TERPS SQUARE OFF WITH PRINCETON IN NATIONAL SEMIFINALS

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The top-ranked University of Maryland women's lacrosse team will take on Princeton University this Friday at 6:00 p.m. in the first national semifinal of the 2001 NCAA Tournament. The meeting between the Terrapins and Tigers is a rematch of the 2000 national championship game, a contest which saw the Terps victorious by a 16-6 margin en route to their sixth straight NCAA title.

Princeton (14-4) enters this weekend at the peak of what has been a roller coaster ride of late. Of the four games leading into this year's tourney (Dartmouth, Maryland, Brown and Georgetown), the Tigers lost three, all of which came at the hands of this year's other three Final Four participants. In their two tournament games, however, they have been outstanding beating Cornell (14-4) before getting the proverbial monkey off of their back at Dartmouth (10-4), a place they had lost three straight times previous.

By way of their 19-0 regular season record and number one national ranking by the IWLCA, the Terrapins earned the top seed in this year's tournament. That seed, however, has not meant an easy ride for the Terps as Monmouth made a game of it for a half in the tournament's first round while ninth-seeded James Madison gave Maryland its biggest scare of the season in the quarterfinals.

In those opening rounds, Maryland (21-0, 3-0 ACC) overcame the possibilities of upset with strong team play and, in the case of the JMU game, intestinal fortitude. Against the Hawks of Monmouth, the Terps held the slimmest of halftime leads at 8-7, but opened scoring with five straight

second-half goals. After Monmouth answered with a pair of goals, Maryland then held the Hawks scoreless for the game's final 19:33 to run away with a 23-9 victory. The story of the game was senior **Jen Adams** who notched four goals and six assists and, with her second point of the day, became the most prolific points scorer in the history of women's collegiate lacrosse.

Against James Madison, the Terrapins jumped out early with a 5-1 lead, but were brought back down to earth with a 26-plus minute scoreless spurt. In that time, JMU took a halftime lead (just the second time this year that Maryland has trailed at intermission) and ultimately carried a 9-8 lead into the game's final minutes. Adams tied the score on an unassisted backhand goal with 1:35 left while a JMU defender accidentally scooped the ball into her own goal with 0:18 for the gamewinner. An 11-9 win was the outcome after Courtney Hobbs added a goal for good measure with 0:11 left.

With last week's wins, Maryland pushed its 2001 win streak to 21 and made it 41-in-a-row overall dating back to last year. Maryland's last loss came on March 5th of last year and it was its only defeat in the team's last 71 outings.

ADAMS BREAKS ALL-TIME SCORING RECORD

- ◆ With her second point against Monmouth -- an assist to **Allison Comito** -- in the NCAA's first round, senior **Jen Adams** became most prolific scorer in the history of collegiate women's lacrosse. The assist gave her 421 points for her career, breaking the mark of 420 held by Delaware's Karen Emas (1981-84).
- ◆ Emas is the all-time record holder for collegiate women's lacrosse. She played in the NCAA, AIAW and USWLA thus making the record an all-time collegiate record, not just NCAA.
- ◆ After 14 points last week, Adams now has 433 for her career. The closest player to Adams' numbers in the past 10-plus years is Maryland's Kelly Amonte (1993-96) whose Terrapin career record of 319 points was broken by Adams early this season. *For more on Adams, see page 3 of this release.*

THE DRIVE FOR SEVEN

- ◆ This year's NCAA Tournament signifies Maryland's run at a seventh straight NCAA title and the school's 10th national championship overall. The Terrapins' current streak of championships began in 1995 and their overall list of titles includes the 1981 (AIAW), '86 and '92 seasons as well.



Maryland at NCAA Final Four

◆ Maryland is 39-12 all-time in postseason tournaments (AIWA and NCAA) with its last loss coming in the finals of the 1994 NCAA Tournament. The Terps have won 18-straight NCAA Tournament games and are 27-8 all-time in NCAA postseason play.

MORE NCAA NOTABLES

◆ The Terrapins are playing for their seventh straight NCAA title. Their six consecutive titles are the longest string of any Division I women's team in the nation. Their seventh title would match the feat of John Wooden's UCLA Bruins from 1967-73. The longest current Division I streak is held by the Arkansas men's track team which has run off 12 consecutive NCAA Championships.

◆ The Terps' trip to this year's Final Four is their 12th-in-a-row. In addition, they have played in the championship game 10 out of the last 11 years.

◆ Maryland was 13-0 versus this year's NCAA Tournament field and played two teams twice (Virginia and Duke). In addition, they are 3-0 against the teams remaining in the Final Four.

