-20 lead at the break.

After Moton's three-point play pulled George Mason within 21-13, the Patriots went nearly 9 minutes without scoring and trailed by as many as 27 points.

"That was definitely an emphasis we had going into the game," Frese said. "We felt with what we have in size that we could expose them inside, and it's great because again you challenge a team to execute and they did."

After winning one blowout after another, No. 5
Maryland found itself in a unique position: trailing in the second relation its own floor.

Although the Terrapins never could find a way to prevent Delaware star Elena Delle Donne from scoring, they got enough production from gurds Laurin Mincy and Anjale Barrett to pull out an 85-76 victory over the previously unbeaten No. 19 Blue Hens on Thursday night.

Mincy scored 18 of her career-high 25 points after halftime and fueled a pivotal run that enabled Maryland (13-0) to win the title game of the Terrapin Classic. Barrett had 16 points and eight assists despite missing time in the first half after taking a spill.

"We're going to go as far as our guards take us," coach Brenda Frese said. "It's just fun to see how our backcourt is working together."

The Terrapins trailed 44-41 before Mincy scored nine points in a 15-2 run that put Maryland ahead by 10 with 13:51 left. After the Blue Hens closed to 56-50, Barrett contributed the final seven points to a 9-2 spurt that upped the margin to 13.

Alyssa Thomas had 23 points and nine rebounds for the Terrapins, whose margin of victory was under double digits for only the second time this season.

Delle Donne scored 32 for the Blue Hens (10-1), who were seeking to improve on the best start in school history. Delaware is 0-10 all-time against Maryland and 3-28 versus ranked opponents.

Delle Donne finished 10 for 19 from the field and made all 10 of her free throws. The nation's leading scorer kept the Blue Hens in striking distance by scoring 24 points after halftime, including two foul shots that made it 79-73 with 3:43 to go.

But the Terrapins simply had too much depth and height. Maryland finished with a 38-30 rebounding advantage, the first time this season Delaware was beaten on the boards.

Delaware ran off 11 straight points late in the first half, taking its second lead of the game before a follow-shot by Whitney Bays put Maryland ahead 39-38 at the break.

After Thomas scored off the opening tip, the Blue Hens went up 7-6. Thomas then made a pair of baskets in a 13-4 run that put the Terps in front 19-11. The only Delaware points during the surge were scored by Delle Donne, who also committed two turnovers.

It was 24-20 before Thomas drilled a 3-pointer off a pass from Barrett and Kim Rodgers sank two foul shots. Minutes later, Thomas drove the length of the court for a layup, was fouled and added the free throw to make it 37-27.

The Terrapins then went nearly nine minutes without scoring. Barrett had assists on five of Maryland's first eight baskets, but she hurt her left ankle trying to take a charge and did not play the last 6 minutes of the half.

Maryland used balanced scoring and a sizable rebounding edge to stay unbeaten and hand Florida State its worst home loss in nearly five years.

Laurin Mincy scored 23 points, Alyssa Thomas added 21 points and 10 rebounds and Tianna Hawkins had 20 points and 13 rebounds as No. 5 Maryland routed Florida State 91-70 on Monday night. Hawkins was 7 of 7 from the floor in the first half and had nine rebounds for Maryland (14-0, 1-0 ACC), which won the Atlantic Coast Conference opener for both teams. Anjale Barrett notched 12 points.

"I liked the toughness we played with," Maryland head coach Brenda Frese said. "This obviously was a very important game for us to set the tone early for the conference schedule. To be able to come in and be able to secure our first road (ACC) win is tremendous."

Maryland handed Florida State its worst home loss since No. 2 North Carolina defeated Florida State 80-59 on Feb. 12, 2007.

Alexa Deluzio tied a career high with 23 points, Cierra Bravard had 14 points and Chasity Clayton had 13 points for Florida State (8-7, 0-1). The Seminoles had 20 turnovers, including 10 in the game's first 11 minutes.

The Terrapins outhustled the Seminoles, winning the rebounding edge 53-40.

"They completely outmuscled us with 25 offensive boards," Florida State head coach Sue Semrau said. "They pushed the ball in transition and we were just not up for the challenge tonight."

Maryland shook off a sluggish start to remain unbeaten. The Terrapins are enjoying their best start since opening 18-0 in 2006-07.

Florida State trailed 15-7 early in the game but a pair of 3-pointers by Deluzio were part of a 10-0 run that put the Seminoles in front 17-15 with 12:01 left in the first half. Maryland trailed 19-18 but went on a 10-0 run, capped by Mincy's 3-pointer with 9:01 left in the first half, to pull away.

Maryland led 48-36 at halftime and had no trouble extending that lead. The Terrapins led by as many as 22 points after Anjale Barrett's layup with 14:30 left in the game.

The Terrapins, who lead the country in field goal percentage, shot 44.6 percent from the floor in the game. The Seminoles shot 40.3 percent. Defensively, the Terrapins had 10 steals as a team, including three each from Alicia DeVaughn and Hawkins. DeVaughn also had three blocks on the night.

Down by 20 points in the second half, No. 5 Maryland turned to Alyssa Thomas to pull the team out of a seemingly insurmountable hole. The unflappable sophomore forward came through with a brilliant performance that helped the unbeaten Terrapins stay that way.

Thomas scored 18 of her 24 points over the final 18 minutes, including a three-point play with 17 seconds left that carried the Terrapins past Georgia Tech 77-74 Friday night.

"Are you kidding me? Did you see what we saw?" coach Brenda Frese said. "To have the heart and determination and grit to be able to come back like they did is what makes this team so special."

The Terrapins (15-0, 2-0 Atlantic Coast Conference) trailed 56-36 shortly after halftime and 72-64 with 4:23 remaining before coming back. After Thomas gave Maryland a 76-74 lead by scoring in the lane and adding a free throw, Georgia Tech's Metra Walthour lost the ball driving to the basket and Laurin Mincy made a clinching foul shot for the Terps.

Thomas went 1 for 3 from the floor in the first half and 6 for 11 after halftime. She also made all six of her free throws in the final 20 minutes.

"I think the first half, I was a little too excited. I let their press got the best of me," Thomas said.

And after that?

"The difference was Alyssa Thomas," Georgia Tech coach MaChelle Joseph said. "We didn't have an answer for her."

Mincy scored 17 points and Alicia DeVaughn contributed 11 points and 11 rebounds for the Terrapins. Thomas added 11 rebounds as well.

Georgia Tech (11-4, 1-1) came in with a six-game winning streak. Sasha Goodlett had 20 points and 10 rebounds for the Yellow Jackets and Tyaunna Marshall scored 16. All of Georgia Tech's defeats this season have come against teams currently ranked in the Top 25.

"I felt like we came out here with a good game plan," Joseph said. "We got on our toes and we attacked early and we were able to control the boards in the first half and stop transition baskets, the two things that Maryland does. We were able to take those away in the first half."

The second half, not so much

"We got more aggressive, attacked more and were more active on the glass," Frese said. $\label{eq:control}$

After Maryland scored the opening basket of the second half, Marshall made a driving layup to begin an 11-0 run that gave Georgia Tech a 20-point lead with 17:39 left.

"When we were down 20, this team could have folded,"

rese said.

That's when the Terrapins began their comeback, and it

didn't take long. Beginning with a three-point play and a layup, Thomas scored 11 points in a 17-1 run that cut the deficit to 57-53 with 12:28 to play.

