TOP-RANKED TERRAPINS HEAD TO ACC CHAMPIONSHIPS UNBLEMISHED

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The University of Maryland women's lacrosse team heads to Orlando, Fla., this weekend for the 2001 Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Lacrosse Tournament. The tournament is part of the ACC Springfest -- which features conference championships in men's and women's lacrosse, track & field, golf and tennis -- and it will take place at Disney's Wide World of Sports Complex.

The Terrapins are the tournament's No. 1 seed by way of their perfect conference record in the regular season. They will face off against fourth-seeded Virginia (0-3) in the tourney's opening game on Friday at 1:00 p.m. while second-seeded Duke (2-1) will square off with fourth-seeded North Carolina (1-2) at 3:30. The winners will play in a televised final at noon on Sunday.

Maryland (13-0, 3-0 ACC) enters the tournament playing its best lacrosse of the season after coming off of a week that saw it conquer four Top 20 teams in the span of seven days. After beating then 12th-ranked James Madison on Sunday, April 8, the Terps beat No. 9 William & Mary, No. 5 Georgetown (in Washington, D.C.) and No. 19 Johns Hopkins. In addition, Maryland's average margin of victory in the four games was over 11 goals (17.5 - 6.3).

In the Hopkins game, the Terrapins were challenged early but rattled off 16 unanswered goals in the second half to hand the Blue Jays a 24-5 defeat. **Jen Adams** set the school record for points in a game with 12, set a personal record for goals in a game with eight, and moved into the number two spot on the all-time NCAA points chart with 392. Adams is on pace to become the most prolific scorer in collegiate history by the end of the regular season.

With last week's 4-0 run, Maryland pushed its 2001 season-opening win streak to 13 and made it 33-in-a-row overall dating back to last year. Maryland's last loss came on March 5th of last year and it was its only defeat in the team's last 63 outings.

A LOOK BACK AT ADAMS' AMAZING WEEK

- Last week, senior **Jen Adams** had what may have been the most amazing week in the history of Maryland lacrosse. In the four games beginning on Sunday, April 8, versus James Madison, the two-time National Player of the Year notched 37 points (25 goals and 12 assists).
- Adams was Maryland's leading scorer in all four games (she has led the Terps in all but two games this year) and started the string with six goals and three assists versus JMU.
- Against William & Mary, the Brighton, So. Australia native had her "worst" game of the week, producing five goals and an assist.
- At No. 5 Georgetown, Adams scored almost half of the Terrapin's goals (6) and added four assists for her third double-digit points effort of the season. Among her six scores were a spinning backhand in front of the net and a shot from over 20 yards out that caught the goalie out of position.
- If her accomplishments coming into the weekend were not enough, Adams topped it all off by having the best game of her career. Against Johns Hopkins at Byrd Stadium and in front of a local television audience, Adams scored a career-high eight goals and added four assists to set the Maryland school record with 12 points.
- For her accomplishments, Adams was named National Player of the Week by *Street & Smith's 360lacrosse.com* and *Inside Lacrosse* magazine, as well as conference player of the week by the ACC.

HEAD COACH CINDY TIMCHAL

- Head coach **Cindy Timchal** is in her 11th season at the helm of the Maryland women's lacrosse program. In her 10-plus years, she has established one of the most dominant teams in all of collegiate athletics as

the Terrapins are 182-12 (.938), have earned 10 NCAA Tournament bids and have taken the crown seven times.

◆ Timchal was selected last year as the IWLLCA South Region Coach of the Year as well as Co-ACC Coach of the Year. She has been chosen as National Coach of the Year twice and has coached 36 Terrapins to All-American status.

◆ From the time of her arrival, Timchal has lost no more than three games in any one season, including a spectacular 21-0 season in 1999. She has led the Terps to the Final Four every year since coming to Maryland, reaching the title game an unbelievable nine of the last 10 years. This year, the Terrapins will contend for an unprecedented seventh straight national title.

◆ Now in her 20th season of coaching collegiate athletics overall, Timchal got her start at Northwestern where she led the Wildcats to the NCAA tournament five times in nine years. Her overall record (Maryland and Northwestern) currently stands at 258-52.

