PISCATAWAY, N.J. - Sophomore back **Carly Viher** opened the 2000 season with a header into the upper left corner of the goal off a corner kick from sophomore **Dana Jarzyniecki** 5:17 into the season opener to give Maryland a 1-0 win at Yurcak Field. The win marked the fifth time in six years Maryland opened the season with a victory, four of which came by shutout.

"I feel really good about the victory," said coach **Shannon Higgins-Cirovski**. "This was a great starting point and building block for the season. We got some great performances from freshman **Jen Biscoe**, who had four shots all on goal and obviously Viher with the goal had a strong performance.

"We had a lot of opportunities in the first half and didn't capitalize. But it helps us to learn about ourselves, I really feel we connected overall, though."

The goal, which came on the Terps' first shot of the season, was the first of Viher's career and also represented her first career point.

**Kim King** hit the left post with a rifle shot with 29 minutes left in regulation, which could have given Maryland a two-goal lead.

Maryland senior keeper **Riki-Ann Serrins** made one save to earn her ninth career shutout, as she played all 90 minutes.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. -- The No. 23 Maryland women's soccer team stunned No. 4 Penn State for the biggest upset in the 14-year history of the program with a 3-1 win over the Nittany Lions at Ludwig Field. The Terps were previously 0-28-1 against teams ranked in the top five dating to 1987.

Junior **Sara Gustafson** had a career night as she recorded her first career hat trick. She scored her first two goals in the first 3:57 of the match to give Maryland a 2-0 lead. Gustafson sealed the win with her third goal with 2:57 left in regulation.

"I knew I could have a night like this against Penn State," said Gustafson, who transferred to Maryland from Indiana prior to the 1999 season. "This was the fifth time I've played Penn State and in all of the other four games -- three at Indiana and one in the NCAA's with Maryland last year -- my team lost by one goal. What I wanted more than anything was to beat Penn State. This was the game I was looking forward to the most and we got it done. It was awesome."

The previous highest ranked team Maryland defeated

was then-No. 7 Duke on Oct. 1, 1995, with a 2-1 Terps' win. Maryland's only positive result in 29 games against top five teams came as the Terps tied then-No. 4 Connecticut, 2-2 on Oct. 11, 1998.

"This win really put us on the map," said head coach **Shannon Higgins-Cirovski**. "This was a huge win for everyone in our program. To beat a number-four ranked team will just give us a tremendous amount of confidence. We talked about making connections and that is what we did tonight. This win really lets everyone know what type of team Maryland is."

In nets, Maryland senior keeper **Riki-Ann Serrins** equaled her career high with 13 saves, including nine in the second half, when the Penn State attack fired off 13 shots.

Gustafson gave Maryland a 1-0 lead just 1:35 into the match as she took a soft cross from sophomore **Carly Viher** and beat Penn State keeper **Emily Oleksiuk** in the lower right corner.

Gustafson came back for her second goal just 2:22 later as she she took a pass from **Valerie Lawrence** and beat Oleksiuk with a lob shot from about seven yards out.

Penn State's All-American **Christie Welsh** brought the Nittany Lions to within a goal with her first of the season with a low shot from about 15 yards out.

Serrins and Maryland's defense had a phenomenal game as they stopped the Nittany Lions continuously. Lawrence made a key defensive block seconds prior to halftime. Viher came up with a clutch defensive save off a Welsh shot in the 64th minute on a scramble in front of the goal which secured Maryland's lead.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. -- The No. 23 Maryland women's soccer team dropped a hard-fought 2-1 decision to No. 22 Duke in the ACC opener for both teams at Ludwig Field. Fresh off a stunning 3-1 upset of No. 4 Penn State, the Terps were aiming for a third straight win to open the 2000 season.

Duke (2-0, 1-0 ACC) opened the scoring as junior forward **Sarah Pickens** headed home a rebound to give the Blue Devils a 1-0 lead just 20:29 into the contest.

Maryland (2-1, 0-1 ACC) retalliated as sophomore forward **Kim King** beat Duke keeper **Isis Dallis** to tie the game at one with 6:11 left in the first half.

