TERPS POISED FOR 18th NCAA FINAL FOUR APPEARANCE

• After defeating No. 8 Penn last Saturday, the Terps now head down the road to Towson for its second consecutive NCAA semifinal berth and 18th in program history.

• Maryland is a phenomenal 14-3 in semifinal contests dating back to 1984 but is seeking its first win in the round since 2001.

• Of the Terps' 17 semifinal games, six have been decided by one goal. Maryland has defeated eight opponents in this round by five or more goals.

• This is the first time the Terps will face a Big East opponent in the NCAA semifinals. Maryland has battled Virginia, Penn State, Loyola and Princeton each three times in the round of four.

SCOUTING THE ORANGE

- An at-large bid out of the Big East Conference, Syracuse enters Friday's NCAA semifinal match with a 15-6 record. The Orange upset No. 4-seeded Georgetown in the first round and topped No. 7 James Madison in the quarterfinals.
- Syracuse is led by Christina Dove, who boasts team-highs in goals (67) and points (94). The Orange has a balanced attack, garnering six players with 25 or more goals in 2010.
- Additionally, Syracuse has a solid goalie, as Liz Hogan seals up the cage. Hogan set the single-season record for saves with 12 against James Madison last weekend.
- Maryland owns the all-time series, 9-0, including a win against the Orange in last year's NCAA quarterfinal round.
- Syracuse head coach Gary Gait spent nine seasons as an assistant coach at Maryland, including all four years current Maryland head coach Cathy (Nelson) Reese was a player.

THE LAST MEETING

- The Terps topped Syracuse, 12-10, to advance to their first NCAA semifinal since 2003 last season.
- Syracuse came out to a 4-0 lead before Maryland replied with four unanswered scores of its own to open the game. The Terps closed the first period with a decisive 23-11 shot advantage.
- Caitlyn McFadden paced the Maryland offense with four goals while Sarah Mollison added a hat trick and an assist for a team-high four points.
- Maryland dominated the draw control category, 16-8, and cleared a perfect 10-for-10 despite turning the ball over 14 times.

MOLLISON AND MCFADDEN LEAD TERPS IN NCAA QUARTERS

- Junior Sarah Mollison and senior Caitlyn McFadden scored five goals apiece to lead the Terps to a 15-10 victory over the eighth-seeded Penn Quakers in Saturday's quarterfinal round.
- Maryland was 11-for-12 in clear attempts while Penn failed four on the day. The Terps won despite trailing Penn, 16-11, in the important draw control category. The Terps were able to force 12 Quaker turnovers in the match.

NO. 1 TERPS COAST PAST MARIST IN FIRST ROUND

- Maryland outshot MAAC champion Marist, 29-6, in the first half on its way to a 20-5 first round victory in NCAA Women's Lacrosse Championship action.
- The Terps reaped the benefits of 10 different goal scorers, led by five from sophomore Karri Ellen Johnson. Sarah Mollison and Amanda Spinnenweber added hat tricks on the day while newly-crowned Atlantic Coast Conference Most Valuable Player Caitlyn McFadden added two.
- Maryland's 46 shots was the fourth-highest shot output in NCAA Women's Lacrosse Championship history while Marist's 11 shots are tied for the fifth-fewest.

MCFADDEN NAMED TEWAARATON FINALIST AGAIN

- Maryland senior midfielder Caitlyn McFadden has been named a Tewaaraton Award finalist for the second consecutive season.
- Defensively, McFadden has consistently been called upon to shut down each team's best midfielder. North Carolina midfielder and fellow Tewaaraton finalist Jenn Russell was held scoreless and Virginia's Kaitlin Duff managed only one assist in ACC Championship action as McFadden tacked on her second-straight tournament most valuable player honor.
- She is joined on this year's list by Ali DeLuca (Penn), Katrina Dowd (Northwestern), Brittany Kalkstein (Virginia) and Russell.