◆ Timchal is assisted by **Gary Gait** and **Cathy Nelson**. Gait is one of the most innovative minds in all of lacrosse coaching and widely held as one of the sports greatest players of all time. A 1991 graduate of Syracuse and three-time All-American, he still plays professionally and on the World Cup circuit. Nelson was an outstanding player in her own right as she was a two-time All-American at Maryland and the tournament MVP in the Terps' run to the 1998 national title.

TERPS ALL-TIME AT THE ACCs

◆ Maryland has won three of the previous four Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Lacrosse Tournaments, with their lone stumble coming in a 12-10 loss to North Carolina in 1998. In each of those seasons, however, the Terrapins went on to claim the NCAA title.

DEFENSE NO LONGER IN QUESTION

◆ Entering the 2001 season, there were few questions regarding the Terps and their needs. They returned arguably the strongest set of offensive players in the country (Adams, Comito, Carney, Hobbs, etc...) and there was no doubt that they would score. One of the lone questions was the defense as it lost National Defender of the Year Tonia Porras and National Goaltender of the Year (and current Terp volunteer assistant), **Alex Kahoe**. The Terrapins have answered those questions in resounding fashion.

◆ Through 13 games, Maryland is allowing an average of 6.15 goals per game, its lowest total since 1997. That year the team allowed 5.95 goals per contest but only scored 11.95 per game. This season, the Terps have averaged 15.69 goals per game.

- ◆ The 1996 season is the only year in recent lore that the Terrapins have had a better scoring differential as they outscored their opposition by 10.79 goals per game (largely due to a 3.63 goals against average). This season, Maryland is outscoring its opponents by 9.54 goals per game (15.69-6.15).
- ◆ Although the play of sophomore and first-year netminder **Alexis Venechanos** has been solid and has steadily improved as the year has progressed, the name of the game has been defense for the Terps. A comparison of the shot chart is most telling as Maryland has averaged 32.9 shots per game while holding its foes to 17 per contest.
- ◆ In their last three games, the Terps have held their opponents to an average of 12.3 shots per game.

ADAMSON PACE

- ◆ Through 13 games, **Jen Adams** has done all that has been expected of her and more for the Terrapins. The two-time defending National Player of the Year, Adams is leading Maryland (and the ACC) in goals (58), assists (37) and points (95) and is on pace to set the NCAA record for points by the end of the regular season. At her current pace of 7.3 points per game, Adams would enter the last game of the regular season (at Harvard) with 428 career points, seven better than the NCAA record of Karen Emas.
- ◆ Adams now stands second on the NCAA's all-time points list after breaking the career assist record early this season. The senior now needs just 29 points to become the all-time leading scorer in collegiate history.
- ◆ In the Terps' 13 games of '01, Adams has already set four career records taking the top spot in Maryland history for points, goals and assists as well as breaking the NCAA's all-time mark for assists. She also set the school's single game record for points (against Johns Hopkins) with 12.
- ◆ In addition to her exploits in the record books, Adams has had several outstanding single-game efforts in 2001. She has reached double digits in points four times (vs. Duke, at Penn State, at Georgetown and vs. JHU) and she has scored six goals or more five times.
- ◆ Adams entered the 2001 season as the favorite to claim National Player of the Year honors for the third straight year, as well as her third year as an All-American. She was selected as the favorite for Player of the Year by *Inside Lacrosse*, *Lacrosse Magazine* and *Sports Illustrated for Women*, and she earned preseason first team All-American honors from *Inside Lacrosse*, *College Lacrosse USA* and *LaxPower*.
- ◆ The Australian native finished the 2000 season as the NCAA's Division I leader in points

per game (6.18), goals (81) and assists (55). Her totals for points (136), assists and goals were all single season records at Maryland and put her in good shape to own the school's career records in all three categories.

- ◆ In seven weeks of play this season, Adams has been named the Atlantic Coast Conference's player of the week four times and has been named national player of the week by two publications (*Inside Lacrosse*, *Street & Smith's 360 Lacrosse*) twice.
- ◆ In addition to her on-field exploits, Adams was the GTE Academic All-American of the Year in 2000.

