MARYLAND OPENS NCAA TOURNAMENT PLAY AGAINST TEMPLE

- The Maryland Terrapins, seeded third in the NCAA Tournament, will face Temple on Thursday, May 13, at 4 p.m. at Ludwig Field. The game is a re-match of last year's first round game, a game in which the Terps won 26-6.
- The winner of this game will face the winner of Duke-Georgetown on Sunday. The site and time of that game will be announced the morning of Friday, May 14.
- The Terps (14-4) are making their 15th consecutive and 20th overall appearance in the NCAA Tournament. The NCAA is in its 22nd year of sponsoring a women's lacrosse tournament, which began in 1983. Maryland has won eight NCAA titles and two AIAW titles (the governing body for women's collegiate lacrosse before the NCAA) for a total of 10 national titles. Maryland has advanced to the final four in eight of the last nine years.
- Temple's two national titles (1982 and 1984) were won against Maryland. This is Temple's 16th NCAA tournament appearance. Temple (11-7) earned an NCAA berth by winning the Atlantic 10 Tournament.

THE WEEK THAT WAS

- Maryland got five goals from senior Kelly Coppedge on Senior Day as the No. 3 Maryland Terrapins defeated No. 20 George Mason 13-9 last Sunday. In a close game for most of the afternoon, the Terps rattled off five unanswered goals in the middle of the second half to secure the victory.
- Junior Acacia Walker scored four points on one goal and three assists, and senior Annie Collins tallied two goals and one assist for three points to help pace the Maryland offense. As has been their trademark in the latter part of the season, the Terps took the early lead on goals from Jessica Dorney and Walker.
- The Patriots were able to capture the lead early in the second half, but Maryland put on a 6-0 run over the next 14 minutes to take a commanding 12-6 lead. Collins and Coppedge, two of Maryland's seven seniors, helped key the run with a pair of goals each. Senior Laura Warren and sophomore Delia Cox also found the back of the net to help key the Terrapin run.
- Defensively for the Maryland, Greta Sommers was able to cause two turnovers and scoop a game-high five ground balls. Tess McLeod also forced two Patriot turnovers in her final regular season game for the Terps.
- Coppedge was named Honorable Mention Player of the Week by WomensLacrosse.com.

TOURNEYTIDBITS

- Maryland is 34-10 in NCAA Tournament play. The Terps are the winningest program in NCAA Tournament history. Maryland is 45-15 all-time in postseason tournaments (USWLA, AIAW and NCAA) with just three losses in the last 10 years.
- Head coach Cindy Timchal is 26-5 (.839) at Maryland in the NCAA Tournament. Her overall record in the tournament is 27-10 (.730). This is her 19th appearance in the NCAA Tournament.
- Of the 17 individual and team records kept by the NCAA in tournament play, a Maryland player or team holds or shares eight of those records. Current assistant coach Jen Adams holds the NCAA Tournament records for assists in a game (7 vs. Monmouth, 2001), tournament (15 in 2001), and points in a game (11 vs. Monmouth in 2001) and tournament (26, in 2001). As a team, Maryland holds the record for goals in a game (26 vs. Temple, 2003), goals for both teams (32, twice, most recently vs. Temple, 2003), shots in a game (52 vs. Temple, 2003), and shots from both teams (78 vs. James Madison, 1998).

HEADCOACH CINDY TIMCHAL

- Head coach **Cindy Timchal** enters her 14th season at the helm of the Maryland women's lacrosse program. In her 14-plus years, she has established one of the most dominant teams in all of collegiate athletics as the Teraps are 235-30 (.892) under her guidance, have earned 14 NCAA Tournament bids and have taken the crown eight times.
- Timchal entered the 2004 season as the winningest coach in the history of women's collegiate lacrosse. She is also the first coach in the sport's history to win 300 games.
- Timchal was selected as the 2003 ACC Coach of the Year, her fourth time earning the honor. She has been chosen as National Coach of the Year twice and has coached players to All-American status 66 times in her career.
- Now in her 23rd season of coaching collegiate athletics overall, Timchal got her start at Northwestern where she led the Wildcats to the NCAA tournament five times in nine years. Her overall record (Maryland and Northwestern) currently stands at 311-70 (.819).
- Timchal is assisted by **Jen Adams** and **Lauri Kenis**. Adams is in her second season as a full-time coach after spending a year as an undergraduate assistant. Kenis is in her first season with Maryland after spending her playing career at Virginia.
- A 1976 graduate of West Chester, Timchal was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame on Feb. 13, 2004. Timchal lettered in lacrosse, track and field and tennis, while earning a degree in health and physical education.

