TERPS HEAD BACK TO LOYOLA FOR FIRST ROUND MATCHUP

- The University of Maryland women's lacrosse team will officially begin its trek towards its eighth-straight national championship this Thursday as it will head to Loyola College in Baltimore to take on the Greyhounds in an NCAA first round matchup. The Terrapins earned an at-large berth in this year's tournament while Loyola is the tourney's fifth seed.
- The Terps enter Thursday's game with an overall record of 10-9 (0-3 ACC). The Terrapins, this year's preseason No. 1, were ranked eighth in the final IWLCA poll of the regular season.
- Loyola finished the 2002 regular season with an overall record of 15-3 (8-0 CAA) and earned an automatic berth by way of their winning the Colonial Athletic Association. The Greyhounds are ranked fifth and won seven of their last eight games, including a 7-4 win over the Terps and a 25-4 victory over American to close the season.
- The Terrapins closed their regular season last Friday with a strong performance in a 18-6 win over No. 20 George Mason. Maryland looked like the Terps of old as all but five of their goals were assisted and several came on quick-hitters and crisp passing inside the eight meter. In the win, **Courtney Hobbs** surpassed the 200-point plateau for her career and moved into the Maryland all-time top 10 in points and goals.
- Maryland entered 2002 as the seven-time defending national champion and the winningest team in the history of women's lacrosse. The Terps were a perfect 23-0 a year ago, winning the ACC and national title in the process while winning more games than any team ever in a single season.



THE DRIVE FOR EIGHT

- This year's NCAA Tournament signifies Maryland's run at an eighth straight NCAA title and the school's 11th national championship overall in women's lacrosse. The Terrapins' current streak of championships began in 1995 and their overall list of titles includes the 1981 (IAIW), '86 and '92 seasons as well.
- Maryland is 42-13 all-time in postseason tournaments (USWLA, IAIW and NCAA) with its last loss coming in the finals of the 1994 NCAA Tournament. The Terps have won 20-straight NCAA Tournament games and are 31-8 all-time in NCAA postseason play.

MORE NCAA NOTABLES

- The Terrapins' seven consecutive titles are the longest string of any Division I women's team in the nation. The Terps' string is the longest current streak in Division I athletics and the third-longest streak ever in women's Division I athletics (trailing only LSU outdoor track (11, 1987-97) and North Carolina soccer (nine, 1986-94)).
- Should Maryland earn a trip to this year's Final Four, it would be its 13th-in-a-row. Entering this year's tournament, the Terrapins have played in the championship game 11 out of the last 12 years.
- Courtney Hobbs** has scored at least a point in each of her last seven NCAA tournament games. In that span, she has scored 19 goals for an average of 2.7 goals per game in the last two years.
- Starting defender **Megan Kelly** has four NCAA Championships and six ACC Championships under her belt in her three-year career as a Terp. The Maryland native moonlights on the Terrapin field hockey team that won the 1998, '99 and 2001 ACC Championships and was crowned the 1999 NCAA Champions. Kelly was also part of the Terp squad that won the 1999, 2000 and 2001 NCAA women's lacrosse championships, as well as the ACC women's lacrosse championships from those seasons.

A CLOSER LOOK

- The 2002 season has been a tough one by the standards set in College Park, but a closer look at this year's team shows that the Terrapins have had a better season than their record indicates.
- Maryland has lost its nine games by a combined total of 18 goals (an average margin of defeat of 2.0 goals per

game). Included in the nine losses are a total of five one-goal losses.

- The Terrapins have, according to the LaxPower rankings, played the toughest schedule in Division I women's lacrosse.
- LaxPower also rates the Terps as the sixth-best team in the nation with the seventh-highest ranking in the "Quality Win Factor" category.
- Maryland became the first fourth-seeded team in the history of the Atlantic Coast Conference tournament to win its way to the tourney finals. The Terps made it there with an impressive 15-12 win over then third-ranked Virginia. They ultimately lost in the finals to North Carolina by, again, a single goal (11-10).
- Of Maryland's nine losses, six have come to teams ranked – at the time the games were played – in the nation's top five.
- The team is eighth in the nation in scoring (12.7 points per game) and first in draw controls (14.6 per game). Terps have beaten six ranked opponents this year, three of whom were ranked in the top 10 at the time they played Maryland.

