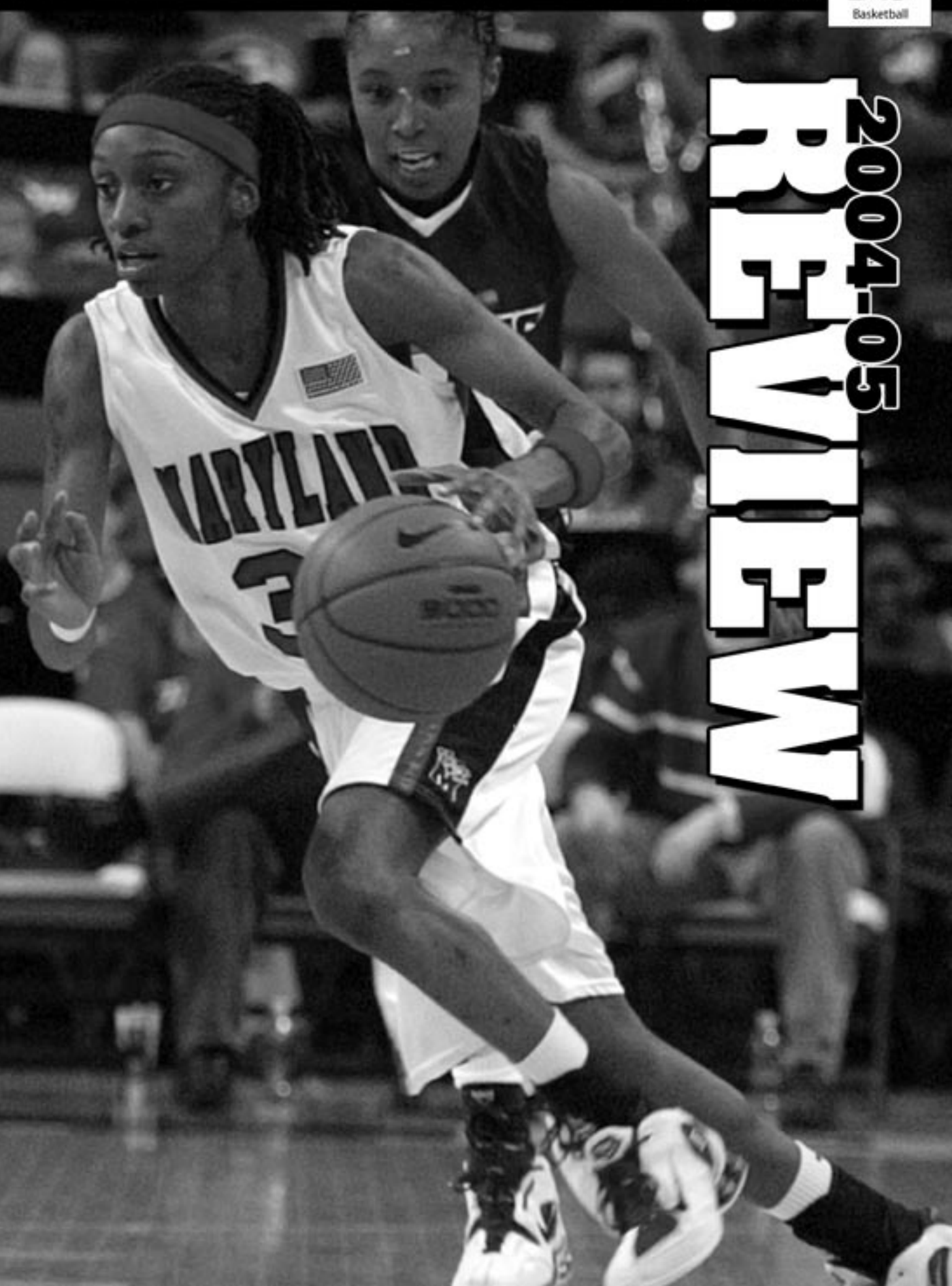

REVIEW NOTEBOOK

TERPS REACH NCAA SECOND ROUND FOR THE SECOND-STRAIGHT YEAR

For the first time since 1989 and 1990, Maryland advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament in back-to-back years. The seventh-seeded Terps defeated 10th-seeded and 24th-ranked UW-Green Bay, 65-55, in the first round to advance.

Maryland's berth into the 2005 NCAA Tournament marked the first time since 1992 and 1993 the Terps have played in the postseason event in consecutive years.

TERPS HOST NCAA TOURNAMENT

In July 2004, Comcast Center was selected as one of eight predetermined sites for the first and second rounds of the NCAA Tournament. College Park has been host to the tournament eight times and is the only school in the state to ever host an NCAA Women's Basketball Division I Tournament game. However, it was the first time the Comcast Center has hosted an NCAA Tournament game.

Prior to the 2005 tournament, it had been 12 years since a NCAA Tournament game had been played in College Park. In 2005, second-seeded Ohio State, 10th-seeded UW-Green Bay and 15th-seeded Holy Cross were sent to Comcast Center to play their first and second-round contests, with each team looking to move on to the Philadelphia Regional. With the tournament format having changed to eight sites and 16 teams at each venue, No. 4 Penn State, No. 5 DePaul, No. 12 Virginia Tech and No. 13 Liberty from the Chattanooga Regional also played at Comcast Center to open their tournament action.

TERPS WIN 20 GAMES

With its 66-55 win over Clemson in the first round of the ACC Tournament, the Terps captured its 20th-win of the season, the first time since 1992-93 Maryland had reached the 20-win plateau. The Terrapins went on to upset No. 19/21 NC State in the semifinals (63-56), then topped No. 24/21 UW-Green Bay (65-55) in the first round of the NCAA Tournament for 22 victories, the most in 12 years.

TERPS 24TH IN FINAL COACHES POLL

For the first time in 12 years, Maryland was ranked in the final ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll, earning a No. 24 rating. The Terps ended the season with a No. 7 seeding in the NCAA Tournament, reaching the second round for the second-straight year, while also posting wins over No. 19/21 NC State in the ACC Tournament and No. 24/21 UW-Green Bay.

Maryland had been ranked in the Coaches Poll for 16-consecutive weeks, earning a No. 16 ranking on January 16, its highest of the season and the highest since 1992-93.

TERPS ACHIEVE HIGHEST RANKING IN 12 YEARS

After upsetting its first top-five opponent since 1992-93 when it defeated North Carolina, Maryland made the second-largest leap in the *Associated Press* poll the week of Jan. 10, jumping six spots from No. 21 to No. 15, the team's highest rating since earning a No. 11 final ranking in 1993.

LANGHORNE ACC ROOKIE OF THE YEAR; TWO EARN ALL-ACC NODS

Earning 64 of 74 votes, Maryland's Crystal Langhorne was named the 2005 ACC Rookie of the Year, the fourth Terrapin in school history to win the award and the first since 1991. Langhorne, who was the only player in the ACC to average a double-double, led the ACC in rebounding with 10.6 boards a game, also the third-highest season average in school history. She also finished the season sixth in the ACC in scoring with just over 17 points per game. Tabbed the ACC's Preseason Rookie of the Year, she also led the conference and was sixth in the nation with 18 double-doubles.

Langhorne was also voted second team All-ACC, becoming the highest honored rookie Terrapin in school history. Breaking the school freshman class record for points and rebounds, she also earned 43 first-team votes, the most for any league freshman. Teammate Shay Doron was named first team all-conference, the first Terrapin to earn the honor since 1994. Third in the ACC in scoring, she also ranked in the top 15 in three other categories. Both Doron and Langhorne scored over 500 points each during the 2004-05 campaign, the first time since the 1988-89 season two Terps were over 500 points in the same year.

The two All-ACC selections for Maryland are the most since 2000.



DORON NAMED KODAK ALL-REGION

Shay Doron added to her list of postseason accolades, earning a spot on the Kodak/WBCA Region II All-American Team. The ninth player in school history to be named regional All-American, she is the first player in 12 years to earn the award and only the second sophomore in school history.

Doron, who was eventually named KODAK/WBCA Honorable Mention All-American, was third in the ACC in scoring and also ranked in the top 15 in the conference in free throw percentage, assists and steals. At Florida State, Doron tallied 39 points, tying the single-game school record, five days after leading the Terps to a big upset over then-No. 5/4 North Carolina, 92-77, netting 37 points.

Doron's 562 points on the season is the fifth-highest, single-season scoring output in school history. She also broke Maryland's season free throw mark for the second-consecutive year, netting 145.

