TERPS KNOCK OFF TWO TOP 11 TEAMS, SHOW PROMISE FOR FUTURE

A QUICK LOOK AT 2006

- The 2006 Terrapin women's soccer team showed the college soccer community that the Terps will be a force to be reckoned with in the future.
- Playing one of the nation's toughest schedule Maryland battled some of the top teams in the country and pulled off two major upsets, beginning with a 1-0 shutout of #10 Tennessee in the season opener at the Penn State Classic on August 25. The game's lone goal came when a pair of freshmen, making their first appearance for Maryland, hooked up for the score. **Emily Maynard** took a through-ball from **Brittany Cummins** and chipped in a shot from 35-yards out. The Terps pulled off another upset in their final home game of the season, sending the team's three seniors out with a memorable victory, 2-0, over No. 11 Virginia at the end of October.
- Senior goalkeeper **Nikki Resnick** had a remarkable final season and was rewarded with her second-straight first team All-ACC honor. She led the conference in saves per game in both conference games and all games. The Boca Raton, Fla., native, also tied her own Ludwig Field record for saves in a game with 14 in a 0-0 tie with Duke on Oct. 14.
- The strong freshman class from 2005 had another solid season, highlighted by **Aimee Bresani**, who started all 18 games for the Terps and helped hold their opponents to just 15 goals for the season. **Kaila Sciascia** scored the first two goals of her career, while **Amanda Paizs** netted her first career assist.
- The 2006 freshman class proved to be one of the most promising in years. **Emily Maynard** led the Terrapins in goals and points, despite missing four games due to injury. **Molly Dreska** proved to be a solid and exciting player and tallied three assists, but a torn ACL ended her season after just 13 games. **Mary Casey** was brought in as a goalkeeper, but was moved to defense due to injuries and was solid in front of Resnick, starting 12 games. **Maureen Dowling** played in 10 games with two starts and scored the game-winner vs. Stony Brook.

RESNICK EARNS ALL-ACC HONORS

- Goalkeeper **Nikki Resnick** was named to the All-ACC first team prior to the ACC Tournament.
- Resnick led the conference in total saves (123), overall saves per game (6.83), saves in ACC games (74) and saves per ACC game (7.4).
- Resnick's selection marks the second consecutive season she has been named to the All-ACC first team. The only other Maryland player to be named to two All-ACC first teams was Erin Taylor in 1996 and 1997.

RESNICK SHUTS OUT THE ACC

- Nikki Resnick is second in career shutouts at Maryland with 19 and 10 of those shutouts have come against ACC opponents, including four ranked among the Top 11 in the nation at the time.
- In 2006, Resnick was third in the conference with eight shutouts overall, but four of those have come in ACC play which tied her for third in shutouts in ACC games.

RESNICK IN THE TERRAPIN RECORD BOOK

- Nikki Resnick finished her brilliant three-year career near the top of every goalkeeping category in the Terps' record book. She is second all-time as a Terp in saves (353), goals against average (1.16) and shutouts (19).

MAYNARD LEADS TEAM IN SCORING AS FRESHMAN

- Emily Maynard led the Terps in goals and points, marking the first time since 2002 that a freshman topped those two offensive categories.
- Overall, Maynard is the sixth player in school history to lead the team in goals in her first season and just the fifth to be the leading point-scorer.

PLAYING OVERTIME

- Maryland played five overtime games in 2006. During the past three seasons the Terps have played in 19 overtime games with a record of 3-5-11 in those contests.
- Towson has been a consistent overtime foe for the Terps during the past three seasons. Maryland took a 1-0 win at Towson in 2004 before going to 0-0 double-overtime ties in each of the past two campaigns.
- Clemson, Virginia Tech and Duke have each played Maryland to overtime games twice over the past three seasons.