But Duke responded just 2:02 later at the 40:51 mark as freshman forward **Ali Kopfman** took a pass from **Brigid Bowdell** and beat Maryland keeper **Riki-Ann Serrins** for the decisive goal.

The teams played a scoreless second half as Maryland took six shots, but second-half Duke keeper **Thora Helgadóttir** made three saves.

Overall, Duke outshot the Terps, 13-12. Serrins made four saves in the defeat as she saw her record fall to 2-1-0 in 2000.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. -- Playing with its highest ranking since 1997, the No. 9 Maryland women's soccer team defeated in-state rival Towson, 1-0, on at Ludwig Field. The win was Maryland's sixth consecutive non-conference regular-season victory dating back to last season. The Terps improved to 3-1 in 2000, while Towson suffered its first defeat and also falls to 3-1.

Freshman midfielder **Jen Biscoe** scored the game's only goal -- her first as a collegian -- with 4:09 left in the first half. Biscoe took a cross from sophomore defender **Carly Viher** (Mentor, Ohio) and used her left foot to beat Towson keeper **Tina Steck** to the lower left corner of the goal.

Maryland senior keeper **Riki-Ann Serrins** posted one save in the second half to record her second shutout of the season and 10th of her career at Maryland. Serrins is just two whitewashes shy of the Maryland career shutout record shared by **Heather Rowe** (1988-91) and **Missy Price** (1993-96).

Towson took the first two shots of the game, but Maryland dominated the shot total the rest of the way, outshooting the Tigers, 19-4 in the game.

The game also marked the first between Maryland and Towson since 1992, when the Terps routed the Tigers, 12-0,

RICHMOND, Va. - Richmond used a first half goal by sophomore midfielder Jenna Merriam at the 5:30 mark to stun No. 9 Maryland, 1-0, in women's soccer action at UR Soccer Complex.

On the game-winning strike, senior co-captain Nicole Froman played a throw-in to senior forward Brooke Sands, who flicked a ball to Merriam. She deposited the decisive goal just inside the far post to account for the match's only scoring. The goal was Merriam's first of the season, while both Sands and Froman delivered their first assist of the campaign.

Terp senior keeper **Riki-Ann Serrins** made six saves on 18 Spider shots. Richmond goalkeeper Kristen Samuhel made four saves to earn her second shutout of the season.

Maryland's **Jen Biscoe** suffered a right knee ACL injury in the first half of the match and did not return.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. -- Senior forward **Julie Nelson** scored her first career hat trick to lead No. 23 Maryland to a 3-0 win over local rival George Washington at Ludwig Field. The win was a well-rounded effort for the entire team as both the defense and offense clicked.

"Tonight was a solid win for us," said head coach **Shannon Higgins-Cirovski**, who coached George Washington from 1991-97. "Julie Nelson had a stellar performance. She came out with the vengeance that we needed tonight. She had a real fire in her and you could see that from the start."

Nelson got the Terps on the board at the 29:47 mark as she took a cross from **Audra Poulin** and blasted home a one-timer off a beautiful spin play. She then made the score 2-0

off another Poulin pass at 51:17. Poulin took a pass from fellow freshman **Katie Ludwig** and centered the ball to Nelson, who rifled the ball into the lower left side of the goal. For Ludwig, the assist was the first point of her career.

Exactly 10 minutes after her second goal, Nelson completed her first career hat trick as she scored on a penalty kick after **Terri Greer** was taken down in the box by a George Washington defender.

"We had to play well tonight to set the pace for the rest of the season," said Nelson, a senior captain. "I did the job tonight with three goals after not scoring in the first five games of the season."

Poulin had an exceptional night in her first start as she replaced fellow freshman and roommate **Jen Biscoe**.

Biscoe suffered a torn ACL in her right knee in the Terps' last game at Richmond and will be lost for the season. Poulin, the 1999 *Washington Post* Player of the Year posted her first two collegiate points and played solid midfield all night.

In net, senior **Riki-Ann Serrins** preserved her third shutout of the season, making two saves. Serrins now has 11 career shutouts, just one shy of the school record held by Heather Rowe (1988-91) and Missy Price (1993-96).

