IMPROVEMENT SHOWS ON THE FIELD EVEN AS INJURIES IMPACT SQUAD

A QUICK LOOK AT 2007

- The 2007 Terrapin women's soccer team showed the college soccer community that the Terps will be a force to be reckoned with in the future ... and that the future could begin in 2008.
- Playing one of the nation's toughest schedule Maryland battled some of the top teams in the country and took three top 15 teams into overtime before losing the match. The Terps also dropped a one-goal decision at Miami, which was an NCAA tournament team in 2007.
- Freshman goalkeeper **Yewande Balogun** had a remarkable first season and was rewarded with a spot on the All-ACC freshman team. She finished third in the conference in saves per game (4.13) and was fourth in goals against average (0.84) and third in shutouts per game (0.33). She made a season-high nine save at Miami in a 1-0 defeat and became the first Terrapin goalkeeper to register an assist since 1998 with a helper in the 2-0 win over Lehigh on Sept. 30.
- The injury bug bit the Terps again in 2007, marking the fourth consecutive season that Maryland has had significant injury problems. Sophomore midfielder **Molly Dreska** was lost for the year due to a knee injury suffered during the summer. Balogun started the first 15 games of the year, but suffered a broken foot at Duke and missed the final three games of the year. Sophomore defender/goalkeeper **Mary Casey** filled in admirably between the pipes, but battled injury issues herself earlier in the season. Casey, arguably the team's best defender, missed the North Carolina game due to an injury sustained late in the match against Wake Forest. The short-handed Terps took the 12th-ranked Tar Heels into overtime, but eventually fell by a 2-1 score.
- The 2007 season also saw the return of **Nataly Arias**, who missed the entire 2006 season due to a knee injury. The redshirt-junior showed no ill effects from her time away and led the Terps in points (11) and goals (5).

- 2007 was the final season for four Terrapin seniors. **Ashly Kennedy** was a two-time team captain that earned numerous freshman accolades in 2003. **Melissa Hornfeck** was a two-time junior college player of the year before finishing her final two seasons as a Terp. **Shelley McDuff** and **Kelly Rozumalski** shared team captain duties with Kennedy in 2007, but will best be remembered for their contributions on the 2004 squad that advanced to the NCAA tournament Sweet 16.

BALOGUN EARNS FRESHMAN HONORS

- Goalkeeper **Yewande Balogun** was named to the All-ACC freshman team and picked up a pair of additional honors by *Soccer Buzz*.
- Balogun was named a third team freshman All-American by *Soccer Buzz*. The national women's soccer website also named Balogun to its Mid-Atlantic all-freshman team.

PLAYING OVERTIME

- The 0-0 tie with Eastern Kentucky marked the third-straight home opener that has ended in a scoreless tie. In 2005 and 2006 the Terps played to a 0-0 draw against Towson.
- Maryland played five overtime games last season, going 0-1-4 in those matches. All four ties ended in 0-0 finishes, tying the 2006 Michigan Wolverines for the most 0-0 ties in a season in NCAA history.
- During the past four seasons, Maryland has played 27 overtime games (nearly 40% of its total games) with a record of 4-9-14 in those games.
- The Terps have played eight overtime matches this season tying the program record for overtime games in a season. Maryland is 1-4-3 in OT this year. The 2004 team also played in eight overtime contests, going 2-2-4.

OFFENSIVE DEFENSE

- Maryland defenders - **Brittany Cummins**, **Mary Casey**, **Ashly Kennedy** and **Mallory Baker** - all tallied points for the Terps last season. Kennedy had two goals and an assist and tied for third on the team with five points. Casey had a goal and two assists and finished sixth in points with four. Cummins had a pair of assists, while Baker finished the year with one. Goalkeeper **Yewande Balogun** added her name to Maryland's list of defensive players with points in the 2-0 win over Lehigh on Sept. 30. She became the first Terrapin goalkeeper since 1998 to assist on a goal. The only defensive regular to not have a point last season was freshman **Olivia Onyeador**, but she only moved into the starting line-up regularly when Balogun broke her foot in the 15th game of the season. Casey then moved to keeper, opening up a center back spot for Onyeador.