Maryland's next eight points came at the foul line, including two by Thomas that made it 63-61.

After the Yellow Jackets boosted the margin to eight points, a layup by DeVaughn sparked a 9-2 spree that cut the gap to 74-73. Thomas' three-point play gave Maryland its first lead since 27-25.

Georgia Tech scored 26 points in the paint and outrebounded Maryland 26-18 in the first half to take a 45-34 lead at the break. The Terrapins, the nation's leading rebounding team, outrebounded the Jackets 25-12 in the second half for a 43-38 advantage on the boards overall.

As a team, the Terps went 22-24 at the line for 91.7 percent at the line - their best clip of the season. Thomas was 10-for-10.

Maryland was in trouble for the second time in three days. Once again, the undefeated Terrapins responded.

Tianna Hawkins grabbed a missed free throw and scored with 1:49 left in overtime to help No. 5 Maryland beat No. 25 North Carolina on Sunday 78-72.

Alyssa Thomas scored 24 points for the Terrapins, including a reverse layup as time expired in regulation. Anjale Barrett added 16 points, going 4 for 4 on free throws in the final 1:08 of overtime.

Thomas, dubbed a "smiling assassin" by Maryland coach Brenda Frese, helped the Terrapins (16-0, 3-0 Atlantic Coast Conference) rally for their second league victory in three days. Maryland trailed Georgia Tech by 20 points before coming back to win 77-74 on Friday night.

"What I love about the spirit of this team is that they'll fight for each other, and they know they're never out of a contest," Frese said. "It's very comforting, obviously, as a coaching staff when you see players who believe so much in each other."

Chay Shegog scored 20 points for Carolina (12-3, 2-1), which led by six in the final two minutes of regulation.

"You've got to give Maryland a lot of credit," Tar Heels coach Sylvia Hatchell said. "They did the right things at the right time. I felt like we should have won the game. We played hard, but we don't accept losing."

North Carolina almost closed it out in regulation.

Thomas extended the game with an acrobatic move. The Terrapins inbounded the ball to her from the sideline with 3.7 seconds left, and she drove the left baseline. When Thomas encountered defensive help by the Tar Heels, she finished with a layup on the other side.

Candace Wood scored a career-high 15 points for the Tar Heels. Tierra Ruffin-Pratt had 13 points on 4-of-17 shooting, and Brittany Rountree had 10 points.

The Tar Heels led 66-60 after a driving bank shot by Ruffin-Pratt with 1:29 to go in regulation.

But Mincy hit a 3-pointer, and Barrett followed with a transition layup.


Rountree made 1 of 2 free throws for North Carolina with 12.7 seconds left, setting up Thomas' tying shot.

The Terps, the nation's leading rebounding team, grabbed 54 boards to the Heels' 44. Hawkins led the Terrapins with 12 and Alicia DeVaughn had 11. Maryland also beat North Carolina in the paint, 36-32, and off second chance shots, 18-15. The Terps grabbed 20 offensive boards for the ninth game this year. Hawkins had seven.

Barrett dished nine assists, as the Terps had 15 sltogether.

The win is head coach Brenda Frese's second at Carolina, as the Terps beat then-No. 1 UNC in Chapel Hill 98-95 in overtime on Feb. 9, 2006.

Alyssa Thomas led with 18 points and Tianna Hawkins added her eighth double-double of the year, but No. 5 Maryland fell to No. 11 Miami, 75-63, Thursday night in Coral Gables, Fla. The Terrapins (16-1, 3-1 ACC) led 56-54 with just over six minutes to play, but the hot-shooting Hurricanes (14-3, 3-1 ACC) hit two quick threes within a minute to take the lead for good.

Thomas was 9-for-18 from the field with five boards, while Hawkins finished with 12 points and 11 rebounds. Anjale Barrett added 10 points.

After trailing by 12 at 22-10, with 11:31 left in the first half, a layup by Hawkins at 8:11 jumpstarted a 17-3 Terps run to close the first half. Maryland extended its run to go up 35-28 and force a Miami timeout with 18:47 to play in the second.

Miami's Riquna Williams, a Preseason All-ACC Player, was 8-for-14 from outside the arc to lead the Hurricanes with 34 points. Stefanie Yderstrom was 4-for-7 from downtown for 12 points. As a team, Miami shot 46.4 percent from three-point range.

The Terrapins held Shenise Johnson, the reigning ACC Player of the Year, to six points, well below her average of 16.4 points per contest. Maryland ended her streak of scoring in double figures in 87 straight games - the longest active streak in the country.

The Hurricanes won the battle on the glass, 48-40, but the Terps outscored them in the paint 34-18.

Laurin Mincy scored 20, and No. 8 Maryland bounced back from its first loss of the season by defeating Virginia 68-61 Monday night in a rugged Atlantic Coast Conference matchup.

Lynetta Kizer had 10 points and 10 rebounds for the Terrapins (17-1, 4-1) in her first double-double of the season. Alicia DeVaughn added nine points and she and Tianna Hawkins each added nine rebounds.

But the Terrapins outdid the ACC's best defense by holding the Cavaliers to 39 percent shooting and finishing with a 43-33 edge in rebounding. Maryland was coming off a 75-63 defeat at Miami.

"I thought Virginia was really, really good," Terrapins coach Brenda Frese said. "They came in and had a really good game plan. They really made us play their tempo and their style of play -- very, very aggressive. I thought it took us a while in terms of getting the feel and the rhythm of the game, but in the second half we were able to wear them down."

"Anytime you have that happen the first time, you want to get back out and play. Especially a game like UVA, a rivalry."

Lexie Gerson scored 15 for Virginia (14-5, 2-3) and Ataira Franklin had 14.

It was 38-all before Maryland's Tianna Hawkins made a layup and reserve guard Kim Rodgers buried a 3-pointer to launch an 11-5 run that made it 49-43. After a timeout, the Terrapins beat the press and got the ball to Brene Moseley, who hit a 3-pointer for a 52-43 lead with 11 minutes left.

The Cavaliers closed to 62-57 with 2:08 remaining, but Mincy made four free throws over a 31-second span to blunt the comeback and end Virginia's two-game winning streak in the ACC.

DeVaughn made three layups and Mincy hit a pair of 3-pointers in an 18-6 spurt to end the half. The Terrapins got 10 points from Mincy and outrebounded Virginia 21-15 in taking a 36-32 lead at the break.

Tianna Hawkins had already taken a seat on the bench, happy to savor a solid victory by Maryland.

Then, with just over two minutes left in what would be an 86-58 rout of Wake Forest on Thursday night, word got to coach Brenda Frese that Hawkins was one rebound short of setting the school record.

Hawkins was thrust back into the game, snared her 24th rebound on the Maryland end with 32 seconds left, and wore a huge smile right up to the final buzzer.

"I asked the team if we should let her come back in and they unanimously said yes," Frese said. "That record has been in the record books for a very long time. It's special for us to be able to break records."

Hawkins eclipsed the mark set by Angie Scott against Towson State in February 1977 and tied by Debbie Jones against Howard in December of that year.

"It felt good. My teammates were pushing me to get that last rebound and the crowd was pushing me," said Hawkins, who scored 18 points and fueled a second-half surge by Maryland.

