DARTMOUTH, ACC/ALC CHALLENGE HIGHLIGHT BUSY WEEK FOR TERPS

- The Terps begin a busy three-game week at home against No. 11 Dartmouth on Tuesday, March 23, at Ludwig Field beginning at 3 p.m. Live Stats are available for that game on www.umterps.com. Maryland will then travel to Chapel Hill, N.C., to compete in the Aeropostale Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC)/American Lacrosse Conference (ALC) Challenge. The Terps will take on No. 20 Penn State on Friday, March 26, at 5 p.m., before battling No. 18 Ohio State on Sunday, March 28, at 1 p.m.
- The Terps (5-2) are in the midst of their longest winning streak this season, winning three straight.
- Dartmouth enters Tuesday's game with a record of 1-2. As of March 22, Penn State is 1-5 and Ohio State is 2-3, but both teams play before the ACC/ALC Challenge this weekend.
- Maryland has never lost to Dartmouth, holding a 12-0 lead in the all-time series. The Terps took two victories from the Big Green a season ago, including a win in the NCAA Quarterfinals. The two teams first met in 1981 and have played every season since 1993.
- The Terps lead the all-time series with the Nittany Lions 24-13-1. The last PSU victory over Maryland was in 1991, a 7-6 victory for the Nittany Lions in Cindy Timchal's first season at Maryland.
- The Maryland-Ohio State series started with the ACC/ALC Challenge back in 2001. The Terps hold a 2-1 edge in the series, with OSU's win coming in 2002 (a 12-11 victory for the Buckeyes).

LAST WEEK IN WOMEN'S LACROSSE

- Maryland extended its winning streak to three with an 18-7 win over Old Dominion on Saturday.
- In addition to Kelly Coppedge's eight points on six goals and two assists, she also had a game-high six ground balls and five caused turnovers as well as four draw controls. She has scored at least eight points in her last three games, a tremendous scoring stretch that totals 25 points in that span.
- Delia Cox and Annie Collins tallied five points apiece as the Terrapins (5-2) won their third consecutive game. Collins' five points were a career high.
- The Maryland defense refused to allow Old Dominion to get in any offensive flow. The Lady Monarchs were 11-21 in clear attempts and had only one assisted goal on the afternoon.
- Meg Mallon and Greta Sommers and Molly Lambert each recorded their first goals of the season. Laura Warren chipped in a goal and an assist and Krista Pellizzi converted a free-position shot to round out the Terp scoring.

COPPEDGE ACC PLAYER OF THE WEEK

- Maryland's Kelly Coppedge was named this week's Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Lacrosse Player of the Week for her performance against Old Dominion.
- The senior midfielder was dominant on both ends of the field, scoring six goals and dishing out two assists for eight points on offense, while registering game-highs in both caused turnovers (5) and ground balls (6) on defense.
- Coppedge is the Maryland second player to earn ACC Player of the Week honors this season (Delia Cox is the other).

HEADCOACH CINDY TIMCHAL

- Head coach **Cindy Timchal** enters her 14th season at the helm of the Maryland women's lacrosse program. In her 14-plus years, she has established one of the most dominant teams in all of collegiate athletics as the Teraps are 226-28 (.889) under her guidance, have earned 13 NCAA Tournament bids and have taken the crown eight times.
- Timchal enters the 2004 season as the winningest coach in the history of women's collegiate lacrosse. She is also the first coach in the sport's history to win 300 games.
- Timchal was selected as the 2003 ACC Coach of the Year, her fourth time earning the honor. She has been chosen as National Coach of the Year twice and has coached players to All-American status 66 times in her career.
- Now in her 23rd season of coaching collegiate athletics overall, Timchal got her start at Northwestern where she led the Wildcats to the NCAA tournament five times in nine years. Her overall record (Maryland and Northwestern) currently stands at 302-68 (.816).
- Timchal is assisted by **Jen Adams** and **Lauri Kenis**. Adams is in her second season as a full-time coach after spending a year as an undergraduate assistant. Kenis is in her first season with Maryland after spending her playing career at Virginia.
- A 1976 graduate of West Chester, Timchal was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame on Feb. 13, 2004. Timchal lettered in lacrosse, track and field and tennis, while earning a degree in health and physical education.

- Kelly Coppedge enters the 2004 season with the team's longest scoring streak: 32. She has scored in every game this season for the Terps.

GOING THE EXTRAMILES

- One of the question marks for Maryland heading into the 2004 season was the play of first-year goalie Kirah Miles.
- Miles has answered those questions with stellar play in the cage so far. Miles has a solid GAA of 7.57 and has 57 saves on the season.
- Against Virginia, Miles stopped 17 shots, the most since another Villanova, Pa. native, Alex Kahoe, stopped 21 shots in the NCAA finals on May 17, 1998, also against Virginia.

