TERPS FACE TOUGH TESTS IN NO. 1 PRINCETON AND NO. 3 LOYOLA

- The fourth-ranked Maryland women's lacrosse team will look to rebound after a tough loss at the ACC Tournament to Virginia against No. 1 Princeton and No. 3 Loyola. Fans can catch both games on www.wmucsports.com, and the game against Loyola will be broadcast on 88.1 FM as well.
- Maryland (12-3) had its 10-game winning streak snapped by Virginia at the ACC Tournament. The winning streak has bookend losses to Virginia (3/9 and 4/23).
- Speaking of winning streaks, Princeton (14-0) is undefeated this year and is currently riding a 23game winning streak dating back to last season. The Tigers are the consensus No. 1 team in the nation and have been throughout the season.
- From 1994-2003, Maryland or Princeton have captured the national title.
- Loyola (13-2) is also one of the top teams in the nation with losses to only Princeton and Virginia on the year.
- Including the games this week, Maryland will have played every team that was in the Final Four last season (Virginia, Princeton and Loyola) and the nation's No.1, No. 2 and No. 3 teams, consecutively.
- Maryland has two-game losing streaks against Princeton and Loyola.

THE WEEKTHAT WAS

- Kirah Miles stopped 17 shots and the Terp defense held ACC Player of the Year Amy Appelt to just two goals, but it wasn't enough as Maryland fell 9-7 to Virginia last Friday in the ACC Semifinals.
- The Terps fell behind early when UVa's Caitlin Banks found the back of the net at 28:09, but Maryland rattled off the next five goals to take a 5-1 lead with 7:33 left in the first half. In that surge, Kelly Coppedge netted a free-position goal, Delia Cox tallied a pair of scores, and Greta Sommers and Annie Collins found the back of the net for the Terps.
- Appelt was held scoreless in the first half trying to fight through Greta Sommers and double teams. She managed seven total shots, but Miles was able to stop all three of Appelt's shots on goal -- including one free-position. The Terps led 6-3 at the half.
 - Appelt wasn't held down for long, though, helping to ignite Virginia in the second half. She scored just two minutes into the second half and added another goal just :46 later to make the score 6-5. Tyler Leachman tied the score at 6-6, then Morgan Thalenberg gave Virginia the lead at 19:26. The Cavs capped their 7-0 run over 22:41 minutes with goals by Banks and Ashleigh Haas to take a 9-6 lead.
 - After a Terp timeout, Laura Warren stopped the Maryland scoring drought with a shot from five yards out in front of the cage to cut the deficit to two goals with 10:26 remaining in the game. Maryland appeared to make it a one-goal game, but an offsides call disallowed a Maryland score and gave Virginia the ball. The Terps also had another good opportunity on a freeposition shot but could not convert.

HEADCOACHCINDY TIMCHAL

- Head coach Cindy Timchal enters her 14th season at the helm of the Maryland women's lacrosse program. In her 14-plus years, she has established one of the most dominant teams in all of collegiate athletics as the Terrapins are 233-29 (.892) under her guidance, have earned 13 NCAA Tournament bids and have taken the crown eight times.
- Timchal entered the 2004 season as the winningest coach in the history of women's collegiate lacrosse. She is also the first coach in the sport's history to win 300 games.
- Timchal was selected as the 2003 ACC Coach
 of the Year, her fourth time earning the honor.
 She has been chosen as National Coach of
 the Year twice and has coached players to AllAmerican status 66 times in her career.
- Now in her 23rd season of coaching collegiate athletics overall, Timchal got her start at Northwestern where she led the Wildcats to the NCAA tournament five times in nine years. Her overall record (Maryland and Northwestern) currently stands at 309-69 (.819).
- Timchal is assisted by **Jen Adams** and **Lauri Kenis**. Adams is in her second season as a full-time coach after spending a year as an undergraduate assistant. Kenis is in her first season with Maryland after spending her playing career at Virginia.
- A 1976 graduate of West Chester, Timchal was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame on Feb.13, 2004. Timchal lettered in lacrosse, track and field and tennis, while earning a degree in health and physical education.

ACCOLADES

- Despite finishing 1-3 in the ACC, the Terps still placed five players on the all-conference team, the most of any team in the league.
- Kelly Coppedge was named to the All-ACC team for the third time in her career, while senior Annie Collins, juniors Acacia Walker and Greta Sommers, and sophomore Delia Cox all earned their first selections to the team.
- Freshman Mollie Reese -- the only freshman starter for Maryland this year -- was named the ACC's Freshman of the Year. Reese is just the second Terp to be named Freshman of the Year, with Alex Kahoe earning that honor in 1997.
- For their efforts in a losing cause against Virginia at the ACC Tournament, Delia Cox and Kirah Miles were named to the ACC All-Tournament team. Cox led the Terps with two goals against the Cavs, while Miles was stellar in goal stopping 17 Virginia shots.

