TERPS KNOCK OFF TWO TOP 15 TEAMS, MAKE ACC TOURNEY

A QUICK LOOK AT 2005

- While the 2005 season failed to live up to the preseason hype surrounding the team, which looked to follow up a Sweet 16 NCAA Tournament performance in 2004 with another deep run in the NCAA Tournament, there were plenty of bright spots for the Terps.
- Playing the nation's toughest schedule, Maryland battled some of the top teams
 in the country and pulled off two major upsets, beginning with a 1-0 shutout of
 #11 Wake Forest at the end of September. Nataly Arias gave Maryland the
 victory by ripping a 35-yard blast past the Demon Deacon goalkeeper for the
 game's lone goal. The Terps pulled off another upset in their final home game
 of the season, sending the team's seven seniors out with a memorable victory,
 2-1, over No. 8 Boston College at the end of October.
- Junior goalkeeper Nikki Resnick had a remarkable season and was rewarded as a first team All-ACC selection. She led the conference in saves per game in both conference games and all games. The Boca Raton, Fla., native, also set the Ludwig Field record for saves in a game with 14 against No. 1 North Carolina on Oct. 2.
- Senior Kimmy Francis capped off her remarkable career by leading the team in points, goals, assists and shots. She finished among the all-time top 10 in points, goals, assists, shots and game winning goals.
- Another bright spot for the Terps was the emergence of a strong freshman class.
 Maryland got significant contributions from five freshmen Kimmy Bunting,
 Aimee Bresani, Amanda Paizs, Lauren Sands and Kaila Sciascia. Bunting
 played three different positions, including starting and earning a shutout in goal.
 Bresani started each of the 17 matches that she played and missed only one
 game due to a broken nose. Paizs made five starts and helped solidify a defense
 that had to be shuffled due to various injuries. Sands provided an offensive spark
 off the bench and appeared in 11 games. Sciascia played in all 18 games, one
 of only eight Terps to do so and the only freshman, made eight starts and was
 third on the team with 31 shots.
- The seven seniors Mel Anderson, Simone Dekker, Laura Desobry, Kimmy Francis, Lauren Krasko, Mallory Mahar and Danielle Malagari - left a lasting legacy which includes three NCAA Tournament appearances, the school's first Sweet 16 appearance since the tournament expanded to 64 teams, and 10 victories over Top 25 opponents. Since 2002, the Terps have shutout their opponents on 24 occasions, including 14 during the past two seasons.

ACC HONORS PAIR OF TERPS

- Junior goalkeeper Nikki Resnick and senior forward/midfielder Kimmy Francis were named to the All-ACC teams prior to the ACC Tournament.
- Resnick was named to the All-ACC first team, marking her first all-conference honor. She was an All-ACC Tournament selection in 2004. Francis earned the third second team All-ACC honor of her career.

RESNICK TOPS IN ACC

- Goalkeeper Nikki Resnick, a native of Boca Raton, Fla., led the ACC in saves per game (6.24). In Maryland's 10 ACC games last season she stopped 78 shots for an amazing 7.8 saves per game average.
- For the season Resnick has made 106 saves in 17 games. Among the other seven teams in the ACC Tournament, the next closest save total belongs to Clemson's Ashley Phillips with 82.

RESNICK SHUTS OUT THE ACC

- Nikki Resnick is fifth in career shutouts at Maryland with 11, but six of those shutouts have come against ACC opponents, including three ranked among the Top 11 in the nation at the time.
- In 2005, Resnick tied for eighth in the conference with four shutouts overall, but three of those have come in ACC play which ties her for fourth in shutouts in ACC games.



FRANCIS FINISHES IN FINE STYLE


- Senior captain Kimmy Francis moved up several of Maryland's all-time lists during the 2005 season.
- With an assist on Aimee Bresani's goal vs. BC, Francis moved into sole possession of third place on the career points chart with 67. She was tied for third with Robin McCullough with 66. In second place is Emmy Harbo with 140 points.
- With her goal vs. NC State, Francis moved into a sole-possession of the sixth spot on the all-time goal scoring list with 22 goals. She is two shy of tying Jackie Mynarski for fifth with 24 goals and three shy of Michelle Deville, who compiled 25 goals during her career. Francis is already one of only eight players in the history of Maryland women's soccer to score 20 or more goals in their careers



The senior from Richboro, Pa., is second on the career shots list with 225. With 11 shots in the 2-1 victory over NC State, Francis passed Emmy Harbo who fired 214 shots during her career.

