THE TERPS

Maryland's new home for Terrapin Athletics was completed in the fall of 2002, and has already provided three seasons of topped attendance records and memories on the hardwood. Comcast Center provides a seating capacity of 17,950 fans for basketball, and serves as a campus site for university special events and select community events.

The Terrapins' first public basketball event was its 2002 Midnight Madness celebration, which has grown to one of the premiere student events of the academic year. The women's basketball team holds the honor of playing the first-official game in Comcast Center, an 80-72 victory over Loyola on Nov. 22, 2002, also the first game of the Brenda Frese era.

Since its first season, attendance has increased at women's basketball games, including the 2004-05 season when the school's all-time attendance record was shattered as 71,087 fans attended 17 games, 33,000 more than the previous year.

Comcast Center is also the site of two of the top three largest crowds in ACC women's basketball history. The Terps set the conference's women's basketball single-game record drawing 17,243 fans to their game versus Duke on Feb. 13, 2005. In the previous season, the Terps also had 13,446 fans in the stands on Feb. 22, 2004, the third-largest crowd in ACC women's basketball history. It's per game average of 4,182 fans in 17 games in 2004-05 is also a school record. In each of the three seasons the Terps have played in their new home, they have improved in attendance, cracking the top 25 in 2004-05, for the 24th-best average attendance in the nation.

Comcast Center also houses the university's athletics administration offices and includes a 7,000-square-foot Academic Support Center, providing an enhanced study atmosphere for the school's near-750 student-athletes on 27 teams. An additional 1,500-seat gymnasium serves as home to the Terps' volleyball, gymnastics, and wrestling teams, Nextel Heritage Hall multi-purpose room is equipped to host banquets, press conferences, meetings and serve as a pre-game restaurant suite overlooking the competition arena and 20 suites provide enhanced viewing and entertainment capabilities for Maryland fans.

Comcast Center is an excellent place for alumni and fans to enjoy their favorite sports and share in their common Terrapin spirit. Visitors can learn about the men and women who have forged the Maryland Athletics program among the nation's elite as they stroll through the Terrapin Walk of Fame and History. The Terrapin Team Store, located just off the soaring three-level atrium lobby, allows visitors to outfit their pride. Maryland has once again reclaimed the status of having the best student activities center and basketball arena in the country.
