NO. 7 MARYLAND TAKES ON NO. 13 SYRACUSE IN COLLEGE PARK

- The Maryland women's lacrosse team, ranked seventh in the nation, returns to College Park to take on 13th-ranked Syracuse on Sunday, April 24, at 1 p.m. The Terps have won three straight home games this season, including a win over No. 12 Johns Hopkins the last time they played at Ludwig Field.
- Maryland (9-5) is in the midst of a difficult stretch of games, with the Orange being the seventh ranked opponent in the last eight games. The Terps have won three of their last four against ranked opponents, including a win at then-No. 6 North Carolina last weekend. According to Laxpower.com, Maryland's strength of schedule is fourth in the country.
- The Orange (9-3 as of April 21), will play host to Rutgers on Friday before traveling to College Park to take on the Terps. After a couple of early season losses to Virginia and Georgetown, Syracuse has since gone 7-1.
- After the win over UNC, the Terps moved from ninth to seventh in the most recent IWLCAs poll. The ranking matches Maryland's highest this season as UM began the season ranked seventh in the country.
- The win over the Tar Heels likely gives Maryland the third seed in next week's ACC Tournament at M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore, meaning the Terps will not play in Thursday's play-in game. The official ACC standings and tournament bracket will be released following the Duke-Virginia Tech game on Friday, April 22.
- Maryland leads the all-time series against Syracuse 7-0, including a 14-11 win last season in the Carrier Dome. Delia Cox sparked the Terp offense scoring a career-high six goals against the Orange. The last time Syracuse visited College Park the Orange pushed the Terps to overtime, but the Terps prevailed with an 8-7 win. Cox again had a big day scoring two goals and one assist, and Jessica Dorney tied the game at 7-7 in overtime before Kelly Coppedge netted the game winner.
- Excluding the game against Virginia, the Terps average loss margin is just two goals.
- **A look ahead:** *The University of Maryland, in conjunction with the ACC, the Baltimore Ravens and M&T Bank Stadium, are hosting the ACC men's and women's lacrosse championships from April 28-May 1. COX NAMED NATIONAL AND ACC PLAYER OF THE WEEK

- Maryland's Delia Cox was named this week's ACC and *Inside Lacrosse* Women's Lacrosse Player of the Week for leading the Terps to a 14-7 win over No. 6 North Carolina in Chapel Hill, N.C.
- The junior midfielder scored four goals and registered one assist as ninth-ranked Maryland downed No. 6 North Carolina, 14-7. The Newbury, Mass., native also recorded three ground balls and one draw control as well as a season-high five points.

THE WEEK THAT WAS

- The Terps won their only game of the week, doubling up No. 6 North Carolina 14-7 in Chapel Hill, N.C. Delia Cox led all scorers with four goals and one assist for five points.
- Trailing 2-1 early in the first, the Terps closed the first half on a 7-0 run to take an 8-2 halftime lead. The Tar Heels made a run in the second half, twice cutting the UM lead to three goals, but the Terps surged again late in the second half to secure the victory.
- Kirah Miles made nine saves for Maryland, Becky Clipp and Collins each had three caused turnovers, and Megan Sommar scooped up five ground balls to lead the Terps.

HEAD COACH CINDY TIMCHAL

- Head coach **Cindy Timchal** enters her 15th season at the helm of the Maryland women's lacrosse program. In her 14-plus years, she has established one of the most dominant teams in all of collegiate athletics as the Terpaps are 245-36 (.884) under her guidance, have earned 14 NCAA Tournament bids and have taken the crown eight times.
- Timchal enters the 2005 season as the winningest coach in the history of women's collegiate lacrosse. Last season, she became the first coach to win 300 career games.
- Timchal was selected as the '03 ACC Coach of the Year, her fourth time earning the honor. She has been chosen as National Coach of the Year twice and has coached players to All-American status 70 times in her career.
- Now in her 24th season of coaching collegiate athletics overall, Timchal got her start at Northwestern where she led the Wildcats to the NCAA tournament five times in nine years. Her overall record (Maryland and Northwestern) currently stands at 321-76 (.815).
- Timchal is assisted by **Allison Valentino** and **Lauri Kenis**. Valentino is in her first season with Maryland after spending six seasons with Duke. Kenis is in her second season with Maryland after spending her playing career at Virginia.
- A 1976 graduate of West Chester, Timchal was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame on Feb. 13, 2004. Timchal lettered in lacrosse, track and field and tennis, while earning a degree in health and physical education.

HERE COMESTHE BENCH

- The Terp depth is now coming through with offensive sparks off the bench. In the win over sixth-ranked North Carolina, the bench chipped in three goals and contributed three of the team's six assists -- including two from Krista Pellizzi. Kelly Kasper had a goal and one assist and Casey Magor, who also contributed four draw controls, found the back of the net as well against the Tar Heels.

SOMMERSACC PLAYER OF THE WEEK

- Maryland's Greta Sommers was named this week's Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) Women's Lacrosse Player of the Week for her performances against fourth-ranked Georgetown and 12th-ranked Johns Hopkins.
- Sommers, a senior defender from Chesterstown, Md., led the Terrapins against No. 4 Georgetown and No. 12 Johns Hopkins. On defense, Sommers stopped two of the nation's best scorers while also tallying a career high three points against Georgetown. On the week, Sommers recorded three goals and one assist for four points along with six ground balls, four caused turnovers and three draw controls.

IRONWOMEN

- Seniors Greta Sommers and Acacia Walker have started every game of their Maryland careers (77 games).