LONG RANGE THREAT

- Sophomore midfielder Nataly Arias has made a habit of scoring big goals for the Terps in ACC action - or should it be long goals. Two of Arias' four career goals have come on 35-yard blasts to either tie or beat a Top 15 opponent.
- Last year with the Terps trailing 1-0 vs. No. 14 Florida State at home, Arias fired a 35-yarder with her right foot that sailed past FSU's keeper into the net to give the Terps a 1-1 tie.
- Arias did the exact same thing on Sept. 30
 vs. No. 11 Wake Forest, but this time the
 game was scoreless at the time and the
 Terrapins were able to hold on for a 1-0
 victory.



PLAYING OVERTIME

- Maryland has played six overtime games in 2005, tying for the second most in team history with the 1988 team. That '88 squad was 1-3-2 in those six games, while this year's Terrapins are 1-2-3.
- The record for most overtime games in a single season belongs to the 2004 Maryland team, which played in eight overtime contests (2-2-4).

PLAYING THE BEST

- Once again in 2005, Maryland's strength of schedule was the toughest in the nation, according to SoccerRatings.com. The Terrapins' opponent rating, which is the average rating of their opponents, is 1772. The only teams even close to Maryland are Washington (1762), Stanford (1747) and Santa Clara (1741).
- Another way to judge the quality of schedule Maryland played in 2005 is to look
 at its opponents combined overall record. The Terps 2005 opponents combined
 to go 262-114-30 (.682). Compare that to Florida State's (.604) or Penn State's
 (.596) (the two Terp opponents to make the College Cup) opponent winning
 percentage.
- Maryland played 11 of the 64 teams (17% of the field) in the 2005 NCAA Tournament. The Terps played 12 of their 18 games (66.7% of the schedule) against those 11 teams (Maryland played North Carolina twice in 2005) going 2-9-1.
- The Terps took on nine teams ranked in the final NSCAA regular season poll including three of the top five and five of the top 10. The Terps played No. 2

North Carolina (L, 0-4 at Ludwig, L, 1-3 in Cary, N.C.), hosted No. 3 Penn State (L, 0-3), at No. 5 Notre Dame (L, 0-6), at No. 7 Virginia (L, 0-2), at No. 10 Duke (L, 0-1), at No. 11 Florida State (L, 1-3), hosted No. 14 Boston College (W, 2-1 W), vs. No. 16 UConn at the Notre Dame Invitational (L, 1-2, 2OT), hosted No. 22 Yale (L, 0-1 L). Maryland also faced Clemson (T, 0-0, 2OT), which also received votes.

• During six of the past seven seasons, Maryland has at least one upset win or tie of a top-10 ranked team: a 4-3 win at No. 9 Duke on Sept. 19, 1999 and a 2-1 victory over Clemson on Oct. 17, 1999; a 3-1 win over No. 4 Penn State on Aug. 29, 2000; a 1-0 overtime over No. 8 Clemson on Oct. 13, 2001 and a 1-1 tie at No. 2 North Carolina last season, on Nov. 1, 2002. Most recently, the Terps stunned No. 3 UCLA 2-1 at the Virginia Soccer Classic on Sept. 12, 2004. A month and a half later, Maryland beat No. 10 Duke 1-0 in overtime at Ludwig Field. The Terps topped all of those victories with a 1-0 shutout of No. 2 seed Penn State in the 2004 NCAA Tournament. The win also snapped the Nittany Lions 39-game home winning streak and was head coach Paula Wilkins' first-ever loss at Jeffrey Field. The Terps extended that streak in 2005 with a 2-1 upset of No. 8 Boston College on Oct. 29 at Ludwig Field.



2004 CAME RECAPS

GAME 1 - AUG. 26 TOWSON......0 (20T) MARYLAND......0

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The University of Maryland women's soccer team opened its 2005 season with a 0-0 double-overtime tie with Towson Friday night at Ludwig Field

The Terps dominated play, outshooting the Tigers 26-2 in 110 minutes of play, but could not get a shot past Towson goalkeeper Brandi Daniels, who stopped 13 Terrapin shots.

"My hat is off to Leslie Wray and Towson," said Maryland head coach **Brian Pensky**, who was coaching his first game as a collegiate head coach. "They defended well and found a way to get a tie.

"I thought our effort at times was very good. I'm disappointed for our players that we didn't find a way to get a goal and come out of this one with a victory. Now we have to learn from this and move on. We have an important game vs. Rhode Island on Sunday."