ACCOLADES

- Despite finishing 1-3 in the ACC, the Terps still placed five players on the all-conference team, the most of any team in the league.
- Kelly Coppedge was named to the All-ACC team for the third time in her career, while senior Annie Collins, juniors Acacia Walker and Greta Sommers, and sophomore Delia Cox all earned their first selections to the team.
- Freshman Mollie Reese -- the only freshman starter for Maryland this year -- was named the ACC's Freshman of the Year. Reese is just the second Terp to be named Freshman of the Year, with Alex Kahoe earning that honor in 1997.
- For their efforts in a losing cause against Virginia at the ACC Tournament, Delia Cox and Kirah Miles were named to the ACC All-Tournament team. Cox led the Terps with two goals against the Cavs, while Miles was stellar in goal stopping 17 Virginia shots.

SCOUTING THE OWLS

- The Owls are 11-7 (6-1 in the A-10) and head into Thursday's game riding a four-game winning streak and having won eight of their last nine. Temple has scored at least 10 goals in its last nine games and has gone over the 20-goal mark three times.
- Temple received its NCAA Tournament bid after defeating Duquesne 12-11 in overtime of the Atlantic-10 finals. Tiffany Pulaski was named the tournament's Most Outstanding Player and she also received national Player of the Week honors by WomensLacrosse.com and InsideLacrosse.com.
- Head coach Kim Ciarrocca is in her 12th season at the helm of the program and 15th overall. Her record in Philadelphia is 133-76, and her career record stands at 158-90.

SERIESNOTES

- Maryland owns a 15-10-1 record in its history of play versus Temple. The two teams were regular opponents from 1981-2000.
- Temple owned the early part of the series between the two schools, winning nine of the first 12 meetings and tying another. The two schools played every year from 1981-2000 and early on, played in the same conference (EIAW, 1981 and 1982).
- The Terps have since won 13 straight games in the series with the Owls' last win coming in 1989.

THE LAST TIME: MARYLAND 26, TEMPLE 6

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (May 3, 2003) - The second-seeded University of Maryland women's lacrosse team posted an overwhelming 26-6 win over Temple at Ludwig Field in today's NCAA first round matchup. In the win, the Terrapins (17-3, 3-0 ACC) set an NCAA tournament record for goals while posting their largest goal total since 1986 (35 against Towson).

The Terrapins have now won 22 of their last 23 NCAA games and own a 33-9 record in NCAA tournament action. Their win over Temple (13-6, 7-0 Atlantic 10) was their 13th-in-a-row against the Owls and they now own a 15-10-1 advantage in the series that began in 1981.

Ten minutes into today's game, no one would have predicted that 32 goals would be scored between the two teams as the contest's first goal came with nearly 10 minutes elapsed in the first half as sophomore Annie Collins scored on an unassisted goal at 9:32. Up until that point, Temple netminder Sheena Oommen had been strong, making save after save. She finished the first half with 10 saves.

After the Owls scored with 16:24 left in the half, the Terrapin offense took over. Sophomores Acacia Walker and Jessica Dorney scored a pair of goals to help key an eight-goal Maryland run. Temple's Megan Condon found the net on an unassisted run and the two teams went to the half with the Terps ahead, 10-2.

In the second half, the Terps and Owls exchanged a pair of goals early and then it was off to the races again for Maryland as it then ran off nine unanswered goals. In this run, Dorney scored three while junior Kelly Coppedge and senior Sonia Judd each added a pair. With just under 15:00 remaining, Maryland owned a 20-3 lead and began to empty its bench.

