TERPS LOOK FOR ACC WIN AGAINST UNC THIS WEEK

- The fourth-ranked Maryland women's lacrosse team will attempt to notch its first ACC win of the season against No. 15 North Carolina Saturday at 1 p.m. The winner of this game will be the third seed at the ACC Tournament the weekend of April 23-25, while the loser will be the fourth seed. Duke went 3-0 in ACC play and is the top seed in the tournament while Virginia went 2-1 and is seeded second.
- With their pair of victories over top 10 teams a week ago, Maryland climbed from seventh to fourth in the most recent IWLCA poll.
- The Terrapins have finished ACC play in fourth place just once (2002) in the seven years the conference has sponsored women's lacrosse. Maryland, the defending ACC Tournament champion, has been seeded first four times, second twice and fourth once. The Terps have never finished in third place in the conference.
- Maryland (11-2) has won nine in a row, including a pair of wins over ranked opponents last week. North Carolina (7-5) has lost its last two but will face Old Dominion before taking on the Terps on Saturday.

LAST WEEK IN WOMEN'S LACROSSE

- Last week, Maryland knocked off two top 10 teams to run its winning streak to nine.
- On Wednesday, it took Maryland just :19 second to flex its muscle against No. 2 Georgetown as Delia Cox raced down the field and scored, giving the Terps a lead they would not relinquish.
- Senior Kelly Coppedge led the way for the Terps scoring six goals and adding two assists in the victory. Cox netted a hat trick and added an assist for Maryland.
- Goalie Kirah Miles stopped 13 shots and the Maryland defense refused to allow any Georgetown players run free in front of the net. The Hoyas' leading scorer, Sarah Oliphant, was held scoreless and limited to just four shots.
- Despite being outshot 32-27, Maryland held a 13-10 edge in the draw controls, including nine in the first half. On three of those nine, Maryland scored immediately without a change of possession.
- On Saturday against Johns Hopkins, Coppedge again scored six goals - including the 200th of her career - to lead No. 7 Maryland to victory as the Terrapins defeated No. 9 Johns Hopkins, 14-11, at Homewood Field.
- Coppedge's 200th score came when she knifed between two defenders 20 yards away from the net and then raced toward the cage for the goal.
- Just as they did against Georgetown on Wednesday, the Terps (11-2) got off to another quick start. After pressure on Hopkins keeper Lauren Riddick resulted in a turnover, Acacia Walker capitalized on it with a goal just :26 seconds into the game. Walker added another goal at 27:52 to give the Terps a 2-0 lead in just over two minutes.
- The Terrapin defense held the Blue Jays to just eight shots in the first half, with goalie Kirah Miles making five saves.
- The Terps got a pair of goals from Laura Warren and goals from Mollie Reese, Annie Collins and Jessica Dorney.
- For her 12-goal, three-assist performance on the week, Kelly Coppedge was named the ACC Player of the Week for the third time this season.

HEADCOACH CINDY TIMCHAL

- Head coach **Cindy Timchal** enters her 14th season at the helm of the Maryland women's lacrosse program. In her 14-plus years, she has established one of the most dominant teams in all of collegiate athletics as the Terapins are 232-28 (.892) under her guidance, have earned 13 NCAA Tournament bids and have taken the crown eight times.
- Timchal entered the 2004 season as the winningest coach in the history of women's collegiate lacrosse. She is also the first coach in the sport's history to win 300 games.
- Timchal was selected as the 2003 ACC Coach of the Year, her fourth time earning the honor. She has been chosen as National Coach of the Year twice and has coached players to All-American status 66 times in her career.
- Now in her 23rd season of coaching collegiate athletics overall, Timchal got her start at Northwestern where she led the Wildcats to the NCAA tournament five times in nine years. Her overall record (Maryland and Northwestern) currently stands at 308-68 (.819).
- Timchal is assisted by **Jen Adams** and **Lauri Kenis**. Adams is in her second season as a full-time coach after spending a year as an undergraduate assistant. Kenis is in her first season with Maryland after spending her playing career at Virginia.
- A 1976 graduate of West Chester, Timchal was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame on Feb. 13, 2004. Timchal lettered in lacrosse, track and field and tennis, while earning a degree in health and physical education.