HEAD COACH CINDY TIMCHAL

- Head coach **Cindy Timchal** is completing her 12th season at the helm of the Maryland women's lacrosse program in 2002. In her 11-plus years, she has established one of the most dominant teams in all of collegiate athletics as the Terrapins are 202-21 (.906) under her guidance, have earned 11 NCAA Tournament bids and have taken the crown eight times.
- With a win earlier this year over Johns Hopkins, Timchal won the 200th game of her career at Maryland, and now averages almost 17 wins per season for her 12 years at Maryland. By comparison, in the 17 years prior to Timchal's arrival, only three times had a Maryland team won more than 15

games in any single season.

- Timchal was selected as the '01 ACC Coach of the Year, her third time earning the honor. She has been chosen as National Coach of the Year twice and has coached 36 Terrapins to All-American status.
- Now in her 21st season of coaching collegiate athletics overall, Timchal got her start at Northwestern where she led the Wildcats to the NCAA tournament five times in nine years. Her overall record (Maryland and Northwestern) currently stands at 278-61 (.820).
- With the Terps' win in the 2001 title game, Timchal became the winningest coach in the history of women's collegiate lacrosse. With the Terrapins' win over Princeton in the semifinals, she tied the record of William Smith's Pat Genovese, who led all coaches with 267 wins. With Maryland's win in the title game, Timchal moved to 268 wins for her career.
- Timchal is assisted by **Gary Gait** and **Cathy Nelson**. Gait is one of the most innovative minds in all of lacrosse coaching and widely held as one of the sports greatest players of all time. A 1991 graduate of Syracuse and three-time All-American, he still plays professionally and on the World Cup circuit. Nelson was an outstanding player in her own right as she was a two-time All-American at Maryland and the tournament MVP in the Terps' run to the 1998 national title.

HOBBS TOPS 200

- In the final regular season game of her career (vs. George Mason), senior **Courtney Hobbs** reached several milestones.
- Hobbs was the game's leading scorer with three goals and four assists. Her seven points pushed her over the 200-point plateau for her career (she now has 202).
- Her point total also pushed her into the top 10 for her career at Maryland and her three goals moved her into the Terps' 10th spot in that category as well as she now has 145 in her three-plus seasons in College Park.

BY THE SKIN OF THEIR TEETH

- Maryland has lost nine games this season, but there have been plenty of positives to point to in spite of that fact.
- In their nine losses, the Terps have lost by a combined 18 goals with four-goal losses to two No. 1 teams (Georgetown and Princeton) being the largest margins of defeat. That's one two-goal, one three-goal, five one-goal and two four-goal losses with all but two of the defeats coming at the hands of Top 10 opposition.
- That the Terrapins have been unable to pull out some close games may just be a simple sign of their age. For most of the season, Maryland has started six underclassmen (four freshman and two sophomores) while another six have seen action in the games. By comparison, only three underclassmen (**Kelly Coppedge**, **Sonia Judd**, **Alexis Venechanos**) earned starts at any point a year ago and a total of just five saw playing time in more than 10 games.

SCORING STREAK

- Recently departed All-Americans Jen Adams and Quinn Carney finished their careers with amazing scoring streaks; streaks that lasted almost the length of their collegiate careers. Adams scored in each of her last 78 games as a Terp while Carney finished her career with a 73-game streak.
- This season, All-American candidate **Courtney Hobbs** has the longest running streak as she has scored at least a point in each of the last 46 games. Her last game without a point came against Loyola on April 29, 2000.

SHOOTING STARS

- Second-year players **Kelly Coppedge** and **Annie Collins** have made the most of their scoring opportunities in 2002.
- Coppedge, a sophomore from Annapolis, has converted 53 percent of the shots she has taken this

year (48-of-90) for 48 goals, second most on the team.

- Collins, a redshirt freshman who missed last year with a knee injury, is seventh on the team in scoring but her 23 goals have come on just 40 shots, leaving her with a .575 shooting percentage.

