- No. 15/13 Maryland (2-1) will travel to No. 1/1 Connecticut (1-0) Sunday for a 1:30 p.m. matchup in Hartford.
- The Terrapins held off Niagara (0-3), 92-65, Thursday afternoon in College Park. The Terps shot 83 percent from the field (10-12) in the third quarter to pull away. Stephanie Jones led five in double figures with 21 points, Ieshia Small scored a career-high 18 and Kaila Charles scored 17.
- Maryland is ranked No. 15 in the Associated Press poll and No. 13 in the USA Today Coaches Preseason poll.
- The Terrapins were picked to finish second in the Big Ten by both the league's head coaches and media panel. Sophomore Kaila Charles was also named to the Preseason All-Big Ten Team. Charles, a Glenn Dale, Md. native, earned All-Big Ten Freshman Team honors last year after starting in all 35 games for Maryland. She averaged 9.7 points and 5.6 rebounds per game.
- Charles was named to the Ann Meyers Drysdale Award Watch List earlier this month as one of 20 of the nation's top shooting guard. Brianna Fraser was named to the Cheryl Miller Award Watch List as one of the nation's top small forwards.
- Maryland welcomes freshman point guard Channise Lewis and junior guard/forward Eleanna Christinaki to the roster this season. Christinaki will be eligible Dec. 20, per NCAA transfer rules.
- Christinaki is currently playing with the Greek National Team in the 2019 FIBA EuroBasket Qualifiers in Portugal and Greece. She will return to College Park later this month.
- The Terps were selected to represent the USA in the World University games this summer in Taipei, Taiwan. The U.S. went 5-1 in the tournament, earning wins over Canada, Sweden, the Czech Republic, Poland and Uganda.
- Brenda Frese signed the No. 4 recruiting class in the country earlier this week, making it 12 top 10 recruiting classes in her 16 years in College Park. The Terrapins will welcome 6-5 forward Shakira Austin (Fredericksburg, Va.), 5-9 guard Taylor Mikesell (Massillon, Ohio) and 6-4 post Olivia Owens (Niskayuna, N.Y.) next summer. Austin is ranked No. 3 overall, per ESPN, Mikesell is No. 32 and Owens is No. 33.

► 2017-18 SEASON OUTLOOK

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The 2017-18 Maryland women's basketball season will be highlighted by student-athletes ready to leave their mark on one of the nation's most dominant and consistent programs. With a roster filled with talent, hard workers and kids ready for the opportunity, head coach Brenda Frese and her staff will have 10 Terrapins ready to make the most of their minutes on the court.

"This is going to be an exciting season for our program," head coach Brenda Frese said. "We will be relying on a lot of players that have been working hard and waiting their turn to help this team night in and night out. I look up and down the roster and see hungry, humble, talented players. Every day in practice has been interesting just seeing who takes advantage of each day."

Heading into this season, Maryland fans will see two seniors in Ieshia Small and Kristen Confroy, as well as returning starter sophomore Kaila Charles. Those three bring the most experience to the floor and will help guide the way.

Thanks to generous donations and supporters of the program, the Terrapins traveled to Taipei, Taiwan to represent the U.S. at the World University Games this past August. Due to FIBA rules, the Terps were able to hold unlimited practices this summer and play six games, plus two friendlies. This was extremely valuable with helping the new players learn the Terps' sets, terminology and overall chemistry.

"The trip to Taiwan was terrific in a lot of ways for us," Frese said. "First of all, it really opened everyone's eyes to a place and a culture they had never seen. There was so much to like, especially the people, who made making us happy a real priority. The competition was good and our players had to compete under different rules, against professionals. We got six games under our belt. So, we learned a lot about our team and it should help them grow."

Because of what we graduated, we're going to need players to expand their roles and take on more responsibility. There's not always a fixed timeline for when players mature into that. Playing in an international competition like the World University Games should help that process."

The Terrapins also bonded as a team through the off the court experiences, like staying in the Athletes Village, being away for two and a half weeks and two 15 hour flights.

"We spent 16 days together in tight quarters," Frese said. "The Athletes Village was not luxurious, but more functional. So not only did we spend a lot of time around each other, but we also had to share space. We had to be patient with the traffic when traveling back and forth to gyms."

New Faces

The Terrapins welcome two newcomers in guards Eleanna Christinaki and Channise Lewis. Christinaki is a transfer from the University of Florida who will be eligible in December, after final exams. She played her first season and a half with the Gators before leaving in December 2016. During her nine appearances with the Gators in 2016, she averaged 17.6 points, 4.7 rebounds, 3.0 assists, and 1.3 three-pointers made per game. She was named to the All-SEC Freshman Team in 2016.

"We've added two terrific pieces to our program in Eleanna Christinaki and Channise Lewis," Frese said. They're both going to make us a better team this season and bring qualities that we need. And just as importantly, they've fit in as people.

Eleanna got to practice with us the back half of last season. It was exciting to watch her on the court. She can score the basketball and pass well too. She brings a lot of energy to the court, which matches her personality, because she's full of life. It will take a little bit for her to get her timing and game conditioning back, but that will come and when it does, she'll be terrific."