SCOUTING THE TAR HEELS

- North Carolina is 7-5 on the year and will take on Old Dominion on Tuesday before taking on the Terps on Saturday. The Tar Heels have dropped two straight decisions, losing 14-3 to Georgetown and 12-8 to Vanderbilt.
- Like Maryland, UNC is 0-2 in the ACC. The winner between the two teams will be the third seed at the ACC Tournament the weekend of April 23-25 and will play Virginia, while the loser will be the fourth seed and play Duke.
- The Tar Heels have plenty of balance on offense with four players with at least 20 points. Allison Higgins leads the way with 25 points on 20 goals and five assists, while Beth Ames has a team-high 23 goals. Melissa McCarthy has 18 goals and two assists and Jess Allen has 14 goals and six assists. Chrissy Rude leads the team in assists with eight.
- Katelyn Hoffman and Kristen Hordy have been splitting time in the cage for UNC. Hordy has been getting the starting nod as of late, but Hoffman has seen plenty of action in relief. Hordy has a goals-against average of 8.64 in 409 minutes, while Hoffman has a GAA of 8.04 in 321 minutes of work. Their save percentages are nearly identical, with Hordy having a .587 save percentage and Hoffman sporting a 5.78 save percentage.
- Jenny Levy is in her ninth season at North Carolina and has a 103-48 record. She is a 1992 graduate of Virginia.
- Maryland leads the all-time series 9-5. The series started in 1996.

START MEUP

- Maryland has been able to score first in 11 of its 13 games, but its the Terrapins ability to tally that first goal quickly that can set the tempo for the entire game.
- Maryland has outscored opponents 14-3 in the first five minutes of the game, including three scores in the very first minute of action.
- The Terps lead the nation in scoring offense, averaging 14.77 goals per game.

MOVIN ONUP

- Senior Kelly Coppedge, the reigning ACC Player of the Year and Tewaaraton Award candidate is moving her way up the career charts at Maryland for goals and points.
- The Annapolis, Md., native is second all-time in goals with 201. She passed Kelly Amonte on April 2 with six goals against Denver. She became just the 22nd player in Division I history to score 200 goals against Johns Hopkins on April 10.
- She is now third all-time in career points with 276 and ninth in career assists with 75.
- During a three-game span from March 11-20, Coppedge scored an amazing 19 goals and six assists.
- Coppedge was named ACC Player of the Week on March 22 for her six-goal, two assist performance against Old Dominion, in which she also recorded game-highs in caused turnovers (5) and ground balls (6).
- She earned her second ACC honor a week later on March 29 after racking up nine goals and one assist in a week that saw the Terps collect three victories against ranked opponents.
- Coppedge has scored nine points twice this season. She had a career-high seven goals to go with two assists against Brown. She also had nine points on six goals and three assists against Denver.
- Coppedge earned her third ACC Player of the Week honors on April 12 after her 12-goal, three-assist performance helping the Terps to win over No. 2 Georgetown and No. 9 Johns Hopkins.
- She has scored at least six goals in six games this season. She ranks first on the team in goals, assists, points, ground balls and caused turnovers.

SCORINGSTREAKS

- Kelly Coppedge has the team's longest scoring streak at 38 (dating back to last season). She has scored in every game this season for the Terps.

GOING THE EXTRAMILES

- One of the question marks for Maryland heading into the 2004 season was the play of first-year goalie Kirah Miles.
- Miles has answered those questions with stellar play in the cage so far. Miles has a solid GAA of 7.71 -- best in the ACC and eighth best in the nation -- and has 105 saves on the season.
- Against Virginia on March 9, Miles stopped 17 shots, the most since another Villanova, Pa. native, Alex Kahoe, stopped 21 shots in the NCAA finals on May 17, 1998, also against Virginia.
- Miles was also key against Georgetown, making 13 saves against the second-ranked Hoyas. She helped limit Georgetown to just 4-10 on free-position shots.

