MARYLAND FACES NO. 2 PENN STATE AND NO. 13 OHIO STATE AT ANNUAL ACC/BIG TEN CHALLENGE

- The Maryland women's lacrosse team will face No. 2 Penn State and No. 13 Ohio State at the annual ACC/Big Ten Challenge, this year being hosted at the Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md. The games will be played at Navy-Marine Corps Stadium, home of this year's Final Four for women's lacrosse.
- Maryland (5-3) will face its third and fourth straight ranked opponents this weekend in Penn State (5-2) and Ohio State (4-2). The Terps are 0-3 against ranked teams thus far, but all of those teams have been ranked in the top 10 and have been ranked higher than Maryland.
- Maryland is in the middle of a six-game road trip. Four of those six games are against teams that are ranked.
- The Terps went 2-0 at last year's ACC/Big Ten Challenge, posting a 12-11 win over the Nittany Lions and a 14-4 win over the Buckeyes.
- Maryland leads the all-time series with the Nittany Lions 25-13-1. However, the last three games have all been decided by two goals or less. The last PSU victory over Maryland was in 1991, a 7-6 victory for the Nittany Lions in Cindy Timchal's first season at Maryland.
- Penn State enters the weekend ranked second in the country after knocking off the two previous No.1-ranked teams in the country, Virginia and Princeton. However, the Nittany Lions are coming off a 6-5 loss to Temple on Tuesday.
- The Maryland-Ohio State series started with the ACC/ALC Challenge back in 2001. The Terps hold a 3-1 edge in the series, with OSU's win coming in 2002 (a 12-11 victory for the Buckeyes). Ohio State also lost in its last outing, 13-11, to Cornell.
- Jessica Dorney and Annie Collins are the only Maryland players to have scored a point in every game this season for Maryland.
- This weekend's games will be broadcast on 88.1 FM and www.wmucradio.com.
- A look ahead:** Maryland will travel to Blacksburg, Va., for its first-ever ACC meeting with Virginia Tech on Saturday, April 2.

THE WEEK THAT WAS

- Maryland went 1-1 on the week, rallying for a thrilling 10-9 win over George Mason and losing 10-8 at Dartmouth.
- Kelly Kasper picked up her own rebound in the fifth overtime period and finished for the goal to give Maryland a 10-9 win over George Mason last Wednesday. The Terps erased a 7-3 halftime deficit and led 9-8 late in the game, but the Patriots were able to force overtime.
- Jessica Dorney led all Terps with four points on two goals and two assists. After surrendering the seven first half goals, the Maryland defense tightened up and allowed just two goals over the game's final 42 minutes, including none in the overtime periods.
- Against Dartmouth, Maryland jumped out to an early 4-1 lead, but the Big Green rallied for four goals in the final minutes of the first half on its way to a 10-8 win over the Terps. The win was the first-ever for Dartmouth over Maryland.
- Delia Cox paced the Terp offense with four goals. Kirah Miles played well in goal stopping 12 Big Green shots.

HEAD COACH CINDY TIMCHAL

- Head coach **Cindy Timchal** enters her 15th season at the helm of the Maryland women's lacrosse program. In her 14-plus years, she has established one of the most dominant teams in all of collegiate athletics as the Terps are 241-34 (.884) under her guidance, have earned 14 NCAA Tournament bids and have taken the crown eight times.
- Timchal enters the 2005 season as the winningest coach in the history of women's collegiate lacrosse. Last season, she became the first coach to win 300 career games.
- Timchal was selected as the '03 ACC Coach of the Year, her fourth time earning the honor. She has been chosen as National Coach of the Year twice and has coached players to All-American status 70 times in her career.
- Now in her 24th season of coaching collegiate athletics overall, Timchal got her start at Northwestern where she led the Wildcats to the NCAA tournament five times in nine years. Her overall record (Maryland and Northwestern) currently stands at 317-74 (.815).
- Timchal is assisted by **Allison Valentino** and **Lauri Kenis**. Valentino is in her first season with Maryland after spending six seasons with Duke. Kenis is in her second season with Maryland after spending her playing career at Virginia.
- A 1976 graduate of West Chester, Timchal was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame on Feb. 13, 2004. Timchal lettered in lacrosse, track and field and tennis, while earning a degree in health and physical education.

