TOP-SEEDED TERPS AIM FOR THREE-PEAT

- Maryland has won seven of the 13 ACC Championships by taking titles in 1997, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2003, 2009, and 2010.
- The Terps are 18-7 all-time including wins against Virginia and North Carolina on its way to the title in 2010.
- Maryland and Virginia are the only two programs to boast three consecutive championships.

THE ROAD TO THE 2010 ACC CROWN

- Led by five points from Caitlyn McFadden and a career-high 12 saves from Brittany Dipper, Maryland upended No. 1 North Carolina, 10-5, to win its second consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference Championship title in 2010.
- McFadden was tabbed tournament most valuable player while teammates Dipper, Karri Ellen Johnson, Sarah Mollison, Laura Merrifield, and Karissa Taylor joined her on the all-tournament team.

SCOUTING CAROLINA...

- North Carolina (12-4), like Maryland, has taken on a challenging slate in 2011 with games against eight teams ranked in the top 20 in regular season play.
- Corey Donohoe leads the UNC offense with 44 goals and 15 assists. The Tar Heel defense is giving up 8.12 goals per game.
- Maryland leads the all-time series, 17-9, including a win over the Tar Heels in the ACC Championship game a year ago. UNC is the only team to beat the Terps since 2008.

TERPS TOP UNC, SECURE ACC REGULAR SEASON CROWN

- Katie Schwarzmans and Laura Merrifield scored four goals each to pace No. 1 Maryland to a 12-9 win against league-rival North Carolina.
- Brandi Jones tallied a team-high four draw controls, Iliana Sanza registered a career-high four caused turnovers and Brittany Dipper posted seven saves in the cage to lead the Terps. Maryland has now won at least a share of the ACC regular season championship every season in Reese's five-year tenure.

THE 100/100 CLUB

- Sarah Mollison became the seventh player in Maryland history to notch 100 goals and 100 assists for her career earlier this season. She is one of only two active players nationally to boast membership in the exclusive club.
- Currently, the Aussie has 134 goals and

115 assists. She is eighth all-time in points with 249. Below is a list of 100/100 club members:

MOJO BABY, YEAH!

- Sarah Mollison and Karri Ellen Johnson have been one of the most dominating tandems in the game this season.
- Johnson boasts 39 goals while Mollison has dished a Terp-best 40 assists.
- The pair is already etched in Maryland history, each ranking among the top five in career goals and career assists.
- Of Johnson's 39 goals this season, 13 have come via an assist from Mollison.

SHUTDOWN DEFENSE

- The Maryland defense has allowed an opponent to score more than 10 goals only three times in the last 27 games.
- The Terps surrendered 13 scores at UNC (4/10/10) - their last loss - and gave up 11 to Northwestern in the NCAA Tournament. Maryland allotted Duke 11 scores this season.
- The Terps are giving up an average of 6.69 goals per game in 2011 including holding No. 16 Penn State and George Mason to two goals - a feat not done by Maryland since 2003.

NATIONALLY SPEAKING...

- Maryland boasts the top scoring margin (9.6), scoring offense (16.4) and total points (368) nationally. The Terps also rank second in scoring defense (6.42) and are one of three teams that remain undefeated in 2011.
- Sarah Mollison leads the nation in total assists and ranks third in points. Brittany Dipper is first in goals against average.

TEWAARATON TERPS

- Maryland has four players on this year's Tewaaron Watch List, including senior Sarah Mollison, juniors Karri Ellen Johnson and Brittany Dipper and sophomore Katie Schwarzmenn.
- Caitlyn McFadden became Maryland's second Tewaaron award winner last season.

TALE OF THE TURNOVER

- Maryland is dominating the turnover battle this season, forcing opponents into 47 more turnovers than it is making.
- The Terps have had less or equal turnovers than their opponent in all 16 games this season.
- Maryland is also clearing the ball at a .839 clip compared to its opponents (.774).

NUMBERS DON'T LIE

- During head coach Cathy Reese's five-year tenure at the helm of the Maryland program, the Terps are averaging 15.1 goals per game.
- The Terps are also outscoring opponents by an average of 137.8 goals per year.