The game was tied at halftime, but the Terrapins dominated the final 20 minutes in rolling to their 11th straight win over the Demon Deacons. Alyssa Thomas had 16 points and 11 rebounds for Maryland (18-1, 5-1)

A total of five Terps finished in double figures, as Lynetta Kizer, Laurin Mincy and Brene Moseley each added 11.

Chelsea Douglas led Wake Forest with 15 points, and Lakevia Boykin and Sandra Garcia each had 13. The Demon Deacons (11-7, 1-4) scored only 21 points after halftime.

"I'm very disappointed that the ACC voted down my proposal to play 20-minute games," Wake Forest coach Mike Peterson joked. "That would have made this evening more enjoyable." Maryland opened the second half with seven straight points, the last five by Hawkins. After the Demon Deacons closed to 47-43, Hawkins made a three-point play.

The Demon Deacons answered with baskets by Douglas and Garcia to make it 50-47, but that preceded an eight-point run by the Terrapins. It was 62-52 before Maryland used a 19-2 blitz to erase any doubt.

"They're really good," Peterson said. "That's the best offensive rebounding team I've ever seen."




Maryland led 34-31 at halftime despite limiting Virginia Tech to 9-for-29 shooting.

The Terps' domination in the first half could hardly have been more complete. In the final 15 minutes of the half, they allowed the Eagles just one field goal - outscoring Boston College 38-3 and scoring the final 20 points in the period. Maryland (19-3, 6-3 Atlantic Coast Conference) led Boston College 51-13 at the break the Eagles' lowest point total in a half ever.

"I thought the first half was by far the most inspired, best effort and intensity that we've given up to date. It's encouraging with three of our best practices leading up to this game today. I thought it showed a lot of character from our last game," head coach Brenda Frese said.

Alyssa Thomas scored 23 points and pulled down 12 rebounds, Tianna Hawkins added a career-high 23 points and Maryland (No. 10 ESPN/USA Today, No. 8 AP) beat No. 22 Georgia Tech 64-56 on Monday night.

Thomas went 12 of 12 on free throws to help Maryland (20-3, 7-3 Atlantic Coast Conference) win its second straight. Hawkins went 11 of 13 from the field and grabbed nine boards. The Terrapins outrebounded Georgia Tech 43-28.

Sasha Goodlett, who finished with 15 points, was the only player to score in double figures for Georgia Tech (17-7, 7-4). The loss snapped the Yellow Jackets' four-game winning streak.

The teams had split the last four games, which had been decided by a margin of 3.3 points, in the series. The lead changed hands eight times, and the score was tied 12 times. Thomas went 5 of 15 from the field.

Lynetta Kizer, who scored 10 points, hit a 16-footer to give the Terrapins a 52-44 lead with 6:05 remaining. The Yellow Jackets followed by scoring 10 unanswered points and going up by two on Ty Marshall's layup.

Hawkins' jumper with 2:09 remaining gave Maryland a 56-54 lead, and the Terrapins never trailed again.

The Yellow Jackets, who failed to hold a 20-point lead early in the second half at Maryland last month and lost by three points, let the Terrapins end the first half on a 10-0 run, capped by Thomas' two free throws, for a 24-24 tie at intermission.

As a team, Maryland was 17-19 (89.5 percent) from the foul line. The Terps scored 22 points off Georgia Tech's 17 turnovers. Maryland's 17 offensive rebounds led to 19 second chance points to the Jackets' six.

The Terps notched their 20th win for the eight consecutive season under head coach Brenda Frese.

Lynetta Kizer scored 18 points and No. 8 Maryland had six players in double-figures to win their third straight game, 91-61, at Clemson Thursday night.

The Terrapins (21-3, 8-3 Atlantic Coast Conference), won their 11th straight in the series and ran all over the Tigers (6-16, 2-9) at Littlejohn Coliseum.

Alicia DeVaughn scored 15, Alyssa Thomas and Tianna Hawkins had 14 each, Laurin Mincy 13 and Brene Moseley 10 as Maryland tied its highest ACC point total this season. The Terrapins also showed off some defense, forcing 25 turnovers off 14 steals.

Nikki Dixon had 17 points to lead the Tigers, but was just 4 of 14 from the field against Maryland's high-pressure defense.

Maryland kept within sight of ACC leaders in No. 5 Duke (11-0 in the league) and Miami (10-0). The Terrapins have a golden opportunity to close the gap in the next two weeks, facing Miami at home on Sunday and Duke at home a week later.

Maryland came in to this one off a milestone victory, a 64-56 win at Georgia Tech that gave the program 20 wins for the eighth consecutive season. And the Terrapins didn't let up at Clemson. Maryland forced turnovers on five straight Tigers possessions to run out to a 16-4 lead less than seven minutes in. Clemson could not hold on against the ACC's highest scoring team.


Thomas had 11 points in the opening half while Kizer had eight consecutive points down the stretch as Maryland took a 20-point lead in the final minutes of the opening half. The Terrapins did just about everything right the first 20 minutes. They shot 50 percent (15 of 30) and made all but one of their 14 foul shots. They held Clemson to 2 of 13 shooting from behind the arc and forced 16 turnovers in the period.

Maryland kept up the pressure throughout the second half. When Clemson cut the lead to 65-47 with 9:18 to go, the Terrapins answered with a 31-7 charge over the next six minutes. It was Maryland's fourth ACC win of 21 points or more.

The Terps won the battle on the glass, 39-33, with six each from Hawkins and Kizer. DeVaughn added career-highs with six blocks and four steals.

The game served as a remembrance of the late Kay Yow with both teams wearing pink in their uniforms — Clemson had pink shorts while the Terrapins had pink socks — to honor the North Carolina State coach who died of breast cancer in 2009.

► GAME 25: MIAMI



Five Maryland players finished in double figures as the Terps led most of the game, but No. 8 Maryland fell to No. 6 Miami, 76-74 Sunday afternoon in front of over 11,000 fans at Comcast Center

Tianna Hawkins notched her 10th double-double of the season with 18 points and 10 boards, while Lynetta Kizer added 16 points and 12 rebounds. Anjale Barrett and Alyssa Thomas added 12 points apiece, and Laurin Mincy scored 11.

The Terrapins (21-4, 8-4 ACC) led through more than half of the first half and through most of the second, until the Hurricanes (22-3, 11-1) took a 1-point lead with 39 seconds remaining in the game.

"It was a tremendous game. Both teams were battling their wills, and it was a back and fourth game," head coach Brenda Frese said. "Obviously, I thought our game plan was really solid. I think down the stretch Miami's players stepped up and made plays like seniors do, like All-Americans do. From our end, we're obviously disappointed. We played with a lot of heart and intensity. It got away from us."

Miami's Stefanie Yderstrom scored a career-high 26 points and Shenise Johnson added 20 to help Miami rally from being down by eight in the second period.


Trailing 66-60 with 6 minutes left, Miami rallied behind Johnson. The senior preseason All-American's jumper from the corner with 2:07 left gave the Hurricanes their first lead since early in the first half and set up a tense finish.

Anjale Barrett's lay-in with 54 seconds to go put Maryland back up 72-71. But the Hurricanes took the lead for good on Sylvia Bullock's jumper 15 seconds later. After two missed shots by the Terrapins, Johnson hit two free throws to make if 75-72.

