THEY'RE BACK - TITLE TERPS READY TO DEFEND CROWN

- Maryland is looking to extend its nation-topping numbers by garnering its 27th appearance in the NCAA Tournament and 12th national title in 2011. While the absence of Tewaaraton winner Caitlyn McFadden and IWLCA National Defender of the Year Karissa Taylor will undoubtedly leave a void, 2010 IWLCA National Coach of the Year Cathy Reese and the Terps look forward to filling the gaps with a mix of old and new to create yet another national champion contending unit for the 2011 season.
- Three IWLCA All-Americans return for the defending national champion Terps, including senior attacker Sarah Mollison, junior attacker Karri Ellen Johnson and sophomore midfielder Katie Schwarzmann. Johnson has been pegged by *Lacrosse Magazine* as its preseason national player of the year.
- Top defender Katie Gallagher is a welcomed back-addition to the roster after serving a redshirt season during the Terrapin's run to the crown.
- The Terps home schedule will be an exciting one as Maryland welcomes the likes of Penn State, Duke, Syracuse, Penn and North Carolina to the Field Hockey & Lacrosse Complex.

2011 NATIONAL CHAMPION MARYLAND WOMEN'S LACROSSE SCOUTING PENN...

- Penn (7-1) dropped its lone game of the season last week at Johns Hopkins. The Quakers' signature win of the year came in an early-season battle with North Carolina.
- Penn is led offensively by Erin Brennan (14g, 7a) and Giulia Giordano (12g, 4a), but make no mistake, this is a defensiveminded unit. Leading that defense is goalie Emily Leitner, who boasts a 6.25 GAA.
- Maryland leads the all-time series, 15-2, and knocked the Quakers from the NCAA Quarterfinals last season.

TEN-SPOT LIFTS TERPS

- · Sarah Mollison scored a career-high 10 points on five goals and five assists as No.1 Maryland toppled Towson, 17-8, in non-conference action on the road Tuesday.
- · Karri Ellen Johnson netted five goals and Katie Schwarzmann added three to join Mollison in a three-pronged attack to lift Maryland (11-0, 3-0 ACC) to its 21st consecutive victory. Kristy Black registered five ground balls and a pair of caused turnovers to pace the Terp defense.

THE HOME STRETCH

- Maryland welcomes its final three home opponents of the regular season, beginning with a match against No. 8 Penn Friday night.
- · North Carolina visits College Park April 9 and Princeton is the Terps' foe on Senior Day April 13 at Ludwig Field.

MERRIFIELD PACES TERPS PAST NO. 5 VIRGINIA

- · A five-goal effort from Laura Merrifield helped fuel No. 1 Maryland as it dominated No. 5 Virginia, 18-6, on the road in Atlantic Coast Conference action.
- Merrifield, who was announced as one. of five Maryland players on this year's preliminary Tewaaraton watch list earlier in the day, notched a season-high five goals on five shots. Fellow Tewaaraton nominees Karri Ellen Johnson and Katie Schwarzmann tallied four and three goals, respectively.

BALANCED ATTACK DOWNS NO. 3 DUKE

 Katie Schwarzmann and Karri Ellen Johnson scored five goals each to lead No. 1 Maryland to its first marguee win of the season against No. 3 Duke, 18-11. Schwarzmann tallied her third five-goal showing for Maryland and added a teamhigh five ground balls, three draw controls, and two caused turnovers. Johnson moved into sixth all-time in career goals at Maryland with five on the day and also added an assist, three ground balls, and two caused turnovers.

HISTORY IN THE MAKING

- Maryland has held two opponents to two goals this season - a feat that has not been done since 2003.
- The Terps' 19-point win over George Mason is the highest margin of victory for the Terps since a 24-5 win against Johns Hopkins in April of 2001.

SHUTDOWN DEFENSE

- The Maryland defense has allowed an opponent to score more than eight goals only five times in the last 22 games.
- The Terps surrendered 13 scores at North Carolina April 10, 2010 - their last loss - and gave up 10 to Penn and 11 to Northwestern in the NCAA Tournament. Maryland allotted Duke 11 and Boston College nine this season.
- · The Terps are giving up an average of 6.45 goals per game in 2011 including holding No. 16 Penn State and George Mason to two goals - a feat not done by Maryland since 2003.

NATIONALLY SPEAKING...