◆ Jen Adams and Quinn Carney have scored at least a point in every NCAA game in which they have played (11).

◆ Starting defender Megan Kelly has three NCAA Championships and six ACC Championships under her belt in her three-year career as a Terp. The Maryland native moonlights on the Terrapin field hockey team that won the 1998, '99 and 2001 ACC Championships and was crowned the 1999 NCAA Champions. Kelly was also part of the Terp squad that won the 1999 and 2000 NCAA women's lacrosse championships, as well

as the 1999, 2000 and 2001 ACC women's lacrosse championships.

SEEKING PERFECTION

◆ With their wins at Dartmouth and Harvard two weeks ago, the Terrapins finished the 2001 regular season undefeated, marking just the sixth time in school history that a UM team finished its regular season without a blemish. In addition to the '95, '96 and '99 teams, the 1980 and 1994 teams went undefeated before losing the final games of their respective seasons. The 1984 team went without a loss in the regular season, but had a tie along the way before losing in the NCAA finals.

◆ The Terps are now seeking their second undefeated season (including the NAAs) in the last three years. Should they accomplish that feat, it would be just the fourth time in school history joining the teams from 1995, 1996 and 1999.

HEAD COACH CINDY TIMCHAL

◆ Head coach Cindy Timchal is in her 11th season at the helm of the Maryland women's lacrosse program. In her 10-plus years, she has established one of the most dominant teams in all of collegiate athletics as the Terrapins are 190-12 (.941), have earned 11 NCAA Tournament bids and have taken the crown seven times.

◆ Timchal was selected last year as the IWLCA South Region Coach of the Year as well as Co-ACC Coach of the Year. She has been chosen as National Coach of the Year twice and has coached 36 Terrapins to All-American status. Her recent naming as 2001 ACC Coach of the Year was her third time earning that honor.

- ◆ From the time of her arrival, Timchal has lost no more than three games in any one season, including a spectacular 21-0 season in 1999. She has led the Terps to the Final Four every year since coming to Maryland, reaching the title game an unbelievable 10 of the last 11 years. The Terrapins are now contending for an unprecedented seventh straight national title.
- ◆ Now in her 20th season of coaching collegiate athletics overall, Timchal got her start at Northwestern where she led the Wildcats to the NCAA tournament five times in nine years. Her overall record (Maryland and Northwestern) currently stands at 266-52 (.836).
- ◆ Timchal is assisted by **Gary Gait** and **Cathy Nelson**. Gait is one of the most innovative minds in all of lacrosse coaching and widely held as one of the sports greatest players of all time. A 1991 graduate of Syracuse and three-time All-American, he still plays professionally and on the World Cup circuit. Nelson was an outstanding player in her own right as she was a two-time All-American at Maryland and the tournament MVP in the Terps' run to the 1998 national title.

10+ SEASONS AT MARYLAND 190-12 (.941)

NON-CONFERENCE SUCCESS

- ◆ Despite the fact that four of the top eight seeds in this year's NCAA Tournament were ACC teams, only one -- Maryland -- remains. What that means is that this year's group of Terrapins will either finish their career with the most impressive non-conference streak possible or they will finish it with a single blemish.
- ◆ At the national championships, Maryland will look to improve on its success -- which is astounding -- against non-conference foes in the last four years. This year's group of seniors have run up a 63-0 record in their tenure versus non-conference competition. The last loss to a non-ACC foe was to Loyola in 1997.

THE AMAZING AUSSIE

- ◆ With no more than two games remaining in her amazing career, **Jen Adams** has done everything that could have been asked of her and more. In 2001, she is leading Maryland in goals (84), assists (53) and points (137) and has set the all-time collegiate points record (the original record was 420 set by Karen Emas (1981-84) of Delaware).
- ◆ With her first goal against James Madison, Adams also broke her own Maryland record for goals in a season (81) and with her game-tying goal with 1:35 left, she broke the collegiate single-season points record that she set a year ago (136).
- ◆ Entering tournament play, she was also leading NCAA Division I in points per game (6.78), second in goals per game (4.28) and third in assists per game (2.50). In addition, she was tied for 10th in draw controls per game with 2.67.
- ◆ Adams has had several outstanding single-game efforts in 2001. She has reached double digits in points six times (vs. Duke, at Penn State, at Georgetown, vs. JHU, vs. Loyola and vs. JMU) and she has scored six goals or more six times.
- ◆ Out of the seven weeks it was awarded this year, Adams was named the Atlantic Coast Conference's player of the week four times. She has also been named national player of the week by two publications (*Inside Lacrosse*, *Street & Smith's 360 Lacrosse*) twice.
- ◆ Adams has shown her all-around ability in '01 as she leads the team lead in ground balls (66) and draw controls with 58, while she is second in caused turnovers with 35.
- ◆ Of the 21 games Maryland has won this year, Adams has scored the game winner seven times and she has led the team in scoring in all but four games.
- ◆ As the Terrapins prepare for the national semifinals, Adams stands 15 goals and 14 assists from having the top single season efforts in collegiate history in each of those categories. Attainable marks in the next game include the number four spot in goals (88) and her own number two spot in assists (55).
- ◆ In the Terps' 21 games of '01, Adams has already set five career records taking the top spot in Maryland history for points, goals and assists as well as breaking the all-time collegiate marks for points and assists. She also set the school's single game record for points (against Johns Hopkins) with 12.
- ◆ In addition to her on-field exploits, Adams was the GTE Academic All-American of the Year in 2000 and is a nominee for the award again in 2001.