2011 NATIONAL CHAMPION MARYLAND WOMEN'S LACROSSE

KEY TABBED PRESEASON BEST

- Junior attacker Karri Ellen Johnson has been named Lacrosse Magazine's NCAA Division I Preseason Player of the Year, announced by the publication Monday.
- Johnson, a local product from Annapolis, amassed 143 goals in only two seasons in College Park. She capped last year's magical run to the program's 10th NCAA championship by scoring three times in the Terps' 13-11 win over five-time defending champion Northwestern in the NCAA final.
- The two-time IWLCIA All-American is currently ranked fourth all-time in career goals at Maryland with 177.

PROTECT THIS HOUSE

- Maryland is 48-1 at home under fifth-year head coach Cathy Reese.
- The Terps have won all five games in which they have played an opponent ranked No. 1 or No. 2 at home in the past four seasons and have done it in three different locations.
- The Terps are 188-15 in College Park dating back to 1990 with 13 perfect seasons in that span.
- Records of home and away games are incomplete from 1974-89.

COLLEGE PARK - STREAK CITY

- Maryland's Sarah Mollison and Karri Ellen Johnson each possess scoring streaks which rank among the best nationally.
- Mollison boasts a string of 61 consecutive games with either an assist or a goal. Johnson has scored a point in all 56 games she has appeared in since her arrival as a freshman.
- The Terps have won 26 consecutive games, dating back to 2010.

NO. 1 TALLIES NO. 100

- Sarah Mollison found favorite target Karri Ellen Johnson with 1:01 remaining in the first half against James Madison March 26 to pick up her 100th career helper.
- The senior became only the seventh player in Maryland history to hit the century mark for assists.
- Her 40 assists in 2011 rank eighth for helpers in a season in Maryland annals.

RED, WHITE & BLUE TERPS

- When the Terps tangled with the U.S. this preseason, they were without the services of key players Katie Schwarzmann and Brittany Poist.
- Schwarzmann, an IWLCIA Second Team All-American and the ACC Rookie of the Year in 2010, is in her first full season with U.S. Senior National Team. She joins her older sister, Lauren, on the squad.
- Poist is experiencing her first action with the U.S. Senior National Team. A transfer from the University of Louisville, Poist played an integral role for Maryland as a junior, helping lead the nation's top defense.
- Former Terps Acacia Walker and Caitlyn McFadden are also on the U.S. squad.

- Maryland boasts three players from countries outside the U.S., including captains Sarah Mollison (Australia) and Laura Merrifield (England).
- A transfer from Cal-Berkley, Camilla Hayes joins Merrifield as a representative from England.

WHAT A RIDE...

- Maryland captured its 10th NCAA crown when it staged an incredible comeback from a 6-0 deficit against five-time defending champion Northwestern in the national title game to conclude the 2010 season.
- It was Maryland's first NCAA title since 2001. The game was played in front a record-crowd totaling nearly 10,000 people.

TERPS RACK UP SEVENTH ACC CHAMPIONSHIP

- Led by five points from Caitlyn McFadden and a career-high 12 saves from Brittany Dipper, Maryland upended No. 1 North Carolina, 10-5, to win its second consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference Championship title in 2010.
- UNC was held to its lowest goal output of the year while Brittany Poist led the Terrapin defense with two ground balls and two caused turnovers. Maryland, which has played host to the ACC Women's Lacrosse Championship twice, has won the tournament in both attempts with defeats of Carolina in the title game on each occasion.
- McFadden was tabbed tournament most valuable player while teammates Dipper, Karri Ellen Johnson, Sarah Mollison, Laura Merrifield, and Karissa Taylor joined her on the all-tournament team.

TERPS LAX - A FAMILY AFFAIR

- Maryland freshmen Abbey Clipp and Annie Farrell have a family link to the Terps.
- Clipp's sister Becky is a former All-American for the women's lacrosse program. Farrell's brother, Brian, is an All-American long pole for the Terrapin men's lacrosse unit.