SCOUTING THETIGERS

- The Tigers have tremendous balance on both offense and defense. Princeton has a pair of 50-point scorers in Lindsey Biles (42-13-55) and Theresa Sherry (41-12-53) -- both of whom are Tewaaraton nominees along with Elizabeth Pillion (24-14-38). The Tigers are the only team to have three players on the list of 20 nominees for the Tewaaraton.
- Sherry, who also plays varsity soccer at Princeton, is able to contribute in a variety of ways. She is
 among the team leaders in goals, assists, points, ground balls, draw controls and caused turnovers.
- Princeton has six players with at least 20 points on the year.
- As potent as the Tiger offense has been, their defense has been just as dominant. Princeton has
 allowed double-digit goals just once this season (to Cornell) and opponents are averaging just 6.29
 goals per game. As impressive, the Tigers are outshooting opponents by an average of 12 shots
 per game. Goalie Sarah Kolodner is first in the nation in goals-against average (6.04) but has only
 had to make 90 saves this season. As a team, Princeton ranks first nationally in scoring offense
 and scoring defense.
- In its last two games, Princeton has outscored its opponents 34-15. The Tigers have victories over Loyola, Virginia, Duke, Georgetown, Penn State and Dartmouth this year. Maryland has wins over Georgetown, Penn State and Dartmouth, and lost to both Duke and Virginia (twice).
- Maryland leads the all-time series 17-5, but the Terps have lost two straight to Princeton, including a lopsided 13-6 defeat in 2003.

THE LAST TIME: PRINCETON 13, MARYLAND 6

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (April 30, 2003) - The University of Maryland women's lacrosse team suffered its worse defeat of the 2003 campaign in falling to No. 6 Princeton, 13-6, at Ludwig Field.

Princeton was solid from start to finish, employing a strategy used frequently against the Terrapins over the years, a methodical, ball-control offense and solid defense. But the Tigers succeeded where others have not, mixing a relatively mistake-free offense with success on draws. Princeton won 13-of-21 draws in the game, marking just the third time this year that a team has won more draws that the Terps.

Second-ranked Maryland actually opened scoring in the game as sophomore Annie Collins ran in an unassisted goal at 11:27. Princeton answered less than a minute later but sophomore Jessica Dorney put the Terrapins back on top with an unassisted goal of her own at 13:17.

Scoring remained slow for the first 20 minutes and Maryland maintained its 2-1 lead, but the Tiger offense came alive when the clock hit 10:00 in the first half. Whitney Miller got things started with a pair of goals that kicked off a four-goal Tiger run with Lindsey Biles scoring the other two in a four minute stretch. Terp junior Kelly Coppedge found the net on an unassisted goal with 2:38 left in the half and freshman Delia Cox followed with another goal :30 later on a feed from senior Julie Shank and the two teams would head to the half with a goal separating them (5-4 Princeton).

When Coppedge was able to finish after a pass from Acacia Walker at 30:31, the Terps looked like they were back on track with the score knotted at five. Three minutes later, Princeton would start a run that would dampen the Maryland hopes.

Leigh Slonaker scored three goals in a five-goal Tiger run that moved the score from 5-5 to 10-5 in Princeton's favor and just nine minutes remained on the clock. Coppedge would net her third goal of the game with 5:25 left, but the Tigers continued to win draws and play keep away while drawing the Terrapin defense away from the net which gave Princeton opportunities to tack on three more for the final seven-goal margin.

The Terps were led by Coppedge's three goals while Collins, Cox and Dorney each added a goal. Senior Alexis Venechanos also finished with seven saves and it was just the second complete game this year that she had less saves than goals allowed.

SCOUTING THEGREYHOUNDS

- The Greyhounds also have one of the most explosive offenses in the nation to go along with one of the best defenders in the nation. Five players have scored at least 20 goals for Loyola, and Sydney Greene has found the back of the net 36 times for the Greyhounds. Rachel Shuck, a Tewaaraton nominee, leads the team and is among the nation's leaders in assists with 29.
- Tara Singleton, a defender, is also a Tewaaraton nominee. Singleton is among the national leaders in caused turnovers with 32 (2.13 per game).
- Loyola has just two losses this year, with one coming against No. 1 Princeton and the other coming to No. 7 Virginia. The Greyhounds have quality wins over North Carolina, James Madison, George Mason, Penn State and Duke. They are 5-2 against ranked opponents on the year.

- The Terps lead the all-time series 23-3, but have lost two straight to Loyola, including a narrow 9-8 loss a seaon ago.
- This season, Loyola is playing at Diane Geppi-Aikens Field, in honor of its longtime coach who
 passed away in 2003. The Greyhounds are now coached by Kerri Johnson, who served as an assistant under Geppi-Aikens from 1998-2003.