OVER/UNDER

- The magic number for the Terps seems to be 10.
- In eight of Maryland's nine victories, the Terps have held their opponents under the double-digit threshold.
- Dating back to last season, the Terps are 0-8 when failing to score double-digits.

A TALE OF TWO HALVES

- Whether it be a slow start and a hot finish, or a quick start before cooling off, the Terps have been completely different teams in halves of the same games this season.
- Against Duke and Old Dominion, Maryland managed just one goal first half goal in each game. However, the Terps outscored their opponents 18-7 in the final 30 minutes. Maryland had just six goals against Brown before exploding for 14 goals in the second frame.
- Against Richmond, Maryland raced out and scored 10 goals in the first half, but managed just four goals the rest of the way.
- The Terps fell behind 7-3 against George Mason, but exploded for six goals in the second half and got the game-winner in overtime for the win.
- At the ACC/Big Ten Challenge, the Terps put together a great first half against Penn State (10 goals) and a great second half against Ohio State (nine goals). However, in the other halves of those games, the Terps managed just two goals against PSU and four against OSU.
- Maryland scored six in the first half against Georgetown, but only scored two in the second half and was held scoreless over the game's final 23 minutes.
- The Terps put together one its most complete offensive games on the road at North Carolina, scoring 14 goals (eight in the first and six in the second).
- Generally, the Terps seem to be a second half team, outscoring opponents 96-64 in the final 30 minutes.

PLAYINGQUARTERS

- Prior to the game at UNC, the final 15 minutes of the first half (the unofficial "second quarter") of the game had proven to be a tough stretch for the Terrapins.
- Before the game with the Tar Heels, Maryland had been outscored 34-21 in the "second quarter." Subtracting the wins against Richmond, Denver, Virginia Tech and UNC, the Terps were being outscored 31-10.
- However, the Terps snapped out of that second quarter funk with a resounding 7-0 run in the final 15 minutes of the first half against the Tar Heels on April 16.

100GOAL CLUB

- Delia Cox became just the 24th player in Maryland history to score 100 career goals with her score against Penn State on March 25.
- Cox, who has 27 goals this season, scored 36 as a freshman and 47 last season. She has 110 for her career
- Acacia Walker scored her 100th career goal against Georgetown. Walker now has 105 career goals. She is just 19 points shy of becoming the 12th player to score 200 career points.

KASPERCOMES ON

- Kelly Kasper, *Inside Lacrosse's* preseason Rookie of the Year, has thrived in her role as an offensive spark off the bench.
- In 10 games as a starter, Kasper scored 10 goals and three assists. In her last six games off the bench, Kasper already has six goals and three assists.
- In her 10 games as a starter, she had 11 turnovers. Since then, she has only turned the ball over five times.

SCOUTINGSYRACUSE

- The Orange will take on Rutgers on Friday before visiting College Park to take on the Terps. Syracuse, ranked 13th in the country, is 7-1 in its last eight games (as of April 21).
- The Orange have three players with at least 30 points in Monica Joines (28g, 3a), Caitlyn Dragon (24g, 10a) and Melody Agnew (14g, 16a). Three of Agnew's goals have been game-winners.
- Jen Kasel is the Orange starter in the cage. The junior has 83 saves this season and maintains a 8.83 goals-against average.
- Maryland and Syracuse have four common opponents this season in Virginia, Georgetown, Brown and Dartmouth. Each team fell to UVa, the Hoyas and the Big Green, and defeated the Bears.
- The Orange are out-drawing opponents 238-191.
- Syracuse is also a hot-starting team, outscoring opponents by 31 goals (78-47) in the first 30 minutes.
- SU is coached by Lisa Miller, who is in her eighth season with the Orange. She has a career record of 80-38.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. -- Fourth-ranked Duke raced out to a 7-1 first half lead and withstood a second half rally by No. 7 Maryland to defeat the Terps, 10-7, Saturday afternoon in College Park. Annie Collins led Maryland with two goals and one assist, while Katie Doolittle and Jessica Dorney added a goal and an assist apiece.

The Blue Devils jumped on Maryland early with goals from Kristy Dirks and Kristen Waagbo in the first two minutes of action. Maryland's Brooke Richards scored for the Terps on an assist from Doolittle at 25:24, but Duke closed out the first half with five straight goals from five different Blue Devils. Maryland was out-shot 23-11 in the first half as it took a 7-1 lead into the second half. Duke goalie Megan Huether's six first half saves helped limit the Terps to one goal.

The Terps rallied back, though, scoring five unanswered goals in the first 10 minutes of the second half to cut Duke's lead to 7-6. Collins helped the Terps with two goals and an assist in that run, and Doolittle, Kelly Kasper and Greta Sommers also added goals for Maryland.

Duke's Katie Chrest ended the Blue Devils scoring drought, finding the back of the net at 14:52 on an assist from Leigh Jester. The two teams traded opportunities for the next nine minutes, but the Blue Devils were able to push its advantage to three goals after Jessica Adam's goal with just over five minutes remaining.

Jessica Dorney scored a free-position goal at 2:56 to make the score 9-7, but Duke was able to win the ensuing draw and melt the clock until Chrest tacked on a late goal to seal the victory. Chrest led all players with four points on three goals and one assist.

For the game, the Terps were just 2-of-7 on free-position shots. Kirah Miles stopped nine shots for Maryland. Duke's Huether made seven saves on the game.

ANNAPOLIS, Md. -- Maryland ripped off eight straight second half goals to erase a 6-4 deficit and defeat Ohio State, 13-8, Sunday afternoon in the final game of the ACC/Big Ten Challenge at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium in Annapolis.