THE YOUNG AND TALENTED

- Four freshmen once again represented the University of Maryland when they played in the 2010 Under Armour All-America Game.
- Brooke Griffin led all South scorers with three goals as the North edged the South.
- Beth Glaros, Amalie Trentzsch and Kelsey Horton all earned starts and joined Griffin.
- Horton tallied a team-high four assists on the day, including two to Griffin, while adding a goal. Glaros scooped a ground ball and the combo of Griffin and Horton gathered a combined six draw controls in the all-star action.

GALLAGHER RETURNS FOR DEFENSE

- After serving a redshirt season during Maryland's run to the national title in 2010, Katie Gallagher returns to action in 2011 to help rejuvenate a defense that will be without the services of departing seniors Abby Caso and Karissa Taylor.
- Gallagher is entering her third season as a starter and totaled 24 caused turnovers and 33 ground balls prior to her redshirt senior season in 2011.

2011 CAPTAINS

- Cathy Reese has named seniors Sarah Mollison, Katie Gallagher and Laura Merrifield captains for the 2011 campaign.
- Mollison served as captain last year as a junior. The attacker was third on the team last season with 45 goals. The Melbourne, Australia, native is a two-time All-American and returns for her third season as a starter.
- Gallagher missed last season with an illness but is poised to lead the Terrapin defense in 2011. One of Maryland's strongest players, Gallagher is a three-year starter for the Terps and played a key role in the squad capturing the 2009 ACC Championship.

Schwarzmann ended with a career-high five goals on the day. Junior Brittany Dipper made five saves and senior Katie Gallagher tallied three caused turnovers and a pair of groundballs to lead the Terps defensively.

After falling behind the Nittany Lions 2-1 to begin the match, the Terrapin defense held Penn State (0-1) scoreless through nearly 51 minutes of play. Offensively, Maryland (3-0) was led by a trio of hat tricks from Sarah Mollison, Katie Schwarzmann and Kristy Black. Despite having her streak of consecutive games with a goal snapped at 47, Karri Ellen Johnson tied a career-high with three assists.

Seniors Laura Merrifield and Sarah Mollison combined for 11 points to lead No. 1 Maryland to its 24th consecutive win, downing No. 12 Princeton, 17-10, on Senior Night Wednesday.

With the win, Maryland capped its 13th perfect home regular season slate in program history. The Terps, who have already clinched the ACC regular season title, started all seven of its available seniors, including Colleen Dawson, Sara Cooper, Brandi Jones, Katie Gallagher, Brittany Poist, Merrifield and Mollison.

Brittany Dipper helped guide a solid defensive showing, boasting nine saves in 52 minutes of work. Gallagher racked up team-highs in caused turnovers (3) and ground balls (3).

Merrifield ended the match with four goals and one assist while Mollison tallied three goals and three helpers. Jones ended with a hat trick and Schwarzmenn registered two goals and two assists to aid another balanced Terrapin attacking effort.

93-9 record at Maryland

Former Maryland standout and reigning IWLCA National Coach of the Year Cathy Reese enters her fifth season at the helm of the Terrapins' women's lacrosse program after guiding Maryland to its first national championship since 2001 last season.

With the Terps falling just once in regular season play, Maryland wrapped up the 2010 campaign on a devastating 10-game winning streak, which concluded in elation with a gallant comeback against five-time defending national champion Northwestern in the NCAA Women's Lacrosse Championship at Towson. Reese coached Maryland's first Tewaaraton Award winner since Jen Adams as Caitlyn McFadden was tabbed the top player in all of women's lacrosse. Four other Terrapins landed All-America status as well and Reese garnered IWLCA National Coach of the Year honors along with being named the top coach in the conference for the second straight season.

Reese had Maryland on the verge of perfection in 2009, leading the Terps to a 21-1 record, an NCAA Final Four trip, and ACC Tournament and Regular Season championships. She boasted three Tewaaraton nominees, five All-Americans, five All-ACC honorees, the ACC Player and Rookie of the Year and the IWLCA Midfielder of the Year. Reese also earned a few honors of her own, racking up IWLCA South Region Coach of the Year accolades along with her second ACC Coach of the Year award in only three short seasons at the helm of the storied Maryland program.