AT LUDWIG FIELD

- Since its opening in 1995, Ludwig Field has proved to be a tremendous home-field advantage for the Terps women's soccer team. All-time Maryland is 80-35-12 (.677) at Ludwig Field.
- Through the seasons, the Terps have had a knack for shutting teams out at Ludwig Field. Maryland has won 54 of its 80 games (68%) at Ludwig Field via shutout. Add in the eight 0-0 ties the Terps have had at Ludwig Field and it totals 62 times that Maryland has shutout its opponent in 127 games (48.8%).
- All-time in ACC games at Ludwig Field the Terrapins are 21-18-8 (.532).

BEATING THE BEST

- During seven of the past eight seasons, Maryland has at least one upset win or tie of a top-10 ranked team: 4-3 win at No. 9 Duke on Sept. 19, 1999 and a 2-1 victory over Clemson on Oct. 17, 1999; a 3-1 win over No. 4 Penn State on Aug. 29, 2000; a 1-0 overtime over No. 8 Clemson on Oct. 13, 2001 and a 1-1 tie at No. 2 North Carolina on Nov. 1, 2002. The Terps stunned No. 3 UCLA 2-1 at the Virginia Soccer Classic on Sept. 12, 2004. A month and a half later, Maryland beat No. 10 Duke 1-0 in overtime at Ludwig Field. The Terps topped all of those victories with a 1-0 shutout of No. 2 seed Penn State in the 2004 NCAA Tournament. The win also snapped the Nittany Lions 39-game home winning streak and was head coach Paula Wilkins' first-ever loss at Jeffrey Field. The Terps extended that streak in 2005 with a 2-1 upset of No. 8 Boston College on Oct. 29 at Ludwig Field. Jeffrey Field proved lucky for the Terps again in the 2006 season opener as they knocked off No. 10 Tennessee 1-0 at the Penn State Classic on Aug. 25. Most recently, Maryland knocked off No. 11 Virginia, 2-0, in its 2006 home finale at Ludwig Field.

2006 GAME RECAPS

GAME 1 - AUG. 25 PENN STATE CLASSIC

#10 TENNESSEE 0
MARYLAND..... 1

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - Freshman midfielder Emily Maynard started her college career with a bang, scoring the lone goal for the Maryland women's soccer team in its 1-0 victory over No. 10 Tennessee in the opening game of the Penn State Classic at Jeffrey Field in University Park, Pa.

The Terps (1-0) earned the victory in a fashion that has become a Maryland trademark over the past few seasons, with a hard-nosed defensive effort and an opportunistic offense that finishes its chances.

"I'm extremely proud of our team right now," said Terrapin head coach Brian Pensky. "With the work they put in during the spring and summer they deserved this win. We talk all the time about being connected, both verbally and non-verbally, and tonight we were connected in all areas of the field and that started with Nikki Resnick and our entire back line."

The Lady Vols (0-1) outshot the Terps 6-4 in the opening 45 minutes of play, but it was Maryland that had the best scoring opportunity. That came with just about three minutes left in the half when Tennessee was whistled for a hand-ball in the box, giving Maryland a penalty kick. Junior midfielder Shelley McDuff stepped in to take the shot and struck the ball well, sending a shot toward the lower right corner of the goal. But the goal was denied by the Lady Vols' goalkeeper Jaimel Johnson, who guessed correctly and made a diving save and then controlled the rebound.

The game, which was a physical contest throughout, remained scoreless until the 72nd minute when Maynard scored. The play began in Maryland's defensive third where freshman defender Brittany Cummins sent a pass from the right back position over Tennessee's back four to the far side of the left wing. Johnson was off her line in goal for Tennessee, but Maynard raced in from her left outside midfield spot and beat the keeper to the ball. The freshman from Munster, Ind., was able to punch the ball over the keeper with her laces from 35 yards out for her first collegiate goal on what proved to be Maryland's only shot of the second half.

"It was a class finish by Emily," said Pensky. "Brittany played a great ball behind their back line. For Emily to recognize their goalkeeper cheating off her line and then to be able to technically pull off getting it over the top from 35 yards away was special and fun to watch."

Now with the 1-0 lead, the Maryland defense stepped up its pressure and stifled the Tennessee attack, cutting off the Lady Vols from mounting an offensive threat through the midfield.