SCORING STREAKS

- ◆ A pair of Terrapin stars carried impressive scoring streaks with them into the 2001 season, both of which are still alive and date back to their freshman seasons.
- ◆ **Jen Adams** has scored at least one point in her last 69 games. Adams began her streak on March 31, 1998, when she scored two goals and added an assist against Temple. The last time she was held scoreless was on March 30, 1998, in the Terps' 16-4 win over Vanderbilt. In addition, she has scored at least one goal in all but 10 games of her 77-game collegiate career.
- ◆ **Quinn Carney** is currently in the midst of a 63-game scoring streak. Her streak began on April 23, 1998, when she totaled one assist in the Terps' 16-7 win at William & Mary. The last time Carney was held scoreless was April 11, 1998, against North Carolina in the ACC semifinals.

CARNEY HITS CENTURY MARK

- ◆ With three assists against Johns Hopkins, All-American candidate **Quinn Carney** hit 100-assist plateau for her career. She became just the fourth Terrapin to accomplish that feat.
- ◆ Carney has been the Terps' top all-around player this year with the exception of Jen Adams and her numbers speak volumes. Through 13 games, the senior has scored 22 goals, notched 17 assists, scooped up 31 ground balls, caused 21 turnovers, controlled 27 draws and taken about 90 percent of the Terrapins' draws. In each of those categories, she ranks in the top four on the team.

MARTINEZ PLAYING WELL

- ◆ Senior **Courtney Martinez** has been one of the Terrapins' leaders this year from a defensive standpoint, despite the fact that she has had to fend off the injury bug. The Towson, Md., native started the season overcoming a knee injury and she recently

injured her ankle, though she is not expected to miss any playing time from the injury.

◆ After starting the year as a reserve, Martinez has since started 10 straight games and has been stellar on defense. Despite not starting those first three games, she has worked her way into the team lead in caused turnovers with 31, she is tied for second on the squad in ground balls with 35 and is fifth on the team in draw controls with 11.

◆ Though she spends most of her time on defense, Martinez is not lacking as an offensive threat. She scored a goal against UMBC and has dished out three assists as well.

WORLD CUP TERPS

◆ Three Maryland women's lacrosse players have a shot at participating in the Women's Lacrosse World Cup this July in England.

◆ Australians **Jen Adams** and **Courtney Hobbs** have already made their country's team and will play at the tournament in High Wycombe, England.

◆ **Quinn Carney** is the lone Terp on this year's team with a shot at playing for the US Team. She is currently a member of the US "Elite Squad," from which 16 players will be chosen. In addition to Carney, nine other former Maryland players are on the "Elite" team and have a chance of making the team.

ENJOYING THE VIEW

◆ Including the 2001 preseason IWLC poll, Maryland has been atop of the national rankings for eight straight weeks. The Terps have now been the number one ranked team for 30 consecutive polls, a stretch that dates back to the final rankings of 1998 when the Terps captured their fourth straight NCAA title.

TEWAARATON TERRAPINS

◆ Three members of this year's Terp team have been nominated for the inaugural Tewaaraton Award. The award is given to the top women's and men's player in the nation.

◆ Among the 15 women nominated for this year's award are Terrapins **Jen Adams**, **Quinn Carney** and **Allison Comito**.

SCOUTING THE ACCTOURNAMENT

#2 Seed Duke

◆ The Blue Devils enter this year's tournament as the hottest team excluding the Terps. Duke (11-2, 2-1 ACC) has won eight straight games coming in including big games at Georgetown (8-7) and Virginia (14-10). Their lone losses of 2001 have come at the hands of last year's NCAA finalists -- Princeton and Maryland.

◆ The Blue Devils -- who are ranked fourth in the latest IWLC poll -- are lead by head coach Kerstin Kimel, a 1993 graduate of Maryland who is in her sixth season with the team. She has a record of 56-40 at Duke. Prior to taking over at Duke in 1996, Kimel spent one year as the head coach at Davidson.

◆ Duke returned nine of 12 starters from last year's team. Its top two players this season have been sophomore Lauren Gallagher and junior Kate Kaiser. Gallagher (40) has notched one more point this year than Kaiser (39), but Kaiser has two more goals (31-29).

◆ **Series Info** : Maryland leads the all-time series, 6-1, and took this year's meeting by an 18-11 margin. The Terps lone defeat in the series was a 10-6 loss at Durham in 1998.

#3 Seed North Carolina

◆ North Carolina comes into this weekend's tournament having been the team that gave Maryland its biggest scare this season as it battled the Terps to the end in an 8-7 loss. UNC is currently ranked sixth by the IWLC and has a 9-4 overall record (1-2 ACC). The Tar Heels' lone loss in their last seven games came to Georgetown on April 7th (14-9).