TEN NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

MARYLAND DOMINATES ACC POSTSEASON AWARDS

- No. 1 Maryland took home all three Atlantic Coast Conference individual awards, highlighted by Caitlyn McFadden's second-straight player of the year nod. Katie Schwarzmans earned ACC Rookie of the Year honors while Cathy Reese garnered her third ACC Coach of Year award in four seasons at Maryland. This year, she shared the honor with UNC's Jenny Levy.
- McFadden's player of the year honor marks the fifth time in ACC women's lacrosse history that it has been given to the same person who won the league's championship MVP. In addition, McFadden is only the fourth student-athlete in ACC women's lacrosse history to be titled Player of the Year twice. Maryland's Jen Adams (2000 & 2001), Duke's Katie Chrest (2005 & 2006), and Maryland's Dana Dobbie (2007 & 2008) were the other three.

TERPS RACK UP SEVENTH ACC CHAMPIONSHIP

- Led by five points from Caitlyn McFadden and a career-high 12 saves from Brittany Dipper, Maryland upended No. 1 North Carolina, 10-5, to win its second consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference Championship title.
- UNC was held to its lowest goal output of the year while Brittany Poist led the Terrapin defense with two ground balls and two caused turnovers. Maryland, which has played host to the ACC Women's Lacrosse Championship twice, has won the tournament in both attempts with defeats of Carolina in the title game on each occasion.
- McFadden was tabbed tournament most valuable player while teammates Dipper, Karri Ellen Johnson, Sarah Mollison, Laura Merrifield, and Karissa Taylor joined her on the all-tournament team.

MCFADDEN NAMED TEWAARATON FINALIST AGAIN

- Maryland senior midfielder Caitlyn McFadden has been named a Tewaaraton Award finalist for the second consecutive season.
- Defensively, McFadden has consistently been called upon to shut down each team's best midfielder. PROTECT THIS HOUSE

- Maryland is 40-1 at home under fourth-year head coach Cathy Reese.
- The Terps have won all five games in which they have played an opponent ranked No. 1 or No. 1 at home in the past four seasons and have done it in three different locations.
- The Terps are 180-15 in College Park dating back to 1990 with 12 perfect seasons in that span.
- Records of home and away games are incomplete from 1974-89.

THE 200-POINT CLUB

- With seven points against George Mason, senior Caitlyn McFadden joined Maryland's prestigious 200-point club for her career.
- The four-year starter is currently sixth all-time with 252 points. Former Maryland great Jen Adams leads the way with 445 career points, the most in NCAA women's lacrosse history. Maryland assistant coach Quinn Carney is fourth with 272, while head coach Cathy Reese is 12th with 217.

MCFADDEN DISHES 'EM OUT

- Maryland senior captain Caitlyn McFadden is currently fifth all-time in career assists with 109.
- The reigning IWFLCA National Midfielder of the Year is only one-shy of cracking the top three and tying current Terp assistant coach Quinn Carney (110) for third.

JOHNSON IN ELITE COMPANY

- Maryland sophomore Karri Ellen Johnson has now landed on the single-season goal leader list twice in her young collegiate career.
- The two-time Tewaaraton nominee and All-ACC honoree boasted the third-most in program history with 74 scores as a rookie and has tallied 64 in her sophomore campaign. She is one of only three players in Maryland annals to dot the list more than once, joining Kelly Coppedge (2) and Jen Adams (3).

- McFadden's 46-game point scoring streak ranks 9th in the nation, while Johnson and Mollison's 43-game version is tied for 11th. Johnson also boasts the second-longest goal scoring streak after scoring in all 43 games she has appeared in as a Terp.

TERPS FINISH IN TOP SPOT IN POLLS

- Maryland owned the No. 1 ranking in both the deBeer/Inside Lacrosse Women's Media Poll and the IWLCAC Coaches Poll for four-straight weeks, concluding with the final poll May 10.
- This is the first time Maryland has garnered the top spot in the rankings since March 31, 2003. That season, the Terps were the No. 1 team in the land for the majority of the year before late-season losses to James Madison and Princeton shoved Maryland downwards in the poll.
- Maryland is the third team to be ranked No. 1 this season as defending NCAA champion Northwestern and North Carolina have also both held the prestigious spot.