SMITH A FINALIST FOR TOP POINT GUARD

Anesia Smith was selected a finalist for the Nancy Lieberman Award, given to the nation's top point guard. Smith dished out more assists in her senior season than her first three years, combined. Her 214 assists on the year are the third most in school history. She was fifth in the nation and first in the ACC with 6.7 assists per game. Her 1.98 assist-to-turnover ratio was also the best in the league.

FRESE TALLIES 100TH VICTORY

On Feb. 3, 2005 vs. Georgia Tech, the Terps handed Maryland head coach Brenda Frese her 100th-career victory.

A six-year head coaching veteran, Frese, who just completed her third season at the Terrapin helm, won her first game as a head coach at Ball State in 1999.

With the Terps win over UW-Green Bay in the first round of the NCAA Tournament, Frese also notched her 50th victory as head coach of the Terps.

TERPS SET ATTENDANCE RECORDS

Terp fans set a new school record as over 71,000 spectators attended 17 home game last season, over 32,000 more fans than the previous mark which was set in 2003-04.

Maryland also recorded the largest women's basketball crowd in ACC history and the eighth-largest in the nation in 2004-05 when 17,243 fans witnessed the Terrapins take on Duke on Feb. 13, 2005. The figure topped the previous record of 14,500 which Maryland also held. The Terps now hold the top three ACC attendance records of all time.

TERPS TOPPLE HEELS

Maryland recorded its first victory over a top-five team since 1992-93 when it defeated then-No. 5/4 North Carolina, 92-77, on Jan. 9, 2005, at Comcast Center. The defeat was one of only five on the season for eventual ACC Champion UNC, and the only double-digit setback.

The Terps defeated three ranked squads in 2004-05, the most victories over ranked teams since the 2000-01 campaign.

GAME 1

#24/24 MARYLAND 94 APPALACHIAN STATE 74 NOVEMBER 19, 2004 HOLMES CENTER

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The No. 24-ranked Maryland women's basketball team opened the 2004-05 season with a 94-74 win at Appalachian State. All five starters scored in double figures with freshman Crystal Langhorne netting 25 points and seven rebounds to lead the team.

The Terps (1-0) shot 61.9 percent from the field, including 67.9 percent in the second half, to win their sixth-consecutive season opener. Making her Maryland debut, Langhorne was 11-for-14 from the field, en route to team-high 25 points and 16 rebounds from the field and 2-for-3 from behind the three-point arc.

With Maryland holding onto a 10-8 lead with 15:37 on the clock, the Terps went on an 11-2 run over a three-minute span, capped by a Doron three-pointer at the 12:24 mark, to widen its lead to 11 at 21-10.

Appalachian State came to within three points at 21-18 with 10:30 remaining in the opening frame, but Maryland opened up a 47-27 halftime lead, as Langhorne tallied nine of her 13 first-half points to put help put the Terps out in front.

The Terps led by as many as 26 points early in the second half, but ASU started to get hot from the floor, slicing a 55-29 Maryland lead to a 69-61 advantage with 8:11 remaining in the contest when Whitney Tossie converted the lay-up after a steal.

The Mountaineers' Lindsay Smith scored 17 of her game-high 28 points during that key 10-minute stretch, including three treys and a key four-point play from the right baseline.

Doron's three-pointer from the top of the key immediately following a Maryland timeout with 8:11 remaining in the game started a 23-4 run, pushing the Terps' lead to 92-65 to put the game out of reach.

Also in double-digits for Maryland were sophomore Kalika France with 14 and freshman Laura Harper, who had 12 in her collegiate debut. Senior Anesia Smith was an assist shy of a double-double, tallying 10 points and dishing out nine assists, tying her career high.

The 891 fans in attendance marked the highest attendance figure for a women's basketball game in the Holmes Center.

#24/24 MARYLAND 73 SIENA 52 NOVEMBER 21, 2004 COMCAST CENTER

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Sophomore Shay Doron scored 21 points to lead the No. 24/24 Maryland women's basketball team to a 73-52 win over Siena in the team's home opener. Freshman Laura Harper posted her first-career double-double as the Terps move to 2-0 on the season.

After a three-pointer from Katelyn Dooley gave the Saints a 3-2 lead, a Kalika France fastbreak layup gave the advantage back to the Terps who never looked back.

The Terrapins could not shake Siena (0-1) who were close behind for much of the game. A pair of free throws from Dooley tied the ball game at 10-10, but Maryland's 17-5 run, capped by another France layup with 5:43 to go in the half, put it ahead, 27-15. Senior Anesia Smith's free throws at 2:31 gave Maryland its biggest advantage of the half, 32-19. The Saints cut the lead to within nine points with less than a minute to play, but Doron closed out the half sinking three free throws, giving Maryland a 35-23 lead heading into the locker room.

Doron, who has scored in double figures in the last seven games dating back to last season, led all scorers with 16 at the break.

Maryland had struggled in the paint in the first half but was determined to reclaim its inside presence. After having been outrebounded, 22-14, in the first stanza, the Terps held a 23-18 edge on the boards in the second period, including 14 offensive rebounds, and outscored the Saints, 22-10, from inside. Leading the way was Harper who grabbed 10 en route to 14 boards for the contest.

In the second half, the Saints still refused to go away, cutting the Maryland lead to single digits on a number of occasions in the first 11 minutes. A Michelle Blot trey at 10:11 brought Siena to within 47-40, but the Terps responded with a decisive 17-5 tear. France's layup with 4:05 left on the clock put the Terps out in front, 62-45, a lead that never went below 15 points for the duration of the game.

After a Maryland time out, freshman Ashleigh Newman knocked down a three-pointer to put the Terrapins on top, 67-49, with less than two minutes to play. Smith was then perfect from the charity stripe, going 6-for-6, in the final 1:26 to lock up the victory.

Doron had career-highs of seven assists and five steals to accompany her game-high 21 points. France ended the game with 15 points and seven rebounds. Harper also chipped in 12 points.

Dooley led Siena with 15 points on 6-for-13 shooting.

Maryland forced 26 Siena turnovers in the game, scoring 32 points on those opportunities.

(AP) - LSU freshman Sylvia Fowles finished with 18 points and 18 rebounds, and Seimone Augustus added 23 points, leading second-ranked LSU to a 64-51 victory over No. 22 Maryland in the opening game of the Coors Classic. Freshman Laura Harper led the Terps with a career-high 17 points and 16 rebounds for her second-straight double-double.

Fowles keyed a second-half run by scoring 15 points. Augustus shot 10-for-23 and scored in double figures for the 32nd straight game for LSU (6-0).

Aside from Harper's team-high 17 points and 16 rebounds for Maryland (2-1), Shay Doron scored in double figures for the ninth-straight game, finishing with 14 points.

Doron completed a three-point play early in the second half, capping a 15-4 run that gave Maryland a 35-33 lead. A basket by Jade Perry put Maryland ahead 39-37.

Fowles then scored eight points in a 12-0 run for LSU, which moved out to a 49-39 lead.

Kalika France made a basket and a free throw that pulled Maryland within 52-49, but Fowles made four free throws in the final 3:08 to help secure the win.

"They really got after us in the second half," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "They hurt us down low with their rebounding."

LSU led 29-20 at halftime despite committing 11 turnovers.

Augustus, who scored 11 points in the period, hit a jumper and baby hook in a 6-0 run that put the Tigers ahead 26-18. Maryland shot 0-for-7 and had four turnovers during that five-minute stretch.

Anesia Smith snapped Maryland's scoreless streak with a layup with 3:05 left, and Laura Harper hit an off-balance jumper.

Maryland was the only team to hold a second-half lead against the Tigers this season, while also limiting LSU to its lowest point total of the season.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - The defense was sharp, the scoring balanced and the rebounding edge overwhelming.

There really wasn't much for coach Brenda Frese to complain about after No. 22 Maryland blew past Loyola, Md. 77-36 Tuesday night.

Laura Harper scored 18 of her 22 points in the first half, and the Terrapins (4-1) pulled away by limiting Loyola to 12 points over the final 20 minutes.

"Obviously, I'm very excited how we played tonight, especially on defense," Frese said.

The Greyhounds (0-3) made only basket in the opening 14 minutes of the second half and missed 45-of-60 field-goal attempts overall.

"Their zone just totally shut us down," Loyola coach Candy Cage said. Harper, who surpassed her previous career high of 17 by halftime, finished 7-for-10 from the floor and made eight of 11 free throws. She also had eight rebounds.