Laurin Mincy missed a 3-pointer that would have tied the game, and Riquna Williams hit a free throw to seal the win

Maryland held Miami to 25 percent (4-16) from outside the arc - below the Hurricanes' season average of 32.7. Maryland won the battle on the glass, 44-33, and beat the Canes in the paint, 38-32. Kizer's 12 boards put her at 903 in her career - No. 5 on the Terrapins' all-time list.

► GAME 26: at Virginia



Tianna Hawkins notched a career-high 26 points and Alyssa Thomas added 16 to lead No. 7 Maryland past Virginia, 73-56, Thursday night at John Paul Jones Arena. The win was victory No. 300 for head coach Brenda Frese.

Hawkins, who leads the nation with her field goal percentage of 65 percent, was 12-13 from the field and grabbed a game-high 14 rebounds. Thomas added 10 boards for her sixth double-double of the season.

The Terrapins (22-4, 9-4 ACC) dominated the inside game, out rebounding the Cavaliers 53-26, and beating them in the paint, 48-20.

"I thought we really set the tone tonight with our defense and rebounding. Those are the things that you have to have as you are going down the stretch here in February getting ready for postseason play," head coach Brenda Frese said. "I'm just really proud of our intensity that we played with tonight for 40 minutes and just getting better in terms of what we are doing. Obviously, the last two years we have come in here and sprinted out of here in terms of those battles. I'm just proud that we were able to play with a lot of energy and intensity tonight."

Ariana Moorer led Virginia with 23 points and Ataira Franklin had 10.

Laurin Mincy added nine points and eight rebounds, while Alicia DeVaughn had eight points and boards as well. Lynetta Kizer scored eight.

The Cavaliers came into the game ranked 18th nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 52.9 points per game, but nearly gave up that many by halftime. Maryland took charge early to lead 44-21 at the break. The Cavaliers (18-9, 6-7) fought back in the second half, but never got closer than 11.

Early in the game, the Terrapins built a 22-8 cushion and scored 30 of their first 32 points in the paint. They outrebounded the Cavs 29-10 in the first period.

Hawkins had 15 points and 10 rebounds by the break, and Maryland's 15 second-chance points almost matched Virginia's total.

The Terrapins stretched their margin to 24 several times in the second half before Virginia rallied. A jumper by Franklin, two free throws by Moorer and a steal and layup by Moorer made it 57-46, inciting the crowd and prompting Frese to call timeout.

Hawkins steadied things with a jumper, and after Virginia missed, Alicia DeVaughn's putback rebuilt the lead to 61-46.

The Cavaliers lost 68-61 at College Park on Jan. 16, but quickly found themselves hoping just to get that close in the rematch

Tianna Hawkins scored 19 points, including the tiebreaking basket with 14 seconds left, and Maryland (No. 7 ESPN/USA Today, No. 8 AP) defeated fifth-ranked Duke 63-61 Sunday to end the Blue Devils' bid to go unbeaten in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Laurin Mincy had 17 points for the Terrapins (23-4, 10-4). Alyssa Thomas grabbed 12 rebounds and blocked a last-second shot by Haley Peters to secure the victory.

The game drew a crowd of 15,150, eighth-largest in school history. It was also the eighth-largest crowd to watch an ACC regular-season game.

Elizabeth Williams scored 19 points and Chelsea Gray had 16 for Duke (22-4, 13-1). After a three-point play by Hawkins gave Maryland a 61-59 lead with 43.6 seconds left, Gray tied it with a driving layup. Hawkins then followed a miss by Thomas with a putback, setting the stage for Duke's final possession.

The Blue Devils worked the ball to Peters in the left corner, but Thomas ran over and swatted the potential 3-point shot out of bounds as time expired.

Duke played its first game without sophomore guard Richa Jackson, who tore a ligament in her left knee on Wednesday and is lost for the season. The depleted Blue Devils got points from only four players in the first half and had just two finish in double figures.

Gray picked up her third foul with 18:49 left and promptly took a seat on the bench with Duke up 30-28. Maryland temporarily forged into the lead, but two straight baskets by Williams put Duke back in front. Soon after Gray returned, a three-point play by teammate Tricia Liston and a follow-shot by Williams made it 45-38 with just under 13 minutes to go.

Thomas then made two free throws and added a 3-pointer to begin a 15-5 spurt that put the Terrapins ahead 53-50 with 5:21 remaining. After Duke cut it to 55-54, Mincy popped a 3-pointer from the right corner before three straight foul shots by Williams got the Blue Devils within a point around the two-minute mark.

Allison Vernerey then hit a jumper to put Duke up 59-58 with 1:48 left, but that would be the Blue Devils' final lead.

Maryland trailed 29-28 at halftime despite getting off to a tough start, committing 14 turnovers and getting one point from Thomas, who missed all six of her shots from the floor.

The Terrapins, one of the nation's top rebounding teams, out rebounded the Blue Devils, 45-36 and grabbed 23 offensive boards to Duke's 16. Hawkins had nine boards - all were offensive.

Maryland made it clear quite early that this game against North Carolina wasn't going to be anything like the last one.

Alyssa Thomas had 20 points and 14 rebounds, and the sixth-ranked Terrapins established command soon after the opening tip in an 84-64 rout Friday night.

Alicia DeVaughn scored 14 and Laurin Mincy had 13 for the Terrapins, who never trailed after yielding the game's first point. Maryland led 11-1 after 4 minutes, 53-29 at halftime and 73-40 with 10 minutes to go.

Last month, Maryland needed overtime to squeeze out a 78-72 win at North Carolina. This time, the outcome was apparent almost immediately.

"We were really able to dominate right away," Terps coach Brenda Frese said. "I thought we came with the knockout punch early that they were never able to recover from."

The victory pushed the Terrapins into a third-place tie with Georgia Tech in the Atlantic Coast Conference, although Maryland (24-4, 11-4) gets the tiebreaker by virtue of its sweep of the Yellow Jackets. The top four teams receive a first-round bye in next week's ACC tournament.

After beating Duke and North Carolina in the span of six days, the Terrapins are riding a hot streak at just the right time.

"This is how you want to finish," Frese said. "You want to be peaking come March, and this is where this team is at."

Maryland went 8 for 10 from 3-point range and finished with a 49-32 rebounding advantage. It was the Terrapins' fourth straight win over UNC and sixth in seven games.

Chay Shegog scored 24 and Laura Broomfield had 13 rebounds for the Tar Heels (19-9, 9-6), who shot 33 percent and committed 14 turnovers.

Maryland held the Tar Heels to 25 percent shooting in taking a 24-point halftime lead. The Terrapins went 6 for 7 from beyond the arc after going 6 of 26 in their previous two games.

Not long after Maryland honored Lynetta Kizer, Anjale Barrett and Kim Rodgers on Senior Night, the Terrapins took control. After Broomfield opened the scoring with a free throw, Maryland rattled off 11 consecutive points, including a pair of 3s by Rodgers. The Tar Heels missed their first nine attempts from the field before Shegog hit a baseline jumper at the 14:24 mark.

The Terrapins then got points from six different players in a 12-3 spurt that made it 26-8. Minutes later, DeVaughn made successive layups in a 6-0 run that put North Carolina in a 34-13 hole.

Hatchell burned another timeout after Mincy canned a 3 for a 43-19 lead. At that point, UNC was 5 for 27 from the floor with six turnovers.