MARYLAND PLACES FIVE ON ALL-ACC TEAM

- Maryland boasted a league-high five players on this year's All-Atlantic Coast Conference Women's Lacrosse team, announced by the league office Wednesday.
- Headlining the list for the Terps is 2009 ACC Player of the Year and three-time all-conference honoree Caitlyn McFadden. McFadden joins fellow Tewaaratton nominees Karri Ellen Johnson and Karissa Taylor as well as junior Sarah Mollison and freshman Katie Schwarzmann as Maryland's 2010 All-ACC awardees.

TERPS TOP VT FOR SHARE OF ACC REGULAR SEASON TITLE

- Head coach Cathy Reese captured her 100th career win Saturday as No. 3 Maryland routed Virginia Tech, 18-4, to secure a share of the Atlantic Coast Conference regular season title.
- Maryland picked up scoring from 10 different players on the day, led by four goals from Karri Ellen Johnson and three from Sarah Mollison, to help Reese, who is in her fourth season at the helm of the Terp program, accomplish the milestone.
- In total, the Terps amassed 27 points on the day while 14 Maryland players added a goal and/or assist on the day. The game was Maryland's first this season at Ludwig Field, where it will play the remainder of its schedule, including next week's ACC Lacrosse Championships.

MCFADDEN, TAYLOR AND JOHNSON ALL MAKE FIRST CUT

- Seniors Caitlyn McFadden and Karissa Taylor, along with sophomore Karri Ellen Johnson, have been listed as three of the top 25 candidates for this year's Tewaaratton Award, given annually to the best player in women's college lacrosse, as announced April 14 by The Greater Washington Sports Alliance.
- From this nominee list, five will be named finalists for the prestigious award. Last season, McFadden was named one of the final five. This season, the Terps boast one player at each position with a defender (Taylor), an attacker (Johnson) and a midfielder (McFadden) on the list. Johnson is one of only three sophomores to make the cut.

WHEN I DIP, YOU DIP, WE DIP

- Sophomore goalie Brittany Dipper once again put together a tremendous ACC Championship weekend, racking up 18 saves while holding two of the best offenses in the land to a mere 11 goals total.
- Last season, the rookie was named to the all-tournament team after making 10 saves in the championship game against Duke. This season, Dipper tallied a career-high 12 stops against top-ranked North Carolina as the Terps coasted to its seventh ACC title in program history.

FH & LAX COMPLEX FINALE

- Maryland, which began the season with a snow-filled opener at the football field turf, went 6-0 at the Field Hockey & Lacrosse Complex this season and concluded its home venue slate against Towson on Wednesday.
- The Terps, who played host to the 2010 ACC Women's Lacrosse Championship at Ludwig Field, switched locations for its final home game prior to the championships versus Virginia Tech April 17 and stayed there for the remainder of the season, including their final two NCAA Tournament matches.
- The field turf at the Field Hockey & Lacrosse Complex will be getting a makeover after sustaining some damage following the series of blizzards in College Park this winter.

- Maryland's Caitlyn McFadden, Sarah Mollison and Karri Ellen Johnson each possess scoring streaks

TEN NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

REESE GARNERS 100TH WIN

- Head coach Cathy Reese earned career win No. 100 as the Terps routed Virginia Tech, 18-4, on April 17 at Ludwig Field.
- The former Terrapin All-American is 106-38 in her seven-year career, which began at the University of Denver. Reese is 75-9 all-time at the helm of the Maryland program and has not lost a regular season match in College Park during her four seasons with the Terps.

LEADERS OF THE PACK

- Several Terps find their names scattered among the active leader lists in NCAA Division Women's Lacrosse.
- Caitlyn McFadden is currently third among active leaders in career assists (109), sixth in points (245) and 21st in goals (143).
- As only a sophomore, Karri Ellen Johnson ranks 23rd in the nation in active career goals (138). Maryland senior Kate Faas, who spent the first two years of her collegiate career at St. Bonaventure, ranks 40th with 168 career points.

