TERPS ADVANCE TO NCAA TOURNAMENT FOR 17TH STRAIGHT YEAR

- The Terrapins finished the season with a 12-8 record and advanced to the NCAA Tournament. It was Maryland's 17th-straight appearance in the postseason. Fifth-seeded North Carolina eliminated the Terps, 9-6, in Chapel Hill, N.C., in the first round.

- The Terps finished fourth in the ACC with a 2-3 record. Maryland lost in the semifinals of the ACC Tournament to Duke at M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore, Md. Maryland beat Boston College in the first round, 21-8.

- Maryland won at least 10 games for the 17th-straight year, and for the 29th time in the last 30 years.

- Eleven of Maryland's 17 opponents were ranked at the time the teams played. The Terps were 3-8 in those games.

- The Terps posted an 8-3 record in College Park.

- Four Maryland women's lacrosse players were named to the IWLCA/US Lacrosse All-America teams, including second team selections Becky Clipp, Delia Cox, and Kelly Kasper. Krista Pellizzi was named to the third team. Cox was a second team *Inside Lacrosse* All-American while Clipp and Kasper were third teamers.

- Five Maryland Terrapins were named to the 2006 All-ACC team. Becky Clipp, Delia Cox, Katie Doolittle, Kelly Kasper, and Krista Pellizzi were all named to the 16-member team.

- Three players earned ACC Player of the Week honors throughout the 2006 season: Delia Cox, Kelly Kasper, and Krista Pellizzi all earned the honor during the year. Kasper was one of three student-athletes in the conference to earn the honor twice.

- Delia Cox was named to the ACC All-Tournament team after scoring 10 goals and two assists in two games.

- Kelly Kasper scored a goal in every game and also caused a turnover in every contest. She has scored a goal in 26-consecutive games dating back to 2005. Katie Doolittle recorded a groundball in all but one game and scored in 15 of the 20 games. Casey Magor notched a point in 17 of the Terps' 20 games. Krista Pellizzi netted a goal in 17 games and had a streak of scoring in 15-straight in the middle of the season.

- Eight players started all 20 games for Maryland in 2006: Allie Buote, Becky Clipp, Lauren Cohen, Delia Cox, Katie Doolittle, Kelly Kasper, Casey Magor, Krista Pellizzi.

- Kelly Kasper and Krista Pellizzi both had the best game of their careers against Virginia Tech as both set new personal bests for goals, assists, and points in a game. Kasper finished the game with five goals and four assists for nine points and Pellizzi recorded five goals and three assists for eight points.

- The season high for points was nine by Kelly Kasper against Virginia Tech. The season high for goals in a game was six by Delia Cox against Dartmouth. The season high for assists in a game was four by Kasper.



- Opponents converted only 31 percent of their free-position shots against the Terrapins (34-108).

- Four Maryland alums led their respective programs into the NCAA Tournament as head coaches. Kelly Amonte-Hiller of Northwestern, Kerstin Kimmel of Duke, Stanford's Michelle Uihfelder and Dartmouth's Amy Patton each guided their teams into the field of 16. Amonte-Hiller led her team to the NCAA title for the second-straight season.

- Terp seniors Delia Cox, Molly McCourt, and Brooke Richards all played their final game against North Carolina in the NCAA Tournament First Round.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. -- Top-ranked Northwestern overcame a 4-0 first half deficit to defeat ninth-ranked Maryland, 13-8, at the Lacrosse and Field Hockey Complex. Delia Cox scored three goals and added three assists in the loss.

The Terps roared out of the gates with a 4-0 run to start the first half. Cox helped spark the run with an assist on the game's first goal by Casey Magor, and after a Kelly Kasper goal, scored a pair on her own.

The Wildcats regrouped, though, and closed the half with a 7-0 run of its own. Kristen Kjellman and Aly Josephs each scored two goals during the run as Northwestern took a 7-4 lead at the half.

Maryland pulled back into the game after starting the second half strong. Cox scored unassisted just a minute into the second half and assisted on a Kasper goal to pull the Terps to within one goal with just over 26 minutes left in the game.