NEW LOOK TERPS

- After losing eight starters to graduation from last year's NCAA championship team, pundits knew that Maryland would have some fresh faces in the lineup. A look at who has played as the team crosses the season's midpoint would suggest that the Terps' best games are ahead of them.
- Through 19 games, Maryland has had all nine freshman see action with four (**Annie Collins**, **Kristie Leggio**, **Greta Sommers**, **Acacia Walker**) appearing as permanent fixtures in the starting lineup.
- By comparison, only one Terp freshman (**Kelly Coppedge**) started at any point last season and only one other (**Molly Lambert**) saw action in 10 games or more.
- Of Maryland's top seven scorers this year, four are underclassmen.

HOBBS UP FOR THE TEWAARATON

- Prior to the 2002 season, 12 nominees were named for this year's Tewaaraton Trophy, an award which recognizes each the best male and female in collegiate lacrosse. The first annual award was presented a year ago to Maryland's Jen Adams. This season, the Terrapins are hoping to have another native Australian capture the award as senior **Courtney Hobbs** was named one of the 12 nominees.
- Hobbs, a senior from West Lakes, South Australia, is this year's leading scorer for Maryland.

WORLD CUP TERPS

- The 2001 International Federation of Women's Lacrosse Associations' World Cup was played in High Wycombe, England, but that didn't stop the event from having a distinctive Maryland stamp.
- At the championships, which were won by the United States, a total of 14 former and current Terrapin lacrosse players represented their respective countries. The U.S. team featured eight Terps among its 16 players including Kelly Amonte-Hiller (1996), Erin Brown (1990), Quinn Carney (2001), Randall Flynn (1997), Christie Jenkins (2000), Kristin Sommar (2000), Michele Uhfelder (1991) and Jess Wilk (1990). In addition, five members of the Australian national team can claim they played at Maryland. Among them were current Terp **Courtney Hobbs** and former players Jen Adams (2001), Trish Adams, Sarah Forbes (1997) and Sascha Newmarch (1998). Finally, **Laura Warren** (who joined the Terrapins in February), was a starting attacker for the Welsh team.

10TH ANNIVERSARY FOR TIMCHAL

- Last year marked the 20-year anniversary of Maryland's first-ever national championship, the AIAW title of 1981. (The AIAW was the forerunner to the NCAA for competition in women's collegiate athletics). This season marks another milestone, especially for head coach **Cindy Timchal**, as the 2002 season marks the 10-year anniversary of the Terps' first national title under Timchal.
- The 1992 Terrapins went 14-1 and started a run of championships that is nearly unparalleled in sports. Since the NCAA win in '92, Maryland has run off eight championships in 10 years, missing only in '92 and '93.
- Maryland has won the national championship in eight-of-11 of Timchal's years at the helm and finished worse than second only once (NCAA semi-finalists in 1993).

CAPTAINS

- The captains of this year's Maryland team are seniors **Meredith Egan** and **Courtney Hobbs**. The pair were chosen after a vote was conducted by their teammates as representatives of this year's squad.

IN THE RANKINGS

- A pair of Terps have made their way towards the top of some NCAA statistical categories.
- Courtney Hobbs** is ranked 10th in the nation in scoring, averaging 4.32 points per game. She also ranked 12th nationally in assists per game (1.63) and 25th in goals per game (2.68).
- Sophomore **Kelly Coppedge** also appears in the NCAA rankings, placing 23rd in Division I in points per game (3.68) while she just recently dropped out of the top 30 in assists.
- As a team, Maryland ranks eighth in the NCAA in scoring offense at 12.7 goals per game while it leads the nation in draw controls with an average of 14.6 per outing. It is also ranked in the top 20 nationally in scoring margin (12th; +3.0) and ground balls (18th; 27.6 per game).