Alyssa Thomas scored 22 of her 24 points in the second half and added a career-high 17 rebounds, and No. 6 Maryland beat North Carolina State 65-50 on Sunday at Reynolds Coliseum.

Thomas finished two points shy of her scoring high and added a career-high four blocks to help the Terrapins (25-4, 12-4 Atlantic Coast Conference) win their fourth straight and seventh out of eight.

The Terps clinched the No. 3 seed in the ACC tournament that starts Thursday in Greensboro. They will play the winner of 6-seeded Virginia vs. 11-seeded Boston College at 8 p.m. Friday evening.

Laurin Mincy added 12 points for Maryland. The Terps never trailed and used a late 17-5 run to pull away and claim their seventh win in eight tries against the Wolfpack (16-14, 5-11).

The Terrapins, the league's best rebounding team, built a 55-36 advantage on the boards.

Thomas - who averages 16.7 points - was the only Maryland player to score during a 10 1/2-minute stretch of the second half, reeling off 16 consecutive points for her team.

N.C. State made it a three-point game three times in the second half, the last when Marissa Kastanek's drive across the lane pulled the Wolfpack within 46-43 with just under 10 minutes left.

But while N.C. State managed just two field goals the rest of the way, Thomas carried the Terrapins.

She knocked down a jumper through contact from Lakeesa Daniel with 8:57 left to spark a run of eight straight points during the decisive spurt. Kim Rodgers' 3 from the corner with 7 1/2 minutes to play stretched it back out to double figures at 54-43, and Mincy's free throw with 3:15 left made it 63-48.

No N.C. State player reached double figures, with leading scorer Kastanek - who averages 13 points - finishing with nine on 4-of-14 shooting. Senior Bonae Holston, who averages 12.4 points, had six on 3-of-14 shooting in her final game at Reynolds Coliseum.

Alyssa Thomas scored 18 points and No. 6 Maryland beat Virginia 70-58 on Friday night in an Atlantic Coast Conference quarterfinal. The Terrapins advance to their 22nd overall Semifinals appearance and seventh under head coach Brenda Frese.

Brene Moseley added 13 points and Tianna Hawkins had 10 rebounds for the third-seeded Terrapins (26-4), the highest-seeded team left after No. 5 Duke and No. 7 Miami were upset earlier in the day.

Maryland led by 26, shot 48 percent, built a 48-23 rebounding advantage, established an early 22-point lead following two big runs and cruised to their fifth straight win. The Terps advanced to a semifinal matchup Saturday against seventh-seeded Wake Forest.

Ariana Moorer scored 19 points and Lexie Gerson had 16 for sixth-seeded Virginia (22-10), which had its fourgame winning streak snapped and was denied its first semifinal appearance since 2008. The Cavaliers closed the game on a 20-6 run against the Terps' reserves.

Thomas, the ACC's player of the year, had her third straight game with at least 18 points, and she helped Maryland reach the semifinals for the first time since the 2009 team went on to claim the program's ninth ACC championship.

The Terps, who won both regular-season meetings with Virginia by an average of 12 points, capped an upset-filled day at the Greensboro Coliseum by restoring some semblance of order.


They trailed for all of 16 seconds of this one and erased that brief deficit by reeling off 14 straight points to give themselves a comfortable working margin.

Thomas started their 14-0 burst with a layup that put Maryland up 10-9, and added a jumper in the lane before Anjale Barrett's 3 from the corner made it 22-9 with just under 10 minutes left before the break.

Maryland then put together an 11-0 run during the final 4 minutes of the half, with Laurin Mincy's free throw making it a 20-point game for the first time and Hawkins' layup in traffic making it 40-18 with 20 seconds left before the break.

Moorer gave the Cavaliers their only lead when she hit a 3-pointer 5 1/2 minutes in to make it 9-8. Virginia managed just one field goal during the 9 minutes that followed while Maryland first reclaimed its lead, then stretched it well into double figures.

Brenda Frese didn't like the way her Maryland team struggled to keep determined Wake Forest off the boards or how the Demon Deacons were the aggressors through the first half.

She had a simple message at halftime for her team: Start rebounding or get on the bus to go home from the Atlantic Coast Conference tournament.

The sixth-ranked Terrapins answered their coach's challenge, nearly doubling Wake Forest's total on the glass in the second half on the way to a 73-58 win in Saturday's semifinals

Alyssa Thomas had 18 points and 12 rebounds for the third-seeded Terrapins (27-4), who shot 53 percent. But it wasn't until Frese saw her team play tougher that the Terps took control and earned another trip to the championship game.

"I like the fact that we were able to keep our composure," Frese said. "I thought specifically in the second half, we were really able to get back to playing how we play: We were able to defend, we were able to get on the glass and make plays. We shared the basketball."

Maryland advanced to Sunday's championship game for the third time in seven years and the first since winning the 2009 title. Maryland will face No. 15 Georgia Tech, the tournament's fourth seed who rolled past North Carolina State in Saturday's first semifinal, at 2 p.m. Maryland can become the first ACC team to win 10 tournament titles by beating the Yellow Jackets for a third time this season.

Thomas, named ACC Player of the Year on Thursday, went 7 for 18 from the field and scored 13 points in the first half to help the Terps take a 33-27 lead at the break. Then Tianna Hawkins scored two baskets to push the lead to 37-27 with 18:34 left, putting the Demon Deacons in catch-up mode the rest of the afternoon.

Maryland turned a 21-20 halftime edge on the boards at halftime into a 47-34 rebounding advantage by the end of the game. The Terrapins also scored 10 of their 15 second-chance points in the second half. "Like (Frese) said, we don't want to go home," Thomas said. "We knew the importance of possessions and getting second opportunities. We just fought as hard as we could."

So did the seventh-seeded Demon Deacons (19-13), who upset No. 7 Miami in Friday's quarterfinals. That pushed Wake Forest into the semifinals for the first time since 1988 and the third time ever, but the Demon Deacons shot 30 percent and couldn't re-create any of the magic from their big win against the second-seeded Hurricanes.

Wake Forest never got closer than five in the second half, as the Terrapins stretched their lead to 16 with about 8 minutes left.

Chelsea Douglas scored 14 points to lead the Demon Deacons.

Alyssa Thomas scored a career-high 29 points and No. 6 Maryland beat No. 15 Georgia Tech 68-65 on Sunday to win the Atlantic Coast Conference tournament championshin

Lynetta Kizer had 11 points and Kim Rodgers added 10 to help the third-seeded Terrapins (28-4) claim their 10th ACC tournament title and second in four years.

Thomas scored 13 of her points in the first half, went 5-5 at the foul line, grabbed four boards and added a block and a steal.

"Alyssa is by far the most competitive player I've ever coached and I've coached a lot of great players," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "Her will to win - our team just wants to follow her lead, and she was sensational."

Tyaunna Marshall scored 18 of her 25 points in the second half and Sasha Goodlett added 20 points for the fourth-seeded Yellow Jackets (24-8), who were denied their first league tournament title.

The Terrapins led through much of the first half, but a quick Georgia Tech run and three at the halftime buzzer left the Terps with a 29-27 lead at the break.

Maryland trailed by four at 44-40 with just over 12 minutes to play, but two free throws from Rodgers cut it two. After a made free throw by Tech's Chelsea Regins, Thomas rebounded her miss and DeVaughn made a free throw to cut it to two once again. Rodgers stepped up and made two more free throws on the next possession to tie it.