OVER/UNDER

- In Maryland's five victories, opponents have not scored more than 10 goals. In fact, Terp opponents are averaging just 5.95 goals per game in Maryland victories.
- However, in the two Terrapin losses, Maryland has given up an average of 11.67 goals.
- Offensively, Maryland is averaging 13.82 goals per game in its five victories, but just 7.67 in its losses.
- Dating back to last season, the Terps are 0-7 when failing to score double-digits.

BROOKEBREAKING OUT

- Junior attacker Brooke Richards is on pace to have one of her strongest seasons as a Terrapin.
- In just eight games, the Annapolis, Md., native has 19 points (11g, 8a). Her career bests (set last season) are: 21 pts (12g, 9a).
- Richards had a career day against Denver (3/14) scoring four goals and adding two assists for six points.

A TALE OF TWO HALVES

- Whether it be a slow start and a hot finish, or a quick start before cooling off, the Terps have been completely different teams in halves of the same games this season.
- Against Duke and Old Dominion, Maryland managed just one goal first half goal in each game. However, the Terps outscored their opponents 18-7 in the final 30 minutes. Maryland had just six goals against Brown before exploding for 14 goals in the second frame.
- Against Richmond, Maryland raced out and scored 10 goals in the first half, but managed just four goals the rest of the way.
- The Terps fell behind 7-3 against George Mason, but exploded for six goals in the second half and got the game-winner in overtime for the win.
- On the year, Maryland is outscoring opponents 61-30 in the second half.

PLAYINGQUARTERS

- The final 15 minutes of the first half (the unofficial "second quarter") of the game has proven to be a tough stretch for the Terrapins.
- Maryland is being outscored 24-13 in the "second quarter." Subtracting the wins against Richmond and Denver, the Terps are being outscored 22-4.

COXCOUNTDOWN

- Junior Delia Cox is just one goal shy of her 100th career goal.
- Cox, who has 16 goals this season, scored 36 as a freshman and 47 last season.
- Acacia Walker is also nearing the 100-goal mark for her career. Walker, who leads the team in goals with 17 this season, has 90 career goals.
- Just 23 players have scored 100 career goals at Maryland.

SCOUTINGPENN STATE

- Penn State has been the giant-killers so far this season, knocking off two No. 1 and previously unbeaten teams in Virginia and Princeton in successive weeks. However, the Nittany Lions fell in their last outing, losing 6-5 to Temple on Tuesday. PSU enters Friday's game with a 5-2 record on the season.
- The Nittany Lions have five players with double-digit goals and points. Kristen Burke leads the team with 26 points on 16 goal and 10 assists. Emily Chambers, Lori Havrilla and Shari Maslin each have 21 points on the year. Lindsay Dutch has added 14 goals for PSU this season.
- For the third straight game, Maryland will face another top-notch goalie in All-American Lee Tortorelli. So far this season, Tortorelli has allowed more goals (51) than saves (47), but is still surrendering just 7.87 goals per game.
- Penn State is 3-0 against ranked opponents this season, but just 2-2 against non-ranked foes.

SCOUTING OHIO STATE

- Ohio State enters the weekend with a 4-2 record, including a 2-0 mark in the American Lacrosse Conference. The Buckeyes fell to Cornell, 13-11, in their most recent outing on Tuesday.
- Kelly Kremer leads Ohio State with 21 goals and six assists. Freshman Kristen Slahor, an Ellicott City, Md. product, leads the team with eight assists.
- Kim Hastings has seen the majority of work in the cage this season for the Buckeyes. She has made 50 saves and is allowing just 7.72 goals per game.
- Regina Oliver is one of OSU's best players in school history. The midfielder holds Ohio State records for caused turnovers and ground balls, and is among the top 10 in goals, assists and points.
- The Buckeyes are 1-0 against ranked opponents this year after an unconventional indoor/outdoor win over then-No. 12 Johns Hopkins in Columbus, Ohio. The game was moved indoors midway through the game because of weather.
- This weekend will only be OSU's second trip away from Columbus so far in the season.
- Ohio State is coached by Sue Stimmel, who is in her 10th season as head coach of the Buckeyes. She is the only coach in the program's history, and has a record of 77-63 in Columbus.