In an offensive battle, Santa Clara quickly jumped out to a 1-0 lead on Kathleen Cello's goal just 4:33 into the match.

Ludwig retaliated just 36 seconds later as she took a pass from senior **Julie Nelson** and scored on a breakaway to

tie the game at one at the 5:09 mark.

The Broncos recaptured the lead on a goal by Megan Horvath at the 29:16 mark.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. - The No. 20 Wake Forest women's soccer team posted a 1-0 shutout victory over No. 21 Maryland on a cold and rainy night at Spry Stadium. Wake's Lindsey Griffin scored the game's only goal of the game, converting a penalty kick late in the first half.

The Deacs outshot the Terps 21-5, placing 10 shots on goal and allowing none. Stacy Roeck, Emily Taggart and Lindsey Griffin fired three shots apiece on frame for Wake Forest, but Maryland goalkeeper **Riki-Ann Serrins** proved resilient, making nine saves on the day.

With under nine minutes remaining in the first half, Roeck was dragged down inside the Terrapins' box, to set up a penalty kick for the Demon Deacons. Griffin cashed in the kick, her fifth goal on the season. Wake Forest goalkeeper Tracy Chao earned the shutout victory.

Wake Forest improved to 6-2 overall and 1-0 in the ACC while Maryland fell to 4-5 overall and 0-2 in the ACC.

Senior keeper **Riki-Ann Serrins** recorded her fourth shutout of the season and 12th of her career to tie the all-time career school record for shutouts.

Maryland (5-5) got on the board as sophomore **Kim King** scored on a shot into the left side of the net from eight yards out at the 55:28 mark in the second half.

The defense was a story though as sophomore **Katie Kruse** stepped in for fellow sophomore **Carly Viher**, who was injured in warm-ups. In her first college start, Kruse teamed with sophomores **Valerie Lawrence** and sweeper **Sally**

**Harrison** to limit George Mason to just eight shots. "This was a great team performance," said Maryland head coach **Shannon Higgins-Cirovski**. "We got a great performance out of our defense. We made the right adjustments and the defense played exceptionally well. Kruse did a great job stepping in for Viher."

In nets, Serrins made six saves to preserve the shutout and move into a tie for the all-time lead for blankings in Maryland history with 12. Serrins now stands tied with Heather Rowe (1988-91) and Missy Price (1993-96) for the all-time lead in school history, dating to 1987.

The win over George Mason (5-6) was the sixth straight home non-conference win for the Terps and the third straight home shutout for Maryland.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. -- After busting out to a 2-0 lead in the first half, the Maryland women's soccer team lost a heart-breaking 3-2 battle to ACC rival No. 15 Virginia at Ludwig Field. The Cavaliers scored all three goals in the final 22 minutes of the match.

"We played very hard against a very good team," said Maryland head coach **Shannon Higgins-Cirovski**. "We played with a ton of guts and I'm proud of the performance. (Senior keeper) **Riki-Ann Serrins** played out of her head and kept us in the game. She was amazing."

The Maryland (5-7-0, 0-4 ACC) offense was kick-started by a pair of midfielders, each of whom scored their first goals of the season in the first half. Junior **Courtney Beirne**, who was reinserted into the starting lineup, tallied Maryland's first goal as she took a cross from **Carly Viher** in the box and beat Virginia keeper Julie Harris to the lower left corner, 26:42 into the match.

Senior **Terri Greer** scored on a beautifully set screen in front of the Virginia net at the 31:21 mark to put the Terps up 2-0. Beirne and **Sara Gustafson** were credited with assists on the play.

Virginia (7-5-0, 2-2 ACC) came out strong in the second half as Maryland stayed in front behind the sensational goalkeeping of **Riki-Ann Serrins**, who made several point blank stops. She finished with six saves in each half for 12 in the game, one shy of her career high.

The Cavaliers broke into the scoring column as Katie Tracy finished off a corner kick by Ashley Meeker on a scramble in the box with 21:59 left in regulation to bring Virginia within one. Then, just 1:43 later, Lori Lindsey scored on a free kick that was lobbed over a Maryland wall and Serrins to tie the game at the 69:44 mark.