SCORING STREAKS

◆ A pair of Terrapin stars carried impressive scoring streaks with them into the 2001 season, both of which are still alive and date back to their freshman seasons.

◆ **Jen Adams** has scored at least one point in her last 76 games. Adams began her streak on March 31, 1998, when she scored two goals and added an assist against Temple. The last time she was held scoreless was on March 30, 1998, in the Terps' 16-4 win over Vanderbilt. In addition, she has scored at least one goal in all but 10 games of her 85-game collegiate career.

◆ **Quinn Carney** is currently in the midst of a 71-game scoring streak. Her streak began on April 23, 1998, when she totaled one assist in the Terps' 16-7 win at William & Mary. The last time Carney was held scoreless was April 11, 1998, against North Carolina in the ACC semifinals.

CARNEY MAKES COLLEGIATE CHARTS

◆ With three assists against Johns Hopkins on April 14th, All-ACC performer **Quinn Carney** hit 100-assist plateau for her career. She became just the fourth Terrapin to accomplish that feat.

◆ Last week, Carney moved into the Top 10 in collegiate lacrosse history with 108 assists (she is currently tied for 10th). She also moved into sole possession of third on Maryland's career list, trailing only **Jen Adams** and **Kelly Amonte**.

WORLD CUP BOUND

◆ Three Maryland women's lacrosse players have a shot at participating in the Women's Lacrosse World Cup this July in England.

◆ Australians **Jen Adams** and **Courtney Hobbs** have already made their country's team and will play at the tournament in High Wycombe, England.

◆ **Quinn Carney** is the lone Terp on this year's team with a shot at playing for the US Team. She is currently a member of the US "Elite Squad," from which 16 players will be chosen. In addition to Carney, nine other former Maryland players are on the "Elite" team and have a chance of making the team.

ENJOYING THE VIEW

◆ Including the 2001 preseason IWLCA poll, Maryland spent all 11 weeks atop the national polls this season. Overall, the Terrapins have now been the number one ranked team for 32 consecutive polls, a stretch that dates back to the final rankings of 1998 when the Terps captured their fourth straight NCAA title.

THREE TERPS NAMED STX ALL-STARS

◆ Three Maryland players -- **Jen Adams**, **Quinn Carney** and **Allison Comito** -- were recently named Senior All-Stars for the Division I South Region by STX for their play in the 2001 season. The trio top the list in scoring for Maryland and have accounted for 246 of the Terrapins' 425 points this year.

◆ Coach **Cindy Timchal** was selected as the South squad's coach along with Bloomsburg's Kathy Frick and Timchal will coach her players -- along with the 17 others selected to the South team -- on June 9th at the all-star game which is the feature event of the 2001 STX Festival at Johns Hopkins.

ALL-ACC HONORS

◆ At the ACC Tournament (April 20-22), four Terrapins were honored with all-conference honors. Seniors **Jen Adams**, **Quinn Carney**, **Allison Comito** and **Courtney Martinez** were all named All-ACC while Adams was tabbed as the conference's player of the year for the second straight year.

◆ In addition to Adams being picked as the ACC's top player, head coach **Cindy Timchal** was selected by her peers as coach of the year. It marked the third straight year that she has earned the honor as she has been the outright choice in 1999 and 2000, while she shared the award with Duke's Kerstin Kimel last year.

TEWAARATON TERRAPINS

◆ Two members of this year's Terp team -- **Jen Adams** and **Quinn Carney** -- have been named finalists for the inaugural Tewaaraton Award. The award is given to the top women's and men's player in the nation.

◆ Maryland placed two of its three nominees on the final ballot as senior **Allison Comito** was also among the 15 nominees. In addition to Adams and Carney, the finalists for the award are Georgetown's Sheehan Stanwick, Princeton's Julie Shaner and Duke's Kate Kaiser.