The Terps won the ensuing draw control, but were unable to capitalize on the possession. The Wildcats took the opportunity to push their lead to 9-6 after Laura Glassanos scored a pair of goals just 17 seconds apart.

Magor won the next draw, and the Terps took advantage with a goal by Krista Pellizzi to make the score 9-7. Maryland again won the draw, but turned the ball over in the offensive end. Lindsey Munday then scored a free-position goal at 17:42 to give Northwestern a 10-7 lead.

The Wildcats won the next draw and Hannah Nielson scored on an assist from Kristen Kjellman. Kjellman won the next draw, but the two teams exchanged chances before Pellizzi scored her second goal of the day to pull the Terps to 11-8 with over 13 minutes left.

Northwestern controlled possession the rest of the way and added scores from Meredith Frank and Kjellman to end the game.



COLLEGE PARK, Md. -- Brooke Richards and Katie Princiotta each registered hat tricks and the Terp defense smothered Ohio as No. 9 Maryland defeated the Bobcats, 12-3, Sunday afternoon at the Lacrosse & Field Hockey Complex. Seven different players found the back of the net for the Terps, and the Terp defense forced 19 turnovers in the win.

Richards finished the game with four points on three goals and an assist. Delia Cox and Kelly Kasper also helped pace the offense with four points each. Kasper also added five caused turnovers in the winning effort.

Richards struck first for the Terps on their third possession of the game on an assist for Kasper at 27:49. Just under two minutes later, though, the Bobcats would even the score on a free-position shot by Kiersten McLouth.

Princiotta scored unassisted at 23:11, and Kasper scored on a free-position shot at 19:52 to give the Terps a 3-1 lead it would not relinquish. Maryland took a 4-1 lead into halftime.

The Terps started the second half hot offensively as Richards scored twice in the opening two minutes and Cox added another quick score to stretch Maryland's lead to 7-1 with 27:22 left in the game. Casey Magor added another goal for the Terps on an assist from Cox before Ohio ended a 32-minute scoring drought on a goal by Shannon Hadaway in the game's 37th minute.

Ohio was just 14-24 on clear attempts, and turned the ball over 29 times, compared to just 17 turnovers for Maryland. In addition to Kasper's five caused turnovers, Maeve McKew forced three and four other players had two caused turnovers. Maryland also had the edge in groundballs, 33-26.



COLLEGE PARK, Md. -- Delia Cox scored a game-high five goals to help lead the fifth-ranked Maryland Terrapins past George Mason, 13-6, in women's lacrosse action Wednesday night in College Park. The Terps broke the game open with a late run in the first half and went on to out-score the Patriots 8-4 in the second to collect the victory.

The Terps (2-1) were up 2-0 midway through the first on goals from Cox and Kelly Kasper despite having three goals taken off the board on crease violations. The Maryland defense helped make the two-goal lead stand, though, courtesy of outstanding play in goal by Allie Buote. Buote made eight saves in the first half, including three on free-position shots. The Patriots did not get on the board until Melissa Curry connected on a pass to Laura King with just under five minutes to play in the half.

The Terps responded by scoring three goals in just 1:26 to pad the cushion to 5-1, but Curry tallied another GMU goal with :38 seconds left to make the margin 5-2 at the half.

Maryland then broke the game open with a 4-1 run in the first eight minutes of the second half, sparked by Krista Pellizzi and Casey Magor who each notched a goal and an assist in that span. George Mason's Sarah Bryant would make the score 9-4 with her second goal of the night, but that was as close as the Patriots would get. Cox scored two of the game's next four goals, and Katie Princiotta and Brooke Richards would add the others.

Kasper and Pellizzi each finished with three points. Katie Doolittle added a pair of goals, and for the third straight game, Magor scored a goal and an assist. Magor and Cox also helped Maryland to a distinct 13-8 advantage in draw controls.

The Terrapin defense helped force 13 of the Patriots' 27 turnovers, and the Patriots were just 14-24 on clears.