"Things were just flowing," the freshman said. "Sometimes you can't explain it. My focus this game was on defense."

Crystal Langhorne had 14 points and 10 rebounds, and Kalika France scored 13 for the Terrapins, who have won six straight against their crosstown foes. Leading scorer Shay Doron scored only eight points, but Maryland showed that it doesn't have to depend on just one player for points.

"That's what we're going to have to have," Frese said. "It was nice to see so many players step up."

The Terrapins outrebounded Loyola 29-11 in building a 46-24 halftime lead. Despite committing 15 turnovers, Maryland made 15-of-29 field-goal attempts and went 13-for-16 at the foul line in the first half.

If there was one flaw in the Terrapins' performance, it was that they gave the ball away too many times.

"Twenty-five turnovers is entirely too much," Frese said. Lauren Troupe and Krystle Harrington scored seven apiece for the Greyhounds, who were outrebounded 50-26.

"We knew that was going to be a tough area for us," said Cage, who believes the young Terrapins will be a tough to beat if they fully mature.

"I think by the end of the season, come March no one's going to want to see them in their bracket," Cage said. "They're going to win a lot of games."

The Terrapins led 24-17 before using a 15-2 run to go up by 20 with 3:55 left in the first half. Harper started the surge by following her own miss with a layup. At that point, all 11 of Maryland's baskets were scored from within the key.

Loyola then bunched its defense inside, and the Terrapins began to connect from long range. Doron hit a 15-footer, and Ashleigh Newman and France sank 3-pointers before France capped the spree with a driving layup.

"Once they started doubling," Frese said, "we were able to get our outside game going."

Freshmen Laura Harper and Crystal Langhorne, who were selected ACC Rookies of the Week in back-to-back weeks, posted their third double-doubles of the young season. Langhorne netted 12 points while Harper added 10. Each hauled down 10 boards.

With the score tied at 4-4 in the first half, the Terrapins (6-1) rolled off a 19-0 run, jumping out to a 23-4 lead which the Bonnies (2-4) could not overcome. Langhorne tallied three points during that span.

After allowing Xavier to shoot almost 46 percent from the floor in the Terps' 74-72 victory last weekend, Maryland put on a defensive clinic, limiting St. Bonaventure to five field goals and just 19.2 percent shooting for the half. After Mandi Pierce's shot tied the score at 4-4 with 16:32 on the clock, SBU did not make another basket until 1:03 was left in the period.

Holding a 38-17 lead at the halftime buzzer, the Terps gradually built its lead and put the game away in the second period. Maryland was almost 61 percent from the field in the second half, making 6-of-11 three pointers. Freshman Ashleigh Newman was 3-for-4 from behind the three-point arc in the half, en route to a season-high 11 points. Doron scored 15 of her 25 points in the final 20 minutes.

Junior Charmaine Carr contributed six points, four boards and three assists off the bench. Sophomore Aurelie Noirez had seven rebounds, tying a career high. Senior Anesia Smith dished out seven assists and had eight points in the win. All 12 Terrapins saw playing time in the win.

The Terps controlled the paint, once again, outscoring the Bonnies, 40-14. Maryland also forced 27 turnovers, scoring 34 points on those opportunities.

No player on the St. Bonaventure roster reached double digits. Maripier Malo had a team-high nine points in the losing effort. Stefanie Collins, who was averaging 12 points per game, was held scoreless but had seven rebounds.

Crystal Langhorne and Ashleigh Newman each added 11 points for the Terrapins (7-1), who are off to their best start since going 9-1 to open the 1996-97 season.

Monmouth (4-4), which has lost three of four games, got 17 points from Naimh Dwyer and 12 from Courtney Lumpkin.

Playing the Terrapins for the first time since Nov. 11, 1985, the Hawks fell to 0-2 all-time against Maryland.

Monmouth shot 6-for-25 from the field and the Terrapins turned 17 turnovers into 22 points in taking a 40-16 halftime lead. Monmouth's first-half point total was a season-low.

Doron had four points during an 8-0 game-opening run and the Terrapins took advantage of six early Monmouth turnovers for a 14-5 lead.

Consecutive 3-pointers by Brianne Edwards and Dwyer got the Hawks within 16-13 with 11:22 left in the first half, but Monmouth didn't score again until Lumpkin's jumper 4:17 before halftime.

In between, Maryland put together a 14-0 run to take a 31-13 lead.

Langhorne's driving layup started the run, Doron contributed four points and Kalika France hit consecutive 3-pointers — one from the right corner, the other from the left corner.

With 5:39 left in the game, Langhorne capped a 12-2 Maryland run with a fadeaway jumper for a 70-38 lead.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Sophomore Kalika France scored 15 of her game-high 20 points in the second half, leading #17/21 Maryland to its 10th-straight win over Coppin State in as many tries with an 83-51 romping at Comcast Center.

Maryland won its sixth-straight game to improve to 8-1 on the season, matching its best win streak since 2000-01, while the Lady Eagles fell to 6-3.

France also added a career-high five steals, four assists and four rebounds. Freshman Laura Harper was one rebound short of her fourth double-double, scoring 19 points to go with nine rebounds. Classmate and ACC Preseason Rookie of the Year Crystal Langhorne chipped in 14 points.

Langhorne scored eight points in a 15-0 Maryland run which turned a 17-14 slim lead into a 33-16 advantage with less than 2 and 1/2 minutes to go in the first half. The 17-point lead was the Terps' biggest lead of the half. Maryland turned 12 Coppin turnovers into 20 points, while shooting better than 47 percent from the field.

France and Harper combined to score 13 points in the first 4 minutes and 20 seconds of the second half as the Terrapins tallied the first 15 points of the period to put the game away early, 54-29. The Lady Eagles committed 13 more turnovers and trailed by as many as 35 points, 68-33, with just under nine minutes to go in the game and were never closer than 26 points, 75-49, with less than three minutes to play in the game.

The Terps, who lead the ACC in rebounding margin and rank eighth in the nation as of Dec. 13, outrebounded CSU, 46-30.

Maryland shot almost 51 percent from the field, the fourth time in the last five games it has shot better than 50 percent. The 30+point margin of victory is the third-straight for the Terps, the first time since the 1989-90 season they have won three-consecutive games by at least 30.

Harper, who was fifth in the conference in field goal percentage heading into tonight's game, hit 7-of-10 buckets, the sixth time this season she has shot better than 60 percent. Langhorne was nearly perfect from the field, going 6-for-7.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Freshman Crystal Langhorne's career-high 26 points and 10 rebounds for her fourth double-double of the season led the No. 17/17 Maryland women's basketball team to a 67-63 win over Massachusetts, the team's seventh-straight victory, on the first day of the Terrapin Classic.

Langhorne had 21 of her season-high 26 points in the first half, two points fewer than UMass had scored, helping the Terps to a 37-23 advantage at the break.

Pam Rosanio's three-pointer gave the Minutewomen a 7-4 lead to open the game, their biggest lead of the contest. However, Maryland's Langhorne polished off a three-point play to even the score at 7-7 with 16:16 remaining in the period.

At 10:13, Brooke Campbell's jumper pulled the Minutewomen to within, 18-17, but Langhorne's 10 points in a 19-5 Maryland surge gave the Terps a commanding 37-21 advantage and then went into the locker room ahead, 37-23.

The Terps outrebounded the Minutewomen, 25-13, and forced 13 turnovers in the first half to grab onto the lead despite UMass' 42.3 percent shooting.

After the break, the Terrapins pushed its lead back up to 16 points on two more occasions, the last time coming at 18:24 at 41-25. UMass began to claw its way back to within single digits. A 10-1 run keyed by four points from Tamara Tatham brought the Minutewomen to within 42-35. However, Maryland answered with a 13-4 to lead 55-39.

But UMass was not dissuaded in their cause. Despite trailing most of the second period by double digits, the Minutewomen rallied to get within 63-60, using a 12-0 run capped by Kate Mills' jumper with less than two minutes left to play in the game.

In their attempts to stop the clock, the Minutewomen were called for an intentional foul with just 27 seconds to go. Senior Anesia Smith hit the first of two free throws to give Maryland a four-point edge, 64-60. Then sophomore Shay Doron went 3-for-4 down the stretch to seal the victory for the Terps.

Going 10-17-13 from the field, Langhorne's 26 points is the second most scored by a Terp in Comcast Center. Doron added 18 points and had four assists and three steals.

Maryland, who is playing without the injured Laura Harper for the first time this season, was held to below 70 points for just the second time, but outrebounded the Minutewomen, 40-34.