- · Maryland boasts the top scoring margin (10.5) and scoring offense (16.8) nationally. The Terps also rank fourth in scoring defense (5.71) and second in total points offense (254).
- Sarah Mollison leads the nation in total assists and ranks ninth in points. Karri Ellen Johnson is 12th in points and 13th in goals per game. Alex Aust is 13th in assists. Brittany Dipper is third in goals against average.
- The Terps have four players in the top 100 nationally in total points, including Mollison, Johnson, Schwarzmann and Kristy Black.

TEWAARATON TERPS

- · Maryland has five players on this year's Tewaaraton Watch List, including seniors Laura Merrifield and Sarah Mollison, juniors Karri Ellen Johnson and Brittany Dipper and sophomore Katie Schwarzmann.
- The watch list will eventually be whittled down three more times until the top ten finalists are named in May.
- Caitlyn McFadden became Maryland's second Tewaaraton award winner last season.

TALE OF THE TURNOVER

- Maryland is dominating the turnover battle this season, forcing opponents into 40 more turnovers than it is making.
- The Terps have had less or equal turnovers than their opponent in all 11 games this season.
- Maryland is also clearing the ball at a .829 clip compared to its opponents (.736).

SMALLS DISHIN' IT OUT

- · Sarah Mollison added her name to the Maryland career assists list this season.
- The senior from Melbourne, Australia, is fifth all-time in career helpers at Maryland with 107.
- She tied a school-record for assists in a game with six in the season opener at Richmond.



JOHNSON, SCHWARZMANN NAB ACC WEEKLY AWARDS

- Maryland swept the league weekly awards as Karri Ellen Johnson and Katie Schwarzmann were tabbed ACC Offensive and Defensive Player of the Week for the period ending March 1.
- Johnson scored five goals and added an assist to lead No. 1 Maryland to its' first ACC win this season. Johnson also notched three ground balls, two draw controls and two caused turnovers.
- Schwarzmann coupled her third fivegoal performance this season with a phenomenal defensive effort against Duke. The sophomore was steady on the defensive end of the field, racking up a game-high five ground balls, three draw controls and two caused turnovers. She was also named Synapse Defensive Player of the Week and WomensLax.com Player of the Week.

TERPS IMPRESSIVE 'D'

- An impressive Maryland defense has allowed 71 goals through its first 11 games in 2011.
- That number is the least amount of scores a Terrapin defense has allowed through 11 games since it gave up 65 in 1999. Maryland won the national championship that season.

KEJ TABBED PRESEASON BEST

- Junior attacker Karri Ellen Johnson has been named Lacrosse Magazine's NCAA Division I Preseason Player of the Year, announced by the publication Monday.
- Johnson, a local product from Annapolis, amassed 143 goals in only two seasons in College Park. She capped last year's magical run to the program's 10th NCAA championship by scoring three times in the Terps' 13-11 win over five-time defending champion Northwestern in the NCAA final.
- The two-time IWLCA All-American is currently ranked fourth all-time in career goals at Maryland with 177.

PROTECT THIS HOUSE

- Maryland is 45-1 at home under fifth-year head coach Cathy Reese.
- The Terps have won all five games in which they have played an opponent ranked No. 1 or No. 2 at home in the past four seasons and have done it in three different locations.
- The Terps are 185-15 in College Park dating back to 1990 with 12 perfect seasons in that span.
- Records of home and away games are incomplete from 1974-89.

COLLEGE PARK -STREAK CITY

- Maryland's Sarah Mollison and Karri Ellen Johnson each possess scoring streaks which rank among the best nationally.
- Johnson and Mollison boast a string of 56 consecutive games with either an assist or a goal.
- The Terps have won 21 consecutive games, dating back to 2010.

THE 100 ASSIST CLUB

- Sarah Mollison found favorite target Karri Ellen Johnson with 1:01 remaining in the first half against James Madison March 26 to pick up her 100th career helper.
- The senior became only the sixth player in Maryland history to hit the century mark for assists.
- She is on pace to crush her singleseason best tally of 38 set in 2009.

RED, WHITE & BLUE TERPS

- When the Terps tangled with the U.S. this preseason, they were withouth the services of key players Katie Schwarzmann and Brittany Poist.
- Schwarzmann, an IWLCA Second Team All-American and the ACC Rookie of the Year in 2010, is in her first full season with U.S. Senior National Team. She joins her older sister, Lauren, on the squad.
- Poist is also experiencing her first action with the U.S. Senior National Team. A transfer from the University of Louisville, Poist played an integral role for Maryland as a junior, helping lead the nation's top defense.
- Former Terps Acacia Walker and Caitlyn McFadden are also on the U.S. National Team.