◆ Jenny Slingluff Levy (Virginia, '92) is in her sixth season with UNC and has put together a fine 70-28 record during her tenure. She has led the Heels to two NCAA Final Fours in her five previous years with the program.

◆ North Carolina won the ACC regular season last year with a 2-1 record as they handed the Terps their only defeat of the season on March 5 in Chapel Hill. The game was a 14-13 triple overtime win in game two of the 2000 season.

◆ The Tar Heels returned half (6) of their starters from last year's team. They have been led this season by junior Kellie Thompson who has racked up 46 points (35 goals, 11 assists).

◆ One name on the Tar Heel roster that may ring a bell to Terrapin fans is that of 13-game starter Nicole Foran. Foran is a midfielder and the sister of Maryland's starting defender, **Tara Foran**.

◆ **Series Info** : Maryland leads the all-time series, 7-3. The two teams split last year while Maryland won the lone meeting between the teams this season, 8-7, in College Park.

#4 Seed Virginia

◆ The Terps and Cavaliers square off for the second time this year on Friday. Virginia is 8-5 (0-3 ACC) this season and ranked ninth in the latest IWLC poll. The Cavs have won four of their last five games.

◆ Head coach Julie Myers (Virginia, '90) has run up a 81-28 record in her five-plus years in Charlottesville.

- ◆ Though they are on a roll of late, Virginia's struggles have come against ranked opponents in 2001. In eight games versus ranked competition, the Cavs have won just three times with the most significant win of the lot coming against then ninth-ranked Syracuse on March 3rd. On a positive note, they have not been beaten badly all season as their largest margin of defeat was just four in a 14-10 loss to Duke.
- ◆ The Cavaliers' have been led in scoring this season by Lauren Aumiller. The Baltimore native has scored 46 points on 33 goals and 13 assists. Jamie Haas and Molly Cangemi are second on the team in points with 37.
- ◆ **Series Info**: Maryland leads the all-time series, 25-7. The Terrapins have won each of the last 11 meetings while Virginia put up a strong fight in this year's 8-7 loss in Charlottesville. In that game, the Terps and Cavaliers were tied at the half marking the only game this year that the Terrapins did not lead at intermission.

COMITO MOVING UP THE CHARTS

- ◆ Somewhat lost in the shuffle of Jen Adams' scoring sprees and record making has been the outstanding play of senior **Allison Comito**, who is making her way up the Maryland scoring charts as well.
- ◆ Comito, who is currently second on the team in scoring with 51 points (28 goals and 23 assists), recently made her way up to third on the Terrapins' all-time list in goals and into fourth in points. In the last few weeks, she has knocked her career totals up to 160 goals and 243 points, surpassing such Terrapin greats along the way as Christie Jenkins, Sascha Newmarch and current Maryland assistant coach **Cathy Nelson**.
- ◆ Midway into the season, Comito has found her stride and is again posting All-American numbers. In the Terrapins' last nine games she has accounted for 36 points (19 goals and 17 assists).

NCAA ASSIST RECORD FALLS

- ◆ In Maryland's 20-4 win over Brown (3/17), **Jen Adams** scored four goals and distributed three assists to lead all Terps with seven points. More notable, however, was the fact that Adams' third assist of the day was the 133rd of her career. That total broke both the Maryland and the NCAA records held by former Terrapin great Kelly Amonte (1993-96) who had 132.

- ◆ Adams is now at the top of the Maryland career charts for points, assists and goals. The next big record that could fall to the Australian native is the all-time NCAA points record as she currently stands second and needs 29 points to move to the top.

CAPTAINS

- ◆ The captains of this year's Maryland team are seniors **Jen Adams** and **Tori Wellington**. The pair were chosen after a vote was conducted by their teammates as representatives of this year's squad.

20TH ANNIVERSARY

- ◆ This season will mark the 20-year anniversary of Maryland's first-ever national championship. That title came in 1981 as Maryland won the AIAW national championship with a 12-3 record. (The AIAW was the forerunner to the NCAA for competition in women's collegiate athletics.)
- ◆ The 1981 team was coached by **Sue Tyler** who spent 16 seasons with the Terps, compiling an impressive 195-61-3 record with two national titles.