TOPPLING THE TOP

- Don't accuse Maryland of padding its schedule with fluff teams. The Terps have played 13 games against teams ranked in the top 20. Nine of those games have been against teams ranked in the top 10. Maryland has won 12 of the 13 games in which its battled a top-20 squad. (prior to the NCAA Tournament)

A BALANCING ACT

- Maryland's offense, while dominant, is also incredibly balanced, boasting 10 players with double-digit goals.
- Karri Ellen Johnson (64), Caitlyn McFadden (44), Sarah Mollison (40), Katie Schwarzmann (28), Brandi Jones (20), Amanda Spinnenweber (19), Laura Merrifield (25), Kate Faas (19), Kristy Black (16) and Brittany Jones (13) give Maryland an extremely dynamic attack, providing solid looks at goal from all over the field.

SPREADING THE LOVE

- Maryland had three different players earn weekly awards after dropping No. 7 Towson and No. 6 Penn in consecutive matches.

JOHNSON LEADS TERPS PAST NO. 7 GEORGETOWN

- Sophomore Karri Ellen Johnson netted five scores and No. 2 Maryland put up 20 goals for the second consecutive game as the Terps ran away with a 20-11 win against No. 7 Georgetown.
- Three of Johnson's five goals came in the opening minutes of the second stanza to provide Maryland some breathing room and a six-goal cushion after an even-played first half.
- The Terrapin defense stepped up the intensity in the second half, allowing only five Hoya goals in the period. Maryland trumped Georgetown 23-10 in the draw control category, led by five from junior Brandi Jones.

TENACIOUS D

- George Mason's Megan Udovich finally stymied Maryland's defense with a goal with 2:33 remaining in the first half to stop Maryland's streak of 67 consecutive minutes without surrendering a goal.
- Maryland, which is allowing a mere seven goals per game this season, held No. 9 Virginia scoreless the final 39:43 of last Friday's match before preventing Mason from seeing the back of the net for 27:27 to begin Tuesday's game in Fairfax.

MARYLAND DROPS VIRGINIA, 11-5

- The No. 2-ranked Maryland women's lacrosse team held No. 9 Virginia scoreless in the second half on its way to an 11-5 defeat of the Cavaliers.
- After the two perennial powerhouses battled to a 6-5 Maryland advantage through the first 30 minutes of play, the Terps held the Cavs to a mere three shots in the second stanza.
- Karri Ellen Johnson ended the day with a match-high four goals while adding an assist, two caused turnovers, a draw control and a ground ball. Sarah Mollison also tallied five points on two goals and three assists.
- Maryland held a decisive shot advantage, 33-11, and kept an opponent from reaching a double-digit goal output for the fourth consecutive time this season.

TERPS DOMINATE DUKE, 17-4

- Maryland benefited from a balanced scoring attack as the Terps toppled Duke, 17-4, on the road.
- Maryland picked up hat tricks from Katie Schwarzmann, Amanda Spinnenweber and Sarah Mollison as a total of nine players scored on the day, five of whom put up multi-goal showings.
- The Terps have now scored 17 goals in all three of their wins in 2010. Duke (4-1, 0-1 ACC), who was also averaging 17 scores per contest, was held to a season-low four goals in its conference opener. Maryland outshot the Blue Devils 32-19 for the match.
- In addition to notching three goals, Mollison added a pair of assists and a game-high five draw controls. Schwarzmann put together the most complete game of her young career at Maryland, tacking an assist, two draw controls, five ground balls and three caused turnovers onto her career-high three-goal performance.

TAYLOR AND POIST NET BACK-TO-BACK DEFENSIVE HONORS

- Karissa Taylor garnered WomensLacrosse.com Defensive Player of the Week honors after Maryland dismantled No. 5 Duke on the road, while the next week Brittany Poist garnered the award.
- Taylor played a vital part in Maryland's monumental 13-goal defeat of Duke, scooping up five ground balls, causing three turnovers and adding a pair of draw controls to help hold the Blue Devils to four scores, its lowest goal production since 2005.
- Poist kept the honor in the family the next week as she helped the Terps to a dominating win over Virginia. She had four ground balls and four caused turnovers as Maryland shut down the Cavaliers in the second half, allowing only three shots and zero goals.