PICKING UP THE PACE

- After a pedestrian 2-2 start, the Terrapins have picked things up to ignite a nine-game winning streak. In that span, Maryland has defeated six ranked opponents, including No. 2 Georgetown.
- In the first four games, the Terps were held to under 10 goals twice (both losses) and averaged 11 goals during that stretch. In the last nine, Maryland has not been held under 11 goals and is averaging 16 a game.
- Kelly Coppedge has picked up her game as of late for the Terps. During the four-game opening stretch, she averaged just under four points per game and a shooting percentage of just .294. In the winning streak, Coppedge is averaging 6.55 points per game and has a shooting percentage of .505. In six of those nine games, she has scored at least six goals.
- The Terp defense has also clamped down on opponents to help propel the team during this stretch. In the last nine games, opponents are averaging just 6.89 goals a game and are shooting just 33 percent. Maryland is also forcing roughly three more turnovers per game during its winning streak.
- Maryland has started the season 2-2 seven times in its history, with the last time coming in 1998. In those seasons, Maryland has twice won the national championship (1986 and 1998) and finished runner-up once (1982).

MAGIC NUMBER: 10

- If Maryland can score double-digit goals, chances are the Terps will be able to come away with the victory. The Terps are 11-0 this season when scoring at least 10 goals, while in both Maryland losses the Terrapins have failed to crack double-digits.
- The last time Maryland lost when scoring at least 10 goals was April 21, 2002, North Carolina defeated the Terps 11-10 at the ACC Tournament.

THE EXTRAPASS

- What separates Maryland from many teams in the country is the ability to pass (and catch) the ball in tight spaces. On Maryland's 154 goals not scored on free position shots, the Terps have assisted on 86 of those goals (55.8 percent).
- Annie Collins and Kelly Coppedge lead the team with 20 assists. Collins has more assists this season than her other two combined (16). Acacia Walker is third on the team with 12.
- Collins and Coppedge are first in the ACC with 1.54 assists per game, and Maryland leads the conference with 6.54 assists per game.

NOTHING FREE ABOUT IT

- While the Terps have converted on 38-60 free-position attempts -- 63 percent -- opponents have not had as easy of a time when it is their turn on the fan.
- Opponents have just 18 goals on 60 free-position attempts (30 percent).

SHE SAID

- "It's just a tribute to everyone that has been involved with the program. We've had tremendous support from the University of Maryland and great players. It's the players that score the goals and get the victories for a coach -- I've never scored a goal. It's really something all of the Terrapin players we've had here can share and take pride in." -- **Cindy Timchal on winning 300 games**

TOP FLIGHT TALENT TOP FLIGHT SCHEDULE

- According to the April 12 IWLCA poll, 10 of Maryland's 17 opponents are ranked or receiving votes. The Terps are 7-2 this season against ranked opponents.

U-19 TERPS

- Three Terp freshmen were involved with the U.S. U-19 World Cup team. Krista Pellizzi was one of the team's top scorers and was a teammate of Mollie Reese. Katie Doolittle trained with the U-19 squad but did not compete.
- The trio has seen the most significant action of the Maryland freshmen this season, with Reese starting every game for the Terps. All three scored a point in their debut against Richmond on Feb. 21, and Doolittle scored two goals in her homecoming win over Syracuse.
- Pellizzi has eight goals and three assists this season, Reese has eight goals and a pair of assist, while Doolittle has seven goals and three assists.

TEAM CAPTAINS

- Maryland head coach Cindy Timchal has announced that seniors Kelly Coppedge and Molly Lambert will be the team captains this year. The two were chosen after a vote conducted by their teammates as representatives of this year's squad.