UMass had four players in double figures. Brooke Campbell netted 12, while Kate Nelson had 11. Rosanio and Tatham each added 10.

Doron missed seven of eight shots, and the 17th-ranked Terrapins reached halftime Thursday night with a two-point lead over Marshall.

"I definitely was not happy at halftime. We just didn't come out and play inspired, and I don't understand that when you're hosting your own tournament in the championship round," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said.

Doron and her teammates turned things around in the second half, however, and won the Terrapin Classic with an 83-68 victory.

Doron scored 21 of her 26 season-high points after halftime to lead Maryland to its eighth straight win. Tournament MVP Crystal Langhorne scored 20 points for the Terrapins (10-1), who are off to their best start since the 1991-92 season.

"I'm extremely proud of this team," Frese said. "We had set a lot of goals for ourselves, most recently to win this tournament and go into the ACC at 10-1."

Doron finished 9-for-17 from the floor. The sophomore guard made two 3-pointers and went 6-for-8 at the line.

"At halftime I composed myself a little bit," she said. "I got some reassurance from a couple of my teammates and got some easy looks, which gave me a lot of confidence. That's all you really need, one or two quick buckets, and it gets you going again."

Doron scored 10 points in the opening five minutes of the second half to help Maryland take a 49-36 lead. Then, after the Thundering Herd closed to 49-43, Doron made short jumpers and a 3-pointer in an 11-2 run that put Maryland up by 15.

Crystal Champion had 20 points and 11 rebounds for Marshall (5-5), and Kim Griffin contributed 14 points.

Maryland was playing its second game without leading rebounder Laura Harper, who will miss the remainder of the season after tearing her Achilles' tendon during practice Monday. The 6-foot-4 freshman forward was averaging 13 points and 10 rebounds.

She underwent surgery on Thursday afternoon.

Langhorne, the Terrapins' second-leading rebounder, picked up her third foul with 17:33 left and finished with only six rebounds. Anesia Smith had a career-high 14 assists for the Terrapins, and Kalika France had 11 points and 10 rebounds.

Langhorne scored the game's first five points to help Maryland race to a 15-5 lead, but Griffin hit successive 3-pointers to cap a 15-3 spurt that put Marshall ahead for the first time.

Neither team led by more than three points the rest of the half, which ended with the Terrapins up 32-30.

Massachusetts beat Elon 57-50 in the consolation game.

BLACKSBURG, Va. - No. 17 Maryland women's basketball was upset at Virginia Tech, 77-67, in both teams' ACC opener. The Terps could not overcome a 10-point, first-half deficit despite 23-point performance from freshman Crystal Langhorne, her third-straight 20-point outing.

It is only the second loss of the season for the Terps who fell to 10-2. The Hokies, who were playing in their inaugural ACC game, improve to 10-2.

Maryland was within single digits the entire first half until Carrie Mason hit a three-pointer with 43 seconds left in the half, giving VT a 36-26 lead.

Langhorne's layup at 16:38 tied the game at 4-4. Mason knocked down back-to-back threes to cap an 8-0 run, putting the Hokies in front, 12-4, to start the game.

The Terps could not get any closer than five points over the next eight minutes until Charmaine Carr's reverse layup cut the lead to 29-25 with 5:39 remaining in the first half. It was the last bucket of the period for Maryland, who struggled from the field, shooting just 30 percent from the field.

The Hokies opened the second half with a 12-5 run to claim their biggest lead of the game, 48-31, with 16:22 to go.

Trailing 59-44 later in the period, another Carr layup at 10:05 sparked a 13-3 run, cutting the VT lead to just 62-59 with 4:10 left on the clock. However, Virginia Tech was able to hold off Maryland down the stretch to pick up its first-ever ACC victory.

The loss snapped an eight-game Terps win streak, their longest since 1996-97.

Langhorne's 23 points led all scorers. Sophomore Shay Doron was 8-for-11 from the free throw line, en route to 17 points. Sophomore Kalika France grabbed a career- and game-high 11 rebounds, while dishing out a team-high four assists.

VT's Mason led four double-digit scorers with 16 points.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Maryland's Shay Doron, Crystal Langhorne and Kalika France have had no trouble scoring all year, but were not supposed to be able to score at will against No. 5 North Carolina.

The trio combined for 76 points, including a career-high 37 from Doron, against the Atlantic Coast Conference's second-ranked scoring defense, as the No. 21 Terrapins upset the Tar Heels 92-77 at Comcast Center on Sunday.

Doron's 37 points were good for the third-highest total ever by a Maryland women's player. The Maryland sophomore sunk 12 free throws during a stretch that the Terrapins converted 18 of their last 19 foul shots to seal the win.

"The truth is I didn't even feel like I was scoring a lot," she said. "I think that it was so balanced today and rightfully so. My team deserves a lot of credit for my success and for this win."

Langhorne added 23 points and 14 rebounds for her fourth straight 20-point effort. France scored 16.

"We knew they had three kids that could score and they all did," said North Carolina coach Sylvia Hatchell. "We didn't play defense and rebound. ... If you would've told me that this would've happened, I'd say 'no way.'"

The Terps outrebounded the Tar Heels, who grabbed an average of 9.8 more rebounds than their opponents entering the game, 49-35.

Maryland (11-2, 1-1 in the Atlantic Coast Conference) won its first game over a top-five opponent since beating No. 1 Tennessee on Dec. 30, 1992 and snapped a seven-game losing streak to the Tar Heels.

Ivory Latta had 21 points and Nikita Bell added 18 for North Carolina (12-2, 0-1). The Tar Heels, who entered the game shooting a conference-best 47 percent, shot a season-low 38 percent.

It was the most points North Carolina allowed since giving up 97 to Duke on Feb. 20, 2003.

"I'm obviously just so proud of this team and that's what we did tonight," said Terps coach Brenda Frese. "We truly played like a team unselfishly on the offensive end and the defensive end. This is just a special win for this team and for our program."

Maryland went on a 13-0 run for a 27-15 lead before North Carolina ended the half on a 6-0 run to trail 41-31 at the break.

The Tar Heels trailed by as many as 16 before pulling to within six points with 8:33 left, but Maryland would not allow them to get any closer.

Maryland jumped out to an 18-7 lead early with Doron scoring eight points. Georgia Tech then went on a 10-0 run capped by Megan Harpring's basket with 7:39 left in the half.

Maryland got within one on three occasions down the stretch, but Linnea Liljestrand's 3-pointer with 41 seconds remaining sealed the win for the Seminoles.

Florida State made six of eight shot attempts in the extra session. Maryland shot 58.3 percent from the field, compared with 47.8 percent shooting by the Seminoles — but Florida State scored 27 points off 22 turnovers by the Terrapins.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Shay Doron had a sore shoulder, yet Maryland coach Brenda Frese experienced far more pain than her star guard during the Terrapins' narrow 63-60 victory over Virginia.

Crystal Langhorne had 16 points and 17 rebounds, and Doron sparked a late surge that made the difference for No. 16 Maryland on Thursday night.

The Terrapins (13-3, 3-2 Atlantic Coast Conference) won despite committing 23 turnovers, shooting 41 percent and going 17-for-33 at the foul line.

"I think I would have preferred to get drilled by the dentist than watch that game tonight," Frese said. "It was not pretty."

Doron scored 21 points and Kalika France had 14 for the Terrapins, who are 9-0 at home for the first time since the 1991-92 season.

Takisha Granberry and Sharnee Zoll had 13 points apiece for the Cavaliers (13-5, 3-2), who went 23-for-74 from the floor (31 percent) and were outrebounded 56-38.

"I felt like we never really got on track tonight," Virginia coach Debbie Ryan said. "We got some really good looks that we normally put down. We just were not on our game."

Doron came in averaging 35 points over her last three games, but played much of the night with a sprained right shoulder. After scoring 10 points before halftime, she spent the opening 2½ minutes of the second half in the training room.

"At halftime it gets really stiff," she said. "I just have to play through it."

Doron's first shot upon returning was an air-ball, and she had to be helped to the bench with 10:29 left after being thrust into the first row of court-side seats on a foul by Granberry.

"That initial hit was a little bit of a shock," she said, "but once the pain died down I got right back in."

Doron came off the bench five minutes later with the score tied at 45, and the Terrapins promptly used successive layups by Langhorne, France and Doron to go up by six with 4 minutes left.

Doron made the lead stand up, scoring 10 of Maryland's final 14 points. She finished 7-for-11 from the floor and had seven rebounds.