Dorney led all scorers with career highs in goals (5) and points (6). Coppedge (four goals, one assist) and Walker (three goals, two assists) each posted five points while Judd also netted a hat trick. Collins was also among the most notable of 13 Terrapins in the scoring column as she chipped in with a career-high three assists.

With their 26 goals, the Terrapins broke the NCAA tournament mark set by Princeton which posted 25 in opening round action a year ago against LeMoyne on its way to the national title. The Terps also set an NCAA tournament record today for shots with 52, surpassing the mark of 48 by Delaware in 1984 while the 20-goal margin of victory was also the second-most ever in an NCAA game (Princeton beat LeMoyne by 22 last year).

DELIA COX: NEXT

- Sophomore Delia Cox has proven that she is in line as the next great Maryland scorer.
- So far in her first two seasons at Maryland, she has 79 goals. Kelly Coppedge, who is second all-time at Maryland in goals scored, had 74 goals after her sophomore season.
- Cox, an All-ACC performer, has the ability to carry the Terps in tight spots. Her six goals against Syracuse (3/3) helped propel the Terps to victory and her astounding six-goal outing against No. 1 Princeton (4/28) almost was enough for the upset victory over the Tigers.
- Delia's father, Ralph Cox, was the all-time leading scorer in hockey at New Hampshire and was the last player cut from the historic 1980 US Olympic team that won the gold medal. Ralph Cox is portrayed in the movie *Miracle*.

START MEUP

- Maryland has been able to score first in 15 of its 18 games, but its the Terrapins ability to tally that first goal quickly that can set the tempo for the entire game.
- Maryland has outscored opponents 20-6 in the first five minutes of the game, including four scores in the very first minute of action.

MOVIN ONUP

- Senior Kelly Coppedge, a 2004 All-ACC selection Year and Tewaaron Award candidate is moving her way up the career charts at Maryland for goals and points.
- The Annapolis, Md., native is second all-time in goals with 211. She passed Kelly Amonte on April 2 with six goals against Denver. She became just the 22nd player in Division I history to score 200 goals against Johns Hopkins on April 10.
- On April 20, Coppedge was named one of 20 official nominees for the Tewaaron Trophy. She was a finalist for the award last season.
- She is now third all-time in career points with 289 and is seventh in career assists with 78.
- During a three-game span from March 11-20, Coppedge scored an amazing 19 goals and six assists.
- Coppedge was named ACC Player of the Week on March 22 for her six-goal, two assist performance against Old Dominion, in which she also recorded game-highs in caused turnovers (5) and ground balls (6).
- She earned her second ACC honor a week later on March 29 after racking up nine goals and one assist in a week that saw the Terps collect three victories against ranked opponents.
- Coppedge has scored nine points twice this season. She had a career-high seven goals to go with two assists against Brown. She also had nine points on six goals and three assists against Denver.
- Coppedge earned her third ACC Player of the Week honors on April 12 after her 12-goal, three-assist performance helping the Terps to win over No. 2 Georgetown and No. 9 Johns Hopkins.
- She has scored at least six goals in six games this season. She ranks first on the team in goals, points, ground balls, game-winning goals and caused turnovers, and is second on the team in assists and draw controls.

SCORINGSTREAKS

- Kelly Coppedge had her 40-game scoring streak snapped against Princeton on April 28 -- a streak that encompassed the entire 2003 season and most of 2004. Prior to the game against the Tigers, the last time Coppedge was held without a point was April 27, 2002, against Loyola.
- Delia Cox now has the team's longest scoring streak having registered a point in five straight games.