Resnick made five saves in goal for the Terps en route to picking up her 12th career shutout, moving her into a tie for third on the all-time list with former Terrapins Heather Rowe and Missy Price.

The victory over the 10th-ranked Lady Vols marks the first time in Maryland's 20-year history that it defeated a ranked team on the road in its season opener.

GAME 2 - AUG. 27 PENN STATE CLASSIC

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - The University of Maryland's women's soccer team entered Sunday's match with No. 1 UCLA with confidence following Friday's 1-0 victory over No. 10 Tennessee, but another upset was not in the cards as the Bruins dropped the Terps, 3-0, at the Penn State Classic.

The Terrapins played the two-time NCAA runner-up tight throughout much of the first half. The Bruins were finally able to break through the tenacious Maryland defense and took a 1-0 lead in the 34th minute of play. Lauren Wilmoth capitalized on a Terrapin foul just outside of the left side of the penalty box by score on the ensuing free kick.

The score would remain 1-0 until the 73rd minute when Bristyn Davis found Stephanie Kron on the left wing where Kron sent a shot into the back right side of the Maryland goal.

The Bruins would tack on their final goal in the 82nd minute when McCall Zerboni scored on a shot from the top of the box into the upper left corner of the net.

"Today's result is disappointing," said Maryland head coach Brian Pensky. "We knew that we were playing a good team, yet our players know that we had an opportunity to steal one. We can point to specific lapses in concentration on our part that led to all three goals, and against good team, you cannot have that."

"Nonetheless we leave the weekend feeling great about our team. The win over Tennessee Friday was well deserved, so we're going home 1-1 and looking forward to two in-state battles next weekend against Towson and UMBC."

GAME 3 - SEPT. 2

TOWSON 0 (2OT)
#25 MARYLAND 0

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The University of Maryland's women's soccer team controlled every aspect of the game against Towson at Ludwig Field, but had to settle for a 0-0 tie in its Mid-Atlantic Regional battle with the Tigers.

"First, congratulations to Towson on a positive result," said Maryland head coach Brian Pensky. "For us, it's frustrating. Our players know we need to do a better job in the final third."

"Today's 0-0 tie wasn't the result of not enough scoring opportunities; it was a result of not taking care of those opportunities. But overall we're very proud of our effort - and I know our players will be chomping at the bit Monday afternoon against UMBC."

The first half played to a 0-0 tie, but the Terps dominated play, controlling the midfield and outshooting the Tigers 11-5. Maryland had some opportunities off of three corner kicks, but could not get a shot past the pesky Towson defense led by goalkeeper Brandi Daniels, who stopped four Terrapin shots.

The second half was another scoreless battle, but both teams certainly had a number of quality scoring opportunities. Towson started the period as the aggressors. Erica Marshall fired a shot in the 57th minute, but Terrapin keeper Nikki Resnick was able to get enough of the ball to tip the ball up and over the net off of the crossbar.

The Tigers would have another quality chance in the 61st minute when a Maryland foul gave Towson a free kick from just outside the 18-yard box. Alison Reinhart took the kick for the Tigers, but sent it high over the goal.

Maryland would respond by controlling possession in the later part of the half. The Terps took four shots in the span of 15 minutes, but Daniels was there to make the saves for Towson. The Terrapins' best opportunity came in the 88th minute when junior midfielder Shelly McDuff sent a through-ball toward the Tiger goal where freshman Molly Dreska beat Daniels to the ball. That left Dreska with an open-net, but her shot deflected off of the left post, ending the threat.

The first overtime period saw Maryland junior Kelly Rozumalski with a scoring chance in the 97th minute, but once again Daniels was there for the save. The Tigers had another free kick in front of the Terrapin goal following a Maryland foul, but this time Reinhart sent the kick harmlessly into the Terp defensive wall.

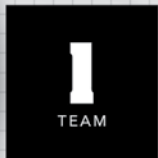

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Junior midfielder Melissa Hornfeck scored two goals and added an assist to lead the University of Maryland women's soccer team to a dominating 6-0 victory over UMBC Monday afternoon at Ludwig Field.