"Slowly but surely, I'll get back to 100 percent," she said.

The 17 rebounds were a career high for Langhorne, a freshman playing in her 16th college game.

"The rebounding killed us," Ryan said. "Seventeen rebounds by one person is crazy."

Virginia missed 21 of its first 27 shots but closed the first half with a 7-0 run to take a 27-26 lead. The Cavaliers shot 26 percent before the break and were outrebounded 30-20, but Maryland was hindered by 14 turnovers.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - North Carolina State coach Kay Yow figured the best way to beat No. 16 Maryland was to focus on stopping the Terrapins' two leading scorers, Crystal Langhorne and Shay Doron.

The Wolfpack executed the game plan to near perfection, and the result was a 67-55 victory Sunday.

Billie McDowell had 18 points and nine rebounds, and Tiffany Stansbury and Khadija Whittington each scored 16 for NC State (15-4, 4-2 Atlantic Coast Conference). But the key was a defense that effectively shut down two of the league's top scorers.

Langhorne had 13 points and 19 rebounds, but was 4-for-11 from the floor. Doron, who came in averaging 20.6 points, scored only 2 points on 1-for-12 shooting.

"Defense is always a large part of our game plan," Yow said. "We knew Langhorne was a person we had to key on, and we knew Doron was."

Langhorne proved difficult to contain on the boards _ "At our best effort she got 19 rebounds today," Yow said _ but Doron simply couldn't shake the Wolfpack's aggressive guards.

Still showing the effects of a sore right shoulder that's been bothering her for nearly two weeks, Doron missed all six of her field-goal tries in the first half and was held scoreless over the final 18 minutes.

"I don't think we can take complete credit for two points for a player like Doron," Yow said.

Doron, who has not practiced since hurting the shoulder against Georgia Tech on Jan. 13 said, "I knew coming in it was going to be sore, but that's never an excuse for shooting that poorly. I definitely think their defense keyed on me, and they did a good job."

Kalika France scored 11 and for the Terrapins (13-4, 3-3), who fell to 9-1 at home.

It was the third straight win for NC State, which never trailed after taking control with a 16-0 run midway through the first half.

"We started turning the ball over and missed a lot of transition opportunities," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "That's a credit to their defense. I think they're one of the best defensive teams that we'll face in the conference."

Down 31-18 after shooting 27 percent over the first 20 minutes, the Terrapins came out firing _ and connecting _ after halftime. France hit a 3-pointer and Doron connected on a jumper from the corner to spark a 14-2 run in the opening four minutes.

McDowell and Rachel Stockdale then hit successive 3-pointers, and a three-point play by Whittington made it 42-34.

Maryland closed to 50-47 before the Wolfpack used an 8-2 surge to go up 58-49 with 4:30 left. Stockdale started the run with a 3-pointer and Stansbury ended it with a three-point play.

That was enough to ensure NC State a victory in its second outing since Yow returned after missing two games while being treated for a recurrence of breast cancer.

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) - Monique Currie scored 18 of her 24 points after halftime and rattled in the go-ahead jumper with 41.2 seconds left, helping Duke pull out a 60-57 victory over No. 20 Maryland.

Currie also hit two key free throws late for the Blue Devils (19-2, 5-1 Atlantic Coast Conference), and finished with 13 rebounds in 39 minutes. Wanisha Smith added 14 points for Duke, which has won 10 straight and 13-of-14 against the Terrapins (13-5, 3-4).

Maryland led early in the second half and fought the Blue Devils the entire way, tying the game at 55 on Crystal Langhorne's three-point play with 49.1 seconds left.

Duke called a timeout and set up a play for Currie, who took the pass and found herself wide open after a good screen from Mistie Williams. She launched the 16-foot jumper, which rattled around the rim before dropping through for a 57-55 lead.

Then, after Shay Doron missed a shot on the other end, Currie hit two free throws with 21.1 seconds left to increase the lead to four.

Maryland kept fighting, getting a jumper from Anesia Smith with 13.3 seconds left to cut it to 59-57. Then, after Jessica Foley made one of two free throws to increase the margin to three, the Terrapins called a timeout with 3.8 seconds left with a chance to send the game into overtime.

But the Terrapins didn't get a good shot, with Ashleigh Newman shooting an airball on a 3-point try just before the horn.

Maryland coach Brenda Frese was pleased with her team's defensive effort, which slowed an offense that averages 80 points. But in the end, her team couldn't get the stop when it needed most.

"We talked about it every timeout and we knew they were going to (Currie)," she said. "But with Duke, they have a lot of weapons and Monique is unselfish, so if you double-down too much off their shooters you're going to get burned that way."

Duke shot 38 percent and went 0-for-9 from 3-point range, ending a 241-game streak of hitting at least one 3-point shot.

Maryland didn't take advantage, shooting 40 percent and going 0-for-5 from behind the arc.

Doron scored 16 points to lead the Terrapins, while Langhorne had 14 points and nine rebounds.

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - Shay Doron scored 26 points, including a crucial three-point play in overtime to give No. 20 Maryland an 84-77 victory over Arizona.

Maryland took a 77-75 lead with 1:18 remaining on a lay-in by Crystal Langhorne, but it was not until Doron's three-point play on a drive through the lane--- that put the game out of reach with 40 seconds left.

The Terrapins (14-5) took advantage of the extra time after Maryland's Jade Perry connected on an 8-foot jumper at the buzzer to end regulation play.

Doron also had four free throws in overtime to help the Maryland cause. The Terrapins got 20 points and 16 rebounds from Langhorne. It was Langhorne's fifth double-double in the last seven games. Kalika France added 17 points.

Arizona (15-6) was led by 19 points from Shawntine Polk. Jessica Arnold had 18, while Danielle Adefeso, Natalie Jones and Ashley Whisonant each had 11.

Maryland needed the last second shot in regulation, but Arizona required more down the stretch before overtime. Trailing 67-60 with 1:16 remaining, the Wildcats got a lay-up by Dee-Dee Wheeler and then a four-point play from Jones to close to within one.

Jones followed it up with a deep three-pointer from the corner to give Arizona a 69-67 lead with 3.2 seconds left. After two passes were batted out of bounds, Perry connected on a shot that was reviewed by officials to make sure it was attempted before time expired.

Maryland maintained the lead throughout the second half, but down the stretch France kept the Wildcats from catching up. France's three-pointer put Maryland ahead 59-54 with 4:14 remaining. After a Polk short jumper, France responded with a quick bucket inside and then added a lay-up after the Terrapins beat the full court press for a 63-56 lead.

The Terrapins started out the second half slowly, seeing their 40-30 lead at the break evaporate with Arizona scoring the first nine points.

Arnold had five points off drives, including a three-point play, and Polk added a pair of inside buckets to get to within one.

Maryland re-established control by scoring seven straight, with Aurelie Noirez capping the run with a three-point play for a 47-39 lead with 15:17 left. The Terrapins took a 10-point lead at halftime by scoring the final nine points.

Ahead by one, Doron connected on a three-pointer to get the Terrapins started. Langhorne added a jumper before Maryland got a pair of free throws apiece from Ashleigh Newman and Doron to put the finishing touches on a first half where the Terrapins shot 56 percent from the field.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - After earning her 100th victory as a college coach, Maryland's Brenda Frese was far more interested in talking about her improving basketball team than reaching a personal milestone.

Shay Doron and Crystal Langhorne each scored 18 points, and the 20th-ranked Terrapins cruised past Georgia Tech, 84-67.

Maryland led by 12 with 11 minutes elapsed, upped the margin to 20 at halftime and breezed through the second half in improving to 10-1 at home. The Terrapins shot 52 percent and had 21 assists compared to only 12 turnovers.

"I thought it was by far one of the most unselfish games we've played as a team," Frese said. "You look at a positive assist-to-turnover ratio, having four players step up and score in double figures, and doing a tremendous job of moving the ball on offense."

The 34-year-old Frese has a 100-66 record in five-plus seasons. She spent two years at Ball State and one at Minnesota before coming to Maryland, where she's 43-36.

"Those 100 wins are about the teams that I've coached in three different programs. The players, as well as my assistant coaches, get the credit for the wins," she said. "But obviously I'm very excited to be able to do it at home in front of our great fans. That means a lot."

Most of her players weren't aware of the milestone until the fans began holding up signs that said "100" as the game neared its conclusion.

"I didn't know," Doron. "I think she wants to win regardless of 100 or not 100. I don't think that went through her mind."