The Terrapins also welcome freshman point guard Channise Lewis from Miami, Fla. She led her Miami Country Day team to two Dicks' National Championship titles in her sophomore and senior years and earned Most Outstanding Player honors in the tournament run her senior year. Lewis averaged 13.9 points, 7.2 assists, 4.5 rebounds and 3.3 steals per game as a senior as she led the Lady Spartans to their fourth straight state title.

"Channise Lewis really values the basketball and has been well-groomed to come in and play right away," Frese said. "She has a point guard's personality in that she's not just consumed with getting things for herself. She's perfectly happy to get her teammates going. She's fit in well with them on and off the court. We're fortunate things worked out for her to be here at Maryland."

Point Guards

The Terrapins will look to Lewis and sophomore Sarah Myers to help distribute the basketball this season. As a freshman, Myers carried a 2.0 assist turnover ratio off the bench.

"Channise and Sarah Myers are the first two names at this spot for us. Sarah has worked really hard and gotten stronger. I think our fans saw at the end of last season how her perseverance paid off and she made a big contribution for us in the Big Ten Tournament," Frese said. "When you put Sarah on the floor with good players, she understands how to play with them. She can hit shots and she has a terrific 'hit ahead' pass in transition. I'm happy with how she's come in and grown as a player and a person."

Lewis got a jumpstart on learning the Terrapins' offense with the extra practices before the trip to Taiwan, plus games overseas.

"We got the chance to coach Channise in some real game action in Taiwan," Frese said. "It was a fantastic opportunity for her to play in those situations against mature competition. Based on what we saw in Taiwan and having watched her in high school, she takes good care of the basketball. That's something any coach would love."

Wings

Maryland has the most depth at the wing position with multiple players with a variety of strengths to contribute. Their wings can rebound, shoot and drive with the best in the country. The wing position will start with Confroy and Small, then bring in sophomores Kaila Charles and Blair Watson and Christinaki.

Confroy is a career 38 percent shooter from outside the arc that has started in 60 games over the last two years. Small averaged 5.1 points per game off the bench last season while shooting 41 percent from the field.

"Our wings will have the chance to grow into larger roles this season," Frese said. "We return Kristen Confroy for her senior season. She's been a steady player for us and just knows where to be at what time. She can hit timely shots when we need them. We're incredibly proud of all she's accomplished here and the standards she's maintained."

Ilesia Small covered a lot of positions for us last season. She's had a good offseason and she played well in Taiwan. She's at her best when she's attacking and shooting the ball with confidence."

Charles is a wing with size that can rotate to a larger forward spot. She has worked on her jumpshot and long range shooting after a spectacular freshman year that culminated in a Big Ten All-Freshman Team honor. She started in all 35 games and averaged 9.7 points with 5.6 boards per game.

"Kaila Charles is one of our hardest workers. She's a player that we can move all over the floor to give us advantages," Frese said. "We play her as a dynamic 4 in our offense. I'm not sure anyone embodies the champion mentality more than Kaila. She is a supreme competitor who doesn't back down. She's really bright and eager to be challenged. She has a relentless will that very few can match."

Watson showed flashes of her versatility and athleticism in 30 games last season after recovering from shoulder surgery in the spring of 2016.

"Blair Watson has had a good preseason," Frese said. "When she's on, she can really shoot the ball. I want her to play with a ton of confidence. She also has the ability to rebound and set up her teammates. Defensively, she has

good instincts and makes plays for us."

Christinaki will round out the wing spot once eligible.

"Eleanna will give us a player with a true scorer's mindset when she's eligible to play in December," Frese said. "She works very hard on her game and is constantly in the gym. Even though she can score and we'll want her to do that, she's unselfish and throws some of the best passes on our team. She'll be a lot of fun our players to play with and our fans to watch."

Front Court

The Terps will look to continue to be a dominant inside team after leading the league and being second in the NCAA in rebounding. After losing the NCAA leader in field goal percentage in Brianna Jones, Frese and her staff will call on junior Brianna Fraser, Jones' younger sister, Stephanie, and Aja Ellison to help control the paint.

Fraser also showed flashes of her athleticism and skill last year, averaging 6.1 points and 3.6 rebounds per game.

"Brianna Fraser has a tremendous opportunity in front of her this season," Frese said. "She's already shown us what she's capable of during her first two seasons here and we keep pushing her to do more. She's capable of doing some things perhaps no other post player we've had here could do. It's all there for her to go and get. She had some big games for us in Taiwan against good competition, which was encouraging."

Stephanie Jones had a solid freshman season, especially when you consider she was coming off a knee injury and regaining strength. Just like her big sister, she plays intelligently and finds the right places at the right times. She should have another solid season for us.

Aja Ellison was one of the nice surprises of our World University Games experience and our preseason. Aja's been out so much and had injuries, so I honestly didn't know what was realistic to expect. She's worked hard to get healthy and she's showing that she can do some things for us. If Aja rebounds, make layups and defends, she's going to contribute this season."

Staff

The Terrapins will enjoy limited staff changes heading into the 2017-18 season. Assistant coach Shay Robinson will enter his fourth season in College Park and Bett Shelby and Terry Nooner return for year three.

"Our staff is largely together for a third season now," Frese said. "It's nice to have some continuity. It usually takes a couple seasons to fully groom assistants to get them to understand what I'm looking for on and off the court. I always encourage my assistants to keep growing their roles and expanding their knowledge."