"Today was a great team effort," said Terrapin head coach Brian Pensky. "Six goals from five different people is terrific. We have more depth in the program now than we've had in a number of years. And the players that came in off the bench today worked hard in their effort to earn more minutes."

It didn't take the Terps long to get on the board. Senior midfielder Sarah Sample scored her first goal of the season in just the third minute of play. Redshirt-sophomore Stevie Dunning sent a long cross from the left wing to the right side of the UMBC penalty box where Sample ran onto the ball and finished it into the upper half of the Retriever goal.

A little more than three minutes later junior forward Kelly Rozumalski picked up her first goal of the season, chipping the ball over Retriever goalkeeper Catie Bukowski from 25 yards out. The play began as freshman midfielder Amanda Paizs sent a clean pass to Hornfeck who hit a streaking Rozumalski with a terrific through-ball for the scoring opportunity.

Hornfeck got into the scoring act in the eighth minute of play with her first goal as a Terrapin. Sample started the play with a pass through the center of the UMBC defense that found Hornfeck's feet and she finished with an easy chip into the net from 12 yards out.

The Terps took a 4-0 lead in the 26th minute when freshman midfielder Emily Maynard tallied her second score of the season. Sophomore defender Amanda Paizs picked up her first career assist by starting the play with a pass to Rozumalski, who dropped the ball off with a simple touch for Maynard who finished from 12 yards out in front of the goal.

Hornfeck scored her second of the game in the 51st minute after beating the UMBC keeper one-on-one. Maynard tallied the assist, the first of her Terrapin career, after setting-up the goal with a terrific pass through the center of the Retriever defense.

Maryland continued to press the attack throughout the second half, but could not get another goal across until the 85th minute. That's when redshirt-sophomore defender Lauren Gamble scored the first goal of her career on a long shot that eluded the reach of Retriever back-up keeper Christine Bacinski.

Hornfeck's five points is the first time that a Maryland player has recorded five points in a game since October 1, 2003, when Jen Biscoe and Katie Ludwig each tallied five against James Madison. Coincidentally, that game against the Dukes was ended in a 6-0 win for the Terps, which was the last time Maryland scored six or more goals in a game.

With a commanding lead Coach Pensky was able to rest senior goalkeeper Nikki Resnick for the entire second half, but not before Resnick moved into third place on the school's career saves list. The native of Boca Raton, Fla., now has 255 saves in her career, passing current assistant coach Ali Wolff-Toole, who amassed 254 saves from 1997, 1999-2001.

Overall for the game, Maryland out-shot the Retrievers 26-5. Maryland's victory would have been even more lopsided if not for Bacinski, who racked up nine saves after relieving Bukowski in the 16th minute.

Senior midfielder Sarah Sample raced down the right side of the field and crossed a ball into the FSU six-yard box. The ball bounded through the box where freshman midfielder Molly Dreska one-timed it toward an open Florida State net. But the score was not to be as a Seminole defender was able to deflect Dreska's shot and the ball sailed just wide of the goal.

Sample figured in Maryland's next quality scoring chance as well. Sophomore midfielder Stevie Dunning caused a Nole turnover in the 26th minute and crossed the ball to Sample just outside of the right corner of the FSU 18-yard box. Sample let loose with a shot, but it just missed wide to the right.

Florida State seemed to pick up the pace after that and nearly scored in the 38th minute, but senior goalkeeper Nikki Resnick was there to keep the game scoreless with one of her three saves. A crossed ball into the Maryland 18-yard box bounced around until it found Katrina Schmidt, who volleyed a shot toward the Terrapin goal. Resnick appeared to be out of position, but the native of Boca Raton, Fla., made a leaping save to punch the ball over the goal and end the threat.

The game's lone goal came in the waning moments of the first half. Becky Edwards dribble the ball into the Terps' defensive third and chipped a pass over the Maryland defense, where Kelly Rowland was able to run under it and head the ball into the lower left corner, past a diving Resnick, for a 1-0 Seminole lead.