IMPACT FRESHMEN

- Maryland played 10 freshmen in 2007, including six who started matches.
- Goalkeeper **Yewande Balogun** logged 1392 minutes for the Terps in their first 15 games and posted a 0.84 GAA with five shutouts to her credit. Balogun will miss the final three games due to a broken foot suffered in the Virginia match.
- **Mallory Baker** and **Caitlin McDowell** each picked up their first collegiate assists in the 2-1 win over Fairleigh Dickinson. Baker started every game last season for Maryland, while McDowell played in all 18 games with 17 starts.
- **Annesia Faulkner** was been a spark off the bench for the Terps, but earned her first collegiate start in the team's ACC opener at No. 14 Clemson. She earned her first career point with an assist on **Kelly Rozumalski's** goal in 2-2 tie at Duke.
- **Olivia Onyeador** made her first career start against No. 12 North Carolina. She played a tremendous match at the right back spot, filling in for the injured **Mary Casey**. She moved back into the starting line-up against Virginia Tech when Casey replaced Balogun in goal.

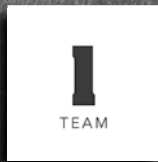

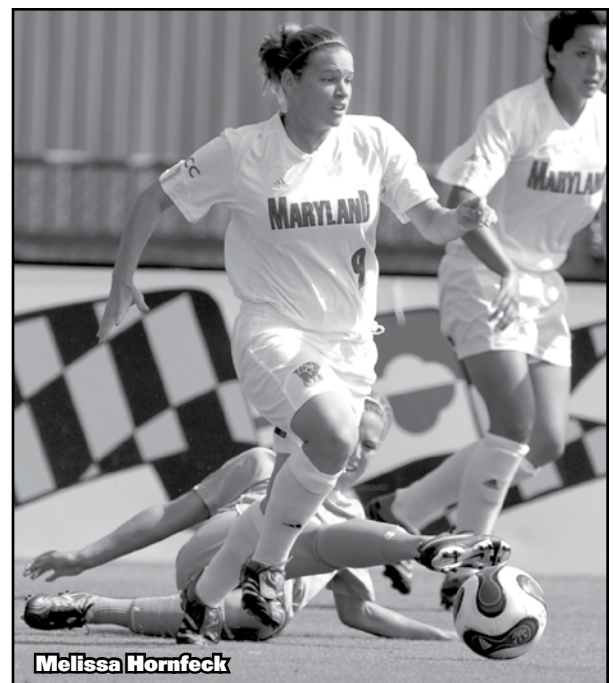

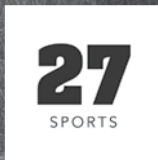

2007 GAME RECAPS

GAME 1 - AUG. 31 EASTERN KENTUCKY...0 (2OT) MARYLAND.....0

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The match resembled a shooting gallery at times, but the result was a 0-0 tie for the University of Maryland's women's soccer team as it fired off 55 shots to set a new Ludwig Field record in its 2007 season opener against Eastern Kentucky at Ludwig Field on Friday night.

"I've never been a part of a game where one team takes 55 shots," said Maryland head coach Brian Pensky. "Our kids worked very hard tonight and they deserve better than a 0-0 result. But we're a resilient group and we will bounce back on Sunday against Fairleigh Dickinson."

The Terps got off six shots in the first 11 minutes of the match, but it was midfielder Emily Maynard's 20-yard blast in the 16th minute that proved to be Maryland's first good scoring chance. The sophomore's shot from just outside the 18-yard box skimmed over the top of the crossbar by mere inches.

Redshirt junior Nataly Arias had the Terps' next great chance in the 36th minute when she drove a header off a cross from sophomore Brittany Cummins toward the Colonel's net, but freshman goalkeeper Stephanie Lynch made one of her 19 saves to preserve the scoreless tie.

The closest Maryland came to scoring came just minutes after halftime when Arias sent a long pass over the top of the EKU defense to a streaking Kaila Sciascia. The junior forward used a burst of speed to separate from defenders and punched a shot past Lynch, but the ball sailed too far and hit the left post.

Maryland looked to have a chance to end the game in the 87th minute when Sciascia and Arias hooked up again for a scoring opportunity. This time it was Sciascia setting up Arias with a corner kick from the right corner to the far post where Arias got a head on the ball sending it at the Colonel net. But luck was not on the Terps' side again as the ball sailed wide of its target.

Arias, who was making her first appearance since 2005 after missing all of 2006 due to injury, almost won the game again in the 91st minute with a long shot from 20 yards, but it too just went over the crossbar.

Senior forward Kelly Rozumalski was stifled on her bid to end the game in the 95th minute by Lynch's 16th save of the game. Sciascia crossed a low ball from the left side to the middle of the field at the 12 yard mark where Rozumalski made a run to one-time the ball into the heart of the Colonel net, but Lynch was perfectly positioned for the stop.

Maryland's last great chance to finish the game came in the 110th minute of play on a corner kick from junior midfielder Aimee Bresani. Bresani sent the ball from the right corner to the middle of the six-yard box, where sophomore defender Mary Casey got a clean header on the ball, but could not get it down and it went over the top of the goal.