START MEUP

- Maryland has been able to score first in 12 of its 15 games, but its the Terrapins ability to tally that first goal quickly that can set the tempo for the entire game.
- Maryland has outscored opponents 16-5 in the first five minutes of the game, including three scores in the very first minute of action.
- The Terps are tied with Princeton in scoring offense, averaging 14.00 goals per game, which is first nationally.

MOVIN ONUP

• Senior Kelly Coppedge, a 2004 All-ACC selection Year and Tewaaraton Award candidate is moving her way up the career charts at Maryland for goals and points.

The Annapolis, Md., native is second all-time in goals with 203.
 She passed Kelly Amonte on April 2 with six goals against Denver.
 She became just the 22nd player in Division I history to score 200 goals against Johns Hopkins on April 10.

• On April 20, Coppedge was named one of 20 official nominees for the Tewaaraton Trophy. She was a finalist for the award last season.

• She is now third all-time in career points with 280 and tied for seventh in career assists with 77.

During a three-game span from March 11-20, Coppedge scored an amazing 19 goals and six assists.

 Coppedge was named ACC Player of the Week on March 22 for her six-goal, two assist performance against Old Dominion, in which she also recorded game-highs in caused turnovers (5) and ground balls (6).

She earned her second ACC honor a week later on March 29
after racking up nine goals and one assist in a week that
saw the Terps collect three victories against ranked opponents.

- Coppedge has scored nine points twice this season. She had a career-high seven goals to go with two assists against Brown. She also had nine points on six goals and three assists against Denver.
- Coppedge earned her third ACC Player of the Week honors on April 12 after her 12-goal, three-assist performance helping the Terps to win over No. 2 Georgetown and No. 9 Johns Hopkins.
- She has scored at least six goals in six games this season. She ranks first on the team in goals, points, ground balls and game-winning goals, and is second on the team in assists, draw controls and caused turnovers.

SCORINGSTREAKS

• Kelly Coppedge has the team's longest scoring streak at 40 (dating back to last season). She has scored in every game this season for the Terps.

GOING THE EXTRAMILES

- One of the question marks for Maryland heading into the 2004 season was the play of firstyear goalie Kirah Miles.
- Miles has answered those questions with stellar play in the cage so far. Miles has a solid GAA of 7.90 -- best in the ACC and sixth in the nation -- and has 128 saves on the season.
- Against Virginia on March 9, Miles stopped 17 shots, the most since another Villanova, Pa. native, Alex Kahoe, stopped 21 shots in the NCAA finals on May 17, 1998, also against Virginia.
- Miles was also key against Georgetown, making 13 saves against the second-ranked Hoyas. She helped limit Georgetown to just 4-10 on free-position shots.
- In the ACC Semifinals on April 23, also against the Hoos, she matched her career high with 17 saves. Miles was named to the ACC All-Tournament team for her performance.

MAGIC NUMBER: 10

- If Maryland can score double-digit goals, chances are the Terps will be able to come away with the victory. The Terps are 12-0 this season when scoring at least 10 goals, while in all three Maryland losses the Terrapins have failed to crack double-digits.
- The last time Maryland lost when scoring at least 10 goals was April 21, 2002, North Carolina defeated the Terps 11-10 at the ACC Tournament.

THE EXTRAPASS

- What separates Maryland from many teams in the country is the ability to pass (and catch) the ball in tight spaces. On Maryland's 170 goals not scored on free position shots, the Terps have assisted on 90 of those goals (53 percent).
- Annie Collins leads the team in assists with 23, while Kelly Coppedge is second with 22. Collins has more assists this season than her other two combined (16). Acacia Walker is third on the team with 13.
- Collins is first in the ACC and 16th in the country with 1.53 assists per game, and Maryland leads the conference with 6.07 assists per game.
- In the loss to Virginia at the ACC Tournament, the Terps failed to have an assisted goal for the first time this season.

AMONG THEBEST

PROVIDENCE, R.I. -- University of Maryland women's defeated got a career-high nine points from Kelly Coppedge on seven goals and two assists and cruised to a 21-6 victory over Brown Friday night in Providence, R.I.

A day after playing in 52-degree sunny weather, the Terps played in cold and windy conditions that reached into the teens with the wind chill. The result was the same, though, as the Terps posted another runaway victory.

Maryland got off to another quick start, scoring the game's first five goals, highlighted by a Coppedge goal in which she took a feed from behind the net from Acacia Walker, turned her back to the cage, and fired a shot over her shoulder that found the back of the net. She has scored at least eight points in her last three games, a tremendous scoring stretch that totals 25 points in that span.