I know Shay Robinson went and spent some time with the Washington Wizards watching stuff they do with their players. And Terry Nooner is friends with Cleveland Cavaliers coach Tyrone Lue, so he was able to take in some Cavs workouts. Bett Shelby's also been on the court helping our players and has our recruiting engine running well. We're involved with a lot of potential players that would be tremendous additions to our program. A lot of that is due to Bett's tireless effort."

Frese does return four second-year members to the staff in assistant director of basketball performance Lanie Deppe, director of video Sean Ehlbeck, director of recruiting operations Joe Glowacki and Director of Player Personnel Anjalé Barrett. Three of the four are Maryland alums and returners to Frese's program.

- The Terps are in the Big Ten conference. They have earned a record of 58-3 in Big Ten play, including their nine wins in the Big Ten Tournament. They are 70-7 (.909) against Big Ten opponents in the 15 years under Brenda Frese. Maryland is 30-3 (.909) against Big Ten teams at home in XFINITY Center. All are under Frese.
- Brenda Frese signed a multi-year extension in November 2014 which will keep her at Maryland through at least 2021. With rollovers, she could be on the Maryland sidelines through 2025. She's brought the program its first national championship, three Final Fours, six Elite Eights and 3 NCAA Tournament appearances in her 14 postseasons. Frese has also brought in 13 top 15 recruiting classes and brought home nine conference titles.
- Frese signed the No. 4 recruiting class in the country this month, making it 12 top 10 recruiting classes in her 16 years in College Park. The Terrapins will welcome 6-5 forward Shakira Austin (Fredericksburg, Va.), 5-9 guard Taylor Mikesell (Massillon, Ohio) and 6-4 post Olivia Owens (Niskayuna, N.Y.) next summer. Austin is ranked No. 3 overall, per ESPN, Mikesell is

No. 32 and Owens is No. 33.

- Last year, the Terrapins led the Big Ten and were second in the country in rebounding margin (+13.9).
- Six returning Terrapins were named All-Big Ten Academic honorees last year - Kristen Confroy and Ieshia Small.
- Maryland ended the 2016-17 season ranked No. 4 in the final Associated Press poll (released March 13) and No. 8 in the final USA Today Top 25 Coaches poll. (released April 4).

Pound It Inside

- The Terrapins have beaten their opponents in the paint, 108-88 (36.0-29.3) this season.
- Last season, the Terps beat their opponents in the paint, 1,647-944 (47.1-26.9).
- They have scored 40 points in the paint in 26 out of 35 games last year with a season-high 72 vs. Maryland Eastern Shore on Nov. 16 and Saint Peter's on Dec. 8.

Total Team Effort

- The Terps had at least five players in double figures in two of three games this year.
- The Terps had at least four players in double figures in 18 out of 35 games last season.
- In 2016-17, Maryland's bench outscored opponents' benches, 866-532 (24.7-15.2).

Glass Cleaners

- The Terps have led their conference in rebounding margin the last six years straight - since the 2009-10 season.
- The Terrapins are +8.3 on the glass this year and have won the battle on the glass in two of three games so far.
- Last season, the Terps have outrebounded opponents 1,556-1,068 (44.5-30.5), for a rebounding margin of +13.9, which was second in the country.
- In 2015-16, the Terrapins led in the country with their rebounding margin of +15.5. This led all teams - men's and women's.

Terps in the Polls

- Maryland is one of the most consistent winning programs in the country. The Terrapins have been ranked in 132 straight Associated Press polls, dating back to the preseason poll of the 2010-11 season.
- Maryland has been ranked for 191 weeks in the last 14 seasons, with 165 of those weeks in the AP top 10 and 83 in the AP top 5.
 - Brenda Frese has had a team ranked in 229 weeks in her career.

Terps vs. Ranked Teams Under Frese

- Since Brenda Frese took over in 2002-03, Maryland has 66 wins over Associated Press top 25 teams, including 11 in the 2014-15 season, which set a new school record.
- Most recently, the Terrapins beat No. 22 West Virginia, 83-65 in the NCAA Second Round on March 19, 2017.
 - In 2014-15, the Terps won at No. 12 Nebraska, 75-47, on Jan. 3, at No. 23 Minnesota, 77-73, on Jan. 11, at No. 22 Rutgers, 71-59, on Jan. 15, vs. No. 20 Iowa, 93-88, on Feb. 1, vs. No. 19 Nebraska, 59-47, on Feb. 8, at No. 25 Northwestern, 69-48, on March 1, over Northwestern again, 74-63, on March 7, against

No. 13 Princeton in the NCAA Second Round and over No. 16 Duke, 65-55, in the NCAA Sweet Sixteen. Most recently, Maryland beat No. 6 Tennessee, 58-48, in the Elite Eight on March 30.

- The Terps won 10 games over ranked teams in the 2005-06 season, including six over top 10 opponents and four over top five teams.

- Under Frese, Maryland has 22 wins over AP top 10 teams, most recently a 78-72 win at No. 7 Louisville on Dec. 1.

- Maryland has five wins over No. 1 teams in its history, including two in Frese's time. The Terrapins beat No. 1 North Carolina twice in the 2005-06 season.

Maryland in the B1G

- The Terps are 102-32 (.761) all-time against their Big Ten opponents.