Freshman goalkeeper Yewande Balogun made her collegiate debut in the tie, finishing the match with three saves. Overall seven freshmen made their collegiate debuts for the Terps, including Mallory Baker who started on defense.

Lynch's 19 saves also set a new Ludwig Field record, besting the previous record of 14 set by former Terp Nikki Resnick on two occasions.

GAME 2 - SEPT. 2

FAIRLEIGH DICKINSON.....1 MARYLAND.....2

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Sophomore Mary Casey capped a furious two-minute stretch in the second half for the University of Maryland women's soccer team with an assist and the game-winning goal to propel the Terps to a 2-1 victory over Fairleigh Dickinson Sunday night at Ludwig Field.

"We had a number of kids come up big tonight, and collectively it was a terrific team win," said coach Brian Pensky. "We dug ourselves a hole early on, and for a while there it appeared as if we were headed for another evening like Friday. But our players kept plugging away, and eventually we were rewarded with a couple of goals."

For a while it looked as if the Knights may pull-off the upset when they took a 1-0 lead in the fifth minute. Amanda Wheeler lobbed a shot at the Terrapin goal and freshman goalkeeper Yewande Balogun was able to tip the ball up and away from the net, but it hit the crossbar and bounced back into the field of play right to the feet of Emma Howes who put the shot away for the 1-0 lead. The Knights only managed three shots in the match with two coming on the scoring play.

With the 1-0 lead, FDU packed in its defense and tried to hold on, but the 85 minutes proved to be too much time to maintain the advantage.

That 1-0 lead would hold up until the 61st minute. That's when the Terps, who totaled nine corner kicks in the game, converted on a corner kick from the left side to tie the score. Freshman Caitlin McDowell started the play, sending the corner kick high into the box. The ball bounced off of Casey and freshman defender Mallory Baker before senior forward Kelly Rozumalski got a clean header off that beat Knight goalkeeper Rachel Derrico into the left side of the goal.

It would take less than two minutes for Maryland, which was scoreless in its first 170 minutes of the season, to pick up another score to take the lead. Once again the goal came off of a corner kick from McDowell from the left side. This time it was Rozumalski that got a head on the ball, but it popped up in the air and landed at the feet of Casey near the 12-yard mark. The defender from Centreville, Va., one-timed the shot into the right side of the net for her first collegiate goal.

A pair of sophomore midfielders, Maureen Dowling and Amanda Paizs, had outstanding games for the Terps creating scoring opportunities and not allowing the Knight defense to maintain possession.

The Terrapins followed up Friday night's record-setting 55-shot performance with another 24 shots vs. FDU. Rozumalski and McDowell led Maryland with four shots apiece. Derrico finished the game with eight saves for the Knights.

GAME 3 - SEPT. 7

NO. 13 USC.....2 MARYLAND.....1 (OT)

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. - For 80 minutes it looked as if the University of Maryland women's soccer team was going to pull off another neutral-site upset of a top-15 team, but No. 13 USC emerged from the first game of the Hoosier Classic in Bloomington, Ind., with a 2-1 overtime victory.

The Terps' plan of solid defense coupled with an opportunistic offense worked to perfection early on and saw Maryland jump out to a 1-0 lead in the 30th minute. Redshirt junior Nataly Arias scored her first goal since September 30, 2005, when she finished a point-blank shot that carried past Trojan goalkeeper Brittany Massaro. The ball was served in by sophomore Brittany Cummins who picked up her second career assist on the play.

Maryland maintained its 1-0 lead for 50 minutes, but a relentless USC offense finally broke through in the 80th minute. Lauren Brown capitalized on a Maryland defensive miscue to score her second goal of the season and knot the game at 1-1.

The game headed into overtime and the Women of Troy needed only one shot to finish the game and take away the 2-1 victory. USC's Alyssa Davis collected a loose ball in the Maryland defensive third and finished it inside the far post for the game-winning goal.

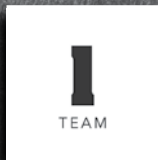

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. - From a relentless offense to a stifling defense, the University of Maryland women's soccer team as a whole turned in a dominating performance in its 3-0 victory over Loyola Marymount at the Hoosier Classic in Bloomington, Ind., Sunday afternoon.

"This is a great win," said Terrapin head coach Brian Pensky. "We knew that both teams were going to be desperate today; and that was a good LMU team - our kids just played well, simple as that. Today was our most complete performance of the season."

The game was scoreless for the first half of play, but the Terps (2-1-1) showed the makings of a team to be reckoned with by outpacing the Lions (0-3-1) in possession, shots and corner kicks in the opening 45 minutes.