TRICKY TRICKY

- Maryland spread around its scoring in its home opener as four different players notched hat tricks on the day.
- Karri Ellen Johnson, Brandi Jones, Caitlyn McFadden and Kate Faas all netted three goals apiece.
- In total, nine Terps scored goals against Richmond, including Danielle Kirk and Katie Schwarzmann, who notched their first collegiate scores at Maryland.

MCFADDEN NAMED PRESEASON PLAYER OF THE YEAR

- Senior midfielder Caitlyn McFadden has been tabbed Lacrosse Magazine's Preseason National Player of the Year, as announced by the publication.
- McFadden, who helped guide the U. S. to a gold medal in the 2009 FIL World Cup in Prague this summer, was tabbed IWLCNA National Midfielder of the Year last season along with a clean sweep of every ACC honor, including Player of the Year, Tournament Most Valuable Player and Scholar-Athlete of the Year. The Tewaaraton Trophy finalist ended the 2009 campaign with 54 goals, 31 assists and 37 draw controls. The Phoenix, Md., native has started in every match since her arrival to College Park in 2007 and is one-goal shy of 100 career goals as a Terp.

ALL-AMERICANS RETURN

- A total of six Terps garnered regional All-American status last season with five moving on to earn national honors -- all return for Maryland this season.
- Regionally, Caitlyn McFadden, Karissa Taylor, Sarah Mollison, Brandi Jones and Karri Ellen Johnson all landed on the first team while Laura Merrifield racked up regional second team honors.
- The first team honorees advanced to national voting where McFadden and Johnson were each tabbed to the first team. Mollison and Brandi Jones landed on the second team and Taylor earned third-team accolades.
- McFadden was also named IWLCAs National Midfielder of the Year.

SUMMER FUN IN PRAGUE

- A total of 16 current and former Terps competed for their respective countries in the 2009 FIL World Cup in Prague this summer.
- Included in that mix are current Maryland standouts Caitlyn McFadden, Laura Merrifield and Sarah Mollison.
- McFadden helped guide the U.S. to the gold medal, topping Mollison and Team Australia in the finals. Merrifield led her native England to the semifinals before bowing out to the U.S.

SCHWARZMANN EARNS LOFTY HONOR

- Maryland freshman Katie Schwarzmans has been tabbed "Athlete of the Decade" by the Carroll County Times.
- A three-sport standout, excelling in soccer, basketball and lacrosse, Schwarzmans was named first-team All-Decade in all three sports.

TERPS TAB CAPTAINS

- Sarah Mollison will join two-time captains Caitlyn McFadden, Amanda Spinnenweber and Karissa Taylor as captains for the defending ACC champions.
- McFadden, who was tabbed Lacrosse Magazine's Preseason Player of the Year, gathered a slew of awards last season, including a sweep of every conference award and IWLCAs National Midfielder of the Year.
- Spinnenweber started in every match except one in 2009, tallying career-highs in goals (26), assists (9), points (35), draw controls (22), caused turnovers (10) and ground balls (16).
- Taylor picked up Third Team All-America honors last season while guiding the Terrapin defense to a 9.11 GAA. She also contributed offensively during her junior campaign, registering 10 goals and four assists.
- Mollison, a junior, started in every match for Maryland's attack in 2009, scoring 44 goals and dishing out 38 assists for the ACC champion Terps.

SISTER, SISTER

- Possibly the finest sister combination in the country, Brittany and Brandi Jones team up once again this season in the Maryland midfield.
- Brandi took her game to a new level in 2009, being tabbed an All-American and All-ACC after racking up 28 goals and 32 assists as a sophomore for the ACC champion Terrapins.
- Brittany had a breakout season in 2009 notching career-highs in goals (33), assists (8), points (41), and draw controls (23). She was named to the ACC All-Tournament Team after scoring four goals and adding two draw controls in Maryland's run to the title.
- In 2010, Brandi has racked up 32 points on 20 goals and 12 assists while Brittany has 13 goals and four assists on the year.