ACC POWERS

- With only four members, the ACC is still one of the strongest leagues in the sport. All four ACC teams are ranked in the top 11 in the nation (according to IWLCA), including Maryland (second), Duke (third) and Virginia (fourth).
- Last season, the ACC represented half of the Final Four and Virginia represented the conference in the national finals.
- In 13 of the past 14 seasons, the ACC has had at least one team in the finals (winning 10 national titles during that span).

PRESEASON NOTEBOOK

- *Inside Lacrosse* named Kelly Coppedge and Acacia Walker preseason first team All-Americans, in addition to being featured in the Feb. 14 issue. Delia Cox, the publication's Freshman of the Year in 2003, and Greta Sommers were named to the second team.
- CSTV will be the channel of choice for lacrosse fans this season. Highlighting the schedule will be Maryland's April 7 game against Georgetown. CSTV will also televise the women's NCAA championships this season.
- Former Virginia standout Lauri Kenis joins the coaching staff this season after Cathy Nelson left to become the head coach at Denver. Former Terp standouts Sonia Judd and Julie Shank will serve as the team's undergraduate assistant coaches.
- The Terp schedule is again one of the toughest in the nation. According to the IWLCA poll, the Terps will face nine of the top-10 ranked teams this season. The ACC will again be ultra-competitive in 2004, boasting all four teams ranked in the top 11.

EVERY SCAR HAS A STORY

Every scar has a story.

That one on Annie Collins' right knee? That one was the result of a wrong step in the final minutes of the final game of her basketball season that obliterated her knee and kept her from her senior season on the lacrosse field and put her on a long road of rehabilitation.

That matching scar on her left knee? It came in the spring of her freshman year at the University of Maryland – just about a year later, when the right one was starting to feel strong again – after a misstep on the lacrosse field doing a drill she had done countless times during her career. For Collins, the pain was instantly unmistakable: she had shredded the ligaments in her knee — again. Gone was another lacrosse season.

Every scar has a story.

But the scars only tell the beginning of the story. They neglect to tell the hours of lifting weights, agility drills, stretching and mounds of ice during the rehabilitation. They don't reveal the 14-hour days when Collins would go to class, attend lacrosse practice as a spectator, go to rehab and then do classwork before heading home. They don't talk about the frustration of sitting out and watching your teammates play. They don't speak of the enduring pain and soreness that will linger for the rest of her life. It takes just an instant to tear knee ligaments – in Collins' case, two instants – but it takes months to recover and a lifetime to cope with.

With all of those images and moments woven together into two, simple, five-inch long scars along the front of her knee; one would think there would be some sentimental attachment to them, a constant reminder of the obstacles she has overcome in her athletic career. But there's no sentiment from Collins. She doesn't wear them as a badge of courage or as any symbol ("I'm not that sappy like that," she says). They're just there, sitting on her knees as if they were birth marks.

And thus is the essence of Annie Collins. The soft-spoken, unassuming senior from Ellicott City, Md., has a perspective only injuries can provide. She has no rearview mirror

into the past that allows her to feel sorry for herself or think what it would be like to have normal amounts of cartilage in her knees. This allows her to swallow any adversity as if it were sweet sugar-coated candy.

Just watch her play. If the word "poised" doesn't jump into your mind, then you're not watching No. 11. Calm behind the net, she waits for the precise moment to hit the cutter heading for the front of the cage. If it's not there, she'll re-start.

"She is very poised under pressure, and she does whatever we need her to do in those tight situations," head coach Cindy Timchal says. "I think the thing with Annie is how selfless she plays – she's out there to play for the team. We aspire to play and give to each other and she leads the way in that category."

With a team so explosive but with a tendency to be impatient; Collins is the perfect counter-balance for the Terps.