The scoring troubles that have haunted Maryland during the past two seasons were not a problem against LMU as the offense broke through with three unanswered goals in the second half.

Freshman forward Kylie Ricker, who earned her first collegiate start in the match, opened the scoring for Maryland in the 57th minute by heading in a corner kick that was sent into the box by fellow freshman Caitlin McDowell. For Ricker, the score marked her first collegiate goal, while McDowell picked up her second assists on the season.

The Terps picked up an insurance goal less than two minutes later when a foul by a Lion player gave Maryland a free kick from about 40 yards out. Normally that would be an ideal spot to serve the ball in for an attacking player, but co-captain Ashly Kennedy had other ideas. The senior defender took the free kick and laced it into the left side of the Lions' net past goalkeeper Joslyn Slovek.

Aimee Bresani scored the third goal of the game for the Terps in the 81st minute on a brilliant individual effort. The junior, who has been moved from defense where she played her first two collegiate seasons to forward, dribbled past a LMU defender and beat back-up keeper Eugenia Miranda with a shot into the lower left corner of the goal.

Overall, Maryland outshot Loyola Marymount 19-4 and took nine corner kicks to the Lions' one. Ricker led the way with three shots for the Terrapins, with 13 Terps registering shots.

Freshman goalkeeper Yewande Balogun picked up the victory and her second career shutout for the Terps, but did not have to register a save in the match.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The match went 110 minutes, but in the end it only took seconds for Nataly Arias to head in a corner kick from Kaila Sciascia for the University of Maryland women's soccer team to pull out a hard-fought 1-0 victory over Dartmouth Friday night at Ludwig Field.

For Terps' head coach Brian Pensky the win, and the way Maryland won, summed up who the Terrapins are. "We're a team that is going to scratch and claw for every inch and tonight was an example of that. This was a big time team win. The positive energy from our bench was outstanding and the play from our reserves got us over the top."

A quick look at the box score won't tell the whole story of the Terps' game-winning goal, which would never have happened without an outstanding effort from sophomore Maureen Dowling. The sophomore from Massapequa, N.Y., pushed the ball into the far left side of the Big Green defensive zone and worked to earn the corner kick that led to Arias' header.

"Maureen [Dowling], Emily [Maynard] and Kailia [Sciascia] all came off the bench to directly contribute to this win," said Pensky. "And once again, Nataly [Arias] proved how great she is in the air."

Arias, a redshirt junior who missed all of last season due to injury, finished a brilliant serve from Sciascia with a clean header into the left center of the Dartmouth net. For Arias the goal marked her third career game-winner and the first since September 30, 2005.

The game was evenly played through the first 45 minutes, but the Terps came out from halftime with good energy and pushed the pace, challenging the Big Green defense.

Freshman Caitlin McDowell nearly put away her first collegiate goal in the 53rd minute, but Dartmouth goalkeeper Laurel Peaks was able to get her fingertips on the shot and the ball grazed the crossbar and went over the goal.

Peaks was saved again by the crossbar in the 68th minute when Arias corralled a loose ball facing away from the Big Green goal near the top of the 18-yard box. With the ball at her feet for less than a second, Arias turned and one-timed a shot, hoping to catch Peaks off guard, but Peaks was able to get a piece of the shot and the ball again went off the crossbar, setting up one of Maryland's seven corner kicks.

Despite being out-shot 19-7 in regulation, Dartmouth came out in the first overtime and controlled the tempo and put pressure on the Terrapin defense. But Maryland's defense proved to be up to the challenge, led by freshman goalkeeper Yewande Balogun, who made a career-high seven saves.

"Our backline and goalkeeper were solid again," said Pensky. "This is a well deserved third shutout of the season for our defense and our team."

Maryland needed a spark in the game's final 10 minutes and it came from sophomore midfielder Emily Maynard. With the game winding down, Maynard helped the Terps control the middle of the field and attack the Big Green defense. She nearly ended the game herself in the 107th minute when she was on the receiving end from a nifty through-ball from Sciascia. Maynard got off a clean shot in a one-on-one situation with Peaks, but the ball sailed wide left of the goal by inches.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Midfielder Nataly Arias scored her third goal of the season off of a perfect give-and-go with sophomore Maureen Dowling to give the University of Maryland women's soccer team a 1-0 victory over George Mason Sunday night at Ludwig Field.

The win lifts the Terps' record to 4-1-1 on the season and gives them their first three-game winning streak since 2002. The Patriots fall to 4-2-0 on the season.