TERPS FAVORITE TO REPEAT

- ◆ Maryland entered the 2001 season as the favorite to repeat -- for the sixth consecutive time -- as NCAA champion. The Terrapins have held the number one spot in each of the first two IWLCA polls and were picked by several publications in the preseason to repeat as champ. Among the publications picking the Terps are *College Lacrosse USA*, *Inside Lacrosse*, *LaxPower* and *Sports Illustrated for Women*.
- ◆ The Terrapins entered this season having won six straight national titles. Last year, Maryland won its final 20 games and defeated Princeton in the NCAA Finals, 16-8, to claim the crown. The 2001 season marks the 20th anniversary of the University of Maryland's first women's lacrosse championship (the 1981 AIAW championship) and a repeat performance this year would mark the 10th title in school history.
- ◆ Maryland has been the No. 1 team in the nation for 30 consecutive polls, dating back to the final rankings of 1998 when the Terps' captured their fourth-straight NCAA title.

Maryland opened its 2001 season with an impressive 18-11 win over No. 4 Duke at Ludwig Field.

The Terrapins -- ranked No. 1 in the IWFLCA preseason poll -- got a brilliant 10-point performance from senior All-American and two-time Player of the Year, **Jen Adams**. Adams finished the game with four goals and a career-high tying six assists. Her six assists push her into a tie for third on the NCAA career list with 124 and the 10-point effort (the second-best of her career) moves her into the ninth spot on the NCAA career list in that category with 307.

Maryland (1-0, 1-0 ACC) used quick starts in both halves to take control of the game. **Quinn Carney** started the game with a goal on a free position shot and **Allison Comito** found the net twice to give Maryland a 3-1 lead after Duke's Lauren Gallagher mixed in a goal. At the 10:36 mark, Adams then scored her first goal -- a spectacular behind-the-back shot from about eight yards out after a nice assist from Comito. The Terps would build a 8-4 halftime lead.

In the second half, Maryland continued the onslaught as it scored six goals in the first 10 minutes of the half, staking a 14-6 lead with 20 minutes left. Of those six goals, three were accounted for by junior All-American candidate **Courtney Hobbs**, one of three Terrapins (along with Adams and Comito) to come up with a hat trick.

The Terps carried a 18-8 lead to the 10 minute mark and went into a defensive mode. In the final seven minutes, the Blue Devils netted three goals to cut the lead to seven, but time ran out on a Duke comeback. Junior Kate Kaiser had an impressive five-goal effort for the Blue Devils, but all 11 Duke scores came on individual efforts or free position shots as Maryland closed down the passing lanes.

The Terps overcame a slow start in the first half and a cold, rainy day in College Park to get a win over fifth-ranked North Carolina, 8-7.

In the win, the top-ranked Terrapins got five goals from star senior **Jen Adams**. With the five-goal effort, Adams overcame Kelly Amonte (1993-96) as Maryland's all-time leading goal scorer. Adams now has 188 goals, one more than Amonte's total of 187.

The win was not, however, an easy one for Maryland. After exchanging a pair of goals with the Tar Heels in the game's first 10 minutes, Maryland (2-0, 2-0 ACC) fell behind after a burst of UNC scoring. With 10 minutes remaining in the half, the Terps found themselves in a 5-2 hole and struggling to find their offense. Adams came up with the answer.

At 5:50, Adams scored unassisted and then followed it up just over a minute later after a nice feed from senior **Quinn Carney**. Fellow senior **Allison Comito** chipped in another at 3:11, then Adams took a quick feed from **Courtney Hobbs** after a foul and scored her third goal in the final six minutes of the half. The Terps would take a 6-5 lead into the half.

In the second half, both teams performed in much the same way that the game had begun -- battling back and forth. The difference in the second half for the Terrapins was the play of sophomore goalie and first-year starter **Alexis Venechanos**.

After not making a save in the first half, Venechanos came up with a half dozen saves in the second half -- many at close range -- in helping Maryland to victory. After Adams added two more goals in the second half, the Terps had a 8-7 lead in the final minutes and just needed to hang on. That feat was not as easy as anticipated as Maryland had what could have been a costly turnover with a minute left and UNC ended up with a free position shot with 15 seconds remaining. Venechanos was again up to the task, however, and made her final save as the clock ticked toward zero.