GOING THE EXTRAMILES

- One of the question marks for Maryland heading into the 2004 season was the play of first-year goalie Kirah Miles.
- Miles has answered those questions with stellar play in the cage so far. Miles has a solid GAA of 7.87 -- best in the ACC and eighth in the nation -- and has 156 saves on the season. Her save percentage of .542 is 16th-best in the country.
- Against Virginia on March 9, Miles stopped 17 shots, the most since another Villanova, Pa. native, Alex Kahoe, stopped 21 shots in the NCAA finals on May 17, 1998, also against Virginia.
- Miles was also key against Georgetown, making 13 saves against the second-ranked Hoyas. She helped limit Georgetown to just 4-10 on free-position shots.
- In the ACC Semifinals on April 23, also against the Hoos, she matched her career high with 17 saves. Miles was named to the ACC All-Tournament team for her performance.
- She continued her hot play against two of the nation's top teams in Princeton and Loyola. She helped hold the Tigers to their lowest output of the season (eight goals) and made 14 saves against the Greyhounds.
- Miles has helped keep Maryland's last five opponents under 10 goals.

MAGIC NUMBER: 10

- If Maryland can score double-digit goals, chances are the Terps will be able to come away with the victory. The Terps are 14-0 this season when scoring at least 10 goals, while in all four Maryland losses the Terrapins have failed to crack double-digits.
- The last time Maryland lost when scoring at least 10 goals was April 21, 2002, North Carolina defeated the Terps 11-10 at the ACC Tournament.
- The Terps' unlucky number this season has been seven. Three of Maryland's four losses have come with the Terps scoring seven goals.

THE EXTRAPASS

- What separates Maryland from many teams in the country is the ability to pass (and catch) the ball in tight spaces. On Maryland's 200 goals not scored on free position shots, the Terps have assisted on 105 of those goals (53 percent).
- Annie Collins leads the team in assists with 25, while Kelly Coppedge is second with 23. Collins has more assists this season than her other two combined (16). Acacia Walker is third on the team with 18.
- Collins is first in the ACC with 1.39 assists per game, and Maryland leads the conference with 5.78 assists per game.
- In the loss to Virginia at the ACC Tournament, the Terps failed to have an assisted goal for the first time this season, and they followed that up with an assist-less performance against Princeton. After 139 minutes without an assisted goal, the Terps got back on track against Loyola when Acacia Walker found Jessica Dorney just 35 seconds into the game to help lead Maryland to the win.

SHESAIID

- "It's just a tribute to everyone that has been involved with the program. We've had tremendous support from the University of Maryland and great players. It's the players that score the goals and get the victories for a coach — I've never scored a goal. It's really something all of the Terrapin players we've had here can share and take pride in." -- **Cindy Timchal on winning 300 games**

- Three Terp freshmen were involved with the U.S. U-19 World Cup team. Krista Pellizzi was one of the team's top scorers and was a teammate of Mollie Reese. Katie Doolittle trained with the U-19 squad but did not compete.
- The trio has seen the most significant action of the Maryland freshmen this season, with Reese starting every game but one for the Terps. All three scored a point in their debut against Richmond on Feb. 21, and Doolittle scored two goals in her homecoming win over Syracuse.
- Pellizzi has eight goals and three assists this season, Reese has eight goals and a pair of assist, while Doolittle has seven goals and three assists.
- Reese was named the ACC Freshman of the Year on April 22 for her contributions in the starting lineup for the Terps.

TEAM CAPTAINS

- Maryland head coach Cindy Timchal has announced that seniors Kelly Coppedge and Molly Lambert will be the team captains this year. The two were chosen after a vote conducted by their teammates as representatives of this year's squad.

ACC POWERS

- With only four members, the ACC is still one of the strongest leagues in the sport. All four ACC teams are ranked in the top 11 in the nation (according to IWLCAs), including Maryland (second), Duke (third) and Virginia (fourth).

- The Terp schedule is again one of the toughest in the nation. According to the IWLCAs poll, the Terps will face nine of the top-10 ranked teams this season. The ACC will again be ultra-competitive in 2004, boasting all four teams ranked in the top 11.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. – Kirah Miles stopped 17 shots and the Terp defense held ACC Player of the Year Amy Appelt to just two goals, but it wasn't enough as Maryland fell 9-7 to Virginia Friday afternoon in the ACC Semifinals.