"Giving up a late goal in the first half was tough," said Pensky, "but we bounced back very well and created a few high-quality chances in the second half."

Maryland pushed the pace in the second half and outshot the Noles 4-3 in the game's final 45 minutes. In fact, the Terrapin defense didn't allow a shot on goal in the second half of play.

Dunning had the second half's first quality scoring opportunity in the 67th minute of play. A Florida State turnover found Dunning's feet at the top of the FSU 18-yard box. Seminole goalkeeper Ali Mims appeared to be caught out of position and Dunning struck the ball well, sending a shot toward the lower right corner of the goal. The ball appeared to go in for the game-tying goal, but the shot actually curled just around the right post and Florida State kept its one-goal lead.

The 73rd minute saw another chance for the Terps as the Seminoles committed a foul just 25 yards away from their goal on the left side of the field. Junior defender Ashly Kennedy took the free kick, but the shot deflected off of Florida State's wall, nullifying another Maryland opportunity.

Kennedy had another chance with a free kick in the 84th minute, this time from 24 yards out in the center of the field. The co-captain was determined not to strike the ball into the wall again, but her shot kept sailing and ended up over the top of the Seminole goal.

"Florida State is a great team," said Pensky, "but our kids know that they were capable of getting a result tonight. We're going to learn from this and get ready to play Miami here on Sunday."

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - One look at the box score and it shows how the University of Maryland women's soccer team dominated the Miami Hurricanes Sunday afternoon at Ludwig Field. But the end result will only show a 0-0 tie for the Terps.

The Terrapins, who stand at 4-7-2 overall and 0-4-1 in the Atlantic Coast Conference, outshot Miami 21-14 for the game and earned seven corner kicks, while allowing none to the Hurricanes.

"It's starting to sound like a broken record," said Maryland head coach Brian Pensky following the game, "but I'm proud of our fight and determination today. Unfortunately, we continue to lose players due to injury, but our team continues to plug away trying to get a result. While the results haven't been in our favor, we're getting better every game and continue to move forward."

Maryland owned a 10-5 shot advantage in the first half of play, but the Hurricanes had the most dangerous scoring opportunity of the period as the clock ticked down to halftime. A Terrapin foul gave Miami a free kick from about 25 yards out in the center of the field. Miami's Jenna Levenson took the kick and struck the ball well toward the upper right corner of the Terps' net. But the game would go to the half scoreless,

thanks to senior goalkeeper Nikki Resnick, who showed why she was named to the All-ACC first team last year by leaping to her left and making a spectacular save.

The Terrapins had the best opportunity to score early in the second half. In the 48th minute junior midfielder Melissa Hornfeck made a run onto the ball and Miami goalkeeper Lauren McAdams left her line to make a play on it as well. The two players collided just outside of the penalty box and the ball bounced to the right side of the field toward a streaking Kelly Rozumalski. With no one in goal for the Hurricanes, Rozumalski had what looked like an easy goal, but the ball to an unlucky bounce, causing the junior forward to have to make a jumping strike at the ball and the shot sailed high over the Miami net.

Maryland nearly got a lucky break in the first overtime. Sophomore midfielder Kaila Sciascia laced a hard shot toward the right side of the Hurricane goal, but a Miami defender deflected the ball. It appeared that the ball was headed into the unprotected left side of the net, but Maryland was unlucky again as it sailed wide left and the game remained scoreless.

Resnick, who leads the ACC in saves, saves per game and save percentage, finished the game with five stops and earned her 16th career shutout as a Terp. Offensively, Maryland was led by redshirt-sophomore Stevie Dunning and Sciascia, who each took four shots.

One positive note for the Terps was the return of freshman midfielder Emily Maynard. The native of Munster, Ind., saw her first action since leaving the Clemson game on September 21 with an injury.

The Terps drop to 4-8-2 on the season and are now 0-5-1 in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Nikki Resnick tied her own record for saves in a game at Ludwig Field against Duke on a blustery Saturday afternoon in College Park and the Maryland women's soccer team needed every one of her 14 saves to battle to a 0-0 tie with the Blue Devils.