SCOUTING THE TIGERS

◆ Fifth-seeded Princeton and top-seeded Maryland have quite a history between them. Most recently, the two teams battled in College Park with the Terps coming out on top, 7-6. Last season, the duo met in the national finals with Maryland winning its sixth straight title, 16-6. In addition, Friday's meeting will be the sixth between the two teams in the Final Four with Maryland holding a 3-2 advantage going in.

- ◆ The Tigers are 14-4 in 2001 after starting the season 11-1. Princeton beat Cornell (14-4) and Dartmouth (10-4) on their road to the Final Four, but if there is a concern, it is in the names in its loss column. That is because of the Tigers' four losses this year, three have come at the hands of the other three teams left in the tournament -- Loyola (13-9, Mar. 11), Maryland (7-6, Apr. 25) and Georgetown (15-10, May 5). Their only other loss was avenged in their win over Dartmouth to advance to this weekend's play.
- ◆ The Tigers are led by head coach Chris Sailer (Harvard, '81). Sailer is in her 14th year at Princeton and owns a 180-65 record in her tenure. She led the Tigers to a 15-4 record and number two ranking a year ago.
- ◆ Princeton's leading scorer this season has been Lauren Simone who has notched 58 points behind 37 goals and 21 assists. She is one of six Tigers with 20 points or more. Princeton's second-leading scorer, Kim Smith, had the best game in the first meeting between the Tigers and Terps as she had a hat trick, followed by a pair by Simone.
- ◆ In the cage for the Tigers is Meghan McInnes who has started all 18 games this season. She has posted 117 saves versus 126 goals against for a .481 save percentage. She is allowing 7.26 goals per game in 1,042 minutes.
- ◆ **Series Info:** Maryland leads the all-time series 16-3 and has won each of the last nine meetings including a 7-6 win at College Park this year and a 16-8 win in last year's NCAA finals. Princeton's last win was in 1994 and two of its three wins against the Terps have come in the national finals (1994) or semifinals (1993).

20TH ANNIVERSARY

- ◆ This season will mark the 20-year anniversary of Maryland's first-ever national championship. That title came in 1981 as Mary-

land won the AIAW national championship with a 12-3 record. (The AIAW was the forerunner to the NCAA for competition in women's collegiate athletics.)

- ◆ The 1981 team was coached by **Sue Tyler** who spent 16 seasons with the Terps, compiling an impressive 195-61-3 record with two national titles.

TERPS FAVORITE TO REPEAT

- ◆ Maryland entered the 2001 season as the favorite to repeat -- for the sixth consecutive time -- as NCAA champion. The Terrapins have held the number one spot in each of the first two IWFLCA polls and were picked by several publications in the preseason to repeat as champ. Among the publications picking the Terps are *College Lacrosse USA*, *Inside Lacrosse*, *LaxPower* and *Sports Illustrated for Women*.
- ◆ The Terrapins entered this season having won six straight national titles. Last year, Maryland won its final 20 games and defeated Princeton in the NCAA Finals, 16-8, to claim the crown. The 2001 season marks the 20th anniversary of the University of Maryland's first women's lacrosse championship (the 1981 AIAW championship) and a repeat performance this year would mark the 10th title in school history.
- ◆ Maryland has been the No. 1 team in the nation for 32 consecutive polls, dating back to the final rankings of 1998 when the Terps' captured their fourth-straight NCAA title.

CAPTAINS

- ◆ The captains of this year's Maryland team are seniors **Jen Adams** and **Tori Wellington**. The pair were chosen after a vote was conducted by their teammates as representatives of this year's squad.

Maryland opened its 2001 season with an impressive 18-11 win over No. 4 Duke at Ludwig Field.

The Terrapins -- ranked No. 1 in the IWFLCA preseason poll -- got a brilliant 10-point performance from senior All-American and two-time Player of the Year, **Jen Adams**. Adams finished the game with four goals and a career-high tying six assists. Her six assists push her into a tie for third on the NCAA career list with 124 and the 10-point effort (the second-best of her career) moves her into the ninth spot on the NCAA career list in that category with 307.

Maryland (1-0, 1-0 ACC) used quick starts in both halves to take control of the game. **Quinn Carney** started the game with a goal on a free position shot and **Allison Comito** found the net twice to give Maryland a 3-1 lead after Duke's Lauren Gallagher mixed in a goal. At the 10:36 mark, Adams then scored her first goal -- a spectacular behind-the-back shot from about eight yards out after a nice assist from Comito. The Terps would build a 8-4 halftime lead.