MOVIN' ONUP

- Senior Kelly Coppedge, the reigning ACC Player of the Year and Tewaaron Award candidate is moving her way up the career charts at Maryland for goals and points.
- The Annapolis, Md., native is fourth all-time in goals with 174. With three more goals, she will move into third all-time.
- She is now sixth all-time in career points with 242, and needs eight more to move into fifth place.
- During a three-game span from March 11-20, Coppedge scored an amazing 19 goals and six assists.
- Coppedge was named ACC Player of the Week on March 22 for her six-goal, two assist performance against Old Dominion, in which she also recorded game-highs in caused turnovers (5) and ground balls (6).

MAGIC NUMBER: 10

- If Maryland can score double-digit goals, chances are the Terps will be able to come away with the victory. The Terps are 5-0 this season when scoring at least 10 goals, while in both Maryland losses the Terrapins have failed to crack double-digits.
- The last time Maryland lost when scoring at least 10 goals was April 21, 2002, North Carolina defeated the Terps 11-10 at the ACC Tournament.

THE EXTRAPASS

- What separates Maryland from many teams in the country is the ability to pass (and catch) the ball in tight spaces. On Maryland's 85 goals not scored on free position shots, the Terps have assisted on 50 of those goals (nearly 60 percent).
- Kelly Coppedge leads the team with 13 assists, followed by Annie Collins' 12 and Acacia Walker's eight.

NOTHING FREE ABOUT IT

- While the Terps have converted on 24-35 free-position attempts -- nearly 70 percent -- opponents have not had as easy of a time when it is their turn on the fan.
- Opponents have just nine goals on 33 free-position attempts (27.2 percent).

SCOUTING THE BIG GREEN

- Dartmouth enters Tuesday's contest with the Terps with a 2-1 record, coming off a 7-6 victory over Stanford on Saturday. The Big Green's lone loss this season was a 7-6 overtime decision at the hands of No. 8 James Madison.
- Lana Smith, a Tewaaron candidate, leads Dartmouth with eight goals and two assists. Smith has both of Dartmouth's game-winners on the season. Smith is a native of Annapolis, Md., and attended high school with Terp star Kelly Coppedge.
- The Big Green defense has excelled at keeping other teams off the board, holding opponents to under six goals in each of their first three games. Opponents are shooting under 30 percent against Dartmouth. Goalie Devon Wills has a GAA of 5.67.
- Maryland took two games from Dartmouth last season, including a win in the NCAA Quarterfinals against the Big Green. Kelly Coppedge had six goals and three assists in two games against Dartmouth.
- Dartmouth is coached by Maryland alum Amy Patton. Patton has led the Big Green to seven Ivy League titles in her 11 seasons at the helm and has career record of 124-50.

ACC/ALC CHALLENGE

- The Terps have played Penn State and Ohio State in the three previous ACC/ALC Challenges.
- The Terps have just lost once in those three seasons, a narrow 12-11 defeat at the hands of Ohio State. The Terps haven't lost to Penn State in the ACC/ALC Challenge.
- At last year's challenge, the Terps came away with an 11-10 victory over the Nittany Lions and a 10-5 win over the Buckeyes. Against PSU, Kelly Coppedge scored the game-winner at 52:31 to give the Terps the win. In the victory over Ohio State, Maryland got a pair of goals from Coppedge, Acacia Walker and Sonia Judd en route to the decision.

SCOUTING THE LIONS

- A 1-5 record (as of March 22) for Penn State is a bit misleading as all five losses for the Nittany Lions have come against teams ranked in the most recent IWLCA poll. Penn State's losses have come to No. 1 Princeton, No. 5 Virginia, No. 7 James Madison, No. 10 Vanderbilt and No. 17 William & Mary. Included in those defeats are narrow one-goal losses to UVa and William & Mary. PSU's victory came over Davidson.
- Penn State's Lori Havrilla is the team's top scorer with 16 goals and one assist. Emily Chambers has 10 goals and five assists, while Shari Maslin has a team-leading eight assists to go with five goals.
- Goalie Lee Tortorelli, a first team preseason All-American and Tewaaron candidate, is surrendering 11.50 goals per game. She has played every minute for PSU this season and has made 64 saves compared to allowing 69 goals.
- The Nittany Lions are coached by Suzanne Isidor, who is in her fourth season at the helm. Her current record at PSU stands at 26-32.

SCOUTING THE BUCKEYES

- As of March 22, Ohio State has a 2-3 record. The Buckeyes have two victories over ranked opponents (Stanford and Richmond) and have fallen to two ranked opponents (Northwestern and Johns Hopkins). OSU's other loss came on the road at California. The Buckeyes will take on Cornell in Nashville, Tenn., before heading to Chapel Hill, N.C., for the ACC/ALC Challenge.
- Regina Oliver, Ohio State's Tewaaron nominee, does it all for the

Buckeyes. She is among the school's all-time leaders in points and is the school's all-time leader in caused turnovers. She leads the team with eight goals this season.