Anesia Smith had 11 assists and 10 rebounds, and Kalika France scored 14 points for the Terrapins (15-5, 4-4 Atlantic Coast Conference), who completed their first regular-season sweep of the Yellow Jackets since the 1997-98 season.

Chioma Nnamaka scored 18 points, and Janie Mitchell had 17 for the Yellow Jackets (12-7, 3-5), who have lost five of seven. The Yellow Jackets committed 12 turnovers and went 8-for-26 from the field in falling behind 42-22 at halftime.

"I didn't think my that my team showed up in the first half," Yellow Jackets coach MacChelle Joseph said. "I just didn't feel like we were ready to play."

Asked to assess Frese's influence on the sport, Joseph said, "Brenda has done a tremendous job from the time she started at Ball State. I have nothing but respect for her, her work ethic and her ability to recruit. I see nothing but a bright future for Maryland."

The Terrapins yielded one basket and forced six turnovers in the opening 6 minutes to take an 8-2 lead. Minutes later, Doron made two straight 3-pointers and added a foul shot to cap an 11-2 run that made it 23-10.

It was 35-22 before France hit a 3-pointer and Langhorne added a layup to start a 7-0 spree into the break.

After Georgia Tech closed to 48-30 in the second half, Langhorne scored five points in an 11-2 surge that put the Terps up by 27 with just over 14 minutes left.

CLEMSON, N.C. (AP) - Ashleigh Newman hit seven 3-pointers and finished with a career-high 21 points for No. 20 Maryland, sending Clemson to its eighth straight loss, 87-82.

Kalika France scored 14 of her 19 points in the second half for the Terps (16-5, 5-4 Atlantic Coast Conference), who had a school-record tying 11 3-pointers. France had four of the 3s.

D'Lesha Lloyd led Clemson (7-14, 1-8) with 18 points and Reggie Maddox had 17.

Crystal Langhorne had 12 points and 13 rebounds for Maryland. Shay Doron, the Terps leading scorer at nearly 20 points a game, finished with 12, including eight from the foul line.

Clemson rallied from a 13-point deficit to a 72-all tie with 4:34 to go. But France followed with her final 3-pointer and had a three-point play down the stretch.

Newman was held scoreless after the break, going 0-for-3. France and point guard Anesia Smith then took over on offense for Maryland. Smith had all 12 of her points in the second half for the Terps, who had five players finish in double figures.

Clemson's plan was to hold Maryland's two-leading scorers, Doron and Langhorne, in check. While the pair was held to 6-of-14 shooting and 24 points (12 fewer than their season average), the Lady Tigers couldn't stop the outside display of Newman and France.

Newman's touch early on spurred an 18-5 run that put Maryland ahead 39-26 in the opening half. When Newman closed the period with her seventh three, she looked like she would easily break the school record of eight, set by Tiffany Brown against Clemson in 2000. The league record of nine was set by North Carolina State's Jennifer Howard in 1995.

But Clemson toughened its defense on Newman during its comeback. Lloyd and Maddox had eight points each as the Lady Tigers went on 22-4 run to lead 56-51 midway through the period.

Smith scored Maryland's next eight points to keep the game tight. France's third 3-pointer with 4:16 left broke the final tie and gave the Terps a 75-72 lead. After France and Doron converted three-point plays, Maryland was up 81-72.

Clemson couldn't get closer than three points the rest of the way. Maryland hadn't made more than eight 3-pointers in a game this season. The Terps tied the school mark of 11 set against Fairleigh Dickinson on Nov. 30, 1999.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - It would have been easy for Maryland to look past Wake Forest toward Sunday's showdown against No. 3 Duke.

Instead, the 19th-ranked Terrapins kept their attention on the task at hand, and the result was a 77-67 victory Thursday night that gave them a boost of confidence heading into their matchup against the Atlantic Coast Conference leaders.

"Now we can definitely focus on Duke," said Maryland guard Shay Doron, one of four Terrapins to score in double figures against Wake Forest.

The Terrapins, who are seeking to shatter the single-game ACC attendance record of 14,500 on Sunday, already have distributed more than 15,000 tickets to the contest.

Maryland (17-5, 6-4 ACC) has won four straight since falling to the Blue Devils 60-57 on the road late last month. Now, the Terps get a chance for revenge.

"There's definitely been a lot of hoopla for the game," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "I think our team is excited, and will be ready to play."

Against Wake Forest, Crystal Langhorne scored 15 points, and Jade Perry and Ashleigh Newman had 12 apiece. Langhorne and Doron have carried the Terps' offense for much of the season, but recently they've been getting plenty of help.

"It makes it much harder to game-plan for us," Doron said. "It proves we have more than a two-dimensional offense."

It certainly was too much for Wake Forest, which fell to 12-44 against Maryland in the series that began in 1977.

"They're a real good offensive team," Demon Deacons coach Mike Petersen said. "They've got great balance; they can score in the lane and score in the perimeter."

Liz Strunk and Porsche Jones each scored 18, and Erin Ferrell had 10 points and 13 rebounds for the Demon Deacons (13-9, 2-7), who have lost four in a row.

Up 41-32 at halftime, the Terrapins held the Demon Deacons scoreless for the opening 4 minutes of the second half in upping the margin to 15.

Wake Forest scored eight straight points to close to 53-46 before two free throws by Aurelie Noirez and a layup by Perry sparked a 10-0 surge that made it 63-46 with 9:21 remaining.

The Demon Deacons cut the gap to 8, but could get no closer. Langhorne had 12 points in the first half on 6-for-9 shooting, and the Terrapins shot 54 percent from the floor to take control.

Strunk scored 11 first-half points and Wake's leading scorer, Cotelia Bond-Young, hit a desperation 22-footer at the buzzer - her only basket before halftime.

Bond-Young, who came in averaging 16.6 points, finished with nine points on 3-for-14 shooting, including 3-for-11 from beyond the arc.

"They did a real good job guarding her," Petersen said. "A number of her attempts were under duress."

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Some of it was stage fright. Much of it can be attributed to Duke's defense.

Whatever the reason, Maryland picked an awful time to have one of its poorest shooting games of the season.

Playing before the largest crowd to watch an Atlantic Coast Conference women's basketball game, the 19th-ranked Terrapins clanged several dozen shots off the rim Sunday and fell to No. 3 Duke 60-49.

Maryland went 23-for-68 from the field (34 percent) and 1-for-6 at the line, much to the dismay of many of the 17,243 in attendance - and coach Brenda Frese.

"It was a tough shooting night for us, probably the worst game we've had," Frese said. "Duke's a great team, and they took us out of a lot defensively. They were very tough inside."

Monique Currie scored 14 points, and Chante Black had 13 rebounds and eight points for the Blue Devils (23-2, 9-1). It was Duke's 11th straight victory over Maryland and fifth consecutive overall.

The previous record for attendance at an ACC women's game was 14,500, when No. 1 Maryland hosted No. 2 Virginia at Cole Field House on Feb. 12, 1992. The Terps and Blue Devils drew 13,446 at the Comcast Center last season, then the second-biggest crowd for an ACC women's game.

Shay Doron scored 18 and Kalika France had 13 for the Terrapins (17-6, 5-5), whose average attendance at home before Sunday was 3,336.

One night earlier, 17,950 fans packed the arena for the Duke-Maryland men's game, won by the Terps in overtime. Although Sunday's contest wasn't a sellout, there was a pregame traffic jam, a television crew from ESPN and an enthusiastic student section that was filled long before the opening tip.

"It was a tremendous environment for women's basketball," Duke coach Gail Goestenkors said.

The Blue Devils played before 11,459 earlier this season at Tennessee, so the big crowd wasn't really a big deal to the many of the players.

"It just gave us more energy to keep going at it," Black said.

The Terrapins had won four straight and lost by only three points at Duke last month, but Sunday they came away with only a memory - not a victory.

"Our team can be very proud of the fact that we broke the all-time attendance record," Frese said. "After they're done playing, they're going to remember that for a long time."

Down 27-23 at halftime, Maryland opened the second half with a 9-0 run during which Duke missed eight straight shots. Doron had five points in the surge, including one of the Terrapins' two 3-pointers.

The Blue Devils responded with a 10-0 spree - two points apiece by five players - to go up 37-33 with 11:15 left. Maryland closed to 39-38 before a 3-pointer by Wanisha Smith and a 15-footer by Wynter Whitley put Duke ahead by six.

After Doron scored in the lane, Jessica Foley hit a 3-pointer, and Black made two free throws to make it 49-40 with 2:33 to go.