In the win, Maryland overcame its largest deficit since last year's Duke game to open the 2000 season. In that game, the Terps were down 8-4 before coming back and winning, 14-10.

Maryland got another superb performance from **Jen Adams** and a hat trick from **Allison Comito** as they bested the 10th-ranked Syracuse Orangewomen, 11-7, at Ludwig Field.

In the win, Adams scored three goals and distributed five assists for a total of eight points. That point total gives her 320 for her career, the most ever by a Maryland player. Adams' point total breaks the all-time mark of 319 set by former Terrapin standout Kelly Amonte (1993-96). Through three games of the '01 season, Adams has scored 23 points to lead all Maryland players.

Maryland (3-0, 2-0 ACC) got a stiff challenge from the Orangewomen (0-2) who had a strong five-goal performance from junior Carrie Soultis. The Terps opened the game with the first three goals of the contest as Adams, sophomore **Sonia Judd** and Comito all found the back of the net. But Syracuse fought back and at the 18:11 mark in the first half, the score was knotted at four.

The Terrapins would then go on a scoring run led by Adams and Comito. After freshman **Kelly Coppedge** and Adams scored to put the Terps up 6-4 at the half, Comito opened the second frame with two quick goals within the first :47. Adams added a goal a minute later and Maryland had run off five straight goals. That scoring spurt gave the Terps a 9-4 lead.

For the remaining 25 minutes, the two teams exchanged three goals to close things out at 11-7 in favor of the Terrapins. The win was Maryland's third against a Top 10 opponent this season and made it 24 wins-in-a-row (total) dating back to last year.

The Terps hit the road for the first time in 2001 and beat the University of Virginia, 8-7, to capture the regular season sweep of their Atlantic Coast Conference opponents.

Maryland got an outstanding performance from senior All-American candidate **Quinn Carney** who scored five points. Virginia came out showing a deliberate offensive strategy -- the first goal of the game was scored at 26:16 by UVA on the opening possession of the game -- and Carney was huge offensively for the Terps in rebuttal. She scored Maryland's first two goals, both on rebounds and assisted on its third and after a free position goal by **Allison Comito**, the Terps held a 4-2 lead in the first half. Virginia, however, would rattle the cage twice in the final 2:22 of the frame to knot the score at four at intermission.

As they have in every tight game this season, the Terrapins (4-0, 3-0 ACC) would come out firing to start the second half. Carney scored on a free

position shot almost eight minutes in and then assisted Comito from behind the net almost a minute later to put the Terps up, 6-4. The top-ranked Terrapins went on a scoring spree and beat the unranked Brown Bears, 20-9, at Ludwig Field.

In the win, senior All-American **Jen Adams** broke the all-time NCAA record for assists with her total of three which moved her career total to 133. In breaking the record, Adams killed two birds with one stone as she broke not only the NCAA record, but also the Maryland school record as the all-time mark of 132 was set by **Kelly Amonte**, who played for the Terrapins from 1993-96. With the record, Adams is now Maryland's all-time leader in assists, points and goals as she had broken the other two marks (also held by Amonte) earlier this year.

In the win over Brown (0-2), Maryland (5-0, 3-0 ACC) got scoring from everywhere as nine Terps rattled the cage and 11 got into the scoring column. Leading the way were Adams and **Quinn Carney** who had four goals apiece. Freshman **Kelly Coppedge** came up with her first collegiate hat trick as she had three goals and an assist while senior **Tori Wellington** tied her career high with three goals of her own. In addition, senior **Allison Comito** tied her career high with three assists and freshman **Julie Shank** scored the first two goals of her career.

Maryland spent most of the day in Brown's end of the field and it showed in the statistics as the Terps out-shot the Bears, 45-13. The 20 goals

were the most by a Maryland team since April 1st of last year -- a span of 17 games -- when the Terrapins scored 24 versus James Madison.

Maryland jumped out early and never looked back against 12th-ranked James Madison, beating the Dukes, 16-6, on a sunny day in College Park.

The Terps' win was their 10th in as many games this year and 30th-in-a-row overall dating back to last season. That streak is the team's longest since running off 50 straight from 1995-97.

The Terrapins got out quickly in both halves, but particularly so in the first. Just 22 seconds from the opening draw, Maryland held a 2-0 lead after goals by **Tori Wellington** (29:46) and **Courtney Hobbs** (29:38). For Hobbs, it was a continuation of a recent string of strong play as she wrapped up a hat trick and three of the Terrapins' first four goals before 10 minutes had elapsed in the half.