- Kim Hastings and Taryn Bowen have split time in the cage for Ohio State. Hastings has started all five games, but Bowen has appeared in every game so far. The pair have each allowed 24 goals and combine for a GAA of 9.41.
- Sue Stimmel is in her ninth season with Ohio State. She has a record of 70-53 with the Buckeyes.

TEWAARATON CANDIDATES

- Senior Kelly Coppedge and junior Acacia Walker were recently named to the 2004 Tewaaron Trophy watch list. This preseason list highlights the players to watch, as all NCAA Division I, II and III players vie for the most coveted and prestigious award in varsity lacrosse, the Tewaaron Trophy. The trophy will be presented in Washington, DC on June 3, 2004 at a banquet honoring the finalists and trophy winners. The ceremony will be held at the National Geographic Society Auditorium and broadcast by CSTV.

TOP FLIGHT TALENT

FLIGHT SCHEDULE

- According to the March 22 IWLCA poll, 12 of Maryland's 17 opponents are ranked or receiving votes. The Terps are 2-2 this season against ranked opponents.

U-19 TERPS

- Three Terp freshmen were involved with the U.S. U-19 World Cup team. Krista Pellizzi was one of the team's top scorers and was a teammate of Mollie Reese. Katie Doolittle trained with the U-19 squad but did not compete.
- The trio has seen the most significant action of the Maryland freshmen this season, with Reese starting. All three scored a point in their debut against Richmond on Feb. 21, and Doolittle scored two goals in her homecoming win over Syracuse.

TEAM CAPTAINS

- Maryland head coach Cindy Timchal has announced that seniors Kelly Coppedge and Molly Lambert will be the team captains this year. The two were chosen after a vote conducted by their teammates as representatives of this year's squad.

ACC POWERS

- With only four members, the ACC is still one of the strongest leagues in the sport. All four ACC teams are ranked in the top 11 in the nation (according to IWLCA), including Maryland (second), Duke (third) and Virginia (fourth).
- Last season, the ACC represented half of the Final Four and Virginia represented the conference in the national finals.
- In 13 of the past 14 seasons, the ACC has had at least one team in the finals (winning 10 national titles during that span).

PRESEASON NOTEBOOK

- *Inside Lacrosse* named Kelly Coppedge and Acacia Walker preseason first team All-Americans, in addition to being featured in the Feb. 14 issue. Delia Cox, the publication's Freshman of the Year in 2003, and Greta Sommers were named to the second team.
- CSTV will be the channel of choice for lacrosse fans this season. Highlighting the schedule will be Maryland's April 7 game against Georgetown. CSTV will also televise the women's NCAA championships this season.
- Former Virginia standout Lauri Kenis joins the coaching staff this season after Cathy Nelson left to become the head coach at Denver. Former Terp standouts Sonia Judd and Julie Shank will serve as the team's undergraduate assistant coaches.
- The Terp schedule is again one of the toughest in the nation. According to the IWLCA poll, the Terps will face nine of the top-10 ranked teams this season. The ACC will again be ultra-competitive in 2004, boasting all four teams ranked in the top 11.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. – Kelly Coppedge and Jessica Dorney each scored a hat trick to lead No. 2 Maryland to a season-opening 16-6 win over Richmond at the Lacrosse & Field Hockey Complex. Maryland improved to 24-7 in season openers with the win.

The Spiders (0-1) tried to slow the pace down by holding possession, but Maryland (1-0) scored the game's first three goals and seven of the first eight to force the action. Freshman Mollie Reese opened the game's scoring at 23:17 (the first score of her career) on an assist from Annie Collins. Laura Warren and Dorney followed with a pair of unassisted goals.

After a Richmond goal by Allison Nuzzi to cut the lead to 3-1, the Terps rattled off four more scores to take a six-goal margin. Coppedge scored two goals to help key the run.

Nuzzi scored cut the lead to 7-3 with a goal to end the first half and to begin the second, but that was as close as they would get after Dorney scored two more and Warren added another to take control of the game. The Terps were able to control possession the rest of the way scoring six of the game's last eight goals. Maryland out-shot Richmond 17-8 in the second half and had a 33-15 advantage in shots for the entire game.

Coppedge and Dorney finished the game with four points each (three goals and one assist), and Coppedge scooped a game-high six ground balls. Collins chipped in two goals and one assist to help pace the Maryland offense. Junior Kirah Miles, making her first start in the cage for Maryland, made five saves for the Terps.