SCOUTING THE GREYHOUNDS

- Loyola wrapped up its 2002 season with an overall record of 15-3 and 8-0 in the CAA. With one more win, it will match the best win total in the 30-year history of the program.
- Diane Geppi-Aikens (Loyola, '84) is in her 14th year as head coach at Loyola. She owns a 180-68 record with the Greyhounds and she has now taken her team to the NCAA tournament in each of the last seven seasons. Last year, Loyola fell in the semifinals to Georgetown.
- The Greyhounds have been led in scoring this season by senior Stacey Morlang (Victoria, Aus-

tralia). Morlang has tallied 82 points (60 goals, 22 assists) and topped off her regular season with a 12-goal, four assist effort versus American that ranks as the top single-game point total in Division I lacrosse this year.

- Fellow senior Tricia Dabrowski has been stellar in the pipes for the Greyhounds this year. Her 6.46 goals against average ranks second nationally and as does her outstanding .608 save percentage (178 saves, 115 goals allowed).
- Loyola has done most of its damage in the first half of games this season. In that first frame, the Greyhounds have outscored opponents by a 140-54 margin (an average of almost 8-3 per game).
- Series Info:** Maryland holds a 21-2 edge in the all-time series. Loyola's 7-4 win on April 27th was its first over the Terps since 1997 and marked Maryland's lowest goal total in a game since 1991.

SEVENTH HEAVEN

- Last year's NCAA Tournament signified Maryland's successful run at a seventh straight NCAA title and the school's 10th national championship overall. The Terrapins' current streak of championships began in 1995 and their overall list of titles includes the 1981 (AIAW), '86 and '92 seasons as well.
- The Terrapins seven consecutive titles is the longest string of any Division I women's team in the nation. Their seventh title matched the feat of John Wooden's UCLA Bruins from 1967-73. The longest current Division I streak is held by the Arkansas men's track team which has run off 12 consecutive NCAA Championships.
- The Terps' trip to last year's Final Four was their 12th-in-a-row. In addition, they have now played in the championship game 11 out of the last 12 years.

2001 PERFECTION

- With their season-ending wins at Dartmouth and Harvard, the Terrapins finished the 2001 regular season undefeated, marking just the sixth time in school history that a UM team finished its regular season without a blemish. In addition to the '95, '96 and '99 teams, the 1980 and 1994 teams went undefeated before losing the final games of their respective seasons. The 1984 team went without a loss in the regular season, but had a tie along the way before losing in the NCAA finals.
- After running the table in the NCAA Tournament, the Terps successfully nailed down their second undefeated season (including the NCAAAs) in the last three years. That feat was accomplished for just the fourth time in school history joining the teams from 1995, 1996 and 1999.

DURHAM, N.C. -- Maryland opened its 2002 season with a tough 9-8 loss at No. 3 Duke.

The Terrapins' loss marked the end of a 43-game win streak that the team had carried into the season and just its second loss in the last 74 games. Maryland, which entered the game as the No. 1 ranked team in the preseason IWLCAPOLL, had not lost since March 5 of 2000 (a triple overtime loss to North Carolina).

In the game, Duke jumped out to an early 1-0 lead, but Maryland got rolling and rattled off six of the next eight goals to post a 6-3 first half lead. The six goals came from six different Terps and the lead was nearly 7-3, but a Meredith Egan goal as the buzzer sounded was ruled no good, a sign of things to come.

The second half began as the first did -- with Duke scoring first and then Maryland establishing its will. Despite strong play, though, the Terrapins had trouble converting and the lead was just 7-4 with 17 minutes remaining. At that point, Duke took control of the game's scoring.

From 16:20 on, the Blue Devils outscored Maryland 5-1 for the ultimate 9-8 final. The game did not end without controversy, however. The first controversial call came at the 4:00 mark when goalie Alexis Venechanos seemed to make a nice steal in front of the Terrapin cage. Instead, she was ruled to have committed a body checking foul and Jessica Bennett was awarded a free position shot, which she converted to tie the game.

After a Lauren Gallagher goal gave Duke the lead, Maryland attempted to tie the game. Despite several misfires in the opponent's end due to penalties, the Terps seemingly sent the game to overtime when senior Courtney Hobbs found the back of the net with 0:08 on the clock. Maryland's celebration was cut short, though, when it was ruled that she had committed a "dangerous" follow through on her shot and the goal was disallowed.