In the second half, Maryland continued the onslaught as it scored six goals in the first 10 minutes of the half, staking a 14-6 lead with 20 minutes left. Of those six goals, three were accounted for by junior All-American candidate **Courtney Hobbs**, one of three Terrapins (along with Adams and Comito) to come up with a hat trick.

The Terps carried a 18-8 lead to the 10 minute mark and went into a defensive mode. In the final seven minutes, the Blue Devils netted three goals to cut the lead to seven, but time ran out on a Duke comeback. Junior Kate Kaiser had an impressive five-goal effort for the Blue Devils, but all 11 Duke scores came on individual efforts or free position shots as Maryland closed down the passing lanes.

The Terps overcame a slow start in the first half and a cold, rainy day in College Park to get a win over fifth-ranked North Carolina, 8-7.

In the win, the top-ranked Terrapins got five goals from star senior **Jen Adams**. With the five-goal effort, Adams overcame Kelly Amonte (1993-96) as Maryland's all-time leading goal scorer. Adams now has 188 goals, one more than Amonte's total of 187.

The win was not, however, an easy one for Maryland. After exchanging a pair of goals with the Tar Heels in the game's first 10 minutes, Maryland (2-0, 2-0 ACC) fell behind after a burst of UNC scoring. With 10 minutes remaining in the half, the Terps found themselves in a 5-2 hole and struggling to find their offense. Adams came up with the answer.

At 5:50, Adams scored unassisted and then followed it up just over a minute later after a nice feed from senior **Quinn Carney**. Fellow senior **Allison Comito** chipped in another at 3:11, then Adams took a quick feed from **Courtney Hobbs** after a foul and scored her third goal in the final six minutes of the half. The Terps would take a 6-5 lead into the half.

In the second half, both teams performed in much the same way that the game had begun -- battling back and forth. The difference in the second half for the Terrapins was the play of sophomore goalie and first-year starter **Alexis Venechanos**.

After not making a save in the first half, Venechanos came up with a half dozen saves in the second half -- many at close range -- in helping Maryland to victory. After Adams added two more goals in the second half, the Terps had a 8-7 lead in the final minutes and just needed to hang on. That feat was not as easy as anticipated as Maryland had what could have been a costly turnover with a minute left and UNC ended up with a free position shot with 15 seconds remaining. Venechanos was again up to the task, however, and made her final save as the clock ticked toward zero.

In the win, Maryland overcame its largest deficit since last year's Duke game to open the 2000 season. In that game, the Terps were down 8-4 before coming back and winning, 14-10.

Maryland got another superb performance from **Jen Adams** and a hat trick from **Allison Comito** as they bested the 10th-ranked Syracuse Orangewomen, 11-7, at Ludwig Field.

In the win, Adams scored three goals and distributed five assists for a total of eight points. That point total gives her 320 for her career, the most ever by a Maryland player. Adams' point total breaks the all-time mark of 319 set by former Terrapin standout Kelly Amonte (1993-96). Through three games of the '01 season, Adams has scored 23 points to lead all Maryland players.

Maryland (3-0, 2-0 ACC) got a stiff challenge from the Orangewomen (0-2) who had a strong five-goal performance from junior Carrie Soultis. The Terps opened the game with the first three goals of the contest as Adams, sophomore **Sonia Judd** and Comito all found the back of the net. But Syracuse fought back and at the 18:11 mark in the first half, the score was knotted at four.

The Terrapins would then go on a scoring run led by Adams and Comito. After freshman **Kelly Coppedge** and Adams scored to put the Terps up 6-4 at the half, Comito opened the second frame with two quick goals within the first :47. Adams added a goal a minute later and Maryland had run off five straight goals. That scoring spurt gave the Terps a 9-4 lead.

For the remaining 25 minutes, the two teams exchanged three goals to close things out at 11-7 in favor of the Terrapins. The win was Maryland's third against a Top 10 opponent this season and made it 24 wins-in-a-row (total) dating back to last year.

The Terps hit the road for the first time in 2001 and beat the University of Virginia, 8-7, to capture the regular season sweep of their Atlantic Coast Conference opponents.

Maryland got an outstanding performance from senior All-American candidate **Quinn Carney** who scored five points. Virginia came out showing a deliberate offensive strategy -- the first goal of the game was scored at 26:16 by UVA on the opening possession of the game -- and Carney was huge offensively for the Terps in rebuttal. She scored Maryland's first two goals, both on rebounds and assisted on its third and after a free position goal by **Allison Comito**, the Terps held a 4-2 lead in the first half. Virginia, however, would rattle the cage twice in the final 2:22 of the frame to knot the score at four at intermission.