Towson packed its defensive zone and limited the number of quality scoring chances for the Terps. Maryland's best chance in the opening half came at the 15:48 mark when senior midfielder **Kimmy Francis** found All-American **Mallory Mahar** on the end of a corner kick. Mahar's header seemed to be heading into the top corner of the Towson net, but Daniels made a spectacular diving stop to preserve the 0-0 score.

After giving up 12 shots and seven corner kicks in the first half, the Tigers settled even more into a defensive scheme. Towson allowed only seven shots in the second half, with only two of those on goal.

Maryland's best scoring chance of the game came in the 94th minute when freshman forward **Kimmy Bunting** came away with a loose ball and had Daniels one-on-one inside the penalty box, but once again Daniels was able to rise to the occasion and made the game-saving stop.

Bunting found herself challenging the Tiger goal in the second overtime period in the 104th minute when sophomore **Ashly Kennedy**, who returned to action after missing the entire 2004 season with a knee injury, crossed the ball from deep in the left corner of the Towson backfield. Bunting was able to get a good header on the ball, but it sailed high over the Tiger net.

Junior goalkeeper **Nikki Resnick** was only challenged once in the game, having to make her only save of the game in the 13th minute.

Francis finished the game with six shots, moving her into sole possession of third place on the school's all-time shots list. She now has 178 for her career.

GAME 2 - AUG. 28 RHODE ISLAND0 MARYLAND4

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - First-year head coach **Brian Pensky** had to wait an additional two days to get his first collegiate coaching win, but the 24th-ranked University of Maryland women's soccer team made sure the wait would not be any longer. The Terps scored three goals in the first half en route to a 4-0 shutout of Rhode Island Sunday afternoon at Ludwig Field.

"I'm very proud of this team," said Pensky. "Friday was a tough result and the challenge was to put that game behind us and look forward to today, and I think we did that."

Senior All-American **Mallory Mahar** started the Terrapin scoring with a great through ball to the feet of sophomore **Kelly Rozumalski**, who beat Rams goalkeeper Ria Carroll with a well-placed shot into the lower right corner of the net for the Terps first goal of the 2005 season.

Senior forward **Melissa Anderson**, who missed each of the last two seasons due to injuries, scored for the first time since September 22, 2002 to give the Terps a 2-0 lead in the 33rd minute. Mahar started the play with two shots inside Rhode Island's penalty box that were blocked. NOTRE DAME, Ind. - The University of Maryland women's soccer team battled No. 9 Connecticut for nearly 110 minutes, but the Huskies were able to pull out a 2-1 victory in the second overtime in the first game of the Notre Dame Invitational at Alumni Field in Notre Dame, Ind.

UConn's Brittany Taylor scored the game winner in the 109th minute when she was able to take a long ball from Jennifer Sullivan, split the Maryland defense and fire a shot into the far right corner of the Terrapin goal. The goal capped two tremendously hard-fought overtime periods, during which neither team could really mount a serious threat.

"This was a great challenge," said Maryland head coach **Brian Pensky**. "UConn was a very good team tonight, but we were quite good as well. Our players deserved a better result. We battled for nearly 110 minutes and at no point did we believe we were going to lose."

For a game that ended up being a battle of attrition, guts and gritty defensive work, it didn't start out that way

The Huskies jumped on top of the Terps in the ninth minute when UConn capitalized on a Maryland turnover to take a 1-0 lead. The second overtime saw each team get a couple of opportunities before Taylor's game-winning goal. For the Terps, All-American Mallory Mahar settled a lo\ose ball at the top of the UConn box, but this time Labbe was able to hold on for the save.

Despite the loss, the Maryland team showed tremendous determination, especially in the defensive backfield, where defenders Sarah Sample, Lauren Krasko, Ashly Kennedy and Malagari limited UConn to just four shots on goal.

"This is a tough result for us," said Pensky, "but we must put it behind us and get ready to play the defending national champions on Sunday, which is not only a challenge, but a tremendous opportunity as well."

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Sarah Sample's first goal as a Maryland Terrapin gave the Terps' women's soccer team a 2-1 overtime victory over NC State Thursday night at Ludwig Field.

"Our defensive pressure in the first half was very good," said Terrapin head coach **Brian Pensky**. "Our possession, when we won it, was some of our best all year. We showed great resiliency in overtime by finding a way to finish off a win that this team, and this program, needed very much."

Maryland, which dominated the game and out shot the Wolfpack 30-13, took an early 1-0 lead on **Kimmy Francis'** team-leading third goal of the season in the ninth minute of play. An NC State defender was whistled for a foul just outside the Wolfpack 18-yard box, giving Francis a free kick from 24 yards. 