HALL OF FAME COACHES

- Over the offseason, both head coach Cathy Reese and assistant coach Quinn Carney were awarded the prestigious honor of being named to various Hall of Fames.

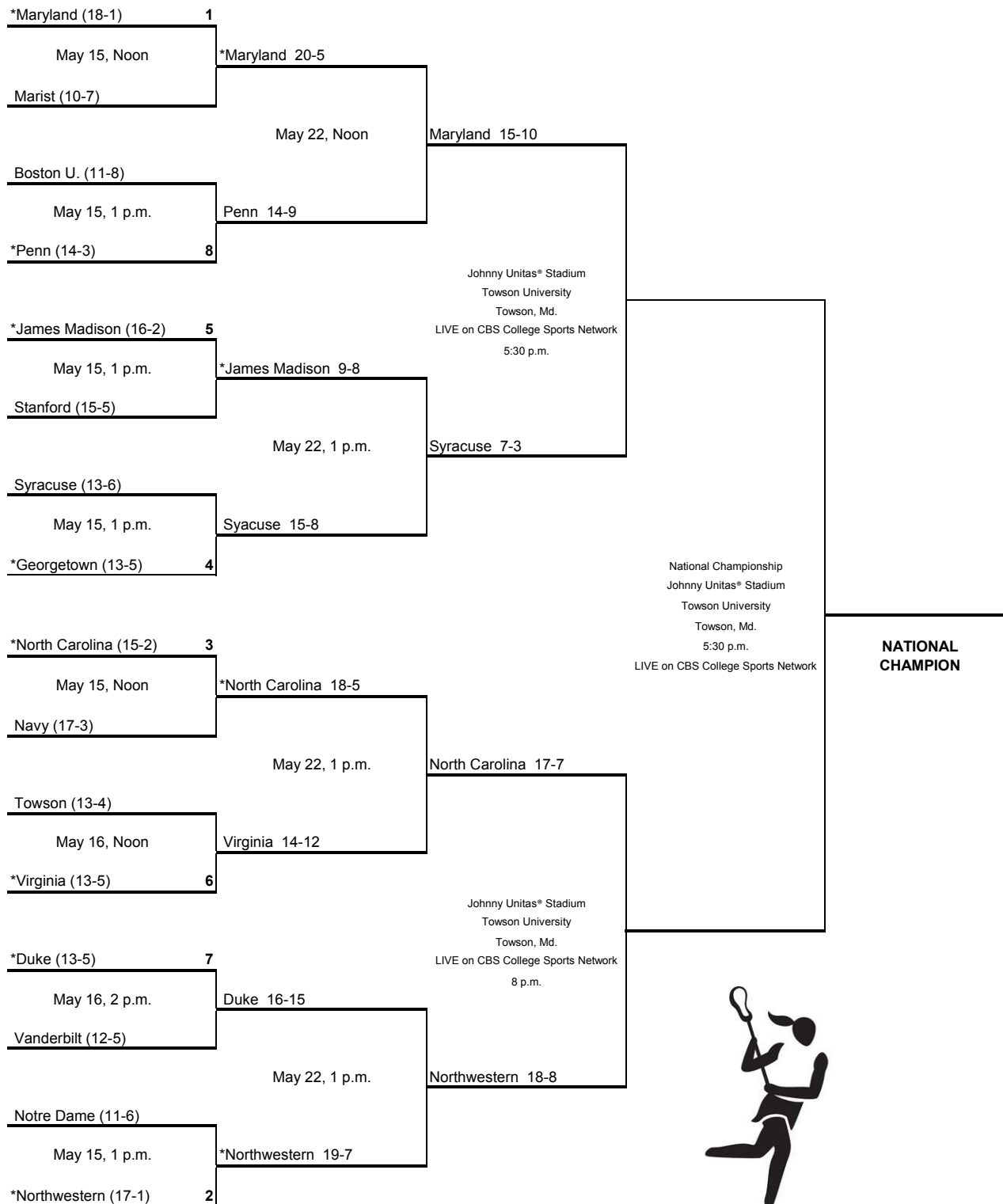