"At this stage of the season we need wins to help our cause and not getting a win tonight is tough," said Maryland head coach Brian Pensky. "Yet, at the same time, our effort continues to be outstanding and there's no question our team deserved at least a point tonight.

Resnick was busy right off the bat in the first half as Duke set a blistering pace for the match. The Blue Devils got off three shots in the first five minutes of play. Resnick already made four of her seven first-half stops before Maryland got their first real scoring opportunity. The fourth save proved to be a big one though.

Duke midfielder Lorraine Quinn, who proved to be a thorn in Maryland's side all afternoon, weaved her way through the center of the Terrapin defense in the 16th minute, dribbling the ball past several Maryland defenders. Quinn wound up on the right side of the Terps' 18-yard box and was one-on-one with Resnick, who came off of her line and made a brilliant sliding save, robbing Quinn of a goal.

The Terps answered back with a dangerous opportunity of their own in the 20th minute of action. Junior forward Kelly Rozumalski ran on to a ball in the far left corner of the Blue Devil defensive third. The Middleburgh, N.Y., native laced a shot with her right foot that bent back toward the Duke goal. It seemed like Blue Devil keeper Allison Lipsher was prepared for a crossing attempt, but recovered enough to get her hands on Rozumalski's bender. Lipsher bobbed the ball, dropping it to the ground where it nearly trickled in for a Terrapin score, but the junior goalkeeper was able to scoop it back before it crossed the goal line.

The second half started with more pressure from the Blue Devils, but it was Maryland that would provide the first true scoring opportunity of the period.

Freshman midfielder Emily Maynard, who played all 110 minutes in just her second game back after missing five games due to injury, threaded a through-ball to Rozumalski as she raced down the left center of the field. Rozumalski's shot was deflected wide of the goal, setting up a corner kick in the 49th minute. Sophomore Kaila Sciascia sent the corner into the Duke box, where the Terps would get three successive shots off with one being blocked, the second going off of the right post and the third sailing to the right of the goal.

Resnick stopped four shots in the second half, giving her 11 through 90 minutes, but was never truly tested. The Blue Devils had several dangerous free kicks following Maryland fouls, but the Terrapin defense and Resnick were able to ward each of them off.

The Blue Devils saw that Resnick was tested early in the first overtime however. In the 92nd minute Duke midfielder Rebecca Moros took a shot from the far right side of the Maryland 18-yard box that was headed for the left side of the Terrapin goal. It seemed as if Moros had the game's Golden Goal, but Resnick dove to her right, stretching all of her 5-4 frame to get a piece of the ball, knocking it off line and out of harms way.

The second overtime started much differently for the Terps, as they went on the offensive as soon as the referee blew his whistle. Maryland got the ball on the left wing where it was passed the junior midfielder Shelley McDuff in the middle of the field about 30 yards out. McDuff tried to find Maureen Dowling as the freshman midfielder was making a run down the left center of the Duke defense. That pass was deflected, setting up a corner kick for the Terps and shifting momentum back to Maryland.

Sciascia took the corner and the ball eventually ended up at about 35 yards out in the center of the field, where Duke was called for a handball, giving Maryland a free kick. Senior co-captain Ashly Kennedy struck a good ball at the Blue Devil net, but it kept rising and sailed over the crossbar by no more than 18 inches.

Duke recovered from the Terps' pressure and finished the game with a flurry of five corner kicks in the final five minutes of play. Resnick had already made 14 saves, but Maryland's defense was not about to allow a shot to get through to the Boca Raton, Fla., native. On their five corner kicks Duke was only able to muster three shot attempts. The first, a header by defender Sara Murphy, sailed wide. The second, by midfielder Darby Kroyer, was blocked. It was Murphy again with the third attempt, but that effort too was wide of the Terrapin goal.

BLACKSBURG, Va. - For the second time this week and the third time in its past four games the University of Maryland women's soccer team played to a 0-0 double-overtime draw. This time it was on the road in Blacksburg, Va., against the Hokies of Virginia Tech.