"We scored a great goal in the run of play against a hard-nosed, stingy defense," said Maryland head coach Brian Pensky. "Kaila [Sciascia] and Mo [Dowling] played good balls, and Nat [Arias] showed terrific composure in skillfully tucking it away."

"Then in the second half we did what we needed to do to kill the game off. It would have been nice to have finished one of our earlier chances to extend our lead; yet knowing that we can successfully finish off a game is important."

Maryland came out at the opening whistle determined to challenge the Mason defense and the strategy paid off with three corner kick opportunities in the first eight minutes of the match.

Freshman Kylie Ricker had the first quality scoring chance in the 17th minute of play, taking a strong shot from 18 yards out that Patriot goalkeeper Kasey Davenport saved, but lost the ball for an instant before recovering.

Junior midfielder Kaila Sciascia nearly got the Terps on the board in the 27th minute with a spectacular effort on a cross-field pass from sophomore defender Mary Casey. Casey sent a long cross from near the right side of midfield to a streaking Sciascia into the Mason 18-yard box. The pass looked to be a few paces too far, but Sciascia caught up to it and got off a sliding shot that barely sailed right of the goal.

That led to Arias' game-winning heroics in the 34th minute. The play started with a foul on Mason that was followed by a free kick shot from senior defender Ashly Kennedy. That shot went wide, but Arias was able to win a 50-50 ball off Davenport's ensuing goal kick. She then saw Dowling making a run down the left side of the field and sent a nifty pass onto Dowling's feet. Never giving up on the play, Arias continued to make a run down the center of the field and Dowling was able to slip a pass to her at the 13-yard marker where Arias finished the goal into the left center of the Patriot net.

That goal marked Arias' fourth career game-winner and second in as many games after netting the lone goal in the Terps' 1-0 double-overtime win over Dartmouth on Friday. It also marks the first time a Maryland player scored back-to-back game-winners since Mallory Mahar tallied consecutive game-winners in the 2004 NCAA tournament against Loyola and Penn State.

Sciascia could have given the Terrapins a 2-0 lead in the 70th minute, but Davenport made the best of her four saves in the match to preserve the 1-0 score. Arias dribbled through the middle of the Patriot defense, drawing several defenders. That allowed Sciascia to make a well-timed run through the left center of the field. Arias hit her with a great through-ball behind the Mason defense that left Sciascia one-on-one with the



GMU goalkeeper. Sciascia got off a hard shot, but Davenport was up to the challenge and held on for the save.

Maryland's defense was solid all match and held the 1-0 lead despite furious pressure in the waning minutes by the Patriots. Terrapin freshman goalkeeper Yewande Balogun earned her fourth shutout after making three saves.

But the ball bounced off of couple of players before junior Kaila Sciascia got on the end of it and sent a solid header toward a wide-open Miami goal. But luck was on the side of the Hurricanes as a Miami defender was right there to head the ball away and prevent the score.

The match would remain scoreless until the 89th minute when Miami's Brittney Steinbruch took a throw-in and dribbled to the left-center of the Maryland 18-yard box and laced a shot through three Terrapin defenders, which screened Balogun from the play, and finished the goal into the lower left corner of the Maryland net for the game's lone goal.

"First, I'd like to say congratulations to Miami," said Maryland coach Brian Pensky following the match. "Brittney Steinbruch is a good player, and she did well to finish that chance. We're not going to hang our heads. We can be proud of our effort and we all know there is a lot of soccer still to be played."

Arias gave the Terps an early 1-0 lead in the 15th minute. Senior co-captain Ashly Kennedy sent a free kick from 40 yards out on the left wing into the Hokie six-yard box. Arias challenged for the ball in the air, but neither team was able to get control. The ball bounced off the turf and Arias was able to direct it into the left side of the Hokie goal off of her right hip.

The game would remain a 1-0 lead for the Terps through the first half, but both teams came out looking to score early in the second period.

Emily Jukich nearly got the Hokies on the board in the 55th minute with a back-heel kick, but her shot deflected off the right post and away from danger. "This win was for our seniors," said Maryland head coach Brian Pensky. "They have meant so much to this team and program; and their legacy as leaders will live on for quite some time."

The Terps came out aggressive on offense and nearly jumped out to a 1-0 lead in the 11th minute. Senior midfielder Melissa Hornfeck sent a bending corner kick from the right corner to the near post. Redshirt junior Nataly Arias fought to the spot and got a piece of the ball, sending it into the right side of the Wolfpack goal. The celebration was short-lived however as the referee called an obstruction foul and waived off the goal.

Although the Terps didn't get the score that play set the tone for the match and Maryland would not be denied for long.