With the win, Virginia (14-3) advances to face Duke in the finals. The loss snaps Maryland's 10-game winning streak and drops its record to 12-3 on the season.

The Terps fell behind early when UVa's Caitlin Banks found the back of the net at 28:09, but Maryland rattled off the next five goals to take a 5-1 lead with 7:33 left in the first half. In that surge, Kelly Coppedge netted a free-position goal, Delia Cox tallied a pair of scores, and Greta Sommers and Annie Collins found the back of the net for the Terps.

Virginia countered with a score by Kim Connors just :15 later at 7:08, but Maryland pushed its lead to four again on an unassisted goal by Krista Pellizzi at the 5:51 mark. The Cavs' Courtney Young added her 17th goal of the season on an unassisted goal at 3:07 to cut the deficit to three heading into half time.

Appelt was held scoreless in the first half trying to fight through Greta Sommers and double teams. She managed seven total shots, but Miles was able to stop all three of Appelt's shots on goal — including one free-position.

Appelt wasn't held down for long, though, helping to ignite Virginia in the second half. She scored just two minutes into the second half and added another goal just :46 later to make the score 6-5. Tyler Leachman tied the score at 6-6, then Morgan Thalenberg gave Virginia the lead at 19:26. The Cavs capped their 7-0 run over 22:41 minutes with goals by Banks and Ashleigh Haas to take a 9-6 lead.

After a Terp timeout, Laura Warren stopped the Maryland scoring drought with a shot from five yards out in front of the cage to cut the deficit to two goals with 10:26 remaining in the game. Maryland appeared to make it a one-goal game, but an offside call disallowed a Maryland score and gave Virginia the ball. The Terps also had another good opportunity on a free-position shot but could not convert.

TT: What's the most embarrassing CD in your collection?

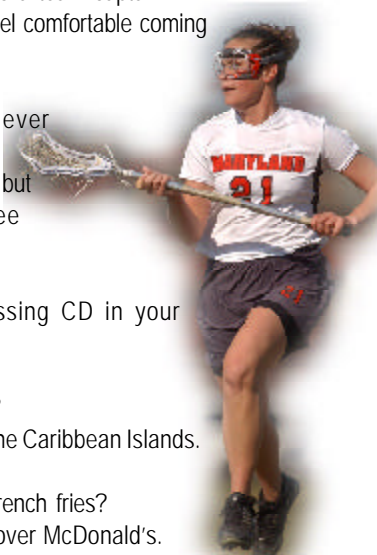
ML: The soundtrack from Rent.

TT: What do you miss most about home?

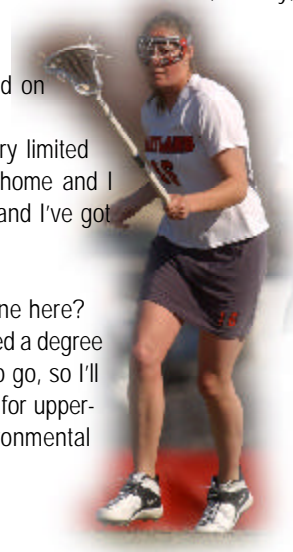
TM: I really miss the beach and the beach life – the laid back, breezy, sunny, warm beach life.

TT: What other sports did you play growing up?

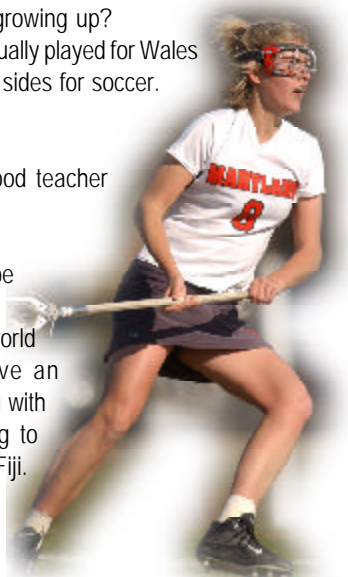
LW: Soccer, field hockey, tennis. I actually played for Wales back at home on the U-18 and U-21 sides for soccer.