- Prior to the Jan. 2, 2016 loss to Ohio State, the Terps had won 31 straight games against Big Ten teams, dating back to 2007. The last loss to a Big Ten opponent was when the third-ranked Terps fell at No. 4 Rutgers, 68-60, on Dec. 3, 2007.

- Since joining the Big Ten in 2014-15, the Terrapins are 58-3 (.951) vs. their conference opponents, including their nine wins in the Big Ten Tournament.

- In the 15 years under Frese, the Terps are 70-7 (.909) against their Big Ten opponents.

- Frese is 82-13 (.863) all-time vs. Big Ten opponents, which includes her time at Minnesota and at Ball State.

- Maryland is 30-3 (.909) against Big Ten teams at home in XFINITY Center. All are under Frese. The first two losses were against Penn State on Dec. 4, 2002 and Ohio State in the NCAA Second Round in 2003.

- In her one season at Minnesota, Frese led the Gophers to a record of 22-8 overall, 11-5 in Big Ten play and an NCAA Tournament berth. She was named AP National Coach of the Year in April 2002.

Home Sweet Home

Maryland has been a dominant home team, especially over the last decade.

- The Terps are 517-131 (.798) all time in College Park, dating back to the inaugural 1971-72 season.

- Maryland is 224-36 (.862) at home under Brenda

Frese, whose first season in College Park was the inaugural season of XFINITY Center. That is among the top 10 toughest places to play in the country.

- The Terrapins are 134-9 (.937) all-time in non-conference games in XFINITY Center.

- Prior to Jan. 2, 2016, Maryland had won 28 straight home games since a 94-46 win over Pittsburgh on Feb. 6, 2014.

- The Terps won 48 straight home games starting Nov. 9, 2007 with a 76-52 season-opening win over Princeton. The streak ended on Jan. 21, 2010 with an 80-77 loss to Miami.

Overtime is Our Time

The phrase, "Overtime is our time!" became one of the catch phrases from the Terps' 2006 NCAA title run. That 2005-06 team went 6-0 in overtime games and won the national title in extra time vs. Duke.

- Maryland is 15-2 (.882) in overtime games in head coach Brenda Frese's 16 years.

- In the 2007-08 season, Frese was not on the sidelines for two of the Terps' overtime games. She missed a 97-86 double overtime loss at North Carolina on Jan. 26, 2008 and a 74-71 win at Virginia Tech on Feb. 4, 2008, due to her pregnancy with her sons.

- The Terps' only overtime loss with Frese on the sidelines was a 95-91 loss at Florida State on Jan. 16, 2005.

USA Terps!

- The Maryland women's basketball team represented the United States at the World University Games this past August in Taiwan.

- The Terrapins were selected by the United States International University Sports Federation (US-IUSF) to represent the United States in the World University Games.

- The World University Games are held every other year and are organized by the International University Sports Federation (FISU). The event is a multi-sport competition open to men and women who are between the ages of 17 and 24, and are or have been within the past year, a student at a college or university.

- The Terrapins added Michigan State alum Tori

- Nine of Brenda Frese's players at Maryland have won gold with USA Basketball. Most recently, Brionna Jones won gold in the World University Games in 2015.

Maryland Welcomes Eleanna Christinaki

The Terps announced the signing of All-SEC Freshman Team honoree Eleanna Christinaki last January and she will be eligible to play in the Terps' game vs. Coppin State on Dec. 20. Christinaki, a junior guard from Athens, Greece, comes to the Terrapins after playing her first season and a half at Florida.

- During her nine appearances with the Gators in 2016-17, Christinaki averaged 17.6 points, 4.7 rebounds, 3.0 assists, and 1.3 three-pointers made per game, as they earned a Top-25 ranking. She led the team in scoring and was second in assists. She was named to the All-SEC Preseason Second Team.

- In 2015-16, she was named to the All-SEC Freshman Team as she averaged 10.4 points and led the team with 3.4 assists per game. She helped lead the Gators to an NCAA Tournament bid. Christinaki played in all 31 games and started in 28 in her rookie season.

- Christinaki is also a member of the Greek Senior National Team and played for thre Greek National Team the past three summers. She helped the Greek National team advance to the Bronze medal game in the EuroBasket Championships.

Frese Signs 12th Top 10 Class

Brenda Frese signed the No. 4 recruiting class in the country earlier this week, making it 12 top 10 recruiting classes in her 16 years in College Park. The Terrapins will welcome 6-5 forward Shakira Austin (Fredericksburg, Va.), 5-9 guard Taylor Mikesell (Massillon, Ohio) and 6-4 post Olivia Owens (Niskayuna, N.Y.) next summer. Austin is ranked No. 3 overall, per ESPN, Mikesell is No. 32 and Owens is No. 33.

- Austin averaged 18.0 points and 12.3 rebounds per game last season as a junior and blocked 88 shots. She led her Colonial Forge team to Class 6A state title and was named The Fredericksburg Free-Lance Star Player of the Year.

- Mikesell averaged 22.5 points, 5.3 rebounds, 2.6 assists and 3.2 steals for her Jackson team last season, becoming the school's career scoring leader. She shot 89 percent from the foul line and enters her senior year with 1,405 points. She earned Associated Press Division I All-Ohio honors in sophomore and junior seasons. She was also named District Player of the Year as a junior in 2017. Mikesell represented the USA in the FIBA U17 World Championship in 2016. The team took bronze in Spain.