Duke missed 13 of its first 16 shots, yet the game was tied at 12 after 13 minutes because the Terrapins were 6-for-23 from the field and missed all four foul shots.

"It wasn't a pretty game, but both teams played exceptional defensively," Goestenkors said.

Currie, playing with two broken bones in her left foot, made only three of 12 field-goal tries. But she was 8-for-11 at the line and grabbed nine rebounds.

CORAL GABLES, Fla. - Freshman center Crystal Langhorne scored 29 points and grabbed 22 rebounds for her league-leading 11th double-double of the season, as #20/21 Maryland defeated Miami, 70-65, in an Atlantic Coast Conference contest at The Convocation Center. Langhorne is the first Terrapin to score 20+ points and grab 20+ rebounds since Myra Waters had 25 points and 20 rebounds against Georgetown on Dec. 6, 1980.

Maryland (18-6, 7-5 ACC), which picked up the program's 200th ACC victory, saw its eight-point lead dwindle to two at 67-65 when Tamara James made a jumper with 46 seconds left to play. Sophomore Kalika France, who had nine points, five rebounds and five assists, knocked down three free throws in the final 10 seconds to give Maryland its first winning record away from home since the 2000-01 season.

Miami (12-13, 4-8 ACC), which trailed by 10 in the second half, used a 20-6 run to take a 48-44 lead with 9:41 remaining. James scored 10 of her team-high 27 points during that spurt, while Yolanda McCormick, who had 13 points and 6 assists, chipped in with seven.

The Terrapins, who will now finish with at least a .500 record in league play in back-to-back seasons for the first time 1993-94, tied the game at 48-48 on a layup by junior forward Charmaine Carr. Sophomore guard Shay Doron, who scored 13 of her 20 points in the second half on 6-of-7 shooting, hit back-to-back jumpers to give UM a 52-48 advantage with 7:43 remaining.

The Hurricanes, which lost to Maryland in the first round of last season's NCAA Tournament, led the Terrapins 23-16 with 5:16 to go in the first half, but the visitors tallied eight straight points and 14 of the half's final 17 markers to take a 30-26 lead into intermission. Langhorne posted 17 points and 10 rebounds in the first half to lead all scorers.

Blue sandwiched a jumper and a pair of free throws around a Doron jumper gave the home team a four-point lead with 24 seconds remaining to seal the win. Smith's jumper at the buzzer resulted in the final score, 63-61.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - No. 23/22 Maryland women's basketball could not overcome a 48-39 first-half deficit and eventually fell to Virginia Tech, 87-79, in the Terps' ACC regular season finale at Comcast Center. Freshman Crystal Langhorne, who sat out much of the first half because of foul trouble, had 17 points and 15 rebounds in the second period and ended with 19 points and 16 boards for her ACC-leading 13th double-double of the season.

The Terps (18-8, 7-7 ACC) finish with a .500 record in the ACC for the second-straight season, the first time they have posted back-to-back non-losing conference seasons since 1992-93 and 1993-94. Seedings for the ACC Tournament will be determined at the conclusion of the ACC regular season on Monday, Feb. 28.

Maryland did not have trouble scoring, shooting 47.4 percent in the game. But it had trouble containing the Hokies' (16-10, 5-8 ACC) attack which shot 57.6 percent from the field, including 60.6 percent in the first half. The Terps also had trouble taking care of the ball, turning it over 24 times. VT took advantage of those miscues, scoring 27 points off those opportunities.

After senior Anesia Smith scored Maryland's first two buckets of the game, giving the Terps a 4-2 lead, Virginia Tech (16-10, 5-8) responded with back-to-back layups and never trailed the rest of the game.

The Terps fell behind in the first half, 20-12, but a 17-9 run tied the game, 29-29, with 6:55 remaining in the period. The Hokies, however, came back with a 15-4 streak to claim its biggest lead of the half, 44-33. Free throws in the final two minutes of the half, four coming from sophomore Kalika France and two from classmate Shay Doron kept the game within reach and the teams headed into the locker rooms with VT on top, 48-39.

In the second half, the Hokies extended its lead to 13 points, 63-50, on a Roshana Jackson layup. The Terps got as close as nine on two occasions, that last time at 7:23 with two Langhorne free throws. But VT pushed its lead back up to 13 at 75-62 with less than five minutes left to play in the game.

Maryland would not give up, however, battling to within 79-75 with 2:40 left but could not get any closer. The Hokies hit six free throws to end the game and hold off the Terrapins' comeback.

Langhorne, who has struggled from the free throw line this season, was 9-for-12 from the charity stripe en route to 19 points. Doron was perfect from the line, hitting on all seven attempts to finish with 20 points and five rebounds. France was also a perfect 6-for-6 and added 14 points. Freshman Jade Perry had 10 points.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Freshman Crystal Langhorne scored a career-high 33 points and grabbed 11 rebounds for her 14th double-double of the season, lifting the #25/22 Maryland women's basketball team to an 87-79 win over Northern Colorado to pick up its 19th win of the season, the most since 1989-90.

On Senior Night, every dressed Terrapin (19-8) on the roster saw playing time. Senior Anesia Smith, who was playing in the final regular-season home game of her career, dished out 11 assists.

The Bears (10-15), who were looking for the upset bid, went 16-32 from beyond the three-point line, including 8-14 (57.1) in the first half. Jena Fosdick led Northern Colorado with 29 points and seven assists.

Each time Maryland seemed to be in control of the game, the Bears would answer with a three-pointer to stop the run. After the Terps went ahead 68-67 with 8:28 remaining on a freshman Ashleigh Newman trey, Northern Colorado responded with a Kirsten Van Orden jumper and a Fosdick three to take a 72-68 advantage with just over five minutes left on the clock.

A Maryland jumper from sophomore Kalika France and a Langhorne layup tied the game at 72-72.

With the game tied once again at 77-77, the Terps went on an 8-2 run in the final 2:58 to take control and come away with the win.

France scored the game's final basket and had seven points over the last 5:20 to help put the game out of reach late. Newman had two key blocks and an assist over that stretch and finished the game with 10 points, two rebounds and four assists. Shay Doron chipped in with 11 points in 23 minutes, and the inside combination of Jade Perry and Aurelie Noirez connected on 6-of-10 field goals to post 12 points and eight rebounds.

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) - Crystal Langhorne had 24 points and 16 rebounds to lead No. 25 Maryland past Clemson 65-55 in the first round of the Atlantic Coast Conference tournament.

Kalika France added 12 points for the sixth-seeded Terrapins (20-8), who advanced to face third-seeded North Carolina State in Saturday's quarterfinals.

Reggie Maddox scored 12 points to lead the 11th-seeded Tigers (8-20), who closed their worst season under 17th-year head coach Jim Davis.

Langhorne - who was named the ACC rookie of the year on Thursday - shot 10-for-18 from the floor.

Langhorne went 6-for-11 from the floor with nine rebounds in the first half. No other Maryland player scored more than four points, and the Terrapins shot just 39 percent, but their sluggish start hardly mattered against the woeful Tigers.

Clemson shot just 9-for-32 and had 15 turnovers, allowing Maryland to build a 32-20 halftime lead that was never seriously threatened after the break.

Davis is a two-time ACC coach of the year and is Clemson's winningest coach with 355 victories. He led the Tigers to the 1996 and 1999 ACC tournament titles, but his program had gone just 17-12, 14-15 and 17-12 in the past three seasons.

Things just got worse this year - and one sequence in the first half against Maryland seemed to sum it all up.

With the Terrapins leading 22-15, Charmaine Carr went to the line for a 1-and-1 opportunity. She missed the first, but Clemson was whistled for a lane violation to give Carr a second try. Carr made that one and missed the second, but the Tigers were again whistled for a lane violation.

And again, Carr made the do-over.

Things didn't get much better after that for Clemson. The Tigers managed to cut the deficit to below double-figures a handful of times, but Langhorne and the Terrapins always had an answer.

With Maryland holding a 50-41 lead, Langhorne got loose inside for a score off a feed from Ashleigh Newman with about eight minutes left. Then, after a 3-pointer from Shay Doron and a basket from France, Langhorne scored inside again to push the lead to 59-43 with 5:21 to play.

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) - Crystal Langhorne had her sixth straight double-double and Jade Perry nearly matched her season high with 11 points, helping No. 25 Maryland hold off 19th-ranked North Carolina State 63-56 Saturday night in the Atlantic Coast Conference quarterfinals.