But it hadn't always been that way. As a high school player, she would blast past defenders with raw speed to get to the net. While sitting out during her senior year of high school and

freshman year of college, Collins would spend time on the sidelines, passing the ball against a wall and developing her stick skills. When she was able to finally play again against live competition and realized that her speed was not what it used to be, her improved skills became her biggest strength and essentially changed the way she played the game.

"I don't think you'll ever get the quickness and agility you had before your surgery; you're just a totally different player," Collins says. "I'm more of a finesse player now than I was before."

That finesse and those stick skills are evident in Collins' 2004 season for the Terps. Her ability to fit the ball into tight spots has helped her rank among the nation's leaders in assists this season.

"If you look at our offense, anyone can score," she says. "There's no need to force shots when there's people cutting open all the time. There's no need to force it one-on-one. I think the coaches have a lot more confidence in me than last year which has made me have more confidence in myself. Knowing that they want me to have the ball and they want me to do something with it and I feel more comfortable."

In accordance with her personality, Collins prefers the dirty work of assists rather than the glamour of scoring the goal.

"I'd much rather make a great pass than score a goal," she admits. "I would rather get a great interception, defensive check, or pass."

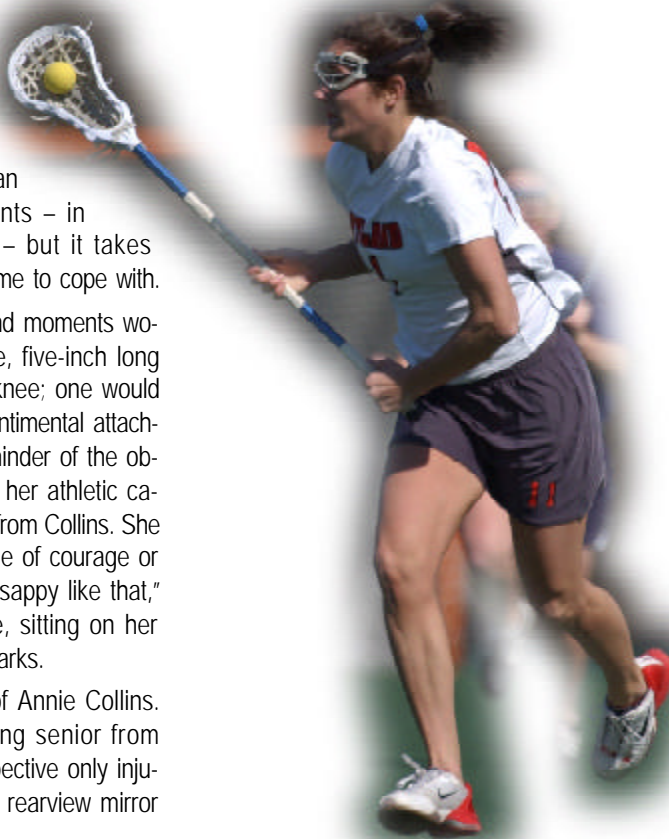
Collins' willingness to contribute in any way necessary is also the product of her perspective. She realizes that her lacrosse days are dwindling, and that this unique opportunity afforded to her is coming to an end.

"I came into lacrosse this season knowing that this was my last year and I want to put it all out there," she says. "I try to think that all of the time. This is my last time to be on a team like this and try and win a national championship."

Every scar has a story. The question now is will the stories from Annie Collins' scars include a national championship?

In addition to Coppedge's eight points, she also had a game-high six ground balls and five caused turnovers as well as four draw controls. She has scored at least eight points in her last three games, a tremendous scoring stretch that totals 25 points in that span. Delia Cox and Annie Collins tallied five points apiece as the Terrapins (5-2) won their third consecutive game. Collins' five points were a career high.

After each team scored in the game's opening three minutes, Maryland's defense shined in holding the Monarchs off the board for the last 20 minutes of the half, while the Terps ran off five straight goals and carried a 7-2 lead into halftime. The Terps allowed just seven Old Dominion shots in the first half and forced the Lady Monarchs to commit 12 turnovers.