In the loss, there were several strong efforts for Maryland as Venechanos looked strong in the cage with 11 saves and she played up to the level of her counterpart, All-American candidate Kristen Foster. The Terps were led in scoring by sophomore Kelly Coppedge who had a hat trick and an assist while Hobbs had a goal and two assists.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. -- The Terps lost the back end of its two-game road swing through Tobacco Road as the University of North Carolina handed them a 13-11 loss. Maryland is now 0-2 on the young season and in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

The Terrapins' consecutive losses mark the first time that they have lost two games in a row since the start of the 1998 season. In that year, the Terps dropped games at Duke and UNC to open 0-2 before storming back to a 18-3 record and their fourth straight national championship.

In this year's game against the Tar Heels, Maryland had a bit of a case of deja vu from Friday's game against Duke. UNC jumped on the board early -- albeit more aggressively than did the Blue Devils -- as it scored the game's first three goals. The Terps came back and got a boost from a surprise source as newcomer Laura Warren (who just joined the team in mid-February) scored the first goal of her collegiate career to get the Terps started. From that point on, the Terrapins scored five of the game's next seven goals to take a 6-5 lead into the locker room. The Terps also had a halftime lead in their loss to Duke.

The second half started with Maryland extending its lead as Courtney Hobbs found the net 3:1 into the frame. At that point, the aggressive Tar Heels took command as the home team scored eight of the game's next 10 goals to go up four goals with less than eight minutes remaining.

Maryland had time to respond, but UNC continued to be staunch in its defensive aggression and Maryland struggled to make it a game down the stretch.

For the game, sophomore Kelly Coppedge again performed well as she scored four goals on as many shots. For the weekend, Coppedge took nine shots and converted on all but one. Coppedge was joined at the top of the scoring column by Hobbs who had a goal and a pair of assists in the losing effort.

SYRACUSE, N.Y. -- No. 5 Maryland returned to form with an important 15-11 win over No. 7 Syracuse University at the Carrier Dome in Syracuse.

The Terrapins used their most complete team effort of the season to move out in front of Syracuse, stave off a late challenge and ultimately pull away in an impressive win. Maryland was led in scoring by senior Courtney Hobbs, who scored a career-high five goals and added an assist in the win. Other notables in the game included a career-high three assists for fellow senior Meredith Egan (who also had a pair of goals) and a career-high tying 14 saves by junior Alexis Venechanos.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. -- Maryland ran out of time in one of the highest scoring games in school history, as it fell 17-16 to ACC-rival Virginia at Ludwig Field.

In the rain-soaked game, the sixth-ranked Terrapins and No. 8 Virginia pumped in 33 goals, the most in a Maryland game since a 24-15 win at James Madison in 2000 and the most at a Maryland home game since March 28, 1985, a 29-5 win over Towson State.

In the game, Maryland fell behind early and struggled in the first half. The Cavaliers scored the game's first six goals and led by as many as eight goals (9-1) in the first 30 minutes. Virginia carried

a 12-4 lead into intermission, scoring on all but six shots in the frame.

The second half started with the Cavaliers scoring two of the first three goals and owning what seemed to be an insurmountable 14-5 lead with 28:02 left to play. The Terps, however, never gave up. Starting at the 27:16 mark, Maryland scored 11 of the game's final 14 goals and when **Courtney Hobbs** came up with the draw with 0:34 left, the Terrapins found themselves with a shot at sending the game to overtime.

That shot came with approximately three seconds remaining as senior **Meredith Egan** charged in and fired from the right side of the goal mouth with her shot, and the Terrapins' hopes at a miracle comeback sailing wide of the goal.

For the game, **Kelly Coppedge** led the Terps with a career-high five goals and seven total points. Hobbs scored four goals and added an assist while sophomore **Annie Collins** and senior **Egan** each added two goals. As a team, the Terrapins took 39 shots, 11 more than Virginia and their most as a team since game 11 of last season when they took 43 in a 17-5 win over William & Mary.

PROVIDENCE, R.I. -- The sixth-ranked Terrapin women's lacrosse team got its second win of the young season as it handed Brown University a 19-8 loss in Providence.