- Owens averaged 20.6 points and 12.3 rebounds as a junior last year. She was named MVP of her Niskayuna team last year. She scored 42 points in a game last season, which set a conference record for

boys and girls.

Terps In the Pros

- Seventeen Terrapins have been drafted since the start of the WNBA in 1997, including 13 under Brenda Frese.

- Eight of Frese's players have gone on to be drafted in the top 10, including: Crystal Langhorne (2008, 6th overall), Laura Harper (2008, 10th overall), Marissa Coleman (2009, 2nd overall), Kristi Toliver (2009, 3rd overall), Tianna Hawkins (2013, 6th overall), Alyssa Thomas (2014, 4th overall), Shatori Walker-Kimbrough (2017, 6th overall) and Brionna Jones (2017, 8th overall).

- Five former Terps have been named WNBA All-Stars - Vicky Bullett (1999), Crystal Langhorne (2011, 2013), Kristi Toliver (2013), Marissa Coleman (2015) and Alyssa Thomas (2017).

- Shatori Walker-Kimbrough made the WNBA All-Rookie Team in 2017. Thomas made the squad in 2014.

Next Level

- Over the last few years, multiple members of Frese's staff have made the jump to become head coaches or work in the NBA.

- In April 2015, associate head coach Tina Langley accepted the head coaching position at Rice.

- Five-year assistant coach David Adkins came to Maryland after becoming a highly-respected development coach at the high school level. In 2014, he was hired by the Washington Wizards as their assistant coach for player development.

- Former practice player and intern Ryan Richman was hired as the Wizards' assistant video coordinator prior to the 2013-14 season.

Terps in the Classroom

The Terrapins have a 100 percent graduation rate in the 16 years under Brenda Frese.

- Kristen Confroy is studying to become a doctor. Confroy is a Physiology and Neurobiology major.

- Confroy was named a Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and a CoSIDA Academic All-District honoree last year. Confroy is the current president of Maryland's Student Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) and is a member of Omicron Delta Kappa, the national leadership honor society.

- Three Terrapins were named All-Big Ten Academic honorees last year - Kristen Confroy, Brionna Jones and Ieshia Small.

Terrapins Partner With Team IMPACT

- The Maryland women's basketball team partnered with Team IMPACT, a national organization based in Boston, whose mission is to improve the quality of life for children facing life-threatening and chronic illnesses through the power of team.

- The Terrapins drafted Ashlyn, a 5-year old girl from Annapolis, Md., on Oct. 24, 2015, officially signing her on as a member of the team. Ashlyn deals with multiple diagnoses that complicate her daily life.

- Ashlyn was born with a heart defect called Supraventricular Tachycardia (SVT), which consists of an extremely sped up heart rate. Ashlyn also deals with muscular dystrophy, cyclic vomiting syndrome and asthma.

- Ashlyn has spent time with the Terrapins over the past two years, watching movies and accompanying them to many functions.

- Team IMPACT children are drafted onto college

Fear the Turtle!

- Maryland's bid to the 2017 NCAA Tournament marks its 14th straight postseason appearance. Thirteen of those 14 were NCAA Tournament bids.

- The Terps have averaged 28.5 wins per season the last 12 years, and have 13 consecutive 20-win seasons from 2004-2017.

- Frese has led the Terps to seven 30-win seasons. 2005-06 marked the first 30-win season for the program, as the Terrapins went 34-4 and won the 2006 NCAA title. The Terps won 30 games in 2007-08 when they went 33-4 and in 2008-09 when they went 31-5. In 2012-13, the Terps notched the program's fourth 30-win season with their record of 31-5. Maryland posted three straight 30-win seasons in 2014-15, 2015-16 and 2016-16.

- The Terrapins have won at least one postseason game (NCAA or WNIT) in each of the last 13 seasons.

- Maryland earned a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament in 2008, 2009 and 2015 and a No. 2 seed in 2006, 2007 and 2012.

There was no better fit for the University of Maryland women's basketball program than head coach Brenda Frese. The 2002 Associated Press (AP) National Coach of the Year arrived in College Park with great expectations and has not disappointed. Reviving a once-prominent women's basketball program back to the national stage, her high work rate and positive attitude has resulted in three Final Fours, 14-straight top 15 recruiting classes and a National Championship in 2006. Frese has balanced that strong work ethic with a fun and family-friendly environment, also becoming a wife and a mother of twin boys, giving birth to them in the midst of one of the most successful seasons in the program's history. With the birth of her twins in February of 2008, she becomes one of only six coaches to win a national championship and be a parent.

Now in her 16th season at Maryland, Frese has guided Maryland to a National Championship in 2006, three Final Fours, 14 winning seasons, 13-straight 20-win seasons, seven 30-win campaigns and 13 trips to the NCAA Tournament. In 2013, she signed an extension through at least June of 2021.

Frese and her staff led the Terrapins to an unprecedented level of success in their first year in the Big Ten in 2015. After losing five seniors, including three starters and a three-time All-American, Maryland led the league in scoring with 80.2 points per game, en route to a perfect 18-0 conference record in a new league and a 24-game win streak over three months. The Terrapins were the first team to go undefeated in conference play since Purdue went 16-0 in 1998-99 and Ohio State went 18-0 in 1984-85. The Terps were the first Maryland team, men's or women's, to stay perfect in conference play. Frese was named Big Ten Coach of the Year for the second time in her career.