As they have in every tight game this season, the Terrapins (4-0, 3-0 ACC) would come out firing to start the second half. Carney scored on a free

position shot almost eight minutes in and then assisted Comito from behind the net almost a minute later to put the Terps up, 6-4. After two Cavalier goals were matched by **Sonia Judd** (who had two on the night) and **Courtney Hobbs**, Maryland would carry that two goal lead to the eight minute mark.

The lead would shrink after UVA's Jamie Haas scored on a free position shot with 7:55 left and then it was up to the Terps' second-half sensation, **Alexis Venechanos**. The top-ranked Terrapins went on a scoring spree and beat the unranked Brown Bears, 20-9, at Ludwig Field.

In the win, senior All-American **Jen Adams** broke the all-time NCAA record for assists with her total of three which moved her career total to 133. In breaking the record, Adams killed two birds with one stone as she broke not only the NCAA record, but also the Maryland school record as the all-time mark of 132 was set by **Kelly Amonte**, who played for the Terrapins from 1993-96. With the record, Adams is now Maryland's all-time leader in assists, points and goals as she had broken the other two marks (also held by Amonte) earlier this year.

In the win over Brown (0-2), Maryland (5-0, 3-0 ACC) got scoring from everywhere as nine Terps rattled the cage and 11 got into the scoring column. Leading the way were Adams and **Quinn Carney** who had four goals apiece. Freshman **Kelly Coppedge** came up with her first collegiate hat trick as she had three goals and an assist while senior **Tori Wellington** tied her career high with three goals of her own. In addition, senior **Allison Comito** tied her career high with three assists and freshman **Julie Shank** scored the first two goals of her career.

Maryland spent most of the day in Brown's end of the field and it showed in the statistics as the Terps out-shot the Bears, 45-13. The 20 goals

were the most by a Maryland team since April 1st of last year -- a span of 17 games -- when the Terrapins scored 24 versus James Madison.

The game -- originally scheduled to take place at Ludwig Field but moved because of rain and poor field conditions -- was not only the second consecutive game in which the Terps have topped the 20-goal plateau, but also the second straight that nine Terrapins have found the back of the net in a game. Four other Maryland players had assists to make a total of 13 Terrapins in the scoring column.

Leading the way once again for Maryland (6-0, 3-0 ACC) was senior standout **Jen Adams** who scored a season-high six goals and added an assist. Freshman **Kelly Coppedge** scored four goals and had an assist, making it seven goals and nine points in her last two games. The Terps won their second road game of the season as they handed 16th-ranked Old Dominion a 13-8 loss at Foreman Field in Norfolk, Va.

With the win, Maryland moved to 7-0 on the season with all but one of its victories coming against Top 20 competition. Against the Lady Monarchs, senior All-American **Allison Comito** led the way in scoring with four goals. Comito was deadly against ODU as she missed on just one of the five shots she took in the game.

The victory was not as difficult for the Terrapins as the final score reflected. They took control in the first half and held a 5-2 lead at intermission. After Maryland bumped its lead to 8-2 just 10 minutes into the second frame, Old Dominion went on its own run to make the game respectable. Senior midfielder Dana Wisniewski went on a scoring rampage as she found the net five times in the second half, the final tally coming as the clock hit zero to end the game.

As it had in the previous three games, Maryland got it done against ODU with a balanced scoring attack. Top-ranked Maryland put together its most complete and impressive performance of the 2001 season, beating the fifth-ranked Georgetown Hoyas, 13-9, at Kehoe Field in Washington, D.C.

The Terrapins (12-0, 3-0 ACC) knew early in the contest that they were in for a battle with the Hoyas, who came into the game riding a three-game win streak and were coming off of a huge 15-9 win at North Carolina. As they did a year ago in the NCAA Tournament, Georgetown started the contest trying to slow the pace of the game and it was successful for the most part getting on the board first and limiting Maryland's touches. The game was nip-and-tuck early with GU holding the ball and the Terps making the most of their opportunities when they did touch it. Then, with the half winding down, the Terps had the ball in Georgetown's end but turned it over. As the Hoyas were heading down field with under a minute left, **Courtney Martinez** -- who was outstanding all game defensively -- stripped the ball and got it to Adams who raced for the goal and was fouled with 14 seconds in the half. On her free position attempt, Adams dished it to Comito on the right side of the goalmouth who put the shot away for a two-goal Maryland lead at intermission.