The Terps continued its recent trend of high-scoring outings, putting up its highest goal total of 2002 to date with 19. Against the Bears, however, the story was the Terrapins' defense.

After Brown got on the board to open the scoring eight-and-a-half minutes in, the Terps scored eight of the next 10 first half goals and never looked back. COLLEGE PARK, Md. – The Terrapins earned their fourth-straight win, handing the visiting Harvard Crimson a 18-3 defeat on a misty day at Ludwig Field.

The Terps' 18-goal effort continued its current high-scoring string, making it a total of 98 goals in their last six games (an average of 16.3 goals per game). But as it has been lately, the story has been the improved play of the Maryland defense.

Against the Crimson, the Terrapin defense allowed a total of just nine shots in the game, fewest by a Maryland opponent since game 16 of last season, a 7-6 win over Princeton. The three goals allowed by the Terps were — like the shot total — fewest by a Terp opponent this year as well as the lowest goal total by a Maryland opponent since last year's 19-2 win over Ohio State.

Offensively, Maryland didn't get going until around the 10-minute mark in the first half. Before **Meredith Egan** scored an unassisted goal with 9:02 left in the half, the Terrapins' lead was just 4-2. After Egan's goal, Maryland ran off four more unanswered goals — three within the span of a minute and then the last coming with five seconds left in the half — to put it up 9-2 at the break.

The second half showed no relief for the Crimson as they were held without a goal for the first 20 minutes of the period while the Terps rattled off another six to run the score to 15-2. All told, Maryland scored 13 unanswered goals in just under 22 minutes, putting a relatively close game on ice.

Individually, junior **Sonia Judd** continued her strong play, netting five goals and a pair of assists to lead all scorers (seven points). The goal and point total were career highs for Judd and come on the heels of her being named co-ACC Player of the Week earlier today after setting career highs for points and goals in last week's games.

Joining Judd atop the scoring column were **Kelly Coppedge** (four goals, two assists), **Courtney Hobbs** (one goal, three assists) and **Annie Collins** (two goals, two assists).

The Terrapins and Nittany Lions squared off today as part of the ACC/Big Ten Challenge. In earlier action, North Carolina gave the Atlantic Coast Conference its first win as it beat Ohio State, 12-7. The American Lacrosse Conference -- which is the conference both Penn State and Ohio State play in despite their school's primary affiliation -- now stands at 0-2.

Maryland's fifth-straight win was in jeopardy late, as the Nittany Lions held a 11-9 advantage after Kristen Burke's unassisted goal with 8:25 left. The Terrapins, however, were up to the challenge as they scored four unanswered goals in the game's final seven minutes to pull out the win. The Terps have now won 78-straight games against non-conference competition.

In the first half, Penn State played well and ran out to an early 3-1 lead behind a pair of goals and an assist by Colleen O'Hara. The Terps answered with five of the game's next six goals -- including a pair from senior **Meredith Egan** -- but gave up a goal in the frame's final 55 seconds and ultimately held a narrow 6-5 lead at intermission.

The Terps extended that lead in the first minute of the second half on goals by **Courtney Hobbs** and **Acacia Walker**, but PSU charged back with three goals of their own, two of which were scored by B.J. Lucey. After Hobbs rattled the cage again, the Nittany Lions scored three more unanswered goals before the Terrapins final run of four to close out the game and the win.

Hobbs led all scorers with four goals and an assist while the freshman Walker notched her second career hat trick and an assist for four points of her own. Fellow frosh **Kristie Leggio** also had four points behind a pair of goals and a pair of assists.

Though the Terrapins scoring total was not up to its recent heights, Maryland did bombard Penn State's netminder -- Lee Tortorelli -- with 36 shots. To her credit, Tortorelli answered with 20 saves.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. – The Terps lost to Ohio State, 12-11, in a driving rain at Ludwig Field. In the game, Maryland suffered from a case of déjà vu as the loss to the Buckeyes was reminiscent of a loss earlier in the season to Virginia.