INTERNATIONAL FLAIR

- Maryland boasts three players from countries outside the U.S., including captains Sarah Mollison (Australia) and Laura Merrifield (England).
- A transfer from Cal-Berkley, Camilla Hayes joins Merrifield as a representative from England.

WHAT A RIDE...

- Maryland captured its 10th NCAA crown when it staged an incredible comeback from a 6-0 deficit against five-time defending champion Northwestern in the national title game to conclude the 2010 season.
- It was Maryland's first NCAA title since 2001. The game was played in front a record-crowd totaling nearly 10,000 people.

TERPS RACK UP SEVENTH ACC CHAMPIONSHIP

- Led by five points from Caitlyn McFadden and a career-high 12 saves from Brittany Dipper, Maryland upended No.
 North Carolina, 10-5, to win its second consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference Championship title in 2010.
- UNC was held to its lowest goal output of the year while Brittany Poist led the Terrapin defense with two ground balls and two caused turnovers. Maryland, which has played host to the ACC Women's Lacrosse Championship twice, has won the tournament in both attempts with defeats of Carolina in the title game on each occasion.
- McFadden was tabbed tournament most valuable player while teammates Dipper, Karri Ellen Johnson, Sarah Mollison, Laura Merrifield, and Karissa Taylor joined her on the all-tournament team.

TERPS LAX -A FAMILY AFFAIR

- Maryland freshmen Abbey Clipp and Annie Farrell have a family link to the Terps.
- Clipp's sister Becky is a former All-American for the women's lacrosse program. Farrell's brother, Brian, is an All-American long pole for the Terrapin men's lacrosse unit.

THE YOUNG AND TALENTED

- Four freshmen once again represented the University of Maryland when they played in the 2010 Under Armour All-America Game.
- Brooke Griffin led all South scorers with three goals as the North edged the South.
- Beth Glaros, Amalie Trentzsch and Kelsey Horton all earned starts and joined Griffin.
- Horton tallied a team-high four assists on the day, including two to Griffin, while adding a goal. Glaros scooped a ground ball and the combo of Griffin and Horton gathered a combined six draw controls in the all-star action.

GALLAGHER RETURNS FOR DEFENSE

- After serving a redshirt season during Maryland's run to the national title in 2010, Katie Gallagher returns to action in 2011 to help rejuvenate a defense that will be without the services of departing seniors Abby Caso and Karissa Taylor.
- Gallagher is entering her third season as a starter and totaled 24 caused turnovers and 33 ground balls prior to her redshirt senior season in 2011.

2011 CAPTAINS

- Cathy Reese has named seniors Sarah Mollison, Katie Gallagher and Laura Merrifield captains for the 2011 campaign.
- Mollison served as captain last year as a junior. The attacker was third on the team last season with 45 goals. The Melbourne, Australia, native is a two-time All-American and returns for her third season as a starter
- Gallagher missed last season with an illness but is poised to lead the Terrapin defense in 2011. One of Maryland's strongest players, Gallagher is a three-year starter for the Terps and played a key role in the squad capturing the 2009 ACC Championship.
- Merrifield has been a steady force in the midfield for Maryland since her arrival. As one of the tallest players in the country, she brings an imposing stature to the Terps' offensive scheme and also boasts the speed to allow Maryland to run its fast-paced style of play.

REESE RETURNS FOR FIFTH SEASON

- Head coach Cathy Reese returns for her fifth season at her alma mater.

Johnson completed a hat trick and Mollison boasted four helpers in the first stanza alone.

Head Coach Cathy Reese Fifth season/Eighth overall Maryland, '98 88-9 record at Maryland

Former Maryland standout and reigning IWLCA National Coach of the Year Cathy Reese enters her fifth season at the helm of the Terrapins' women's lacrosse program after guiding Maryland to its first national championship since 2001 last season.

With the Terps falling just once in regular season play, Maryland wrapped up the 2010 campaign on a devastating 10-game winning streak, which concluded in elation with a gallant comeback against five-time defending national champion Northwestern in the NCAA Women's Lacrosse Championship at Towson. Reese coached Maryland's first Tewaaraton Award winner since Jen Adams as Caitlyn McFadden was tabbed the top player in all of women's lacrosse. Four other Terrapins landed All-America status as well and Reese garnered IWLCA National Coach of the Year honors along with being named the top coach in the conference for the second straight season.