Durham, N.C. -- The No. 2 Duke Blue Devils rallied from an early deficit and held off a strong comeback effort from the No. 5 Maryland Terrapins to win 9-7 Saturday afternoon at Koskinen Stadium. Delia Cox scored three goals and Kelly Kasper netted a pair to help lead the Terps offensively, and Allie Buote came up with a career-high 10 saves to hold the Blue Devils to nine goals in the game.

The Terps raced out of the gates with a 4-1 lead in the first 10 minutes of action. Cox registered two of those scores, and Kasper and Brooke Richards added the others. Duke then rallied for six-straight goals to close the half, including three in a 1:44 span from 7:30-5:46 in the first half. The Blue Devils would go into the half up 7-4.

Duke continued to stretch its lead in the second with a goals in the 31st and 33rd minutes. However, that would be the last tally the Blue Devils would score in the game. The Terps, though, were unable to mount a charge, in large part due to the play of Duke goalie Megan Huether, who stopped several Terrapin shots from point-blank range. Maryland started its rally in the 50th minute when Krista Pellizzi converted a free-position goal. Duke won the ensuing draw control, but Katie Princiotta forced a turnover and Kasper scooped up the loose ball and ripped a shot from outside the 8-meter arc for the score.

Duke again controlled the draw, and after a prolonged possession, the Terps got the ball after an errant Katie Chrest shot was picked up by Lauren Cohen. Cox converted on the offensive end to make the score 9-7 with just over three minutes left.

The Blue Devils again won a crucial draw control, and tried to stall, but Martha Raver intercepted a pass and gave the Terps another chance. However, Maryland turned the ball over and Duke managed to run out the clock to hold on for the win.

The Terp defense managed to hold 2005 Tewaaraton winner Katie Chrest to just one goal on the day. Rachel Sanford and Carolyn Davis scored hat tricks for the Blue Devils.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. -- The No. 5 Maryland women's lacrosse team got hat tricks from Delia Cox, Kelly Kasper and Krista Pellizzi as the Terps defeated Richmond, 12-9, Saturday afternoon at the Lacrosse & Field Hockey Complex. The Terps led nearly the entire game, but had to withstand a late Spider rally to come away with the victory.

Pellizzi led all scorers with a career-high five points against Richmond. Cox had four points on a three goals and an assist, and Kasper added three goals to lead the Terps offensively. The Maryland defense held its opponent to under 10 goals for the fourth consecutive game. Allie Buote made six saves to pick up the win in goal for the Terps.

With the game tied 1-1, the Terps staged a 3-0 run, and would never trail the rest of the way. Cox, Kasper and Pellizzi netted goals to give the Terps a 4-1 cushion with just under 24 minutes left in the half. Maryland took a 7-3 advantage into the locker rooms.

The Terps won the opening draw of the second half, but a quick turnover turned into a Mandy Friend goal on the other end for Richmond less than a minute into the second half. Maryland would then go on an important 4-0 run over the game's next 10 minutes to take an 11-4 lead with just under 20 minutes left in the game.

After a Spider timeout, Richmond gained some momentum with a 3-0 run of its own. Mandy Friend registered two of those scores, while Caroline McGuire converted the other, making the score 11-7 with 15:08 remaining.

After another Terp goal to make it 12-7 with 8:27 left in the game, Richmond won the next two draws and turned those possessions into scores on goals from McGuire and Mandy Friend to pull within three with two minutes left in the game. However, Cox came up with the next draw control, and the Terps were successfully able to hold onto the ball and run out the clock.

The Terps would cut the Tar Heel lead to two goals three times in the second half, the last time coming when Cox made it 8-6 with her fourth goal of the day with 12:40 left in the game. Maryland had two offensive chances to get back to within one, but could not find the

back of the net. After a Terp turnover in their offensive end, UNC got the ball downfield and Brooke Dieringer scored her third goal of the afternoon with just over six minutes left, helping to seal the Tar Heel victory.

Sophomore goalie Allie Buote finished the game with eight saves, including six in the second half. North Carolina was 3-6 on free-position shots, while the Terps were 0-2. The six goals scored by the Terps was the lowest this season.