The Terps dug themselves an early hole against OSU, allowing five unanswered goals to start the game. Leading the charge early for the Buckeyes were Megan Mirick and Regina Oliver, each of whom had a pair of goals. The Terrapins scored their first goal of the game on an unassisted score by **Courtney Hobbs** with 15:10 left in the first half, but the deluge did not stop there -- literally or figuratively -- for the Terps. Ohio State went on to score three of the final five goals of the half and carried an 8-3 lead into the break.

By comparison, Maryland fell behind 6-0 to Virginia and trailed by as many as eight goals in the first half in that game earlier this year.

The second half of today's game began with OSU extending its lead with a pair of goals and Maryland staring at a seven-goal deficit. To their credit, the Terps did not give up as they rattled off the next five goals with Hobbs and **Sonia Judd** each netting a pair in the run that cut the Buckeye lead to 10-8. Ohio State's Mirick -- who led all scorers with five goals and an assist -- then scored at 11:46, but Maryland responded again as it scored the next three goals to tie the game at 11 with 8:02 left. Both teams had their chances as time ran down, but only OSU was able to capitalize as Shannon Wilson found the back of the net on an unassisted goal with 1:37 left for the game winner.

As it did against UVA earlier this year, the Terrapins had matched their opponent's offensive output of the first half while limiting them in the second half. But again, as it did against the Cavaliers, Maryland gave up one more goal in the second half than its opponent did in the first.

The Terps were led in scoring by **Kelly Coppedge** who had three goals and an assist. Hobbs also added a hat trick in the loss. The win by Ohio State was the first for an American Lacrosse Conference school (both OSU and Penn State play in the ALC despite their school's affiliation with the Big Ten) over the weekend and breaks a string of 79-straight wins by Maryland over non-conference competition.

HARRISONBURG, Va. – The Terps lost in another close one as they fell to James Madison University, 11-10, at the JMU Lacrosse Field in Harrisonburg. The loss marked the fourth time that the Terrapins have lost by one goal this year and marks the first win for JMU in the series in its last 29 tries.

Maryland got out to a fast start against the Dukes, scoring the game's first two goals and ultimately moving its way out to a 4-1 lead almost midway through the first half. In the first 15 minutes, seniors **Meredith Egan** (two goals) and **Courtney Hobbs** (one goal, two assists) paced the Terps' scoring attack.

The Dukes, however, took a timeout after Maryland's fourth goal with the intent of changing their early misfortune. Freshman **Acacia Walker** ended the Maryland scoring drought with an unassisted goal with just under 15 minutes to go. At the 10:19 mark, JMU's Lisa Staedt scored her third goal of the game to extend the Dukes' lead back to two, but another Terrapin freshman -- Kristie Leggio -- ultimately answered with a goal with three-and-a-half minutes left to get the deficit back to 11-10.

The Terps won the ensuing draw, but turned it over and JMU tried to kill the clock. Junior defender **Julie Shank** helped Maryland get the ball back with a caused turnover with 2:20 left, but the Terps were unable to convert. After the failed attempt, the Dukes were able to run the clock down to the 22-second mark but Maryland almost made that little bit enough.

With the clock winding down, freshman **Greta Sommers** ran the ball from the Terrapin end line into the James Madison end before getting **Kelly Coppedge** a chance with five seconds remaining. Coppedge got a good look, but her shot sailed wide and with it, the Terrapins' hopes at overtime.

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. -- A 12-goal run over the final 15 minutes of the first half propelled the 13th-ranked University of Maryland Terrapins to a 21-11 win over the hosting College of William & Mary in women's lacrosse action at Busch Field.

The win moved the Terps to 7-6 on the season, while the Tribe fall to 4-9. The Terrapins now lead the all-time series between the two schools, 20-6.

Maryland's **Courtney Hobbs** and **Kelly Coppedge** were the story on the Terrapin attack, as the pair recorded nine and seven points, respectively. Hobbs notched a career-high six goals and three assists for a career-high nine points, while Coppedge added five scores and a pair of helpers to match her career-high point total of seven. The College had three players contribute a pair of goals, Colette Chaput, Meghan Schneider and Allison Evans.

The first 15 minutes of the contest were not indicative of what was to come, as the Tribe used five goals by five different players to forge out to an early lead. When Evans converted a slick feed from Chaput at 14:39, the College held a 5-3 edge and looked ready to make a serious challenge at recording an upset of one of nation's most storied programs.