Reese continued to move Maryland in a positive direction in 2008, steering the Terps to an 18-3 record and an Atlantic Coast Conference regular season title. Once again, Reese boasted some of the top talent in the nation as senior Dana Dobbie was tabbed ACC Player of the Year in addition to being named a finalist for the Tewaaraton Trophy, given annually to the nation's best player. Dobbie and fellow seniors Kelly Kasper and Lauren Cohen joined sophomore Caitlyn McFadden on the All-America team while Kasper accompanied Dobbie as a Tewaaraton finalist. The Terps' 18-3 record was the best for the program since 2003 as Maryland punched its ticket to the NCAA Tournament for the 18th consecutive season.

Reese returned to her alma mater in 2007 as the head coach and guided the Terps to a 16-4 record, including a first-place finish in the Atlantic Coast Conference at 4-1, earning the conference's Coach of the Year award.

Maryland had bowed out of the NCAA Tournament in the first round the previous two seasons, but Reese's Terps advanced to the quarterfinals for the first time since 2004 and had the most wins since 2003. Included in those 16 wins were a pair against teams ranked No. 1 and No. 2 in the country against North Carolina and Duke, respectively.

Reese's guidance produced more than just team success. Dana Dobbie was a finalist for the Tewaaraton Trophy, given annually to the nation's best player, and was the ACC Player of the Year. In addition, Dobbie along with Becky Clipp, Kelly Kasper, and Krista Pellizzi were named All-Americans.

Reese returned to Maryland after spending her first three seasons as head coach at the University of Denver where she guided the Pioneers to their most successful season in school history in 2006. Denver finished that year with a 16-5 record and rattled off 11-straight wins over the course of 43 days. The 11-game win streak was more victories than the school had seen in an entire season as its eight wins in 2003 was the most in a season for the Pioneers prior to 2006.

For a program that saw limited success since its inception in 1999, Reese proved that she is a winner. With a 4-1 Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) record, the Pioneers won its first-ever regular season championship in 2006. For her efforts, Reese was named the 2006 MPSF Coach of the Year. In addition, two of her student-athletes were also given season-ending awards as Denver swept the conference accolades. Kristie Leggio was tabbed the Player of the Year and Karen Morton was the Newcomer of the Year.

In her three seasons in the Mile High City, 11 student-athletes were named to the All-MPSF Team. Not only did her students excel on the field, but they also achieved in the classroom as Denver student-athletes were named to the Academic All-Conference team 11 times.

Prior to lifting the Denver program to national attention, Reese spent nine seasons in College Park, four as a student-athlete and five as an assistant coach. During that span, the women's lacrosse program had one of the most successful streaks seen in collegiate women's sports history. The Terps won seven national championships in her first nine years on campus. That is the third-longest streak in women's NCAA history in any sport.

When Reese first stepped foot on campus as a freshman, it was impossible to gauge how successful she and the Terps would be. Maryland did not lose in her first two seasons as a student-athlete, and it did not lose until midway through her junior campaign. In all, Reese and the Terps went 50-straight games without a loss. In her playing career, Reese guided the Terps to an incredible 75-4 record. In her first three seasons as assistant coach, the Terps went 65-1. Her total record with Maryland in her first nine seasons was 169-19. The Terps also made the NCAA quarterfinals in 2002 and advanced to the national semifinals in 2003 before Reese took the reins at Denver.

As a student-athlete from 1995-98, she was a two-time All-America selection. As a senior, she was tabbed the NCAA Tournament Most Valuable Player and was the second-leading scorer on that championship team with 58 goals and 25 assists. She finished her career with 140 goals, 77 assists, and 217 points. Her 77 assists is tied for eighth all-time at Maryland and her 217 points is 11th.

Reese graduated in 1998 with a degree in speech communications. She and her husband, Brian, who is also a volunteer coach for the program, have three children, Riley, who is six years old, and Brody, who is four years old. Reese gave birth to her first girl, Cayden Elizabeth, on March 12, 2008.