Former Athletics Director Deborah A. Yow courted the 2002 AP National Coach of the Year because of Frese's reputation for making amazing turnarounds and her relentless work ethic in recruiting. Described as dynamic, overachieving, determined and enthusiastic, the 44-year old coach is one of college basketball's stars. Standing atop the podium in Boston in 2006, Frese became the fifth-youngest coach (age 35) in NCAA history to win a national title and only the ninth to win in her first trip to the Final Four.

Frese has built the team's success around recruiting, hard work and a positive atmosphere. The instant she arrived on campus, she determinedly worked the recruiting trails in an effort to reclaim the elite status Maryland once had in the 1980s. Success came quickly and early. Before she even coached a game in the newly-constructed XFINITY Center, she received commitments from a pair of high school All-Americans, including Shay Doron, who went on to become a three-time All-ACC pick and a WNBA Draft selection. In all, 30 high school All-Americans have donned a Maryland uniform under Frese's reign.

Thirteen of Frese's recruiting classes at Maryland have been ranked in the top-15, including 10 rated in the top-10 and six in the top five. The landmark signings of Crystal Langhorne, Laura Harper, Jade Perry and Ashleigh Newman were rated No. 2 in the country, while the class of Marissa Coleman and Kristi Toliver was ranked No. 4 - the core of the Terps' national championship team. Her 2010 batch of Terrapins included three high school All-Americans and a No. 2 national ranking.

Frese's recruiting classes have lived up to their billing and her pupils have earned numerous accolades. In 2012, Alyssa Thomas became the first Maryland

sophomore to be named a WBCA All-American, and was also named to the AP All-American First Team and the USBWA All-American Team. The first Terp in 17 years to garner All-American nods in 2006, Langhorne was a three-time AP and USBWA All-American, the program's first multiple All-American. She was selected a WBCA All-American in 2007, the first in school history since 1989, and then again received the accolade in 2008.

Toliver repeated Langhorne's AP, WBCA and USBWA All-American "trifecta" in 2008. The legendary point guard, however, became the first Terp in school history to be named to the AP's All-America First Team as a senior in 2009 - to go along with another set of WBCA and USBWA All-American laurels. Coleman, Toliver's classmate, also earned AP, WBCA and USBWA All-American honors at the conclusion of her illustrious senior campaign in 2009.

Frese's players have also received numerous conference honors. Thomas was named ACC Player of the Year as a sophomore in 2012. She is just the second sophomore in the history of ACC women's basketball to earn the league's most prestigious honor and went on to win the ACC Tournament MVP honor that year. Thomas garnered the league's top honor in her junior and senior seasons as well and was just the second player in history to earn the honor three times. In her final season, Langhorne was selected the ACC's Player of the Year, the first Terp to win the award in nearly 20 years. Toliver followed suit in 2009 - the third Terp ever to win the award. In 2005, Langhorne became the program's first ACC Rookie of the Year since 1991. Coleman followed in her footsteps by nabbing the honor during the Terps' championship campaign in 2006. Center Lynetta Kizer and Thomas made it four Terps in six years to be named the league's top freshman when they won in 2009 and 2011.

In all, 35 Terps have received All-Conference citations in Frese's years, including a school-record four in 2008 when Langhorne, Coleman, Toliver and Harper were selected and in 2012 when Thomas, Tianna Hawkins, Laurin Mincy and Lynetta Kizer were honored. Six Terps have been First Team All-ACC selections 13 times in Frese's tenure. Langhorne became Maryland's first three-time, first team all-conference selection and the first to be named All-ACC four times. Coleman joined Langhorne as the lone Terps to ever be selected to an All-ACC team four times, stamping her three second-team honors with a first-team selection in 2009. Thomas was also a four-time selection and three-time first team honoree.

Numerous Terps have also garnered national recognition under Frese. Toliver became the first Terrapin to earn the highest point guard honor in the country, winning the Nancy Leiberman Award in 2008, after being a finalist the previous year. Several have earned spots on national player of the year candidate lists, making history in the fall of 2006. That year, for the first time ever, four players from the same team were selected preseason candidates for the WBCA's prestigious Wade Trophy when Doron, Coleman, Langhorne and Toliver were put on the Watch List. All five starters were tabbed preseason honorees for the Naismith Award, also a first in the history of the award.

2017-18 Maryland Women's Basketball

Maryland has rewritten several records over the last few seasons. In 2007-08, the Terps became the first team in NCAA history to have four active players with at least 1,000 points on the same roster. That year, school records were broken for most home wins (21), which is also believed to be an NCAA record. The team opened the 2006-07 campaign winning 18-straight games, setting the program record for best start to a season. Maryland ended the 2008-09 campaign having won a school-record 36-straight home games, thanks to undefeated home marks in two successive seasons, and 40-consecutive non-conference games at the XFINITY Center. In the 2009-10 season the Terrapins extended that streak to 48, a Maryland men's and women's basketball record.