The second half saw the Terrapins increase their lead, scoring two goals in the first six minutes and basically forcing the Hoyas out of their slow-down approach. Georgetown would get as close as 9-7 in the second half, but the Terps pulled away behind goals from Adams (2), **Quinn Carney** and Comito.

Adams led the way in scoring for Maryland for the 10th time in 12 games this year as she notched her third 10-point effort with six goals and four assists. Comito added a hat trick and a pair of assists while sophomore netminder **Alexis Venechanos** made seven saves.

The Terrapins beat 19th-ranked Johns Hopkins, 24-5, at Byrd Stadium in the opening game of a twinbill with the Terrapin men's team.

In the win, **Jen Adams** set the school record for points with 12 as she had eight goals and four assists. The 12 points breaks the record of 11 set four other times (one of which was by Adams a year ago). It is also the fourth time this season that the two-time National Player of the Year has notched double-digit points in a game.

In addition to the points record, the Brighton, So. Australia native set a personal record for goals (8) and moved into second on the NCAA career points list with 392. She now trails only the total of 420 set by Karen Emas of Delaware who played from 1981-84.

Adams finished with five goals and five assists, while Carney netted five goals and two assists. Loyola's Stacey

Morlang finished the day with four goals and an assist in the losing effort.

Maryland jumped out to a 2-0 start on a pair of goals from the senior duo of Adams and Carney before Morlang started the scoring for the Greyhounds. Terrapin senior **Allison Comito** found the net for her only goal of the day to give Maryland the 3-1 lead before Morlang pulled the fourth-ranked Greyhounds within one again at the 9:31 mark on her second goal of the afternoon.

Neither team could pull more than two goals ahead, with Loyola taking their only of the day with two minutes to play in the half. Maryland reeled-off three goals in the final 1:39 of the half to enter the break up 8-7 over Loyola.

In the second half it was all Maryland with the Terps controlling the tempo and outscoring the Greyhounds 8-5. Adams was on fire in the second half, tallying four goals and adding three assists before time expired.

No. 1 Maryland won a nailbiter over fourth-ranked Dartmouth, 12-11, at Scully-Fahey Field in Hanover, N.H.

In front of 2,504 raucous fans, the Terrapins and Big Green waged what was arguably one of the most incredible wars in Maryland women's lacrosse history and it took a valiant Maryland comeback for the Terps to move to 18-0 on the season. The Terrapins got on the board first in the contest as **Allison Comito** started the game with a goal on a rebound at 26:13. Dartmouth played the same slow down pace in the first half that Maryland has seen so many times this year and 22 minutes in, the game was tied at 3-3.

After a **Quinn Carney** goal at 7:31, Dartmouth went on a run with three goals to end the first half and sent the Terps to the locker room down, 6-4. It was the first time this year that Maryland has trailed at the half.

The trouble continued for the Terps in the second half as the Big Green gave up the slow down approach and piled on three more goals in the first six minutes of the half to up their lead to five. That was when **Jen Adams** -- the two time national player of the year and this year's ACC Player of the Year -- went to work.

The senior native of Brighton, So. Australia scored five times in under 20 minutes with the fifth

score knotting the game at 11 with 4:28 remaining after Dartmouth had just staked a one-goal lead a minute earlier. The game winner came a minute-and-a-half later as All-ACC defender **Courtney Martinez** scored her second goal of the year on a free position shot with 2:51 left. The Terps won the draw on the ensuing face off and ran out all but the final seven seconds of the clock, at which time the Big Green was too far from the Maryland goal to get a shot.

With her seven points, Adams moved to within two points of becoming the most prolific scorer in the history of women's collegiate lacrosse.

The top-ranked Terps beat Harvard University at Jordan Field in Cambridge, Mass., 14-4. With the win, the Terrapins closed out the 2001 regular season with an 19-0 record (3-0, ACC).

With the 19-0 mark, the 2001 Maryland team became the sixth in school history to run the table in the regular season. The 1980, 1994, 1995, 1996 and 1999 teams all accomplished the feat, while the '95, '96 and '99 teams went on to continue the run through the postseason as well.

At Harvard, the Terps got off to a slow start but overcame their early sluggishness quickly. After watching the Crimson open up with a 2-0 lead in the game's first 10 minutes, coach **Cindy Timchal** called a timeout that seemed to spark some change in the Terrapins. From that point on, Maryland would go on to outscore the Crimson 14-2 en route to another impressive win.

In the victory, senior **Allison Comito** led the way with four goals and an assist. Fellow senior **Quinn Carney** also scored five points as she had a hat trick and a pair of assists while **Courtney Hobbs** joined the five-point club with a goal and four assists. For Hobbs, the four assists marked a career single-game high.