EVERY SCAR HAS A STORY

Every scar has a story.

That one on Annie Collins' right knee? That one was the result of a wrong step in the final minutes of the final game of her basketball season that obliterated her knee and kept her from her senior season on the lacrosse field and put her on a long road of rehabilitation.

That matching scar on her left knee? It came in the spring of her freshman year at the University of Maryland – just about a year later, when the right one was starting to feel strong again – after a misstep on the lacrosse field doing a drill she had done countless times during her career. For Collins, the pain was instantly unmistakable: she had shredded the ligaments in her knee – again. Gone was another lacrosse season.

Every scar has a story.

But the scars only tell the beginning of the story. They neglect to tell the hours of lifting weights, agility drills, stretching and mounds of ice during the rehabilitation. They don't reveal the 14-hour days when Collins would go to class, attend lacrosse practice as a spectator, go to rehab and then do classwork before heading home. They don't talk about the frustration of sitting out and watching your teammates play. They don't speak of the enduring pain and soreness that will linger for the rest of her life. It takes just an instant to tear knee ligaments – in Collins' case, two instants – but it takes months to recover and a lifetime to cope with.

With all of those images and moments woven together into two, simple, five-inch long scars along the front of her knee; one would think there would be some sentimental attachment to them, a constant reminder of the obstacles she has overcome in her athletic career. But there's no sentiment from Collins. She doesn't wear them as a badge of courage or as any symbol ("I'm not that sappy like that," she says). They're just there, sitting on her knees as if they were birth marks.

And thus is the essence of Annie Collins. The soft-spoken, unassuming senior from Ellicott City, Md., has a perspective only injuries can provide. She has no rearview mirror

into the past that allows her to feel sorry for herself or think what it would be like to have normal amounts of cartilage in her knees. This allows her to swallow any adversity as if it were sweet sugar-coated candy.

Just watch her play. If the word "poised" doesn't jump into your mind, then you're not watching No. 11. Calm behind the net, she waits for the precise moment to hit the cutter heading for the front of the cage. If it's not there, she'll re-start.

"She is very poised under pressure, and she does whatever we need her to do in those tight situations," head coach Cindy Timchal says. "I think the thing with Annie is how selfless she plays – she's out there to play for the team. We aspire to play and give to each other and she leads the way in that category."

With a team so explosive but with a tendency to be impatient; Collins is the perfect counter-balance for the Terps.

But it hadn't always been that way. As a high school player, she would blast past defenders with raw speed to get to the net. While sitting out during her senior year of high school and

freshman year of college, Collins would spend time on the sidelines, passing the ball against a wall and developing her stick skills. When she was able to finally play again against live competition and realized that her speed was not what it used to be, her improved skills became her biggest strength and essentially changed the way she played the game.

"I don't think you'll ever get the quickness and agility you had before your surgery; you're just a totally different player," Collins says. "I'm more of a finesse player now than I was before."

That finesse and those stick skills are evident in Collins' 2004 season for the Terps. Her ability to fit the ball into tight spots has helped her rank among the nation's leaders in assists this season.

"If you look at our offense, anyone can score," she says. "There's no need to force shots when there's people cutting open all the time. There's no need to force it one-on-one. I think the coaches have a lot more confidence in me than last year which has made me have more confidence in myself. Knowing that they want me to have the ball and they want me to do something with it and I feel more comfortable."

In accordance with her personality, Collins prefers the dirty work of assists rather than the glamour of scoring the goal.

"I'd much rather make a great pass than score a goal," she admits. "I would rather get a great interception, defensive check, or pass."

Collins' willingness to contribute in any way necessary is also the product of her perspective. She realizes that her lacrosse days are dwindling, and that this unique opportunity afforded to her is coming to an end.

"I came into lacrosse this season knowing that this was my last year and I want to put it all out there," she says. "I try to think that all of the time. This is my last time to be on a team like this and try and win a national championship."

Every scar has a story. The question now is will the stories from Annie Collins' scars include a national championship?