In 2005-06, the team's 34 wins set a school record, shattering the previous mark of 29. The championship squad also set new standards for highest road winning percentage (.900), points (3,166), field goal attempts (2,363), 3-point field goals (216), 3-point attempts (540), free throws (690), free throw attempts (924), team free throw percentage (.747), rebounds (1,720) and blocked shots (195).

Numerous individual records have also fallen in recent years. Among the most notable are the career scoring and rebounding records, which now own to Thomas. Langhorne shattered the previous marks, becoming the first-ever Terrapin to score 2,000 points and to grab 1,000 rebounds - an elite list of which Coleman later joined.

Maryland's rise into the upper-echelon of the country has bolstered the excitement surrounding the team. Over the last ten years, the program has ranked in the top-25 in the nation in attendance, including top-10 rankings in five of the last 10 seasons. In 2007, Maryland recorded the nation's largest one-season improvement in home attendance, averaging 9,533 fans in 16 games, almost double the average from the previous season (4,183) - with more than 150,000 people making their way through the XFINITY Center turnstiles, a school-record. By the end of the '07 campaign, the Terps were sixth in the nation in average attendance and fourth in overall attendance, as 241,280 spectators filled the stands at home and on the road to watch the Terps play in 34 games. In 2008, Maryland hosted over 160,000 fans in 21 games and was ranked eighth in the nation in average attendance that year, followed by a No. 6 ranking in 2009 (133,336 in 15 games).

One of the highlights of the 2006-07 campaign was the announcement of two sellout games in XFINITY Center, the first- and second-ever in the young facility. The stands were filled to capacity when the Terps hosted North Carolina on Jan. 28, 2007, breaking the ACC's single-game record, the first women's basketball sellout since 1992. The record was matched in the regular-season finale on Feb. 18, 2007, when Duke came to College Park.

In the classroom, the Terps have also been all-star students. Frese's Terps have earned 37 Academic All-Conference honors, while five have received Academic All-American nods by ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA.

Shay ROBINSON

Maryland head women's basketball coach Brenda Frese announced the hiring of assistant coach Shay Robinson in July 2014. Robinson comes to College Park after spending the previous season with the Kansas women's basketball program.

In his first three seasons in College Park, Robinson has helped the Terrapins to a record of 97-10 (.907), three straight Big Ten regular season and tournament titles, and the 2015 Final Four. In 2015-16, the Terrapins led the country - men's and women's teams - with their rebounding margin (+15.1).

"We're really excited about this hire and what Shay Robinson brings to our program," Frese said. "It's always great when you get new ideas and new energy. He's a dynamic guy that can help us in a lot of different ways. We also love that we're adding his wife Tonya to our team. With their passion and values, they're going to fit right in here at Maryland."

"I always want to surround our players with great people that can help them get better. The player development piece is something that's really important to me and it's helped us be successful. Developing our players has always been a team effort shared by our staff and it was crucial to me that Shay is terrific at it. He was endorsed by some people in the business whose opinions I really value. One of those people is Dee Brown, who's considered one of the best in all of basketball at player development. Shay will be working with our perimeter players and I know he's really excited about getting started with our team."

Prior to his season with the Jayhawks, Robinson worked at Air Force and worked as the head instructor at one of the most elite basketball performance centers in the country, the EDGE Training Facility in Orlando.

Robinson served for five years as the assistant director and head instructor at EDGE Training Facility, known as the premier training facility in the state of Florida. In conjunction with former Boston Celtic Dee Brown, Robinson managed daily basketball operations while performing individual and team skill development sessions, camps and clinics. His vast clientele ranged from beginning players to elite high school, college and professional athletes in the NBA and European Leagues.

A native of Greensboro, N.C., Robinson worked the coaching ranks for many years. He coached the girls' basketball team at Viera High School during the 2010-11 season, helping the squad win its first district championship while posting a 22-3 overall record. Robinson also served as an assistant coach with the boys' varsity program at Viera from 2006-09.

During the 2009-10 season, Robinson served as an assistant men's basketball coach at Brevard Community College. There, he was in charge of guard and post player development, while assisting with offensive and defensive philosophies. Other responsibilities included recruiting, team film sessions, scouting, academic monitoring and mentorship of student athletes.

Robinson graduated from James B. Dudley High School before enlisting in the Air Force in 1996. Robinson served more than eight years on active duty in the Air Force. While enlisted, he deployed on numerous tours of duty, including three tours in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom, spending time as a Weapons Load Crew member on F-16s, as well as Special Operations Senior Command Post Controller.

During his military career, Robinson received various medals and was awarded the distinguished John Levitow Award in 2002. He was also named Air Force Special Operations Command, Command Post Controller of the Year in 2002-03, before his honorable discharge in 2004.

In August 2007, Robinson earned a bachelor of science in sports and fitness with a specialization in coaching theory from the University of Central Florida. He also holds a master of science in athletic administration from Nova Southeastern University (2010). Robinson is an active member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA), National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) and the Black Coaches & Administrators (BCA) organization. Robinson is married to Tonya, who is also an Air Force veteran.



Bett SHELBY

Assistant Coach • 3rd year • Greensboro College '06

Maryland head women's basketball coach Brenda Frese announced the hiring of assistant coach Bett Shelby in April 2015. Shelby comes to College Park after spending the previous two seasons with the Virginia Tech women's basketball program.