With today's result, Maryland (4-8-4, 0-5-3 ACC) is eliminated from contention for a spot in this year's ACC Tournament.

Senior goalkeeper Nikki Resnick proved once again that she deserves to be mentioned among the nation's elite netminders. Both teams were drained in the second overtime and neither could muster much offense. Maryland sophomore Kaila Sciascia got off the only shot on goal of the final 10 minutes, but Tech goalkeeper Ashley Owens was there to make the last of her five saves of the match.

Sciascia led the offensive attack for Maryland with five shots, while junior forward Kelly Rozumalski fired off four.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Junior Kelly Rozumalski didn't score or get and assist in the University of Maryland's 2-0 win over No. 11 Virginia at Ludwig Field Sunday night, but the speedy forward made the play that turned the tide in the Terps' favor.

In the 11th minute of play Rozumalski got behind the Cavalier defense and was on a breakaway toward the Virginia goal. But Wahoo defender Alli Fries caught up to Rozumalski and tackled her from behind ending the scoring opportunity. After conferring with the linesman, the referee issued a red card to Fries, giving the Terrapins a man-advantage for the remainder of the match.

It didn't take the Terps, who had only scored one goal in ACC play prior to tonight's game, long to capitalize. Maryland scored its first goal on a play that was a symbolic passing of the torch from senior to freshman.

In the 18th minute senior midfielder Sarah Sample took a pass from freshman Emily Maynard near the top center of the Virginia 18-yard box. Maynard cut to her left after the pass and Sample threaded a pass back to her in a perfect give-and-go. The freshman midfielder did the rest, scoring her third goal of the season by beating Cavalier goalkeeper Christina de Vries into the lower right corner of the goal.

The Wahos almost tied the game in the 37th minute, but the crossbar, which has plagued Virginia all season, took away what looked like a sure goal. Jen Redmond sent a hard corner kick from the right side of the Maryland goal bending into the six-yard box. Nikki Lieb was able to get on the end of the corner and got off a good header, but the ball bounced down off of the crossbar, where Maryland junior midfielder Shelly McDuff was there to clear the ball away from danger.

Virginia had a couple of scoring opportunities early in the second half. The more dangerous of the two came in the 63rd minute. Jess Rostedt laced a shot at the left side of the Terrapin goal and looked to have struck the game tying goal, but Maryland goalkeeper Nikki Resnick did, once again, what she's done for the past three seasons. The senior from Boca Raton, Fla., leapt to her right, stretching her 5-4 frame to its fullest extension, and pulled the ball in for one of her six saves.

Maryland picked up the insurance goal just four minutes after that play, answering Virginia's attack with a tremendous counterattack. Sophomore defender Aimee Bresani pushed the ball forward out of the Maryland defensive third and played a terrific cross-field pass to Maynard on the left side of the Virginia penalty box. Maynard took one look up and crossed the ball into the box, where redshirt-sophomore Lauren Gamble was making a run. Gamble jumped to get on the end of Maynard's cross and deftly one-timed the ball past de Vries into the right side of the Cavalier net.

Maynard nearly capped off her brilliant performance with another goal in the 87th minute. She caught de Vries playing up off of her line and tried to poke a shot over her head from 40 yards out. The shot had the Cavalier goalie beat, but it just skimmed over the crossbar.

The victory came on Maryland's final home game of the 2006 season, which also marked the final appearance at Ludwig Field by seniors Melissa Heintz, Resnick and Sample.

"This is an outstanding way for our three seniors to end their careers at Ludwig Field," said Maryland head coach Brian Pensky following the victory. "Everybody at Maryland considers Virginia to be one of our biggest rivals, so anytime that you beat Virginia it feels good. And we're happy that we were able to do it tonight on Senior Night.

"Our team has shown enormous fight in the last three or four weeks - however we've obviously struggled on the offensive end. Getting two great goals tonight, our players are finally able to be rewarded for all of their hard work and determination."