But the game changed after Evans' goal, and a Maryland timeout. Starting with Hobbs' goal at the 16:06 mark, the Terrapins unleashed a 14-goal onslaught that spanned just 18 minutes of game time. By the time W&M freshman midfielder Morgan Watkins found the back of the net after a free position attempt at the 37:55 mark, the game score was at 17-6.

Over the game's final 30 minutes, the College actually played the Terrapins even on the scoreboard, as each side managed only six scores each, but the damage had already been done. Maryland made the most of its advantage in two crucial categories, draws (18-14) and caused turnovers (14-7), to control the pace of play during its game-breaking scoring run.

In addition to the career days by Hobbs and Coppedge, freshman **Kristie Leggio** had a hat trick and an assist while **Meredith Egan** and **Sonia Judd** each had a pair of goals and an assist.

DURHAM, N.C. - Fourth-seeded and 12th-ranked Maryland received four goals apiece from **Courtney Hobbs** and **Meredith Egan** as the Terrapins defeated top-seeded and third-ranked Virginia, 15-12, in the semifinals of the 2002 ACC Women's

Lacrosse Tournament held on Friday afternoon at Koskinen Stadium in Durham, N.C.

To its credit, however, Princeton did not give up. The Tigers stormed back, running off four goals before Collins scored her second of the half, then added three more and actually held a surprising 7-6 lead at intermission after Kim Smith found

the back of the net on a free position shot with :14 left in the half. Tiger star Lauren Simone paced the attack in the comeback with two goals and a pair of assists.

The Terrapins bounced back quickly as the second half opened with a pair of goals by freshman **Acacia Walker** in the first 10 minutes. Charlotte Kenworthy scored for Princeton to tie the game back up, but Judd answered less than 20 seconds later to give the Terps a leg up again at 9-8. The lead at 40:12 would be Maryland's last of the night.

Princeton scored with 11:14 and 7:10 left to take a one-goal lead and play went back and forth with the game still in question. The Tigers were able to salt the game away late, however, as Simone rattled the cage twice and Mimi Hammerburg once in the last three-and-a-half minutes and Princeton would come away with a 13-9 win.

For the evening, Judd led Maryland's scorers with a hat trick and an assist. Hobbs and Walker each had two goals and an assist while Collins added a pair of goals.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Maryland ended its regular season on a positive note, beating No. 20 George Mason University, 18-6, at Ludwig Field. The seventh-ranked Terrapins finish their 2002 regular season with a 10-9 record (0-3 ACC) while the Patriots move to 9-9 overall (4-4 CAA).

In the win, which served as one of Maryland's most complete efforts of the season, senior **Courtney Hobbs** led all scorers with seven points (three goals, four assists). The three goals gives her 145 for her career, a total that moves her into the 10th spot on the all-time Maryland list. Her seven points moved her over the 200 mark for her career and also into 10th on the all-time Terp chart.

Mason got on the board first in the game, as Jill Toomey scored just :58 in. That would be the last lead the Patriots would own. The Terps scored the next five goals and 11 of the next 13 of the half to head to intermission up, 11-4. In the half, **Kelly Coppedge** and **Annie Collins** each netted three goals.

The second half began with a Hobbs goal a minute-and-a-half in, and after Mason answered with a Kristy Manas goal, the rout was back on. The Terrapins scored six of the game's final seven goals for the eventual 18-6 final.

Individually, Coppedge led all goal scorers with five and one assist to fall just behind Hobbs' game-high seven points. Freshman **Acacia Walker** also chipped in five points behind a career-high tying four assists. In her final game at Ludwig, **Katie Robinson** notched a hat trick -- including one of the prettiest goals of the night on a no-look backhand that went top shelf -- and a career-high in goals. Collins also had a hat trick while **Sonia Judd** scored a pair of goals and added an assist.

In addition to the strong offensive performances, **Alexis Venechanos** continued her stellar play of late in goal. In the last three games, the junior netminder has made 36 saves while allowing just 26 goals (a .581 save percentage).