Reese had Maryland on the verge of perfection in 2009, leading the Terps to a 21-1 record, an NCAA Final Four trip, and ACC Tournament and Regular Season championships. She boasted three Tewaaraton nominees, five All-Americans, five All-ACC honorees, the ACC Player and Rookie of the Year and the IWLCA Midfielder of the Year. Reese also earned a few honors of her own, racking up IWLCA South Region Coach of the Year accolades along with her second ACC Coach of the Year award in only three short seasons at the helm of the storied Maryland program.

Reese continued to move Maryland in a positive direction in 2008, steering the Terps to an 18-3 record and an Atlantic Coast Conference regular season title. Once again. Reese boasted some of the top talent in the nation as senior Dana Dobbie was tabbed ACC Player of the Year in addition to being named a finalist for the Tewaarton Trophy, given annually to the nation's best player. Dobbie and fellow seniors Kelly Kasper and Lauren Cohen joined sophomore Caitlyn McFadden on the All-America team while Kasper accompanied Dobbie as a Tewaarton finalist. The Terps' 18-3 record was the best for the program since 2003 as Maryland punched its ticket to the NCAA Tournament for the 18th consecutive season.

Reese returned to her alma mater in 2007 as the head coach and guided the Terps to a 16-4 record, including a first-place finish in the Atlantic Coast Conference at 4-1, earning the conference's Coach of the Year award.

Maryland had bowed out of the NCAA Tournament in the first round the previous two seasons, but Reese's Terps advanced to the guarterfinals for the first time since 2004 and had the most wins since 2003. Included in those 16 wins were a pair against teams ranked No. 1 and No. 2 in the country against North Carolina and Duke, respectively.

Reese's guidance produced more than just team success. Dana Dobbie was a finalist for the Tewaaraton Trophy, given annually to the nation's best player, and was the ACC Player of the Year. In addition, Dobbie along with Becky Clipp, Kelly Kasper, and Krista Pellizzi were named All-Americans.

Reese returned to Maryland after spending her first three seasons as head coach at the University of Denver where she guided the Pioneers to their most successful season in school history in 2006. Denver finished that year with a 16-5 record and rattled off 11-straight wins over the course of 43 days. The 11-game win streak was more victories than the school had seen in an entire season as its eight wins in 2003 was the most in a season for the Pioneers prior to 2006.

For a program that saw limited success since its inception in 1999, Reese proved that she is a winner. With a 4-1 Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) record, the Pioneers won its first-ever regular season championship in 2006. For her efforts, Reese was named the 2006 MPSF Coach of the Year. In addition, two of her student-athletes were also given season-ending awards as Denver sweeped the conference accolades. Kristie Leggio was tabbed the Player of the Year and Karen Morton was the Newcomer of the Year.

In her three seasons in the Mile High City, 11 student-athletes were named to the All-MPSF Team. Not only did her students excel on the field, but they also achieved in the classroom as Denver studentathletes were named to the Academic All-Conference team 11 times.

Prior to lifting the Denver program to national attention, Reese spent nine seasons in College Park, four as a student-athlete and five as an assistant coach. During that span, the women's lacrosse program had one of the most successful streaks seen in collegiate women's sports history. The Terps won seven national championships in her first nine years on campus. That is the third-longest streak in women's

When Reese first stepped foot on campus as a freshman, it was impossible to gauge how successful she and the Terps would be. Maryland did not lose in her first two seasons as a student-athlete, and it did not lose until midway through her junior campaign. In all, Reese and the Terps went 50-straight games without a loss. In her playing career, Reese guided the Terps to an incredible 75-4 record. In her first three seasons as assistant coach, the Terps went 65-1. Her total record with Maryland in her first nine seasons was 169-19. The Terps also made the NCAA quarterfinals in 2002 and advanced to the national semifinals in 2003 before Reese took the reins at Denver.

As a student-athlete from 1995-98, she was a two-time All-America selection. As a senior, she was tabbed the NCAA Tournament Most Valuable Player and was the second-leading scorer on that championship team with 58 goals and 25 assists. She finished her career with 140 goals, 77 assists, and 217 points. Her 77 assists is tied for eighth all-time at Maryland and her 217 points is 11th.

Reese graduated in 1998 with a degree in speech communications. She and her husband, Brian, who is also a volunteer coach for the program, have three children, Riley, who is six years old, and Brody, who is four years old. Reese gave birth to her first girl, Cayden Elizabeth, on March 12, 2008.