Hobbs' Australian cohort, **Jen Adams**, picked it up from there and notched a hat trick of her own in the first half as Maryland outscored JMU 9-3 in the opening frame.

The second half again saw the Terps come out strong as they posted the first five goals after intermission and counted on sophomore goalie **Alexis Venechanos** and a stingy defense to seal the victory. Venechanos had her second straight strong outing as she made seven assists while allowing just the six goals.

In the end, Adams led all scorers with nine points (six goals, three assists) making it 43 points in her last six games. Hobbs' hat trick gives her three straight games with at least three goals and **Allison Comito** added five points on a pair of goals and three assists.

Top-ranked Maryland put together its most complete and impressive performance of the 2001 season, beating the fifth-ranked Georgetown Hoyas, 13-9, at Kehoe Field in Washington, D.C.

The Terrapins (12-0, 3-0 ACC) knew early in the contest that they were in for a battle with the Hoyas, who came into the game riding a three-game win streak and were coming off of a huge 15-9 win at North Carolina. As they did a year ago in the NCAA Tournament, Georgetown started the contest trying to slow the pace of the game and it was successful for the most part getting on the board first and limiting Maryland's touches. The game was nip-and-tuck early with GU holding the ball and the Terps making the most of their opportunities when they did touch it. With 20 minutes elapsed in the first half, the score was tied at three with the bipartisan crowd on the edge of their collective seats.

The Terps hung in there, however, and got a pair of crucial goals before the end of the half and the senior duo of **Jen Adams** and **Allison Comito** were responsible. With 7:57 remaining in the half, Adams took a pass from Comito from behind the net and converted to put Maryland up one. Then, with the half winding down, the Terps had the ball in Georgetown's end but turned it over. As the Hoyas were heading down field with under a minute left, **Courtney Martinez** -- who was outstanding all game defensively -- stripped the ball and got it to Adams who raced for the goal and was fouled with 14 seconds in the half. On her free position attempt, Adams dished it to Comito on the right side of the goalmouth who put the shot away for a two-goal Maryland lead at intermission.

The second half saw the Terrapins increase their lead, scoring two goals in the first six minutes and basically forcing the Hoyas out of their slow-down approach. Georgetown would get as close as 9-7 in the second half, but the Terps pulled away behind goals from Adams (2), **Quinn Carney** and Comito.

Adams led the way in scoring for Maryland for the 10th time in 12 games this year as she notched her third 10-point effort with six goals and four assists. Comito added a hat trick and a pair of assists while sophomore netminder **Alexis Venechanos** made seven saves.

The Terrapins beat 19th-ranked Johns Hopkins, 24-5, at Byrd Stadium in the opening game of a twinbill with the Terrapin men's team.

In the win, **Jen Adams** set the school record for points with 12 as she had eight goals and four assists. The 12 points breaks the record of 11 set four other times (one of which was by Adams a year ago). It is also the fourth time this season that the two-time National Player of the Year has notched double-digit points in a game.

In addition to the points record, the Brighton, So. Australia native set a personal record for goals (8) and moved into second on the NCAA career points list with 392. She now trails only the total of 420 set by Karen Emas of Delaware who played from 1981-84.

Although Maryland's winning margin was its second largest of the season, the game did not start out looking like it would end that way. The Terps (13-0, 3-0 ACC) jumped out to an early 4-0 lead, but Hopkins came back and posted four of the next five goals to cut the score to 5-4 in Maryland's favor. The Terrapins then closed out the half scoring three of the next four and just missing another as Adams had a goal called back as it left her hands before the clock hit zero, but did not find the net before time expired. The Terps took an 8-5 lead to the locker room.

The second half was all Maryland -- literally. The Terrapins scored 16 times and held Hopkins without a goal for the final 31:07. The Blue Jays' 10 shots in the game were the second-lowest this season by a Maryland opponent.

Joining Adams at the top of the scoring column were junior **Courtney Hobbs** (four goals, two assists), senior **Allison Comito** (two goals, three assists) and sophomore **Sonia Judd** (three goals, one assist). For Hobbs, it marked the fifth time in the last six games that she has notched at least a hat trick. In that six-game span, she has scored 18 goals.