PRESEASON NOTEBOOK

- The Maryland women's lacrosse team was ranked seventh in the country, according to the preseason Intercollegiate Women's Lacrosse Coaches Association (IWLCA).
- Inside Lacrosse* named Delia Cox a pre-season first team All-American. Acacia Walker and Greta Sommers were each named to the publication's second team.
- Cox, Walker and Sommers were among the 32 players named to the preseason Tewaaron watch list. The fifth annual award will be given at a banquet on Thursday, June 2. Ten finalists (five male, five female) will be invited to the banquet for the announcement. The event will take place in Washington D.C. at the National Geographic Society headquarters.
- Former Loyola standout Allison Valentino joins the coaching staff this season after Jen Adams left to become an assistant coach at Denver. Former Terp standout Sonia Judd will serve as the team's volunteer assistant coach.
- Eight Maryland Terrapins, including senior Acacia Walker, have been selected for the 24-member US World Cup training team. Joining Walker on the US squad are Quinn Carney (2001), Randall Goldsborough (1996), Kelly Amonte Hiller (1996), Alex Kahoe (2000), Christie (Jenkins) Kemezis (2000), Kristin Sommar (2000) and Jess Wilk (1990). Six Terps, including volunteer assistant Sonia Judd (2003), are on the Australian World Cup squad. The other alumni making up the 16-member squad are Jen Adams (2001), Sarah Forbes (1997), Courtney Hobbs (2002), Tess McLeod (2003) and Sasha Newmarch (1998). Incoming freshman Casey Magor is an alternate for the squad. Laura Warren, who will exhaust her last year of eligibility this spring with the Terps, will represent the Wales at the World Cup. She played with that team in 2001.
- The Terp schedule is again one of the toughest in the nation. According to the IWLCA poll, the Terps will face eight of the top-10 ranked teams this season (Maryland is ranked seventh, and Northwestern is the only team ranked in the top 10 that Maryland will not play). The ACC will again be ultra-competitive in 2005, boasting four teams ranked in the top eight.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. -- Fourth-ranked Duke raced out to a 7-1 first half lead and withstood a second half rally by No. 7 Maryland to defeat the Terps, 10-7, Saturday afternoon in College Park. Annie Collins led Maryland with two goals and one assist, while Katie Doolittle and Jessica Dorney added a goal and an assist apiece.

The Blue Devils jumped on Maryland early with goals from Kristy Dirks and Kristen Waagbo in the first two minutes of action. Maryland's Brooke Richards scored for the Terps on an assist from Doolittle at 25:24, but Duke closed out the first half with five straight goals from five different Blue Devils. Maryland was out-shot 23-11 in the first half as it took a 7-1 lead into the second half. Duke goalie Megan Huether's six first half saves helped limit the Terps to one goal.

The Terps rallied back, though, scoring five unanswered goals in the first 10 minutes of the second half to cut Duke's lead to 7-6. Collins helped the Terps with two goals and an assist in that run, and Doolittle, Kelly Kasper and Greta Sommers also added goals for Maryland.

Duke's Katie Chrest ended the Blue Devils scoring drought, finding the back of the net at 14:52 on an assist from Leigh Jester. The two teams traded opportunities for the next nine minutes, but the Blue Devils were able to push its advantage to three goals after Jessica Adam's goal with just over five minutes remaining.

Jessica Dorney scored a free-position goal at 2:56 to make the score 9-7, but Duke was able to win the ensuing draw and melt the clock until Chrest tacked on a late goal to seal the victory. Chrest led all players with four points on three goals and one assist.

For the game, the Terps were just 2-of-7 on free-position shots. Kirah Miles stopped nine shots for Maryland. Duke's Huether made seven saves on the game.