In her two seasons in College Park, Shelby helped the Terrapins to a record of 63-7 (.900) and back-to-back Big Ten regular season and tournament titles. She also helped the Terps put the finishing touches on the No. 1 recruiting class in the class of 2016.

"Bett Shelby is someone I've known for a few years now," Frese said. "We've crossed paths in a lot of gyms and I've watched how hard she works. If you look at any program she's been a part of, her presence has elevated the team. People that she's worked with sing her praises as a relentless competitor, which is exactly what we want at Maryland. I'm excited to help her continue to grow here and watch her become a great addition."

Shelby joined the Virginia Tech staff in May 2013. She served as recruiting coordinator, and also helped with on-court preparation, scouting and guard training. In 2015, Shelby helped the Hokies sign a top-20 recruiting class and win two ACC Tournament games for the first time in school history.

Shelby came to Blacksburg after serving as an assistant coach at Seton Hall for two seasons where she coordinated aspects of recruiting, scouted opponents and coached the guards. In 2012, Shelby helped sign a class ranked 33rd nationally by All Star Girls Report. The class featured the 19th best forward in the country as well as the 73rd best overall player in the 2012 class and a NJCAA All-American.

During the 2012-13 season, Shelby helped coach the Pirates to the most school wins since the 2008-09 season as well as the most Big East victories since the 2006-07 season. The team also claimed its first Big East Tournament win since the 2008-09 season.

Prior to Seton Hall, Shelby served on the staff at Southern Illinois where she landed a recruiting class ranked 37th nationally by ESPN HoopGurlz. In addition, the class was tabbed the No. 1 mid-major class that season by ESPN HoopGurlz. The All-Star Girls report ranked Shelby's class 57th nationally and No. 1 in the Missouri Valley Conference. The class included SIU's first Parade All-American, Top-100 player (ESPN HoopGurlz) and a top-100 transfer as named by the All-Star Girls Report.

A native of Charlotte, N.C., Shelby was an assistant coach at Tennessee Tech in 2010 and was responsible for an All-Star Girls Report Top-100 recruiting class, ranking No. 1 in the Ohio Valley Conference. Shelby also spent one season as the recruiting coordinator and assistant coach at Stetson University, helping recruit a Top-100 recruiting class according to All-Star Girls Report that ranked first in the Atlantic Sun Conference.

Shelby spent two seasons as the Director of Basketball Operations at East Carolina. During her time at ECU, the Pirates won the Conference USA title and reached the NCAA Tournament for the first time in 25 years.

Shelby played collegiately at UNC Wilmington during her first two seasons. She spent her junior and senior seasons at Greensboro College where she served as team captain. The team won the USA South regular-season and conference titles during her time. During her senior year, the team advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament with a 22-8 record.

Shelby graduated from Greensboro College with her bachelor's degree in Sports and Exercise Studies with a concentration in coaching in 2006.

Shelby's parents are Brad and Texie Shelby and sister is Mary Shelby of Charlotte, N.C.



TerryNOONER

Assistant Coach • 3rd year • Kansas '00

Maryland women's basketball head coach Brenda Frese announced the hiring of assistant coach Terry Nooner in September 2015. Nooner comes to College Park after coaching at Alabama the two previous seasons. Prior to his time with the Crimson Tide, Nooner coached at his alma mater, Kansas, where he played from 1997-2000.

"Coach Nooner came highly recommended to me by quite a few people," Frese said. "I really like his background and how he's worked his way up the ladder. He played for Roy Williams at Kansas and was a team captain. That says a lot about what kind of leader he was for one of the most successful coaches in the business. He's been an assistant for different, successful women's coaches. And he started at the grassroots level, so he knows both sides of the equation. We're excited to welcome him and his family to Maryland."

In his first two years in College Park, Nooner helped the Terrapins to a record of 63-7 (.900), as well as back-to-back Big Ten regular season and tournament titles. He worked with the post players, helping the Terrapins maintain their rebounding dominance on a national scale. In 2016, they led the nation for all men's and women's teams with their rebounding margin of +15.1. In 2017, they were No. 2 in the nation in rebounding (+13.9).

In Nooner's first season at Alabama, the Tide won 14 games, playing one of the most difficult schedules in the nation. Seven of those victories came in Southeastern Conference play, which was the most league wins for the Crimson Tide in over 12 years. Alabama also had several notable victories including the first in Lexington against Kentucky since 2002, the first against Georgia since 2004, snapping a 23-game losing streak to the Lady Bulldogs, and the first in program history at Vanderbilt's Memorial Gym.

Nooner spent one season at his alma mater as an assistant with the women's team. He helped the Jayhawks to one of their most successful seasons, as Kansas finished with a 20-14 overall record in 2012-13. The Jayhawks advanced to the fourth NCAA Sweet 16 in program history and their first in back-to-back seasons. He returned to Lawrence after serving as an assistant for one year at Southern Illinois.

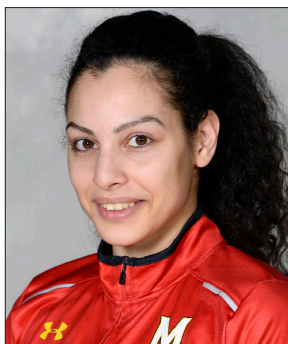