The Terrapins trailed by two with 2:05 to go but a jumper from Kizer at 1:42 tied it at 63. Georgia Tech turned it over on the next possession and a layup by Anjale Barrett gave Maryland a 65-63 lead with just over a minutes to go.

Thomas sunk two free throws and Barrett added one in the final minute to seal the second title under Frese.

Down by three, Georgia Tech called time with 5.6 seconds left and got the ball to Marshall, whose contested 22-footer failed to hit the rim as the buzzer sounded.

Alyssa Thomas was the best player on her home floor, a big reason why second-seeded Maryland was able to get past in-state foe Navy.

Thomas had 17 points and 10 rebounds, and the Terrapins used a strong second half to beat the 15th-seeded Midshipmen 59-44 Saturday in the first round of the NCAA women's tournament.

Laurin Mincy scored 14 for Maryland (29-4), which will next play Monday night against the winner of the Louisville-Michigan State game at 7 p.m. in Comcast Center.

Thomas, a 6-foot-2 sophomore, scored 12 points in the second half on 5-for-7 shooting. Along the way, she became the 27th player in the history of the program to break the 1,000-point mark. She is the second-fastest Terrapin to reach the landmark. She needed only 63 games, while Crystal Langberre did it in 60.

The Terrapins led 31-23 before Thomas fueled a 14-4 run at the outset of the second half to up the margin to 15. Minutes later, she scored six points in an 8-0 spree that made it 57-36 with 6:30 to go.

It was Maryland's 20th trip to the NCAA tournament and Navy's second. The difference between the teams, however, transcended postseason experience.

Navy, the Patriot League champion, simply didn't have enough height or talent to compete with the Terrapins, who finished with a 46-33 rebounding advantage. Jade Geif led Navy (18-14) with 14 points. The Midshipmen shot 30.5 percent and took only two free throws.

Audrey Bauer went 2 for 15 from the floor and missed eight of nine attempts from beyond the 3-point arc.

Using a 27-14 rebounding advantage in the first half, Maryland led 31-23 at the break.

Senior Kim Rodgers drilled a 3-pointer for a 20-17 lead in the first. After Navy misfired on the other end Rodgers again connected from beyond the arc, and Brene Moseley added another to make it 26-17.

The Terrapins trailed 64-59 with 6 minutes left before closing with a 13-4 run and limiting Louisville to only one field goal.

Maryland (30-4) will face the winner of Monday night's late game between defending champion Texas A&M and Arkansas Sunday at noon or 2:30 p.m. in Raleigh, N.C.

Shoni Schimmel scored 22 and Shawnta' Dyer had 17 for the Cardinals (23-10). Louisville had a chance to tie in the closing seconds before Mincy blocked a shot by Becky Burke. Burke, who came in averaging 11.7 points, finished with five

Hawkins scored 13 of her 15 in the second half and grabbed a career-high six steals. Lynetta Kizer scored five of her seven down the stretch as well. Mincy went 10-for-13 from the free throw line and added seven rebounds.

The Terps won the battle on the glass, 41-35. Both teams committed 16 turnovers, but Maryland scored 22 points off the Cardinals' giveaways to Louisville's 13.

Head coach Brenda Frese and the Terps have won their last nine straight games and 12 of their last 13 heading into Sunday's game.

The Terrapins are 30-18 (.625) all-time in NCAA Tournament games. Frese owns an NCAA Tournament record of 19-7 (.731) and 18-6 (.750) at Maryland. Frese has led the Terps to four Sweet Sixteens, three Elite Eights and the 2006 national championship.



Brenda FRESE

308-115 (13th year)/251-85 (10th year at Maryland)

There was no better fit for the University of Maryland women's basketball program than head coach Brenda Frese. The 2002 Associated Press (AP) National Coach of the Year arrived in College Park with great expectations and has not disappointed. Reviving a once-prominent women's basketball program back to the national stage, her high work rate and positive attitude has resulted in two ACC titles, eight-straight top-15 recruiting classes and a National Championship in 2006. Frese has balanced that strong work ethic with a fun and family-friendly environment, also becoming a wife and a mother of twin boys, giving birth to them in the midst of one of the most successful seasons in the program's history. With the birth of her twins in February of 2008, she becomes one of only six coaches to win a national championship and be a parent.

Now in her 10th season at Maryland, Frese has guided Maryland to a National Championship in 2006, nine winning seasons, eight-straight 20-win seasons, four 30-win campaigns and eight trips to the NCAA Tournament. She signed a four-year extension in August 2011.

In 2006-07, Maryland also received its first-ever No. 1 preseason national ranking, remaining in the top spot in the polls for 10-consecutive weeks.

"This has been an incredible journey and winning the national championship in 2006 was just the beginning," Frese said. "My coaching staff and I had the belief we could win a national championship here at Maryland. With all the administrative support, the first-class facilities - we knew we could build something great. We did not set any timetables, but what we have achieved so far ... it's beyond expectations."


Former Athletics Director Deborah A. Yow courted the 2002 AP National Coach of the Year because of Frese's reputation for making amazing turnarounds and her relentless work ethic in recruiting. Described as dynamic, overachieving, determined and enthusiastic, the 41-year old coach is one of college basketball's rising stars. Standing atop the podium in Boston in 2006, Frese became the fifth-youngest coach (age 35) in NCAA history to win a national title and only the ninth to win in her first trip to the Final Four.

Frese has built the team's success around recruiting, hard work and a positive atmosphere. The instant she arrived on campus, she determinedly worked the recruiting trails in an effort to reclaim the elite status Maryland once had in the 1980s. Success came quickly and early. Before she even coached a game in the newly-constructed Comcast Center, she received commitments from a pair of high school All-Americans, including Shay Doron, who went on to become a three-time All-ACC pick and a WNBA Draft selection. In all, 25 high school All-Americans have donned a Maryland uniform under Frese's reign.

10 of Frese's recruiting classes have been ranked in the top-15, including eight rated in the top-10 and five in the top five. The landmark signings of Crystal Langhorne, Laura Harper, Jade Perry and Ashleigh Newman were rated No. 2 in the country, while the class of Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver was ranked No. 4 - the core of the Terps' national championship team. Her 2010 batch of Terrapins included three high school All-Americans and a No. 2 national ranking.

Frese's recruiting classes have lived up to their billing and her pupils have earned numerous accolades. The first Terp in 17 years to garner All-American nods in 2006, Langhorne was a three-time AP and USBWA All-American, the program's first multiple All-American. She was selected a WBCA All-American in 2007, the first in school history since 1989, and then again received the accolade in 2008.

Toliver repeated Langhorne's AP, WBCA and USBWA All-American "trifecta" in 2008. The legendary point guard, however, became the first Terp in school history to be named to the AP's All-America First Team as a senior in 2009 - to



Frese's players have also received numerous ACC honors. Most recently, sophomore Alyssa Thomas was named ACC Player of the Year in 2012. She is just the second sophomore in the history of ACC women's basketball to earn the league's most prestigious honor and went on to win the ACC Tournament MVP honor that year. In her final season, Langhorne was selected the ACC's Player of the Year, the first Terp to win the award in nearly 20 years. Toliver followed suit in 2009 - the third Terp ever to win the award. In 2005, Langhorne became the program's first ACC Rookie of the Year since 1991. Coleman followed in her footsteps by nabbing the honor during the Terps' championship campaign in 2006. Center Lynetta Kizer and Thomas made it four Terps in six years to be named the league's top freshman when they won in 2009 and 2011.