In addition to the exploits of Comito, Carney and Hobbs, **Meredith Egan** had a nice game with two goals and two assists. One of the most impressive efforts of the day, however, came from the Terps' backup goalie, **Virginia Solomon**, who spelled starter **Alexis Venechanos** with under 20 minutes remaining in the game. Though the game was well in hand, Solomon looked strong making

six saves, causing a turnover and scooping up three ground balls.

The top-seeded Maryland women's lacrosse team advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals in a 23-9 win over 16th-seeded Monmouth at Ludwig Field. The Terrapins have now won 17 straight NCAA Tournament games and scored a team tournament best 23 goals in doing so, but the story of the day was standout **Jen Adams**.

Adams, a senior native of Brighton, So. Australia, became the most prolific scorer in the history of collegiate women's lacrosse as her second point of the game -- an assist to Allison Comito just over four minutes in -- put her one point ahead of Karen Emas, Delaware's star from 1981-84. Emas' record was 420 and Adams began distancing herself from the mark early as she finished the game with four goals and a career-high seven assists to lead all scorers with 11 points. Her 11 points is her most in a postseason game and gives her a total of 430 heading into the next round.

In the game, Monmouth came out and proved tougher than its seeding indicated. The Hawks took a 2-0 lead early and after the Terps ran off six straight, Monmouth battled back to knot the score at six apiece. As the half came to an end, the Hawks found themselves trailing the six-time defending NCAA champions by just a goal (8-7).

The second half began with the Terrapins on fire. Maryland ran off five goals in the frame's first eight minutes led by a pair from **Allison Comito**. After two Monmouth goals, the Terrapins held the Hawks scoreless the rest of the game while scoring 10 goals of their own to run away with it. Maryland's success in the second half was all about defense as it held the Hawks to a total of four shots and just one in the final 19 minutes.

Aside from Adams, the Terrapins were led by Comito (5 goals, 1 assist) and **Quinn Carney** (4 goals, 2 assists), but a pair of Maryland players may have given the most impressive performance's aside from Adams'. **Meredith Egan** scored a career-high five goals (nearly half of her season total of 12) and **Virginia Solomon** came off the bench to post eight saves in goal in just over 32 minutes of work. For Solomon, the game marked the sec-

ond in a row that she has been strong in relief as she had six saves versus zero goals at Harvard.

The Terps advanced to the NCAA women's lacrosse Final Four for the 12th-straight time with a come-from-behind 11-9 win over ninth-seeded and ninth-ranked James Madison.

The Terrapins, now 21-0 and winners of 41 straight dating back to last year, had their second scare of the year (the first being at Dartmouth) as James Madison successfully slowed the game down after Maryland had jumped to an early 5-1 lead. After falling behind early, the Dukes held the Terps scoreless for a total of 26:23 (from 22:47 in the first half to 26:36 in the second) while scoring five goals of their own to close out the first half. JMU held a 6-5 lead at the break, marking just the second time this season that Maryland had trailed at the half (again, Dartmouth being the other).

The Terps came out in the second half, however, and rattled off three goals of their own while holding the Dukes scoreless for the frame's first 15 minutes. With Maryland up 8-6, JMU then scored three goals before the 10-minute mark and surged ahead, 9-8. The Dukes then slowed the game down even more, successfully running clock while Maryland waited for a scoring opportunity. Thanks to junior **Meredith Egan**, that chance finally came.

With just over 2:00 remaining, Egan stripped the ball from a JMU player on offense while **Quinn Carney** scooped up the ground ball and helped Maryland get in its offensive set. Then, with 1:35 left on the clock, **Jen Adams** escaped two defenders on the right side of the goal mouth then found the back of the net with a backhand to tie the game at 9-9. Egan then came up big again, controlling the ensuing draw, and the Terps went down to set for a game-winning shot attempt.

With the clock winding down, Carney made a charge at the left side of the cage but lost the ball. In the mad scramble to maintain possession, a Madison defender accidentally scooped the ball past goalie Jen Corradini and into the net for what ended up being the game winner at 0:18 remaining. The Terps tacked on another quick goal for good measure at 0:11 as **Courtney Hobbs** scored on a fast break opportunity.

In the game, Adams scored three goals and added an assist for four points total. Her three goals gave her 84 for the season, a new Maryland single season record, and her four points set the single-season collegiate mark as she now has 137. Both records she broke were her own from a year ago. Also noteworthy was the continued strong play of backup goalie **Virginia Solomon**. Solomon came on in relief again today and made eight saves versus five goals allowed. In the last three games, Solomon has seen increased action and her numbers have been strong (22 svcs., 10 GA).