Virginia took the lead for good as Darci Borski's high lob shot deflected off of Serrins' hands into the goal with 8:15 left in regulation, giving the Cavs the 3-2 win.

Gustafson opened the onslaught just 5:46 into the match as she scored on a diving header off a pass from freshman **Katie Ludwig**. Junior forward **Courtney Beirne** (Westminster, Md.) scored the next two goals for her first-career multi-goal game to give the Terps a 3-0 lead at half-time. Jarzyniecki set up the second of Beirne's goals for the first of her three assists at the 21:51 mark.

Ludwig dented the scoreboard on a lob shot from seven yards out off a pass from **Kim King** just 4:59 into the second half. King came back for a goal of her own about five minutes later as she took a feed from **Terri Greer** to give the Terps a 5-0 lead.

Gustafson then took over, scoring the next three goals to give her a career high four goals, equalling the school record. The junior scored on an unassisted goal from 25 yards out at the 63:35 mark. She came back for a pair of goals assisted by Jarzyniecki at the 71:34 and 78:08 marks. Those two assists gave Jarzyniecki the school record, breaking the school record of two set numerous times.

Ludwig finished the scoring at the 79:47 mark on an unassisted goal.

Overall, five different Terps set career highs in goals, assists or

points: Gustafson - 4 goals, 8 points (goals equals school record); Ludwig - 2 goals, 5 points; Jarzyniecki - 3 assists, 3 points (assists sets school record); Beirne - 2 goals, 5 points; King - 3 points.

In net, **Riki-Ann Serrins** was credited with a half shutout to give her 12.5 in her career to break the school record for shutouts, formerly held by Heather Rowe and Missy Price with 12. Serrins shared the shutout with a pair of freshmen, who made their collegiate debuts in goal. **Kristen Barnhill** played 29:35 and made three saves, while **Lynn Scharf** played the final 15:25 to preserve the shutout.

The nine goals in the game were the most since the Terps set a school record for goals in a game in a 12-0 shutout of Towson on Sept. 16, 1992. The nine goals set a Ludwig Field record, breaking the record of eight set vs. UMBC on Oct. 1, 1996, 8-0. The eight assists and 26 total points also set field records.

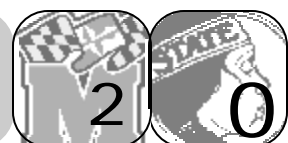

The win comes against a Florida State team that stunned No. 2 North Carolina in its last game on Tuesday night, 3-2 in Tallahassee. Maryland also ended Florida State's seven-match undefeated streak and was the Seminoles' first shutout loss of the season. The win was also the first in the ACC for the Terps (8-8-0, 1-5-0 ACC) this season.

"We were the better team out there tonight," said head coach **Shannon Higgins-Cirovski**. "We really wanted to win this one and we played inspired soccer. We put together two solid halves and beat a team that just came in after beating North Carolina. We played confidently and played an entire 90 minutes."

Maryland struck early as senior **Terri Greer** took a cross from **Courtney Beirne** and beat Florida State keeper Sarah Crawford from about 10 yards out, just 2:15 into the match. Maryland dominated the play through much of the middle of the game and scored again with 7:29 left in regulation.

Senior **Terri Greer** had the game-winner vs. FSU.

Freshman **Katie Ludwig** notched her fifth goal of the season to clinch the match at the 82:31 mark. Ludwig stole the ball from a Seminole defender and beat Crawford from about 20 yards out at the top of the box.

Senior keeper **Riki-Ann Serrins** was outstanding in goal, making five saves to record the shutout, giving her 13.5 in her career -- the most by any Maryland keeper in the school's 14-year program history. Serrins' shutout victory marked the end to Florida State's undefeated streak that dated to Sept. 16, when they lost at Duke. The Noles had gone 6-0-1 in their last seven matches.

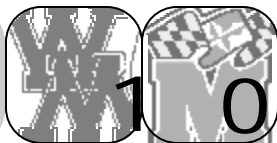

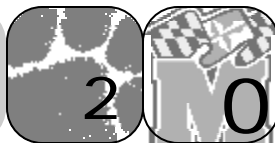