In all, 26 Terps have received All-ACC citations in Frese's 10 years, including a school-record four in 2008 when Langhorne, Coleman, Toliver and Harper were selected and in 2012 when Thomas, Tianna Hawkins, Laurin Mincy and Lynetta Kizer were honored. Five Terps have been First Team ACC selections eight times in Frese's tenure. Langhorne became Maryland's first three-time, first team all-conference selection and the Langhorne as the lone Terps to ever be selected to an All-ACC team four times, stamping her three second-team honors with a first-team selection in 2009. In fact, of Maryland's five players all-time to be selected All-ACC three times or more, four of them were recruited by Frese (Doron, Langhorne, Coleman, Toliver).

Doron was the first freshman in school history to be named All-ACC in 2004 (third team). Langhorne was the highest-honored freshman in the program, garnering second team honors in 2005. Thomas was the first to make the second team since Coleman in 2006.

Numerous Terps have also garnered national recognition under Frese. Toliver became the first Terrapin to earn the highest point guard honor in the country, winning the Nancy Leiberman Award in 2008, after being a finalist the previous year. Several have earned spots on national player of the year candidate lists, making history in the fall of 2006. That year, for the first time ever, four players from the same team were selected preseason candidates for the WBCA's prestigious Wade Trophy when Doron, Coleman, Langhorne and Toliver were put on the Watch List. All five starters were tabbed preseason honorees for the Naismith Award, also a first in the history of the award.

Maryland has rewritten several records over the last eight seasons. In 2007-08, the Terps became the first team in NCAA history to have four active players with at least 1,000 points on the same roster. That year, school records were broken for most home wins (21), which is also believed to be an NCAA record. The team

opened the 2006-07 campaign winning 18-straight games, setting the program record for best start to a season. Maryland ended the 2008-09 campaign having won a school-record 36-straight home games, thanks to undefeated home marks in two successive seasons, and 40-consecutive non-conference games at the Comcast Center. In the 2009-10 season the Terrapins extended that streak to 48, a Maryland men's and women's basketball record.

In 2005-06, the team's 34 wins set a school record, shattering the previous mark of 29. The championship squad also set new standards for highest road winning percentage (.900), points (3,166), field goal attempts (2,363), 3-point field goals (216), 3-point attempts (540), free throws (690), free throw attempts (924), team free throw percentage (.747), rebounds (1,720) and blocked shots (195).

Numerous individual records have also fallen in recent years. Among the most notable are the career scoring and rebounding records, which Langhorne shattered, becoming the first-ever Terrapin to score 2,000 points and to grab 1,000 rebounds - an elite list of which Coleman later joined. Frese recruits own four of the top-five career scoring marks in Maryland history, including Nos. 1-3 in Langhorne, Coleman and Toliver - the only three players in Terp annals with 2,000-plus points.

Maryland's rise into the upper-echelon of, not only the ACC, but in the country, has bolstered the excitement surrounding the team. Over the last ten years, the program has ranked in the top-25 in the nation in attendance, including top-10 rankings in four of the last eight seasons. In 2007, Maryland recorded the nation's largest one-season improvement in home attendance, averaging 9,533 fans in 16 games, almost double the average from the previous season (4,183) - with more than 150,000 people making their way through the Comcast Center turnstiles, a schoolrecord. By the end of the '07 campaign, the Terps were sixth in the nation in average attendance and fourth in overall attendance, as 241,280 spectators filled the stands at home and on the road to watch the Terps play in 34 games. In 2008, Maryland hosted over 160,000 fans in 21 games and was ranked eighth in the nation in average attendance that year, followed by a No. 6 ranking in 2009 (133,336 in 15 games).

One of the highlights of the 2006-07 campaign was the announcement of two sellout games in Comcast Center, the first- and second-ever in the young facility. The stands were filled to capacity when the Terps hosted North Carolina on Jan. 28, 2007, breaking the ACC's single-game record, the first women's basketball sellout since 1992. The record was matched in the regular-season finale on Feb. 18, 2007, when Duke came to College Park.

Maryland owns all 10 of the conference's top-10 single-game attendances, nine coming since Frese has roamed the sidelines, and the top-10 highest-attended ACC games in league history have come in College

In the classroom, the Terps have also been allstar students. 23 of Frese's Terps have been named to the ACC Honor Roll, while five have received Academic All-American nods by ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA.


Tina LANGLEY

Associate Head Coach • 4th year • West Alabama '96

Tina Langley is in her fourth season at the University of Maryland and 13th in coaching overall. She was promoted to associate head coach in the summer of 2011.

Langley made an instant impact her first season with the Terps. She served a crucial role in helping to lead the Terps to their first ACC Championship in 20 seasons and helped secure one of the nation's top recruiting classes for 2010. In her four seasons in College Park, she's helped lead the Terps to ACC titles in 2009 and 2012.

As Coach Frese's top assistant, Langley's responsibilities include coordinating the Terps' recruiting efforts, assisting in player development, scouting, and on the court coaching.



In addition to her passion, determination, and work ethic, Langley has significant coaching experience. Prior to arriving in College Park in 2008, she had coaching stints at Toledo, Clemson and Georgia. She has been instrumental in recruiting, game preparation and floor management in each of her stops.

Langley spent five seasons at the University of Toledo, beginning her coaching career with the Rockets as a graduate assistant coach in 1998-99, before moving up to recruiting coordinator and eventual associate head coach during the 2002-03 campaign. She helped the Rockets reach the postseason three times, including two NCAA Tournament appearances. During her tenure, Toledo also won three Mid-American Conference regular season titles (1999, 2001, 2003) and two conference tournament crowns (1999 and 2001).

Toledo, Langley was responsible for all facets of the program, including recruiting, scouting of opponents and coordinating the team's academic efforts. She helped to sign two nationally ranked classes, the Rockets accumulated a 101-38 record (.679) during her time, and the team's grade point average was ranked in the top 10 in the nation three times. On the floor, she worked directly with players who went on to be selected the team's Most Improved Player in 2001, 2002 and 2003.

Langley then joined the women's basketball staff at Clemson in 2003, under legendary head coach Jim Davis. In her two years with the Tigers, the team advanced to the 2004 Women's National Invitational Tournament (WNIT) while also orchestrating a CU-record six-signee class, which was ranked in the top 30 nationally in just her first season.

After her stop at Clemson, Langley was hired at the University of Georgia as the recruiting coordinator. Langley left coaching for a couple years and earned her second master's in Community Counseling from the University of Alabama, specializing in college mental health. She was named the Most Outstanding Graduate Student in 2008.

Langley played basketball and volleyball for two seasons at Bevill State Junior College before transferring to the University of West Alabama, where she lettered twice in basketball as a guard/forward. She graduated from UWA with a degree in special education in 1996, and earned her first master's degree in Recreation and Leisure with an emphasis in recreation administration from the University of Toledo. Langley resides in Laurel, Md.

Marlin CHINN

Assistant Coach • 3rd year • Hampton '92

Marlin Chinn joined Brenda Frese's coaching staff in June 2009 following a successful four-year stint at Seton Hall, where he spent the last three seasons as the Pirates' top assistant and recruiting coordinator.