Maryland (21-8) advanced to face sixth-ranked Duke in the semifinals. The Blue Devils beat Wake Forest 107-50 earlier Saturday.

Two days after she was selected the league's Freshman of the Year, Langhorne had 23 points and 16 rebounds. She shot 9-of-14 and easily got the better of the Wolfpack's four-player post rotation to reach double figures in points and rebounds for the 16th time this season.

Leading scorer Shay Doron had another rough outing against N.C. State and finished with 10 points on 4-of-12 shooting. In the earlier matchup, won 67-55 by the Wolfpack, Doron was only 1-for-12 for two points.

But her final basket in this one was the biggest. With the Terrapins' lead down to one in the final minute, Doron drove in the lane and lofted an off-balanced one-hander. The ball bounced around the rim before dropping through, and when Kendra Bell's 3-pointer missed everything on the other end, sixth-seeded Maryland had control.

Kalika France sealed the victory by racing ahead of the pack for a layup with 19 seconds left, and she was fouled on the play. When her free throw was off, she raced in for the rebound, and the Terrapins held on.

Bell led third-seeded N.C. State (21-7) with 15 points, and Tiffany Stansbury added 11.

Earlier, a rough defensive possession for the Wolfpack appeared to give them energy. Trailing 51-43, they had three different players called for fouls in a span of about 30 seconds, and they also allowed an offensive rebound. The third foul was their seventh of the half and put Maryland's Jade Perry on the line for one-and-one, but she missed the first.

On the other end, Bell pulled up for a jumper just inside the paint to cut the margin to six, and after France clanged a 3-pointer off the rim, Khadija Whittington powered inside and forced a foul by Perry.

Whittington missed both shots, but N.C. State continued to play aggressively. McDowell slapped the ball away from Ashleigh Newman for a steal, Bell drove for a layup and Stansbury got loose inside for a basket over Langhorne, and the Wolfpack were within four.

Later, after another miss by France, Bell swished her third 3 of the game to cut the margin to one. N.C. State missed a chance to take its first lead on the second half when Stansbury couldn't convert from in close - with Bell wide open in the corner - and Perry followed a miss by Smith to make it 57-54.

Perry's previous best of 12 points came against Wake Forest, and that was one of only two games in double figures in the regular season. In this one, she proved to be the perfect complement to Langhorne, added six rebounds and missing only one of her six free throws.

ACC TOURNAMENT SEMIFINAL

GREENSBORO, N.C. - The No. 25 Maryland women's basketball team's run in the ACC Tournament came to an end in the semifinal round, losing to sixth-ranked Duke, 74-44. The sixth-seeded Terps had reached the semifinal round for the second-straight year and closed out the tournament with a 21-9 record, the most wins since the 1992-93 season.

Maryland will have to wait until next Sunday, March 13 when the NCAA announces the Division I Championship bracket. The Terps are hosting the first and second rounds on March 20 and 22 at Comcast Center.

Senior Anesia Smith (Alexandria, Va./Hayfield) led the Terps with 12 points, while freshman Crystal Langhorne (Willingboro, N.J./Willingboro) added 11.

Maryland struggled offensively, shooting just 13.6 percent from the field in the first half. The Terps trailed just 10-8 with 9:24 remaining in the first half after Langhorne connected on a pair of free throws. The Blue Devils, however, proceeded to go on a 21-2 run to close out the half and take a 33-11 lead.

Despite its offensive struggles, the Terps never gave up. Maryland went on an 11-1 run to make it 48-26 with 8:46 remaining. Sophomore Shay Doron (Great Neck, N.Y./Christ the King) and Langhorne each contributed four points during that span.

The Terps hung in tough over the final nine minutes, putting pressure on the Blue Devils all over the court and trading baskets. Maryland came to within 55-33 with 7:30 left. Duke used free throws down the stretch to build its lead back up again and advance to the championship game, 74-44.

Langhorne ended the game with five rebounds, making her three-game total 37, the third-most in ACC Tournament history in three games.

NCAA TOURNAMENT FIRST ROUND

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Shay Doron wasn't about to let Maryland blow the opportunity to play another NCAA Tournament game at home.

Doron scored 26 points and sparked a second-half surge that carried the Terrapins past Wisconsin-Green Bay 65-55 in a first-round contest.

Playing on its home floor and before a partisan crowd, seventh-seeded Maryland (22-9) used a 14-2 run to take a 56-45 lead with 5:17 left. That was enough to dispatch the Phoenix, who had won five straight and 21 of 22.

Crystal Langhorne had 16 points and 10 rebounds for the Terrapins, one of seven Atlantic Coast Conference teams in the NCAA Tournament. Doron, a 5-foot-9 sophomore, scored 18 after halftime.

The Terrapins will next face No. 2 seed Ohio State, which advanced with an 86-45 rout of Holy Cross. That game will also be played at the Comcast Center, where Maryland is 13-3 this season.

Abby Scharlow scored 21 and Tiffany Mor added 15 for No. 10 seed UW-Green Bay (27-4), which fell to 1-8 in NCAA Tournament play. The Horizon League champions weren't happy about playing in the home arena of an unranked team, but they handled the task well until falling apart at the end.

The Phoenix made only six field goals in the final 11:56, half of them in the final 80 seconds.

The second half featured 10 lead changes before Langhorne made two free throws, Kalika France hit a jumper and Doron sank a 3-pointer in a 7-2 surge that put the Terps up 49-45 with 8:37 remaining.

Both teams then went cold until Doron made a steal and went the other way before hitting a 14-footer. After a miss by UW-Green Bay, Doron made a baseline jumper and Langhorne added a three-point play to put the Terps up by 11.

The Phoenix never got closer than six after that.

Maryland got four points apiece from Doron and Langhorne in an 11-2 run at the outset. It was 23-17 before the Terps went cold, missing their final eight shots before halftime while the Phoenix used a 7-1 spree to pull even at the break.

UW-Green Bay took its first lead when Scharlow opened the second half with a jumper, and the Phoenix made their next three field-goal tries to go up 34-31. Maryland went back on top, but a three-point play by Scharlow put UW-Green Bay ahead 39-36 with 14:17 to go.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Ohio State's balanced attack and aggressive defense was more than enough to overcome Maryland's home court advantage in the second round of the NCAA tournament.

Brandie Hoskins scored 22 points, three other Buckeyes reached double figures, and Ohio State advanced to the round of 16 for the first time since 1993 with a 75-65 victory Tuesday night.

Jessica Davenport had 15 points and nine rebounds, Caitly Matter scored 16 points and Stephanie Blanton added 12 for the second-seeded Buckeyes, who limited the Terrapins to 31 points after halftime.

Ohio State (30-4) will face third-seeded Rutgers on Sunday in the Philadelphia Regional semifinals. Rutgers beat Temple 61-54 on Tuesday night in Storrs, Conn.

Crystal Langhorne had 22 points and 16 rebounds for the seventh-seeded Terrapins (22-10), who were trying to win their first second-round NCAA tournament game since 1992. It was Langhorne's 18th double-double of the season, tying the school record set by Vicky Bullett in 1987-88.

Ahead 58-53, the Buckeyes used a 9-3 spurt to go up 67-56 with just over 3 minutes left. Matter scored seven points in the run, capping it with a 3-pointer that all but assured victory.

Maryland made only four baskets in the final 9:42, two of them in the final 40 seconds. Leading scorer Shay Doron finished with only nine points on 3-for-15 shooting.

The Terrapins were 13-3 at the Comcast Center, but playing at home and in front of a partisan crowd wasn't enough to overcome Ohio State's speed and tenacious defense.

The second half featured eight lead changes before Matter hit a 3-pointer, Hoskins scored on a drive and Blanton sank a shot from beyond the arc to put the Buckeyes up 53-46 with 14:10 left.

At that point, Ohio State was 7-for-8 from the field in the second half. The Buckeyes missed their next four shots, and after Maryland closed to 53-50, Ashley Allen made a 3-pointer and Hoskins added a layup to give OSU an eight-point cushion.

Davenport then went to the bench with three fouls, and the 6-3 Langhorne went to work. She scored inside, grabbed a rebound on the other end and made a free throw to bring the Terrapins to 58-53.



They would get no closer.

The Buckeyes took a 35-34 halftime lead on a 3-pointer by Allen, her only points of the half. Davenport and Langhorne duelled for all 20 minutes; Davenport had 10 points and Langhorne had 10 points and nine rebounds.

Ohio State improved to 28-1 when leading at the half.