Chinn helped lead the Terrapins to their 10th ACC title in 2012.

"We have always been about family first here at Maryland and it's pretty special to bring Marlin back home," Frese said. "This is where he wants to be and he already knows why Maryland is an



incredible place. As we got to know each other, we quickly found Marlin shares common traits with us - loyalty, work ethic, care and concern for people and he is a tremendous recruiter. We feel as though Marlin will help us continue to set the bar high for excellence here at Maryland. We're excited to welcome him to our family."

In Chinn's second season on Phyllis Mangina's staff at Seton Hall, the Pirates posted their first winning record in Big East play in six years en route to a 13-win improvement from the previous season. During his tenure at Seton Hall, Chinn helped secure a top-30 national recruiting class in 2007, recruited a pair of All-Big East Rookie Team selections as well as recruiting and coaching two All-Big East performers.

The Archbishop Carroll High School alum previously spent seven seasons at Mount St. Mary's from 1998-2005, serving as top assistant for The Mount. There, he recruited five Northeast Conference All-Rookie Team choices, including the 2005 NEC Rookie of the Year. Chinn helped lead Mount St. Mary's to a pair of NEC regular-season titles in 1999 and 2001.

Prior to landing on the college scene, Chinn served as assistant men's high school coach locally at Theodore Roosevelt High School (1997-98) and Archbishop Carroll High School (1994-97).

Chinn is a member of both the Black Coaches Association (BCA) and the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA). He was recently selected into the 2007 BCA Achieving Coaching Excellence (ACE) for ethnic minority male and female basketball coach's class.

In spring 2011, Chinn served on a panel of the nation's top assistants at the A Step Up: Chicago 2011 event.

A 1992 graduate of Hampton University, Chinn is familiar with the area and is a native of Washington, D.C. Chinn graduated from Hampton with a B.S. in accounting. Chinn served as president of the National Association of Black Accountants in 1992. Chinn currently resides in Largo, Md.

David ADKINS

Assistant Coach • 3rd year • Radford '89

David Adkins is in his third season at Maryland, joining the Terrapins in June 2009 after a successful career in the high school ranks working with some of the best players in the country. He has helped more than 50 players earn college scholarships, including 41 Division I scholarships.

Adkins helped lead the Terrapins to their 10th ACC title in 2012.

"David Adkins is one of the most highlyregarded player-development coaches in all of basketball and we are incredibly fortunate to have gained his services," Maryland head



coach Brenda Frese said. "I first got to know David through (former Terrapin) Marissa Coleman and (former Maryland men's basketball player) Greivis Vasquez, who rave about him. He's been a big part of some incredible basketball programs and he brings tremendous energy and knowledge."

Adkins joined the Terrapins after spending 17 years as a high school assistant coach, but his coaching laurels reach far beyond the prep ranks.

Widely known in basketball circles as an elite developer of talent, Adkins has helped ripen the games of two NBA players and trained many more, two McDonald's All-Americans, three Jordan All-Americans, three Maryland Gatorade Players of the Year, four Parade All-Americans and three Washington Post Players of the Year during his time teaching the game as a high school assistant, camp counselor and in private workouts. Additionally, Adkins has trained several high-profile European professionals, including former Maryland standout Nik Caner-Medley.

Over the course of his career, he has helped ripen the games of three NBA players and many Division I athletes such as Kevin Durant (Oklahoma City Thunder), Linas Kleiza (Toronto Raptors), Greivis Vasquez (Memphis Grizzlies), Austin Freeman (Georgetown), Jeff Peterson (Arkansas) and Jerai Grant (Clemson).

Adkins, a 1989 graduate of Radford University, also served as an assistant coach for Team USA at the 2006 19-U Nike World Championships and during the 2007 Capital Classic in College Park.

He most recently coached for three years at legendary high school power DeMatha Catholic in Hyattsville, Md., helping the Stags claim two conference titles and two city titles while compiling a record of 83-20. Prior to his stint at DeMatha, Adkins spent seven seasons as an assistant at nationally-acclaimed Montrose Christian High School in Rockville, Md. During his tenure, Montrose Christian was ranked No. 1 in The Washington Post final poll in 2003, 2005 and 2006 where it finished in the USA Today Top-10 each of those years.

In total, Montrose Christian finished in the top-25 of the USA Today poll in five of Adkins' seven seasons at the school.

Adkins' camp experience includes the Nike All-Asia Camp in Beijing (counselor), the Nike Basketball Power Factory Tryout and Training Camp in Beijing (coach), the Five Star Basketball Camp in Caloforte, Italy (camp director), the Chris Paul Elite Backcourt Camp, the Snow Valley Basketball Camp, the Nike All-American Camp (coach) and the Nike Hoop Jamboree Camp (coach).

Adkins resides in Ashburn, Va., with his wife, Janet, and two daughters Ryland and Camryn. Ryland is a sophomore at Maryland and is a manager for the women's basketball team.

Chris CAMPBELL

Director of Operations • 2nd year • Duke '96

Maryland women's basketball head coach Brenda Frese welcomed Chris Campbell as the new Director of Operations in the summer of 2010. Campbell was an assistant coach at University of Delaware from 2008-10 and is a Maryland native.

"We feel very fortunate to have someone of Chris' caliber," said Frese. "He's very bright and really brings a lot to our program. His local ties are a bonus; he's another member of our staff that brings even more people into supporting our program."



While at Delaware, Campbell assisted head coach Tina Martin in recruiting, game plan preparation, practice plans, video and academic performance. He has earned a reputation as a tireless worker and is well-versed in all aspects of the game. Campbell played a key part in Delaware's outstanding 2009-10 season that saw the Blue Hens post a record of 21-12, advance to the Colonial Athletic Association, and earn a spot in the Women's National Invitation Tournament. Delaware was led by the play of freshman Elena Delle Donne who became the first UD women's player to earn All-American honors while also garnering CAA Player and Rookie of the Year honors.

Born in Mt. Kisco, N.Y. and raised in Potomac, Md., Campbell was the top assistant at Marymount University in his three seasons there under 25-year head coach Bill Finney and served as the team's recruiting coordinator. He helped lead the Saints to a three-year record of 61-25 and NCAA Division III Tournament appearances in 2006 and 2008.

Marymount, based in Arlington, Va., went 20-9 and advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 2006, posted an 18-10 mark in 2007, and a 23-6 record in 2008 when the team returned to the NCAA Tournament. Marymount has captured 10 CAC titles during Finney's tenure.

While at Marymount, Campbell helped coach four All-CAC players. In addition into his duties with the basketball team, he also served as head men's golf coach for two seasons, leading the squad to a fourth place finish at the CAC Championships this past spring.

Campbell began his college coaching career at Catholic University in Washington, D.C. where he served as an assistant women's basketball coach in 2004-05 under head coach Maggie Lonergan. He helped lead the Cardinals to a share of the CAC regular season title and a berth in the league tournament semifinals. The team won a school-record 14 straight games.

He also coached at his alma mater, Winston Churchill High School, from 1998-2004 and was part of the Bulldogs' back-to-back state championships in 2002 and 2003. Campbell earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Biology from Duke University in 1996.

While he was a student at Churchill, he was a member of the golf team. He spent seven years on the staff of Young Life and later worked for four years in the Montgomery County (MD) Public School System
